#### BUDGET & ADVISORY COMMITTEE COMMENT'S

The Budget and Advisory Committee met frequently with Selectmen and their Committees in the latter part of the year to review and refine budget requirements. The cooperation of the various individuals involved is appreciated.

The Budget submitted represent a sizable (19.4%) increase over the previous year. Some of the increase results from a new state requirement that the road funds be voted in entirety before any off setting state grants are included. The majority (11.4%) of the increase, however, results from a decision by the Road Agent and Selectmen to offer a major on-going repair program for all gravel roads. It is understood that similar amounts would be requested in each succeeding year as a routine item.. With this exception, the Committee recommends passage of the Budget as presented.

#### SELECTMENS COMMENT'S

At this writing (Feb. 1st) the Selectmen are considering the implications in the recent theft of tools and equipment at the Town Barn. The loss has been estimated at \$6,000.00 and most of the items taken will have to be replaced. Even though we expect insurance to cover most of the loss (after the \$1,000.00) deductable) the theft clearly raises the issue of security for the Town Buildings other than the Town Barn as well as their contents. (Library, Fire Station, Town Hall and Annex)

The Selectmen unanimously agree that immediate steps must be taken to try to secure the replacement tools and rquipment in the Town Barn

and to make a similar effort to protect other Town property.

Accordingly, a security system for the Town Barn, Fire Station, Library, Town Hall and Annex has been proposed as an Article in the Town Warrant at a cost of \$13,000.00.

The new Town Offices in the Town Hall Annex have been in use since October 1983 and seem to be working out well. Town Records are centralized and accessable, access to the Selectmens office is easier and the surroundings there more attractive.

There are two items in the 1984 budget which may need explanation. There has been an accounting change and now all appropriations are listed as "gross". That is, the total contemplated expenditure is shown even though payment for a portion of it may come from grants, revenue sharing or other sources.

You will note a line item in the Highway budget for a re-gravelling Town Roads on a regular scheduled plan extending over 15 years. This item of \$36,000.00 will be explained in detail by the Road Agent. The Selectmen take no position on this item believing that the implementation of an annual program of this magnitude should rest exclusively upon a vote of the Town.

There has apparently been some confusion over the 1983 property assessments. No changes were made in assessments totals for 1983 except for adjustments for errors, etc. in individual cases. There was however an accounting change. Site improvement (septic systems, water supply, driveways, plantings, etc.) have been shifted from buildings assessment to land. In most cases the assessed value of a building has been reduced and the assessed value of the land increased by a like amount with no change in the over-all assessment.

Forecast of a possible 1984 tax rate is difficult. The County Tax has not been determined, the preliminary Conval Assessment increase estimate could mean an additional \$2.00 to \$3.00 on the current tax rate by itself. Increases in the budget and warrant articles (if passed) could cause an additional increase roughly estimated in the table below.

The proposed 1984 net budget (expenses less anticipated estimated revenues) is approximately \$37,300.00 more than 1983 actual appropriations. This is largly due to the \$36,000.00 item for regravelling of roads in the Highway portion of the 1984 budget.

Polls will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Voting on Article 1 thru 5 will be at the polls.

Remaining Articles will be considered at the meeting held at 10:00 a.m. March 17, 1984 at the Town Hall.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Francestown in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on Tuesday the thirteenth day of March, 1984 at 10:00 a.m. in the morning for the choice of Town Officers elected by official ballot and such action required to be inserted on said ballot. Article 1 thru 5.

The polls will open on said date at 10:00 a.m. and will close not earlier than 6:00 p.m. in the evening.

You are hereby notified that the second session of the annual meeting of the Town of Francestown will be held at the Town Hall on Saturday, the seventeenth day of March, 1984 at 10:00 a.m. in the morning to act on those matters not to be voted on by official ballot.

#### ARTICLE 1.

To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing terms.

#### ARTICLE 2.

To see if the Town will vote to rescind the existing Zoning Ordinance and adopt the new Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board.

(Ballot Question)

#### ARTICLE 3.

To see what provisions the Town will vote to adopt as Article VI of the new Zoning Ordinance with regard to accommodation of mobile homes as proposed by the Planning Board. (Ballot Questions)

#### ARTICLE 4.

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Building Permit Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board.
(Ballot Question)

#### ARTICLE 5.

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendment to the existing Zoning Ordinance as proposed by petition of the voters of this town which would create a Recreation District and regulations relating thereto.

(Ballot Question)

#### ARTICLE 6.

To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

#### ARTICLE 7.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sufficient sum of money to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 8.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appy for, accept, and expend money from the State, Federal or other Governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA Chapter 31:95-b.

#### ARTICLE 9.

To see if the Town will vote to accept ownership of the new 1983 Chevrolet Rescue Truck, purchased by the Francestown Volunteer Fire Company, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 10.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-Seven Thousand Dollars (\$57,000.00) to purchase a new tanker with a 750 CPM pump to be funded as follows: to authorize the withdrawal of Thirty-Seven Thousand Three Hundred Ninety-Five Dollars (\$37,395.00) from the Capital Reserve Fund for the future replacement of Fire Trucks, the withdrawal of Ten Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$10,500.00) from Revenue Sharing Fund and the balance on Nine Thousand One Hundred Five Dollars (\$9,105.00) to be raised by taxation, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 11.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell or trade the 1947 Ford Brushbreaker (37M3) and the 1967 army surplus Rescue Truck (37R1) said sums from sales to be applied toward purchase of new equipment for use with present Fire Trucks, or take any action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 12.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of Fire Trucks, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 13.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of Fire Department radio equipment, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 14.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future purchase of, or replacement of road equipment, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 15.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future replacement of the Police Department cruiser, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 16.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Nineteen Dollars (\$619.00) for the support of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 17.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Four Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$2,460.00) to the Monadock Community Visiting Nurse Association to support the continuance of health services now being provided through an agreement with Home Health Care and Community Services, inc., or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 18.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$3,200.00) to replace the tools and equipment of Anthony Roberts that were stolen from the Town Garage, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 19.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000.00) for a Alarm System for security and fire for the Town Hall Annex, Town Hall, Library, Fire Station and Town Barn, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 20.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to paint the Town Hall and to re-glaze and paint the windows, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 21.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Three Hundred Twenty-Five Dollars (\$1,325.00) to purchase a Base Station Radio for the Police Department, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 22.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$650.00) to construct a drainage system/ditch in front of the Library to divert the water that comes in and soaks the SW & NW corners in the basement/ground floor, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 23.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$1,100.00) to construct a fence in back of the Library Property to be funded as follows: to authorize the withdrawal of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) from the Vose Trust Fund and the balance of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) to be raised by taxation, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 24.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$3,900.00) to re-roof and insulate the Town Barn, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 25.

To see if the Town will vote to withdraw the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) from the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase or replacement of Road Equipment, to be used for a 2nd sander and plow, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 26.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$4,600.00) to remove the ledge to correct the dangerous lack of visibility on County Road North, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 27.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) to repair the bridge on Cross Road, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 28.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) to make the end of Bible Hill Road ((McDonough & Partridge) back to gravel, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 29.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$7,200.00) to shim Reid Road, or take any other action relating thereto.

#### ARTICLE 30.

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance relative to the regulation of the Town Beach area at Scobie Pond:

In accordance with the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 31:39, the Town of Francestown hereby adopts the following ordinance:

- 1. It shall be unlawful for any person who is not a resident or taxpayer of the Town of Francestown or a bona fide guest of a resident or taxpayer to use the Town Beach. The Board of Selectmen may implement a system requiring all residents and taxpayers to display stickers or other identification to enforce this provision.
- 2. No litter or refuse of any nature shall be deposited or left on the Town Beach area or in any parking area adjacent thereto or in the waters of the pond, except in trash cans provided for the purpose.
- 3. No alcoholic beverages or glass containers of any kind shall be allowed on the Town Beach or surrounding area.
- 4. It shall be unlawful to damage, deface or destroy any structures, plant or natural features on the Town Beach or surrounding area.

- 5. It shall be unlawful for any person to swim or be present at the Town Beach unless such person is adequately garbed in a bathing suit or other clothing.
- 6. It shall be unlawful to disobey an oral or written request or order of an agent of the Town in connection with the conduct of persons while on the Town Beach or surrounding area.
- 7. The Town Beach shall be closed between the hours of 9 p.m. and 8 a.m. the following day, and it shall be unlawful for any person to be on the Town Beach or surrounding area or in the water serviced by the beach. It shall be unlawful to undertake any conduct which shall be disorderly or so as to endanger the safety and welfare of others using the beach. Intoxication and obscene or indecent acts are expressly prohibited.
- 8. No pets or other animals shall be allowed on the beach or in the water serviced by the beach.
- 9. No vehicles shall be allowed to remain overnight on the Town property and no camping or tenting is allowed on the Town Beach or surrounding area.

Any person found guilty of violating any part of the Ordinance herein set forth shall be subject to a fine of up to One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) in accordance with the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 31:39, 111 (1983 Supp.).

This ordinance shall take effect upon passage.

#### ARTICLE 31.

(By Petition) Pursuant to RSA 39-3, we, the undersigned, respectfully request the Board of Selectmen to include the following article in the 1984 Town Warrant:

"To see if the Town of Francestown shall call upon the Governor and Executive Council, its State Representative(s) and State Senator to promptly convene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of huge cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant on the citizens, businesses, schools and agencies in the Town of Francestown, and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire."

#### ARTICLE 32.

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Article 26. Voted to go on record in support of immediate action by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Francestown and to the health and welfare of the people of Francestown. These actions shall include;

1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain,

sulfur dioxide emissions by the year 1990.

2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the Government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal. The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States.

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds and account groups of the Town of Francestown, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1983 and have issued our report thereon, dated January 13, 1984. As part of our examination, we reviewed and tested the Town's system of internal accounting control to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted auditing standards. Under these standards, the purpose of such evaluation is to establish a basis for reliance thereon in determining the nature, timing, and extent of other such auditing procedures that are necessary for expressing an opinion on the financial statements.

The objective of internal accounting control is to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance as to the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of a system of internal accounting control should not exceed the benefits derived and also recognizes that the evaluation of these factors necessarily requires estimates and judgement by management.

There are inherent limitations that should be recognized in considering the potential effectiveness of any system of internal accounting control. In the performance of most control procedures, errors can result from misunderstanding of instructions, mistakes of judgement, carelessness, or other personal factors. Control procedures whose effectiveness depends upon segregation of duties can be circumvented by collusion. Similarly, control procedures can be circumvented intentionally by management with respect to the estimates and judgements required in the preparation of financial statements. Further, projection of any evaluation of internal accounting control to future periods is subject to the risk that the procedures may become inadequate because of changes in condition and that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

Our study and evaluation of the Town's system of internal accounting control for the year would not necessarily disclose all weaknesses in the system. Such study and evaluation did not disclose any material weaknesses. However, the recommendations on administration and operational matters not directly related to internal accounting control, as listed below, were developed from our observation of the Town's operations. They are not the result of a special study.

### CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PROGRAM

The Town does not currently employ capital improvements budgeting and programming techniques. We believe the Town should develop a long term plan for capital expenditures. Capital expenditures include expenditures for buildings, land, and major equipment, all of which have useful lives of several years.

A capital improvement program lists each proposed capital item, the year in which it will be started, the amount expected to be expended in a given year, and the proposed method of financing the expenditure. The budget would be acted upon annually at the Town meeting, and may vary from the capital improvement program. The capital improvement program would then be updated to reflect departures from the original program.

### TAX WARRANT FILE COPIES

We noted that the Board of Selectmen does not maintain file copies of the document committing taxes to the Tax Collector. We recommend that a copy of these documents become a part of the Selectmen's files.

### HIGHWAY EQUIPMENT REPAIRS

Highway equipment repairs are currently charged to the General Expense of Highways account and are processed in the same manner as other invoices. This process does not provide sufficient information for the Board of Selectmen to decide whether to continue repairs or replace equipment. We recommend that cost information about repairs to specific pieces of equipment be captured as part of routine invoice processing.

We noted that several of our prior audit recommendations were adopted. We wish to thank the officials of Francestown for their assistance during our engagement.

As stated in last year's report, some of our equipment was slated to be replaced. This year, the F.V.F.D. purchased, at a cost of \$19,002.35, a new 1983 Rescue truck. It replaces our 1967 Army surplus vehicle.

The funds used came from a saving account, which has accrued from yearly fund raising and from this years fund raiser,

car washes.

The F.V.F.D. would, at this time, like to thank all for their generous support, which made it possible to buy this new truck.

The Board of Fire Wards, along with a committee from the fire department have been at work looking into prices and drawing up specifications for the purpose of buying a new pumper tanker. An article will appear in the warrant to see if the town will vote to approve the purchase. This particular piece of equipment will provide us with 2244 gallons of water, plus a 750 gallon per minute pump. It would replace our 1947 tanker, which has a maximun capacity of only 150 gallons per minute and a holding capacity of only 500 gallons of water. With this new tanker we would be able to provide better service to our community and also offer better help for our out of town mutual aid calls.

The department sponsored fire prevention educational program, entitled Captain NoBurn, for school children, has been a great success and will be continued with this years program featuring wood burning stove safety.

The F.V.F.D. is open to new membership. If interested, contact me or any department member. The department also wishes at this time to thank the Women's Auxiliary for their

continued support.

In November, the Francestown Volunteer Fire Department suffered a very great loss with the passing if its First Deputy Chief, Lawrence R. Kullgren. Larry was in the fire service for twenty-five years, serving as fireman, First Deputy Chief, member of the Board of Fire Wards, and as Deputy Forest Fire Warden for the state of NH. He was totally dedicated to the Francestown Fire Department and all its work. He will be missed by all.

# REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Once again, our cooperative town and state forest fire prevention and control program leads the nation in least acres burned per forest fire. Less than one-half acre per fire statewide average.

At the town level, your Forest Fire Warden is responsible for the prevention and control of all grass and woods fires when the ground is not snow covered.

Forest fire prevention is achieved at the town level by issuing a written permit for every fire that is to be kindled on the ground out of doors when the ground is not covered with snow. Each person wishing to have an outside fire must obtain this written permit from the town Fire Warden before kindling the fire. Any person that does not obtain a fire permit, when one is required, is violating our forest fire permit law and is subject to a court appearance and could be fined up to \$1,000 and receive a jail sentence of up to one year.

No fire permit will be issued between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is raining. The reason for this is towfold: the fire danger increases steadily between 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., then subsides to a safe level between 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. This happens because the sun dries out the fine fuels that are easily ignited and dries the air which permits rapid fire spread. Also during this part of the day fire fighters are not readily available in most communities só an escaped fire could burn longer and cause greater damage before being suppressed.

Your cooperation in burning only when conditions are safe is greatly appreciated.

As Smokey says, "Remember, Only You Can Prevent Forest Fires!"

#### ROAD AGENT REPORT - 1983

1983 was a "Learning Year" for your new Road Agent. Just learning the nick names and locations of all the roads was a chore in itself. (Dog Farm Road is Cross Road - Ball Park Road is County Road South - Halls Hill is Woodward Hill etc etc.) Also being the middle man between the people - the Selectmen - the Budget Committee and various Beaver Dams was to say the least interesting.

As to whether or not the roads are in better condition now then when I started is questional point. Certainly the "Tar" roads are, and with the regular 3 year sealing plan now in effect there will continue to slowly improve each

year.

The gravel roads, which represent 60% of all roads, unfortunalty continue tto erode and are therefore in worse condition than a year ago. This trend will continue until a long range reconstruction plan goes into effect. I have proposed such a plan to the Selectmen which consists of providing proper ditching and drainage as well as adding approximately 12" of gravel at least once every 15 years. The funding for first year of this program will be voted on at this Town Meeting. I would like to make it clear that I have no "ax to grind" concerning this gravel plan but rather I am looking for guidance from the people who drive on the Towns gravel roads and who pay the bills. The main emphasis this year was put into "saving" of the

The main emphasis this year was put into "saving" of the badly deteriorating "tar" roads with very little money to do much else besides routine maintenance. Next years' budget include extensive ditching and shoulder work, both

of which have been badly neglected.

These two items and hopefully the regravelling project will provide the start of the long range improvement of the

total road system.

In closing I would like to publicy thank Clayton Foote for his patience and help during this "breaking in year" - his knowledge of the roads was invaluable to me. The Town owes "JR" a sincere thank you.

#### WASTE DISPOSAL & RECYCLING COMMISSION

We wish to apologize to the families of Francestown for the overflow conditions at our waste disposal area at the end of each weekend. Our town is growing rapidly and our method of collecting the waste materials is not keeping up with this

growth rate.

 $ar{ exttt{W}}$ e have arranged to add another  $10 ext{-yd}$  container at our pick-up station, which we hope will alleviate the overflow. If it is possible for some of you to bring your refuse on Tuesdays and Thursdays, when our containers are not filled to capacity, it might help the overflow which occurs most Sundays. Also if more of you would separate your newspaper (in bundles) and the bottles and leave them in front of the bins and not in the containers, it might also help relieve the weekend crush.

The New Hampshire Resourse Recovery Association, of which we are members, has now organized more efficient pick-up and sale of newspapers and bottles, and it is our hope this coming year to realize more income from the sales of these recyclable materials. We also are investigating a more efficient way to compact waste materials on a daily basis and thereby eliminating the overflow on weekends. This method may not be less costly than our present method of using the 10-yd containers, but it will avoid the weekend mess, the need for additional containers as the number of households grow and through increased recycling efforts on the part of all of us, increase our income from the sale of recyclable materials.

For the present we can still use the Antrim/Bennington landfill operation. Down the road we will be seeking a larger community area and to join in transferring our waste materials to their energy generating units; so that there will be less use of landfill operations to dispose of waste

materials.

Except for the new Zoning Ordinance, there are no matters pending before the Board.

Dear Selectmen:

The enclosed is written to request continued funding support for Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service for the 1984 fiscal year. Over the past ten years we have maintained the same request of 50¢ per capita from the towns we serve. This year however, due to changes in service requirements mandated by the State Division of Mental Health, we must ask that the requested amount be increased to 75¢ per capita.

The increase will assist in our efforts to continue providing mental health services to the citizens in our catchment area. As an agency we have made and are making efforts to assure the services are continued by staff cutbacks, salary freeze and increased workload.

At 75¢ per capita the amount requested from Francestown is \$618.75, based on the 1980 census data. These funds will be used to assist in continuing services for families and individuals of Francestown. Last year 22 people from Francestown were seen by our agency.

The Peterboro District Office of Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service provides the full range of mental health care to the region, including outpatient and inpatient counseling, day treatment and 24 hour emergency services, seven days a week. There are no age or diagnostic restrictions to our services. The support from our towns have always been critical to our programs. This year however, this is probably more crucial than ever. If there are any questions regarding our programs, or more information is needed, please do not hesitate to contact my office.

#### HISTORIANS REPORT 1983

The population of Francestown continues to increase and is now 898. There were 10 building permits issued for new single family dwellings and 21 permits for additions,

alterations, outbuildings etc.
"Francestown Echoes" is the name given to an Oral History of our town being recorded by friends of the library. Early in the year this program was begun with a borrowed tape recorder and some tapes purchased by the library with money from their Special Fund and several donations. In October the Francestown Improvement and Historical Society (FIHS) voted \$300.00 to support this project and for the purchase of a recorder and tapes.

Interviews conducted so far have included the following people: Arthur Lord, Emily Lord, Ruth and Arthur Lord, Don and Winnie Hoyt, Merle Mace, Rhoda Lemander, Lucy Holt Andolina, Hervey Patch, Bob Cutter, Fran and Don Pettee, Amy Foote, Elizabeth Thompson, Ingie Anderson, "The Clark Girls: Connie, Betty and June", Reese O'Hanlon, Ethel

Caroline Woodbury, and Norton Brown.

Additional interviews are scheduled and suggestions or contributions will be most welcome. Anyone wishing to hear the tapes should contact the librarian.

The FIHS sponsored a lecture by itinerant painter, Christopher Gurshin. A large mural painting was

demonstrated and is on display at the library.

The front of the Town Office building which was renovated, by vote of 1982 Town Meeting, was criticized as being inappropriate to its location on the common, when the overhead doors were replaced with a very modern type of window very prominently placed in the center of the building, A concerned group of citizens backed by the FIHS raised over \$2,800 to redesign and replace the windows with traditional colonial style thus restoring the atmosphere of the common area.

The FIHS contributed \$500.00 matched by a grant from the the Interior and processed by the State Preservation Dept. for a study of the Meeting House, Town and horse sheds by John Merkle, architectural

historian.

The Labor Day Fair continues to be FIHS major fund raising event; The theme of this year parade was "Francestown at work and Play". A pleasant departure from the usual found the judges "Francestown people". They were Joseph Ludwig, and former residents Rhoda Lemander and Mrs. Lawrence

Oak Hill Grange awarded its citizen of the year award to Emily Lord who at 90 years of age is still cheerfully

serving the community.

Another Francestown landmark is being restored. The old barn at the Old Whiting Farm. more recently known as the Foote Farm and now owned by Mr. & Mrs. Walter Hauser, has had its underpinnings and roof repaired. This barn is 150

feet long and 42 feet wide and is one of the longest in New Hampshire.


The huge elm tree by the library has finally succumbed to disease and had to be taken down this fall.

### TRADITIONAL CATTLE DRIVE REMEMBERED IN FRANCESTOWN

May 15th was usually warm. The heavy scent of lilacs filled the air. Apple blossoms, like snow, covered the trees. Their scent was almost too beautiful. Bees burrowed into the pink centers and reeled away.

The 15th was a special day. Children in schools were tense

with excitement.

"You'd know ahead of time when the cattle drove was coming." Gladys Vadney said. Her eyes looked past me, drifting into thoughts of her own childhood. "It was quite a sight! You could hear them mooing long before you could see them."

Dust from the dirt roads rose in clouds around them. "We used to be let out of school so we could watch them." Mrs Vadney continued, smiling a little. The tingling, excited pleasure was no different then than now." It took about two hours for them to get through town."

The cattle drive started in Massachusetts. The cows were driven to pasture land in Stoddard, New Hampshire. "Farmers would rent pasture land," Gladys Vadney said in a practical

voice, "so much for so many per season."
Herds joined the procession as it went by. Small boys ran along the edge of the road, dashing through gapways into farmer's fields, and darting along the stone walls to reach the next entrance before the cows. They brandished sticks and shouted to keep the cattle from wandering into the newly plowed fields.

Along the road that the cattle travelled housewives would sent their children out with sticks. Vegetable gardens were in back yards, carefully fence against woodchucks and other summer marauders. But the flowers were in front, facing the road and the world, tidy, pretty, and defenceless.

"Keep those cows out of my flower garden!" mothers would cry as mooing and dust from the rumbling herd announced its

soon arrival.

whom it was every day.

It took about three days to make the whole trip. The drovers had places they stayed overnight, penning the cattle into several fields, and starting out again early the next day. This event happened every year in times gone by. The generation that was young in Francestown with Gladys Vadney remember the May cattle drive, its dust, its black flies, its excitement, the sounds and smell of it. Life is so different now. Much that was ordinary in "the old days" doesn't exist anymore except in the memories of those to

People than had a tranquility that we "moderns" lack, a great independence and resourcefulness by necessity, an indomitable spirit and a dry sense of humor.

How much can be learned from them by listening!
