#### **TOWN WARRANT**

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Fremont, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Fremont, on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at eleven-thirty of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and take such action as town deems necessary.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges: Care of Cemeteries, Street Lighting, Support of Poor, Old Age Assistance, Maintenance of Highways and Bridges, General Expenses of Highway Department, Public Library and Memorial Day for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$223.78 for town road aid.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be used on taring of roads.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$850.00 for the use of the Fremont Fire Department.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for digging a fire hole, also fencing or filling other fire holes.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for fighting forest fires.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for spraying and removing diceased Elm trees.

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to have the Trustees of Trust Funds turn over the Daniel E. Burleigh Trust Fund of \$1,000.00 plus the interest, to be used for a Wire Fence and other repairs on the Leavitt Cemetery.

12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at private sale or public auction land acquired by Tax Collector's deed.

13, To see what action the town will take by ballot on the following Question, "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws, relative to playing Beano be adopted in this town?"

14. To transact any other business that may be deemed necessary.

# BURNING OVER OF GRASSLAND IS WASTEFUL AS WELL AS DANGEROUS

Much needed organic matter, valuable timberland, even homes go up in smoke and people lose their lives all because someone insists on burning grass each spring.

It's a common idea that burning over grassland kills weeds and insects, furthermore that the burning makes the new grass grow faster. But if you stop to think about it, neither idea holds much water. Most insects are still buried in the ground. Most weeds have dropped their seeds by Springtime. The idea of the grass growing faster is largely a mirage. In other words, by burning the old grass we can see the new grass a little sooner and so you think its growing faster.

Leaving the old grass on the land has a distinct advantage. It has a certain amount of nitrogen and minerals in it. Just as you add manure to the land to decay and fertilize, so can you leave the old grass on the land to decay and add its fertilizer to the soil. What goes up in smoke can't help the soil.

There's another advantage. That layer of dead and decaying grass protects the soil against erosion and helps to conserve moisture. You put a mulch around your tomato plants to conserve moisture. Why not let nature put a mulch around your grass plants to conserve moisture for them?

During the past year we had Four Forest Fires which could have been serious but were prevented by the way our men turned out and fought the fires.

I want to thank everyone for their cooperation.

#### **REPORT OF THE TOWN PLANNING BOARD**

Members of the planning board are appointed by the Selectmen to plan for the development of the town. The board has no power other than the power of suggestion or recommendation to the Selectmen or to the Town. It is solely a study and planning group.

Four meetings of the board were held during the past year. Discussion of the present zoning ordinances revealed no need for new or additional ordinance this year. Revised rules relating to sewerage disposal may be necessary in the near future if houses are built nearer and nearer together and if water polution becomes a problem.

Since the last printing of the ordinances several new ordinances have been added. Because of this and because the present supply is very low the board has recommended to the Selectmen that a new printing be made. And that these ordinances be called to the attention of new residents.

In view of the fact that the Planning Board is a permanent board established by the town action a recommendation was made to the Selectmen that the boards annual report be published in the town report.

Looking toward the future the board has discussed possible methods by which the town can better itself. Several members attended seminars conducted by the N. H .State Planning and Development Commission for the purpose of exploring ways and means of settling additional industries in the town of the seacoast region. The general conclusion as they apply to Fremont are:

1. Make sure that you keep the industries you now have.

2. Because of present tax conditions a small town has very little hope of attracting a new industry unless there is a vacant factory or other suitable building now available, or unless some group within the town is willing to construct a building for lease to the new industry.

The Planning Board earnestly solicits ideas, visionary or other wise, from the towns people that if put in practice, would lead to immediate or future betterment of the town.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Fremont:

It is with pleasure that I submit this, my fourth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

Once again the citizens of Fremont have just cause to be proud of their school. Although two teachers were new to the school system, the program of letting the pupils read with a group at their own reading level has been carried on very satisfactorily. Your School Board deserves much credit for continually keeping the welfare of the boys and girls of Fremont in mind by furnishing the best tools of instruction the budget can afford. The professional interest of the teachers is evidenced by their enrollment in extension courses and their personal interest in the welfare of their pupils.

The following table will give a picture of pupil enrollment for this year and the two years following.

These figures my be expected to vary to a small extent because of promotional failures and pupils leaving or entering the system, but on the whole give a fair picture of what can be expected in the future. A double class of 45 pupils in grades 3 and 4 is a burden on any teacher and is not conducive to efficient instruction. It would help the instructional program in those two grades especially if a helping teacher could be provided for the morning session. The helping teacher could work with special groups in reading, social studies, english and arithmetic. This would take much of the burden of special group instruction from Mrs. Carney and would allow her to carry on a more comprehensive program in all subjects. I'm sure such a program would prove to be a fine investment in Fremont's youngsters.

#### NEW TEACHERS

Mrs. Lillian Carney, Ele. Ed. U. N. H. to replace Mrs. Ruth McGall who resigned to be at home. Mrs. Carney has had a number of years teaching experience and has completed several courses in Elementary Education at U. N. H. Her experience and background permitted her to fit into Fremont's educational philosophy very smoothly and efficiently.

Mrs. Ruth Lavine, K. T. C. "53" to replace Mrs. Alma Gallagher who resigned to be at home but later accepted a position in Kingston. Mrs. Lavine comes to us with four months teaching experience in Epsm and has fitted into the instructional program very nicely.

Miss Irene Tanguay, B. U. "53" to replace Miss Rosemary Leombruno as Union Music Supervisor. Miss Tanguay's background in music assures a sound musical program for our schools.

Mrs. Constance Huss, R. N. to replace Mrs. Constance Cooper as School Nurse. Mrs. Cooper was granted a year's leave of absence because of ill health. Mrs. Huss has taken a very active interest in safeguarding the health of our school children.

#### HOT LUNCH

The Hot Lunch Program under the direction of Mrs. Petit as cook is more popular than ever this year. The willingness of Mothers to come in and help when needed has been instrumental in keeping the program going smoothly. That the meals have been tasty and wholesome is evidenced in the empty plates returned after lunch. An orchid to the P. T. A. for its continued interest in this very worthwhile program.

#### EXTRAS

The painting of the buildings exterior and the corridor walls has added not only to its appearance, but will cut down future maintenance cost. The completion of the concrete block garden in the rear of the school will give an opportunity for the pupils to plant flowers in the spring. The placing of loam on the basketball court and its seeding down should provide a fine play spot for those interested in that game. Money has been put into next year's budget for more work on the playground and baseball field. This should eliminate the small rocks that have worked up to the surface and will consequently cut down possibilities of sprained ankles. All of these projects are real examples of how your School Board and citizens are continually working to make Ellis School a better educational center.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation to the school board, citizens, teachers and pupils for their friendly cooperation. It has made my work pleasant.

#### NURSE'S REPORT

To the Superintendent, School Board and Citizens of Fremont:

It has been a pleasure for me to serve you these past few months in the capacity of school nurse-teacher. My aim is to continue the fine quality of care to which you are accustomed, and to fulfill your confidence in me

The program for covering the health needs of all school children is a full one. First of all, the first aid requirements of the school are checked and supplied. Fortunately, there is seldom a major accident in the schools, but even from minor cuts children can learn the importance of cleanliness and prevention of infection. Every mishap can be turned into a learning experience which may prevent recurrences.

All children undergo a health appraisal which includes heights and weights, observation of teeth, tonsils, skin, hair, scalp and posture.

Yearly eye and ear tests are done also. Follow-up visits to the parents are made in cases where further care or treatment is indicated.

The teaching of health to school children rather than being done on a classroom basis, is carried on informally with individuals and small groups. Opportunities for this type of teaching are almost canstant.

The school lunch program is a fine one, and those concerned with the planning and preparation of it deserve special commendation. It is a well-known fact that the nutritional status of children affects their physical and emotional health, and influences their school progress.

## **GUIDANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

To the Superintendent of Schools, Members of the School Board and Citizens of Fremont:

Again it gives me great pleasure to present my annual report, the second, as Director of Guidance.

The program is moving along well this year toward our objective- a first class program of guidance services for all our pupils from grade one to twelve. The Individual Inventory for each pupil in the eighth grade has been set up and the guidance tests have been given. On the basis of these I am now counseling each pupil individually on their choice of an occupation and the choice of a course in high school in which they will begin the training for this vocational career. Mr. Fields and I gave the vocational battery of tests to the eighth grade.

In order to acquaint the pupils with the opportunities in the various fields of work this year we are using three approaches: 1 - Bulletins giving information about the various careers are placed on the bulletin board each week 2 - Classes each week for eighth grade pupils during which time I discuss with them the occupational world and the many types of careers and opportunities therein. We are using part of this class as a time during which we discuss the Development of Personality. We are making plans to have these classes become a regular part of their career and its possibilities. With the exception of the classes, the same program is being carried on for the upper grade Fremont pupils at Sanborn Seminary.

Miss White gave the tests to the fourth and sixth grade pupils. These are the Standardized tests which compare the progress our pupils are making in Reading, Arithmetic, and Language with other fourth and sixth grade pupils in the United States. These tests, too, point out the weaknesses which need to be strengthened. An aptitude test was also given to the fourth and sixth grade.

We are adding this year, for the use of the teachers in the first three grades, a Standardized Reading Test. It is during these three grades that help in reading may be most advantageously given.

We are now working on the Individual Inventory for each pupil starting with the first grade. The purpose of the inventory is to keep a close check on the progress the child is making in his physical, mental, social, emotional, and moral development. If a pupil is not doing work up to his potentialities, if he is not getting along well with the other children, if he is not developing properly emotionally, it is in the early grades that he can best and most easily be helped.

We are planning this year on a course for the teachers in Personality Development and the use of our tests. A course for parents in Child Training will be given in March.

For those interested adults, the Vocational Guidance Battery of tests will be available in the spring, along with an individual appraisal.

I feel that the guidance program is well on its way toward becoming an integral part of our educational system.

In closing I wish to express my deepest appreciation to you all for your help, cooperation and understanding.
