### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenfield in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Greenfield on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at 7:30 p. m. to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
  - 3. To choose a Highway Agent for the ensuing year.
- 4. To hear reports of Selectmen, Highway Agent, Treasurer, Overseer of the Poor, Library Trustees, and other Officials, or take any action relative thereto.
- 5. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs of highways and bridges, or take any action relative thereto.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote and appropriate for snow removal, or take any action relative thereto.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for support of Library, or take any action relative thereto.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$85.00 for Memorial Day, or take any action relative thereto.
- 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire a sum of money to pay Town debts, or take any action relative thereto.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$69.00 for the Monadnock Region Association, or take any action relative thereto.

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Town Poor, or take any action relative thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$547.55 for Class V roads, the State will contribute \$3,650.31, or take any action relative thereto.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote a discount of 2% on tax bills, 30 days from date of tax bills, or take any action relative thereto.
- 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote for the Police Department, or take any action relative thereto.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for insulating the ceiling of the Library, or take any action relative thereto.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue plowing private driveways, or take any action relative thereto.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for installing lightning rods on Town Hall. A saving of about \$108.00 in insurance can be made by so doing during a three year period, or take any action relative thereto.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 to install three additional "Red Phones" for fire calls, or take any action relative thereto.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 for the purchase of a new truck, two and half ton dump. Payment by serial notes over a period of years, or take any action relative thereto.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money to reimburse the Treasury to cover additional expense over and above appropriations voted in 1956 as follows: Dirt roads \$1,423.42, Snow removal \$6,181.82; Police Department \$287.01, Congregational Church demand note \$1,192.00, or take any action relative thereto.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to enlarge the Tractor Shed to be able to house the Town's entire equipment. The purchase of the Grader has caused a housing shortage, or take any action relative thereto.
- 22. To see what salary the Town will vote the Town Treasurer or take any action relative thereto.

- 23. Shall the provisions of chapter 171-A of the revised laws relating to playing cards or Beano be adopted in this Town, or take any action relative thereto.
- 24. To transact any other business that can legally come before this meeting.

Use it freely

Care for it

Your town dump has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place where you can dispose of the large amounts of dangerous, inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around your household and local stores, brush, etc., cut on your property. The town dump has become a valuable and indispensable asset in modern community life.

The most successful town dumps are supervised, regular days provided for their use and inflammable material consistently burned. The town dump which receives no attention, where waste material is scattered about without supervision of any description, soon becomes a community menace and a liability rather than an asset.

Many people still burn debris around their homes. A large number of such fires get out of control causing unnecessary damage and expense to the burner. Why burn at home? Make use of your town dump and eliminate the hazard of burning. It will be easier for you, personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

- 1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden, the law requires it. The warden won't refuse you if conditions are safe.
  - 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
  - 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Save yourself much possible difficulty. Use your dump freely. Help Keep it safe.

### TOWN JOURNAL, 1956

The normal winter of 1956 was followed by a very late spring. A blizzard on March 16 and 17 left 18 inches of snow. Storms followed to bring the snow level to 44 inches later in the month. On April 8, 14 inches of snow feel and on the 23rd five inches. The snow lingered well into May. A frost on June 19 killed many gardens. The summer continued cool.

The Greenfield Improvement Association received a \$35.00 award in the New Hampshire Roadside Improvement Contest. The Association placed twelve metal road markers. All the trees on the common were trimmed. With the cooperation of the Cemetery Trustees, dead trees were removed and all other trees trimmed in the old cemetery. In conjunction with the Public Service Company, the New England Telephone & Telegraph Company and the abutters, most of the dead trees were removed and others trimmed along the roadside in the village.

The Greenfield Industries also received an award in the New Hampshire Roadside Improvement Contest for their continued ornamental planting around the Gift and Coffee Shops.

A new screen front and new equipment were installed in the Post Office.

The Boston and Maine buses were discontinued. The mail contract was awarded to the Wilder Community Bus Service and the Star Route out of Nashua was extended from Wilton through Greenfield to Peterborough.

Lieutenant Jarvis M. Adams, 3rd, signed an indefinite term contract to remain on duty with the U. S. Air Force. Leo Merchant reenlisted in the Air Force; William Bailey and Edward Lowe, Jr. enlisted in the Navy. Sheridan Sullivan completed his service in the Marine Corps.

Muriel Hopkins received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Cornell University.

Mrs. Fred Brooks resigned as town librarian after 47 years of devoted service.

Mrs. George Foster was engaged as the new librarian.

Real estate was transferred as follows: Dwellings, Mrs. James Slade to John Rideout; John Rideout to Lloyd Cochrane; Charles Quig to James Kane; Nicholas Flynn to Andrew Fulgoni; William Budds to Mrs. Carl Holden; Earle Davis to Harold Eastman; Clarence Babine to Wilson Hadley. Land at Zephyr Lake, Clarence Babine to Merdick Racicot; land on the east side of the old fair grounds, Francis Magoon to Walter Gilbert.

At the Crotched Mountain Rehabilitation Center, the Meeting House was completed. Work progresses on the Charles Hayden Foundation building which will provide living quarters and the main dining room for the adult unit. Construction has started on the recreational building for the Center.

A cottage was built at Zephyr lake for Medrick Racicot. Three apartments were finished on the third flood of the Carbee store building. A barn was built for Jarvis Adams off the Bennington road. C. H. Cragin & Son extended the front of their main garage building four feet toward the street and raised the entrance to a height of 11 feet.

The last of the original district school houses, old Number 5, was razed. The building belonged to Kenneth Cragin, Jr.

A well was drilled for Frank Hutchison to a depth of 150 feet.

The Ground Observation Corps of the Aircraft Warning Service was converted to "Operation Ready Reserve" from "Operation Sky Watch" as of December 15.

Leon Cochrane was employed as caretaker at the town dump two days a week. The dump is closed at all other times.

The Sportsman's Club sponsored a fishing derby at Ralph Sayles' pool for all the children of the Crotched Mountain Rehabilitation Center in addition to the town children's derby.

Good deer hunting was enjoyed during the 21-day open season. Of those registered Richard Merrill shot the largest doe, 133 pounds; and Paul Brooks the largest buck, 185 pounds.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenfield:

I respectfully submit my tenth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

### STAFF AND INSTRUCTION

The Greenfield Public School opened this fall with the following staff. Miss Elsie MacDonald, teacher of Grades 1, 2 and 3, was appointed Principal of the building. Miss Patricia Lange, graduate of Boston University, was employed to teach grades 4, 5 and 6, to replace Mr. Alfred Goulet, who resigned to accept a position in Connecticut. Miss Lange had previously taught in Peterborough, N. H., and for several years was associated with the Girl Scout Organization in New York State. Our music program continues to function effectively under the direction of Miss Ethelyn G. Edwards, music supervisor and teacher. Our health services are efficiently directed by Mrs. Florence Merchant with the assistance of Dr. Louis Wiederhold. The school nurse report relates the services that are rendered under this program.

Mrs. Marguerite Jackson was employed this fall to manage the school lunch program, replacing Mrs. Alfred Goulet. The books and school lunch accounting is being done by Mrs. Donald Harris

Much space could be devoted to describing and explaining the educational program in your school. The only comment I wish to make is that the academic progress being made by our children is very good. As they move from the Greenfield School to Peterborough they are well prepared to carry on the work of the seventh grade and able to adjust themselves well to the larger school situation. The staff and I are eager to have parents visit the school, discuss the progress of your children, and the educational program being offered. We would like to have conferences arranged so that the teacher and parent would have time to discuss fully whatever problem presents itself. Parentteacher conferences during the school day are usually very in-The teachers are fully occupied with their teaching and supervising responsibilities and cannot give the parent her full attention. More misunderstandings are created by lack of time to delve into the problem, than are eliminated. Thus we would like to urge parents to arrange their conferences after the school day is over.

### SCHOOL ENROLLMENT AND TUITIONS

In my last report I made some comments relative to the school enrollment as projected by our school census and a table was printed indicating the number of pupils expected in each grade. The school census of this fall, reveals few changes. However, it is important to note that the largest single expenditure in our budget is tuitions. In 1957-58, the total for this item is \$15,501, an increase of \$3,651 over that budgeted for this year. The school census indicates that next year we will have 34 pupils attending Peterborough High School at a cost of \$354 per pupil and 15 pupils attending grades 7 and 8 at \$231 per pupil. These amounts are the estimated state averages approved by the State Department of Education for tuition purposes. Tuition rates will undoubtedly increase as will the number of tuition pupils for whom we will be responsible. It appears that in 1962-63, we will have approximately 42 pupils in grades 9-12 and 12 in grades 7 and 8. The junior high tuition pupils will have the largest number in 1958-59, namely 24. The foregoing statements are made to show that the Greenfield School Budget will reflect annual increases for the next several vears, and due almost wholly to tuition costs.

A problem closely related to tuitions, is one of truancy or absence from school. This year we have experienced an unusually large number of cases of our pupils, who are attending Peterborough High School, being absent from school for one reason or another. Some have been legitimate absences and in some cases it is felt that they were not. It should be called to the attention of the parents that once a child is enrolled in the Peterborough School, the district is financially obligated to pay for him regardless of whether or not he is there, unless of course the pupil drops out of school. In that case the cost is pro-rated. It can be mathematically determined that if a pupil is absent for one day, the cost to the district is approximately \$2.00, for which no one gets any return. It would appear that this is a problem that can be handled best by the parents.

### STATE WARDS AND FOSTER CHILDREN

I made some comment in my last report that in 1955 the General Court passed a law which makes it possible for one school district to charge tuition of another school district for educating the children living in "foster homes" or "homes for children." The financial responsibility is placed on the district where the child originally resided at the time of his first placement. It is interesting to note that the receipts the Greenfield School District can realize from this are essentially equivalent to its financial obligations. We can anticipate receipts of \$860 and expenditures of \$846.12. Consequently, no provision is made in the budget for expenditures or receipts for this purpose.

### BUILDING AND GROUNDS

It will be recalled that the School Board called a special school district meeting on June 6, 1956 for the purpose of considering raising and appropriating \$2,000 by serial notes to repair and renovate the auditorium in the public school. The work to be done consisted of removing plaster ceiling and replacing same with plywood, re-paint ceiling and auditorium and storage room adjacent to main entrance and install adequate lighting system. Bids were sent out to eight contractors and the work was awarded to the low bidders, namely Mr. LeRoy Robbins of Wilton, N. H., who received the general contract for replacing ceiling and paint work at a figure of \$1,865 and Mr. Arthur Atwood of Wilton, N. H., who received the electrical contract for \$170. The total project cost us \$2,040. The School Board had a total of \$2,320 for the project, including \$320 that was appropriated at the March meeting for painting the auditorium.

This work is now completed and we have an attractive auditorium that should not need any maintenance attention for several years, with the exception of annual seal treatment to the

floor.

The School District voted \$650 at its last annual district meeting, to provide adequate heat in the auditorium. The thought at the time was to install an American Standard upright oil-fired, forced hot air system. However, after studying the problem carefully we found that the State Fire Marshal's Office would not approve the installation, since it would be resting on a wood floor. A further study of other possibilities were made and several bids for other systems obtained. These ranged in price from a complete oil-fired suspended hot air system, costing \$1,400 to a complete steam system costing \$2.775. At the suggestion of the State Fire Marshal's Office, the possibility of installing a suspended gas heating unit was considered. This installation was awarded to Mr Robert Mackintosh of Lyndeboro, N. H., for \$525 94. The heat loss in the building is figured at 186,000 B. T. U. and the output of the gas heating unit is 200,000 B. T. U. This type of heat should prove very economical in that it is instantaneous and need operate only for short periods of time.

We now find that our school plant is in excellent condition and with minor maintenance expenditures, we should be able to keep it that way.

### **FINANCE**

The School Board's Budget for the school year 1957-58, calls for appropriation of \$33,892 66, an increase of \$4,415 29 over that of last year. These increased costs are largely reflected in

two items, tuitions \$3,651 and transportation \$988, both of which are statutory obligations. Other increases and decreases result in the figure mentioned above.

The cost of transporting high school pupils to Peterborough will be approximately \$1,224 in 1957-58 as compared to the \$936 that was budgeted for this year, an increase of \$288.

Transportation is an item that is becoming an increasingly difficult problem in Greenfield. The network of roads is so wide-spread, and the number of pupils in the outlying areas is increasing to such a degree that it is difficult to know exactly how much to budget for this item and who is going to be interested in bidding on the service. Another problem is that of transporting the 7th and 8th graders in the outlying sections of town at one time and retracing the same routes to pick up the elementary pupils attending the Greenfield School. It is felt that our present contractors are doing an excellent job at a reasonable price. However, it can be expected that this item will increase as the years pass.

### Conclusion

I wish to again express my appreciation to the Greenfield School Board and the citizens of Greenfield for their fine support and cooperation this past year.

Exclusions from school have been made in compliance with the State and Local Boards.

The First Aid Cabinet was checked and supplies have been procured at the Drug Store.

Special Health Activities:

Each child is given Cod Liver Oil daily during the winter months. This is sponsored by the local Woman's Club.

Dental Clinic partly sponsored by the Parent-Teachers' Club. Anti-Polio Vaccine was made available to every child in the town at no expense, including Crotched Mountain patients.

The School Lunch Program provided the children with hot lunches.

At this time I wish to express my appreciation to the people who made the health program possible in the school, the Super-intendent of Schools, School Doctor, Board of Education, Principal, Teachers and Parents.
