## LITTLETON WARRANT

### The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the 7th day of March next, being the first Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 A.M., and may not close prior to 6:00 P.M.; business meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 7:30 P.M.), to act upon the following:

**ARTICLE 1.** To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for three years, a Town Treasurer, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for three years, and one member of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for one year, and one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.

**ARTICLE 2.** To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes, Annotated, 1955, relating to playing Beano in the Town of Littleton, and that the following question be placed upon the ballot to be used at said meeting: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this Town?"

**ARTICLE 3.** To take the sense of the qualified voters whether the amendments of the Constitution proposed by the 1971 session of the General Court shall be approved.

**ARTICLE 4.** To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' Salaries, General Expenses, Elections, District Court, Town Building, Police Department, Forest Fires, Sewers, Streets and Highways, Street Lights, Vital Statistics, Sidewalks, Town Garage, Superintendent of Public Works, Health Officer, Hospital, Public Dump, Welfare, Old Age Assistance, Parks and Playgrounds, Community Center, Social Security, Blister Rust, Fire Department, Damage by Dogs, County Tax, Public Library, Cemeteries, National Holidays, Advertising, Region Association, Whitefield Airport, Planning Board, Recreation, Debt Retirement, Interest on Indebtedness, Sewage Treatment Plant, SKI 93, White Mountain Community Services, Dutch Elm, Town Road Aid (A&B), Hydrants, North Country Home Health Agency, and other necessary expenses.

**ARTICLE 5.** To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1972 and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote not to furnish, install or maintain any septic tank or sewer facilities on any land subdivided into two or more lots or on any land used for commercial or industrial purposes.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to convey two and one half (2½) acres of land with a barn located thereon situate on the Lisbon Road to Cray Oil Company in consideration of the conveyance to the Town by Cray Oil Company of two (2) parcels of land, with the buildings thereon, situate on Union Street adjacent to the Town Building.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for the extension of the existing sewer line on the Whitefield Road.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell and convey a certain triangular parcel of land situate on the northerly side of East Street in the Town of Littleton and located between land of Mussman and land of Nichols, said sale to be made, after advertisement in the Littleton Courier for three successive weeks, to the highest bidder submitting an offer by sealed bid.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the regional planning commission, to be organized and named the Northern Regional Planning Commission. This Commission will have membership of at least two municipalities and will have jurisdiction over the planning region delineated by the Office of State Planning. The objective of the Commission will be to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide consensus on major problems of regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of projects within, and which extend beyond, the boundaries of a particular town. The Commission will have only the authority conferred on it by Chapter 36:45-53, Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and will be an advisory commission to local governments in the region. Members of the Commission shall be appointed by the Selectmen in accordance with State Law. Two representatives will be appointed from Littleton.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the voters will authorize the Town Building Study Committee to hold public hearings upon a proposal to construct a two-level town building on town-owned land next to the I-93 Exit at Route 302 on the Lisbon Road at a cost not to exceed Two Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00).

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to pay up to Thirty-Six Thousand Dollars (\$36,000.00) for the installation of a sewage disposal system approved by State of New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission for the proposed Crazy Horse Campground on Hilltop Road owned by The Hurley Corporation (Richard and JoAnne Hurley).

ARTICLE 13. To hear the report of Agents, Auditors, Committees, including the Planning Board, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 14. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and to choose and elect any Agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under the Warrant.

ARTICLE 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

**SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS**

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Littleton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1971. This examination was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed reports must be given to the Town Clerk to be retained as part of the Town's permanent records.

**SCOPE OF AUDIT**

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, District Court, Planning Board, Public Library and Trustees of Trust Funds.

**FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

**General Fund:**

**Comparative Balance Sheets—December 31, 1970 and December 31, 1971: (Exhibit A-1)**

Comparative Balance Sheets, as of December 31, 1970 and December 31, 1971, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Surplus of the Town increased by \$9,587.86 in 1971, from \$70,218.55 to \$79,806.41.

**Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)**

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

**Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)**

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1971, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary, (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$30,277.03 plus a revenue surplus of \$30,310.83 resulted in a net budget surplus of \$60,587.86.

**Long Term Indebtedness:  
Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A-5)**

Comparative Balance Sheets—Long Term Indebtedness—as of December 31, 1970 and December 31, 1971 are shown in Exhibit A-5. The outstanding long term debt of the Town decreased by \$67,000.00 during 1971, from \$581,000.00 to \$514,000.00.

**Parking Meter Reserve Fund: (Exhibit B-4)**

A summary statement of the Parking Meter Reserve Fund is contained in Exhibit B-4. At the end of the fiscal year, the balance of this fund was \$23,224.54.

**AUDIT PROCEDURE**

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Verification of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Tax Collector's records. Consequently, the amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

## GENERAL COMMENTS

**Unauthorized Transfers of Capital Outlay Funds—\$7,392.97:**

During 1971, unexpended balances of capital outlay appropriations, which were originally raised in 1969 and 1970 and carried forward to 1971, were transferred to the appropriation authorized in 1971 for construction of a new sewer line on Lisbon Road (Route 302). The amounts transferred were as follows:

New Sewer Line—Crawford Street (Article 10—1969)	\$ 2,400.00

We were advised that application of these funds towards the amount allocated for the Lisbon Road project will result in a reduction of the amount to be borrowed for this purpose, and will not increase the amount of the appropriation voted therefor.

Although transfers between appropriations are sanctioned by law, in cases involving capital outlay appropriations it is required that authorization to effect such transfers be granted by a vote of the Town. With respect to the transfers mentioned previously, the records do not indicate that this requirement was complied with.

**Planning Board:**

The records indicate that annual appropriations raised by the Town for the Planning Board are paid directly to that agency, which in turn maintains a special checking account for the administration of these funds. This procedure is contrary to the law (R.S.A. 41:29), which stipulates that "the town treasurer shall have custody of all monies belonging to the town, and shall pay out the same only on orders of the selectmen."

At the end of the fiscal year, unexpended funds in the custody of the Planning Board totaled \$410.65 (Exhibit F). Inasmuch as appropriations for this department are for the payment of expenses for current maintenance and operation, an unexpended balance at the close of the fiscal year may not be carried forward to a subsequent year. As is the case with respect to other departments, the unused appropriations must be closed to Surplus. The balance on deposit in the Planning Board's bank account at December 31, 1971, should therefore be returned to the Town treasury during the ensuing year.

**Town Treasurer:**

The provisions of R.S.A. 41:29 require, in part, as follows:  
 "41:29—The town treasurer shall keep in suitable books provided for the purpose a fair and correct account of all sums received into and paid from the town treasury, -----"

It was found that the Treasurer does not maintain a cash book, and as a result, is not complying with the requirements of the preceding statute.

The use of a treasurer's cash book to account for the monies of the Town is mandatory. It is recommended that the Treasurer adopt the use of the standard cashbook designed for municipal treasurers.

**Due To Trustees of Trust Funds—\$33,000.00:**

This amount was realized from the sale of the "Downing Property" and, in accordance with a vote of the Town, is to be placed in a capital reserve fund designated as "Town Building Fund". These funds should be transferred to the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds promptly.

**Conclusion:**

The provisions of Chapter 71, Section 27-a, of the Revised Statutes Annotated require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in the audit report is optional, at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Littleton for their assistance during the course of the audit.

## LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

1971

Whether the library meetings were national, regional, or state, one heard the theme, "Reaching the Unreached." Pilot projects have been used which have pointed up difficulties in reaching the poor, the elderly, the handicapped, but projects are planned at this time which would make some breakthrough in 1972 to help libraries reach out in various ways.

The New Hampshire Statewide Borrower's Card is working out well in Littleton. We have honored 49 of these cards and have had a little trouble with only one. Some people have thought that having to acquire the card at their home library was a nuisance measure, but when we are once established with the borrower, everyone is happy. The necessary rules that accompany special services, whether they are Statewide cards, film programs, inter-library loan, or special collections are meant for the protection and better service of all of us in the state program.

The libraries of New Hampshire are receiving no State Aid grants in 1972, for the legislature made no appropriation. In 1971, the Littleton Public Library had \$1,321.00 for books as a Service Center Library. There is no grant for 1972.

The program of films continued its expansion in 1971, both within the library and outside in the community. One thousand two hundred and twenty-seven children came to the Children's Room for 30 supervised programs. Thirty-two films were obtained from the New Hampshire State Library for outside groups. We hope that these programs will continue to grow and encompass a larger and more varied section of the community .

National Library Week was celebrated in mid-April. The theme was "You've got a right to read. Don't blow it." As well as several book displays on timely subjects, there were exhibits of handicrafts by Littleton residents. Among the displays that were enjoyed by the Littleton public was a collection of applehead and breadhead dolls made by Mrs. Clifford Rancour, several rag dolls and stuffed animals created by Miss Agnes Glode, nail statues sculpted by Mr. Earl Marquis, and crocheted handwork by Mrs. Nan Welch.

Mrs. Eleanor Harte, district representative of the New Hampshire Poetry Society, arranged for the annual poetry exhibit during National Poetry Week in October. This display featured works by several local poets.

Mr. Hamish MacEwan cleaned nine of the old paintings of the library's collection and they can now be enjoyed on the library walls. We hope to have more cleaned by a professional artist in 1972.

The White Mountain Garden Club was most generous with both books and flowers. I wish to thank Mrs. Tracy S. Voorhees for her tireless efforts with me this past year and recent years and now Mrs. James S. Alexander who has already started showing great interest in us.

Each year the Littleton Garden Club members make beautiful Christmas wreaths for the front doors of the library. They are truly appreciated.

With memorial books, last year we remembered Mrs. Reta C. Toole, Lucy McLeod McCormick, Enola Ruggles, Mrs. Anna C. Carleton, Mr. and Mrs. Patrick F. O'Keefe and Katherine C. O'Keefe, Dr. Harold H. Blanchard, Nina Schlesinger, and George R. Kilbourne.

We wish to express our gratitude to the staff of the New Hampshire State Library in Concord for much service to us. We wish to thank Mr. Ralph Riley, North Country District Consultant, Mr. John Wright, and Mr. Harry Paquette for bookmobile service and much more.

I wish to thank each person on the Library Board of the Littleton Public Library. I especially wish to thank Mr. Harold F. Kyte, who resigned as treasurer of the library board last June. We pray for his health and happiness in Bradford, Vermont.

I thank you Ellen Morrow, Patricia Stillings and Mary Miles. I thank you Mr. Norman Kinne. I thank the high school students: Steve Connolly, Carol Riley and Diane Winslow. I thank you, the people of Littleton, New Hampshire.

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

### Lest We Forget—It Can Happen Here

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds, but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellarholes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947. Nothing could stop the wind-driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand—a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.
3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them dead out when leaving.
4. **Most Important**—Instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year—1971—was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.

**SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES OF WHITE MOUNTAIN  
COMMUNITY SERVICES, INC. — 1971**

**A. GENERAL SERVICES**

Received 500 individual requests for mental health services to area individuals and families.

Held 2,663 counselling sessions with individuals and families from the region served by White Mountain Community Services.

Held 326 consultation sessions with other professional persons (doctors, nurses, social workers, etc.) and organizations concerning those individuals they were attempting to serve.

Participated in the development of a state-wide plan to combat drug misuse and abuse at the request of the Governor and in cooperation with the Department of Alcohol and Drug Abuse.

Carried out an after-care program to assist newly discharged patients from the New Hampshire Hospital. (Due in part to this program, the admission and readmission rate to the New Hampshire Hospital has been drastically reduced in the geographic area served by White Mountain Community Services.)

Provided psychiatric evaluation and recommendations to the Courts to assist in pre-sentence investigations.

Offered counselling to persons and consultation to the administration at the Grafton County Jail and House of Correction.

Held monthly seminars for area Public Health and School Nursing personnel.

Provided numerous speaking engagements to church and fraternal groups, youth organizations and P.T.A.'s.

**B. SERVICES TO CHILDREN AND YOUTH**

Provided regularly scheduled psychological consultant services to faculty and administrative personnel in Supervisory Unions 23 and 35.

Operated the Lisbon Developmental Center, a demonstration classroom for handicapped children unable to attend public school.

Participated in Supervisory School Union 35 Drug Abuse Prevention and Education Program.

Participated in the organization of a "Big Brother" program in the Woodsville area.

Provided monthly neurological consultation to physicians and nurses for area children suspected of having a neurological handicap.

Offered a course to area teachers on early childhood emotional development and emotional and behavioral problems of the school aged child.

### **C. SERVICES TO THE ELDERLY**

Provided a Geriatric Direct Services Program to the elderly to help develop telephone reassurance lines; distribution of surplus food; and friendly visits by volunteers.

Initiated a Retired Senior Volunteer Program to help retired persons become meaningfully involved in their community affairs through their volunteer efforts.

Offered a Nursing Home workshop to administrators and staffs of Homes located in the region served by White Mountain Community Services.

White Mountain Community Services is approved as a psychiatric out-patient clinic by the New Hampshire Department of Mental Health and is affiliated with the following state and national organizations: New Hampshire Association of Community Mental Health Clinics; Northern New Hampshire Mental Health System; New Hampshire Health and Welfare Conference; Psychiatric Out-patient Clinics of America.

This non-profit agency is governed by a 40-man Board of Directors of local citizens. Elections are held each year at the time of the agency's Annual Meeting (May). All meetings of the Board are open to the public and citizens are encouraged to attend. All monies voted or contributed to White Mountain Community Services is used to support local needs. This agency serves 22 towns totalling a resident population of 23,603.

## LITTLETON POLICE REPORT

### Arrests Increase by 118 over 1970.

Chief Stanley L. McIntyre of the Littleton Police Department in making his annual report for the year 1971, stated that there was an increase in arrests of 118 over 1970, totalling 470 arrests for the year.

Criminal arrests were as follows: Murder 2, Non-negligent manslaughter 1, 9 for Burglary, 2 for Robbery, 6 for grand larceny, five for forgery, 3 for aggravated assault, one for possession of nearly five pounds of marijuana, one for armed robbery, 2 for possession of burglary tools, 1 for a felon in possession of a revolver, 30 minors in possession of alcoholic beverages, 16 for drunkenness, 5 for procuring alcoholic beverages for minors, 49 arrests were for controlled drugs; this included 20 for possession of a controlled drug, 26 for knowingly being present where a controlled drug is kept, 2 minors were arrested on drug charges, and previously mentioned one for possessing nearly five pounds of marijuana. In fairness to the town, many of the drug offenders were from out of state. Thirty-eight for Assault and Battery, and 10 for resisting or assaulting a police officer. 16 were for fraudulent checks, 4 Aliens were arrested bringing the balance of criminal arrests to a total of 254.

Leading in Motor Vehicle arrests, a total of 216 were 62 for Unreasonable Speed, 29 for Operating Under the Influence of Intoxicating Liquor. A Radar machine was purchased by the Town of Littleton of which 40% was paid for by the Federal Highway Safety Agency, thru the New Hampshire Highway Safety Agency.

Other motor vehicle arrests were as follows: 20 for Operating an Uninspected Motor Vehicle, 10 for stop sign violations, 29 for Defective Equipment, 14 for operating without a valid license, or allowing an improper person to operate. 6 for Reckless Operation.

One fatal accident occurred on December 12th when Vail B. Freeman 31, of Chaplin, Connecticut, was killed when his car (driven by Robert Bedell River Road, Mansfield, Connecticut) hit a utility pole on Union Street. Littleton Police Department handled 121 accidents, 46 less than previous year, eleven were personal injury accidents in which 16 people were injured.

John St. Francis, age 21, of Littleton joined the force in April bringing the total regular officers to eight. Seven regular police completed a course of 20 weeks in General Law Enforcement sponsored by the White Mountain Law Enforcement Institute.

Meter revenue was \$10,500, a drop over 1970.

The Littleton Police Department thru the Governor's Crime Commission and the Federal Safe Streets Act, had two summer police cadets, who assisted on traffic, administration, and other phases of police work. The ten-week program was paid for entirely by Federal Funds.

Chief McIntyre stated that he had given talks to about 20 Driver Training Classes.

Chief McIntyre said "I want to extend my sincere thanks and appreciation to the Board of Selectmen for their cooperation and support the past year."



## THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Due to the absence from the Littleton area of the Chairman, followed by his permanent transfer to a new position, the Conservation Commission did not actively meet during most of 1971. It continued, however, its management of the Dells in cooperation with the Park Commission. A Visitors' Book, posted at the entrance, recorded some very interesting comments from persons as far away as Australia. The general tone of these remarks indicates that people from more congested areas of the nation realize how fortunate is the community of Littleton to possess such an attractive natural area in its midst.

The Commission did purchase a series of sound-filmstrips (5 in number) entitled "Crisis of the Environment". These are available to any Littleton organization for program use.

## REPORT OF THE NORTH COUNTRY HOME HEALTH AGENCY, INC.

In the Spring of 1971, after many months of planning, the North Country Home Health Agency became a reality. It was originally developed to improve and expand home care services to our citizens. A one-nurse agency could no longer provide or finance a full service program so regionalization was the answer. We succeeded in combining the Littleton Community Nurse Association, the Lin-Wood Home Health Agency and the Lisbon District Nurse Association into one unit under the official name of the North Country Home Health Agency, Inc. This includes 12,927 people in 13 towns and covers 662 sq. miles. The new agency is governed by a board of directors representing all the towns served. Each of the separate boards have retained its identity to assure local support and recognition of individual community concerns. Now instead of three separate agencies working to qualify for Medicare certification each year, the survey and certification is done for the combined agency.

This merger has enabled us to expand our services by adding a full-time Nurse-Director, a full-time Medical Social Worker, a full-time Secretary-bookkeeper, a part-time Physiotherapist, a part-time Speech therapist, and two part-time Public Health Nurses who relieve our regular staff nurses during weekends, vacations, etc. The Secretary-Bookkeeper and the Medical Social Worker also relieve the nurses for more nursing time. We are able to obtain federal funds to pay for this additional personnel so that we could demonstrate their need and value to the people of our communities. Already we have been able to offer home care to several rural areas never before covered.

With these added services we are better prepared to meet the needs of the people shorten hospital stays, help keep older people at home longer and happier, and to rehabilitate patients so that they can function with a minimum of support. Our work is twofold; preventive, keeping people healthy, and therapeutic, giving assistance to the sick to return them to the status of dignified human beings. In September, after nearly 5 years with the LCNA, Miss Lolita Ball terminated her position as staff nurse to accept a new job at the Maine Medical Center in Portland. She is missed in the community and remembered with warm affection by patients, co-workers, indeed by all who knew her. We wish her well in her new endeavors. Mert Mountain, who had been employed by the LCNA and NCHHA also concluded her duties in the fall. Presently nursing service is being provided in the Littleton area by Mrs. Joanne White and Mrs. Lana Potter, both professional nurses with Public Health preparations and experience.

During the year the agency conducted 3 series (5 weekly sessions) of expectant parents' classes; 2 Orthopedic clinics; 3 immunization clinics; in addition to providing skilled nursing care,

health teaching and promotion, physiotherapy, speech therapy, medical social services, to 146 families in the area originally covered by the LCNA.

While the board continues its search for a full-time Nurse Director the NCHHA is fortunate to have Mrs. Loretta Russell acting as Interim Director. She is well known in all of northern New Hampshire, having recently retired after more than 30 years as State Public Health Nurse. Mrs. Russell was one of the chief investigators of the merger and served as the first president of the new board. The communities are indebted to her and to many other individuals who have given so willingly of their time in this combined effort to improve health care in the North Country. We are being acknowledged around all of Vermont and New Hampshire as an example of how local public health agencies should be planning for the future.

## REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

Our Littleton Planning Board members are Chairman Ray H. Marshall, Secretary-Treasurer Stephanie E. McGoldrick, Clarence Allard, George Quig, Maurice Stearns, Jr., who replaced retiring Board member James Alt in March of 1971, and John Streeter. The Board has experienced a busy year in the course of investigating the soundest land ownership and implementation of land use for Littleton.

We have met the first Wednesday of each month at 7:30 in the Town Building to consider requests and questions made by State and Local organizations and citizens. For instance, the Littleton Industrialization Development Group questioned extending the present sewerage systems to adequately care for new industry. In response, Edwards and Kelcey's suggestion in its Town Survey had listed this sewerage extension for industry as a priority, and had been accepted and implemented.

On the State level, the Dep't. of Resources and Economic Development requested a copy of the Littleton Zoning Map for its (DRED's) future reference when our Town might apply for industrial Federal grants. This State department of DRED and the State Planning Office have cooperated and communicated often and well with our Board. A State Planning officer recently attended a joint meeting of the Planning Board and Selectmen to help understand the State law on land development and subdivisions.

When local students from St. Mary's-in-the-Mountains visited a Board meeting, one item discussed was subdivision regulations and zoning in Littleton and New Hampshire as a whole.

The role of the Board of Adjustment has been constructive and an asset to our Town in interpreting the Zoning Ordinance fairly and as intended by the citizens and their vote of endorsement. The Board has arrived at primarily favorable and fair decisions, which in turn encourage confidence and approval of Zoning by the people of Littleton.

Primarily, all development plans need to be approved by the State Water Pollution Board in Concord and by the local Planning Board according to the Subdivision Regulations adopted by Littleton citizens. This local approval is achieved by accepting and so stamping a Preliminary Plot Map, submitted by a prospective developer of his considered land lots.

Working with the U.S. Soil Conservation Office, and Mike Dannehy in particular, in Woodsville has allowed us to better understand the importance of soils and adequate drainage relative to weather and sewerage, as well as the advantage of aerial photos of Littleton which overlays may be laid on and so immediately pinpoint the area being considered at a Board meeting with any interested citizens of Littleton who attend. These overlays can individually show trailers, slope of land, drainages, water, and any related information to Town Planning.

Board members do attend auxiliary meetings such as an eight-week Planning Board Seminar in Lebanon last spring (which the RC&D Project brought to our attention), incidental Littleton Industrial Development Meetings, and joint Selectmen's and Board of Adjustment meetings.

Primarily, the Littleton Planning Board has reached out to understand and help incorporate a positive direction for Littleton to take in its growth and planning for tomorrow's growth.

## **WHITEFIELD REGIONAL AIRPORT COMMISSION**

During 1971 your Regional Airport continued to serve a wide variety of individual, public and commercial interests in the North Country.

Generous support received from several area towns and users (see financial report) made possible substantial improvements in facilities and services.

New installations include the terminal office building acquired for a cost approximately the same as rental of temporary facilities the previous year and a new hangar building to house Dr. Harry McDade's new twin engine Aztec.

Of primary importance is the new non-directional beacon installed by the New Hampshire Aeronautics Commission. This facility greatly improves the safety of instrument approaches to the regional airport and ultimately may result in lowered minimums. This translates to prospects of improved service under adverse weather conditions.

Regular air service to Boston in modern twin engine Navajos was provided by Winnipsaukee Aviation during the summer months. Reliability of this service was excellent—on time arrivals and departures with only three cancellations due to weather did much to restore public confidence and acceptance of the service.

Air service and route structures throughout Northern New England are currently the subject of intensive study by Federal and State regulating agencies. Your commission plans to have representatives at hearings scheduled, with a view to obtaining improved scheduling, connections and service to the region.

Among other varied services available at and through the Airport are a charter flight, local scenic

flights and flight instruction. The Airport is used as a base for helicopter operations in support of Appalachian Mountain Club supply lines and inspection tours of the Portland Pipe Line.

Flying ambulance and hearse service proved a boon to many this year in emergency situations. Four search and rescue operations were mounted during the year involving downed airplanes.

Evidence of important and growing contributions to the area economy were made throughout the year with use, by local and visiting business flyers, from all areas of the nation, Canada and the Bahamas, stepped up considerably over last year. Visitors at local resorts are an important source of airport traffic. As development plans unfold at Bretton Woods substantial increases in airport traffic are projected.

While many tax payers in the region are not directly involved with airport operations, overall benefits to the local economy and access to emergency facilities indirectly benefit all.

Continued improvement of services and facilities consistent with budget limitations are the aim of your commission. During the coming year plans for new year-round sanitary facilities and utilities will go forward.

Continuing support of the towns making contributions to the operating funds of the Regional Airport will be sought. The Commission's policy of holding the line on appropriations at previous years levels and emphasizing efforts to gain support from additional towns in the region has been well received.

Operating costs expressed in terms of taxes paid on property valued at \$10,000.00 varied from a low of \$.08 to a high of \$1.71 annually. The average annual cost for all supporting towns per ten thousand dollar valuation was a modest \$1.03.

Our report would not be complete without expressing gratitude to Randall E. Spalding who retired early this year as Chairman after twenty-three years of dedicated service. Under Mr. Spalding's guidance the Airport developed from a grass strip to the present modern facility with a 3,500 foot paved runway, complete lighting system and navigational aids. Success in enlisting support from area businessmen, towns and State and Federal agencies is evidence of Mr. Spalding's extended personal contribution.

As inevitable economic growth takes place throughout the region, benefits derived from Mr. Spalding's efforts along with countless others who worked with him will become increasingly apparent.

## LITTLETON COMMUNITY CENTER

### 1971

The annual meeting of the Littleton Community Center Corporation was held at the Littleton Community House Thursday, Jan. 27 at 8 p.m.

Directors elected for a term of three years include John Bigelow, Alphonse Renaud, Rennie Pennock, Donald Gilpin and Raymond Carbonneau.

The directors held a session following the annual meeting and elected the Officers according to the revised bylaws of May 28, 1969, as follows: H. Hubert Merrill, reelected president; vice president, Alphonse Renaud; treasurer, Mrs. Philip Bronson; secretary, Mrs. Maurice Plant; auditor, Gilbert Pike.

The annual report of the Littleton Community Center for 1971 follows:

Another year has ended  
 Filled with many busy days.  
 As we worked to keep your Center  
 Neat and orderly in every way.  
 To some we've accomplished little  
 But our efforts were sincere  
 As we labored for this Center  
 All through this past year.

There were approximately 52,984 people who availed themselves of the facilities of the Littleton Community Center during the year 1971, a new record high.

This has been another year of bustling activity, with some 64 regular clubs, groups and organizations using the Center. All of the churches have made good use of the House and Barn from time to time, as have the two major political parties.

We are very happy that the White Mountain Grange and the Junior Grange are finding the Barn a convenient place in which to hold their meetings. They are fixing a small kitchen where the snack bar used to be and it will accommodate them nicely.

We have had the usual number of blood drawings, book sales, food and fancywork sales, rummage sales, teas, luncheons, dinners, showers and health clinics. There have been some 81 classes held ranging from foreign cooking through all of the arts and crafts to lamp shade making.

It is a pleasure to have two troops of Brownies meeting at the Barn on Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons each week.

Because of the difficulty in removing the snow during the Winter, the board found it necessary to put up a sign at the foot of the driveway stating that there would be no more all-night parking at the rear of the House. This had to be done in fairness to those people who use the Center for meetings, to those who want a place to park when they come into town to shop and to the men who plow the parking lot.

With the donations from the China Fund of 1970, I was able to obtain enough dinner plates, dessert plates, cups and saucers to serve 30 people. From recent donations I have nearly enough to get 30 more place settings. Everyone who uses the new dishes likes them and as it is an open stock pattern it can be added to as more money is donated.

My sincere thanks to the following individuals and groups who have given to the China Fund this past Fall and during the Christmas season. The Ladies Society of the Congregational Church, the Senior Citizens Club, Mr. Burpee and the camp from Three Rivers, Quebec, Mrs. Rene Mathey, the Woman's Farm & Home League, Miss C. Brousseau, Mrs. Brandt, the North Country Athletic Assoc., the Catholic Daughters, the American Legion, the Legion Auxiliary, Mr. and Mrs. Edson Berry, and the Past Matrons Assoc.

We wish to express sincere appreciation to Donald Gilpin for the lovely hand-carved sign which he gave and which Carroll put on the House at the left of the front door. It extends a cordial welcome of warmth and dignity to all who enter.

To Mrs. Alphonse Renaud and Mrs. Arminda Silsby, a big thank-you for the beautiful tablecloths which they have given the House. I am sure that the ladies will enjoy using them for their teas, dinners and parties.

To the North Country Hairdressers' Assoc. for the lovely china cup and saucer, and to Mrs. Bronson for all the sofa pillows and the new material which she donated so that I could cover them; thank you all many times. Everyone remarks how nice the pillows look on the sofas in the parlor and the writing rooms.

A big thank-you, too, to Mr. Pillsbury for the beautiful flowers which he drops off here from time to time. Also to Mary Albany and everyone who has given flowers, my deep appreciation, as they do so much to make the House look attractive and homey.

Ruth Moore kindly donated two lovely cake plates which I am sure will be used constantly, and Amy Stillings gave a pretty cone wreath which I used at the side of the front door during the Holidays. Thank you all for everything.

The Parlor and Writing Rooms were papered and the ceilings painted last Spring and I particularly wish to thank Peter Drapeau for the extra work he did on the radiators. The rooms look wonderful and many people prefer to meet in those rooms because they are so cozy and comfortable.

Last August we had a phone call from Mr. Burpee asking if the Barn could be made available to house some 40 young people and their chaperones from a Camp from Three Rivers, Quebec. He was giving them their supper on his lawn at home as it was the night that the entire town was in darkness due to a power failure. Carroll took them to the Barn where they spread their sleeping bags and made themselves comfortable. Some of them spoke little English but even so, they were able to convey their sincere appreciation for the use of the Barn and left a donation with Mr. Burpee to be used for the China Fund.

August did prove a month of rather unusual requests. One day a young couple with an 18-month-old baby came in asking if they might take baths. The young man was a page for Senator Symington of Missouri and he and his wife had been camping at one of our state campgrounds. The facilities for showers and baths are not very good at these camping spots so I took them upstairs and placed a bathroom and little sitting room at their disposal. They were two grateful young people and very appreciative of the hospitality shown them in Littleton, N.H.

The benches which are in constant use during the warm Summer months are in very bad condition; in fact, due to the state of most of them Carroll was able to put out only five last Summer. He has mended them with bolts and angle irons, painted them three times since we came here and repaired them generally but the wood in them is so rotten that it will not hold bolts and the iron parts that the bench sits on are bent and out of shape. These benches serve a multi-purpose in that the Summer visitors who shop in town often sit on them and read their papers, the older citizens use them to relax on in order to get out of their warm rooms and apartments on the street, while of course the younger generation makes good use of them also.

I wish it were possible for anyone wishing to perhaps advertise their business, to donate a bench or so and in that way the ones we have had to discard, could be replaced. Maybe this is too big a dream to ever materialize.

Carroll and I wish to thank Mr. Merrill for donating the porch floor paint last Spring. Carroll painted the two porches and aside from looking much better, it also will preserve them longer. Mr. Merrill also gave Carroll some oats to plant on the piece of lawn we had to make beside the Barn where the turf got dug up. Thank you, Hubert, for your thoughtfulness.

There were some organizations who gave checks to the Community Center's general fund, namely the Colonial Club, the Telephone Girls and the White Mt. Grange. Your support of this Center is greatly appreciated.

Fifty-two years ago, when this Center was created, the late Mrs. Eva Speare proved a tower of strength in its organization. She worked diligently on many committees to raise funds to furnish the House and the two rugs you are walking on this evening are some of the results of her labors. It seems only fitting and proper that we should pause and dedicate this report to her. Mrs. Speare was a scribe who worked faithfully to paint us a picture of N.H. so vivid that all the world could better view it. She gave us a record, golden like her pen, proving her worth to her fellowmen.

**Summary Program of the  
White Mountains Region Association  
1971 (34th Year)**

Pioneered an engineering project at the University of New Hampshire in researching problems of snow erosion at ski areas. This project is well underway now and it appears that some practical solutions have been arrived at.

Maintained an active legislative program through the formation of a joint committee of the four regional promotional groups in the White Mountains.

Helped defeat an increase in the rooms and meals tax and gave strong support regarding the 16-mile extension of the Spaulding Turnpike.

Continued to promote new outdoor sports compatible to the region namely, whitewater canoeing, ski touring and bicycling.

Posted the annual 500 miles of fall foliage tour leaves.

Participated in a citizens' review committee on the controversial 4 million dollar federal Connecticut Basin study and were successful in altering some of the recommendations of this study.

Continued to develop the concept of promoting the off-season for tourists as against the high season.

Gave awards to 4-H groups in Grafton and Coos Counties.

Received 6,593 inquiries for the season which were answered with kits of folders.

Wrote 49 news releases. Wrote 259 personal letters.

Wrote four magazine articles and had twenty-five photographs appear in magazines and newspapers.

Printed and distributed 275,000 folders.

Appeared on four radio programs and attended two travel shows. Total income for 1971, \$33,833.

Presently we are working to make the state regional planning effort coincide with the six existing region associations.

Presently we are working with the Neighborhood Youth Corps to develop a course in hotel management for high school drop-outs, etc.
