

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Northwood in the County of Rockingham in said state qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Northwood on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the year ensuing and make appropriations for the same.
- 3. To choose delegate to the Constitutional Convention.
- 4. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for construction of the Class II road known as Sherburne Hill Road, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,086.00.

Or will accept State Aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$461.32.

- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town highways.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$990.00 for street lighting.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the care of cemeteries, as provided in Chapter 55, Section 4, Laws of 1925.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in excess of that required by law for the Northwood Public Library.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote a discount on such part of taxes as are paid on or before July 15, 1938.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for interest on temporary loans.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for improvement of Town Hall grounds, \$100.00 to be expended for grading around the Town House, and \$25.00 for the Forestry Committee to be used for clearing and removing brush from among the pines set out on this lot in 1925.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to join with the towns of Barrington and Nottingham to purchase the dam at the outlet of North River Pond and flowage under the provisions of Section 4 of Chapter 42 of the Public Laws of 1926 as amended by Section 101 of Chapter 133 of the Laws of 1937, and to raise and appropriate Two Hundred Fifty (250.00) Dollars as its proportion of the cost thereof.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid to build a cement bridge at Sherburne Mill and raise and appropriate \$750.00 for same.

Or raise and appropriate \$750.00 to construct Sherburne Mill bridge with cement tile.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to come to an agreement and settlement with the Pacific Mills, a corporation

having a place of business in Dover, New Hampshire, in respect to repairs and maintenance of the Bennett Bridge, so-called, and the roadways on each side of said bridge for not less than Five Hundred (500) Dollars, and in the event of such agreement and payment of said sum of not less than Five Hundred (500) Dollars to release the Pacific Mills from all future claims and responsibility for repairs on said bridge and roadways which were built or rebuilt by reason of the raising of the water in Bow Pond by said Pacific Mills or its preceding owners, and to release said Pacific Mills from all future claims of damages resulting on account of said bridge and roadways.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to buy three fire sirens.
- 19. To transact any other business to come before said meeting.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Citizens of Northwood:

This year the schools are joining in the celebration of the 150th anniversary of the Constitution of the United States, which was signed September 17, 1787. by delegates including John Langdon of Portsmouth. put into effect by New Hampshire's ratification June 21, 1788, and under which George Washington was inaugurated as first President, April 30, 1789. Contests. sponsored by the state sesquicentennial committee, will stimulate special study of these events. As a part of the regular program of studies, however, the upper grades include a course in American History and Civics, while every recent high school graduate in the state has had a full course in United States Constitutional History and Civics. In these courses, the immemorial rights of the people—freedom of speech, press, assembly, petition, religion, and fair trial—are traced through Magna Carta to the Bill of Rights of the Constitution. The free public schools are the greatest bulwark for government "of the people, by the people, and for the people," as against all threats to democracy.

Education is not limited to those of school age. There are more than 25,000 home study courses now available, covering practically every known occupation. Our State Board of Education in Concord offers University Extension Courses. Persons wishing to check on the reliability of different firms and institutions offering courses would do well to communicate with the National Home Study Council, Washington, D. C.

Last year the District provided for a teacher of music in the grades. To fill this position, the School Board employed Miss Elizabeth Girardet of Pittsfield, a graduate of the music curriculum of Keene Normal School, who gives one day a week to this work. The regular teachers have found her assistance in this subject very valuable, while the pupils have responded with a keen interest.

The examination of pupils, conducted last year by the School Nurse, Miss Margaret Macdonald, disclosed nineteen pupils more than 10% underweight, 98 with defective teeth, and 11 with other defects. At a dental clinic attended by Dr. C. H. Manning of Newmarket and sponsored by the Harvey Lake Woman's Club, 27 pupils were treated. Parents are urged to examine health reports sent home by the nurse and take steps to correct the conditions noted. The nurse was also fortunate in securing the use of a machine called the Audiometer, by which 76 pupils were tested for hearing, some of them twice. During the prevalence of contagious disease, the nurse has been assiduous in checking incipient cases and protecting the health of the children.

As a very unusual happening, there were no eighth grade graduates at the Ridge School last June. This year, however, there will be a good-sized class at both grammar schools to enter high school.

Coe's Academy has enlarged its staff and increased the number of subjects offered. The death of Honorable Albert O. Brown, ex-governor of New Hampshire, and for many years President of the Board of Trustees of the Academy, removed a loyal friend of education in Northwood and the state. The results of his intense interest in the welfare of youth will be effective into the indefinite future.
