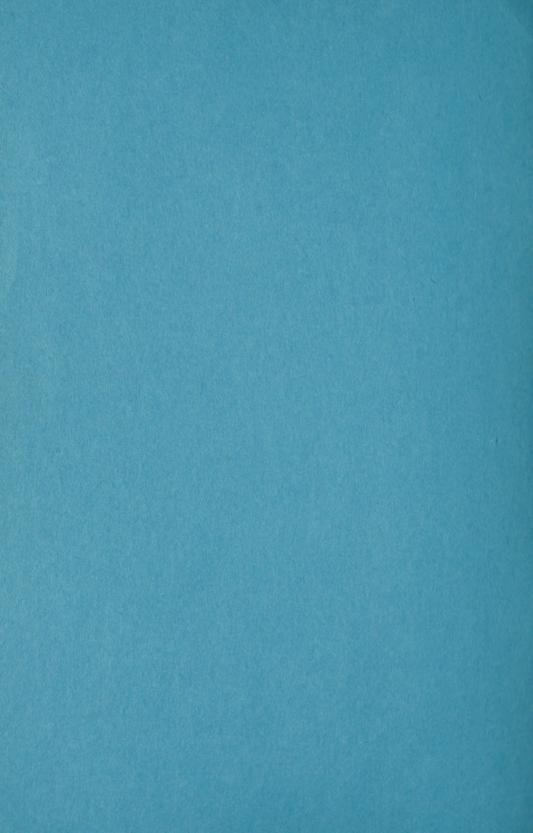

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Piermont in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Piermont Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- l. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To raise and appropriate money to maintain highways and bridges.
 - 4. To raise and appropriate money for town road aid.
- 5. To raise and appropriate money for care of cemeteries.
- 6. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Street lights and Blinker.
- 7. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Library.
- 8. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Fire Department.
- 9. To raise and appropriate money for the relief of poor and old age assistance.
- 10. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day and choose committee for same.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 12. To raise and appropriate to the White Mountain Region Association, for its program of advertising, etc., as a part of the cooperative investment by regional towns, an amount equal to 10c per \$1,000 of the assessed valuation of the Town for 1955.

- 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine the taxable property.
- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Town through Tax Collector's Deeds or otherwise.
- 15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 16. To see if the Town wishes to remodel the Town Hall and to raise and appropriate money for same. \$5,000 was raised in 1955.
- $17.\ \ \text{To}\ \text{see}$ if the Town wishes to raise and appropriate money for Pine Blister Rust.
- 18. To see if the Town wishes to purchase land or land and buildings bordering Armington Pond, if available, and to raise and appropriate money for same. This to be a Piermont public picnic and camping area.
- 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

BEQUEST

May 10, 1955, the Piermont Public Library received from the Grace Gannett Mattoon estate, five thousand dollars and also five thousand seven hundred seventy-one dollars and eighty cents, the residue of her estate. "In trust in memory of my father, William H. Gannett, the principal to be invested by the trustees of said library in safe securities, and the income therefrom to be used each year for the purchase of books, but in no event shall any of said income be used for the purchase of books of fiction."

In spite of the increasing popularity of television, the circulation of books and magazines has increased over last year's circulation by 1,356.

Our substantial legacy from Mrs. Grace Gannett Mattoon will greatly increase the value of the Library to its patrons, as time passes.

From the Misses Perkins in Haverhill, we received one hundred and fifty books and there have been generous gifts of books and magazine subscriptions from Piermont friends. Books have also been loaned to us.

The pay of the Librarian has been raised as of January 1, 1955, from sixty cents an hour to one dollar an hour.

For the generosity of our many friends, the Library Trustees are deeply grateful.

BE A GOOD CITIZEN - COOPERATE

Smoking and debris burning caused more than 50 percent of the forest fires occurring in the state of New Hampshire in 1955 — 235 fires out of a total of 463 originated from these two sources. Lighted smoking material and matches thrown from moving vehicles along the highway or dropped by fishermen, hunters, hikers, berry and flower pickers accounted for 26 per cent; debris burning in the wrong place or at the wrong time by those who failed to heed all pleas for safety or refused to recognize the logical, sensible rules and regulations set up under legislative authority governing the use of fire in or near woodlands accounted for more than 24 percent. This is inexcusable.

Everything possible is being done officially to remedy the situation. Since 1909 there has been a statute on our law books which requires everyone to secure written permission from the local forest fire warden before starting a fire in or near woodlands or where fire can be communicated to woodlands, unless the ground is covered with snow. A never ending program of educational work is being carried on by your local warden and state officials to inform the general public both of the value and necessity of securing the required permit for such burning. Much progress has been made, but there are still many who fail or refuse to cooperate. The value of our permit system was definitely proven in this district during the 1955 calendar year. Local district wardens issued 959 permits for debris burning fires. That's a lot of permits. The records show only 2 permit fires got out of control. This proves several things — while wardens were liberal in the issuance of fire permits, accommodating every applicant so far as possible, they were cautious, following closely directives outlining overall policy governing the issuance of burning permits and thoroughly instructing permit users. The latter, too, fully appreciating their responsibility in using their permits, governed themselves accordingly. Result? Much burning done legally and safe.

But what of the smokers? Despite all the efforts of those officially charged with the responsibility of preventing fires, too many were careless or thoughtless in disposing of smoking material and matches. Why? It is difficult to say. Autos are now equipped with ash trays. Why not use them. The crushing out of a cigar, cigarette and the complete extinguishment of matches before being discarded is an easy chore.

If the costly habits of the careless and indifferent smoker and debris burner could be overcome, more than half of our annual forest fires would be eliminated. Will YOU do YOUR share to bring this about?

Remember

- 1. Get a written permit from your local warden before starting your debris burning or camp fire. The law requires it.
- 2. Make certain they are dead out before leaving them.
- 3. Become a safe smoker by extinguishing smoking material and matches before discarding them.

The Piermont faculty welcomed a new member in September. Mrs. Shirley Metcalf replaced the late Elwyn Farnham as teacher of grades 6-8 and building principal. Mrs. Metcalf resigned from the school board that she might accept the teaching position until Mr. Donald White of Haverhill returned from the armed services. Mrs. Metcalf has been re-appointed to the school board as of January 2, 1956.

Mr. White, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, Class of 1953, holds a B. Ed. degree. He returned from foreign service in December and took over his duties in Piermont on January 3, 1956.

The elementary enrollment steadily increases, the present total being 83 as compared with 79 of last year. Secondary figures show 16 enrolled as of September 1955, a decrease of eight since September 1954.

Some interesting comparisons between New Hampshire and other states have been made during the year by our Commissioner of Education, a few of which I include herewith:

The national average for expenditure per school is \$262. New Hampshire spends \$253, and ranks 26th.

In the population group 25 years and over, 11% of Americans across the country have had less than five years of education. The New Hampshire percentage is 6.3. In other words, the adult population of 35 states had had less schooling than in New Hampshire, and we rank 13th.

In the same group the national proportion for those with four or more years of college is 6 per cent. In New Hampshire it is also 6 per cent. The State is 20th from the top.

Our standing with respect to teachers is not so good. The average salary of classroom teachers in the United States is \$3,605. In New Hampshire for 1953-1954, it is \$3,225 — or 31st from the top. Thirty-one per cent of the nation's elementary teachers have less than four years of college training. In New Hampshire the percentage is 61 per cent.

The continued services of Mrs. Day as lunch operator and supervisor of the program, the contributions of individuals and groups in general and especially the V. F. W., have made for another successful year in this department. The efficient efforts of the teachers, as well as the interest and activity of the school board members, is acknowledged and gratefully appreciated.

Your attention is directed to the report of the School Nurse which follows.

Routine vision and hearing screening tests were completed. When defects were found, written notices were sent to the parents.

The Woods Light was purchased by the Union for use in the schools. This light is used to detect the presence of scalp ringworm. No cases were found.

On May 25, 1955, twenty-seven 1st and 2nd grade pupils received their first Salk polio inoculation. The children were taken by bus to the clinic which was held in the Community Building at Woodsville. The vaccine for the inoculations was provided by the National Polio Foundation. The clinic was sponsored by the State Department of Health and was organized by Mrs. Loretta Russell, Public Health Nurse.

I wish to express my appreciation to Mr. Bennett, the teachers, parents, and pupils for their cooperation and interest in the school health program the past year.
