Fred, a native son, was born on Farm Lane, son of Myron B. and Sadie Felch. He retired as a foreman from the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard in 1975.

He served the town from 1939 to 1985, as a Selectman (6 years), a School Treasurer (20 years), Tax Collector (7 years), a member on the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Adjustment, Budget Committee, Solid Waste, Incenerator, and Water Research committees. He served on the Recreation Commission, was a Boy Scout leader, a member of the School Board, P.T.A. President, a special police officer in the 1950's and a volunteer firefighter from 1939 to 1956.

He accepted a state appointment as a member of the Shore Fisheries Committee (1960 - 1984) and was elected to the N.H. Constitutional Convention (1978-1984).

Fred was a dedicated public servant, greatly admired by all who knew him. He is remembered and sadly missed.

ARTICLE 2: To see if the town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance:

1. To amend the official Seabrook Zoning Map under Section II of the Zoning Ordinance to incorporate a Zone IA as follows:

All area of land currently in Zone 2 and located in the Lakeshore area, to include Forest Drive, Ayer Circle, Forest Court, Pinecone Drive, Evergreen Drive, and Timber Court, as shown on the Revised Seabrook Zoning Map and more specifically shown on the Seabrook Property Tax Map and described as follows:

Beginning at the northeast corner of Lot 75 and running southerly along the easterly boundary of Lots 74 through 68, through Lakeshore Drive, along the southeastern boundary of Lot 146, thence turning westerly following the southern boundary of Lot 146 through 124, thence turning in a northerly direction running along the western boundary of Lot 123 through Lot 122, thence turning easterly at the northwest corner of Lot 122 and running to the southwest corner of Lot 119, thence turning northerly and running along the western boundary of Lots 119 through 116, thence turning easterly and following the northern boundary of Lots 115 through 112, thence turning southerly and following the northern boundary of Lot 111 through 96, thence turning easterly along the northern boundary og Lot 95 through Lot 75 to the point of beginning.

ARTICLE 3: To see if the town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance:

2. To amend the Zoning Ordinance by including an additional zone to be called "Zone IA" and more specifically to amend Section II to add to the list of use districts the "Zone IA" and amend Section III to include a use district as follows:

F. Zone 1A.

In Zone 1A no buildings, structures or portions thereof shall be erected, altered, moved, or used and no land or building or part thereof shall be used, arranged, or designed to be used except for one or more of the following uses: 1. Single family dwellings.

2. Two-family dwellings shall be permitted as a special exception by the Board of Adjustment only if adequate land for parking is available and the sewage disposal system complies with all town and state regulations covering two-family dwellings.

3. Dead storage of travel trailers not more than twentyseven (27) feet in length and boats used by residents or tenants.

4. Accessory buildings not for human habitation which are incidental to the primary uses and accessory uses by owner or tenant incidental to the above permitted uses, such as swimming pools, which are not detrimental to a residential neighborhood.

Article 33: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Thousand (\$200,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of designing and constructing a new solid waste transfer station; and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into such contracts and agreements as are necessary for this purpose.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Motion by Lydia M. Gould, second by David Anderson, to adopt Article 58 as read. Article explained by Lydia M. Gould. YES and NO ballots requested. Engineers, Don McElhinney and E.C. Jordan explained this article. The proposed system will serve the entire town. The tax increase will be \$3.00/\$1,000 valuation. Sewer hookup charge between \$400 and \$1200 per home. Wright's Island recommended site. No Federal Funding for Seabrook. Gordon Dow requests YES and NO ballots using the check-list. YES 189 NO 89. ARTICLE 58 ADOPTED.

Article 59: On petition of Lydia M. Gould and thirty six (36) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Million Five Hundred Thousand (\$3,500,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of adding said amount to the Capital Reserve Fund, known as the "Sewer Fund."

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Motion by Lydia M. Gould, second by Benjamin Moore, to adopt Article 59 as read. Lydia Gould explained if this article is passed this money will pay for the first year of construction. Paper Ballots with check-lists used. YES 182 NO 50. ARTICLE 59 ADOPTED.

Motion by Ernest B. Sanborn, second by Clayton Jeffers, to take up Article 34 at this time. MOTION ADOPTED.

Article 34: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Million Five Hundred Thousand (\$1,500,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of designing and constructing a new fire station to be located on land owned by the town on Centennial Street; and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into such contracts and agreements as are necessary for this purpose.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Motion by Ernest B. Sanborn, second by Howard Page, Jr., to adopt Article 34 as read. ARTICLE 34 ADOPTED.

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the state, federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

Motion by Earlene U. Locke, second by Clyde O. Brown, to adopt Article 12 as read. ARTICLE 12 ADOPTED.

Article 13: To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to appoint such permanent police officers, firemen and employees for all other departments of the town as they deem necessary.

Motion by Earlene U. Locke, second by Clyde O. Brown, to adopt Article 13 as read. ARTICLE 13 DEFEATED.

Article 14: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell at public auction or by advertised sealed bids such town property as is no longer used by the town.

Motion by Clyde O. Brown, second by David Anderson, to adopt Article 14 as read. ARTICLE 14 ADOPTED.

Article 15: To see if the town will vote, pursuant to authority under RSA 80:42 and RSA 80:42-a, to retain and hold all real property located within the marshlands and to authorize the Selectmen to sell all other tax title property, in the first instance to former owners of the property, or the grandparents, parents, children, and spouses of said former owner, for a sum not less than the outstanding taxes owed plus accrued interest to the date of tax deed; or failing such sale, then by advertized sealed bids or public auction, at the discretion of the Selectmen.

Motion by Clyde O. Brown, second by Ann Downer, to adopt Article 15 as read. ARTICLE 15 ADOPTED.

Article 16: To see if the town will vote to ratify the following amendments to the Public Health Regulations; which amendments were adopted on November 6, 1985, and February 5, 1986, respectively, by the Town Health Officer and the Board of Selectmen:

1. Amend Section B-1 to read as follows:

All dwellings and commercial, public or industrial buildings from which sewage will discharge must have a private sewage disposal system of a type, size and construction that meets or exceeds the minimum requirements of the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission or such other requirements as may be necessary for the protection of the public health and safety as determined by the Health Officer for the proposed or actual use of said building. Any enlargements, changes, or intensification of the existing uses of a building shall require the private sewage disposal systems to be modified or enlarged so as to fully comply with the then existing requirements and regulations of the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission (as they may be amended from time to time) as they apply to the said enlarged, changed, or intensified use. All said systems, whether original or later modified, shall be installed and used so as not to create a health or safety hazard.

2. Amend Section B-2 to read as follows:

<u>Permits required to construct septic systems:</u> Any persons intending to construct, retrofit, enlarge, or modify a private sewage disposal system shall first obtain approval from the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission for said new or modified system and then obtain a written permit to do so signed by the Town Health Officer. In the event that the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission does not require an approval or permit for any retrofit, enlargement, or modification of an existing system, the person applying for the town permit or constructing said system must satisfy all existing requirements or regulations of said commission for the installation or construction of the retrofit, enlargement, or modification of the existing system. The Town Health Officer shall, in all cases, determine compliance with these requirements and shall be authorized to hire such expert advice as may be necessary in these duties.

3. Amend the Public Health Regulations generally by adding an additional section to be designated as Section D entitled "Rules for the Sanitary Production and Distribution of Food" and to adopt thereunder all the provisions of the New Hampshire rules for the sanitary production and distribution of food specifically known as He-P2300 with the exception of He-P2301 and He-P2302. Said rules are specifically adopted and incorporated herewith as a part of this ordinance and reference is made therein for the specific provisions. Further, all food processing establishments and food service establishments shall be licensed by the Town Health Officer and shall be subject to the regulations contained herein.

Motion by Clyde O. Brown, second by Ann Downer, to adopt Article 16 as read. ARTICLE 16 ADOPTED.

Article 17: To see if the town will vote to adopt written Welfare Regulations as proposed by the Board of Selectmen. Chapter 380 of the Laws of 1985 require the town to adopt written welfare regulations prior to April 1, 1986. (Copies of the full text of the proposed regulations are on file with the Town Clerk.)

Motion by Earlene U. Locke, second by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau to adopt Article 17 as read. ARTICLE 17 ADOPTED.

Motion to adjourn until Monday evening by James S. Eaton, second by Oliver Fowler. MOTION DEFEATED. Amendment to adjourn until Friday evening at 7 PM by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Frank Thibodeau. Hand vote taken. YES 104 NO 63.

Article 18: To see if the town will vote to enact the following ordinance regulating the use of sailboats and windsurfers on Seabrook Beach in order to protect the health and safety of the general public. This ordinance shall be known as Chapter 229 of the Code of the Town of Seabrook.

229-1 Use of Sailboats and Windsurfers Restricted at Seabrook Beach

The individual use of sailboats and windsurfers from the beaches of Seabrook Beach shall be prohibited at all times.

229-2 Violation and Penalties

There shall be, in addition to any other penalties imposed by law, a fine of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for each violation of this chapter.

229-3 Effective Date

This chapter shall be effective as of the date it is adopted at the Town Meeting.

Motion by Clyde O. Brown, second by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, to adopt Article 18 as read. Amendment by Timothy Willis, second by James C. Falconer, to see if the town will vote to enact the following ordinance regulating the use of sailboarding and windsurfers on Seabrook Beach in order to protect the health and safety of the general public. This ordinance shall be known as Chapter 229 of the code of the Town of Seabrook: 229-1: Use of sailboats and windsurfers restricted at Seabrook Beach. The individual use of sailboats and windsurfers shall be restricted to use by residents, only by issuance of permits. Amendment passed. ARTICLE 18 ADOPTED AS AMENDED.

Article 19: To see if the town will vote to enact an exemption for prisoners of war pursuant to RSA 261:157-a waiving the fee to be charged for a permit to register one motor vehicle owned by any person who was captured and incarcerated for thirty days or more while serving in a qualifying war or armed conflict as defined in RSA 72:28 IV, and who was honorably discharged; provided the person has provided the Town Clerk with satisfactory proof of these circumstances.

Motion by Bruce G. Brown, second by David Anderson, to adopt Article 19 as read. ARTICLE 19 ADOPTED.

Article 20: On petition of Milan W. Knowles, Sr., and seventeen (17) other legal voters of the town: To see what action the voters of Town Meeting will take on the following: That the voters instruct the Board of Selectmen to change the personnel policy to allow police officers to wear beards.

Motion by E. Albert Weare, second by Robert Loud, to postpone Article 20 indefinitely. ARTICLE 20 POSTPONED INDEFINITELY.

Article 21: To see if the town will vote to rescind the action of the town taken under Article 25 of the 1985 Town Meeting [to expend a portion of moneys raised in 1984 for the purchase of the Straw-Grasso parcel of land for a fire station] and to reconfirm the intent of the town vote raising this money under Article 31 of the 1984 Town Meeting.

Motion by Clyde O. Brown, second by Earlene U. Locke, to adopt Article 21 as read. ARTICLE 21 ADOPTED.

Article 22: To see if the town will vote to rescind Article 31 of the 1977 Annual Town Meeting, being the \$50.00 exclusion from the Social Security Plan for election officials and workers, in order to eliminate the exclusion.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The town has made progress toward completion of a variety of projects in 1986.

Money was raised and appropriated to purchase land and hire a design engineer for the town sewer system. The board conducted numerous interviews of engineering firms and visited treatment plants in New England. At the end of 1986 the board was nearing a decision regarding the selection of an engineer. The selection will be finalized in 1987 and construction begun in 1988.

During 1986 bids were reviewed for installation of a fourth deep rock well. The original design engineer and well drilling company will be hired to install the pump in the existing well hole. This will result in a substantial increase to our existing water supply at a cost less than half the original low bid.

In the spring of 1986 virtually all of the town's liability insurance was canceled when its insurer went bankrupt. Thanks to the efforts of our secretary, Margaret Wetherington, Town Counsel Gary Holmes and Insurance Consultant Richard Larrabee, insurance was secured to protect the town. In early summer, we joined the New Hampshire Municipal Association property/liability insurance pool. We now have reliable and affordable insurance for the town, despite the instability of the insurance market.

Work on the new Police Station continued and occupation is expected in the spring. The new Fire Station was brought closer to reality with the hiring of an architect. Construction will begin in 1987.

Several drainage projects were completed, most notably Pine Street, Pine Cone Drive and Adams Avenue. Most drainage projects will be coordinated with next year's sewer construction program.

The new solid waste transfer station was designed, and plans forwarded for state approval. Construction will start in the Spring.

The Ledge Road construction and Old New Boston Road intersection improvement projects are designed. The funds were not adequate for the project. Additional funds will be sought this year so that both of these projects can be completed.

A Wetlands hearing on Cross Beach Road construction was requested and approved in the fall of 1986. Design work can take place this summer, if funded.

The metes and bounds of town roads on the east side of Route 1A were surveyed and a plan prepared. It will now be possible to correct encroachments on a town way. Completion of drainage plans for the area will be coordinated with sewer construction.

The selectmen and the town reaffirmed its commitment to protection of our most valuable resource, the ocean and its environs,

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by purchasing the sand dunes to the west of Route 1A. It is an effort for which the town's future generations will be grateful.

Substantial progress toward a first contract for the Seabrook Employee's Association was made and a new multi-year fireman's contract was completed.

The long-standing N.H. Public Service tax appeal has been settled. Although the town prevailed on many points, the tax refund will still total over \$5 million plus interest, due to the court's decision.

This money, along with the necessary sewer funding and regular operating costs will test everyone's resolve to fund these continuing projects. We have tried to limit the number of additional expenditures this year. We have worked closely with the Budget Committee and department heads to produce a realistic but streamlined budget. We hope town meeting will support our efforts. Otherwise, the low tax rate which the town has enjoyed for several years now, will increase to unparalleled proportions.

In June of 1986 we hired Kevin Paicos as our Administrative Assistant. It is hoped that his expertise will make our burden as selectmen a bit lighter. We would like to publicly commend our clerical staff, Margaret Wetherington, Nona Griggs, and part-timer Joyce Brown, who did tremendous work for the town this year during the six-month period the Administrative Assistant's position was vacant. It is due to their efforts, and especially Margaret, that the office functioned smoothly and progress could be made on so many projects simultaneously.

We hired a new Police Chief, Paul Cronin, in the spring of this year. Paul is no stranger to town. We are confident that he will bring a high degree of professional police-management expertise to the department's operation.

It has been a year of great accomplishment. Much remains to be done. Projects begun in 1986 will be completed in 1987. We are hopeful that a major reform effort will receive your positive review -- approval for the formation of a Department of Public Works. Such action will result in better sharing of manpower and equipment and will result in substantial savings to the town. Of course, another major improvement in our town government is still needed -- adoption of a Town Manager position. This effort remains high on our priority list for future action.

We look forward to the year to come, and to working with the many town employees and volunteer citizens who together help to make Seabrook a better place to live.

ASSESSING DEPARTMENT

During the year we placed all data pertaining to property valuation into the new computer. We went "on line" in May of 1986. In June we were able to do the first in-house tax billing on property. The new system has allowed the office to compile and distribute information to the Building and Health Department, Planning Board and Board of Adjustment, Fire and Police Departments. We all feel it has been money well spent for this sytem.

A team of field personnel was hired in mid-summer for the revaluation of property in town. They are utilized to measure buildings and view property interiors only; photos were taken of the <u>exteriors only</u> of all property. This gives a unique history of properties through the years and is visible assurance to the revaluation process. This process will continue through mid 1987; the new valautions will be evident on the tax bills for the second billing in 1987. The tax suit against the town for 1978 - 1982 is finally through the Lower Courts and Supreme Courts Public Service Co. of New Hampshire was seeking nineteen million dollars (\$19,000,000) in abatements, claiming the utility was improperly and unfairly assessed. The Court allowed a variety of depreciations which left the town with an abatement of \$5,800,000 as opposed to the far greater amount that Public Service was seeking. The Supreme Court is a trier of legality, not opinion; as a result the Supreme Court would not rule on the depreciation amounts assigned by the Lower Court Judge.



ANNUAL REPORT - BROWN LIBRARY - 1986

1986 was an extremely exciting year at Brown Library. Elizabeth Heath, Director, Sharon Rafferty and Joyce Fry, Assistants, continued on in their existing positions, and Anne Ferreira was hired in early March to fill the then-vacant Children's Librarian slot, thus bringing the library staff up to full strength. A new Trustee, Evelyn Fowler, was named this year to fill an existing vacancy on the Board.

Mrs. Ferreira has since done a wonderful job of organizing and upgrading services to children. There have been several series of regularly scheduled storyhours throughout the year for youngsters of all ages, as well as frequent, special evening presentations. Some of these have featured guest storytellers; all have proven to be very popular with the younger crowd. Additionally, during the summer many special childrens' events and programs were held, among which were the popular Talking Leaves Reading Program, a wildly successful performance by the Ha'Penny Puppet Theater, a talk and demonstration by the SPCA of Stratham, and a stuffed animal contest held with the aid of McDonald's Restaurant of Seabrook. Also, the Seabrook Recreation Center held a summer-long youth program at the library. Mrs. Ferreira has also made it a point to make personal visits to the school, as well as to have school groups visit the library. The adults at the library have also been busy. A Book Appraisal Day program was held which proved to be most well-attended, and several exhibits on display managed to achieve area-wide popularity. The Friends of Brown Library was re-started in May of 1986 and during the year three successful booksales were held, including one at a booth at Seabrook Old Home Days. With the proceeds from these activities as well as with profits from the sale of library logo ballpoint pens, the Friends were able to purchase a long-needed refrigerator and a hotplate for the library staff, and ten magazine subscriptions for the library.

The library building gained some new features this year, the most notable of which was the air-conditioning system which was up and running on July 9, 1986. The adult magazine display area has been newly designed and there is now new, improved shelving for children's picturebooks. The interior of the entire building has been repainted to give it a clean and even more welcoming appearance: the upstairs in its traditional mellow yellow, the children's room in the "fun" color of raspberry ice cream.

Equipment purchases included comfortable new furniture for the children's room thereby filling a longstanding need for additional seating in that area, an answering machine, a filmstrip projector, a typewriter for the Children's Librarian, and a printer and modem for the library's computer.

With the acquisition of the modem came an immediate increase in the ability of the Library to more rapidly locate and acquire materials for its patrons via inter-library loan from other New Hampshire Libraries through direct on-line access to the New Hampshire Automated Information System (NHAIS) located at the New Hampshire State Library in Concord.

Gifts to the library from individuals included many donations of used books, several magazine subscriptions, and both new books and/or funds to purchase same - often in memory of loved ones.

During the year 1986 the Library maintained its book collection by purchasing both relevant newly-published titles and some older, classic and necessary volumes. The library also began a systematic weeding program to rid the shelves of outdated materials in order to make way for the newer books which seem to arrive daily. All of this effort paid off handsomely in 1986 for during that year the total adult and child patronage was 10,624 which represents an increase of 38% over last year's figure. Total circulation was up as well in 1986, being 14,667 - an increase of 39% over last year. Children's circulation and patronage increased over that of the previous year by 100+%. Interestingly, the Library has seen a ten-year increase in circulation, from 1976 to 1986, of 386%.

BUILDING INSPECTOR

I would like to take this opportunity to address the continuing problem of <u>JUNK MOTOR VEHICLES</u>. You should be aware that Town Zoning Ordinances and State Regulations prohibit the storage of <u>more than one</u> (1) unregistered motor vehicle on a lot.

Recent regulations by the E.P.A. have declared that all fluids in these junk vehicles, i.e., oil, antifreeze, transmission fluid, etc. are hazardous waste.

The junk dealers will have to pay extra for the removal of the hazardous waste from these junk vehicles. This will make it difficult and expensive to have these vehicles removed in the near future. Anyone having more than one unregistered motor vehicle should have them removed as soon as possible to avoid large removal fees and possible court action.

1986 Report

1986 has been another year of increased building in the town. Fourhundred six (406) permits were issued with a dollar value of \$7,918,299. This is an increase from 1985 and this figure has doubled in two years. There has been an increase in new homes with twenty-four (24) new buildings. Thirteen of these are duplexes with a total of 37 new living units over all. Mobile homes have decreased in 1986. This trend should continue as the mobile home parks become filled. The largest increase in 1986 has been in construction and remodelling of commercial buildings. Permits with a value of \$2,784,836 were issued. This is an increase from \$1,333,217 in 1985.

SEABROOK MOSQUITO CONTROL 1986

Surveillance of freshwater breeding sites began on March 31st. Larvicide treatment of sites found to support larvae of man-biting mosquito species started on April 16th. Because of the light snowfall over the winter and a very dry spring (only 1.5" rain in May), 'spring' <u>Aedes</u> mosquito breeding spots were greatly reduced. June and July, however, were very wet (7.9" rain in June, 5.0" in July). Because of this, 'summer' mosquito species populations were higher than previous years.

Surveillance and treatment of salt marsh breeding sites commenced on April 28th. Further treatments were necessary throughout the summer after the monthly high-run "flood" tides (caused by the full moon). Additional treatments of these sites were done after the heavy summer rains which also can activate mosquito breeding. The larvicide used mainly this year was Abate 5% granular sprayed from motorized Echo DM-9 back-pack sprayers. Also Abate 4% EC (liquid), Altosid briquets, and Flit MLO were used in appropriate situations.

Adult mosquito species populations were monitored weekly at three locations in town using CO_2 (dry ice) baited traps (CDC). Specimans were identified, counted, and recorded with results being sent to state health officials as part of the Eastern Equine Encephalitis monitoring program.

The adulticiding phase (evening treatments of public roadways with the spray truck) of the program commenced on June 10th. Adulticiding treatments were carried out on 28 different nights with the west part of town being done 11 times, the middle portion 13 times and the south section 12 times. During times of high <u>Aedes sollicitans</u> (vicious daytime biters) population, additional spot <u>adulticiding</u> was done on certain woods roads and public gorunds. Cythion adulticide was sprayed using the Leco ULV sprayer which is mounted on the new Mosquito Control truck.

Greenhead Fly Traps

24 new greenhead fly traps were constructed this year, bringing the total up to 78. These were placed along the perimeters of salt marshes around town (using the old pick-up truck). Thousands of the vicious biting greenheads coming off the marshes are trapped and die before they can reach higher ground. The flies are attracted to the shade of these dark boxes, fly up inside and are trapped in the screened-in section where they die of dehydration.

Stream Clearance

Once again, this phase of the program did not get off the ground because of lack of personnel. If this phase of the program is to be continued, competetive wages must be offered to get summer help for this labor-intensive job.

REPORT OF POLICE CHIEF

I am pleased to serve once again as your Chief of Police. I intend to structure a Department that is well trained and educated as well as highly professional.

The Seabrook Police Department will be responsive to all our citizens needs in the area of protecting life and property and one of which the citizens of our Town can be proud.

During 1986, protests at Seabrook Station resulted in the arrests of 176 individuals. The year was also one that plagued us with injuries to several officers.

Several personnel changes were made during the year, one of which included the transfer of Patrolman Carlene Thompson to the position of Youth Services Officer. Statistics have shown us that nearly 70% of all crimes in some way touches a person under the age of 18. Whether as participants or, in many instances, victims of crimes, the needs of our youth have to be met quickly, efficiently, and professionally. While many people may not be aware, once a juvenile enters the legal process, many hours are spent preparing for Court hearings as well as trips to social agencies which are often mandated by the Courts. Court decisions such as the "Kingston Decision" will have a great impact on all law enforcement agencies in our State especially for towns such as ours where youths travel through Seabrook transporting alcoholic beverages enroute to the beaches. Seabrook's future lies in the youth of our Town.

The hiring process was completed to fill the long-time vacant position of Animal Control Officer. I am pleased with the appointment of John Tougas and Jeff Baillargeon who work part-time in providing this important service. Although these individuals had little experience, their desire to learn and ability to handle the various calls has been very positive.

Seabrook is one of a few towns which does not provide firearms for its police officers. Our present policy of police officers providing their own sidearms brings a great liability against the Town in the event of a lawsuit. This can be corrected by means of purchasing and issuing sidearms to all sworn officers.

Finally a word on the men and women who make up the Seabrook Police Department. The year 1986 was a time of transition of all of us. I firmly believe that the Police Department can and will become a leader for others to follow and one which the residents of our Town will continue to be proud of and support.

TOWN WARRANT FOR 1987

To the inhabitants of the Town of Seabrook, in the County of Rockingham, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the auditorium of the Seabrook Elementary School, Walton Road, on Tuesday, March 10, 1987, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and to cast ballots until at least 7:00 o'clock in the evening of the same day, and to meet in the auditorium of the Seabrook Elementary School, Walton Road, on Thursday, March 12, 1987, at 7:00 o'clock in the evening to act on the articles below.

Further, you are hereby notified that the moderator will process the absentee ballots at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon on Tuesday, March 10, 1987, pursuant to RSA 659:49.

Article 1: To elect by non-partisan ballot: one (1) Selectman and Assessor for a term of three (3) years; one (1) Trustee of the Trust Funds for a term of three (3) years: one (1) Road Agent for a term of one (1) year; one (1) Fire Chief for a term of one (1) year; one (1) Town Clerk for a term of three (3) years; one (1) Treasurer for a term of three (3) years; three (3) Constables for a term of one (1) year; two (2) members of the Planning Board for a term of three (3) years; one (1) member of the Planning Board for a term of three (3) years; one (1) member of the Planning Board for a term of three (3) years; and one (1) Park Commissioner for a term of three (3) years.

(On the Official Ballot)

Article 2: Shall the municipality approve the Charter Amendment reprinted below?

To amend the Seabrook Home Rule Charter, Part II, by adding Section XXIV, Public Works, as follows:

There is hereby created the Department of Public Works. It shall consist of a Director of Public Works who shall be head of the department and all officers and employees assigned thereto. The Director shall be appointed by the Selectmen. All officers shall perform their duties subject to the supervision of the Director.

A. The Department of Public Works shall have charge of and supervision over the construction, management, and control of the Town's water system and all storm, water, and sanitary sewers, including the setting of rates which shall be done only with the approval of the Selectmen.

B. The department shall have charge of the care, maintenance, and construction of public dumps, public parks and playgrounds, cemeteries, public beaches, public forests, shade and ornamental trees, and the collection of waste and refuse. These duties shall not, however, conflict and interfere with the duties and responsibilities of the Recreation Commission so long as said Commission continues in existence.

C. The department shall have charge of the street lighting system and shall be responsible for the maintenance, repair, and extension thereof.

D. All physical properties of the Town, including water distribution, parks, playgrounds, and all municipal utilities not assigned to some other department or office shall be and are hereby assigned to the Department of Public Works.

E. The Director of Public Works shall be custodian of all tools, equipment, and other personal property belonging to the Town and not assigned to the care of any other public officer.

F. All persons currently holding office or performing duties in conflict with or duplicating the authority granted to the Department of Public Works herein, shall continue in office or in performance of these duties until the Selectmen appoint a director, at which time the said office and duties shall be discontinued.

G. The effective date of this amendment is July 1, 1987.

(On the Official Ballot)

Article 3: To see if the town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance:

1. To amend the Zoning Ordinance Article 1, Section X, DEFINITIONS, by adding the following definition of "SIGN" as follows:

SIGN - A sign is a name, identification, description, display or illustration or any other visual display which is affixed to or painted or represented directly or indirectly upon a building, structure, or piece of land in view of the general public and which directs to an object, product, place, activity, person, institution, organization, or business.

However, a sign shall not include any display of official court or public notice nor any official traffic control device, nor shall it include the flag, emblem, or insignia of a nation, state, county, municipality, school, or religious group.

(On the Official Ballot)

Article 4: To see if the town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance:

2. To amend the Zoning Ordinance by adding a new section as follows:

SECTION XI SIGNS ARTICLE 1 GENERAL REGULATIONS

- A. The intent of this Article is to allow the erection of signs for the purpose of providing information and advertising in an orderly, effective and safe manner. Restrictions on type, location, and size of signs protect the public from hazardous and distracting displays and create an attractive environment which is conducive to business, industry and tourism.
- B. All signs shall comply with the regulations affecting the erection and construction of signs as required by such State and Federal Agencies having jurisdiction over the location and erection of same.
- C. Any traffic or directional sign owned or installed by a governmental agency shall be permitted.
- D. All signs to be located ten (10) feet from a Street Lot Line or a Public Right of Way except by special exception by the Board of Adjustment.
- E. The maximum height for all signs shall be thirty-five (35) feet.
- F. The minimum ground clearance for all permanent signs shall be six (6) feet.
- G. Signs, any part of which moves or flashes, and all signs with traveling light(s) or of an animated type are prohibited, except by special exception by the Board of Adjustment. Any signs, if lighted, shall be illuminated by a luminous tube or by an indirect shielded light. A sign or its illuminator shall not, by reason of its location, shape or color interfere with public traffic or be confused with or obstruct the view or effectiveness of any official traffic signal.

ARTICLE 2 SIGNS IN ZONES I and 5

- A. No more than one (I) nameplate and/or identification sign shall be allowed for each dwelling unit.
- B. No sign may be larger than four (4) square feet per side.

ARTICLE 3 SIGNS IN ZONES 2 and 3

Business signs are permitted in Zones 2 and 3 in accordance with the following regulations:

- A. No more than two (2) signs shall be allowed for any one business.
- B. One wall or projecting sign for each lot street frontage on each establishment. Maximum surface area shall not exceed two (2) square feet for each foot of building frontage for all wall signs and fifteen (15) square feet for projecting signs.
- C. One pole or free-standing sign for each lot street frontage. Maximum surface area shall not exceed forty (40) square feet per side except that a shopping center or industrial park having two (2) or more businesses may have a common sign containing a registry of all tenants and/or occupants with a maximum surface area of eighty (80) souare feet per side.

ARTICLE 4 TEMPORARY SIGNS

One temporary sign per business shall be allowed. Such sign shall have a maximum surface area of thirty (30) square feet per side.

ARTICLE 5 SIGN PERMITS

- A. No sign shall be erected until a permit for same has been obtained from the Building Inspector and appropriate fee paid. No permit or fee is necessary for the following:
 - 1. Yard Sale and Flea Market
 - 2. Real Estate Sale or Rental Signs
 - 3. Institutional Signs
 - 4. Political Signs
 - 5. Signs indicating the name and nature of approved home occupations.
- B. There shall be no fee charged to non-profit organizations for temporary signs.
- C. All political signs shall be removed within seven (7) days after the election.

(On the Official Ballot)

Article 5: To see if the town will vote to establish a scholarship/trust fund for the purpose of accepting yearly royalties from the town's cable T.V. franchise and expending such sums to benefit high school graduates residing in the Town of Seabrook who are pursuing post-secondary education or training in the mass-media field, and to transfer into said fund the sum of Three Thousand Four Hundred Nine Dollars and Eight Cents (\$3,409.08) which represents accrued franchise fees paid to the town. And further, to establish a Scholarship Fund Committee of three citizens, one of whom shall be a Trustee of the Trust Funds, appointed by the Board of Selectmen to establish qualifications and procedures for the use of said fund and make yearly recommendations to the Trustee of the Trust Funds for awarding of scholarships.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 6: To see if the town will vote to fund the Cemetery Trust Fund entitled "Care of Cemetery Lots" by depositing in said fund an amount of money from accumulated surplus in the amount of Six Thousand One Hundred Twenty-Five (\$6,125.00) Dollars (being the amount of receipts from sale of cemetery lots).

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 7: To see whether or not the town will vote to adopt the ordinances and regulations, together with a change of numbering, titleing and formatting thereof, the entire text of which are as published by General Code Publishers in "The Code of the Town of Seabrook" on file with the Town Clerk, effective on passage; this vote shall supersede and replace by reference to said Code the ordinances and regulations heretofore adopted by the Town of Seabrook.

Article 8: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to renew and refund town notes.

Article 9: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

Article 10: To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to appoint such permanent police officers, firemen and employees for all other departments of the town as they deem necessary.

Article 11: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell at public auction or by advertised sealed bids such town property as is no longer used by the town.

Article 12: To see if the town will vote, pursuant to authority under RSA 80:42 and RSA 80:42-a, to retain and hold all real property located within the marshlands and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell all other tax title property, in the first instance to former owners of the property, or the grandparents, parents, children, and spouses of said former owner, for a sum not less than the outstanding taxes owed plus accrued interest to the date of tax deed; or failing such sale, then by advertised sealed bids or public auction, at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen.

Article 13: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Million Eight Hundred Sixty Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty-Four (7,860,924.00) Dollars or such other sum as may be necessary, to pay and/or settle-judgments of the Superior Court against the town for refund of a portion of the taxes assessed against the owners of the Seabrook project for the years 1978-1982 inclusive, and to authorize the selectmen to calculate and pay additional interest at the rate of six (6%) percent per annum on the principal sum of these judgments, from the date of the 1987 town meeting to date of payment, adding such additional interest to the total amount to be raised and appropriated; and to take any other action relating thereto.

Article 14: To see if the town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as an offset against the following debt service:

or supervisor on an "ad hoc" basis for the specific purpose of monitoring any project, subdivision, or private development which involves compliance with local, state, or federal regulations and has the potential for impact on health, safety, and welfare of the town and its citizens.

Article 33: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Nine Hundred Eighty (\$9,980.00) for the purpose of supplementing an appropriation made under Article 57 of the 1986 adjourned session of the town meeting, regarding the establishment of a lifeguard program.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 34: To see if the town will vote to rescind the provisions of Article 57 of the 1986 adjourned session of town meeting, regarding the establishment of a lifeguard program.

Article 35: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Six Hundred Forty-Two (\$4,642.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and installing a Merlin Telephone and Paging System in the Seabrook Community Center.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 36: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Five Thousand (\$35,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and installing a back-up generator for the Seabrook Community Center.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 37: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and installing the following new equipment for the Seabrook Community Center: (1) American flag with stand; (1) state flag with stand; (1) 48" commercial gas stove with hood, light and fan; and (1) set of heavy duty hideaway stairs.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 38: On petition of Elliot L. Eaton and twenty-four (24) other legal voters of the town: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Five Thousand (\$35,000.00) Dollars, said funds to be administered by the Recreation Commission, for the purpose of purchasing and installing Lights for the main Little League Field at Governor Weare Park.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 39: On petition of Lita M. Brown and twenty-two (22) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand (\$7,000.00) Dollars, said funds to be administered by the Parks Department, for the purpose of adding a second track route to the current BMX Track located at the Seabrook Rt. 107 wells properties, as well as build up portions of the existing track which will be used by both routes.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 40: On petition of Lita M. Brown and twenty-three (23) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred and Forty (\$2,140.00) Dollars, said funds to be administered by the Recreation Commission, to purchase new equipment for the Seabrook BMX Track including: (1) Electric Start Gate; (1) Electric Gate Control; (1) Gasoline 550 Generator and (2) Picnic Tables.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 41: On petition of Edna Hannon and nineteen (19) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to support the Retired Senior Volunteer Program by allocating One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars to help defray some of the expenses for the fiscal year 1987-1988.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 42: On petition of Warner B. Knowles and eleven (11) other legal voters of the town: To see what action the town meeting will take on the following: To make a by-law which shall require that whenever any question appears on the official ballot and the governing body or any other constituted for charter changes, zoning changes, or any other referenda questions which uses public funds or personnel to promulgate propaganda or any other form of communication to influence the decision of the voters on any question; than any responsible citizen or group of citizens who have an opposing view shall be afforded "Equal Opportunity" and access to "Equal Funding" to offer their opinion on questions or "Charter Changes" so placed on the town meeting ballot and warrant.

Article 43: On petition of Warner B. Knowles and twelve (12) other legal voters of the town: To see what action the annual town meeting will take on the following: Pursuant to the Cable Communication Policy Act of 1984, U.S. Public Law 98-549, and RSA 53-c to establish a "Study Committee" of not more than five (5) for the purpose of exploring the possibility of the Town of Seabrook to acquire, purchase, own and operate a Cable Television system; and/or to "establish a separate chartered municipal cable television authority" to acquire, own, and operate said system. The Study Committee to report back to the March 8, 1988 annual town meeting on their findings, and recommendations; further to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars for expenses of this committee for study, travel, and legal advice. The study committee to be constituted as follows: To be nominated and elected from the floor of the adjourned annual town meeting.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 44: On petition of Warner B. Knowles and eleven (11) other legal voters of the town: To see what action the town meeting will take to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Million Five Hundred Thousand (\$7,500,000.00) Dollars for specific purpose of adding this amount to the Capital Reserve Fund known as the "Municipal Sewer Fund."

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 45: On petition of Eric N. Small and fifteen (15) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to rescind the action taken by the Board of Selectmen in December, 1986, in which an engineering firm was selected to design the wastewater collection, treatment, and disposal facilities of a municipal sewage system, funding for this project (\$2,250,000) was approved in accordance with Article 58 of the 1986 annual town meeting.

A special committee, consisting of the Board of Selectmen and two members of the 1986 Town Sewer Committee, shall be authorized to make the final selection of an engineering firm to design and coordinate the above project in the best interest of the town of Seabrook. 

OFFICE OF THE PROSECUTOR

This was a year of progressive changes. A prosecution policy was developed with three things in mind: improving the quality of arrests and cases brought before the Court, maintaining fair and consistent sentence recommendations, and upholding the power of the Court by bringing forth abused suspended sentences.

Continued attendance at the New Hampshire Police Prosecutors Association, in-service schooling at Northern Essex Community College for paralegal courses, and attendance at various seminars sponsored by the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council has aided in keeping abreast of changes in the law, legislative action, and courtroom techniques and actions. An integral part of learning is teaching. This office offered seminars to newly-hired officers, Amesbury High School seniors, N.H. Police Cadet Academy Corps of Cadet, and a small group of Town employees.

REPORT OF YOUTH SERVICES DIVISION

1986 witnessed a new beginning and separate approach in the Youth Division. In August of this year the transferral of officers within the department brought many changes which began with a complete reorganization of all files and records with the result being a more efficient and controlled system which is computer ready should that need arise.

This office gained access to intrastate Juvenile Associations as well as Prosecutorial Associations, thus, allowing it to remain updated on the ever-expanding and changing Juvenile Justice System procedures, Legislative actions, courtroom techniques and methods. The Youth Services Officer has been actively involved in a local group of Judges, Juvenile Officers, Attorneys and Social Services personnel who are attempting to establish a <u>local</u> emergency placement for children in need within our own area. A review of the rising number of truancy difficulties within our schools has mandated a need for more court intervention as well as adult prosecution where applicable.

REPORT OF THE POLICE STATION BUILDING COMMITTEE

On October 19, 1985, work was started to clear the building site. Maxam Company began work on April 7, 1986, and Leonard DiBartolomeo assumed his duties as Clerk of the Works on April 14th. There was an official ground-breaking ceremony shortly after 9:00 a.m. on April 30, 1986.

Although progress has been slow, we can be assured that the station will be of good quality and one that the townspeople can be proud of. Delays have been caused by shortages and delays in delivery of materials, shortage of help, and bad weather.

In February of 1987 the project was 55% complete. The original completion date was October 30, 1986, and the anticipated date of completion now is April 30, 1987. The building is being completed within the budgeted amount and there haven't been any change orders on the contract.

Boynton's Lane Extension was completed with a base asphalt course and will have the finish applied in the spring. Landscaping, hot topping and some exterior work will be done after April 30th. The second floor of the building will be reserved for future expansion. The station will be "fire-safe" and equipped with a sprinkler system.

Much credit should go to Leonard DiBartolomeo who has been overseeing the project on the town's behalf. He feels the project will be the envy of all police departments in the state.

We would like to extend to you a personal invitation to visit our new station during open house. Specific dates and times will be announced through the news media as well as cable television.

The local Seacoast Coca-Cola Bottling Co. has become the largest cosponsor for many of the town's programs. They have assisted in providing uniforms, T-shirts, beverages, banners, patches and other donations for many of the following programs: Youth Basketball League, Youth Basketball Cheerleading Squads, Rams Football & Cheerleaders Program, Teen Basketball Team, BMX Raceway, Little League Boosters, Track & Field Team, Women's Softball and Miss Seabrook Pageant. They also donated a color T.V. and VCR to the town for the Community Center during 1986. They are planning to help this department even more in 1987.

SEABROOK OLD HOME DAYS

The Commission and Recreation Department continued to provide the towns largest special event, Seabrook Old Home Days, in which over a thousand residents and friends participated. The 1986 Old Home Days were during August 14th thru 17th. The event kicked off with the Miss Seabrook Pageant on August 14th, sponsored by the local American Legion Auxiliary and Firemen's Association with over 300 attending. Miss Shelley Dow was crowned Miss Seabrook of 1986 and will reign until August of 1987. The big event continued with the Junior Miss Seabrook Contest sponsored by the American Auxiliary Juniors on August 15th. Over 200 observed April Fowler's victory and crowning ceremony. On Saturday over 20 nonprofit groups, town departments and craftsmen provided booths of food, crafts, and activities. Special activities and contests were held throughout the day and included, Softball Tournament, Pie Eating Contest Best Pie Contest, Corn Husking Contest, Cribbage Tournament, Arm Wrestling Contest, Horseshoe Tournament, Bingo, Egg Throw, Field Races, Doll Carriage Parade, Diaper Derby, Musket Shoot, Entertainment, Food Feast, Record Hop, Monte Carlo, Fireworks and more. On the 17th, the last day of the big event the Lions Club held the 6th annual 10K Road Race and the Seabrook BMX Raceway, Inc. held their special Old Home Day BMX Races.

In addition to providing recreational programs throughout the year, the Commission and department continued to fulfill capital improvement projects such as installing a fire sprinkler system in the Seabrook Community Center, constructing a storage building at the BMX Track, installing protective wall panels in the Seabrook Community Center gymnasium replacing upper storage access stairs in the Community Center. The planned maintenance garage for the Community Center began being constructed in December of 1986 and should be completed by February of 1987. The gymnastic program planned in 1986 had to be postponed due to our search for instructors, therefore we hope to provide this program by the end of March 1987.

The Recreation Commission and Department also extend their thanks to all those volunteers who helped to make each special event and sports program a success during 1986. As we expand our sports programs more volunteers are needed such as coaches for indoor soccer. We would like to encourage other people in the community to come forward in 1987 to share their expertise and join in the expansion of recreational opportunities for the community.

We began the year by cutting trees and hauling away brush. There were winter snow storms so there was considerable time spent in plowing, sanding and salting. We hauled many loads of salt from Portsmouth to Seabrook. The usual vehicle maintenance was done during the year. During March all the town vehicles had to be inspected. There was work done on the drains at South Main Street. The concession building at Veteran's Park burned and the Highway Department cleaned up the debris. There was considerable time put in on cleaning street drains and catch basins. The part time men were laid off to return in the spring. It was necessary to stockpile gravel and a vibrator was rented to separate the rocks from the sand. The necessary cold patch and shoulder work was done during the year. Some time was spent in cutting brush on Fogg's Lane to widen the shoulders of the road. After winter was over the plows were scraped, painted and stored away until next season. Now the sweeper is brought out and used to clean up sand that has accumulated during the winter. Some places had to be swept by hand. Pine Street was graded to eliminate the ruts caused by winter weather. Hot top work was scheduled for Pine Cone Drive, Lower Collins Street, Pickens Avenue and Parkersville Lane. This was completed by November. Some hot top was done on Causeway Street, Farm Lane, Forest Drive and Lake Shore Drive. Twice during the year we had to install snow fence and then remove it behind the Old South Meeting House because of the antinuclear demonstrations. Signs were put up on the beach such as No Parking, One Way, Residents Only, No Alcohol. The farm tractor was used to mow the grass along the sides of the roads. The men of the Highway Department helped out at the Old Home Day celebration building a stage for the beauty pageant and transporting it where it was needed. A new GMC dump truck was purchased for the Highway Department as well as a new wheel loader.

The men of the Rubbish Department made the usual rubbish runs. In the summer months the runs increased to double runs. Twice this year we had clean-up week; once in April and again in November. The men collected the barrels at the beach, cleaned them, painted them and replaced them at the beach. There is one man who works during the summer cleaning up around the police station and public toilets. There were repairs made to the fence at the dump. The men cleaned up the grounds at the Elementary School and emptied the barrels after Old Home Days. A new rubbish truck and back hoe were purchased this year. The beach rake was used to clean up the seashore several times from April until Labor Day.

In the cemeteries a fence was installed at Hillside.During the spring there was a lot of cleaning, raking and mowing done prior to Memorial Day. The part time men were recalled in the spring to do work in the cemeteries. Barrels were placed in the cemeteries and signs were put up in Hillside Cemetery to clearly mark the sections there.

WELFARE OFFICER'S REPORT

Again this year I am pleased to report that less monies are being recommended in the town's welfare budget. Last year 31,595 was appropriated. This year 22,925 is being recommended. As you can see, this is 8,670 less than the previous year.

As you will see from last year's Welfare Report, 1986 was the first year the re-codified welfare law went into effect and no one was certain what this would portend as to expense of welfare impact on the towns and cities throughout the state.

Seabrook is fortunate in that there we have low taxes, and bountiful employment opportunities close-by, which of course means we have less indigent persons; however, because the new law made radical changes in "the residency" requirements to qualify for town welfare, the potential exists for a considerable fiscal impact if the welfare program and the laws and regulations are not carefully administered.

By referring cases to all of the programs which are available to our indigent citizens, it can and does reduce the cost to our local budget and taxpayers.

WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

There were 436,655,330 gallons of water pumped in 1986. This was a 27,213,183 gallon decrease over the previous year. This was found in the commercial use which had a 19,000,000 gallon decrease and in the domestic use which showed a decline in the summer months.

Commercial/industrial use decreased from 169,202,800 gallons in 1985 to 155,765,810 gallons in 1986. Although many commercial customers had increases, Public Service Company and Bailey Company decreased their water usage by 12,000,000 gallons and 4,000,000 gallons respectively.

There were 72 new services installed in 1986. Of these, seven were industrial, commercial or subdivision services which included: Hampton Motors, L & S Realty Trust, Midas Muffler, new police station, Pheasant Ridge, Straw-Brook, and the Greenhouse (Hampton Falls).

There were 19 water leaks repaired by the crew this year. The crew also assisted in the turning-off or repair of about 48 customer leaks, of which two 8" water main leaks in Staples Park were the largest.

Only one fire hydrant had to be repaired in 1986, located on Folly Mill Road.

The crew accomplished many special projects this year in addition to their regular and routine work. In the spring an 8" water main and fire hydrant was installed to the new police station site on Centennial Road. In the summer months the crew installed about 1,100 feet of 8" water main and 2 fire hydrants on Parkersville Lane. Also on Parkersville Lane, all the water services were replaced, the old 2" water main disconnected and the lower-half of the road hot topped.

In the fall, private contractors took up a lot of our time. The crew oversaw two subdivision projects: Pheasant Ridge and Straw-Brook. Both projects had 8" water mains and fire hydrants. A 6" water main was supervised from our new main on Boynton's Lane Extension to the police station.

Also in the fall, the crew assisted the highway crew on Pine Cone Drive. This drainage project included installing catch basins and laying of drainage and under-drain pipes.

Other projects included painting of hydrants, painting of the interior and exterior of pump stations, installing transducers in the rockwell pump houses, and hot topping around town where previous work had effected the road surfaces.

An attempt was made to install a pump into a fourth rockwell. It was discovered that the well has a curve to it -- enough so that a pump cannot be installed. This coming year a smaller pump will be installed in this well, hopefully.

Again, our Rules and Regulations, along with Cross-Connection Rules and Regulations, were revised and worked on by the Board of Selectmen, our engineers and myself. Anyone wishing to view these may do so at their convenience during normal working hours at the Water Department Office in the Town Hall.

In the office, our clerk/secretary has been busy setting up new filing systems with all accounts. With the new computer, she was the first to use the new Zip Code Plus 4 System of mailing in the town. This saved money because the computer was programmed to presort the bulk rate mail.

Nature was good to us in 1986 with its supply of rainfall. As I write this report and see the depth of snow outside, I feel this spring also will be a wet one, replenishing the ground water table. Even with this in mind, we hope our water users will still try to conserve. We again had no restrictions on our use of this precious resource. Hopefully, this will continue -- with everyone's help.

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1985, as listed in the accompanying table of contents. Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole. The combining fund and account group financial statements and supplemental schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Seabrook. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined financial statements and, in our opinion, is stated fairly in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.
