To the inhabitants of the Town of Thornton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Thornton on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for highways and bridges for the ensuing year and appropriate money for the same.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise money for state aid construction and make appropriation for the same.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise money for state aid maintenance and make appropriation for the same.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise money for trunk line maintenance and make appropriation for same.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for library above what the law requires.
- 8. To see if town will vote to fight the White Pine Blister and if so to appropriate money for the same.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the old road from R. L. Hazeltine's sugar camp to King's Camp.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road from Arthur Brown's north across the bridge.

- 11. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road from Dustin land to the J. W. Willey place and Richard's place.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to build a cement bridge over Cone Pond Brook near Fred Dolloff's and raise money for the same.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to buy a new Tractor and Snow Plow, and to raise money for the same.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to buy a new Road Machine and to raise money for the same.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to hold Old Home Day and to raise money for same.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to light the Main Street in West Thornton.
- 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.



SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Mrs. Chairman and Members of the School Board:

I hereby submit for your consideration my eleventh report of the Thornton schools.

The schools opened in September with the following teachers: Gladys S. Moore, West Thornton; Frances Braley, Center; Mary Long, Mad River and Isabelle Kimball, Lyford.

There was but one pupil in town last year who completed the work of the eighth grade, namely, John

D. Merrill.

Four transportation routes are maintained the same as last year, namely, one each to Mad River, Cen-

ter Thornton, West Thornton and Woodstock.

The health examination of the school children was made by Addie Bilodeau, R. N., Lincoln. There was no provision made for follow up work after the examination and for that reason most of the reports sent home were of but little value to the child. Some provision should be made for home visits by the nurse another year. Miss Bilodeau's report is appended.

Some new desks were put into the Center school house. Another year the old double desks at Mad

River should be changed.

Some of the school buildings need painting outside and inside. A woodshed is very much needed at West Thornton. The stove at the Center is about gone and should be replaced by a new one. The present one is quite unsafe.

Last year two pupils had a perfect school record: viz., Arlene Ames and Nellie C. Merrill. I wish we

might have more for this year.

This year, 1929-1930, there are fourteen pupils who are attending high school and six pupils attending

elementary schools outside of the district.

The school census, taken last September, showed 44 boys and 38 girls or a total of 82 children in town between the ages of 5 and 16. There were found not to be in school seven between 5 and 8; one between 8

and 14 (excused by the school board); one between 14

and 16 (completed the elementary course).

The teachers' register recorded the following data: 4 school visits by members of the school board, 219 by citizens, and 105 by the superintendent of schools. The total unrepeated registration was 59 and the per cent of attendance was 90.45. This is not as good as it ought to be but there is a slight gain over the previous year.

We sincerely hope that good health habits may be made a part of the home life of all the children, the seed for which is planted in the hygiene and health lessons in school. Good health is the first cardinal principle of education. May we all co-operate to put the

principle across as we live from day to day.
