To the voters and residents:

What a wonderful tradition — THE TOWN MEETING!

The Town report you are reading offers public servants the opportunity to “talk” to you concerning matters of importance to Barnstead and its residents.

The first thing we want to do is to say Thank You — thanks for your patience and confidence — thanks for cooperating — thanks for conforming to the Planning Ordinances of Barnstead and the State of New Hampshire — Thanks for your understanding when we seemed to be lacking in knowledge or answers to your questions. We’ve been learning too!

How very fortunate you are to have had the foresight to adopt the now existing ordinances! Barnstead is growing and because of your concern as citizens of our town, for its continual, but sensible growth, Barnstead remains a place to live and enjoy and be proud of.

Our activities for 1972 were mostly routine — 2 Public Hearings were held on matters of particular interest — namely — Goodrich property development — Locke airstrip. The routine actions at our monthly meetings (3rd Thursday each month — 7 p.m.) Numbered some 12 to 15 per month, so we usually had a full calendar.

We cordially invite anyone interested to attend our meetings — to ask questions, to present proposals or plans or just to observe. We welcome your suggestions — comments and especially your criticism, for it is by this method we learn and grow in knowledge.

To allow for more planning and less routine, the Planning Board recommends your favorable response to the Articles in the Warrant concerning our responsibilities — Namely Article creating the office of Building Inspector — and Article empowering the board to act for the community regarding Sub-Divisions.

We further recommend favorable action on the purchase of property offered to the town by Mr. Theodore Stocker. This property is not only a great opportunity for the town to have

recreational facilities for its residents, but is equally as important as an investment, conservation of valuable land is definitely an asset, not a liability.

As Chairman, may I take this opportunity to thank the members of the board for their attendance and co-operation.
May 1973 be a fruitful year for you all.

TOWN WARRANT

The polls will be open from 9:00 A.M. to 6:30 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the 6th day of March, next at 9:00 A.M. of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to buy land from Lewis Proctor on Halfmoon Lake to be used for a public bathing beach and give permission to the Conservation Committee to supervise the improvements needed. Said piece of property being approximately 1 acre with 200' on the lakeside, 257' on road, 175' on North end and 190' on south end.
4. To see if the Town will vote to start a retirement program for the permanent highway employees. The Town's share of money to come from the summer and winter accounts on a 50-50 basis.
5. To see if the Town will vote to buy new radios and receiver sets for the trucks and graders at the cost of approximately \$1,200.00.
6. To see if the Town will vote to let the Selectmen and the Road Agent trade the present Austin-Western Grader for a new grader of comparable size and value.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise, and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for the purpose of the Town becoming a member of the Central New Hampshire Home Care Services. This service is affiliated with the Lakes Region Council of Aging.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,155.00 for the purpose of adopting the New Hampshire Retirement System for the Town Highway Workers.

9. To see if the Town will vote to take action, and dispose of the two parcels of land described as Town property, and listed as follows:

1. The Emerson meadow adjacent to John Varney Tuttle lot.
2. A 4-acre meadow deed to the Town as the Otis Anderson property.

These two parcels of land are situated adjacent to the Locke Development Cooperation located in Center Barnstead, N.H.

10. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of Recreation.

11. To see if the Town will vote to expend money from the Capital Reserve Fund on Town owned land for the purpose of developing said land into recreation.

12. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee of five (5) members to serve without pay as a committee to promote the development of the land secured for recreation, or the Town owned land to be developed for recreation.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Revenue Sharing Program with the amount of revenue designated for this year, and leave the said amount as deposited in a special fund until next Town meeting, or any other action that the Town may choose to vote.

14. To see if the Town will vote to establish the office of Building Inspector for the purpose of assuring the Town that subdivisions, new building construction, and sewage systems meet local and State regulations as provided by law; and empower the Barnstead Planning Board in conjunction with the Board of Selectmen the authority to appoint or remove the Building Inspector; and authorize the Barnstead Planning Board in conjunction with the Board of Selectmen to set up standards and rules of the office such as establishing reasonable building permit fees to defray expenses that may occur in conducting inspections. The Building Inspector is to be the representative of the Planning Board and Board of Selectmen and is empowered to act in their behalf according to established Town code.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Town Planning Board to approve or disapprove new subdivisions and plats thereof, showing streets, or the widening thereof, or parks.

16. To see if the Town of Barnstead will give the Selectmen and the Planning Board the authority to restrict the number of housing units constructed within the Town so as to allow the Town to retain its rural setting. To minimize and control the impact on the environment, the increased costs of Town services, such as schools, road maintenance, fire and police protection, waste disposal and health services; thereby preventing an undue financial burden upon the inhabitants of the Town. (By Petition)

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF OSCAR FOSS MEMORIAL LIBRARY

Building on the solid achievements of past years, some new policies and goals have been determined in the Oscar Foss Memorial Library.

Part of the yearly budget is allocated for the education of library personnel in order to constantly update service. This year study has been made of the evaluation of children's books and both librarian and assistant have completed courses in reference work. Our reference collection compares favorably with that in many larger areas because of selective and experienced buying policies.

Our own book accumulation has been increased by three hundred in the current year. We have also been the grateful recipient of many gifts of books. A very impressive gift from Mrs. Robert Thomas of Wolfeboro is that of a late edition of the Encyclopedia Britannica complete with bookcase.

Mrs. Ellen Grau has always been concerned with the stimulation of the young mind and has now sponsored a Junior Friends of the Library group. This past year library aides have been trained in para-professional use of the library in which activity our late friend and trustee, Miss Hazel Clark, participated in setting up. As a group a collection was made of discarded eyeglasses and donated to the Eyes for Needy program; a film program presented, a treasury established by book and other sales; and assistance given to senior activities. Goals in sight are scholarships, arts and craft instruction and career exploration. A Little Theatre presentation was arranged by Mrs. Grau and Mrs. Johnson which was well received and another is planned. Art show and summer reading program was very successful.

Senior Friends of the Library have shared generously of their time and talents with the junior group. Also, as in the past, they have given splendid additions in equipment such as the Children's Corner furniture and vestibule rug.

State Library affiliation permits the enlargement of our services. Regular bookmobile visits supplement the collection; consultants are available for any problem on the professional level

and films are also available to assist us in servicing programs for school and other groups.

Librarians are maintaining a Clearinghouse Calendar in vestibule to invite townspeople to check dates on any activity and avoid duplication or confusion with other groups. We feel sure the use will grow.

There remain some critical problems in the near future. These are the need for inviting and comfortable reading area, safe and convenient access for the elderly and handicapped and urgent need for storage and work area.

**REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND DISTRICT CHIEF**

In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative State-town program. The Town Forest Fire Warden, appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's District Forest Fire Chief is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegal and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression.

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town except backyard cooking fires. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow must obtain a fire permit, free of cost, from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is raining, except for commercial purposes.

Please be careful when using fire, remember it can be an extremely useful tool when under control but once allowed to run wild it can become a disastrous and devastating force. Only you can prevent a forest fire.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE'S REPORT

George B. Roberts, Jr., House Majority Leader

As the 1973 session of the New Hampshire General Court gets underway, it will prove to be a busy schedule with many of the recommended bills being controversial. As of this date, it is anticipated that nearly 2000 bills and resolutions will be introduced and acted upon.

I start this session again being in the position of House Majority Leader and Chairman of the House Rules Committee as well as membership on the Committee of Interstate Cooperation. These assignments and many administrative duties connected with the House dictate that at least three days a week are spent in Concord from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Other special interim committee assignments also demand time of the two remaining days of the week. As I was re-elected Chairman of the Belknap County Delegation to preside over matters concerning county government, the next two years will perhaps be the busiest since I have been your state representative.

Belknap District 4 now includes the towns of Alton, Barnstead and Gilmanton and requests for special legislation and legislation specifically dealing with my district have multiplied.

As requested, I introduced House Bill 13 — an act prohibiting motorboats powered by fuel on Brindle Pond. As of this writing I have been informed by the committee that they will pass this legislation to become effective the beginning of the summer. This legislation was suggested at a right-of-way hearing at the Barnstead Town Hall and was supported by the Barnstead Town Conservation Commission.

As requested by the Town Meeting of 1971, I have introduced House Bill 9 — an act to provide for adoption of absentee voting in certain town, village district and school district annual elections. The bill is not mandatory but would allow such towns to adopt absentee voting because of absence from the town or because of physical disability. As of this writing House Bill 9 is still in the Statutory Revision Committee and I am hopeful of its passage but the committee is attempting to rewrite all New Hampshire Election Laws and I am hopeful that House Bill 9 will be incorporated in that change.

As in the past, I will continue being available to town officials and agencies to report to them about changes in state laws. As always, I will try to continue to be responsive to your comments and suggestions regarding state legislation and look forward to your opinions and suggestions. This year, with a more accurate mailing list of constituents, I will again be reporting to you and look forward to your response.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and the Citizens of the Barnstead School District, I respectfully submit my seventh annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The new elementary school has not only met the needs of the student body, but has proven its value to the community as a whole. Many adult and youth activities have been organized and the school's multi-purpose room is in use nearly every evening. The new addition has, as it should, enhanced the entire town of Barnstead.

There are still minor items to be completed in the construction of the addition. We are working with the general contractor, architect, and engineers in an attempt to complete these miscellaneous items. Final payments have not been made, thus assuring the completion of the project.

It now appears we will be receiving over \$9,000.00 from the State as aid in equipping the kitchen. This income, along with interest earned from investing the bond issue money, will make it possible to proceed with equipping the kitchen and the purchase of any other items needed for the addition. It is necessary, however, for the voters to approve the expenditure of these additional funds for the building program. The expenditure of these funds will have no effect upon the taxes in Barnstead.

The enrollment is increasing steadily, well beyond our expectations. The first day of school recorded a total of 185 students. This represented 17 new students (10% increase) over the previous year. The problem, however, is the continued increase during the school year. In January, 1973, a high of 204 students was reached. This represents 19 more students, or an additional 10% increase since September. These increases place an additional burden on the taxpayers because additional student furniture, textbooks, supplies, etc. are needed.

As more students enter the school system, it becomes more feasible to expand existing programs. An independent study was done reflecting the need and value of establishing a kindergarten. Other reports reflected the need for additional library services, physical education, and guidance for the elementary school student. Everything can not be achieved at once; nor is it expected

of the voters to move beyond their means. Progress, however, is important. The School Board has established the library as the immediate need. They also have supported the need to establish a kindergarten program.

Before closing I wish to take this opportunity on behalf of the School Board to publicly express appreciation to Henry Knirsch for the many years of fine service he provided the Barnstead School District with his school buses. I want to also express sincere appreciation to the parents, businessmen, citizens, and especially the members of the School Board for their continued understanding and interest in the educational program of Barnstead and her youth.

REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and the citizens of the Barnstead School District, I respectfully submit my first Annual Report as Assistant Superintendent of Schools.

I have selected the following areas to report on: (1) Recruiting Procedures, (2) New Staff Members for 1972-73, (3) Length of Service of the Teaching Staff, (4) Title I Elementary and Secondary Education Act, and (5) Minimum Standards and Recommendations for New Hampshire Public Elementary Schools.

It is commonly known that there is a greater supply of candidates for teaching positions today than in recent years. It is not as commonly known, however, that the over supply of teachers is heavily concentrated in the areas of English, Social Studies, Biology, and Physical Education. There is still a need for qualified candidates in the areas of Special Education, Speech Therapy, and all areas of Jr. High. It is for this reason that we maintain a full recruitment schedule with colleges and universities in an attempt to find the best available teachers for Barnstead.

This past year I was involved in the recruitment of a total of 44 teachers for School Union #49. Three of these teachers were recruited for Barnstead. We are pleased with the progress that our new staff members have made this year.

As a result of having to fill this large number of positions, I did a survey on the median length of teacher service in each school district in Supervisory Union #49 and found that for Barnstead the median length of service, as of September, was two years. If progress in the area of curriculum development is to keep pace with recent improvements in facilities, we should make a strong effort to retain teachers in Barnstead for longer periods of service.

This year a Title I Teacher Aide Project was applied for and approved for Barnstead. This project also included funds for the purchase of a tape recorder, headsets, and tapes to be used in the teaching of reading. The primary grade children have benefited from the extra help from the aide and the use of the new equipment.

Last June we were required to submit a Minimum Elementary School Standards Report to the State Department of Education. This report identified those areas of Barnstead's School Programs that do not presently meet the state standards. The areas of deficiency are: Physical Education, Special Education, Guidance Services, and Library Services. We have until July 1, 1975 to develop and implement acceptable programs in these areas. Library services have been identified by the Administration and School Board as being the first priority item and this year's budget calls for an increased expenditure for library books in an attempt to comply with the standards.

It has been my pleasure to enjoy support and cooperation from the Barnstead School Board, individually, as well as collectively, Superintendent Russell, Principal Check, and the school faculty. It is through cooperative efforts that we are successful in improving the educational opportunities for Barnstead youngsters.

BARNSTEAD ELEMENTARY SCHOOL**Center Barnstead, N.H.**

To the School Board, the Superintendent of Schools and the Citizens of Barnstead, it is with great pleasure that I submit this, my third annual report as Principal of the Barnstead Elementary School.

The 1971-72 school year was completed with the graduation of 26 eighth graders to Pittsfield High School and Austin Cate Academy. We also observed the nearing of completion of our fine new addition. Good news was received when we were informed that the Barnstead Elementary School had received a \$2,000.00 ESEA, Title II grant for its new library. Books and audio visual materials were ordered with the grant.

The 1972-73 school year is under way and we are fortunate in having the majority of the staff returning. Filling the vacancies are Margaret Woodward, grade one; Linda MacKnight, sixth, seventh and eighth grade English; and Samuel Bruno, sixth, seventh and eighth grade Social Studies. The staff is completed with Karin Lavin, teacher aide; Paul Andy and David Gregoire, custodians. The teacher aide position was made available this year because of an ESEA, Title I grant.

The students have been using the new addition since the opening of school in September. The sixth, seventh and eighth grades have been departmentalized and are the primary users of the new classrooms. The entire student body uses both the multi-purpose room and the library frequently. The library is staffed by a corp of volunteers which allows us to keep the library in operation for almost the entire school day. It is most encouraging to see this cooperation from the townspeople and the utilization of the facility by the students.

A new science program was implemented in September after a comprehensive study by a committee of Supervisory Union teachers. This year the language arts is being studied as part of a continuing effort to provide the students with the most up-to-date curriculum materials.

During November, 1972, the total enrollment reached a high of 194. This is a very large increase over previous years. To meet the needs of this growing student enrollment, there are three basic needs. These needs are a teacher aide to be utilized by all teachers, a library aide to give continuity to our library program and a part time Physical Education teacher to be used by all grade levels.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Superintendent of Schools, the members of the School Board, the citizens of Barnstead and my fellow teachers for their support and cooperation.
