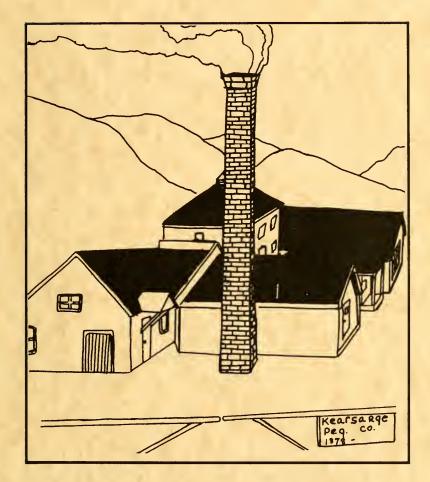

### **TOWN WARRANT**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday the eighth day of March 1983 at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 will be by official ballot and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before six o'clock in the evening. The remaining articles of the warrant shall be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum not exceeding in the aggregate \$400,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable notes therefor, said to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Bartlett.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote in favor of authorizing the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of property taxes and resident taxes prior to issuance of the Tax Warrant, such payments not to be received before April 1st of any given year, in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 80:52a.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,200.00 for the purchase of a new highway sander and authorize the removal of \$7,200.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund as payment for said sander.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,600.00 for the purchase of a new police cruiser and authorize the removal of \$11,600.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund as payment for said police cruiser.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the voters of the Town will authorize the sum of \$8,000.00 (eight thousand dollars) for the purchase of large diameter water supply hose and related accessories for the Fire Department. Agreeable to petition signed by Robert A. Grant and others.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the voters of the Town will authorize the sum of \$2,400.00 (two thousand four hundred) to be combined with funds from the Town of Jackson for the purpose of purchasing a stand-by power source for the Tyrol Fire Frequency Radio Tower. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert A. Grant and others.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay partial costs of constructing a fence at the ballfield. The recreation budget has been reduced by this amount and a matching grant applied for from the New Hampshire Recreation Department.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will authorize the removal of \$5,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund to use toward equipment purchases of the police, fire, and highway departments.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) in support of the North Country Senior Meals Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jennie Mahany (age 94) and others.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 for administrative expenses for the Gibson Center for Senior Services, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard Barrows and others.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$832.00 for the support of the Children and Youth Project of Mt. Washington Valley (C & Y). Agreeable to a petition signed by Susan Gaudette and others.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,700.00 for the 1983 Capital Budget of the Memorial Hospital, North Conway, New Hampshire. Ageeable to petition signed by Peter Fresco and others.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for support of the Community Action Outreach Program. Agreeable to petition signed by Walter Smith and others. ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,532.80 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County Inc. said sum being equal to \$1.60 per person in the Town of Bartlett. Agreeable to petition signed by Ruth Ann Fabrizio and others.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) in support of the Mount Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce. Agreeable to a petition signed by Peter Fresco and others.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will contribute the sum of \$150.00 to assist the Northern Carroll County Family Planning Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Nancy J. Hodgkins and others.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for Carroll County Mental Health Service, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by William D. Paine and others.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,745.75 which will enable the Town to hire a third full time police officer. Said money to cover the period from May 1 to December 31 of the first year's employment. Submitted by the Selectmen at the request of the Chief of Police.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Permit Ordinance as follows: Any persons, firms, corporations, etc., intending to build, construct, or modify any structure or taxable real estate in the Town of Bartlett must apply to the Selectmen for and receive a building permit before said work shall commence if the taxable value of said work exceeds \$500.00. Routine maintenance and repair items are not covered by this ordinance. The Selectmen shall have the right to refuse such permit to anyone who shall fail to comply with the applicable State Statutes or fail to furnish evidence of compliance with said State Statutes. The fine for violation of the Building Permit Ordinance shall be \$100.00 plus \$10.00 for every day of violation.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept approximately 500 feet of road in the development of Saco Ridge Village, a subdivision located off the West Side Road in Bartlett, subject to specification approval by the Selectmen of Bartlett. Said roadway being a continuation of Highland Road, so called, previously accepted by the Town and approved by the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Caroline Middleton and others.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following described road as a town road for the Town of Bartlett: The Meadows Road, so called, running Northerly 650 feet from the West Side Road to a turnaround, said right-of-way being 66 feet in width and being more particularly bounded and described on a certain map entitled "The Meadows" being land of George Seemann, drawn by H. Edmund Bergeron. The acceptance of said road to be upon compliance by the developer with the road requirements of the Town of Bartlett and upon the vote to accept by the Selectmen of the Town of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by John A. Roden and others.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from Canal National Bank for Two cul-de-sacs 50 feet in width more or less as shown on a plan entitled "Mountain View Section, Linderhof Resort", dated April, 1974, prepared by J.R. Blais and recorded at Carroll County Registry of Deeds Plan Book 27, Page 42. Such cul-de-sacs are extensions of Main Loop Road and provide access for lots numbered 213-224 and lots numbered 195-201 on said recorded plan. Acceptance of this deed is contingent upon construction of roads to standards established by the Town and satisfactory to the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Miriam Regan and others.

ARTICLE 27. Shall the citizens of Bartlett ask members of the New Hampshire Congressional delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the U.S. Congress to: Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and the Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production, and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons, with verification safeguards satisfactory to both countries. Agreeable to a petition signed by David Armington and others.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Bartlett and to the health and welfare of the people of Bartlett. These actions shall include: 1) Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990; 2) Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal. The record of the vote of this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States Agreeable to a petition signed by Gail F. Paine and others.

### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Once again it is Town Meeting time and time for the annual Selectmen's Report.

As usual 1982 presented a fair amount of problems. The largest and most complex being the dump issue. Having completed three years at the present site it was time to renegotiate Mr. Garland's contract. Since the Selectmen and Mr. Garland were considerably far apart during the initial negotiations, we decided to appoint a committee to help study the issue and make a recommendation. The members of the committee included Arnold Bennett, John Peterman, Bob Holmes, Ed Pettingill, and Allen Eastman. These men spent a considerable number of hours during a two week period studying the problem and submitted their report to the Selectmen recommending a payment of \$45,000.00 per year for the dump contract. After intense negotiations, a figure of \$4,100.00 per month plus a yearly CPI increase was agreed upon by both parties and a seven year contract extension was signed by Mr. Garland and the Town. The Selectmen found two other viable sites and received cost estimates from both owners, one for \$42,000,00 per year and one for \$50,000.00 per year. After State inspections of both sites, the Town was told they could expect to pay between \$25,000 - \$30,000 start up costs at either site. With these costs in mind, the Selectmen felt it in the best interest of the Town to stay at the present location. Unfortunately, it is going to cost considerably more than in past years but we are in the somewhat enviable position of hopefully having the problem solved for at least the next seven years.

Cable TV installation went pretty much according to plan with a few setbacks in some areas, most notably the Glen Ledge area. The problem in some spots were hold-ups by phone, light and cable companies whenever lines needed to be strung to secondary poles before going into the home. By Town Meeting time most of these problems should have been overcome. Unfortunately, not all homes in Town can be served and this is a problem that the Selectmen and State Cable have discussed and will discuss more in the future.

During 1982 we followed through with the appointment of a single chief, Robert L. Jones, for the Town Fire Department. Now the emphasis is on standardized training, consolidation of equipment and equipment purchases to obtain the most for our dollar.

It is probably not well known that each year the Town attempts to establish a dry hydrant system. Six inch piping with a hook-up device and strainer and a consistent source of water (usually a well established pond, whether articifial or natural) make up the system. Accessibility by a fire truck is a must. The system when installed and working permits the Fire Dept. more flexibility and radius of actions. Four inch hose can be attached to the dry hydrant hook-up and with pressure applied acts as an ancillary water system or as a temporary water system. This method of water delivery is desirable due to its gallons per minute delivery capacity. However, we do have both capabilities. Some dry hydrant locations completed are the House of Color Pond, Glen; Kittredge Pond, Jericho Rd.; Linderhof Pond, Glen; and McGee Pond, Bartlett Village.

The Tax Map is finally complete and property owners are urged to come in and view the completed map. There are always inherent problems with an undertaking of this magnitude and your input can be beneficial.

A highlight of 1982 was the purchase of an ambulance and the formation of an ambulance squad along with the Town of Jackson. With the usual amount of first year kinks, everything went smoothly and a much needed service is being provided at a more reasonable cost than we were facing had we joined the Conway service. The ambulance exercise is a perfect example of how two towns can work together in providing good service and also save taxpayer dollars.

In spite of difficult times, the financial condition of the Town remains good. Despite revenue shortfalls, a small budget overrun, and continuing efforts to keep the tax rate down, our surplus remains at a relatively modest level. We will attempt to increase the surplus to a more comfortable level over the next few years. On the plus side, the level of our capital reserve funds remains high and continues to grow. As of December 1982, we have slightly over \$127,000.00 in these reserve funds. If spending can be kept under control over the next few years, we will be recommending additions to these funds as a hedge against future large expenditures. Also, since it is now legal for towns to use NOW accounts, we should be taking advantage of potential interest earnings from this source.

In summary, your Selectmen are concerned; concerned about the pressures of inflation on the Town's Budget and tax rate; concerned about the State's fiscal problems and the degree to which all N.H. towns will be required to participate in the solution; and concerned about the problems with the national economy from which N.H. is no longer insulated. The old bromide "hold that line" no longer refers to football but to the expenditures of public funds. All public officials responsible for the expenditures of tax dollars can and must work together to "hold that line". Yes, your Selectmen are concerned but more importantly, we are optimistic that the Town will weather the current national economic storm and that Bartlett will continue to be one of the finest places in the world to call home and one of the most affordable.

## BARTLETT PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT

The Bartlett Public Library circulated 7,621 books and magazines during 1982. Three hundred eighty six books were added to its collection. Diamond International Company donated several books on carpentry, cabinet making, renovating and etc.

Story hours were held for pre-schoolers every Friday morning at 10:30 during the school year. These story hours included filmstrips, movies and simple activities.

At the fall meeting the trustees voted to increase its board from three to six members. The three new members will be added this year to serve terms from one to three years. Thereafter two members will be voted upon each year to serve a term of three years.

Recognizing there is little written or taped history of Bartlett the trustees have undertaken the project of organizing a group interested in gathering and recording this history. It is felt that committees should be formed to research special areas — schools, railroad, hotels and inns, local businesses, etc. The library is purchasing books which will give instruction on interviewing and taping oral history. Much of Bartlett's early history lies hidden in attics, closets, the town vaults and in the memories of many of its residents. Early photographs, diaries, town records and newspaper clippings need to be gathered and reproduced.

Bartlett's bi-centennial will be in 1990. What would be more fitting than to have its local history recorded in written and taped form by then. If interested in participating in this project, contact one of the trustees or call the library, 374-2755.

## BARTLETT-JACKSON AMBULANCE SERVICE

We have had a very busy first year of operation. The service made 106 emergency calls since the first one on April 23rd, 1982 to the time this report was turned in on the 26th of January, 1983. We responded to almost every type of medical emergency possible.

I am proud of the members of the Ambulance Service; each member is working very hard to maintain a standard of care and six are going through the Emergency Medical Technician course which is being given at the Memorial Hospital this spring. Upon completion of this course, we will have eleven of our fourteen members Nationally Registered Emergency Medical Technicians; not many squads can boast such numbers. We have two who are trained in forms of advanced life support; and, as the area's Emergency Medical Service Training Program allows, we will send more members through advanced training in order to provide the best emergency medical service possible for the taxpayers of Bartlett and Jackson.

I am happy to report that we are going to keep our budget the same as last year's amount. We do not have to replace or upgrade our equipment as other departments must; most of our equipment will last for years. I feel the type of ambulance that was purchased is a fine piece of equipment that is very well taken care of and has been trouble free from the day it was delivered.

I hope 1983 will be a healthy and prosperous year for everyone. I would also like to thank each and every one who has been so giving and supportive during this first year for the Ambulance Squad.

## REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDENS AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the N.H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/towns and our entire citizenry can this record be maintained.

We continued to strengthen already existing programs from the previous year. Highlighting our activities was the interest shown in men's and women's softball. Our ball field was in constant use through summer and fall and with the construction of lights provided good leisure time activities for all. The maintenance of the field, which was in excellent condition throughout the season gave it a reputation of the best in the valley.

Upwards of eighty youngsters participated in Little League, and Babe Ruth baseball with our Junior Little League team (Pee Wee) having an exceptionally good turnout.

Women's exercise classes, high school and adult basketball highlighted the winter activities.

Our summer recreation program provided exciting activities and field trips for students attending the Bartlett Summer School Reading Program.

We were able to raise over \$500.00 during Volvo Tennis with the clean-up contract.

For all of our sponsored activities we were able to stay within our \$3,500.00 per year budget. We have to expand our services to the community and ask your assistance in making recreation work in the Bartlett community.

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS AND HIGHWAYS

State Highway Aid is available to Bartlett during 1983 in these categories:

TOWN ROAD AID, APPORTIONMENT A FUNDS

Chapter 241, Section 2 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, provides for Class IV and V Construction Reconstruction or Betterment Aid.

If aid is desired under Apportionment A, the town must raise \$829.20 and the State will contribute \$5,528.02.

#### HIGHWAY SUBSIDY

Chapter 241, Section 14 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, provides a highway subsidy for maintenance, construction and reconstruction of Class IV and V highways in towns and cities.

Your highway subsidy for 1983 is estimated to be \$11,568.91.

ADDITIONAL HIGHWAY SUBSIDY

Chapter 241, Section 15 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, provides an additional highway subsidy which shall be used only for construction or reconstruction of Class IV and V highways and shall be used to increase the highway appropriation of the municipality as of 1977.

Your additional highway subsidy for 1983 is estimated to be \$7,459.14.

Highway subsidy payments are made quarterly in January, April, July and October. Accurate records of expenditures must be maintained. Audited reports will be required on a yearly basis, Jan. 1 to Dec. 31, and intermediate reports may also be necessary.

NOTE: All of these figures are subject to the approval of the 1983 Legislature.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Polls opened at 10:00 AM to 6:00 PM.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Motion by William Paine and seconded by Marilyn Cook to accept budget of \$399,072.00. Explanation of each item by F. T. Hodgkins. Motion by R. Gregory, seconded by J. Howard to amend budget to \$399,372.00 for \$300.00 for airport at Fryeburg, Maine. Passed. Discussion ensued regards cleaning up the old Bartlett landfill site, Selectmen's salary increase, and ambulance costs to possibly be lower. Budget of \$399,372.00 voted on and passed unanimously.

Article 3. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum not exceeding in the aggregate \$350,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable notes therefor, said to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the current year from taxes collected within the current municipal year. Motion by John Murphy, seconded by William Paine. Accepted by unanimous vote.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction. Motion to accept by Robert Gregory, seconded by F. T. Hodgkins. Accepted by unanimous vote.

Article 5. To see if the Town wishes to authorize the Selectmen to install a program of semi-annual tax billing. Motion to accept by James Chadbourne, seconded by Evelyn Rivers. Discussion ensued regards advantages and disadvantages. Mr. Raymond Schoen posed the question regards the investments and interests gained by the Town. Mr. Chadbourne responded that interest gained from short term investing does not amount to that much but that the Selectmen would look into more profitable investments. Vote was taken and article was defeated.

Article 7. To see if the Town votes to raise and appropriate the sum of \$32,000.00 for the purchase of a new four wheel drive diesel truck and authorize the removal of \$25,000,00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund as partial payment of said truck. Motion to accept by Gene Chandler, seconded by James Howard. Gene Chandler made a motion to amend the article to \$37,500.00 because the original truck to be traded in had to have the engine replaced and the Selectmen did not feel it would be wise to trade it at this time. Instead, the one ton truck would be traded in but this would create a greater difference in price that would have to be made up. Much discussion ensued regards the usefulness of the one ton truck without trading. A vote was taken to the amendment - 38 in favor to accept and 46 opposed (hand count). William Paine made a motion for an amendment to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$40,000.00 for the purchase of a diesel truck and to retain the one ton truck. Robert Gregory seconded. More discussion ensued. A vote was taken on the amendment and it was passed. A vote was then taken on the article and it was passed.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$10,200.00 for the purchase of a new police cruiser. Motion to accept by Marilyn Cook, seconded by Richard Patch. Mr. Robert Gregory made a motion to amend the article to require the purchase of an American made car no matter what the cost difference. Seconded by Forrest Simmons. Much discussion ensued regards the advantage and disadvantages of American vs. Foreign made cars. Vote taken and amendment was defeated. Vote taken on the original article and it was passed.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600.00 to hire a summer recreation director from June to

August. The Director will manage activities and field trips throughout the summer in conjunction with the presently ongoing summer program at the Bartlett School. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph Rivers and others. Motion to accept by Benson Howard, seconded by John Brandt. Joseph Rivers spoke for the article. Vote taken and article accepted.

Article 10. To see if the Town favors permitting the Town of Jackson to use the existing landfill; subject to terms and conditions to be negotiated by the Selectmen. Motion to accept by James Chadbourne, seconded by F. T. Hodgkins. Mr. Richard Patch stated that he was a little disappointed with Jackson the last time we were working with them on the dump situation in that they backed out at the last minute. TOWN OF BARTLETT OFFICIALS CLOSELY MONITOR COMPLI-ANCE WITH THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCES, REGULATIONS, AND BY - LAWS:

BUILDING PERMIT ORDINANCE: required for construction valued at \$1,000 or more. Violation = fine of \$10.00/day from beginning of construction.

WINTER PARKING ORDINANCE: prohibits parking on Town streets between Nov. 1 and May 1. Violation = fine of \$50.00 plus towing charges.

SNOWPLOWING REGULATION: no snow shall be plowed into or across any Town road.

ILLEGAL DUMPING ORDINANCE: prohibits dumping and littering at other than in authorized area at landfill. Violation = fine of \$100.00. STUMP DUMP REGULATIONS: prohibits dumping garbage and outlining contractor responsibility for materials dumped at the site.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE ORDINANCE: prohibits drinking of alcoholic beverages in public places. Violation - fine of \$25.00.

TEST PIT INSPECTION ORDINANCE: requires inspection of pits prior to application for state septic design approval.

EXCAVATION PERMIT REGULATION: permit required to excavate in Town road. Permit must be obtained 24 hours prior to commencement. Violation = fine of \$100.00.

DOG LEASH BY - LAW: requires that all dogs be restrained by leash or under direct control of owner. Violation - fine of 10.00 + board reimbursement.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

by Robert B. Kautz and David Stickney

The districts of School Administrative Unit No. 9 have seen a great deal of activity on the part of the staff of their local schools and the SAU office in activities which have led to the continued provision of quality education. The recently completed evaluation of elementary schools, which was combined with the State Department of Education's review of how well the schools met minimum standards, gives the citizens of SAU #9, as well as the staff, a great deal to be proud of in terms of the education it affords the children who live here. The support that the community has provided the schools and the teaching staff is greatly appreciated and has helped facilitate quality education in School Administrative Unit No. 9.

The staff of the individual schools of SAU #9 have begun to implement, for all grade levels, a drug and alcohol abuse program. This program has been developed in response to a growing national as well as local need to provide children with the skills to make proper decisions regarding the use of alcohol and drugs. The program is being developed in conjunction with the alcohol and drug abuse section of the New Hampshire State Department of Education. It is hoped that the community is aware of the seriousness of this problem, and we encourage you to accept your responsibility in dealing with this issue. It is through school and community cooperation that we will be able to provide a healthy environment for our children.

Computers, it seems, affect every phase of our daily life. It is currently estimated that 85% of all employment has some contact with a computer. To meet this challenge microcomputers are being purchased for our schools. At the elementary level children are learning about the use, history, and resources of the computer as well as being assisted in their classroom instruction by computer programs. On the secondary level a computer programming course has been instituted. The continued development of computer curriculums and use of the computers will prepare the youngsters to not only be computer literate but also give them the skills to compete in the world they face upon graduation.

Activity continues on the goals established by the SAU #9 school boards in the spring of 1981. Specifically, a computer curriculum for grades K-8 will be implemented this spring to improve the math curriculum. Teachers will continue to stress improvement in the curriculum area of writing. Also, the principals and teaching staff in conjunction with our office will be working together to develop a plan for monitoring each individual child's academic progress for the major curriculum areas. The realization of these goals has been accomplished after many staff hours of planning, attending workshops, and training.

The purchase of diesel buses has proven to be a major cost saving undertaking. Many of the districts will realize a substantial savings in fuel costs. Another cost saving project which has been undertaken during the past year was the modification of school buildings to improve their energy efficiency. The insulating of windows and changing of lighting to more energy efficient types were but two of the projects which will result in lower energy costs to the school districts. The concept of providing a quality education at a fair and realistic cost is a goal that is being achieved and will continue to be a goal. In closing, I, as Superintendent, wish to thank all my fellow educators, citizens, and students for the courtesies, considerations and cooperation extended to me in the school districts that I have represented since July of 1976. It has been a pleasure to have served you all and to have had the opportunity to work along side such a number of professionals that I deeply admire and respect.

Our goal has been to constantly improve the educational opportunities for all of our children, and through a lot of hard work and cooperation this has been occurring. It is my hope that everyone within all of our communities will work together and accept their individual and collective responsibilities to make this beautiful valley a fine, wholesome place to live and work. It is my hope that parents will reawaken in themselves and their children the true spirit of family and become acutely aware and concerned with what their children are doing in their personal lives as well as in their educational program. It is my hope that persons will work to contribute to the community, both as elected officials as well as supporters of community activities in order that life for all becomes better. Let everyone work from a positive aspect, and with this, much will be achieved.

Our children are a valuable resource. Our schools are striving to improve themselves and, therefore, improve the education for children. We need the cooperation and concern of the community together with the schools in order to assure a brighter and more secure future for everyone. It is my hope that I have contributed to that and that this effort shall continue to grow and prosper. Thank you sincerely for having had the opportunity to serve the communities of School Administrative Unit No. 9.

### SPECIAL EDUCATION DIRECTOR'S AND TITLE I COORDINATOR'S REPORT

It is the purpose of the State of New Hampshire to insure that the State Board of Education and the local school districts of this State provide a free and appropriate public education for all children. Included in this is the education of all handicapped children. Special education means instruction specifically designed to meet the unique needs of the educationally handicapped student. This instruction is team designed; is delivered in a variety of settings; and services the youngsters in our community ages 3-21 years of age no matter what the diversity of need.

Tremendous support was given in the SAU #9 communities concerning federal changes in the special education law. The sensitivity and caring for the well-being of others was demonstrated; and parents, teachers, and friends addressed the continued need for special education to the legislature.

One of the largest areas of growth has been the efforts in the early childhood area. To ensure early intervention, monthly diagnostic pre-school screening programs have been developed. A team of individuals skilled in a variety of disciplines observe, assess, and prescribe a plan to help these youngsters. Three center-based programs have been implemented in the locations of Tamworth, Conway and Bartlett. Home-based support services and inter-agency communications have all been strengthened. This will develop a cooperative effort in addressing the needs of our children and provide them with the support they need as early as possible. The major benefit of this program is prevention of learning problems.

At the elementary schools, programs vary from consultation and program modification in the regular classroom structure to the varied amounts of resource room specialized programming. We are attempting, to the best of our ability, to make sure that the program fits the child's needs rather than the child fit the existing program.

The goal for the entire special education department this year has been to bridge the gap between regular education and special education. If children learn best from modeling their peers, then the least restrictive environment, the mainstreamed classroom, offers an appropriate learning experience for students. Whenever possible, children receive the expertise of both special and regular educators.

Staff development is an ongoing process in special education. Special education teachers are constantly pursuing results from current research studies on working with both the handicapped and children with minimal learning deficits. This is highly commendable and ensures that these specialized programs for children constantly improve rather than maintaining the same.

Parents, as the first and primary teachers of their children, play a significant role in the success of any school program. Their involvement in special education is twice as valuable.

Title I serves approximately 200 children in grades 1-8 in SAU #9 who need extra help in reading skills. With the Federal funds granted to SAU #9 schools, specialists and trained tutors are hired for each of the elementary schools and the junior high school to write and implement educational plans for remediation of reading difficulties. Emphasis is on supplementing basic reading skills while creating a positive attitude of confidence in students.

When a decision has been made that a child needs Title I services, the Title I staff will receive permission from the parent to test and work with the child. Staff members confer with the classroom teachers and individualize instruction. Title I activities enrich and supplement, but do not take the place of, classroom reading. Students work at their own pace on materials geared to their own diagnosed needs and abilities.

In conclusion, it is with much pleasure that I share with you our efforts in special education and Title I. It is because of parents, teachers, students, board members, and the community - working, supporting and trusting one another that has resulted in quality special education programs for handicapped children and Title I support programs in our schools.

### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

by L. Joseph Rivers

In my last report of 1981 I spoke of our efforts to take full advantage of our new facility by implementing new programs and to restrengthen existing successful programs. In summarizing the 1981-82 school year we feel we accomplished many of our objectives for total school improvement.

An elementary school evaluation team evaluated our entire school operations in addition to the State Department of Education's visit to determine as to whether we meet state minimum standards. We meet all of the minimum standards with the exception of guidance services which will be implemented in the 1983-84 school year.

Our CTBS testing results showed a decisive increase in our overall scores in relation to the national average. Each grade composite showed our students to be above the national average of those taking the CTBS. We will be initiating accountability testing in grades 4 thru 8 this school year.

We believe that our graduates are well prepared for entrance into the Kennett High School program. Of our thirty eighth grade graduates, twenty eight students successfully passed the Kennett High Math Placement Exam. Thirty percent of our students made the honor roll at Kennett, and five of six senior class offices are held by Bartlett School graduates.

New programs initiated during the 1982 school year were practical arts for grades 6 thru 8, computer literacy for all grades, a comprehensive spelling program for grades 7 and 8 which is an extension of our elementary school spelling program. We have established a school volunteer program, and eight parents have been active in various aspects of our academic program in the elementary section. The re-organization of our primary, intermediate and junior high classes into units of instruction has provided us with a well-defined, cooperative effort in program planning.

The end of the school year featured the science fair with ninety-nine exhibits presented by students in grades 6 thru 8. The fair was attended by over two hundred parents and friends and was an outstanding success and will be continued as an annual fair. Our 8th grade students also presented at that time their Career Education exhibits as a part of their English program requirements.

Eighth grade graduation awards were presented at the third annual graduation exercises held at Christmas Farm Inn. Awards were presented to the following students: George Mulvey Award for Outstanding School Leadership, Allyson Schoen; Highest Academic Achievement (by the Bartlett School Board), Lucy Filip; Most Improved Student (by the Bartlett School Staff), Todd Anthony; Boy/Girl Athlete of the Year (by the Bartlett Athletic and Recreation Association), Jeff Hayes and Ellen Paine; and The Drama Club Award, Lynn Bourassa. Because of the popularity of the graduation ceremony, the program will be held this year at the school auditorium. In September of 1982 our entire staff returned which gave us the opportunity to continue, in a consistent manner, to focus on educational improvements. Our computer literacy program is under way and in keeping with the national trend of integrating computers into the mainstream of education. The phenomenal attraction with which computers are motivating students is stimulating to us, and we will have four computers operating for all grades before the end of 1983. A computer science curriculum is presently being investigated.

A drug and alcohol awareness and prevention program for grades 1-8 will be implemented during this school year.

It is important to mention, which I believe is a tribute to both parents and staff, that over this past school year there has been a zero expense in terms of school vandalism or destruction of school property. It has been gratifying to observe the healthy attitude and respect that our students have for their school facility and school property.

Finally, our budget preparation this year is a realistic and economically concerned preparation. Our educationally budgeted areas are considerably less than previous years, but in no way hinders our academic program. The taxpayers of the community, during my tenure here, always have been supportive of our school; and we intend to spend our funds appropriately to provide the best of educational programs.
