### The State of New Hampshire

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 12:00 NOON TO 7:00 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bradford in the County of Merrimack in said State qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bradford on Tuesday the fourteenth of March, next at twelve o'clock noon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officials for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. To adjourn the meeting until Wednesday, March fifteenth, at 7:00 o'clock in the evening; the raising of money and other articles in the warrant to be taken up at adjourned meeting.

3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to approve the establishment of a Conservation Commission Trust Fund to act as custodian of unused funds as provided in RSA 36:5.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for and accept any Federal funds under Title 1 Local Public Works Capital Development and Investment Act of 1976 if such are available.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, and accept aid for Federal Disaster Funds in the event it is needed.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for and accept Federal Anti-recession Funds under Title II (assistance to state and local governments) in the event such funds are available.

8. To see if the Town will vote to accept any moneys received for the establishment of Trust Funds received during the year since the last annual Town meeting. (Listed in Detailed Statements of Payments in the Town Report.)

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Parks and Recreation Commission to oversee the public use lands of the Town. No funds are involved.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred twenty-five dollars from the estate of William S. Wells, to be held in trust, the income therefrom to be used for the perpetual care of lot #4 in the Pond Cemetery.

11. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the new provisions of RSA 72:43-c relative to expanded exemptions on real estate for the elderly, changing the eligibility requirement that a person may own no more than \$35,000.00 in assets of any kind to a requirement that a person may own no more than \$50,000.00 in assets of any kind. If passed, the change takes effect on April **1st** next following the referendum. If **not** passed, the asset limitation in effect before the referendum remains in effect.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept Polka's road off Pleasant View Road. The road is 321.8 feet long

and 50 feet wide. The road construction is 2 feet of gravel over a gravel base with ditches on both sides crowned for drainage. The road leads to a new approved development entirely in Newbury. The portion of the road in Bradford will not be accepted until the portion in Newbury is accepted by Newbury. Winter and summer maintenance will be done by the Town of Newbury.

13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$200.00 for the repair of the driveway to the Fire House, the funds to be transferred from Revenue Sharing funds. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 to replace the roof of Brown Memorial Library and authorize withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from Revenue Sharing funds. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to create office space for the Town Clerk, Town Tax Collector and Town Treasurer in the Town Hall, and authorize withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from Revenue Sharing funds. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 for a new police cruiser, and authorize the withdrawal of this sum from Revenue Sharing funds. The old cruiser to be sold and the money to be deposited in the General Fund. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 for a School Crossing Guard at the intersection of Route #114 and Main Street. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 for adequate policing by a police officer of the Town's picnic area at French's Park. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 as half of the expense for restoring the well near French's Park. The Lake Massasecum Association to assume equal payment of \$250.00. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for a dye-testing of lakeside cottage septic systems at Lake Massasecum. This is to be a one-time expenditure. (Recommended by the Budget Committee, the Conservation Commission and Planning Board.)

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing equipment: the purpose of said equipment subject to a vote of the Town. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,304.61 for the continuation of services to the Town through the Kearsarge Valley Area Center of the Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for Civil Defense. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the American Red Cross. (Submitted withouth recommendation.)

25. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$13,264.38 from the State Highway Subsidy Fund, for work on Town roads. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

26. To see if the Town will vote to accept a state subsidy of \$3,983.34 for the maintenance of Class V highways in Town (Duncan Fund). (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,024.90 for Town Road Aid (TRA) and to accept the sum of \$6,832.63 from the state in matching funds. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

28. To see if the Town will vote to accept an estimated additional State Highway subsidy of \$7,478.11 for the improvement and construction of Class IV or V highways. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$19,700 for a new tractor to be equipped with a bucket, backhoe, mower and winterized cab. The old Ford tractor and mower to be traded in at \$2,000.00, thus a net of \$19,700.00. \$10,000.00 to be used from Revenue Sharing funds, \$3,700.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund, \$4,000.00 to be raised in two serial notes payable in two years, and \$2,000.00 to be raised by taxation this year. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$21,500.00 for a new truck of 32,000 GVW with extra heavy front springs, 6- to 8-yard dump body and a plow. \$13,500.00 to be used from Revenue Sharing Funds, \$5,000.00 to be raised in serial notes payable in two years, and the balance to be raised by taxation this year. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 to add a fourth full-time employee to the Highway Department. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of up to \$50,000.00 as its share of the reconstruction of the Water Street Bridge over the West Branch River. Matching funds of up to \$50,000.00 in State Bridge Aid will be available on July 1, 1978, construction to be done in 1980. (Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.)

#### OR

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$33,300.00 for the repair of the Water Street Bridge, \$3,300.00 to be raised by taxation and \$30,000.00 to be raised by serial notes payable in five years. Construction in 1978. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

33. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to require building permits for new construction and exterior alterations resulting in dimensional change. Fee to be \$5.00 for permit and a fine of \$25.00 for non-compliance.

34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,273.00 for garbage disposal including establishment of a transfer station, rental of such station and trucking to a disposal area from May 15, 1978, to December 31, 1978. The entire cost to come from Revenue Sharing funds. (Recommended by the Dump Study Committee and Budget Committee.)

35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,445.00 for the phasing out of the old dump, regrading, covering and seeding of the site as required by the New Hampshire Department of Health and Welfare, Division of Air Pollution, and the construction of a concrete pad and a ramp for the Transfer Station. \$1,800.00 to be used from Revenue Sharing funds and \$15,645.00 to be raised by taxation this year. (Recommended by the Dump Study Committee and Budget Committee.)

36. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$220.00 as its share of the cost of publishing and promoting the natural attractions of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region which includes Bradford and encouraging vacation travel in the region. (Submitted with recommendation of Budget Committee.)

37. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,500.00 for a complete revaluation of the lands and buildings within the boundaries of the Town; said appraisal and the appraisers subject to the approval of the State Board of Taxation. The contract will not be signed until after completion and acceptance of the Tax Map. The appraisal to be completed for the 1979 property tax warrant. (Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.)

38. To see if the Town will vote to limit the habitation of house trailers and/or mobile homes in the Town of Bradford to one-tenth of the number of conventional homes in existence at any particular time.

39. To see if the Town will approve the acceptance of up to \$20,000.00 of Comprehensive Employment and Training Act Funds from the Merrimack County Department of Employment & Training for the funding of public service employment positions with the Town.

40. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of the Town Officers.

41. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

### Selectmen's Commentary – 1977

Despite persistent spiraling costs of goods and services required for Town operations, we have managed to stay within the budget adopted by the Town. Some expenses were greater than anticipated, others less. The selectmen met with the Budget Committee several times during the fiscal year and, with their advice and consent, the Town remains in a sound financial situation. We doubt if there has ever been as hard working or one as totally involved as the present Budget Committee in the history of the Town.

The Board of Selectmen has been faced with several problems affecting the Town in the past year. These have been the resignation of the police chief in March; the resignation of the road agent and staff; the continuing problem of solid waste disposal; the rapid turnover, subdivision of properties and consequent growth of the Town; and the problem of safety on state highways and main feeder roads.

The Town applied for and received an extension (until July 1, 1978), which may be revoked at any time, to continue open burning of solid waste at the dump. The board has been informed by State Air Pollution that no further extension will be forthcoming. The Solid Waste Committee (Dump Study Committee) has worked diligently to present for consideration the most practical and economically feasible plan available to the Town to handle the waste disposal problem and to phase out and rehabilitate the present dump as required by the State of New Hampshire.

Following the resignation of the former road agent and crew, the Highway Dept, has been completely reorganized and has done well when it is realized the difficulties it has had to overcome. The road agent started out with an inexperienced crew, immediately faced with road washouts in many parts of the Town, cost of repairs of which were estimated at \$10,000.00. The Town applied for state disaster aid for this but none was forthcoming. Delay in receiving state funds due to the lack of an approved state budget hampered contract work. More weather problems in the form of an extremely wet, late summer and fall made an oiling schedule impossible to implement. Enactment of the state legislation increasing the gasoline tax one cent per gallon will result in the Town receiving an estimated extra \$7,478.11 yearly for the next five years which must be used for road improvement and may not be carried over from year to year.

The need for new highway equipment is being felt during this severe winter. Our oldest truck, which is 14 years old, should have been replaced years ago. The other trucks, four and six years old, have been overworked. The Ford tractor, over 23 years old, is in poor shape and will not do the work needed on maintenance of the roads. The grader, eight years old, is in reasonably good state of repair while the bucket loader which has seen yeoman service in the three years it has been in service, is in good shape although it is doing work it was not designed for. It is essential to replace old and worn out equipment systematically.

Through the cooperation of the N.H. Dept. of Public Works and Highways, the Governor and the Executive Council approved the lease of the state gravel pit on Jones Road to the Town for one dollar per year. The lease gives the Town the use of the pit for material and storage. The same department also conducted a survey of the intersection of Main St. and Rte. 114 at the request of the Town. Some improvement in placing the stop signs on Rte. 114 and decreasing the speed limit have been implemented. The Town still considers that intersection a severe hazard to both motorists and pedestrians and intends to press for further improvement.

When the Town, at the Special Town Meeting, voted not to utilize the services of the Merrimack County Sheriff's Dept. the board appointed a special search committee of Florence Jones, Stephen White and John Pfiefle, who, after many hours of review of applications and interviews, recommended Mr. Marvin Rich to the selectmen. After the board met with Mr. Rich, this recommendation was accepted. This committee also recommended utilizing a telephone connection to the Sheriff's Office in Concord to give the Town 24-hour coverage without direct cost to the caller. This recommendation has also been activated and from the record of calls logged it has proven to be a valuable asset to the Town. This is evaluated further in the Police Dept. report.

The Town of Bradford is experiencing rapid growth both in year-round residences and commercial properties and in recreational homes. The number of real estate transfers in the Town during the year reflects this rapid growth and an influx of new owners. This has necessitated many long hours devoted by the selectmen to recording and assessing both new and old properties. The values recorded were discussed and established honestly and to the best of their ability. The board, however, recognizes that they are not professionals in this field and they strongly recommend that the services of a professional group be utilized to revalue the properties in the Town after the Tax Map is complete. The fact that inequities exist and have for years is not debatable; such inequities are compounded every year. Such reevaluation should be done periodically.

According to law, if 50 unhappy taxpayers petition Revenue Administration, the state may step in and revalue the Town and present it with the bill.

It is expected that the Tax Map will be completed by July. The map will be available for inspection and correction by May, with final delivery, with corrections, by July as contracted for. Final payment of \$2,250.00 is due within 60 days after delivery. No one is more impatient than the selectmen to obtain the use of this source of information which will readily locate each individual parcel. It is also hoped that the Town will favorably consider a professional revaluation of the Town when the map is completed in this period of rapid growth. When originally proposed, the cost of such revaluation of land and buildings was \$19,900.00; last year and the same firm quoted \$21,300.00 and this year \$22,500.00. This reflects both the growth of the Town and inflation. Postponing such revaluation of Bradford real estate is hiding our heads in the sand; it must be done sooner or later and the sooner it is done the better off the Town will be financially. This plea has been made for two years, we repeat it again this year.

The fact that the Town does not have a zoning law leaves us wide open to a rapid influx of house trailers and mobile homes in this period of rapid growth. This situation can become very serious and undesirable both economically and esthetically. We recommend that the Town give serious thought to limiting the number of trailers or mobile homes that can be placed in Bradford. Before the Town can send out our tax bills we have to wait until the Revenue Administration establishes our tax rate. Due to delay by the Governor, Senate and Legislature in coming to an agreement on the state operating budget, all the cities and towns in the state were delayed in sending out their tax bills. This situation could have resulted in borrowing money to meet established deadlines for the Town's payment of school and county levies. In particular, the selectmen, tax collector and town treasurer wish to thank the many people who prepaid part or most of their taxes before the tax bills were mailed to alleviate the Town's temporary financial distress and the resulting saving in interest payments.

Bradford was awarded a certificate of Distinguished Service by the Community Action Program of Relknap and Merrimack Counties "for demonstrating exceptional social concern and distinguished action on behalf of poor people." Basically this award is in recognition of our financial support of the CAP program and the Kearsarge Valley Area Center.

The selectmen wish to express their deep appreciation to all the members of the various commissions and committees for their sincere concern for the Town and their many hours of gratuitous service.

The Bradford-Newbury town line was perambulated in October by Selectmen Fred Winch and Jim Bibbo with representatives from Newbury. Where needed, town boundary markers were rereferenced and all were marked with 1977 dates.



# Report of Bradford Conservation Commission

The year ended on a sad note with the sudden passing of our respected senior member, Jay George. His sage advice and many recollections of bygone days will leave us with a wide void in membership. We shall miss him deeply.

Completion of the Fitness Trail as planned for 1977 suffered an initial long delay due to the late arrival of the \$500 grant awarded to us by the Ellen Anderson Trust Fund. This has been used in the purchase of the trail layout and needed signs. Construction work reached about halfway and will be resumed as weather allows in the spring. This trail is located on the former railroad bed, running between Church Street and Gillingham Drive.

The newly acquired Whitman Park area, adjacent to the Fitness Trail, now has a path cleared through most of its length. This will be further developed as a nature trail with trees, shrubs and wildflowers identified for group or individual study. Mrs. Whitman plans to position a picnic table at the commemorative boulder for public use.

Bradford Bog is now accessible, due mainly to our good fortune in being assigned CETA worker Debra Dunlop. A laid boardwalk aids in the wettest areas, but sturdy shoes or boots are required for anyone visiting this bog. Guided tours will be publicized for periods best suited to view flowers and shrubs in bloom. Information will be available from Mrs. Sheehan at the selectmen's office.

Prompt action was forthcoming to our request to the N.H. Highway Department in removing the huge dead elm tree overhanging the Bradford Pines turnout. The trail to the venerable Bradford Pines has been maintained by this commission. Publicity on these ancient, aweinspiring trees is anticipated in a forthcoming issue of Yankee Guide. A picnic table and trash receptacle at the entrance to the Bradford Pines trail was given frequent usage throughout the summer months.

Tree plantings along Main Street will continue with the hope of restoring some semblance of a shaded appearance to Bradford's main thoroughfare. Arbor Day, on the last Friday of April, will activate this program. Highway-approved programs for planting are also planned to alleviate the stark, unattractive appearance of the highway crossing at Main Street.

This commission relies on voter support for requested funds to enable us to carry out our planned programs, also to build our funds for land acquisition in establishing green belts for the betterment of our town.

# Report of Bradford Planning Board

Our records show that subdivision activities for 1977 have exceeded those of the previous year, indicating a continuing trend toward home construction in Bradford. There was one major subdivision of 11 parcels in which an agreement was reached that one dwelling each year would be erected. Much of this board's time is occupied with subdivision matters and the close scrutiny required for compliance to regulations. Other activities are outlined in the following.

Bradford's Tax Map continues toward completion with review process for landowners scheduled for this spring.

Essential information is regularly received from our affiliation with the Central N.H. Regional Planning Commission. Since wider recognition is given to regionalization, making the sharing of equipment and services a more economical operation, the value of our membership increases. Being kept advised of newly enacted legislation is understandably beneficial.

In cooperation with Bradford's Conservation Commission and the Lake Massasecum Improvement Assn., this board is actively interested in establishing and preserving a good water quality for our only accessible body of water. Voter awareness of Lake Massasecum's financial and recreational value to this town must be stimulated. Pollution and subsequent devaluation of property must be avoided for the stark reason that summer cottage tax revenue could be seriously reduced.

Little-used Town roads and wetlands are dealt with in relation to SD proposals submitted for approval. Unsanitary seepage would result from the installation of septic systems in wetlands and this is to be avoided at all costs.

Development of a Master Plan by your Planning Board is an objective for 1978. Residents must determine what guidelines they wish to establish for proper growth and development in an intelligent approach to planning for the future of our town. Your Planning Board is ready to assist in this important matter.

The board cordially invites anyone who is interested in the planning or subdivision process to visit with us during our regular meetings on the second Monday of each month at 7:30 p.m. in the selectmen's office.

### Report of the Health Officer-1977

This past year an increased effort was made to improve conditions at the Town Dump. Our permit to extend the deadline to stop open burning was approved by Air Pollution until July 1978. We were told that there would be no further extension of time. The Town was also warned that uncontrolled burning creating a health hazard or nuisance would result in immediate closing of the dump.

The measures instituted to improve conditions at the dump were: 1. the hiring of an attendant to supervise use of the dump during its open hours; 2. installation of a permanent gate; 3. erection of a shelter and sanitary facility for the attendant; 4. monitoring the amount of refuse deposited by a commercial hauler attributed to Bradford and authorized by the Selectmen; 5. rough grading the lower dump and getting rid of brush; 6. rodent control.

Further improvements to dump are intended and recommended by the Dump Study Committee, if approved by the Town.

During the past year there have been two applications for approval for construction pending 11 approvals for operation of septic systems registered with the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. This continues the pattern of moderate growth we have been experiencing in Bradford. There were also several repairs to existing systems.

The mill dam area at Lake Todd was checked for pollution by the state. Lake Massasecum testing has disclosed some pollution and it is hoped that funds will be allocated to check all septic systems abutting the lake, before the lake, which is a great asset to the Town, is lost beyond retrieval.

The well in the area of French's Park has had some repair done in the way of ditching by the State Highway Dept., in order to divert surface water from polluting the well. It is hoped that funds will be appropriated to clean out and reconstruct this well so that it will be useable.

The History Committee has missed the leadership of its chairman Mildred Gunscheon this year. Mildred was taken ill soon after the publication of the Bradford history. She has recovered and we anticipate her working with us in 1978.

Elizabeth A. Cilley, as the bonded agent for the sale of the histories, has sold 107 books and paid to the town treasurer the sum of \$1,778.07 which includes \$25.00 for mailing costs.

The town appropriation of \$100 was used to purchase albums, each containing 50 plastic pages. Arranging the pictures acquired during the history research in these, has been a time-consuming project, but rewarding as it progresses. Some albums will be on display during the annual town meeting election on March 14, 1978.

Two trophies awarded the Bradford Center School at Hopkinton Fair in 1936, and discovered in storage at the Central School were part of an exhibit of memorabilia at the Bradford church in July. Also received this year was a large framed picture of the Bradford Springs Hotel given by Clayton Craig. Pictures of Bradford were shown the same evening, some of which had never before been projected on the screen. Among them were pictures taken during the renovation of the Town Hall, by Dr. Anne Wasson.

School text books of the 1930's and earlier were culled from books being cleared from the Central School and are being preserved. The committee is still seeking both old and current pictures of homes, businesses and events in the town, along with all varieties of memorabilia.

The committee urges everyone to continue an active interest in the history of our town, not only its past, but its year-to-year happenings. The committee is seeking "history-minded" persons in the community who would give some of their time to this effort and become a member of the committee.

In the meantime they will continue to work to bring order to their files and preserve the properties.

### Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission

This commission is comprised of two representatives from each of the following towns: Bow, Bradford, Canterbury, Concord. Deering, Dunbarton, Henniker, Hillsboro, Hopkinton, Loudon, Pembroke and Warner. Many of these towns are equal in size to Bradford, having similar problems and seeking sensible solutions. This creates a natural "sounding board" at regular monthly meetings. Frequently, conditions existing in other towns have not yet surfaced in Bradford, but Town officials are forewarned.

Charles Clifford, director of CNHRPC visited the Bradford Planning Board to deliver a comprehensive study of land use planning and future housing needs projected to the year of 2000. Later, their senior planner Anthony Dater appeared to describe the study, aided by graphs and charts. The Planning Board was provided with various soils maps which are vital in guiding future development in Bradford.

Junior planner Elizabeth Corell was instrumental in securing a fund grant through New Hampshire Charities for Bradford's Fitness Trail, which the Conservation Commission is developing on the former railroad bed. Site layout and construction details were aided by a consultation with Rich Maxom of Concord's YMCA which Miss Corell arranged.

Seminars relating to legal questions involving old town roads and the planning procedures for subdivisions were attended by Selectman James V. Bibbo and Planning Board member Cardon Ruchti.

Bulletins issued by CNHRPC serve to keep the Planning Board abreast of legislation adopted or amended during legislative sessions. This would be an impossible task for the local Planning Board to accomplish.

In looking ahead, the state required Master Plan and revised subdivision regulations will be developed this year with reliance on Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission.

## Report of the Dump Study Committee

Last spring the selectmen were able to obtain a permit to operate the Town's burning dump; however, the State Air Pollution Control Agency made it very clear that this would be the final extension and that the permit was subject to immediate revocation if the dump was not operated exactly as they specified. Thanks to the efforts of the selectmen, especially Barney Woods, access was controlled and burning was accomplished as the state had required. Commercially hauled rubbish was restricted to the amount collected in Bradford and this significantly reduced the air pollution problem.

During the spring and early fall, representatives from the committee attended information meetings in Sunapee and Concord and became convinced that the methods of handling garbage may rapidly change when the state begins to implement the Federal Solid-Waste Disposal Act of 1977. This act provides money for states to construct regional facilities such as steam generation incinerators. The committee decided that a flexible approach with the minimum capital expenditure would be the wisest program for Bradford.

We ruled out incineration and a town-owned sanitary landfill because either would require between \$50,000 and \$100,000 for start-up cost and both methods might be condemned by new state laws in the near future. Our only alternative was to secure bids from private contractors to install and service a "mini-transfer station" whereby town garbage is compacted into a truck-like container and hauled periodically to the contractor's landfill. We have obtained, through competitive bidding, the services of Browning-Ferris Industries, Inc. They operate a mini-transfer station in Alstead, N.H., which has a summer and winter population similar to Bradford's. The system works well and the Town of Alstead is quite satisfied with its decision. We hope the voters of Bradford will support the advice of the Dump Study Committee and approve the proposed expenditures at the Town Meeting.

# Kearsarge Valley Community Action Program

Over the past four years, the Kearsarge Valley Community Action Program Center has been the focal point of social services delivery in this area. It has provided, through its staff and facilities, assistance to the community as a whole, as well as to low-income families. Programs such as the "Senior Congregate Meal Site," "Meals-on-Wheels," "Adult and Child Health Clinics" and "Summer Recreation for Youngsters" have aided groups from all segments of the population. With the renovation of our multi-purpose facility we have been able to expand our capacity to serve the needs of local residents.

Funds for the operation of the area center come from two sources. One is the Community Services Administration, the Federal umbrella agency for all Community Action programs throughout the country. This year the Community Services Administration is contributing 61 percent of the total operating costs of our center.

Funding also comes from local appropriations from the towns we serve. The share of our total operating budget for which we ask the towns to contribute is based upon the percentage of local resident participation in Community Action programs or services. We feel that this is the most equitable procedure for dividing the costs between the towns.

The financial support is needed for the continued operation of the area center, rather than for specific programs, which receive their funding from various sources and granting agencies.

By having a Community Action Program center located in the Kearsarge Valley we have been able to bring services which have heretofore been inaccessible to some residents of our area. Funding provides a base of operations for outreach services and a staff of social service workers, who implement existing programs and plan new projects, specially suited to each particular town.

We realize that any increase in budget appropriations is to be avoided, if at all possible. But those hardest hit by economic pressures are the senior citizens and low-income families and individuals, thus increasing the need for Community Action Program assistance and services. We have attempted to meet the growing needs of the community.

Much of our work would be impossible without your interest and support. It has been appreciated not only by us, but by the persons benefited by our services.

I have enclosed a copy of our budget which reflects the minimum costs to maintain our center, as well as compilation of participants in our programs from Bradford.

On behalf of the Kearsarge Valley Community Action Center, I am respectfully requesting that the following article be placed in the town warrant, and that a line item be put in the budget:

To see if the Town of Bradford will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,304.61 for the continuation of services to the town through the Kearsarge Valley Area Center of the Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc. l would also like to request a meeting with the Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee to discuss our request, answer any questions you may have concerning it, or to make any necessary changes in the budget.

# Report of Kearsarge Visiting Nurse Association

"You may stay in your home and be taken care of right there," or "You can go home from the hospital **now**." These are some of the most welcome and wonderful words heard by anyone who has been ill. They mean the chance to stay or be reunited with family and friends and to be in the comfortable and well-known surroundings of **home**.

The Kearsarge VNA feels home health care is a cost-effective, efficient way of meeting the needs of the people in their usual environment. The total number of patient visits has grown in all of the services oftered with a continued increase of 20% anticipated in 1978.

The agency made 5,852 home visits in 1977. This includes physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, health education, home health aide and supervisory visits. There were 605 home visits made in Bradford.

A total of 1,551 homemaker program visits were made in 1977. Ninety-eight of these visits were made in Bradford.

The Kearsarge VNA made 3,539 skilled nursing care visits which included care of catheters, colostomies, dressings, injections, heart/lung exams and related services.

Nursing intervention and prevention visits totaled 1,308 and included preventive testing, health guidance and support, counseling and teaching. There is no charge to the patient for these visits.


