

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bridgewater in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall in said Bridgewater on Tuesday, the Eighth day of March next, at twelve of the clock in the noon, to act upon the following subjects:

> Polls to be opened from 12:00 noon to 7:00 P.M. Business Meeting at 8:00 P.M.

1. To choose a Selectman for three (3) years and all other necessary Town Officers.

2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$501.52 for T.R.A., provided that the State contributes the sum of \$3,343.48.

3. To see if the Town will vote to expend the 1977 State Highway Subsidy Fund for Town Construction.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for General Expenses as estimated in the budget.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,500 for the purchase of new equipment, and authorize the withdrawal of \$5,500 from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended by 2nd Session of the 94th Congress.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$24,500 for a Highway Garage, and authorize the withdrawal of \$3,500 from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended by 2nd Session of the 94th Congress, with the balance to be raised by issuing a series of notes for a period not to exceed Ten (10) years.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum

of \$4,000 for the Fire Dept., and authorize the withdrawal of \$2,000 from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as amended by 2nd Session of the 94th Congress, and \$2,000 by appropriation.

8. To see if the Town will vote to approve the purchase of the Edward Willoughby property, approximately 19 acres, on the Pemigewasset River at a price of \$15,000, to be paid for, without interest, over a period of 3 years, in equal payments, for use by the Town for future recreational purposes. (Requested by the Planning Board)

9. To see what action the Town will take regarding Libraries.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to receive in the name of the Town any and all grants or relief from any other governmental divisions.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The financial condition of the Town during fiscal 1976 resulted in a change from a surplus of \$2,966 to a deficit \$35,280.

As indicated in the audit report a total of \$132,683.21 was expended to rebuild the Town roads after the disastrous flood in 1973. The State Disaster Coordinating Office has refused to allow \$37,063 of this amount. The Selectmen are now awaiting the outcome of a special audit conducted last December. In case of an adverse decision on this audit an appeal will be made to the highest possible authority.

Other than this, the financial condition of the Town remains very favorable with a budget deficit of \$2,417 and a long term indebtedness of \$3,000.

A considerable increase in the 1976 Tax Rate resulted from increases in the School and County tax levies by over \$30,000. It is hoped that the School share may decrease in the coming year due to a possible drop in the Bridgewater enrollment and application of the new formula.

All of the legal requirements have been met regarding the Regional Refuse Disposal District which will reimburse the Town of Bridgewater in full for all expenditures to date. The facility will be in operation in the spring, however, final arrangements for separation of cans and bottles are uncertain at this time.

The TRA project on the Dick Brown Road now has been completed as far as the Town Dump. Present plans are to seal this and the other hard surfaced roads during the coming summer. The department is now very well equipped to carry out its duties with everything in good condition with the exception of the sand and salt spreader which is badly corroded and is now 5 years old. An article is in the warrant for a replacement.

The Huber grader was exchanged for a larger Caterpillar unit when it was found that the expense of repairs and overhaul would exceed the cost of exchanging for a larger machine which is in excellent condition.

An article has been placed in the warrant for a new and larger garage for the Highway Department. It is suggested that the building be located on land now owned by the Town near the gate to the present Town Dump. The present garage is large enough to house only one piece of equipment and two of the fire trucks. Land space is not available to allow for any sizable addition. The Selectmen propose to make the present building available to the Fire Department.

The Fire Department now consists of a complement of 19 men, who are equipped with helmets, coats and boots. The boots were purchased by each man individually. Many of the coats and helmets have been acquired through the efforts of the Auxiliary.

Three of the trucks are now equipped with radios and are able to communicate with other departments as well as between themselves. When and if winter storage space becomes available a total of 2,000 gallons of water will be ready for immediate use at a fire situation. A standard Mack 750 gal pumper is now on loan from the State Forestry Dept. but has not been put into use as yet.

500 feet of $1\frac{1}{2}$ " hose and 250 feet of $2\frac{1}{2}$ " has been purchased this year but more hose and air packs are still greatly needed. However the predominant problem is the lack of storage space for Fire Trucks. Presently the only available space in the Highway Garage allows the storage of one tanker and the smaller Forestry truck thereby greatly reducing the capability of the Department in cold weather.

Bridgewater membership in the Twin Rivers Mutual Aid Group is now under consideration by that group. Individual mutual aid agreements have been consummated with Alexandria and Hebron departments.

Gentlemen:

We have examined the books and records of the Town of Bridgewater, New Hampshire for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1976, and have prepared the attached exhibits and schedules in conformity with the recommended format prescribed by the Municipal Services Division of the State of New Hampshire. Included in the examination were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds and Road Agent.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

General Fund:

Comparative Balance Sheet - December 31, 1975 and December 31,1976: (Exhibit A-1)

A comparative balance sheet disclosing the financial condition of the general fund as of December 31, 1975 and December 31, 1976 is presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the financial condition of the Town changed from a current surplus of \$2,966 at December 31, 1975, to a current deficit of \$35,280 at December 31, 1976.

In addition to a budget deficit of \$2,417 as indicated on Exhibit A-4, the principal factor responsible for the current deficit at December 31, 1976 was actual expenditures paid by the Town for damages incurred by heavy rains in 1973, and the amount approved for reimbursement by the FDAA. According to the final audit report prepared by the New Hampshire State Disaster Coordinating Office dated September 16, 1976, claims for reimbursement by the Town amounted to \$132,638.21 and only \$95,574.78 was recommended for reimbursement.

The Selectmen intend to appeal the findings of the audit report.

Analysis of Change in Current Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of change in current financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures -Estimated And Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenue for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1976 are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4) a net overdraft of appropriations of \$15,149, less a revenue surplus of \$12,732, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$2,417.

Long-Term Indebtedness:

Comparative Balance Sheet: (Exhibit A-5)

A comparative balance sheet which discloses the outstanding long-term indebtedness of the Town as of December 31, 1975 and December 31, 1976 is included in Exhibit A-5.

Statement of Debt Service Requirements: (Exhibit A-6)

A statement showing annual debt service requirements of principal and interest as of December 31, 1976 is presented in Exhibit A-6.

OTHER FUNDS AND OFFICIALS' ACCOUNTS

The accompanying supplemental exhibits covering segregated funds and the accounts of those officials entrusted with the custody, receipt or expenditure of Town funds, are presented in accordance with the current requirements of the Municipal Services Division of the State of New Hampshire. Although not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial statements and results of operations, our examination of these accounts included the same tests and auditing procedures applied in the examination of the aforementioned financial statements. In our opinion, these exhibits are stated fairly in all material respects when considered in conjunction with the financial statements taken as a whole.

We extend our thanks to the officials and the office staff of the Town of Bridgewater for their assistance during the course of the audit.

TOWN OF BRIDGEWATER NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Regional Refuse Disposal District:

The Towns of Bridgewater and Hebron have established a Regional Refuse Disposal District pursuant to Chapter 53-B of the

Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire. The costs are to be shared equally by each Town. The Town of Bridgewater has assumed all of the initial costs of planning, borrowing and construction of the incinerator as of December 31, 1976. Based on data obtained from the records maintained by the Town of Bridgewater, total expenditures incurred by the Town in 1975 and 1976 have amounted to \$120,075 of which \$34,620 has been appropriated and contributed by the Town of Bridgewater. The balance of \$85,455 is due the Town by the newly formed regional refuse disposal district and should be recovered in fiscal 1977. This amount has been reflected on the general fund balance sheet as due the Town of Bridgewater at December 31, 1976.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

NEWFOUND AREA NURSING ASSOCIATION 1976 Yearly Report

1976 has been a time of growth and a period of change for the Newfound Area Nursing Association. NANA has had an active year serving the people of the towns of Alexandria, Bristol, Bridgewater and New Hampton.

Due to the changing trend in health care, home health services are now more widely used. Many times patients are discharged at an earlier time with the knowledge that continued skilled nursing care can be carried on within the home setting.

The total number of nursing visits are as follows: Skilled Nursing 2,146 Health promotions 341 2,487 Physical Therapy 53

In June there was a change of staff personnel, including two registered nurses and a qualified physical therapist. This staff has worked together as an effective team for better nursing care.

There has been an increasing number of nursing referrals from our local physicians as well as physicians from hospitals in Franklin, Lakes Region, Hanover and Veterans Administration.

NANA is involved in discharge planning groups from Franklin Regional Hospital and Lakes Region Hospital. These groups plan ahead for nursing care of patients in the home.

Members of the staff of NANA have attended various workshops to continue education and update knowledge of trends in home health care.

Community activities in which NANA has been involved are as follows:

Bloodmobile Drive - August

Swine Flu Immunization - October

Blood Pressure & Diabetes Screening Clinics - February & December.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Last year we reported that the Town Forest had been surveyed, the boundaries marked, and a timber cruise made by the State and County foresters. Inspection of the property last summer indicated that at some recent time trees had been cut on the Bridgewater side of the north boundary line, perhaps inadvertently by persons approaching from Hunt Road. It is recommended that some simple type of fence be constructed along this line.

There have been no further developments on the so-called "Kelly Lot" on the river bank just north of Union Bridge. Various friends have pointed out that this ³/₄-acre piece with its approach by old Route 3, which is also town property, does not lend itself very well to a bathing beach. However, as a place to launch canoes or other small boats, it is believed that a ramp could be constructed at comparatively small expense.

Several requests for Dredge or Fill were received. Most of these were related to repair of damage to beaches on Whittemore Point during the 1973 flash flood. One request involved placing a culvert in a small branch of Dick Brown Brook near the golf-driving range on Route 3A. This was discussed with the Selectmen who believed it was in the town's interest to approve it. Another request involved running a power line over the Pemigewasset River to a trailer park in New Hampton.

At a meeting of the Planning Board, attended by a member of the Conservation Commission, there was a discussion of the possibility of developing a recreation area near the site of the old covered bridge on property now owned by Dorothy and Edward Willoughby. Since recreation areas are generally considered to be one of the primary interests of Conservation Commissions, it is recommended that a full discussion of this matter be held at a joint meeting of the Planning Board and all the members of the Conservation Commission before any town funds are expended on this property. It is historically a very interesting area, and it is possible that it could be made into a most attractive recreation asset with much less expense to the town than that called for by the plans discussed at the above-mentioned meeting.

After five years of service, Mrs. Marlene Matthews has asked to be replaced as Secretary. The Commission wishes to take this occasion to express its thanks to her for her faithful attendance at meetings, and careful preparation and preservation of the records. The Chairman also feels that he should be replaced as Chairman, although he will be glad to continue as a member.

Potential replacements for both of these positions have been approached, but have not been formally appointed. They are willing to serve.

Up to this time, the Conservation Commission has not requested any funds in the Town Budget. Most of its expenditures have been covered by the Ford Foundation Grant which paid for all the maps, surveys etc., but which is now exhausted. It hopes that an amount of approximately \$200.00 will be authorized to cover the legitimate and reasonable expenses of the Commission, such as the required membership in the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions (\$25.00), attendance at various appropriate meetings, mileage when on official business, such as investigating Dredge and Fill requests, necessary secretarial supplies, etc.
