

A WORD FROM THE SELECTMEN

This is the Town's 186th Town Meeting and the 104th printed Report. The First Report was printed in 1850 on a single sheet of paper. How different are these days from those of 1850, when the total amount of receipts was \$3,413.13 with expenditures of \$2,912.68. No doubt our forefathers had their problems too with money; the paramount issue as it is of today.

As your servants we have tried to spend your money as judiciously as possible, but there is a limit to our authority.

We hear much stress and talk laid upon "tax rate"—which is simply a factor in the matter of computation. What does definitely matter—and really effects your pocketbook—is how much money you raise at this meeting. You ALONE can accurately estimate how much you can reasonably afford to spend. Our Budget Committee, at considerable effort, has listed certain sums for expenditure. Please give their estimates your earnest consideration, before you vote.

Upon receiving a Petition from interested parties for a new road to be constructed at the foot of LeClair hill to eliminate a dangerous curve, and upon a promise of a gift of the necessary land from Bertha and Kenneth Hunt. The LeClair Brothers promised the use of their equipment and furnished fill for the entire job. The Selectmen felt that this was an offer that could not be refused. Accordingly, the plans were carried out as agreed upon.

In behalf of the Town, the Selectmen wish to thank Bertha and Kenneth Hunt for their deed of the land and the LeClair Brothers for giving the use of equipment and help. The Town's share will be found under New Construction, except labor.

The Cemeteries under the care of Mr. George Geer, show the care for which we have long hoped. As Trustees of Trust Funds we wish to acknowledge receipt of \$100.00 from Charles H. and Maude A. Welcome for care of the Welcome lot and from Harriett D. Lippett and James K. Davidson for the Lillian J. Kelly lot. Both in the Child's Cemetery.

May we at this time express our thanks and appreciation for the kindly cooperation we have received from all heads of departments and residents of Cornish.

We have tried to give you a clear, concise report of the financial transactions during the past year.

Our single hope is — that it meets with your approval.

- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

- 3. To see if the Town will vote to set aside the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.) of the maintenance money for the purpose of graveling the Mountain Road at South Cornish. (By Request.)
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the south fork of the road from S. Clyde Perkins house to the main road, or Route 120.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to purchase a new fire truck suitable for all fires in a Town the size of Cornish.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for the new Fire Truck; balance to be raised by five long term notes of equal amount.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one-hundreth of one per cent of the assessed valuation for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association for the purpose of promoting and publicizing the natural advantages of the town together with other towns in the region.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of revaluing the real property of the town.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the capital reserve fund for purchasing highway equipment.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the final payment on the Chevrolet truck.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$816.00, the State to contribute the sum of \$5,442.00 for Town Road Aid.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to trade in or purchase a new power mower for the Cemeteries and raise and appropriate the necessary amount.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell or otherwise administer on property acquired through tax sales and liens.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money if necessary in anticipation of taxes.

- 15. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote of 1952 on articles 19 and 20 and instruct the Selectmen to apply for the State plan on old age insurance.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Collector of Taxes additional compensation for his services in collecting the State Head Tax and to fix the amount thereof.
- 17. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regards to allowing the use of the Town Hall for general public activities and fix the compensation and instruct the Selectmen in regards to the same.
- 18. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regards to printing unpaid taxes in the Town Report.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of no less than five or no more than nine members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15, Chapter 53, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942, as amended; to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The Board members shall consist of one Selectman and four or eight other citizens appointed by the Selectmen as provided in Sections 1-15, Chapter 53, Revised Laws of New Hampshire, 1942, as amended.
- 20. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regards to a Town Dump and raise and appropriate the necessary money.
- 21. To hear reports of Officers, Agents, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote in relation thereto.
- 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF HIGHWAY AGENT

Many existing town roads are the outgrowth of a situation that began with the founding of our town. Old trails were widened to accommodate the horse and wagon, roads were built around ledges or other obstacles. When construction began, equipment was of the pick and shovel type. With the advent of modern machinery and the more modern means of transportation the demand is for better and better roads.

At your request one thousand dollars of maintenance funds was set aside for the repair of two back roads. Clark's road was repaired at a cost of four hundred and seventy-three dollars, ditching was done where possible, also culverts installed, as a matter of fact, there will have to be spent several thousand dollars for blasting, fill and gravel to make this road passable twelve months of the year. The same problems apply to the Mountain road on a larger scale. But because of the greater length eight hundred and fifty-eight dollars was spent on this road. With a considerable amount of gravel applied three hundred and fifty yards, being given by Green Mountain Forest Association.

Particular reference to the reasonable limits of State expenditures must be taken in consideration of our local roads. As their limited ability is to build a short distance each year. This makes our financial burden greater, as we must substitute the benefits formerly received by the State.

Another fact I would like to call your attention to, is that most of the traffic that we see on state roads also use our local roads. Unfortunately this transportation problem that raises havoc with pavement breakage, etc., to the state roads, do the same to ours.

We have a considerable item in our budget for road tar. This work in the past has been done every two years. I think this work important if left for another year could reasonably mean disaster. One of our knottiest problems which lead us to our present situation, shall we continue tarring new roads. If for no other reason, perhaps the advantages out-weighs the disadvantages in cost maintenance, etc., the security of a good road, the added value of farms and homes and last, but not least the saving of gravel. The scarcity of this can be seen each year therefore a thorough consideration of these matters are urged.

Thanking every one for their kindness and cooperation.

REPORT OF LOCAL CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

In spite of the fact that heavy rainfall in March and April of 1952 threatened to bring about conditions similar to those which prevailed during the floods of 1936; and the storms which hit the greater part of New England this past Winter, your Civil Defense Organization was not called upon to serve either in Cornish or in other areas. For this we are indeed most grateful!

While all has not been achieved that might be hoped for we do have a reasonably well-equipped and organized set-up. However, we are not satisfied that all has been done to bring the Cornish Civil Defense Organization up to the point that it may best meet the contingencies that could possibly arise.

Our Firefighting Unit, Transportation and Evacuation Unit, Police, Engineering, and Nurses Units are established on a sound basis, although they could all do with more members.

We need help mostly in the REFUGEE UNIT, which is the one that would be called into action right here in Cornish; to care for displaced persons from other areas,—or should the circumstances require, house and feed such citizens of our own town in the event of any natural calamity!

We are calling on the housewives of Cornish to come out to our next meeting and learn how they can help in this needed and worth-while activity.

Regular meetings of the CDO are scheduled to be held in the Town Hall on the Second Mondays in January, April, July and October. All are cordially invited to attend.

SCHOOL WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Cornish qualified to vote in district affairs—

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the seventh day of March, 1953, at one-thirty o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing year.
 - 5. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 6. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 7. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 8. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to rescind the action taken at the school district meeting held June 17, 1952, whereby the district approved the Dumaine property, so-called, as a site for a new proposed school.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to construct and equip a new elementary school.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to acquire any real estate which may be necessary for such purpose.
- 12. To see what sum the district will vote to raise and appropriate for constructing and equipping a new elementary school and acquiring any real property that may be necessary for its location; and whether the district will vote to authorize

the issue of serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the district for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated; and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued, including their sale, the time and place of payment of principal and in accordance with the municipal bond statute, New Hampshire Revised Laws, Chapter 72, as amended by Chapter 55, Laws of 1949.

- 13. If Article 10 is adopted, to see if the district will vote to use any capital reserve funds previously voted, and to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to pay over these accumulated funds to the school board as agents of the school district to be used in the construction of a new school building, the necessary equipment and furnishing and the acquisition of any real property for its location.
- 14. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 15. To determine what provision the school district will make for the increased enrollment for the school year 1953-54, and to raise and appropriate any additional money necessary for tuition, classroom space, teacher and/or equipment.
- 16. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$4,000 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for School Building purposes.
- 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Cornish, I herewith submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

The citizens of Cornish may well re-evaluate their educational system at this time. The most fortunate situation is in regard to the teaching staff. There are six teachers, all of whom have had considerable successful teaching experiences. These teachers are constantly trying to improve their professional training by taking extension courses or attending summer school. In addition, they are reading educational literature to find other methods of more effective teaching.

Due to the many years of teaching in Cornish, they have acquired an understanding of the individual differences in boys and girls which the beginning teacher does not discover for many months. These same teachers are teaching for lower salaries than are being paid by the majority of other communities for comparable experience, training and position.

The great increase in enrollment has caused an overflow in the number of pupils who can now be educated in Cornish. We are depending upon Windsor and Claremont to provide facilities and the education at great expense to the Cornish tax-payers in terms of tuition and transportation. The time has actually arrived when Claremont and Windsor cannot accept the number of pupils it will be necessary to send if we continue to operate the present six schools. I have a letter from Superintendent Trafton stating that Claremont will not be able to take more than ten eighth grade pupils for the school year 1953-54. I also have a letter from Superintendent Byrne stating that Windsor will be able to take only a limited number.

With an anticipated enrollment of between 220 and 230 in the eight grades, it is not difficult to see that additional housing is an absolute necessity.

It would seem wise to raise and appropriate money for a new modern school building that would provide for all the elementary pupils. There are, however, many issues to be settled before actually voting to do this. Transportation, lo-

cation of building, and financing seem to be the major issues. In addition, the type of construction, the area available for future development, the teaching staff, the supplemental offerings to the boys and girls—such as music, art, dramatics, physical education, hot lunch, shop or home economics—maintenance, and availability for public use, are all issues that you as citizens must decide upon as a whole or as small groups charged with the responsibility of carrying out the duties of office or assignment.

As your superintendent, I highly recommend that you provide all the facilities essential to offer a complete educational program. Even though this may not be accomplished in the next few months due to limitations of financing, construction, teaching staff, or for other factors beyond our control, I feel that this should be an ultimate goal.

There has been much hesitation on improvements to the existing school plants in anticipation of a new building. There is a limit to this time element and it will be necessary to spend large sums soon to maintain, but not actually improve, the conditions under which pupils must attend school.

The citizens of Cornish are to be complimented upon the way in which they have grasped the problem and worked very diligently to find the answer. There are many individuals who have labored over a period of eight years to come up with the right answer. This has meant many hours and dollars spent. It has broken friendships and discouraged some individuals and groups, but I believe that it has done much to unite the entire population as a unit in a democratic country. I am most confident that the opinions of the majority will be respected because it will provide the educational opportunity that you really desire and know is essential for the future Cornish adults if they are to compete successfully in the business and social world.

I have enjoyed working with the school board, teachers, parents and friends in the very short time I have been with you. I hope I can serve you efficiently and effectively in the future.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

Healthy development of the child is of basic importance. Good health is essential to effective living. What better place than the school to teach "GOOD HEALTH HABITS"? Good health is an important goal of education.

Your school nurse has been privileged with the opportunity to continue to improve the health of your school child. The methods used are not new. A yearly inspection is done. This includes weight and height. An inspection of posture, skin, hair, teeth and throat are also a part of the routine. Your child's vision is tested by means of the Massachusetts Vision Testing Machine. Hearing is tested individually by means of the audiometer. Hearing is done about every other year as the testing apparatus is loaned by the State Board of Education. As time permits, your nurse visits the classrooms and has discussions with the children on different phases of the health problem.

Now to explain what happens following the inspection. A "Notice to Parents" is sent home by the school nurse. What is on this notice? The defects observed by your nurse are sent to you for your consideration. You may request the assistance of the nurse, check that you will consult your family doctor or family dentist. Home visits are made by the nurse where it is necessary; to discuss the plan to be taken; to discuss health problems; to give suggestions in the care of the sick child as needed.

A health record is kept on your child so that the nurse, teachers, principal and superintendent may have access to the health progress of each child. Should parents wish to discuss this record, they may consult the nurse at their convenience. A close relationship between local, state, social and health agencies is gratefully appreciated. There is a full cooperation with the State Board of Education, State Health Department and State Department of Public Welfare. Thus through the cooperation of "ALL OF US," our endeavor will be to keep the school child healthy in mind and body.
