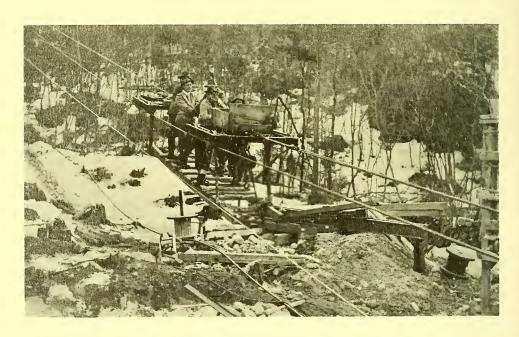

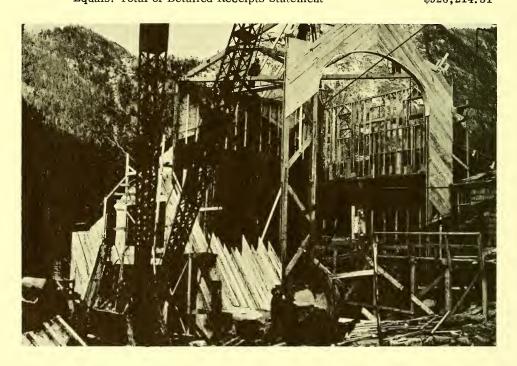

- Article 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the White Mountain Center for the Arts to provide tickets to the Town through its Recreation department for special Sunday Afternoon Childrens' Series.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00) and will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, negotiate, and do all other things necessary to obtain Federal assistance in the sum of One Hundred Twelve Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$112,500.00) and State assistance in the sum of One Hundred Twelve Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$112,500.00) and to expend the total amount of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) to construct a new bridge across the Gale River connecting Wilson Road with Coal Hill Road (Bridge No. 118/079 on the Wilson Road Connector, so-called, a class V highway); and to issue notes on the credit of the town with the amount and mode of payment to be determined by the Selectmen.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and further, to authorize the Selectmen to make pro-rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or to take any other action thereon:

- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the salary of the Selectmen from \$750.00 plus \$250.00 in expenses to \$2,000.00 each. With this increase will come a more effectively run Town Government. The Selectmen will be expected to work at least 6 hours per week, and to become the "Active Town Management". Job descriptions will be developed for all Department Heads, including the Selectmen, policy will be firmly established and administered, and a purchasing policy developed. In addition, pay scales and employee benefits will be written. These procedures will be drawn up by the New Hampshire Municipal Association with assistance from the North Country Council. The Legislative branch of the Town (Town Meeting) will make recommendations on the effectiveness of this article at its next regularly scheduled meeting in March of 1981.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to establish a permanent historical-museum committee to collect data, photographs, papers and artifacts of the history of the Town of Franconia, and nearby environs where pertinent; and to authorize the Selectmen to organize said committee and make appointments thereto.
- Article 9. To see if the Selectmen shall grant a franchise to erect, install and maintain in, under or over streets, highways and other public ways of the Town, wires, cable and other equipment related to the delivery or enhancement of television signals and other electrical impulses in accordance with New Hampshire Law RSA 53-C (Supp. 1977).

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen in conjunction with the Planning Board, to negotiate the purchase for a sum not to exceed Thirteen Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$13,200.00), a portion of the Real Estate presently owned by Franconia Land Company, known as the Dow Strip, and vote to raise and appropriate said sum from surplus funds, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the purchase of said real estate as shall be in the best interests of the Town.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a yearly contract with the Sheriff of Grafton County, N.H. for full-time police service.

Article 12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 13. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relative thereto.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

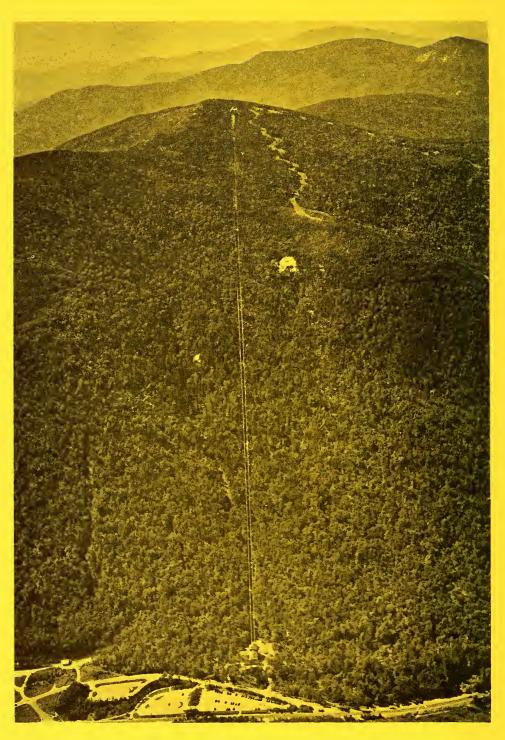

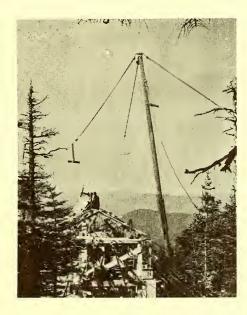

TOWN OF FRANCONIA REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Prevention and control of forest fires is handled through a cooperative effort between town/city fire organizations and the State Forest Fire Service.

Since 1903, when the first forest fire laws were passed by our Legislature, the State Forester has appointed someone in each municipality as a Forest Fire Warden and charged him with the responsibility of forest fire prevention and control within his town/city. This person may ask the State Forester to appoint as many Deputy Forest Fire Wardens as may be necessary to efficiently carry out his charge.

The State Forester has divided the State into ten forest fire districts with a full time District Forest Fire Chief in each district. The State organization is charged with assisting the municipal forest fire organization in any way possible.

State personnel conduct fire training schools, assist with forest fire suppression, fire cause investigation, prosecution of fire law violators and forest fire prevention programs. Forest fire suppression equipment is purchased through State bulk purchasing ability and sold to local forest fire organizations at one-half cost. Excess military property is obtained and turned over to town/city fire departments at no cost to local departments for conversion into fire suppression units. This cooperative arrangement between State and municipality has resulted in one of the best forest fire records in the United States with less than one-half acre of woodland burned in each fire reported.

During the early summer of 1979, 22 hard wood trees and 8 flowering bushes were planted along Main Street between the Sugar Hill and Black bridges. This was the third successive year we have engaged in plantings and to date out of some 40 trees planted all but one have survived.

A comprehensive review of the Final Impact Statement on the I-93 Parkway through the Notch was conducted and a report written which was sent to various outside agencies, eg. Sierra Club, Appalachian Mountain Club, Audubon Society etc. for their comments. The Impact Statement, in content the size of three Manhattan Telephone books, did not, in our opinion, live up to the agreement reached by various concerned agencies and the N.H. Highway Dept. and the U.S. Dept. of Transportation. The basic agreement was that the Parkway would retain the essential wilderness character of the Notch. We feel that major changes have been made to the agreement. In essence, the parkway will have a center dividing strip, various passing lanes and turn offs and far more cut and fills than originally contemplated. We have alerted others to these facts. To date we have received minimal response. We are forwarding our concerns to the Secretary of Transportation reflecting only those views of the Franconia Conservation Commission.

We have submitted formal applications for the Dow and Forest Hills Hotel building to be designated as National Historic Trust landmarks. Both applications are still pending.

1979 was another excellent year for the Frost Place. Visitors to the house totaled 822 and came from 38 states and 8 foreign countries. 705 persons attended one or another of the art events in the barn. Our first poetry festival had 20 registrants and was a financial and artistic success as was the entire summer season which produced a \$1900 profit. Our poet-in-residence, Gary Maranda, was nominated for the Pulitzer Prize while at home in Franconia. The debt on the Frost Place was reduced from \$44,000 to 11,000. In 1980 the Frost Place Committee intends to pay off the remainder of the debt on the house. Consequently no further borrowing seems necessary.

from the North Country Council

In Franconia North Country Council assisted in organizing a meeting regarding the available options for the Franconia College property; provided information on possible historic preservation opportunities; provided information and assisting the town prepare a community plan.

This past year of 1979 saw a mixture of planning and action for the North Country Council, Inc. Major contributions were made in rural and economic development, local planning, and transportation.

In rural development, the Council assisted approximately twenty-five communities in taking positive steps on such concerns as housing, downtown revitalization, water supply, and solid waste. The council has helped communities obtain needed housing resources. Working with appropriate state and federal agencies, the Council assisted targeted communities by preparing applications and by providing information so decisions can be made. In economic development, the Council assisted two communities with steps toward the creation of parks which will provide a necessary place for additional jobs. Energy development activities have encouraged the development of indigenous resources such as wood and hydro power. NCC has also been active in helping local companies with loan applications and business counseling, and in assisting a targeted community with a revolving loan fund. Additional business development services will be provided during the coming year to encourage existing area and other in-state businesses to expand or locate so that more jobs can be provided in the North Country. An industrial brochure has been published which promotes the quality of life in the region and the resources available for small companies.

Local planning assistance, such as master planning, subdivision regulations, zoning, review of development proposals continues to be a major function of the Council. This activity will take on greater significance with the NH Supreme Court's emphasis on local master planning as a basis for local regulations.

Technical reports have been prepared on Mt. Washington Valley's Seasonal Population and on wetland evaluation and management. Brief and informative fact sheets on community investment strategies, land capability and wetlands are also available.

To advocate North Country transportation needs at the state and federal level, a Transportation Committee has been organized with representatives from different communities and transportation sectors.

The Council acts as a "regional spokesman" with membership on the Governor's Advisory Committee on Growth, the N.H. Environmental Law Clinic, and the State's Forestry Resources Committee. By sponsoring forums and conferences on growth in the forest industry, agricultural development, and regional land use, the Council has brought together people, ideas, and resources to generate appropriate solutions.

We believe that the Council has a program that can assist its rural communities in meeting the challenges and opportunities of the 1980s. The Board of Directors, the staff and the entire Council greatly appreciates the support your Town has provided in 1979 and over the last few years. from the North Country Home Health Agency, Inc.

North Country Home Health Agency provides services to people in their own homes who have health-related problems. Nursing visits are provided for the chronically ill, for care following hospitalization or for acute care in lieu of hospitalization. Physical Therapy and Speech Therapy are available to homebound patients. The Homemaker/Home Health Aides work with the nurses and therapists to assist with personal care, light housekeeping and meal preparation, and other health-related services aimed at keeping people independent in their own homes for as long as possible.

This year we added a program aimed at reducing child abuse through personal contact by Family Assistants with families which are not coping.

Our Public Health activities are aimed at prevention of disease, and include child immunization clinics, well-child conferences, handicapped children's clinics, adult health screenings and child dental screenings. Monthly well-child and immunization clinics are now held in both the Littleton and Haverhill areas, and three times a year in Lisbon and Lincoln. Health promotions for the assessment of problems and newborn visits to infants and mothers are also made. There is no charge for any of the clinics, health promotions or newborn visits.

North Country Home Health Agency serves 15 towns in a 1200 square mile area. Its main office is 60 High Street, Littleton, and there are satellite offices in Lincoln and Woodsville.

Services included to residents of Franconia are: 173 Nursing Visits, 9 Physical Therapy Visits; 72 Home Health Aide hours, 30 Homemaker hours, 4 Health Promotions, 2 Newborn visits and 3 Social Worker visits.

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

In an effort to communicate more directly with the taxpaying citizens of Grafton County, we, the Grafton County Commissioners, are writing to you through your individual town or municipal reports.

Last year (1978-79) the total county tax raised was \$1,977,142.00. These monies were appropriated by the County Delegation and administered by the Commissioners. Some of the ways this money was spent was in maintenance of our courthouse, nursing home, county farm, sheriff's department, jail and house of correction, social welfare, etc.

The average number of patients in our nursing home is 140. The average daily census of the Jail/House of Correction is 25. We had a total of 349 inmates in the Jail and 114 inmates in the House of Correction during our fiscal year.

In addition to providing food for the nursing home complex and agricultural services for the community, the farm also continually shows a profit. In our fiscal year 1979 the farm profit was \$60,654, due in part to sales of pigs at \$5,500, cows at \$27,000, wood at \$1,800, hay at \$2,100, milk at \$135,444 and produce at \$48,129.

We have completed Phase II-Design of the sewage project and anticipate beginning construction under Phase III in the spring. The total overall cost of the project is approximately \$540,000, of which \$400,000 is federal grant, \$110,000 State share and \$30,000 County share.

We are making an effort to conserve energy, particularly in the courthouse building, and are taking a hard look at any modifications in this so called "modern" facility that will make it a less expensive consumer of fuel.

A trial dispatching service was instituted for 16 area fire departments and probably will be made a permanent function during the latter part of 1979. A yearly fee is charged for this service.

Grafton County employs 230 people of whom we are very proud. It is because of these people that Grafton County continues to operate efficiently and within budget.

There are many other concerns that we, the Commissioners, deal with. We invite the citizens of Grafton County to take part in any of our regular meetings held each Monday morning at the courthouse in North Haverhill.

The Littleton Hospital looks forward to the challenges of the 1980's. In 1981 the hospital will celebrate its 75th anniversary of service for the acute health care needs of residents and visitors of the North Country. The hospital's course for the 80's was set by its trustees who formulated this mission:

Provide a range of health care services to include Cardiology, General Medicine, Internal Medicine, Obstetrics and Gynecology, Orthopedics, Pathology, Pediatrics, Radiology, Surgery, a fully-staffed 24-hour a day Emergency Department and outpatient care.

Enhance public awareness of personal health care through education and through support of primary health care services.

Participate in cooperative regional hospital efforts to share services.

Be financially accountable and economical in every action taken.

As a result of the recently completed construction and renovation program, Littleton Hospital is now a fully modernized 54-bed facility providing modern clinical and diagnostic support to a highly talented and dedicated cadre of physicians who comprise the medical staff.

Littleton Hospital is a fully accredited not-for-profit organization directed by a Board of Trustees who are elected residents of the communities within the hospital's support area.

To improve and update sophisticated medical equipment, the hospital looks for funds from annual appropriations from supported communities, gifts and bequests from hospital friends and supporters, grants from charitable foundations and revenue from benefits sponsored by the hospital auxiliary and other civic clubs.

Littleton Hospital is committed to containing the cost of hospital care. Rates and charges are fixed by the Trustees at levels to adequately cover the cost of operations and services rendered.

Town appropriations are a primary source of nonoperating revenue so necessary to keep the Littleton Hospital equipped for the needs of modern medical and surgical practice.

During 1979, 2,582 patients were treated and discharged, 221 infants were born, almost 1,200 surgical procedures were performed and more than 9,600 individuals were treated in the Emergency Department. Town appropriations contributed to quality of care each of these patients received at the hospital.

A TIME TO REMEMBER

At this time, it seems appropriate to recognize the impact upon our town of the erection on Cannon Mountain forty two years ago of the first modern aerial passenger tramway on the North American Continent. It is also time for recollection and fond, backward glances.

Just as in 1938 we hailed that achievement with great pride and anticipation, in 1980 we acclaim its successor, the new Cannon Mountain Aerial Tramway.

Alexander Bright, called "the father of the Cannon Mountain Tramway", a well known skier, and member of the U.S. Olympic Ski Team returned from Europe in 1933 with an idea that he determined to investigate. He believed that it would be feasible to construct to the top of some mountain in New Hampshire a tramway that could carry both tourists in the summer and skiers in the winter. His enthusiasm led him in July of 1933 to contact the American Steel and Wire Co. and ask them to make preliminary surveys to locate the best site for a tramway and to estimate costs of construction. Many sites were considered, but Cannon Mountain was recommended. Influential factors were the volume of summer traffic through Franconia Notch, the advantage of State and Federal ownership of eleven square acres of land at the site, and the prediction that a tramway could be erected there with minor cutting and alteration to the appearance of the area.

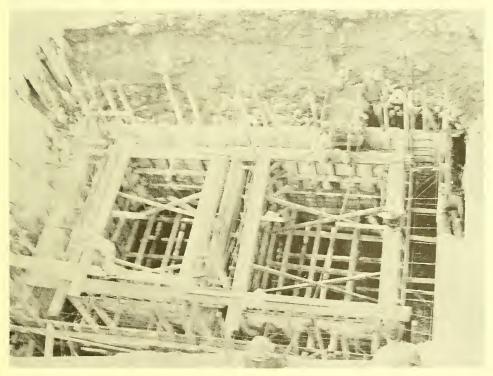
Alexander Bright's idea appealed to an increasing number of people because of the growing interest in skiing and the hope that an influx of skiers would provide a much needed boost to the winter economy of the region. Roland Peabody was a prime mover in arousing the support that led to the introduction in the New Hampshire Legislature of a bill which called for the erection of a tramway on Cannon Mountain at a cost of \$250,000.

On June 17, 1937, the bill was approved. How rapidly the project took shape! Bids were called for on August 16, and the announcement that the contract had been awarded to the American Steel and Wire Company was made on August 26, 1937. The autumn of '37 saw commencement of construction of the first aerial passenger tramway in North America. Detailed profile surveying had been completed during the summer, and actual construction began in September on what was to become a year-round attraction for hundreds of thousands of vacationers over the next forty plus years.

The prime contractor, American Steel and Wire assigned S. E. Vandervoort as Field Engineer to tackle this formidable task. Approximately four dozen men, comprised of riggers, painters, laborers, carpenters, and advisory personnel were employed. Sand and cement were backpacked up the mountain to be used in constructing cable anchorages. A 3/8" cable was then hand-winched up the mountain's face to the summit station site. This, in combination with a donkey engine at the base, was then used to pull a %" cable, and subsequently two 1" cables to the summit. Wooden towers were prefabricated at the base and systematically installed up the mountainside to permit operation of a freight tramway. By December first, the freight tramway was ready and crews were able to move rapidly ahead with the task at hand. Damus Champagne, Sr., Winton Hunt, George "Red" Cawley and Newt Avery were involved in the project from its very beginning and were an integral part of its successful operation for many years.







In the following months, workers utilized 232 tons of steel, 32 carloads of sand, aggregate, and cement, and over four miles of cable. Work continued through the winter months, with manual labor predominating. The counterweight pits were hand dug to a depth of thirty five feet with pick and shovel. Rock drilling was done with sledge and hand held bits. The freight tram carried materials to tower locations and to the summit, but loading, unloading and requisite tasks were all done by hand.



With the advent of the spring of 1938, the new tramway was nearing completion. Extending 5,410 feet, the Tram had a vertical rise of 2,022 feet. The two Tram cars, handsome in their forest green paint and bearing appropriately the names of Lafayette and Lincoln, rode silently and safely on two massive track cables, 5,787 feet in length, 17/8" in diameter, and weighing 25.3 tons each. The track cables ran over three steel towers, one rising 107 feet toward the sky, and the other two reaching 85 feet. The traction or haul cable was a continuous 11,200 feet which was broken only where it was attached to each Tram car. The Lafayette and Lincoln, each with a capacity of 27 passengers and a conductor were electrically driven by a 100 horsepower D.C. motor. In case of power failure, a gasoline driven generator could supply energy. A 40 horsepower D.C. electrical auxiliary motor was also available. With an operating speed of 1,000 feet a minute, a completed trip, including loading and unloading of passengers, was possible every seven minutes.





It required just nine months to complete the construction of the Cannon Mountain Tramway. The cost was \$250,000, of which \$110,000 remained within New Hampshire. On June 28, 1938, impressive and appropriate dedication ceremonies were held at the Valley Station. The Tramway quickly became a major tourist attraction, carrying 133,204 passengers that first summer and averaging over 125,000 passengers in succeeding summers.

"The next car for the summit of Cannon Mountain will be leaving in seven minutes." That voice coming over the loudspeaker could be heard in every parking lot, and was the introduction to a "safe, smooth, scenic trip to the top of the Mountain". Waiting rooms and services were available at both Valley and Mountain Stations. The round trip fare was 95¢ for adults and 75¢ for children.

The Tramway Commission, which was authorized by the original Tramway bill and chaired by James C. MacLeod of Littleton, elected Roland E. Peabody as the first Managing Director. He served in this capacity until his untimely death in 1950 and was succeeded by his son, Roger Peabody. Newton Avery held the new title of Assistant Park Manager for many years and served as acting Park Manager following Roger Peabody's resignation in 1954. William Norton of Sugar Hill was then appointed Park Manager, a position which he continues to hold.

The winter of 38-39 brought the first paying winter customers to Cannon Mountain. The skiers were greeted at the Mountain top by the same spectacular views as admired in summer, and in addition, the Richard Taft and the Cannon trails were an invitation. The C. C. Corps had been busy during the summer of 1938, cutting the Cannon trail. This now famous, intermediate ski trail, over two miles in length, combined with the Taft trail and a practice slope which was serviced by a rope tow, to offer challenge and satisfaction to winter enthusiasts. No longer did skiers have to make a long climb to ski the Taft trail, but could ride the Tramway, ski down the Race course, and take a shuttle bus back to the Base Station. The first winter that season tickets were offered, the rate was \$60.00.

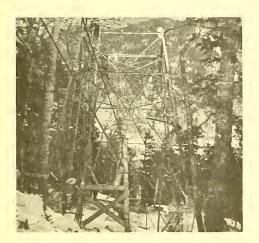
Ensuing years would see Cannon Mountain grow and prosper and become one of the major ski areas in the Country. The Tramway would continue to be the focal point of this giant recreational complex. Today, a season ticket costs \$333.00, a reflection in part of the growth of the Mountain. The Tramway and the Mountain have indeed been a boon and a dominant factor in the development of Franconia as a year round recreational area.

A list of those who were associated with the early years of the

Tramway operation and who were responsible for its renown as a respected tourist attraction and a reputable ski area would be long indeed. It would have to include those who came to Franconia to work on the construction and remained to work in various capacities at the Mountain and to make their homes nearby. Bill Hodge, Elwood Lewis, Archie Straw and Roy Bowles comprise a special list of those who helped, each in his own way, to create the atmosphere of the mountain. Then there were the young men in their custom-designed uniforms who were the first summer guides and became the first paid, professional ski patrol in winter. How many high school boys, who earned their rides on the Tramway by packing ski trails after each snow fall and who learned their skiing skills on the Mountain went on to become racers and bring glory to the name of Cannon! The name of Roland Peabody would be at the top of the list, for his leadership and management during the early years did much to shape the image of Cannon Mountain and build its reputation. Almost all the men and women who worked at Cannon during the early years and who were responsible for giving the Mountain almost a family atmosphere which appealed to the skiers, are no longer there in their various positions. The traditions that were established remain, and there are many in Franconia and in the area who remember.
