

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TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Fremont, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Fremont, on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at eleven-thirty of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and take such action as Town deems necessary.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges, Care of Cemeteries, Street Lighting, Support of Poor, Old Age Assistance, Maintenance of Highways and Bridges, General Expenses of Highway Department, Public Library and Memorial Day for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.06 for town road aid.

- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to be used in Grading Roads and Replacing Culverts.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,050.00 for the use of the Fremont Fire Department.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for fighting forest fires.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for spraying and removing diseased trees.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at private sale or public auction land acquired by Tax Collector's deed.
- 11. To see what action the Town will take by ballot on the following question: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws, relative to playing Beano be adopted in this Town?".
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to prohibit the use of rifles in the Town of Fremont, except that 22 calibre rifles may be used for target practice under sponsorship of a suitable organization on ranges approved by that organization—both organization and ranges subject to the approval of the Board of Selectmen.

13. To transact any other business that may be deemed necessary.

REPORT OF CHIEF OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

The year 1954 passed with plenty of rain which kept forest and brush fires at a minimum. The most disastrous fire was the one which destroyed the barn and stock of Herman Bishop. This fire was caused by lightning.

A problem has been presented to the Fire Department due to the installation of dial telephones in the near future. At the present time, a call to the Chief's home or place of business is the method of procedure in reporting a fire. If no response is received in either place, our local telephone operator would proceed to call Piper's Lunch Room, Spaulding and Frost Mill, or the Assistant Chief, according to a list filed at her office. She could also cut a busy connection to obtain a desired number. Soon, however, with no local operator, much time could be lost looking up a series of telephone numbers, and there is no quick way of breaking in on a busy line.

To take care of this situation, many towns have installed what is called a "Red Network". This was created to meet such a situation where a firehouse has no constant attendant. The "Red Network" consists of a seperate telephone line connected to four homes or places of business and all four phones ring simultaneously. If such a system were adopted in this town, stickers bearing the network number would be distributed to each regular phone holder to be attached to his telephone.

There may be other and better solutions to this problem, and the department is open to suggestions and final action by the voters of the town.

I should like to report that during the past year the exterior of the firehouse has been painted and also all windows and casings on the inside.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN A GOOD RECORD

As we go into 1955, it is pleasant to review briefly the excellent record achieved in 1954. The Warden and Deputy Wardens of this State reported 393 fires which burned 300 acres of forest land and 388 acres of grass land, a record, although achieved partly through an assist from the favorable weather, shows what prompt suppression action can do. Most of our fires occurred during a few bad fire days in the spring, but we had spells in August and in October when fires could have been destructive. Holding the average fire

to .76 acres of forest land is a record we can well be proud of. We remember 1954 as a wet, cool year, and yet if it weren't for the hurricane rains, the total rainfall would only be a little above normal.

I would like to thank all the helpers I had in 1954 to keep the forest fires we had small ones. Let's not forget the Deputy Wardens who had a hand in maintaining the good record. Deputy Wardens are Russ Copp, Sam Sanborn, "Pokey" Fuller, Curt Sanborn, Laurence Pettengill and Lee Moulton.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Fremont:

It is with pleasure that I submit my fifth annual report as your Superintendent of schools.

It has been proven that no matter how far sighted one attempts to be, circumstances sometimes arise that alter cases. Such has been true in Fremont. By using the best information available last Spring it was thought that the year 1954-55 would find us with sizeable first and second grades plus a combined third and fourth grade of 45 pupils.

The following table will show what we found when school opened in September:

In fact school opened with 13 pupils less than in 1953-54. This called for a change of plans. Mrs. Barbara Bean who had been appointed helping teacher for grades 3 and 4, very graciously resigned from that position as it was felt with such a small first grade a more economical arrangement should be made.

Consequently 6 second grade pupils were assigned to Miss White's room while 11 of the third grade were assigned to Miss Brooks, this distributing the pupil load. I am happy to say that the plan has worked out very well in every respect.

Because of the small first grade class, this year and next it has been felt advisable to return to the former system of 2 grades to each teacher.

How long this can go on is a question, but census figures indicate no real increase in school population, and up to this point Fremont has been the only town in Union No. 14 with decreased school enrollment.

NEW TEACHERS

Mr. Paul D. Beeman, U.N.H. 1951 and the Conversion Course at U.N.H. 1954. Mr. Beeman replaces Kenneth Field in grades 7-8 and will coach baseball.

Miss Virginia Brooks, K.T.C. 1954 to replace Mrs. Ruth Lavine as teacher of grade 2.

Miss Sara Jane Cummings, U.N.H. "54" to replace Miss Irene Tanguay who resigned to marry. Miss Cummings is doing an outstanding job in her first year as music instructor.

HOT LUNCH

Mrs. Petit with the help of Mrs. Kimball, Mrs. Bean and other interested mothers is carrying on her usual fine school lunch program. A well balanced and tasty meal has been a big asset during this recent spell of sub-zero weather. The continued interest and support of the P.T.A. is a prime factor in the success of the program.

REPAIRS AND REPLACEMENTS

The building of the baseball backstop has improved the playground considerably, the basketball court should be ready in the Spring; all classrooms and the teachers' room were painted during the summer; new furniture was bought to complete Mrs. Carney's room. All of these items are important factors in the proper maintenance of any school. Continued effort should be made to remove small stones from the playground, as they continue to constitute a danger in baseball as well as any sport calling for running or jumping. All of these projects are examples of how your School Board, citizens and teachers are working hand in hand for continued progress in the education of Fremont's future citizens.

GUIDANCE AND TESTING

As Mr. Scanlan's report follows, I will only say that I am happy with the worthwhile progress being made. It is planned that with the program now well organized, more time will be spent on the Vocational aspects of Guidance. This will broaden the scope of guidance work throughout the Union.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, Citizens, Teachers and pupils for their friendly cooperation. It has made my work pleasant.

NURSE'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools, School Board Members and Citizens of Fremont:

It gives me pleasure to present this, my second report, to you.

Health functions are continuing as before. Much of the school nurse-teacher's work is dependent upon teacher observation. Through working in close relationship with them, we can more easily attain the objectives of the school nursing program. These are primarily to provide learning experiences for the child, not only that he may become more self-directing in matters relating to his own health, but also that he may become more aware of his responsibilities to others.

This year the N.H. State Department of Education has published its first guide for a school health program. A copy has been sent to the School Board and to your school. I hope everyone will acquaint himself with the contents of this manual, not only to become aware of recent trends in school nursing, but also that we may all work together to attain the highest health goals for our children. It cannot be stressed too strongly that if a child does not have good health, he is not a whole person, and therefore cannot possibly achieve what his potentialities would otherwise allow.

Pertaining to this fact, I would like to make two suggestions, the fulfillment of which would be of great benefit to the children.

First, I would like to see a physician obtained for the school. This could be a simple matter in relation to expense to the town, and time expended by a doctor, and yet be a great value to the well-being of our children.

Second, I should like to see a dental program begun in your school. If a sum not exceeding \$50.00 is sent to the State Bureau of Dental Services by March first of this year, there is a possibility that this amount will be matched by them for use next school year.

In closing, I should like to thank all who have helped in making the school nursing program successful.

GUIDANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of School's, members of the School Board, and Citizens of Fremont:

It is with pleasure that I submit to you my third annual report as Director of Guidance.

The choosing of their career and the planning of their education with that goal in mind is one of the most important decisions that our pupils will make in their lifetime. It is the philosophy of Guidance that there is a fitting vocation for every boy and girl, one to which his or her aptitudes and interests are well geared and in which that student may discover the satisfactions of achievement and self-realization, and, further, that each individual boy or girl should be provided with the opportunity, the incentive, and the time, to make this choice wisely with the help of adequate information about himself or herself and adequate information about the vocation in which they are interested.

Through the program of Guidance services—the settingup of the Individual Inventory for each pupil, the testing of each pupil with the University of New Hampshire Occupational Guidance Tests, the Occupational Information file, the Bulletin Board program at Sanborn Seminary and at Ellis School, and the individual counseling conferences with the Guidance Director, thirty-four of the pupils of Fremont reaching that stage in their lives when they must make that decision have this year had those very important advantages.

An objective of a program of Guidance services which is reached after a few years of that program's operation is a wiser and more mature attitude toward the choosing of their careers by the pupils. This attitude is developing

among our Fremont boys and girls, and this change is taking place even among our seventh grade pupils. It is needless to state that when a vocational career is chosen early school becomes more purposeful.

The testing program covering the 4th and 6th grades was carried out early this year. The twenty-two 4th grade and the fourteen 6th grade pupils were tested on the attainment of Reading, Arithmetic, and Language skills. Mr. Saulnier did the testing. The results indicate the excellent work our teachers are doing.

These tests, along with the individual tests, are helping to provide for us a more complete picture of the pupil—his academic ability, his special aptitudes and his weaknesses, his interests, and his personality. We can then see more clearly his needs and provide for them. We are directing our attention this year to those students who may not be reaching a desired standard in the Reading skills. During the current months we are making plans for steps which will help those students become more proficient in this all-important ability.

We are spending now about forty percent of our time in developing our Elementary School Guidance program. In this part of the overall program we work with the pupils in the earlier grades—from the first up. Because of difficulties which may arise in the earlier years of their schooling a poor attitude may develop. The techniques of Guidance are techniques by means of which these pupils may be taught to adopt as their own those habits of mind and emotion which will result in a more healthy attitude. This year six pupils are being worked with on this basis.

The Child Study course for parents, so well received in the past two years, will be held again this year in the union. In order to make it easier for more parents to attend it is planned to hold it in April when the weather, it is hoped, will be better. This course is one of the areas of the Guidance program which we are trying to develop and one to which we look forward in the future with a great deal of hope. It is a long-term project and we are much encouraged by the response of the parents to it.

In closing I would like to say that because this is a Pilot Program in Guidance and the first in New Hampshire to be tried on a union basis there has been a great deal of attention centered on it both by other school systems interested in guidance for their own pupils and by officials of the State Board of Education. The comments made by these educational leaders have been very encouraging. For my part, I would like to say that a large part of the success of the program is a result of the extremely high order of cooperation and support given it by the Superintendent, the members of the School Board, the teachers, and the parents of Fremont. For this cooperation and support I would like to express my sincere thanks.
