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TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Goffstown, in the County of Hillsborough and in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall in Goffstown Village on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

First—To choose all Town Officers and Agents for the ensuing year, including a member of the Board of Selectmen for three years.

Second—To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Goffstown Public Library.

Third—To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance and improvements in our Cemeteries.

Fourth—To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred (\$400.00) Dollars for the suppression of the White Pine Blister Rust.

Fifth--To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to borrow from time to time, as needed, certain sums of money in anticipation of taxes, not to exceed in total at any time the sum of Forty-five Thousand (\$45,-000.00) Dollars, giving the Selectmen the right to renew said loans in anticipation of taxes as may be found necessary. Sixth—To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the Town through the Tax Collector's Deeds.

Seventh—To see if the Town will vote to allow its Selectmen to dispose of a piece of land located on the New Boston Road and formerly used for a Gravel Bank.

Eighth—To see if the Town will vote to allow its Selectmen to renew the Bridge note, so called, held by the Hillsborough County Savings Bank, upon which Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars is due August 1, 1943, at such times as the bank may require.

Ninth—To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for improvement of Class Five Roads and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand One Hundred Eight and 27/100 (\$1,108.27) Dollars, the State to contribute Four Thousand Four Hundred Thirty Three and 08/100 (\$4,433.08) Dollars.

Tenth—To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars to provide for additional Fire, Police and Health protection, due to the War Emergency.

Eleventh—To see if the Town will vote to buy One Thousand feet of two and one-half inch fire hose and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Twelfth—To see what action the Town will take as to increasing the pay of the Road Agents and Laborers on our Highways and the Firemen of our Fire Department.

Thirteenth—To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of erecting a garage to house the Town motorized equipment. Fourteenth—To see what action the Town will take of an act recently passed by the General Court regarding adoption of the following: To provide for Non-Partisan Ballot System for Town Elections.

Fourteenth-A—To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Fifteenth—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor, construction and maintenance of highways and bridges, and all other necessary Town Expenses for the ensuing year, including the amount required for Memorial Day^{*}.

Sixteenth—To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees and pass any vote relating thereto.

Seventeenth—To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Goffstown, N. H.-March 10, 1942

Meeting opened at 8:00 o'clock in the forenoon by moderator Alfred W. Poore. Article One of the warrant was read and checklist posted. On motion of R. M. Gordon it was voted that the polls be now open for voting, that the balance of Warrant be read and articles 2 to 17 be acted upon at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon. That the polls close at 6:30 o'clock and that our next Annual Town Meeting open at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

Polls were now opened for voting.

1:30 P.M. Balance of Warrant read by the Clerk.

On motion of Fred R. Davis it was voted to substitute article 17 and act on it at this time. Mr. Davis then made some very appropriate remarks regarding Mr. George L. Eaton and a rising vote of thanks was given him for his 39 years of service as Selectman. Mr. Davis then spoke regarding the contents of the Town Report and suggested some added information that should be given in future reports. He also spoke regarding the heating system in our School buildings. Gave information on changes that should be made and recommended the installation of a sprinkler system.

The following officers were elected in open meeting.

It was voted to have the Town Books audited by a Certified Public Accountant.

Budget Committee Appointed for Three Years Frank W. Bartlett, Jean B. Moquin, Leland Stanyan, George E. Jenkins and Elizabeth B. Holt.

Report of the Budget Committee was given by the Chairman, Lawrence W. Shirley.

ARTICLE 2. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Hundred and Fifty (\$1150.00) Dollars for the Goffstown Public Library.

ARTICLE 3. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars for the maintenance and improvement in our Cemeteries.

ARTICLE 4. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for maintenance and improvement in the Barnard Playground.

ARTICLE 5. Voted to dismiss this article.

ARTICLE 6. Voted to allow the Selectmen to borrow from time to time as needed certain sums of money in anticipation of taxes, not to exceed in total at any one time the sum of Forty-five Thousand (\$45,000.00) Dollars giving the Selectmen the right to renew said loan as may be found necessary. ARTICLE 7. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any Real Estate acquired by the Town through the Tax Collectors deeds.

ARTICLE 8. Voted to allow the Selectmen to renew the Bridge note, so called, held by the Hillsborough County Savings Bank, upon which Seven Thousand (\$7,000.00) Dollars is due August 1, 1942 at such times as the bank may require.

ARTICLE 9. Voted to accept State Aid for class five (5) roads and raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand One Hundred six and 93/100 (\$1106.93) Dollars, the State to contribute Four Thousand Four Hundred Twenty-seven and 71/100 (\$4,427.71) Dollars.

ARTICLE 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred (\$400.00) Dollars for the Collection of Garbage in the Fifth District and that the Selectmen be authorized to have the rubbish collected.

ARTICLE 11. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars to provide for additional Fire, Police and Health protection due to War Emergency.

ARTICLE 12. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred and Twenty-five (\$525.00) Dollars for the purchase of Five Hundred (500) feet of two and one half $(2\frac{1}{2})$ inch fire hose.

ARTICLE 13. Voted that the Town accept when and if legally tendered, the gift from the Goffstown Village Fire Precinct of the land and buildings now used as a Fire Station together with the furnishings thereof and all fire fighting and lighting apparatus and equipment belonging to said Precinct wherever situated. That immediately following the transfer to the Town of the above assets the Town assume and undertake the responsibility of fire fighting and street lighting of the entire Town.

The following Fire Wardens were elected for One Year. Daniel F. Earl Carl B. Pattee

Wardens for Two Years Robert M. Gordon William S. Whipple

> Wardens for Three Years Maurice E. Farley

Voted to accept the recommendation of the Budget Committee and raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred (\$7,500.00) Dollars for said purposes.

ARTICLE 14. Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to accept and improve the extension of Summer Street already built, a distance of about Five Hundred (500) feet, and that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred (\$300.00) Dollars for the same.

Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to build extensions to Summer Street to a house or houses when such house or houses are built, provided that each future extension required does not average more than two hundred feet for each new house built.

ARTICLE 15. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-six Thousand Two Hundred Seventy-three and 86/100 (\$76,273.86) Dollars, for the support of the poor, construction and maintenance of Highways and Bridges and all other necessary Town expenses for the ensuing year, including the amount required for Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 16. Voted to accept the Printed reports.

Voted that the Insurance money in the amount of Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred (\$16,500.00) Dollars be placed in the invested funds, and left to accumulate to be used for future purposes.

A rising vote of thanks was given Carl B. Pattee for his services as Town Clerk.

We still ask for your co-operation in preventing fires for if we can prevent them in the first place we are the savers in the end.

We wish to thank the Red Cross, Canteen and all others who have served the firemen lunches or assisted them in any way.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES GOFFSTOWN PUBLIC LIBRARY

As stated in our report last year, the local Red Cross unit was granted the use of the north room in the library building for classes in Home Nursing. These classes were continued through the winter and spring and at their completion the room was finally restored to library use. After it was vacated the walls and floor of the room were refinished, after which the juvenile books were returned to their places on the shelves and it became once more the "Children's room". It is open, as formerly, on Wednesdays and Saturdays from 2 to 6 p.m. and is enjoyed by the young people and appreciated by their elders.

We were glad to co-operate with the Office of Civilian Defense by turning over the south basement room to be used as a Control Center. All library property was removed and as it can be reached by the basement door and is entirely separate from rooms used for library purposes it makes an excellent location for this war-time civilian activity.

As an economy measure it was decided to discontinue the opening of the library on Monday evenings during the winter months. We regret having to curtail service in any way and it will again be open on Monday evenings from 6:30 to 8 as soon as the weather permits. The use of library material by the schools has been encouraged as usual by putting aside books desired for outside reading and by visits of classes for instruction under the direction of Miss Marion Lathe, English teacher in the high school. Each week a box of books is sent to Grasmere where they are distributed by Mrs. Lena Ploss, who reports continuing interest by the residents of that section. Miss Marden and Miss Harrington attended library meetings in Concord and Manchester as well as the annual Book Fair in Manchester, which offers much of help and interest to all who enjoy good reading and want to learn more about books and authors.

To the Shirley Club for its donation of books and to all others who have remembered the library with gifts during the past year we wish to express our gratitude. Such manifestations of friendship are encouraging to us who are striving to make the library increasingly useful to the citizens of Goffstown.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Goffstown:

Your School Board welcomes this opportunity to express publicly its belief that the standing of the Goffstown schools compares very favorably with that of other schools of the State. That this high standard has been maintained during these months of uncertainty and change should be a cause of gratification to all of us who are vitally interested in the education of our young people.

We wish to commend our janitors, transporters, and Superintendent for the splendid way in which they have borne the additional responsibilities placed upon them this year. Especially deserving of our appreciation is our Superintendent, Mr. Atherton, upon whom the war has placed very many new and difficult duties. He has discharged them with a cheerfulness and efficiency which has been reflected upon the entire school system. We feel he is the right man in the right place.

In the summer the Board accepted with regret the resignation of Mr. Harold Huntley who, for many years, had served the Independent District as janitor of the two school buildings in Goffstown Village. This is an important position; and the Board feels it made a fortunate choice in Mr. Maurice Farley who, as a substitute last year, became somewhat acquainted with the work required.

In August, the secretary of the School Board, Mr. Philip Whittier, accepted a commission in the United States Army Air Corps. Lieut. Whittier's thorough acquaintance with matters pertaining to the management of the schools in Goffstown Village made his services on the Board particularly valuable at this time when the union of the school districts has so recently been effected.

Minor repairs have been made on all of the schools in town. The largest expenditure, about five hundred dollars, was for the roofing of the Bartlett School,—a necessary expense but one unforeseen when the budget was made last spring.

For a better understanding of the actual operation of your schools, we refer you to the other reports submitted for the information of the voters of the District.

The School Board appreciates the interest manifested in the schools by the residents of the town. Only by working together can we hope to have our schools approach their maximum of helpfulness and efficiency.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Goffstown:

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report as Superintendent of your schools.

Several changes in the teaching staff have occurred since last year. Ten of our nineteen regular class room teachers have ceased work for the district. Of these ten three have left their positions for the armed forces, one has left to assume a better teaching position elsewhere, two have transferred from teaching to other work, and four have given up teaching either temporarily or permanently for personal reasons.

Miss Alice A. August, a graduate of Boston University with three years' experience at Charlestown High School, was engaged as commercial teacher and girls' coach when Miss Doris Baker resigned in favor of a business position.

Mr. Frank C. Thompson was elected to teach mathematics and science, filling the position previously held by Miss Katharine J. McLain. Miss McLain was unable to return this year on account of her father's health. Mr. Thompson is a Bates graduate and has been teacher at Gloucester, Mass., Headmaster of Colebrook High School, Superintendent of Schools in Raymond, and a teacher for many years in Manchester Central High School.

Mrs. Ellen F. Graham replaced Mrs. Virginia Parkinson when the latter resigned her position. Mrs. Graham is a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College with several years' experience in Hopkinton, Wollaston, Mass., and Manchester.

Mr. Richard H. Erwin, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, with summer work at Yale and the University of New Hampshire, and twelve years of experience in Hudson, Gilmanton, and Suncook, was engaged as shop teacher and boys' coach. His predecessor, Mr. William Parkinson, gave up his teaching position to enlist.

Miss Ruby A. Whittemore, a graduate of Keene Teachers College with experience at Tilton-Northfield and Tamworth, replaced Mr. Raigh Mason as teacher of social studies. Mr. Mason also enlisted.

Mrs. Marion C. Zeller assumed the position as teacher of foreign languages when Mrs. Eunice Marshall resigned. Mrs. Zeller is a graduate of Middlebury College and has had several years of teaching experience in high schools in Hollis, Sharon, Mass., Malden, Mass., New Boston, and Hopkinton.

Mrs. Ursula Jensen, a graduate of Keene with teaching experience in Merrimack and Manchester, became Principal of the Bartlett School when Mr. William Rodgers resigned in favor of the army.

Mrs. Anne L. McAllister, a graduate of Fitchburg Teachers College with several years' experience at Norwood and Winchendon, Mass., and Manchester, replaced Miss Loretta Manter as Principal of the Grasmere School when the latter resigned to accept a position in Massachusetts.

Miss Caroline Nichols, trained at Keene Teachers College, replaced Mrs. Hildred Cushman as teacher at Shirley Hill School when Mrs. Cushman left teaching for industry.

During the school year Mrs. Esther Chase has succeeded Miss Lillian Westergren in the third and fourth grades at the White Building. Miss Westergren resigned early in December to live at home after her father's death. Mrs. Chase is a graduate of Keene with teaching experience at Hooksett, Ludlow, Mass., Medford, Mass., and Manchester.

The enrollment last year, as will be seen by the table at the end of the report, was 528 as compared with 510 the year before. Enrollment so far this year is smaller than a year ago, largely because some people have moved away for reasons connected with the war effort.

The work of Goffstown High School is discussed in detail in Mr. Allen's report. The school is orderly and efficient. Spirit among pupils and teachers is good.

As a result of careful and co-operative study, several changes have been made in the curriculum. Home economics has been expanded from a two to four year course. Courses in civics, salesmanship, commercial law, and consumer buying have been instituted. The mathematics courses have been reorganized. All this has been done to modernize the curriculum and provide work more practical for every-day living.

The war has brought new demands in high school training. A course in pre-flight aeronautics has been added to the curriculum this year. Mr. Allen is able to conduct the course as a result of summer study. Emphasis upon aviation is growing, and I am very glad that our high school is able to conduct such work in keeping with the times. School work in mathematics and science is being emphasized. Plans are under way for a pre-induction course in shop work and a program of physical fitness for the whole school. Many of the changes in our high school work, given an impetus by the war, are splendid and of permanent value.

In the elementary schools work is progressing well along the usual lines. The curriculum of the elementary school is not so much affected by the war. Some rooms have joined the Junior Red Cross. Teachers are encouraging pupils to buy war stamps. Both teachers and pupils cooperated splendidly in the scrap salvage campaign. In the Bartlett and Grasmere schools the older boys have done work on airplane models. The Grasmere school is fortunate in having a sewing machine loaned by parents so that the girls have been able to do practical sewing and handwork. Our high school and elementary teachers as a group have been loyal to their schools and children. They have met ever increasing demands cheerfully with labor on rationing, scrap drives, and many other programs. They have worked hard in the face of petty difficulties, increased costs of living, more taxes, and personal worries. Their work is not spectacular and dramatic, but is basically important to our community and nation. They merit a tribute for their splendid loyalty and co-operation.

Educational opportunities for our children must be maintained to the fullest possible extent. Children grow continuously. They cannot wait. They cannot relive these years through which we are passing. They must not lose the benefit of good schools. Even though teachers in several fields may be scarce, materials often difficult to obtain, and war demands on the schools ever increasing, all effort will be made to keep school work at as high a standard as possible.

Co-operation of parents, other citizens, and members of the school organization has helped materially during a critical school year. It is thoroughly appreciated.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

I herewith submit my second annual report on the Goffstown High School.

The total number of pupils enrolled in the high school last year was 193, of which number 159 finished the year. The total this year to February first is 168 (columns one and two):

The 40 seniors who were graduated last June (20 boys and 20 girls) were the largest graduating class in the history of the high school. Since graduation, nine have attended college. As of February, five girls are in college, and 15 are working; seven boys are in the Army or about to go, six are in the Navy or Navy Reserve, one is in the Marines, and six are working, most of them in defense plants. Thus 14 boys are in the armed forces.

Extra-curricular activities have remained about the same as last year: Student Council, Traffic Patrol, Traffic Court, Athletic Association, Hi-Y Club, Glee Club, Orchestra, boys' and girls' basketball, Senior and Junior Plays, and class parties. A few activities have been discontinued because pupils had little time for them. We are asked by the government to reduce non-essential activities but to maintain morale. We have added a Girls' Reserves, a dancing class similar to the one held during 1940-41, had two extra school dances, a reception for new teachers, and an exhibit for National Education Week.

The war affects us in many ways. About 37 boys and girls were dismissed a total of nearly 200 school days to help harvest crops last fall. Several teachers and pupils serve at the observation post. Model airplanes have been made in the shop for use in training schools of the armed forces. First aid cabinets have been made for local Red Cross work. Girls in the home economics courses have canned food for home use. Many of the boys and girls are in home defense organizations, such as messenger service and Red Cross work. Five ration programs have been handled through the schools, and another will have been by March. Over 50 pupils worked on a school scrap drive last fall, aided by contributions from every pupil's home and by the donation of trucks and drivers, collecting 22 tons of heavy scrap and rubber and several tons more of light metals. In December the Student Council organized a Schools at War committee to promote the sale of war bonds and stamps for the duration of the war. In the first month of the drive \$752.70 worth of stamps and bonds was sold, with 92% participation in the high school. A group of boys is receiving training after school on a volunteer basis for forest fire fighting. Three senior boys are working 20 hours a week in the Manchester N.Y.A. machine shop to prepare for defense plant work. Several junior and senior boys are taking an aeronautics course which will replace some of their ground school training in the air corps. Several pupils are taking a pre-induction course in auto driving.

Last fall eight new subjects were introduced. Six are half-year courses: Community Civics (governmental and community organization), Vocational Civics (requirements and opportunities in different kinds of work), Salesmanship, Commercial Law, Consumer Buying, and Solid Geometry. Advanced Algebra has been expanded to a full year course. Year courses in The Home (advanced domestic science training for older girls), and in Aeronautics have been added.

Changes in our high schools are being accelerated and modified by the war. Almost daily we receive some new suggestion. We must guide such changes so that they may improve our schools in meeting the needs of our children and community at the same time that they aid the war effort. There is more emphasis on mastery of subject matter, especially mathematics, science, and shop work. By the time this report is published we will probably have a program of physical fitness training for the two upper classes and some pre-induction courses besides Aeronautics as a part of the daily program. Physical training for all children should become a regular part of the curriculum. We must look ahead to our needs ten years from now as well as meet the present emergency.

High school pupils are sometimes ignorant of certain facts on the war, but they are aware of its reality and problems. They do not go into things blindly, but usually see through a proposal to its merits. They seem to realize that one of our problems is not to be rushed into doing many apparently important things at the expense of solid accomplishment. We must do good work in the modified and new subjects now in our curriculum; we must get ourselves physically fit; we must build character; we must understand and value our democratic form of government; we must work outside of school; we must try always to do better than we have done in the past.

All of us feel, but may not always realize, the strain under which we are working during this war. We of the high school faculty appreciate the co-operation and understanding shown by parents, and shall continue our efforts to make the best education possible available to every pupil.

In submitting my annual report I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Superintendent, members of the School Board, and the teachers for their interest and kind co-operation in the health work of our schools.

In the work with the school children we have had and continue to have the support and interest of our teachers who are actively interested in the correction, at least, of the most outstanding and common physical defects found in the school children such as teeth, tonsils, vision, and hearing.

In our districts there may be children with certain other serious defects who may seem to need special attention and the teachers many times bring it to my attention.

Time and service is being given by physicians and hospitals in New Hampshire in an endeavor to bring health to the crippled children of our state. A free orthopedic clinic is carried on each week in Manchester and is financed by the Crippled Children's Service.

Other clinics available to our children are the eye, ear and throat, the heart clinic, a thyroid clinic and a tubercular clinic. The audiometer test was given in May 1941 and will be given again this spring. This test is to determine how well a child can hear.

A dental clinic was given in May, 1942.

A physical education program for all normal high school boys and girls is being prepared. This is a war time program planned to contribute to the physical fitness of high school pupils as a part of the war effort.

Milk was delivered to the village school every day for those who needed it or wanted it.
