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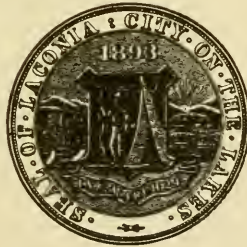

ORGANIZATION of the City Government

Tuesday, March 26, 1935

At ten o'clock in the forenoon of the above date, members-elect of the city council for the municipal year of 1935, and the members from the previous council, met for organization at the city council room agreeably to the provisions of the city charter.

The oath of office was administered to the Mayor-elect, Hon. Walter E. Dunlap, by Harold E. Wescott, Esq. after which retiring Mayor Carroll introduced Mayor Dunlap to the Council and visiting friends. The oath of office was also administered to the following councilmen by Mr. Wescott.

Prayer was then offered by the Rev. Ernest R. Caswell after which the Mayor delivered his inaugural address.

INAUGURAL ADDRESS

of Hon. Walter E. Dunlap, March 26, 1935

Gentlemen of the Council and visitors:

In assuming the duties as Mayor of our city I wish to state that I was elected with no strings around my neck as I made no promises before election and therefore have no promises to be held to.

“I can and will promise you an honest administration, careful expenditures and equal rights to all.”

“I will endeavor to work whole-heartedly with the council and sincerely seek their co-operation so that we may work together in harmony, in the best interests of the city.”

The Old War Horse, our retiring Mayor Carroll, has set a pretty fast pace for any one who succeeds him to equal, and his many achievements are a credit to him and his council, over whom he presided.

I shall use my political friends and my political enemies alike. I have no bouquets to toss and no lemons to throw. I earnestly plead with my councilmen to cast politics to one side so that we can unite in giving to the city the very best that is in us.

We shall have to step some to keep pace with the outgoing Mayor and council, in giving the city a good administration.

I recommend that the several projects instituted by Mayor Carroll be carried to completion.

It occurs to me that owing to interest rates being so low at present, the amount of discount allowed for early payment of taxes should be reduced or omitted entirely;

when interest rates were five or six percent this means of securing funds to meet running expenses for the first half of the year was very acceptable, but now that condition does not exist and to reduce our interest charges it is advisable to save accordingly.

“We will pick up the reins of government now and give our utmost in giving to the city an administration as fine as that given by Mayor Carroll and his Council,” and pledge an honest administration, careful expenditures and equal rights to all.

MUNICIPAL REGULATIONS

for payment of bills against the city

All bills against the city must be approved by the persons authorizing the charge; unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the committee on accounts and claims, and no order will be given for its payment.

When bills are certified to as above, and left with the City Clerk not later than Thursday at 12 o'clock M., preceding the last Monday of each month, they will be audited by the committee on accounts and claims, and if approved by them and allowed by the Council, will be ready for payment on the following Wednesday, at the office of the City Treasurer.

Meetings of the committee on accounts and claims are held on Friday preceding the last Monday of each month at 7.30 P. M., at the City Clerk's Office.

Section 5—PENALTY. The penalty for a violation of the provisions of this chapter shall be punished by suspension of the license of the offender for such time as the Court deems wise, and, in extreme cases, shall be punished by revocation of the license of the offender.

Section 6—This Ordinance shall take effect as of July 1, 1935, and all Ordinances or parts thereof which are inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

On Saturday the hours shall be from nine o'clock in the forenoon until ten o'clock in the afternoon. There shall be no restrictions on Sunday.

Section 2—This Ordinance shall be effective only during the months of June, July, August and September.

Section 3—Penalty. Any person violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not more than five dollars for each offense.

Section 4—This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage, and all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 2—This Ordinance shall not be construed to prevent the operation of any radio broadcasting station operating by virtue of license from the Federal Communications Commission, nor to prevent such radio station from advertising over the station.

Section 3—Any person, firm, or corporation violating the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not more than ten dollars for each offense.

Section 4—This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

CONTRACTS

AGREEMENT, made this 20th day of August 1935 A. D. by and between the City of Laconia, a municipal corporation established in the County of Belknap, and State of New Hampshire, hereinafter called the City, and the Public Service Company of New Hampshire, a corporation duly organized under New Hampshire laws and doing business in said Laconia, hereinafter called the Company.

This Contract shall cancel and supersede a similar contract now in force and executed by said parties the 28th day of September 1925.

The Company in consideration of the agreements of the City hereinafter contained agrees that it will install, maintain, and operate for and during the period of ten years beginning on the date of this Contract series alternating current street lamps of the latest type of the capacity in candle power as hereinafter specified, and will furnish and maintain all the fittings, connections and accessories thereto as required for the safe and efficient operation of said lamps during the term of this Contract. The City shall grant to the Company necessary authority to erect and maintain upon the public highways within the city all poles, wires and fixtures necessary for supplying electric energy to said lamps.

DESCRIPTION OF LAMPS.

The minimum number of lamps to be furnished by the Company and used by the City under this Contract is hereby defined as follows: Six hundred (600) Series Incandescent street lights, candle power of same to be as ordered by City Government.

The foregoing lamps are to be paid for by the City at the following prices:

1,000 candle power lamps at	\$100.00 each per annum
600 candle power lamps at	70.00 each per annum
400 candle power lamps at	65.00 each per annum
250 candle power lamps at	36.00 each per annum
100 candle power lamps at	25.00 each per annum
60 candle power lamps at	20.00 each per annum
40 candle power lamps at	18.00 each per annum

At any time upon request of the City, the Company will quote price for lamps of other capacities than those above specified, such prices to be proportional to the foregoing prices; and if the City desires any lights of such different capacities and is unable to agree with the Company as to the proportional price to be paid for the same, any difference of opinion shall be settled by a board of arbitration to be chosen as provided below in the paragraph entitled "Improved Methods." Any such light shall be included in the computation of the minimum as above provided.

HOURS OF LIGHTING.

The lamps are to be kept lighted continuously every night, and shall be started within thirty minutes after sunset and kept in operation until at least thirty minutes before sunrise, it being understood that when weather conditions require, they shall be turned on and kept lighted as much longer as may be necessary in order to furnish suitable illumination of the streets.

TYPE OF LAMPS.

The lamps to be furnished under this Contract are commonly known as series, street lighting, lamps, and shall be of the latest improved type for said purpose. They shall be renewed by the Company whenever burned out, broken, or reduced in efficiency to a point of eighty per cent

of rated candle power. The shades, brackets and other devices in connection with the lamps shall be of suitable type to the satisfaction of the City or its representatives. Lamps shall be suspended at such height and at such points over the highway as the City may determine so far as practicable.

SAFETY OF APPARATUS.

The lamps, wires and all accessories shall be thoroughly insulated and so placed and cared for as not to expose the public or property to danger, or necessarily interfere with the fire alarm or fire department. If any repairs or renewals which may be required for any of the apparatus shall be neglected by the Company, they shall be furnished within twentyfour hours after notice from the City; and if not so furnished shall be made by the City at the expense of the Company, to be deducted from any amount due or to become due under this Contract.

TESTS.

It is understood and agreed that the City may make tests at any time to determine the capacity, candle power or condition of the lamps, and that the Company shall cooperate in every particular to furnish facilities for said purposes.

INDEMNITY.

The Company shall indemnify and save harmless the City from any loss, cost or damage which it may suffer by reason of any suits for liability for damage to persons or property resulting from the installation, operation or management by the Company of said lamps or accessories, or the lines and apparatus used in connection therewith, unless such damage shall result from the negligence of the City or its employees, but nothing herein contained shall in any way be construed as an admission of possible liability on the part of the City.

PATROL AND ALLOWANCES.

The City agrees that in the district covered by its police patrol it will have its patrolmen inspect the operation of the lights and report through the police department all cases of failure of lamps to operate. In outlying districts not covered by the police patrol, the Company agrees that in order to provide reliable service it will maintain a reasonable system of patrol.

The Company shall make allowance to the City for any time during which said lamps or any of the same shall not be kept in operation for any reason, the allowance to be based *pro rata* upon the prices herein provided. In case the parties shall be unable to agree as to the amount of allowance, it shall be referred to a competent disinterested third party to be mutually agreed upon, and in case the parties are unable to agree upon a referee within five days after any such question shall arise, the Judge of the Municipal Court for the City of Laconia shall select a referee. The decision of said referee shall be final and binding on both parties.

ADDITIONAL LIGHTS.

The Company will furnish any additional lights of the sizes herein defined for the same prices as specified above, which shall be furnished and maintained whenever located by the City for the remaining period of the Contract, provided, such additional lights are within an average distance of five hundred (500) feet of the then existing pole line; if such additional lights are more than an average of five hundred (500) feet from the then existing pole line, then the City shall pay for the expense of the extension of the line over and in excess of said average of five hundred (500); the City, however, shall not be obliged to pay any part of the expense of any extension of then existing pole

lines, when such extension is used by the Company for commercial purposes, and in the event of any extension toward the expense of which the City has made contribution, as above provided, being subsequently used for commercial purposes, then the Company shall pay back to the City the amount of such contribution, upon all the terms and conditions as herein provided.

IMPROVED METHODS.

The Company further agrees that after three years from the date of this Contract, if it shall be found that cheaper methods of electric lighting are practicable, it will give to said City the benefit of said cheaper methods, provided said City will allow as a proper part of the cost, the expense, if any, of making the change to said cheaper methods, so far as the cost of change effects the cost to said Company of doing the business. If the parties hereto cannot agree as to the allowance to be made on account of said cheaper methods, the prices, to be paid by the City to the Company after such changes are made shall be determined as follows: The Board of Public Works of the City shall appoint a referee, the Company shall appoint a referee, and the two so chosen shall select a third, who shall be Chairman. The decision of the three referees shall be final, and the Contract thereafter be modified accordingly.

AGREEMENT OF THE CITY.

In consideration of the foregoing agreements of the Company, the City agrees that it will, subject to any and all rights it has or may have under any of the terms and conditions of this agreement, and to the right of the City to change the candle power of lights as above provided, use all the above described lamps for street lighting during said period of ten years and will pay the Company for said lighting service for and during said period at rates above

specified for the number of lamps above scheduled, and at the same rate for all additional lamps which may be installed as above provided. Bills to be paid monthly for the service of the preceding month.

POLES AND ARMS.

All poles shall be round, of selected quality, chesnut, white oak, cedar, cement or iron, to be straight, and the wooden poles to be not less than ten inches in diameter at six feet from the butt end and not less than seven inches in diameter at the top, the same to be approved by the Committee on Street Lighting of said City as conforming to said requirements, to be located and set under their direction and with their approval, and to be kept painted of a color designated and approved by them. And said City may use any one of the cross arm spaces on each of said poles for fire alarm or other municipal wires free of cost, the proper location of said wires on any pole to be agreed upon by said Company and the superintendent of the Fire Alarm and the Chief of the Fire Department of said City. Arms are to be such as will produce the most satisfactory lighting conditions, subject to the approval of the Committee on Street Lighting, of said City, and also subject to the approval of any liability insurance company which may insure said Public Service Company of New Hampshire.

PAYMENTS.

All bills to be rendered the City the first day of each month, payment of same to be made within ten days after the regular meeting of the City Council next succeeding the rendering of such bills.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT made and entered into this 3d day of December, 1935, by and between Burlon A. McGowan, party of the first part and the City of Laconia, party of the second part, Witnesseth:

That whereas the City of Laconia is desirous of furnishing its citizens with a skating rink in that part of Laconia known as the Pearl Street Fair Grounds on Pearl Street in said Laconia, and whereas the said Burlon A. McGowan is desirous of maintaining and operating said skating rink for and in behalf of said City of Laconia, the said McGowan party of the first part does hereby agree with said City of Laconia, as follows:—That for the sum of six hundred dollars, said sum to be paid in installments of \$46.15 each week commencing on Saturday December 14, 1935 and weekly thereafter for thirteen weeks, that he will do the following acts for the maintenance and operation of said rink for said city;—That he will prepare all necessary

ground on said Fair Grounds in the usual place occupied by former skating rinks, said plot of ground to be prepared to be 175 by 300 feet in its dimensions; that said skating rink after proper preparation shall be flooded by the said McGowan as soon as the weather shall permit, the said McGowan to stand any expense of thawing and repairing water pipes in case same become frozen, and after said rink is flooded he the said McGowan shall keep said rink scraped, shovelled and in good shape for skating uses, meaning hereby to keep said rink in good condition, weather permitting from December 2, 1935 to March 2, 1936. The said McGowan to file an inventory of the tools and equipment when taken and to return all tools and equipment used in as good condition, wear and tare excepted upon the expiration of this contract, and to clean up and leave the grounds in same condition as found upon the opening of spring.

And the said McGowan further agrees that he will accept an appointment as Special Police Officer, and will keep and maintain proper order at said rink during the period of this contract, without extra charge to the City of Laconia.

That the said City of Laconia in consideration of the promises and agreements on the part of the said McGowan does hereby agree with the said McGowan that it will pay the said McGowan the sum of six hundred dollars in installments of \$46.15 each Saturday commencing with Saturday December 14, 1935; for the period of thirteen weeks, the said McGowan's contract covering a period from December 2, 1935 until March 2, 1936; That it will furnish all necessary electric lights for said rink; also all water for the flooding of said rink; that it will also allow the said McGowan to maintain and operate such store or stores or rest room for the benefit of the public during the term of this

situated between Elm and Washington Sts. in said Laconia, and whereas the said Joseph Morgan is desirous of maintaining and operating said skating rink for and in behalf of said City of Laconia, the said Morgan, party of the first part does hereby agree with said City of Laconia, as follows:—That for the sum of three hundred dollars, said sum to be paid in installments of \$23.10 each week commencing on Saturday December 14, 1935 and weekly thereafter for thirteen weeks, he will do the following acts for the maintenance and operation of said rink for said city: That he will prepare all necessary ground on said Leavitt Park in the usual place occupied by former skating rink, said plot of ground to be prepared to be 135 by 175 feet in its dimensions; that said skating rink after proper preparation shall be flooded by the said Morgan as soon as the weather shall permit; the said Morgan to stand any expense of thawing and repairing water pipes in case same become frozen, and after said rink is flooded he the said Morgan shall keep said rink scraped, shovelled and in good shape for skating uses, meaning hereby to keep said rink in good condition weather permitting from December 2, 1935 until March 2, 1936. And upon the opening of spring will clean up all bankings and materials used in constructing said rink.

That the said city of Laconia in consideration of the promises and agreements on the part of the said Morgan does hereby agree with the said Morgan that it will pay the said Morgan the sum of three hundred dollars in installments of \$23.10 each Saturday commencing with Saturday December 14, 1935 for the period of thirteen weeks, the said Morgan's contract covering a period from December 2, 1935 to March 2, 1936; that it will furnish all necessary electric lights for said rink; also all water for the flooding of, said rink; that it will also allow the said Morgan to maintain and operate such store or stores or rest room for the benefit of the public during the term of this contract

as he may deem fit, said stores if erected by the said Morgan to be removed at the termination of this contract; that said City shall furnish for the use of said Morgan all necessary shovels, scrapers, and brooms, for the proper maintenance of said rink during the period of this contract; the said Morgan to file with the city clerk an inventory of the tools found or acquired at the commencement of the work, and that he shall be held liable for their return together with any new equipment purchased, in as good condition as they were received, wear and tare excepted.

And it is further agreed that said Morgan will accept an appointment as Special Police Officer, and will keep and maintain proper order at said rink during the period of this contract without extra charge to the City of Laconia.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTEN- DENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Laconia:

I herewith present my nineteenth annual report for your consideration.

During the school year 1934-1935 there was a slight drop in membership from the previous year in the elementary grades, 18 in grades I-VI and 14 in grades VII-VIII, but there was increase of 21 in grade IX-XII.

Comparison of last year's figures with those of 1923-1924, only twelve years ago, shows that the membership in the lower six grades has increased only 131, while in grades VII and VIII and in IX-XII there have been increases of 114 and 274 respectively, or a total of 388 in the high school. The increases in the upper grades are probably due to three causes: 1. lack of employment, especially for boys and girls; 2. increased enrollment from the parochial schools. Many of these boys and girls are attracted to high school by the practical arts courses. 3. increased demands from employers and further desire on part of parents and pupils for a high school training. This desire on the part of boys and girls for an education has been very pleasing and although the overcrowded conditions resulting in the high school have been somewhat trying both to teachers and to pupils all have tried to accept the situation in a sportsmanlike way.

The last school year could be called successful, both in the elementary schools and in the high school, in spite of the large numbers many of the teachers had in their classes. The splendid co-operation of our teachers deserves commendation.

During the year concerts and other ways of raising money were arranged in several of the grade buildings with the result that pictures were purchased, playground apparatus was erected, library books were added and in one school a duplicating outfit was bought. An attempt to build up a library in each building is being made and gifts of suitable books will be appreciated.

Last May the New Hampshire State Music Festival was held in Laconia. The high school orchestra tied for first place with Keene. The school band, organized last year by Mr. Blanchette, with the valued assistance of Mr. John St. Clair, won first place in its class. Again our glee clubs carried off the honors. The great success of this festival was made possible by the co-operation of the Mayor and the City Council and the people of Laconia, many of whom assisted by opening their homes to the visitors from other schools and in many other ways.

The untiring and conscientious work of Miss Carolyn Wright for nine years supervisor of music in our schools was apparent in the success of our musical organizations whether in state festivals, in concert and operetta programs or in the smaller programs that were presented for various organizations of the school and of the city.

Last spring the debating season came to a close by the winning by our debaters of the New England contest. This entitled our debating teams to enter the national contests at Kent, Ohio. This trip was made possible through the co-operation of the Laconia Evening Citizen which sponsored a fund for the purpose, and of the citizens and organizations that contributed to this fund.

In the annual scholarship contest held at the Normal Schools last May the team in United States History from the high school won first place.

The graduates of the high school in the Freshman class at the University of New Hampshire last year won the Phi Kappa Phi Award for the third consecutive time. This award is given each year to the high school whose graduates have the highest scholarship average during Freshman year at the University.

At the end of the year resignations were received from Miss Carolyn Wright, supervisor of music; Miss Lucy

Lundell, Latin; Miss Erma Tetley, English; Miss Eleanor Stott, History; Miss Winnifred Atwood, Grade I, Harvard Street; Miss Muriel McCullough, Grades V and VI, Washington Street. During the year the resignations of Miss Dorothy Aldrich and Miss Jennie Munkittrick had been accepted. All of these young ladies gave up teaching to be married excepting Miss McCullough who accepted a position at her home, Waltham, Mass. Miss Kathleen Davison was granted a leave of absence for one year for study at Boston University.

1935—1936

At the opening of school in September Miss Thurston was transferred to Harvard Street from Academy Street where her place was taken by Miss Helen Maxcy. At Washington Street Miss Ann Nichols came to the upper grades.

Miss Helen Cazneau, a graduate of Boston University School of Music, and Philip Blanchette, a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music, were elected supervisor and assistant supervisor of music.

It had been known for some time that the work in music was too strenuous for one person and there was need of some one to direct the school band and a second orchestra.

In the high school there was need for two more teachers because of the increased number of classes. The new teachers in the high school are Miss Carolyn Dodge, Latin; Miss Doris Wilson, English; Stanley L. Harding, Mathematics; Miss Evelyn McCawley, Mathematics; Miss Eileen Collins, Mathematics; Wilfred E. Creteau, French; Miss Mary Hynes, History; and Willard Smith, Biology and Economics. Mr. Smith, as sub-master, also helps in the administration of the school.

All of the new teachers have had special training for their work and several of them have had considerable experience before coming to Laconia.

Enrollment in the elementary schools is about the same as last year, although there has been a decrease in the lower grades in many places. Again there has been an increase of about fifty in the high school. It would seem as if the enrollment in the high school had just about reached its peak unless there is an increase in population.

The increased room made possible by the erection of the new building will not only give better facilities for the practical arts courses but will be a great help in all of the work of the high school.

Much of the confusion and unrest of the present time should be eliminated if the school is well organized and administrated when the new facilities are available.

A great deal of credit belongs to the teachers for the efficient manner in which the programs of American Education Week were carried out.

Thrift is being taught in all of the schools and at the present time there are 1849 operating accounts with a bank balance of approximately \$19,500. The elementary schools have better than 90% of the pupils depositing weekly but in the high school only about 60% of the pupils take advantage of the opportunity. Many boys and girls by small weekly deposits have accumulated funds for extra expenses in high school and for graduation expenses.

The Student Activities Association is another feature that merits attention of parents of high school pupils. By a payment of 10 cents a week for 20 weeks in the lower three grades and 25 weeks in the upper grades a pupil is entitled to the benefits of all activities of the school besides contributing to his class treasury. All activities under this plan are self-supporting excepting athletics, although only about 60% of the pupils purchase activities tickets.

It is impossible to enumerate all of the gifts and help during the past year, for which we are most grateful.

There is one outstanding service that cannot go without mention and that is the gift of the Kiwanis Club of forty uniforms for the school band. These uniforms are very attractive and as they are of very good quality will last for a long time.

As has been its custom for several years the Rotary Club has made a very generous contribution from the receipts of the annual Hospital Rotary Fair for use among crippled and underprivileged children.

Often times inconvenience may be avoided if people who are thinking of employing graduates or boys or girls from the high school will consult some one at the school regarding their qualifications. It surely is unfair to the school and to the boy or girl to engage him for some particular work without learning anything about his qualifications for that work.

The Evening Schools have had a total enrollment of about 200 this year. At the present time 7 classes are running.

Three Nursery Schools with a registration of 75 boys and girls from two to four years of age opened December 13. These are conducted by the W.P.A.

1936

1. A complete re-organization of the high school will be necessary when the new building is available. It is expected that many of the difficulties that now exist will be eliminated.

2. More teachers should be provided both in the elementary schools and in the high school.

3. Badly needed repairs should be made at some of the elementary buildings and playgrounds should be improved at all.

4. The gymnasium should be remodelled and the athletic field should be finished so that the boys and girls may have better facilities for their recreation and games.

The schools of Laconia have not taken a backward step as have schools in many communities in the country. They should advance and improve, and with the continued support and co-operation of teachers, parents and School Board they will reach new standards.

of the Laconia City Council:*

The trustees of the hospital are confident that they were fully justified in making the recent enlargement.

The report of Miss Williams, superintendent, shows the increase in the work done the past year. What better protection can we provide for the sick and unfortunate than to maintain a place where they can have care and assistance necessary to enable them to return to their homes and loved ones and resume their accustomed duties.

During the past year the hospital has fully maintained its reputation as a first class hospital. It is not only a hospital for Laconia but for the people in every town and nearby community and can truthfully be classed as our greatest and best charitable institution.

The support it has always received from so many sources to assist in its work is ample evidence that the service is fully appreciated, and that it merits and will continue to receive from its friends their generous support.

If the money earned could be collected there is no doubt that it would soon be placed in a sound financial basis.

A recent statement shows that for a few years prior to 1933 nearly \$32,000 was charged of as worthless and that today we have charged out nearly \$37,000 a part of this is no doubt collectable.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF THE LACONIA HOSPITAL

In reviewing the hospital activities for 1935, records show that the daily average is only one more than the previous year. However, we feel the degree of illness has been much more serious. While many critically ill patients recovered, our death rate has markedly increased.

It has been a satisfaction that we have had room to accommodate all who applied for admission.

There have been few changes in our personnel. Mrs. Eliza Leazer, graduate of our school of nursing in 1932, was engaged as supervisor on Women's Surgical Floor. Miss Virginia Whitcomb was secured as a second night supervisor. Miss Phyllis Grant, who had just completed a laboratory course at University of Penn., came to us June 1st to substitute in this department during vacations. In October, Miss Ethel Dawson, R. N., an experienced Librarian was engaged to organize our filing records. This was brought about by recommendations of Dr. A. P. Campbell-Field Representative of The American College of Surgeons—who inspected our Hospital in June. Dr. Campbell also made helpful suggestions to the Committee of Trustees and Doctors—who were in process of revising Hospital By-Laws. These have since been completed and accepted.

Directors table and chairs were provided as furnishings in addition to record files, in former operating room, which serves to accommodate monthly meetings of Trustees, Doctor's Staff, Training School Committees, and weekly conferences of Supervising Nurses.

To provide for files of laboratory and X-ray, and better accommodations for view-boxes, for study of X-ray pictures, the former drug-room was connected with the X-ray department, other accommodations being provided for drugs.

The flooring laid on part of East-Wing roof, making it possible for patients in their beds to be wheeled into the open was greatly enjoyed during the hot weather, by patients confined to their beds and wheel chairs. As one patient remarked—"If they couldn't go to the mountains, it was next best to be able to see them."

In our laundry, a small hand elevator was built to transfer baskets of laundry to the basement without necessitating going out of doors. A Huebsch drying-tumbler was added to our laundry equipment. Our next installment in this department should be an ironing press.

For efficiency, it seemed necessary to purchase a second Gas-Oxygen Machine for use in the operating rooms. An Infra Red Biolite was purchased for Electro-Theraphy treatments.

New markers indicating Hospital Parking, Quiet Zone, Ambulance Entrance, have been placed in conspicuous places on the grounds.

The new chain link fence around the property of Nurses Cottage on High Street, serves to prevent it being a common thoroughfare.

The repainting of rooms, removal of varnish and re-dressing of floors in Nurses Home, upholstering of several chairs, and many other repairs have been done by men in our regular employ.

At the capping exercises, January 31st, when thirteen students received their caps, indicating their acceptance, Miss Marion Mellinger, School Nurse, gave a stimulating address on the Public Health phase of Nursing.

July 1st, a second group was accepted, and Dr. Abbie Little of the State School, told most interestingly of nursing in the mountains of the South. Mrs. Cheney, wife of Dr. Harry Cheney of Campton, in be half of the Auxiliary of New Hampshire Medical Society, awarded cash prizes to student nurses for outstanding theoretical and practical work throughout the year. The Training School Committee require all prospective students to pass a physical examination by one of doctors on Staff, and have based their acceptance of students on educational requirements of a standing of 80% or over in High School studies. At the recommendation of Training School Committee, about \$40.00 was spent for reference book for Nurses.

October 25th, Graduating exercises were held at the High School Auditorium, addresses were given by Rev. Edmund Quirk, Pastor of Lady of Lake Church, Lakeport, and Miss Marietta Barnaby, Registrar of Central Directory for Nurses, Boston. The previous evening, a very happy gathering was the class dinner served at the hospital,

attended by the Trustees, Doctors and their wives, and the Faculty. Members of Graduating class participated in post-prandial exercises.

We very much appreciate the time and interest of Mrs. Hazel Porch Gibson so generously given in training student nurses chorus for graduation exercises and for Christmas Carols.

For the Daily Papers, provided for patients, we are indebted to Maher's Bookstore for the Boston Herald, and to Dutch-Boy Bakery for Evening Citizen.

We wish to express our gratitude to Charles French, City Engineer, for his cooperation in responding to our requests in emergencies and for keeping the road to the hospital in such good condition.

We appreciate and thank our Doctors for their services in giving Class-Room lectures, and so graciously attending sick members of our hospital family.

For the many kindnesses of the good friends of the hospital we are most grateful.

We record with deep regret the death of Dr. Edwin Remick, Sr., of Tamworth, a senior member of our Associate Staff. Dr. Remick had been a practicing physician for 41 years, and had brought his patients to Laconia Hospital since it was first organized.

The Treasury of Hospital Aid was about depleted last year after providing for much of the furnishings for the new addition. To show the loyalty of this organization, I am giving a comprehensive report of the year's work:

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Honorable Mayor and members of the City Council:

The work of the Board of Health for the past year has been an attempt to further the program of past years.

The report of the milk inspector following his second year on full time shows a continued gain in milk purity as produced and sold in Laconia, and indicates the value of frequent checks and analysis of same.

An increase in the number of reported contagious cases will be noted over last year and this may attributed to the mild scarlet fever epidemic of the late fall and winter, and to the prevalence of pneumonia during the winter months, with the usual amount of contagious diseases of childhood.

Following the loss of Miss Regis Leavitt, R. N., as Public Health Nurse we were fortunate in obtaining the services of Miss Julia Periard, R. N., to carry on the work and her report will follow in this section.

No vaccination clinics as such were held this year as it was found that majority of those children entering in the fall classes had been vaccinated by their family physicians and the small number remaining were cared for by the Board of Health as they were reported by teachers and school nurse.

Through the generosity of the Honorable Mayor and members of the city council in appropriating \$100 and the co-operation of the state Division of Maternity and Child Welfare two diphtheria inoculation clinics were held, the second being held because of inclement weather on the first date selected. Thanks are also due the American Legion for the use of their home for the clinic and to the members of the Legion and Auxiliary in supplying transportation to and from the clinics.

REPORT OF THE MILK INSPECTOR

Milk inspection work in 1935 continued along the plan made possible by year-round inspection. As the work progresses it is the aim of the Board of Health to insure the consumers in Laconia a better milk and cream. It is felt that each year must show stricter adherence to the rules set forth by the City Milk Ordinance.

The farm inspection was carried on with better results because of the increased familiarity of the producers and dealers with Board of Health requirements. It is felt that increased wholesale and retail prices of milk have made possible many improvements in producers and dealers equipment and methods. The general improvement of conditions has made the inspection work more successful. The producers have been financially better able to comply with regulations.

The laboratory work was carried on with better results made possible by the purchase of new test equipment. This year saw an increased voluntary submitting of samples for testing by producers and consumers. It is felt that this shows appreciation of the service rendered.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council of Laconia:

Among the important duties of your board of trustees is the care of invested funds and to properly expend the income from this source and also the appropriation made for the library by the City Council for the care and maintenance of the library and in the purchase of new books. The usefulness of any library depends largely on a good supply of books.

No library can properly perform the service for which it was created without making this the most important duty. The income from funds of Napoleon B. Gale, E. P. Jewell, Helen A. Avery, Julia S. Busiel, William Esty and Julia A. Ladd are very helpful, but the library must continue to depend largely on the appropriation made each year by the Laconia City Council.

The circulation of books has been highly curtailed the past year from the fact that readers have taken out more non-fiction books that can be held for a period of two weeks. The distribution during the past year has been 88,709 books.

We have received from the estate of Mrs. Mary Hannaford a gift of 500 volumes that include many geneological works that are of much value. 131 other books have been received from interested friends. The trustees are very grateful to the school department for its kindness in printing a library bulletin containing a list of books added for the year from Jan. 1st, 1935 to Jan. 1st, 1936. Many people have expressed their appreciation for this bulletin.

During the spring and early summer Mrs. Lillian Taylor worked as an A.P.A. worker, and told stories in the library hall and at each playground. The large number of children that attended the story telling hour attested to the success of this project. In the fall, Mrs. Taylor returned and in December Mrs. Ruth Sharples was added as a second worker.

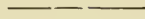

BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

We hereby submit the thirty-fifth annual report of the Board of Public Works together with the detailed report and suggestions of the City Engineer and Superintendent of Streets and Sewers.

The routine maintenance work has been carried on during the past year, also such special work as has been authorized and provided for and the accompanying reports show in detail all expenditures in the various accounts.

Several new surface drains and sanitary sewers were added to our system, and over four thousand square yards new asphalt sidewalks were laid.

State Aid Construction on the Meredith Parade road resulted in substantial improvement of another section of this thoroughfare and we recommend that this construction be continued the ensuing year, the State contributing one half the cost.

As suggested last year, this Department is greatly handicapped in snow removal work by the lack of proper equipment. Both of our tractors are old and expensive to maintain and we need a new heavy duty truck and plow unit. The small trucks equipped with blade blows do good service within certain limits, but some heavier equipment is absolutely necessary to meet requirements.

As in former years, we urge an adequate appropriation for routine maintenance and would recommend the following general appropriations for the ensuing year:

BRIDGES

The many highway bridges of the city are generally in

good condition and but little was spent on their care and maintenance. Two small, wooden bridges on the Hilliard Road, so called, are in poor condition and should be replaced by more permanent structures.

The small, steel bridge on Gold street, which carries the sanitary sewer, a water main and a gas main, together with a foot walk, will need some repairs this coming summer. Just how much the expense will be, cannot be determined until some of the wooden box around the water main is removed.

COLLECTION OF REFUSE AND GARBAGE

The contract for collection and disposal of refuse and garbage, in force for the previous year, was continued with satisfactory results. There is some difficulty in getting compliance with the City Ordinance in regard to the method, time of collection and what should be set out for collection. A dumping place for refuse at the Weirs Village was procured and a road built for access to the dump for residents in that vicinity. The public dump provided by the city off the Morin Road, so called, is used extensively and generally the users observe reasonable regulations, but in some cases rubbish and automobiles are dumped where they should not be and which cause trouble and expense to the city and to the caretaker of the dump.

DRAINS

Existing surface water drains were cleaned, flushed and repaired as needed and the expense was more than the appropriation allowed. New drains were built at Casino Square, South Main Street near Court Street, Gilbert Street to Baldwin Street, large drain on Fairview, Lafayette, Pine, Merrimac and Warren Streets with branches; Arch Street, from Union Avenue to the river, Valley Street, Holman Street and a 30" culvert drain across the High School Lot from Dewey Street to Union Avenue, to

replace the drain cut off by new school building.

Some of these drains were built as E.R.A. and W.P.A. projects, where materials and overhead were furnished by the city and labor by the Federal Government.

MEREDITH-PARADE ROAD

The City appropriated \$3,384.00 to go with a like amount, furnished by the State Highway Department which was used to continue the construction toward the Meredith Town line.

The bills for this work were paid through the State Highway Department, the City reimbursing it for the City's share.

SIDEWALKS

Asphalt sidewalks were built on Grant Street, Lincoln Street, Fair Street, Sheridan Street, Bridge Street, Gilford Avenue, Lindsay Street, Highland Street, a total of 4,173 sq. yds. Total cost was \$6,037.65. 4,032 sq. yds. of asphalt sidewalks were repaired and recovered.

SANITARY SEWERS

Sewers were built on Carver Street, 538' of 6" pipe and on Lafayette Street, 800' of 8" and 675' of 6" pipe.

GENERAL

Increased demand for winter road plowing and a heavy demand for sanding icy roads make for a large expense under winter expenses.

As stated in last year's report some of our snow plowing equipment is getting old and more or less obsolete and expenses for repairs are considerable.

The following projects under E.R.A. and W.P.A. set-up were put through and all but the extension of Lakeside Avenue at the Weirs were completed.

We do not feel certain that the figures below, as the

cost of labor from the Federal Government, are accurate as we obtained the figures from the W.P.A. Office.

CITY SOLICITOR'S REPORT

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

I beg to submit herewith the report of the Law Department of the City of Laconia for the past year.

Many matters of importance have been submitted to the Law Department by the various Departments of the City, all of which have received proper attention. In connection with the erection of the new High School Building, and the remodelling and renting of the City Building on Water Street, it has been necessary to spend a great deal of time and numerous contracts, and other papers had to be drawn. A number of ordinances have been drafted and legal documents drawn.

No litigation in the Superior Court has appeared during the last year, and the one remaining case on the docket has been disposed of. There are several controversial matters now pending, but the likelihood of litigation is small.

The Solicitor has prosecuted, as has been the custom for some years, all violations of law committed within the City. There is considerable doubt as to whether violations of state law should be so prosecuted, or whether that falls to the County Solicitor. I have consistently maintained that violations of City Ordinances are all that come within the province of the City Solicitor.

About eighteen years ago the City Ordinances were completely revised. Since that time amendments have been

adopted and new ordinances passed, until, at the present time, the City Charter and ordinances are in a deplorable condition. It is next to impossible to find the law on any given subject. The Charter has been referred to by the office of the attorney general as in the worst condition of any in the State. I very strongly recommend that the next administration give very serious consideration to a revision of the charter and ordinances.

REPORT OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

We respectfully submit the report of the Police Commission and Chief of Police George N. Hubbard for the year ending January 31, 1936.

Year by year more duties are being placed on the police department though, you realize our appropriation was smaller this year. During the year the officers found 1211 store doors open and called owners thus saving loss to the owners of the stores. Two fires were extinguished without alarm and eight fires were discovered and alarms given thus reducing the fire loss and helping to keep the fire insurance rate low.

We would call your attention to the amount of money that is paid the city treasurer on account of fines and witness fees. For the year ending January 31, 1936 it was \$5,491.73. Therefore, though the appropriation for the police department was \$30,000 the cost to the tax payers was less than \$25,000.

We respectfully urge your careful reading of the chief's report which gives a comprehensive report of the services rendered by the Police Department.

REPORT OF THE OVERSEER OF THE POOR

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City
of Laconia:*

Gentlemen:

It is my privilege and duty to submit, herewith, my report as Overseer of the Poor for the year ending February 15, 1936.

For a statement of the income and expenses of this department, I refer you to the Treasurer's report. The net expense has been large, principally for two reasons: first, the lack of employment in private industry, and second, the failure of the state to reimburse city for its share of relief expenses as outlined in House Bill No. 296. The state's reason for defaulting is lack of funds.

The work-relief has helped considerably in reducing the relief load, but has removed entirely only a very few families from the relief roll. The weekly wage per calendar month is \$10.26, and is often less than that because of illness. Only one person in a family is permitted, by federal regulations, to work on any federal relief project, regardless of the size of the family. A single man is allowed the same number of hours of work weekly as a family man, and no person is eligible for such work unless he was on either direct or work relief between May 1 and November 1, 1935.

Weekly budgets are made for each family, in accordance with instructions from the office of the State Relief Board, and in most cases, these budgets exceed the weekly incomes. The difference between the amount earned and the amount of the budget allowance represents the amount of aid to be granted a family.

One of the growing problems is the care of persons

sixty-five years old or more, as they are refused work on federal projects and in most private industry. Another problem is that of caring for those who were fortunate enough to have jobs for the summer. Requiring no aid during that period, they are ineligible for work on projects. At present, such persons are dependent wholly on relief, except for an occasional day's work and assistance from private sources.

There is a steady increase in the number of persons receiving old age relief, which will probably continue.

PARK COMMISSION

To the Mayor and Council, City of Laconia:

Gentlemen:

The Park Commission herewith submits its twenty-first annual report.

OPECHEE PARK

For the third consecutive year, Opechee Park Playground has been under the supervision of Mr. Reginald Clement and Miss Anna Collin.

The point system introduced by Mr. Clement three years ago was again used this year, and in addition to the prizes awarded at the end of the season to the three highest point winner, smaller prizes were awarded every two weeks to the highest point winner.

Four new games introduced this year proved very popular. Basketball appealed especially to the older boys. Deck tennis was most popular among the girls and the ring board game was enjoyed by all the youngsters. A punching bag and stand, put up under the grandstand was easily the most popular piece of apparatus on the playground.

Tournaments were run in tennis, horse shoe, deck tennis and ping pong.

Although there were many rainy sessions this year much interest was shown in the swimming. Out of 54 children in the Beginner's Class who couldn't swim more than three or four strokes or couldn't swim at all, 34 passed the Beginner's Test which consists of diving into water over one's head and swimming at least fifty feet. In all, 64 Beginners passed their test and 18 passed the Swimmer's Test. One boy and one girl passed the Senior Life

Saving Test and four girls passed the Junior Life Saving Test.

The annual Field Day was held Friday, August 23.

LEAVITT PARK

Mr. Charles F. Peterson and Miss Barbara Gilman were the Instructors at Leavitt Park for the summer of 1935.

The average attendance, in spite of many rainy days was nearly 200 for both morning and afternoon sessions, which alone speaks for the popularity of the playground and the interest which the activities as provided by the Instructors arouse.

Athletic Badge tests, checker tournaments and tennis tournaments; a pet show; a doll parade; a talent show and a "dress-up" day were special events.

A girl's hike to the Big Maple brought out 27 girls for an all day good time while the boys' overnight hike up Mount Belknap was as popular as ever—with 42 boys enjoying the trip.

In swimming, 56 passed the Beginner's test and 14 passed the Swimmer's Test. An inexpensive slide at Sandy Shore added much to the enjoyment of the group at the water front afternoons.

The annual Carnival had to be postponed on account of rain but in spite of that, the gross receipts and amount cleared was the highest in four years. Over \$100 was cleared, and was used for equipment as usual.

The Twilight League offered entertainment for young and old from 6.30 until dark, at least three nights a week. A total of 30 games were played in seven weeks. It was not unusual to have 300 spectators for the games. The League was self-supporting. Collections were taken at eleven of the games and the money so obtained was used for bats, balls, some work on the field and a bonus to the umpires. (The umpires are guaranteed no fees—but are given a bonus

if the finances permit.)

The Nursery school enjoyed the use of the Park mornings during their play period.

The usual cooperation of parents and friends was evidenced throughout the season and surely the season could be considered only a successful one in that offered many activities to many people of all ages at all times—this would seem the function of a real “play” ground.

SOUTH END PLAYGROUND

Mrs. Helen Ford Weeks had charge of this playground and, in spite of the workmen being there daily—had a most successful season.

The children had a Doll Carriage parade, a Costume Parade, a Pet Show, a Jack Knife contest and a Checker Tournament and a Stunt Day.

Much hardwork was accomplished, many holders, sofa pillows as well as a patchwork quilt were completed. The boys made doorstops of wood and painted them; kitchen pads and many of the children made the dish gardens.

The Parents' organization held their second Carnival which was most successful both socially and financially.

The Commission wish to express their appreciation to all those who furnished trucks and labor without cost in filling in this playground which is now completed.

The Park Commission wish to thank the Mayor and Council for the appropriation and the townspeople for their continued interest and cooperation.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Honorable Walter E. Dunlap, Mayor, and the City Council, Laconia, N. H.:

Gentlemen :

Having completed the audit of the financial accounts of the City of Laconia for the fiscal year ending February 15, 1936, I present the following Statements showing the financial condition of the City as of that date.

Exhibit I—Appropriation Account year ended Feb. 15, 1936.

Exhibit II—Excess and Deficiency Account.

Exhibit III—Balance Sheet as of Feb. 15, 1936.

Exhibit IV—Serial Debt as of Feb. 15, 1936.

The following items appearing in the balance sheet are commented upon as follows :

ASSETS

<i>Cash</i>	\$81,961.96
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This cash balance was verified by the various bank statements with the records of the City Treasurer and compared with the ledger of the City Clerk. This large balance is necessary owing to the fact that the fiscal year of the schools does not end until June 30 and to the building of the New High School building.

Property sold to City for Taxes \$23,577.93

During the fiscal year ending Feb. 15, 1936, the city purchased unpaid taxes assessed on real property to the above amount.

Balance Due on Taxes Paid by City \$2,254.27

During the fiscal year ending Feb. 15, 1936, tax payers redeemed taxes to leave the above amount due the City.

Accounts Receivable Taxes \$80,220.76

The collector's record of unpaid taxes was examined by me and compared with the record kept by the City Clerk; warrants from the Board of Assessors to the City Tax Collector covering the commitment of all taxes was examined by me and all abatements were examined to see that they were approved by the Board of Assessors.

Deficit \$8,059.18

This deficit was due principally to an appropriation made after the tax rate was set, for new sidewalks and drains of \$8,000.

LIABILITIES

Miscellaneous Liabilities \$1,364.12

This account was increased during the year owing to new projects entered into by the City Council.

Leavitt Fund \$504.91

This account was examined and verified.

Motor Vehicle 1936 \$2,358.96

The amount of Motor Vehicle Fees received by the City Clerk was checked and verified with the receipts of the City Treasurer.

Notes \$83,000.00

The increase in this amount over that of the previous year was made necessary by the construction of new sidewalks, for which no money was raised by taxation during the fiscal year.

Unexpended Appropriations \$103,291.06

Appropriations made during the year were verified with the records of the City Council and expenditures were properly approved by Treasury Warrants; all transfers were approved by the City Council.

An itemized account of the above balance may be found in Exhibit II.

SERIAL DEBT

The Serial Debt outstanding at February 15, 1936 is detailed in Exhibit IV of this report showing an increase of \$50,750.00 owing to Factory Improvements and New School building.

The Serial Payments of Bonds and Coupons were examined.
