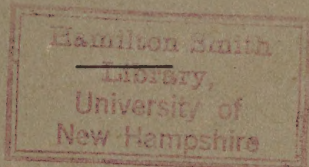

TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

Grafton S. S.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Lyme in the County of Grafton in said state qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at church hall in said Lyme on Tuesday the 11th day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the town officers as printed.

3. To see what compensation the town will allow its various officers the ensuing year.

4. To see what order the town will adopt in relation to the Savings Bank Tax, railroad tax, auto permit fees, interest and dividend tax and insurance tax the ensuing year.

5. To see what sums of money will be raised to repair highways and bridges the ensuing year including Thetford bridge.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of the Town Library the ensuing year.

7. To see what sums of money the town will vote for improvements in the cemeteries the ensuing year.

8. To see if the town will vote to allow bank discount on taxes paid before November first, 1930.

9. To see what sums of money, if any, the town will raise for the purpose of graveling the following highways: Road leading from Edd Webb's to D. H. Thompson's. Road leading from Edd Webb's to Geo. E. Stark's. Road leading from Baker Hill to F. J. Bryant's. Road leading from Lyme Ctr. to Dorchester. Road leading from East Thetford Bridge to C. S. Steele's. Road leading from Pond School

house to Sand Hill. Road leading from Bartlett Mayo's to Alice Hewes. Road leading from J. R. Eastman's to Orford. Road leading from L. W. Coburn to river road. Also the river road from Hanover line to East Thetford Bridge.

10. To see if the town will vote the sum of \$200.00 for the Mary Hitchcock Hospital.

11. To see if the town of Lyme will vote to accept \$15000.00 the gift of Sidney A. Converse for the purpose of building a suitable town library to be known as the Converse Free Library.

Also to elect a committee to procure land and make all necessary arrangements.

12. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$400.00 for the prevention of the spread of the White Pine Blister Rust.

13. To see if the town will vote the sum of \$100.00 for the G. A. R., W. R. C. and the American Legion.

14. To see what action the town will take in regard to mowing the common and raise money therefor.

15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise such sum of money as may be necessary to plow out the rural free delivery roads of snow in the same way as are State and State Aid Roads, also to sand dangerous curves and steep grades in time of ice.

17. To see what action the town will take in regard to rebuilding the High Bridge, so called.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise the amounts recommended by N. H. Highway Dept.

19. Bring in your votes for one delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

20. To hear the reports of the committees, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board of Lyme:

The eleventh annual report of the Superintendent of schools of the town is herewith submitted. It is the second by your present superintendent.

Survey

The purpose of these reports is to convey to you and through the Board to the citizens, an accounting of the various activities of this part of the town's business. It presents statistical and other information which is for the year ending the previous June. This necessity arises from the fact that the school financial and official year does not end at the same date as that of the other town departments. The school year ends June 30 and the town year ends January 31 following. Occasionally in these reports there is need to consider some of the educational aspects of the work more than the merely material necessities and accomplishments.

The work of the year has progressed along normal lines without marked changes in policy or methods. Progress has taken place in a generally satisfactory upward trend. The attendance was somewhat below the standard as was anticipated in last year's report. Partial epidemics of children's diseases will often prevent high averages either in attendance or scholarship. The needed improvements made have added both to the comfort and usability of the several school buildings. More needs to be done. A start has been made.

Repairs

The recommendations made last year have in the main been carried out. They are enumerated in some detail for purposes of record. Modern circulating heaters have been provided for the Center and Whipple schools. Book cupboards have been provided for the Stetson and Hewes schools. Somewhat extensive repairs were made to the Whipple school, including interior decoration, additional slate blackboards, and refinishing the desks. The Chesley

school was reshingled and a new fence set up around the Center school lot. It is anticipated that additional new heaters will be supplied to the other buildings as soon as funds are available. The heating plant at the Plain school needs overhauling so that these rooms may be more comfortable in extreme weather. Electric lights should be installed in these rooms so that there will be less eye strain on dark winter days. One other feature of this building requires attention in the near future. It is regrettable that a building which presents such a satisfactory outward appearance is such a disappointment when it comes to toilet conveniences. It has been said over and over again that the out house even though divided is a questionable device so far as behavior and sound morals are concerned. It is time that some provision be made either for the installation of a water system or for a chemical toilet system. This could be done by moving the small structure nearer the school proper, raising it and making it accessible direct from the school. In this way the whole would be under the direct supervision of the teachers and do away with the present rather unsanitary and unwholesome arrangement. The underpinning of a part of the Whipple school needs shoving up with stone or cement pillars beneath the floor and one or two new floor timbers. The chimney at that school needs pointing and a protection over the top to prevent snow from obstructing the draft. The Hewes school, if it is to continue to be used, should be thoroughly overhauled and remodeled. Some of the floor timbers are weak, the steps are badly out of repair and the lighting is very inadequate. This building is the next which should have the most serious attention. Measures should be taken to point up the walls of the Center building to prevent cold from getting under the floors of the two rooms. Another year the Chesley school should receive consideration as a special project. If it is worth while to continue to operate small rural schools, it is most emphatically worth while to make them comfortable, convenient, and attractive for those who occupy them for so

great a portion of their waking hours. If the policy is to be to further consolidation, the sooner it is done the better so that the needed improvements can take place in the larger buildings. One other item should be mentioned, that of school equipment, desks, chairs, maps and the like. Many of these are either out of date, or out of repair in such a way as to render them almost unfit for further use. They all require positive action to make them right.

Health and Safety

Last year's report commented somewhat at length upon wise provision in the employment of a school physician and a school nurse. This arrangement provides a closer follow up of children suffering from the common ailments as well as from contagious diseases. The nurse has made 35 visits to the several schools in town since September, she has made 15 calls to the homes when a need arose. She has treated several children for minor difficulties including cuts and minor skin infections.

It is a known fact that the health of the children has a very definite relation to regularity of attendance and to school progress. If the teachers know something about the physical condition of their pupils, they understand better how to deal with individual cases. It would serve the interests of all concerned better, were the examination to be conducted in the early fall months. This would enable the nurse to do even more systematic checking for defects and to see that they were remedied, if possible, and it would enable the teachers to supplement the work of both doctor and nurse. Each building has been supplied with emergency outfits so that there is at hand proper disinfectants and bandages for minor accidents. The health work this year has included special emphasis upon safety. The idea is to help the pupils to develop an attitude of carefulness in their varied activities. Accidents occurred before there were automobiles. They will occur now and then despite all precautions. It should be one of the aims of both home and school to assist the boys and girls in establishing such habits and

attitudes as will protect their well-being whenever they come in contact with hazardous situations.

Schools and Teachers

The state program of studies in the several school branches has been followed as consistently as possible. It should be remembered that a teacher trying to teach from four to eight grades each day cannot hope to accomplish all that is done in a single graded system. So many grades necessitates doubling up of classes, alternating work, and careful selection of the worth while to secure even passable results. The wonder often is that so much is done. One answer is that the teacher is obliged to permit the pupils to do more work of their own volition and less under direction, hence arises the good of self directed effort. There comes a time, however, when actual efficiency is lost and the pupil in the mixed graded schools are the losers. Our programs of study have omitted much of the material which was commonly taught a generation ago and which is no longer valuable in the world of today. The more carefully trained teachers are taught how best to economize the time so that the results are constantly improving. There is much yet to be done to make the progress complete. Several of our older teachers have availed themselves of summer school attendance to make up their shortage in training. The time is fast approaching when no teacher can be kept in a school system just because she is liked or just because she is a good disciplinarian or manager. There is no longer such a scarcity of good teachers as at the close of the Great War. Our own normal schools are graduating each year well-trained conscientious women who are willing to enter upon this great work of teaching with enthusiasm, ability, and preparation. It is then more and more desirable that communities such as Lyme fill such vacancies as occur in the teaching staff from the ranks of these substantially trained teachers. It is also commendable and desirable for those already employed to exert their best endeavor by attendance at summer schools, by constant read-

ing, and an appropriate professional attitude to keep abreast of the best in their chosen field. Incidentally it should be remarked that the more and the better trained the teachers in a state aided system are, the larger will be the amount of state aid granted. These various considerations make it incumbent upon all to see to it that our schools are provided with the best possible teachers available regardless of personal likes and dislikes or prejudices.

Music

One neglected subject in our schools is that of music. The teachers all do what they can, but without coordination or direction. So much of life is given over to work that as adults we often forget the other sides of life. We hope for our children greater leisure, greater recreation, than has been our lot. But are we doing all we can to enable them to enjoy to the full the time which may be theirs? Can they get as much from the radio or phonograph as is their due? It seems to me that this is a field in which we can make a start at no far distant day. Either an article in the warrant or an item in our budget could place this before the voters to see if they are willing to sponsor systematic music instruction in our schools.

State Progress

New Hampshire has just passed a decade of unusual progress in her school system. Time was not so very long ago when she was low in the galaxy of states as to length of school year, trained teachers, adequate teacher training opportunities, proper school buildings, and careful supervision. During the period now ending the length of the school year for all schools has increased several months, the school life of the pupils has increased about one third, the number of high schools and high school pupils has steadily increased, the number of trained teachers has increased by 20 per cent., and the financial burdens have been more nearly equalized. All of these improvements have been made because of the

change in the law. The New Hampshire state law is regarded by those who are in a position to make comparisons as one of the best school laws in the whole 48 states. The school progress of New Hampshire during the past 10 years, is probably greater than that of most of the other states. New Hampshire must continue this forward movement in order to keep her position among her sister New England states, and to take her appropriate place among the western and southern states.

The New England council organized a few years ago by the six governors is doing much to hold and increase the growth and prosperity of these revered older states. The New Hampshire group of this council is doing its part to keep our state in the fore front of this onward movement. The state publicity bureau is likewise rendering valuable service. It is fitting that this period of educational progress is recognized in the midst of such activity. That this progress shall continue is dependent in no small degree upon the progressiveness and open mindedness of our citizens. It is apparent that Lyme is doing her part in this strong forward trend. It is certain that in common with her sister towns she may profit materially and will surely profit in terms of a strong intelligent citizenry. True scholarship is an ideal in some cases indispensable, but a sound thinking, intelligent body of citizens is a necessity if a well regulated democracy is to continue to exist. All may rejoice to have played a part in so much good service to our commonwealth, at the same time all may well pledge themselves with renewed vigor to press forward to higher marks of school achievement.

Recommendations

It is a pleasure to record that nearly all of the recommendations made in last year's report have been put into operation. That the forward movement be not impeded the following are made as the objectives for another fiscal period:

1. The continuation of the plan for periodic repair and upkeep of school property.
2. The completion of the installation of circulating stoves for buildings not now provided.
3. The remodeling of the Hewes school for better lighting and more satisfactory interior arrangements.
4. The continuation of the health work so auspiciously started.
5. The introduction of systematic instruction in music as soon as the school finances permit.
6. A provision in the budget for equipment to replace obsolete and broken articles of various descriptions.

The attitude of helpfulness and friendliness shown by citizens, pupils, teachers, and the Board has aided in whatever forward steps have been taken this year. This consistent attitude places a greater burden upon your executive. It is his ambition to continue to render capable, efficient and economic service to the end that the boys and girls may profit by such contribution as he is able to make toward their permanent progress.

The averages given above indicate that the growth in attendance is just now continuous. While the average membership is slightly less than last year, the enrollment is greater. The average membership was less because of extended absence on account of an unusual amount of sickness. It is worth noting that the Whipple School continues to have a very high percentage of attendance. Your attention is also directed to the fact that there was no tardiness recorded in the Plain Primary School, and that the Hewes School had the next lowest record in this regard. While it may not be possible to eliminate tardiness entirely, there seems little reason for much tardiness in any of the schools. Fourteen pupils were neither absent nor tardy for the year. Seventy-six pupils were neither absent nor tardy for one or more terms.
