## OUR COVER: YE POUND

### *From Old Records of the Town of Mason*

1771 — At a legal Town meeting held at Mason September ye 17th Day Annoque Domini 1771 — Lieut. Obadiah Parker, modderator. Voted not to build such a Pound as was proposed in June last. Voted that it be built with stones and that it be twenty six feet square within the walls. Voted that sd walls be two feet and a half thick at the bottom and not less than twelve inches thick at the top. Voted that sd walls be six feet high of stone and twelve inches of timber on the top and the timber to be properly locked together at each corner and hewed so as to be at an edge on the top. Voted that the building of sd Pound be let out to the lowest Bider at this meeting. The building of sd Pound was bid off by Stevens Lawrence at four pounds eight shillings, Lawful Money whereupon voted that the sd Pound shall be built by the first day of June next and that he, the sd Stevens Lawrence shall then be Intitled to his pay in case he compleats the building of sd Pound by that time.

1773 — At a legal Town Meeting on Monday ye 8th day of March — Article 6: To see if the Town will except the Pound. Voted — To except the Pound.

1773 — March ye 10th — Then the Selectmen ordered the Treasr to pay Stevens Lawrence one pound ten shillings eight-pence L. money for what he did building the Pound.

1773 — At a legal town Meeting held July 12th — Article 7: to chuse a Pound keeper. Samuel Abbot was chose Pound keeper.

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## **TOWN WARRANT**

### **THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

**To the Inhabitants of the Town of Mason in the County**

of Hill borough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Mason on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at one of the clock in the afternoon, then and there to bring in your ballots for the following:

Article 1. Town Clerk for one year; Selectman for three years; Town Treasurer for one year; Tax Collector for one year; Highway Agent for one year.

Article 2. To choose Delegates to National Conventions.

The polls to close at 7 p. m. of the same day

And at seven of the clock in the afternoon of the next day at the same place to act upon the following subjects:

Article 3. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on anticipation of taxes.

Article 6. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell any real estate now owned by the town that has been acquired by tax sale, purchase, bequest, or gift, if they, with a majority of the Financial Advisory Committee think it advisable or take any action relating thereto.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on taxes paid on or before a certain date or take any action relating thereto.

Article 8. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell any obsolete Highway equipment or take any action relating thereto.

Article 9. To see if the town will allow the Tax Col-



lector compensation for collecting the State Head Tax and fix the amount of 8 per cent or take any action relating thereto.

Article 10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the 200th Anniversary Celebration of the Town Charter in August or take any action relating thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to change the term of office of the Clerk to three years or take any action relating thereto according to R.S.A. 41:16a.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to change the term of office of the Treasurer to three years or take any action relating thereto according to R.S.A. 41:16a.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to change the term of office of the Tax Collector to three years or take any action relating thereto according to R.S.A. 41:16a.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to change the office of Highway Agent from an elected to an appointed office or take any action relating thereto according to R.S.A. 245:6.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$250.00 for the purchase of a resuscitator or take any action relating thereto.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for changing the electric service entrance to the Town Hall from the front to the side of the building or take any action relating thereto.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to add the following sentence to Section 4 of the Building Code: All interior walls of a dwelling shall be at least one-half inch in thickness.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to delete Section 5 of the Building Code reading: "Roofs on new construction or replacement of old structures shall be of fire resistant materials" and replace with new Section 5 which reads:

No building of wood or other combustible material shall be erected, altered, remodeled or enlarged without providing firestops in every combustible wall or partition. Firestops may be wood or masonry. Wood firestops must be at least two inches of nominal thickness.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to amend all of Section 6 of the Building Code to read: Electrical wiring should be installed by a qualified electrician and shall conform to the latest edition of the National Electrical Code.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to add the following sentence to Section 7 of the Building Code: Additional information regarding sanitary facilities and wells can be found in Articles IV G-J of the Mason Planning Ordinance of 1967.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to add new Section 8 of the Building Code reading: No building designed or intended for public use or congregation of people shall be erected, altered or used for any purpose which does not provide exits, as described in Chapter 155 and Chapter 156, N.H.R.S.A., 1955, and in the regulations of the N. H. Fire Marshall's Office.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to transpose ENFORCEMENT Subsection 1 of the Building Code to become ENFORCEMENT Subsection 5, and delete the present Sub-Marshal's Office.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to add new ENFORCEMENT Subsection 1 to the Building Code to read: A building permit shall be required in accordance with the provisions of Article VII, Sections C and D of the Mason Planning Ordinance of 1967.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to amend ENFORCEMENT Subsection 3 of the Building Code to read: The Building Inspector shall issue any and all building permits when such request is in accordance with the provisions of this Code and the Mason Planning Ordinance of 1967. The fee for such a permit shall be \$1.00 per \$1,000 of the owners

valuation of the building, with a minimum fee of \$3.00. The fee shall be payable to the Building Inspector, one-third of which shall be returned to the town.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to transpose ENFORCEMENT Subsection 4 of the Building Code to become ENFORCEMENT Subsection 6.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to add new ENFORCEMENT Subsection 4 of the Building Code to read: No building may be occupied until the Building Inspector has issued a Completion Certificate.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to change the word **Ordinance** to **Code** in the preamble, old ENFORCEMENT Subsections 1, 4 and 5, AMENDMENTS, SAVING CLAUSE and WHEN EFFECTIVE in the Building Code.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to change item designations, add new headings, and amend the Building Code as:

Article 1. PREAMBLE AND TITLE

A. Preamble. Original first paragraph.

B. Title. This code shall be known and may be cited as the "Town of Mason Building Code of 1957" hereinafter referred to as "this Code".

Article 2. GENERAL PROVISIONS Start with "All residential dwellings . . ." and include Sections 1-8 as Sections A-H.

Article 3. ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT Subsections 1-6 as amended, redefining Subsection 1-6 as Sections A-F.

Article 4. Board OF ADJUSTMENT. The powers of the Board of Adjustment are set forth in Article VIII of the Mason Planning Ordinance of 1967.

Article 5. Amendments Retained.

Article 6. SAVING CLAUSE Retained.

Article 7. WHEN EFFECTIVE Retained.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to add new Sec-



tion I to Article II of the Building Code to read: All attics or confined spaces shall have access of at least two feet square.

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## **REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN**

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Mason's existance as a rural residential community is threatened by the pressures of surrounding industrial areas. Mason's scenic beauty and charm can attract many people from thickly settled areas who then seem to want many city conveniences. Increased growth, without offsetting increases in valuations, only means more expense for present residents.

School costs, which are almost three times all other costs, should receive more State Aid. Real Estate should not carry the burden for a service which in the long run benefits the whole area. Broad based State taxes appear to be one solution.

Our revised Planning Ordinance of 1967 is designed to control growth in a manner which will maintain the present character of the Town. The report of the Planning Board deserves your attention. **The appointment of our Building Inspector gives valuable assistance to the Selectmen in carrying out the construction regulations of the Ordinance and Building Code.**

In order to comply with the Town vote to report taxes on dwellings, outbuildings and land separately, all buildings were measured and a rather complete re-evaluation was made. We have attempted to value all properties in relation to present market value. It was felt that in the past properties that had changed hands reflected market value and others which remained with one owner were undervalued.

Our Bi-centennial Celebration will be the big event of the coming year. We expect to have all the improvements that were voted for the Town Hall, Horse Sheds etc., completed in time.

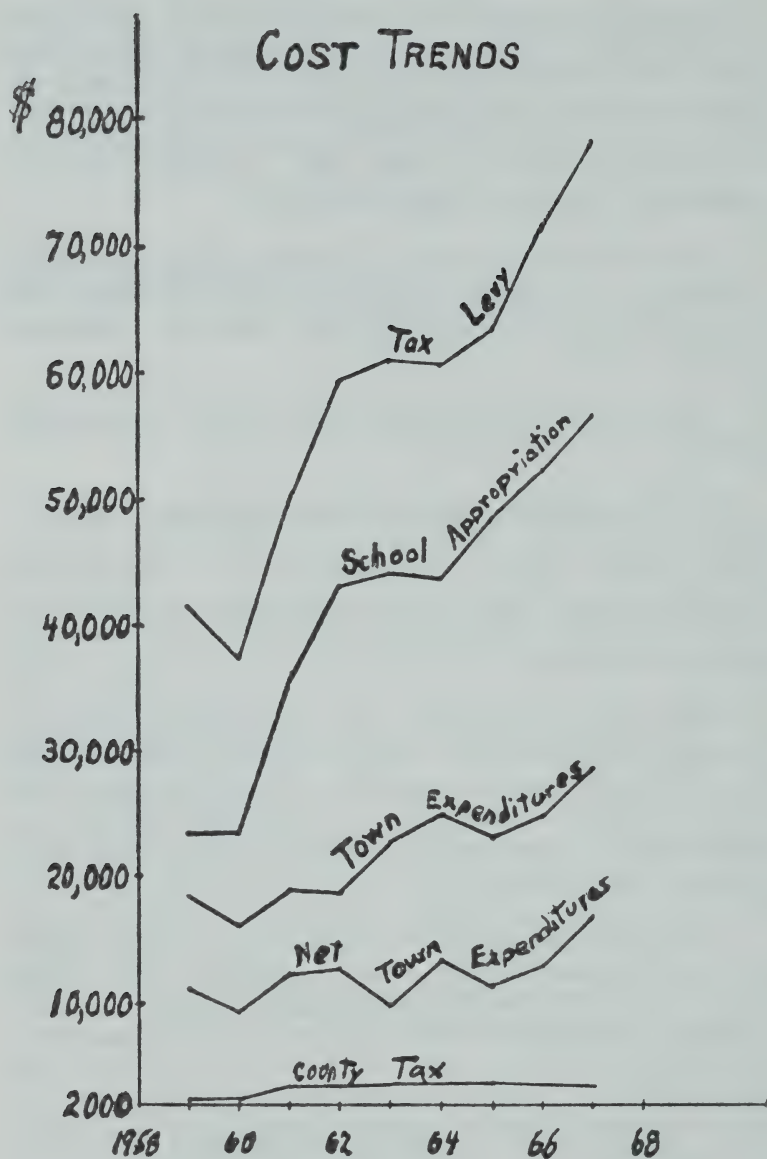
The Police Department has been increased to give better around the clock protection.

The Highway Department represents the major portion of Town expenditures. For several years Mason has been increasing Winter Roads appropriations and over-expenditures have also increased with no noticeable decrease in complaints. Control of Highway expense appears to be the major problem of this coming year.

The Selectmen wish to thank all Committee Members and Departments for the increased activity during the past year. We also extend our thanks to the several Town Residents who have voluntarily given us valuable assistance in various ways. It is very gratifying to have more residents active in Town affairs.

We hope increased Town expenditures can be kept in line with increased revenues from sources other than Property Taxes. On the following graph, the Net Town Expenditures show how well this has been done in the past.

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## **REPORT OF THE MASON PLANNING BOARD FOR 1967**

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The Mason Planning Board was reorganized during the summer of the year in order to execute the functions necessary for any planning board. The Board considered as its most urgent task the modernization of the Planning Ordinance of 1957. After careful study and with the professional advice of other town planners, the State Department of Resources and Economic Development, and the Town Attorney, the Board presented its recommendations known as the Planning Ordinance of 1967 to the people of Mason at a public hearing on the evening of September 13. The hearing lasted about four hours.

The Board reconvened to consider the amendments to the original proposal suggested at the first public hearing. The amendments accepted by the Board were published in the newspaper and were presented to the Town for reconsideration at the second Public Hearing held in the Town Hall on the evening of October 4.

The final draft of the Ordinance was prepared and was presented to the voters of Mason for their approval on Saturday, October 28, 1967. The Ordinance was approved by the voters on that day by a margin of almost 2 to 1. The Planning Ordinance of 1967 which took effect immediately upon its passage is presented under separate cover.

The Planning Board presently meets on the last Thursday of each month at 7:30 in the Selectmens Office of the Town Hall. The meetings are open to the public.

Two matters are of primary concern to the Board at the present time: (1) revision of the Mason Building Code, and (2) definition of the proposed power lines to be constructed in Mason by the Public Service Company of New Hampshire

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## REPORT OF THE FIRE CHIEF FOR 1967

---

The Mason Volunteer Fire Dept. has just ended its sixth year of service to the Town of Mason and at this time has twenty-two men on the Department.

The year 1967 has seen the start of a much needed fire station on Depot Road, which is presently all closed in. This station is being built by funds donated by the townspeople and others, also from Mason Volunteer Fire Dept. revenues as they become available. We hope to finish the station by the time of the Bi-Centennial if sufficient funds are received. No town funds have been used to build the station.



The expenditures of the Mason Volunteer Fire Dept. for the year 1967 were in excess of \$5,000, of which the Town furnished \$1,300. The balance was raised by the Department.

Two bad building fires occurred in the winter of 1967. The Robichaud house and Kivimaki house. The Kivimaki house was totally involved when the Department arrived and was lost. The Robichaud house was saved and an excellent stop was made by the Department and responding mutual aid companies. This home has been repaired and continues to be an asset to the town.

I would like to remind everyone again that the emergency number 878-1611 is available for all emergencies, Fire, Police, Ambulance or other emergency calls. If you do not have telephone stickers for each phone, contact the Fire Dept. and they will be delivered. This is no charge for this service.

2. Take all debris and waste to the town dump.
3. Keep a clean, safe town dump.
4. Urge close supervision of children in regard to use of matches.
5. Exercise care with smoking material — use the ash-tray.

## CIVIL DEFENSE

---

The primary activities of the Mason Civil Defense during the past year have been in the field of developing operational plans for use in the case of emergency. We have attempted to coordinate the activities of all the existing town agencies to allow for effective action. During the coming year we hope to complete the remainder of the plans, and to submit them to the town for formal approval.

We have also made arrangements for the construction and installation of a three-way alarm system on the new fire station. This alarm will be used for fire purposes and for the sounding of both Civil Defense signals.

Last spring a course was conducted for Mason townspeople in Radiological Monitoring. At present there are four trained teams of people capable of detecting and measuring radiation. We are in the process of acquiring instruments for these RADEF teams.

During the past year we have also acquired supplies, equipment and materials for the town fire, police and highway departments.

Again, it should be stressed that the role of Civil Defense is advisory and coordinating, not administrative. We shall continue to attempt to help all town agencies prepare for any type of disaster.

I would like to request that anyone interested in helping in the Civil Defense Organization contact me.

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## REPORT OF MASON BI-CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

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The Bi-Centennial Committee has been meeting monthly throughout the year.

The first official event of our celebration, under George Cook's able direction, was held September 13th, the 201st anniversary of Uncle Sam's birthday, with the dedication of a new 40 ft. flag pole, a Betsy Ross and an Uncle Sam flag. Town officials, school children and members of the committee took part in the celebration. The very beautiful Uncle Sam flag was designed by our talented artist, Elizabeth Orton Jones.

Considerable progress has been made in other areas such as the beautiful landscaping in the area of the common and around the public buildings by Arthur Thompson. The clearing of Wolf Rock was done by Carl Valyou and the boys furnished to him under the Federal Summer Work program. At the "Lawrence" stone, the burial place of the first white child to be born in Mason, a suitable wall has been erected and an attractive wrought iron gate has been placed. This will be one of the many historical sites to be designated by appropriate markers. The town pound, under the supervision of the Grange, has been cleared. Ray Akerman has made and installed a replica of the original gate and the Senior 4-H boys, under the direction of Carl Valyou, have agreed to restore the wall where necessary.

Throughout the three day celebration various articles of historical value will be on display. These will include; documents, photographs, antiques, etc., under the supervision of Mrs. Werner Lofquist.

Items to memorialize the occasion such as Uncle Sam jewelry, Uncle Sam figurines, and John Boynton tumblers are being offered now and will be on sale during the festivities.

The Bi-Centennial Book, one of our outstanding accomplishments, is going to press in March. It will cover the entire two hundred years of Mason's corporate history as well as prior events.

The English Department of our school, under the direction of Mr. Hebert, will conduct an essay contest in the upper four grades. It will cover subjects relating to Mason and the Bi-Centennial. Prizes will be awarded and the prize winning creative writing will be read by the winners at the Memorial Day exercises. The lower grades will portray stories of Mason's history, being told to them by Miss Jones, in the form of drawings which will be on display during the celebration.

Bumper stickers have been purchased and will be dis-



tributed by the Town Clerk when automobiles are registered after March 1.

The Bi-Centennial Program is as follows:

On Friday, August 23, the Anniversary Ball will be held at the town hall starting at 8 p. m. There will be square and round dancing under the direction of a professional caller who will bring his old-fashioned orchestra. Townspeople and their guests are requested to be in period costumes for this event and throughout the weekend.

On Saturday, Aug. 24, there will be an opportunity for family picnics at noon which will be followed by the parade at 1:30, a drill and/or band concert at 3, a BBQ at 5:30, a speaker at 8 and the pageant at 8:30.

On Sunday, Aug. 25, an old-fashioned Bi-Centennial service will be conducted at the Mason church at 11 a. m. This will be the closing event of the celebration.

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## **SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT**

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To the School Board and citizens of Mason, I respectfully submit my final report as the Mason School District Superintendent of Schools. The report of the Mason School District will not include some of the items usually covered, namely, a budget for the coming school year since this will be taken care of by a Mascenic Regional School District Report which will outline this proposal.

### **STAFF AND INSTRUCTION**

Several changes in staff were made this year, all very fortunate however, and thus the school is carrying out its program in a most satisfactory fashion.

Mrs. Virginia Rafter, remedial reading teacher for two years, accepted a teaching position in the upper room to replace Mr. Gibbons, who had other plans for the current year. As many of you know, Mrs. Rafter is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and had teaching experience in Mason for five years prior to her most recent experience as teacher in the school. Fortunately, we were able to procure the services of Mrs. Lillias Johnson of Mason, a teacher with many years of experience at Lebanon, New Hampshire and Concord, Massachusetts, who filled the reading position vacated by Mrs. Rafter. Mrs. Anne Fifield of Mason assumed

responsibility as Art teacher and formerly filled that position a few years ago on a voluntary basis. With the retirement of Miss Elsie Wheeler, Music teacher, Mr. Clark Greene of Ashby, Massachusetts, a graduate of the New England Conservatory, was hired to fill this need within the school.

Even though we were very fortunate in Mason that we did not have to seek out many teachers and were successful in finding well qualified teachers, citizens of the community should be aware of the fact that the critical shortage of teachers at the elementary level, especially at the primary level, continues. At the beginning of the school year there were many more classrooms in New Hampshire this year, than last, that did not have qualified teachers. In spite of the fact that Mason is going to be part of a cooperative which will help to reduce the teacher recruitment problem to some extent, finding teachers to work in small communities in multiple graded classrooms is going to continue to be a very serious problem until the critical shortage is relieved. Perhaps the best course of action should be to make every effort to hold good staff members that are already employed by providing satisfactory competitive salaries and fringe benefits.

I have every reason to believe that the present attitude of the Mascenic School Board will be to follow this recommendation and help to simplify this very serious problem.

## **BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS**

The Mason School is generally in good condition. Additional storage space for the janitor and Phys. Ed. storage space has been provided, bringing a little bit more orderliness to both of these equipment areas. Some funds also were expended to finish off the interior changes that were made to accommodate the kitchen of the Lunch Program.

Probably the most demanding need of the school at this time is for further development of the playground, namely, loaming and seeding, in order to alleviate the severe tracking-in problem which exists, as well as providing a more satisfactory playground area for the children.

## **COOPERATIVE PLAN**

After many years of fruitless cooperative planning, studying, and voting, everyone now knows that the Mascenic Regional School District is a reality and will have full educational responsibility for Mason children as of July 1, 1968. Citizens of Mason should be thankful that there were interested citizens of the community who were willing to devote their time and energy, not only for this study, but to the several studies that have taken place previously, finally resulting in Mascenic.

No thinking citizen, I am sure, will expect that Mascenic is going to solve all the educational problems of the children of Mason, but within the cooperative structure which is established by this organization, hopefully, education for children of Mason will be markedly improved. Certainly the biggest plus factor will be that of providing departmentalized junior high education for children of the seventh and eighth grades, a need that has existed for some time.

## **WARRANT ARTICLES**

Warrant Articles are designed to assure a school district organization through the end of June to oversee the interests of the district during that period of time. In addition, specific provisions are made for handling any deficit or balance that might occur, to transfer all Mason School District property to Mascenic Regional School District, as well as satisfactorily closing out the financial accounts of the district.

## **CONCLUSION**

The teachers of the Mason School are to be complimented for the efforts which they are making in behalf of the children of the community. All are conscientiously devoting their energies to providing the best possible instruction within the organization which exists. The efforts of the instructional staff along with those of Mrs. Taylor, Noon Lunch Manager, and Mr. Cook, Custodian, help to provide a good school program and an atmosphere that is quite satisfactory.



It has been a pleasure for me to have worked with the School Board during this past year and over the past ten years as your Superintendent of Schools. I have always found the Board to be understanding of serious school problems, sensitive to the responsibility that they have to the community and especially alert to the needs of children. Close cooperation between the staff, the School Board, citizens and the Superintendent have resulted in a most satisfactory education program for the children. Of course, I am more than pleased that two School Board members of Mason are also members of the Mascenic Board and so the excellent relationship which has existed will thereby be continued.

I am sure that the continued interest of the citizens and parents, working closely with the staff of the Mascenic District, will assure for Mason an even better educational program than that which has existed in the past and one of which all may be exceedingly proud.
