State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Mont Vernon in the County of Hillsborough in the said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Mont Vernon on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at 10 of the clock in the morning, to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To vote on the question: Are you in favor of the adoption of the Building Code Ordinance, as proposed by the Mont Vernon Planning Board?

Action on succeeding Articles is deferred until 7:30 P. M.

- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charge for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 4. To act on the reports of all Town Officers, Agents, Auditors, Committees, etc., and raise and appropriate any money relative thereto.

- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept Town Road Aid for construction of Class V Roads, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$883.47 for such purpose. (State will add \$5,889.78)
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to rescind action previously taken providing for the election of a Road Agent and vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Road Agent, such vote to take effect as of the Annual Town Meeting in March 1972.
- 8. To see if smoking shall not be allowed in any public building during any public meeting when more than three persons are present.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to have all town owned land now or in the future acquired by tax liens to be evaluated by the Conservation Commission. The Commission will evaluate the land according to conservation or open space values and so designate these lands to remain in town ownership. Said land shall only be transferable from administration of said Commission upon a vote of the Town.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Polls open at 10:00 A. M.,and will not close before 8:30 P. M.

REPORT OF THE

FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1970 forest fire season was a quiet one in this area, quiet in part because of your continued cooperation and favorable weather conditions.

Fires that did occur were, for the most part, caused by

debris burning, children and smokers.

The elimination of these three causes of forest fires would drastically change this picture-to bring about this change we

make the following suggestions:

1. When the ground is not covered with snow a permit to burn must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden. This permit covers waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, as well as garden trash and brush burning, such burning is restricted by regulation prior to 9:00 a. m. and after 5:00 p. m. with the following exceptions:

Commercial or Industrial burning is permissible at any time under normal conditions but only with the approval of the District Chief and a written permit from the Forest

Fire Warden.

2. Fires caused by children can be prevented only with the complete cooperation of parents in the supervision of their children, keep matches out of reach of children, this action will help to prevent fires and may save a life, the life of your child. Try to explain this to your child, won't you?

3. Forest fires caused by smokers can be reduced in number by the exercise of more care in the discarding of matches and smoking material whether from a vehicle or by a hiker. In all cases, make sure that the butt or match you discard is out, dead out. Smokey says, "Thanks for your help", and invites you to join with him in setting a good example for others in the prevention of fires and the protection of our environment.

MONT VERNON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Mont Vernon Conservation Commission is well steeped in the tradition to retain what we now enjoy and preserve for future generations those natural resources we now enjoy. The commission has embarked upon many projects during the past twelve months, some are complete,

others are nearing completion.

The commission sponsored a very successful conservation education tour for grades 4-6 to Beaver Brook Association in Hollis. We also provided the school with sources of conservation education materials for classroom use. Plans are, also, underway to mark nature trails for public use by residents in those areas where landowners approve. A trail map has been completed and posted for those who wish to hike, ski, ride on Class VI roads, so classified in town.

A major emphasis on wetlands was initiated and is partially completed. The Soil Conservation District has completed a map of all wetlands within Mont Vernon, copies are on file with the Commission, Planning Board and Selectmen. The Commission has embarked upon a program of mapping wetland areas to determine their proper use in relation to their future development of the town. These areas are important for their water holding capabilities.

The Commission has been involved with the Department of Public Works and Highways concerning a proposed scenic overlook or vista on Route 13. This would be a mutual project with the Commission and the Highway Department with federal funding. The proposal is to construct a parking area on the westerly side of the hill, south of town. This area would provide access to those who wish to stop and view, paint or photograph the valley and surrounding mountains.

We are indebted to the Friends of the Library for sponsoring the open forum in September. Many of the suggestions from the audience have been incorporated into the plan for future programs of the Commission.

Concerns regarding total and equitable use of the land

within the town are being studied as they relate to the overall land use as it applies to every resident and visitor.

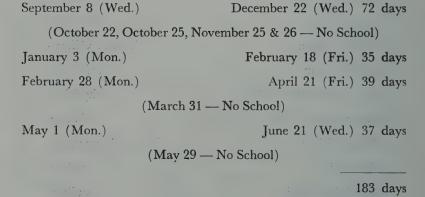

MONT VERNON SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

The period between the School District Meeting of 1970 and the one scheduled for 1971 has been a very busy and productive one for the members of the School Board.

The new elementary school on Harwood Road was completed in late February for occupation by the students of grades 4, 5, and 6. The teachers and children have been using the new facilities to the fullest degree and are very enthusiastic about the opportunities available in their new surroundings. Some minor problems such as one might expect when moving into a newly built house have occurred, but with the cooperation of the architect and builder, things have been quickly remedied and any rough areas are being taken care of step by step.

A quick look at comparative school population figures for just five short years ago and today should make the voters of Mont Vernon heave a sigh of relief that our overcrowded condition of the past two or three years has been eliminated

and we are prepared for limited future expansion.

Our two elementary schools consisting of the new one as mentioned above and the McCollom Institute housing grades 1, 2, and 3, are staffed by six full time teachers plus one teacher's aide, part-time teachers of music, art, remedial reading, speech therapy and an instructor of the French language for grades 5 and 6. Mont Vernon also has its own school nurse since the one shared with Amherst is no longer available to us, as that town is now required to employ a full time nurse because of its larger school population.

Another glance at comparative figures for student population, grades 1-12, increased staff, building plans and expenses and full budget for the years 1965-66 and 1971-72 will show the full scope of responsibility held by the members of your School Board. As your elected officials, we strenuously endeavor to make the decisions we believe will be the tax-

payers' decision after a full study of all issues.

Each year we invite the voters of our town to attend our annual budget hearing held before School District Meeting. This is a courtesy we extend to you, as we feel the taxpayer benefits by having the budget explained item by item and all questions can be fully answered in an informal setting. We appreciate your assistance by coming to this meeting — we are all taxpayers in the same town for the same children and all of us want to get the most for each dollar. All of us are well aware there are some of us who have been individually affected by lay-offs, reduced working hours, etc., inflated prices in our own homes. These same items are reflected in the new budget and we have done our very best to keep

everything down.

Again the tuition has risen for those students attending grades 7-12 in Milford, plus an increase in our share of Union #40 expenses. The Board did make an offer to the members of the four other school boards representing those towns which make up Union #40, and this offer, in our opinion, would have saved a total of \$2,000 or more each year for the five towns. The rental charge for the Superintendent's office is being increased this year and we made what we felt was an attractive offer of renting the upstairs of the McCollom Institute to the Union at a very reasonable price. This would have been a saving to them plus given us an opportunity to earn some money toward future expansion. However, our motion was defeated — the major objection seeming to be the desire to keep the facilities in Milford.

In closing, we assure you, as members of your board, we will continue to take advantage of exploring every avenue of savings and always work in the best interest of the town.

This has been a busy year necessitating many additional meetings, but we have received much cooperation from everyone and have had no complaints. For instance, we published a request for a donation of a piano for the new school and the next day, the Malcolm Winsors generously contacted us and donated theirs.

Our staff, headed by Mr. Edward Bailey, who also teaches grade 5, is an excellent one and the results of their efforts has been appreciated and is reflected by our children's progress.

ADMINISTRATIVE SCHOOL REPORT

To the Citizens of Mont Vernon:

The year into the decade of the 70's has passed quickly and with it some of the educational goals that have been set for the decade have been met.

Change continues to be especially urgent as we provide education for increasing numbers of students, for longer spans of productive life, at far higher levels of understanding, competence, and skills and always with the goal of strengthening our democratic way of life.

Educating is never an easy task in this age of constant change and discovery. To encourage individual potentialities we must keep looking at the child in a multi-dimensional way if we are to understand what is happening to this generation. A fresh look is required due to the rapid change in the child's environment.

The task calls for continued re-examination and realignment of educational priorities to see that what we are doing is the best that can be done. In this re-examination, we continue to include all the component parts of a school—students, staff curriculum, and facilities.

In 1970 the State of New Hampshire passed Minimum Standards for elementary schools which must be met by 1972. Elementary Minimum Standards require that greater impetus be given in the fields of Art, Physical Education, Music, Health and Library. Additional part-time personnel will be needed in order to meet minimum standards in some of these areas in the near future.

We do not want to settle for "minimum standards". Therefore, we suggest that we try to fulfill minimum standards as soon as possible so that we may then head for "more than the minimum" in our elementary schools.

At the September 14, 1970 meeting of the Mont Vernon School Board, the following policy was enacted. Children with a sixth birthday after September 30th may not enter school until the following school year. If a parent has a child with a sixth birthdate before September 30th and feels

the child is not ready for school in that year, he may keep him out of school by notifying the Superintendent of Schools and/or School Board. This is in compliance with the State Attendance Law.

The new policy will go into effect January 1, 1971 and will affect those children who are scheduled to enter school in September of 1971.

The Board passed the regulation now to give parents a year's notice so they will not enroll their youngsters in preschools a year too soon.

The 1970-71 school year marked the first full year of use for the new Village School by grades 4, 5, and 6. The children benefited by the expansion of the music program, with the addition of a part-time music teacher for one full day rather than the one half day as in the past.

Two new programs were initiated this year. The hiring of a part-time art teacher gave the children a wider exposure to different art media and methods. The boys and girls in grades 5 and 6 experienced conversational French for the first time in an effort to better prepare them for the Junior High School program of studies.

CONCLUSION

It is the citizens' responsibility to continue to invest in the kind of education which will produce good future citizens. This responsibility costs money, but it is an investment we can ill afford to ignore. For it is the purpose of our school system to provide such opportunities that our young people may develop to the full extent of their ability and become responsible, contributing citizens of our community, state and nation.

We are grateful to the staff and citizens of Mont Vernon, School Board members and all others who have helped to make our first year into the new decade a successful one.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE MONT VERNON SCHOOL DISTRICT March 3, 1970

The Annual Meeting of the Mont Vernon School District was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by the Moderator, Roland Christie, Jr. Mr. Christie read the Warrant for the Election of Officers for the School District, to take place on 10 March 1970, beginning at 2:00 p.m.

Mr. Donald Cheever led the Pledge to the Flag.

Mr. George Kittredge led the assembly in prayer.

The Moderator read the Warrant for the Annual Meeting of the School District.

Article 1 — Walter Kilian moved that we pass over this article and act on it with Article 8, as it is included in the budget. Seconded by George Kittredge. Voted.

Article 2 — George Kittredge moved that we accept all reports as printed in the Town Report. Seconded by Robert Damoiseau. Voted.

Article 3 — Robert Damoiseau moved that we pass over this article. Seconded and voted.

Article 4 — Walter Kilian moved that we authorize the School Board to make application for and accept on behalf of the District any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire or from any other source. Seconded and voted.

Article 5 — George Kittredge moved that we amend Article 5 to read "that the District authorize the School Board to use the sum of \$5,000, previously raised and appropriated in the 1969-70 budget for temporary accomodations, to defray the expense of interest accrued on the building loan of \$140,000." Amendment seconded by R. Damoiseau. Voted. Judith Corbett moved that we adopt Article V as amended. Seconded and voted.

Article 6 — Robert Damoiseau moved that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to provide basic French instruction in grades 5 & 6. Seconded by George Kittredge. Voted.

Article 7 — Walter Kilian moved that the District raise and

appropriate the sum of \$1,200 to provide instruction in art for grades 1-6. Seconded by Robert Damoiseau. Voted: 27 yes, 15 no.

Article 8 — George Kittredge moved that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$193,535.26 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for School District officials and agents, and for payment of the statutory obligations of the District. Seconded by Robert Damoiseau. Voted.

Article 9 — Walter Kilian moved that the School Board be directed to submit for publication within ten (10) days of each School Board meeting, a synopsis of all items covered at that meeting. This synopsis is to be forwarded to the MILFORD CABINET plus any other newspapers that the School Board may indicate so that the residents of Mont Vernon may be kept informed of School District matters. Seconded by Eileen Naber. The School Board stated that they would take this motion under advisement and would try to work something out as suggested by this motion. Show of hands indicated passing of this motion.

The Chairman of the School Board, Robert Damoiseau, introduced and thanked each member of the School Building Committee. He then called Mr. R. Morton Darling to the front of the Hall. In appreciation for his untiring service as Clerk of the Works for the new school on Harwood Road, Mr. Damoiseau presented to Mr. Darling on behalf of the people of Mont Vernon a plaque which read:

"To R. Morton Darling in sincere appreciation for outstanding service to the Mont Vernon School District in providing advice, recommendations and supervision in planning and constructing the new elementary school, 1969-1970. Presented at the Annual Mont Vernon School District Meeting, March 3, 1970, by the citizens of the Mont Vernon School District."

Mr. Darling received a standing ovation in appreciation of his dedication.

George Kittredge moved that the meeting adjourn. Seconded by J. Justin Pestana. Voted.

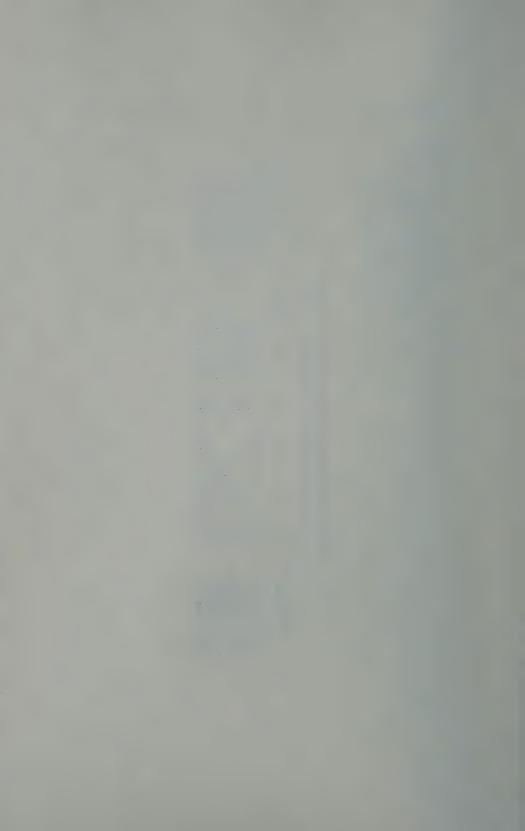

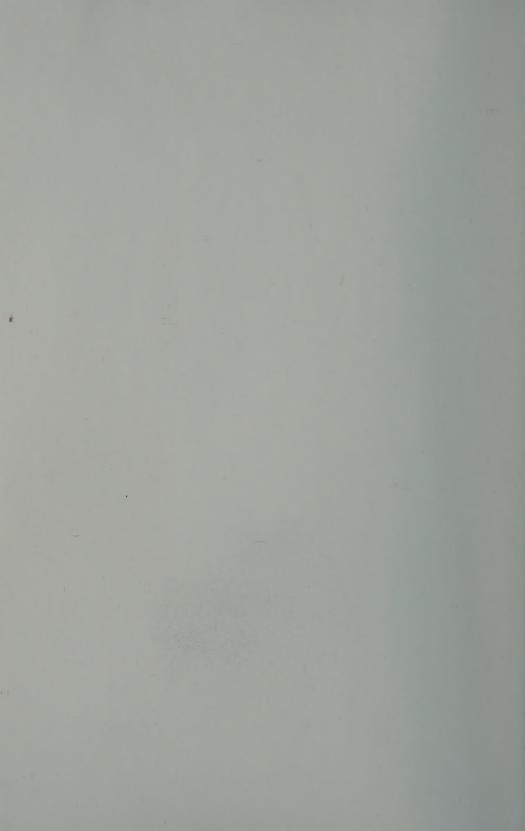
