## TOWN WARRANT

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### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the inhabitants of the Town of New London in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet in Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear reports of agents or auditors and committees heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.
4. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
5. To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Town Library for the ensuing year.
6. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting for the ensuing year.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemetery purposes for the ensuing year.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,776.50 for State Aid Construction and make appropriation of the same.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$4,024.00 for the Trunk Line Maintenance for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
11. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,030.00 for State Aid Maintenance for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the support of highways, bridges and sidewalks more than the law requires for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
13. To see if the Town will vote to put the highway on Pleasant Street beginning at the New London Fire House and extending to the residence of Frank Mastin in condition, and oil and make appropriation for the same.
14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 for hydrant service.
15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Old Home week.
16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

## TRACY MEMORIAL BUILDING

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### Librarian's Report\*

A half-decade has been rounded out in the history of New London's library and community center. In a backward glance it would seem that each year of the five has seen a worth while progress in desirable things attempted, and, in many instances attained.

During the year the usual organizations have continued to meet at Tracy Memorial, and numerous occasional meetings of different groups have been held in hall or committee room. The visitation count of the year has been heavy, and we continually learn that knowledge of our attractive building and garden draws visitors from far and near, for during the summer months alone visitors registered from 21 states and five foreign countries.

A feature article reporter for New Hampshire and Massachusetts papers has "written up" life at Tracy Memorial and an illustrated article appeared in a July number of the New England Homestead. During the New London broadcast, made weekly over a period of several weeks, our building and activities were often mentioned. To quote Rev. Harold Buker, president of the Civic Association, on the occasion of one broadcast, he said "No word can properly describe the influence of Tracy Memorial Library and Community House. There it stands, the gift of Mrs. Jane Tracy of Cleveland and New London, daily ministering to the cultural and spiritual values of the community. Its beauty constantly speaks; it is a poem in the heart of the town."

The terraced garden is in daily use, when weather permits, during many months of the year. People are frequently seen reading, sewing, or even dreaming in some

attractive spot about the grounds. More formal use of the garden has been made by hostesses of the Woman's Club, the Civic Association, and the Forestry Association. In connection with the work with the children an hour is often spent in the garden on Saturday afternoon. Miss Jesseman, assistant librarian, gave the children a delightful garden party early in July. One summer afternoon several children from Twin Lake Villa, coached by a former Colby student known as Pete the Greek, presented a picturesque Chinese play "The Mong Wing Family", staging it on the middle terrace.

The choral work of the past seasons has been suspended as an organized affair, but the services of Alfred E. Plumpton have been retained as director of music in preparation for the Sunday services of the church. Regular rehearsals are held at Tracy Memorial Building on Monday evenings. A young people's orchestra has been doing good work with Mr. Plumpton as instructor. The instruments played include violin, 'cello, clarinet, and trumpet. Instruction in trumpet playing is given by Gilbert N. Wiggins. A few new players have been added to the group of last year. At the June concert the orchestra made a very creditable first public appearance, contributing several numbers to the program of the evening. The program also offered selections by the chorus and solos by Marie-Louise Parker and Gussie Trumbull, two of Mr. Plumpton's private pupils.

Exhibitions of the year have been various—the Alphonse Shelton exhibit of portraits and landscapes in oil and water color, a collection of autographs, school papers edited by the upper grades at Colby Hill School, the customary annual white soap sculpture exhibition, foreign railway posters, a traveling exhibit from the Traphagen School of Fashion (N. Y.), a display board containing 45 knots required of all regular and sea scouts, an exhibit arranged from foreign weavings, embroideries, prints, carvings and metal work from many countries loaned by Mrs. Francisco J. Manrique, also groups of cards and curios from northern Africa and southern Europe, loaned or given by Mrs. Tracy and Mrs. Macomber.

The book collection is constantly improved and several magazines and newspapers have been added to the yearly subscription list. The figures for the year will show the

increased use of library material, traceable to additions made to the book shelves by purchase or gift. The usual summer library hours were in force.

At Christmas time the building was decorated in holiday fashion, carol singing and a program appropriate to the season were the order of the day. Plans for the observance of open house on New Year's Day were cancelled this year (1931).

Within the year librarian and trustees were in attendance at one or more library meetings—national, state and local—including American Library Association meeting at New Haven, Conn., the New Hampshire Library Association meeting at Hanover, and a Neighborhood meeting at Warner.

Work with the children, aside from the usual routine, has been varied. A course in music appreciation conducted by Walter Damrosch over the radio each Friday morning for the school children of the country has been attended by classes and teachers from Colby Hill School. In celebration of Good Book Week a display of books was arranged in the post office window, and one evening Hon. Daniel K. Barry of Newport spoke at the library to an appreciative audience on the subject "Highlights of America", illustrated by colored slides of national parks, of which twenty have been visited by Mr. Barry. The Warner Cadet Band furnished music during the evening. A decorated metal chest, known as a Friendship Treasure Chest, was secured to be filled with small gifts for children of Porto Rico. Local children brought and wrapped 46 gifts and money was contributed for 52 hot lunches to be provided for the needy school children of the island. A letter, also winter and summer views of New London were sent with the chest. The Greek dolls in native costume of soldier and peasant, sent from Greece by Mrs. Tracy, have been much admired. Twelve 4-H Club girls dressed dolls sent from Greece for that purpose. Mrs. Tracy offered a prize for the best dressed doll, and gave the 4-H Club girls a party in July when the prize, a gold dollar on a gold chain, was awarded to the winner—Winifred Little.

The reading contest of the year was Book Golf which attracted many players or readers. The idea was original with Miss Jesseman, who carried the contest through very

successfully. Forty-five players registered and 24 completed the course of nine holes, which covered periods of United States history, starting with the European background of the several mother countries. Prizes of new books went to William Twohey and Maurice Messer, and were awarded at the graduation exercises.

Speakers at evening programs held in the Assembly Hall were Miss Helen M. Church, executive secretary of the New Hampshire branch of the League of Nations Association, who spoke on the special work of the League, and Miss Margaret Hamp of Cambridge, Mass., who spoke to a capacity audience, telling of her experiences during five months spent as a worker on a Russian sovhoz or government farm.

Loans of pictures, books, musical instruments, curious plants, and flowers have added to the enjoyment of users of Tracy Memorial.

The library continues to be a recipient of the gift of books sent out by the Carnegie Endowment to make up the International Mind Alcove collections. Sixteen newly published books are received each year.

Friends have presented the library with books, pictures, etc. W. W. Davies, a summer resident, sent nine cases of books containing many desirable titles for addition to the library. A most unusual gift is the Albert Arnold collection of fifty precious and semi-precious stones for which a suitable display cabinet has been made.

Special gifts from Mrs. Tracy during the year have been a hand tally (a most useful accessory in constant use at the library desk), a collection of beautiful baskets from northern Africa, the costumed dolls from Greece, and the seven volume set of "Lands and Peoples", with fine illustrations, many in color. The binding of these books is especially worthy of attention, as each cover is embossed with a different pictorial design.

At last town meeting the appropriation for the library was increased \$100.00 to meet the desirable one dollar per capita rate. This now gives the library an annual income of \$800.00 for books and magazines, which is much appreciated when librarians and trustees consider the demands upon the library for more, and ever more material along many lines.



Additional cupboards and shelves in the Children's Room, the new stairway in the stackroom, the linoleum on floor of upper stack, and the additional shelves and light fixtures in the upper stack have been decided improvements in the facilities of the building.

The library staff has undergone changes during the past year. In June Miss Jesseman, library assistant since October 1927, resigned to spend the summer at her home in Lisbon, later to take up studies at Boston University. Miss Jesseman's resignation was accepted with much regret. Mrs. Bertha M. Glassey of Suncook was appointed to succeed her. In the spring the librarian took a necessary sick leave of two weeks. Mrs. Allie J. Sargent continues the weekly exchange of the Elkins books, which are transported back and forth through the accommodation afforded by Arthur J. Gould and Allen O. Crane. Percy Thurston attends to the loan of the books from his store. Miss Alice Todd was a library assistant during the months of July and August. The usual annual vacations were enjoyed by members of the library and building staff. Peter Laurent substituted for Mr. Robbins during his absence.

The whole number of books now in the library—7,916. Books added during the year—622 volumes, of which 121 were added by gift, 501 by purchase. Visitors of the past year have numbered 22,180, an increase over last year by 407. Circulation of books was 17,070 volumes, an increase of 3,407 volumes. Of the total circulation 2,865 books were non-fiction, and the increase in this class was 374 volumes. As mentioned in previous years, these figures never bear any record of the books and magazines used at the library in connection with reference work required by students and teachers in the town schools and at Colby School for Girls.

## REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL COMMITTEE

*To the New London School District:*

The High School Committee, with the approval of the School Board, submit the following report:

Due to the fact that the taxes in New London are about as much as the Town can bear, we do not recommend building a high school this year.

This being the last year that our girls can be accommodated in the Freshman class at Colby, we feel some provision should be made for high school privileges in New London, for both boys and girls.

If we continue to transport our boys to Proctor, and make arrangements for our girls at Sunapee, the total expense for tuition and transportation will exceed \$9,000.00 annually.

We can organize a local high school, to be housed temporarily in the present grammar school building. This can be made to care for the increased numbers by some remodeling. The cost of the remodeling will be approximately \$700.00.

We should plan for \$5,500.00 per year for teachers, although it is possible that this amount would not be used. Books to equip this new high school would cost about \$7.00 or \$8.00 per pupil. The maximum cost would not exceed \$400.00. Ordinary pupil supplies will cost about \$3.00 per pupil, maximum total amount \$150.00. There should be some reference material, \$200.00 will cover this. For the science laboratory equipment, \$500.00 will be sufficient.

In estimating the cost of furniture in a new school, architects usually figure on \$700.00 per room. The furniture needed at this time could be bought for from \$600.00 to \$800.00.

There would be a slight increase in janitor cost. The cost of the other items, such as fuel, light, etc., would not be much of an increase over the present.

Another item of importance, is the fact that our seventh and eighth grades are at present in a traditional grammar

school organization. If a local high school were maintained, this group could be offered many advantages which are impossible at present.

Of the expenses listed, the remodeling would be a loss when a new building is built. The other items would all be of value. Teacher salaries and supply money would have been used in the regular way, but books, furniture and laboratory equipment could be used and their cost deducted from the cost of a new building program.

The cost of maintaining a local high school for the year 1932-33, compared to the expense of sending our boys and girls elsewhere, is shown in the following table:

Many of these figures are first-year expenses and would be eliminated the second year. The estimated saving after the first year would be: Remodeling, Books, Furniture, and Laboratory Equipment, approximately \$2,400.00.

Excellent space for athletic purposes can be had, directly back of the Old Academy building. This land is owned by Colby Academy and is available.

After making a study of the school situation in the surrounding towns, we find we could have considerable number of tuition pupils if we cared to provide for them. This of course, would mean an added income with little or no added expense.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

*To the Members of the School Board of New London :*

The big educational topic during the last year has been "High School". So much has been said and written on this subject that it is rather difficult to realize that a larger school system is already in operation and running smoothly.

Clear back to the time of the ninety-nine sheep, the different thing has had all the attention, and the usual has been ignored and taken for granted. Consequently in this report I shall not mention high school, but will bring up those prosaic items pertaining to everyday life in our established institution. It may not be news, but it's there.

As usual, in the period immediately following our last report, we had our "mud season". To people riding smoothly over hard surface roads in the summer, Mud Season doesn't mean much. But to drivers of school transportation, and to small children living on back roads, it means a lot. I do not recall ever seeing an annual report mention that children got to school during that period. It is taken for granted. This is a good time to call to your attention the fact that our attendance is very regular.

During the spring term, the eighth grade raised a great deal of money, to be used in a trip to Washington. This trip was made immediately after the close of school.

As usual, we graduated a good class in June. Their names will be found in the Appendix.

We did considerable standard testing all during the school year. The few places in which we found conditions not entirely satisfactory in the earlier tests were strengthened. It is not an item to make a newspaper story, but it is a rather satisfactory fact to record that these places were very few. It is rather taken for granted that our schools are good. But to make them good requires a lot of quiet, continuous hard work on the part of teachers and pupils.

When someone goes to Boston, that is news. No one reads in the paper that the superintendent has been in town, but he has been.

Supplies and books were furnished our pupils, in sufficient quantity and adequate quality. Slates are no longer used. I wonder if that item has ever been printed. The economical purchase and timely distribution of these items is usually an unmentioned part of school work. If they weren't there, that would be news.

Warm lunches are prepared by our pupils, and consumed by those staying at noon.

Our school nurse has given careful attention to the health of our children. Over-weight, underweight, tonsils, adenoids, eyes, ears, teeth, inoculation against disease, and some things better not mentioned, are routine subjects of conversation,—and action,—with her. Attention to the teaching of health habits is stressed in the schools.

When school opened in the fall, we had two new teachers. But we also had lost two good teachers. Not enough is said about the teachers we lose. The good work in the schools is not due merely to those of us who are here. It is also due to those who were here before us.

We are fortunate this year in being able to have the services of a music supervisor. Miss Sanguinetti is a real musician. She is also a teacher. In addition, we have a course in music appreciation by probably the best teacher in America, Dr. Damrosch. Of course, he doesn't come here, but the Tracy Memorial Library has made it possible for us to hear him, by means of the radio.

While we are mentioning the Library, another taken-for-granted service should be mentioned. The attention to, and guidance of, children's reading which is supplied by these librarians comes very near being news. It certainly is superior to that found in most places.

This winter we had a fire in the school house at Colby Hill during school hours. That was news, and got in the papers. But during my years of school work I have seen thousands and thousands of fire drills. They are not news, but they save lives when the fires come.

When we drive by the school house, we are apt to see children out for recess. We rarely notice that they are playing games in an organized manner, learning and getting health while enjoying themselves. The teachers are leading and directing this play. Organized play and physical development are a part of our school program.

Considerable discussion spread over America this fall, because a number of magazines and newspapers printed cartoons showing children unwillingly going to school for the opening of the fall term. The discussion started because people discovered that their children were not going unwillingly, that day or any other. It surprised people.

The surprise was the fault of the teachers and school officials. The children like to go to school now, not because of the spectacular, but because of the routine improvement. The children knew about such things as I have mentioned, but we teachers had not told you parents. It was just in the day's work.

In writing this report, there is no attempt to be facetious. It is merely, I think, time that someone brought the idea to public attention. If I were writing in a newspaper, I might call it the glorification of the commonplace. Our schools are good, they are running smoothly, our children are learning. Why not say so?

Your Board activities come in the same category. You do not have the acrimonious discussions which some city papers report from their boards. But it is worth including in this record that you have met regularly, and discussed calmly, and decided wisely. It is, in no small measure, due to this that your schools are as they are.
