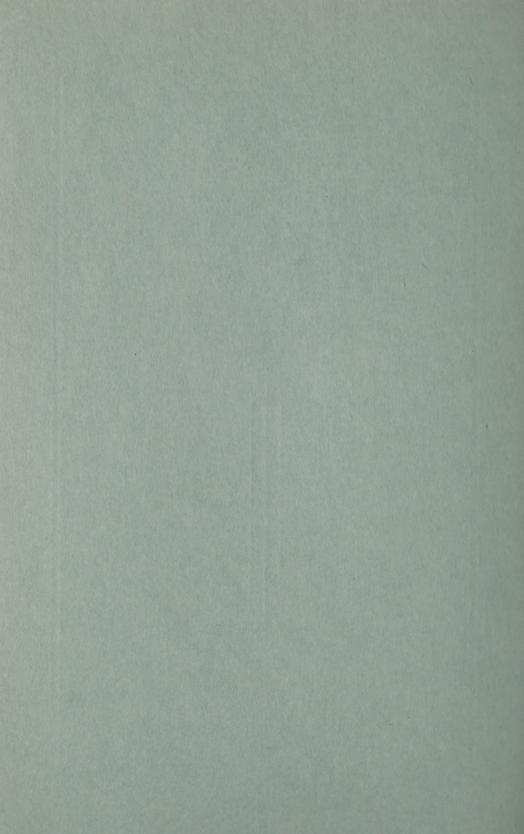

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Piermont in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Piermont Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. Mr. Earl Howard wishes to resign, a trustee will need to be elected for two remaining years.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To raise and appropriate money to maintain highways and bridges.
 - 4. To raise and appropriate money for town road aid.
- 5. To raise and appropriate money for care of cemeteries.
- 6. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Street lights and Blinker.
- 7. To raise and appropriate money for the support of the Library.
- 8. To raise and appropriate money for the support of the Fire Department.
- 9. To raise and appropriate money for the relief of poor and old age assistance.
- 10. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day and choose committee for same.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

- 12. To raise and appropriate to the White Mountain Region Association, for its program of advertising, etc. as a part of the cooperative investment by regional towns, an amount equal to 10ϕ per \$1000 of the assessed valuation of the Town for 1956.
- 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine the taxable property.
- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Town through Tax Collector's Deeds or otherwise.
- 16. To see if the Town wishes to raise and appropriate \$5000 or the balance for Town Hall reconstruction.
- 17. To see if the Town wishes to raise and appropriate money for Pine Blister Rust.
- 18. To see if the Town wishes to raise and appropriate for a Piermont public picnic and camping area and discuss the problem.
- 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Piermont qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 12th day of March, 1957, at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the support of the school lunch program for the ensuing year.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to instruct the School Board to have a telephone installed in the school building, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70.25 for the support of same.

- 11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to expenses.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The unusually large enrollment in the intermediate grades made it necessary to move Grade III into the primary building, leaving grades IV and V in the intermediate room. The employment of Miss Jean Kennett of Suffield, Connecticut, filled the position made vacant by the decision of Mrs. McClellan to leave for a much more lucrative position. Miss Kennett graduated from the University of New Hampshire, Class of '56, and holds a B. A. degree. She has done graduate work in the field of Elementary Education.

The pupils are being instructed by an efficient staff. The American public school system was founded to help maintain and further develop the American way of life. Our educational system has grown as America has grown. Underlying every school system there is an educational philosophy, assumed or expressed.

With each succeding generation, more persons work for others. This also brings new responsibilities to the schools. Each person today, more than ever before, needs to see the relationship between his work — and the quality of this work — and the welfare of himself, his family, and his community.

Education is preparation for complete living, for citizenship in its broadest sense. The first ten amendments to the Constitution were adopted primarily to safeguard the rights of the individual in our society. Education is a privilege, a right, and a responsibility.

Although the nature of society and the resulting needs of citizenship determine what should be taught, the nature of the child determines to what extent it can be taught, when it can be best taught, and how it can be taught. The needs of a child thus determines what should be taught and the nature of the child determines method.

The staff is diligently applying methods as determined by the needs of the individual, in-so-far as the teachers can, as determined by the physical plant, number of pupils per room, and equipment available.

The generous support given the lunch program is indicative of the citizens general interest in the pupils welfare. This program continues to be successfully operated by Mrs. Martin Day.

The industry and loyalty of the teaching staff, as well as the support of the school board members and citizens are gratefully acknowledged.

Routine vision and hearing screening tests were completed. When defects were found, written notices were sent to the parents.

Each pupil was examined with the Woods lite which is used to detect the presence of scalp ringworm. No cases were found.

The Salk Polio vaccine became available to all children through 14 years of age. All school children in this age group were given an opportunity to receive the vaccine. The clinic was sponsored by the State Department of Health, and conducted by Mrs. Lois Barton, R. N., Public Health Nurse in this area. I want to especially thank the following people who gave so generously of their time and services: Dr. Franklin Dwinell, Vida Adams, R. N., Florence Clough, R. N., Jean Putnam, R. N., and Mrs. Phyllis Cliveland, R.
