# WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

The Polls will be open from 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Bremer Pond Auditorium in said Pittsburg on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To bring in your ballots for the election of one Selectman, for three years; one Selectman, for one year; one Road Agent, for one year; a Town Clerk, for three years; an Overseer of the Welfare, for one year; a Trustee of Trust Funds, for three years; a Library Trustee, for three years; two Planning Board Members, for three years; two Planning Board Members, for two years; and two Planning Board Members, for one year.
2. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to appoint all necessary town officers not listed under Article 1.
3. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and elect a committee to set a date and manage the Old Home Day observance.
5. (BY PETITION) Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure? These statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for non-payment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes. (Yes or No Ballot)
6. (BY PETITION) To see if the Town will vote to elect to approve of the inclusion of its officers and employees in the New Hampshire Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by RSA 100-A (supp), for the employees of the Town of Pittsburg in accordance with Chapter 134 (Laws of 1967) to be effective July 1, 1989.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600) for the town contribution to the New Hampshire Retirement System, if the preceding Article is approved.

8. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of closure of the Town Dump and raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) to be placed in this fund.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand forty-four dollars (\$2,044) to develop a Solid Waste District Management Plan as required by NH RSA 149-M. Specifically, the appropriation will be used to coordinate monthly meetings of the seven communities, to document the status of existing disposal facilities, to assess future disposal options and to prepare an implementation plan for a 15 year disposal solution. The Upper Connecticut River Valley Solid Waste District recommends this appropriation.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for the stream bank on Hall Stream.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) for an addition to the town office.
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand one hundred and 28/100 dollars (\$15,100.28) of accumulated interest on Sewer Project Funds and authorize the withdrawal of this sum from the Sewer Construction Account to be used to pay the first interest payment of Sewer Project note. (2/3 majority vote required.)
13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to close out and withdraw the Sewer Capital Reserve Fund plus accumulated interest to date (approximately \$29,000 total) to be used toward the principal and interest payment for the Sewer Project.
14. To see if the Town will vote to accept the lease/purchase agreement made by the Selectmen for the new 1988 Dresser grader.
15. To see if the Town will vote to trade in the 1955 Austin-Western grader, being part of the agreement on the new grader.
16. To see if the Town meeting will vote to rescind the Happy Corner Covered Bridge Appropriation in the amount of \$25,000 as voted at the 1987 Town Meeting under Article 17 and redirect the appropriation in like dollar value toward gravel or hot-top for town roads.
17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for hot-top on town roads.

18. To see if the Town will vote to have a complete revaluation by a private appraisal firm that has been approved by the Department of Revenue Administration. Revaluation to be completed for the year 1989 or thereafter.
19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000) for a complete revaluation, \$25,000 of which would be raised by taxation in the year 1989, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow the balance of \$55,000 in the name of the Town by issuance of serial notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33), to be repaid over a two year period. (2/3 majority vote required.)
20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal and state grants which may become available during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the town may legally appropriate money.
21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$494,379.00 which represents the bottom line of the posted budget. Said sum is exclusive of all special articles addressed.
22. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Polls will not close before 7:00 P.M.

# POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

1988 was a busy year for the Pittsburg Police Department in that we prosecuted a large number of cases in the Colebrook District Court. A breakdown of the cases is as follows:

Motor Vehicle - 111, Driving While Under the Influence - 7; O H R V - 49; Unauthorized Camping - 27; Unlawful possession of Alcohol - 3; Dog Complaints - 12; Juvenile Cases - 5; Assaults - 1; Drugs - 5; Theft - 3; Criminal Trespass -9; Criminal Mischief - 1; Disorderly Conduct - 1.

In addition to this, we had several camp breaks reported, and we investigated 45 accidents during the year. We are happy to report that as of this time we have a suspect awaiting indictment in Lancaster Superior Court for the January 28, 1988, burglary at the Trading Post.

Our goal continues to be twofold: 1. We want to continue our training in 1989 to be able to meet the ever-changing requirements and laws. 2. We want to try to update our equipment to make our Department as well equipped as any in the area. We feel that if we can continue with this policy we will be better able to serve you. In 1988 the other officers and I attended schools on various subjects as well as being recertified in the PR-24 nightstick and firearms.

I would like to remind all dog owners of their responsibility to get their dog licensed, and also that they must keep the dog under control at all times. I will use an extra effort in 1989 to see that all dogs are licensed or summons will be issued to the owners and a court appearance will be required.

Again let me remind you of how to get in touch with an officer. If you have an emergency, call Colebrook dispatch at 237-5555. They have our schedule and are manned 24 hours a day. You can call me at home (538-6540) and if I'm not there, leave a message on my answering machine and I will get back to you as soon as possible. Please leave the time of your call as well as your message. You can call Officer French at his home (538-6506) or Sgt. von Dohrmann at his home (538-6541). We are here to help you and will make every effort we can to see that an officer responds to your call. On behalf of the Pittsburg Police Department, I would like to thank you for your support in 1988 and look forward to serving you in 1989.

# FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Pittsburg Fire Department held its usual monthly meetings on the second Wednesday of each month at 7:00 P.M. in the meeting room over the Town Office. Between drills and fire schools, the men put in 744 man-hours of training during the year. Four men attended a 120 hour school at the Colebrook Fire Department, and two men went to Pease Air Force Base for a school on the use and types of foam. Two live-fire training burns taught subjects such as air paks, pumping, water supply, large diameter hose, and forcible entry.

It is a statistical fact that 52% of N. H. structural fires originate as chimney fires. DON'T TAKE A CHANCE--Call 538-6611 and give your name and your location, and stay on the line until you are told to hang up.

I would like to remind everyone that smoke alarms are required by law. They cost less than \$15.00 and yet, in 1988, in N. H., nine people lost their lives due to smoke inhalation. Smoke alarms cost so little and, with a five pound fire extinguisher, are the best insurance policy you can have. If you have a battery-operated alarm you do have to replace the battery once a year, or when it signals that the battery is low. Please, if you do not have a smoke alarm in your home or camp, get at least one.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank our neighboring departments and their chiefs, Ronald Hughes of Colebrook and Henry Prehemo of Beecher Falls, for their cooperation and assistance during the year.

I particularly wish to thank each and every man in the Pittsburg Department for his dedication throughout the year. These men know that they owe their community more than just taxes, and they demonstrate it.

# PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Pittsburg Planning Board held its twice monthly meetings on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month. The appointed members for 1988 are:

We were also very fortunate to have the services of Ellie Crockett as Secretary.

On August 25, 1987, there was a special town meeting at the Bremer Pond Auditorium giving the voters the chance to vote on an article that would give the Planning Board the authority to regulate subdivisions. The recorded vote on this article was YES - 77 and NO - 9. We then held two public hearings on our proposed subdivision regulations, one in September of 1987 and another in February of 1988. On February 15, 1988, the Board voted to accept the subdivision regulations, and they were filed with the Town Clerk.

During 1988 we received one application for a lot line adjustment, eight applications for a minor subdivision, and one application for a major subdivision. We would like to state that any subdivision that was in place before we adopted the regulations was grandfathered and is exempt from our regulations. We would also like to remind you that "subdivision" means the division of a lot, tract, or parcel of land into 2 or more lots, plats, sites, or other division of land, and requires planning board approval prior to being done.

We are continuing to work on the town master plan. It is now required that all towns have a master plan, and we are hopeful that Pittsburg's will be completed before the end of 1989. A Master Plan is a comprehensive set of policies aimed at guiding growth and development. It must show what Pittsburg is like today, and describe how it is meeting its problems. It also must show how Pittsburg will change in the future and how the town will be prepared to meet these changes.

At this time the planning board would like to thank everyone for the support we have received in the past, and ask for your continued support in guiding the growth of the town in the future.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

School board members, school personnel, and interested community members continue to wrestle with the problem of improving and upgrading school facilities. As this necessary task continues, progress has been made in improving educational programs.

An art teacher position was added to the staff, working with all students on a four day per week schedule. One day is spent in Stewartstown.

Additional computers have been purchased to give students more time at "hands-on" experiences in computer science.

The "Odyssey of the Mind" program was introduced to students in the upper elementary grades, giving students the opportunity to work together in creative problem solving and compete against students in other schools. Also, a student council has been formed at this level and hopefully in the future, they will carry on into the high school.

Through the limited funding we receive from vocational education grants, equipment is being upgraded in the business and home economics areas.

Much of what is being done in the daily routines of the educational process needs to be documented. Sub-committees comprised of teachers, the principal, and board members are working together to write a school philosophy, establish discipline guidelines, and set standards for academic excellence. Curriculum development continues to be a priority for school staff.

After a lengthy process of negotiations which went to impasse and mediation, an agreement was finally reached which keeps teacher salaries competitive with other north country districts. Though teacher turn-over was significantly high, we were fortunate to hire well qualified teachers, many with prior experience.

The Clarksville and Pittsburg School Boards have held, and will continue to hold, joint meetings in a cooperative effort to improve programs at the Pittsburg School.

It seems that new issues are always on the horizon in the education domain. Three come to mind that the State Board of Education and the Department of Education want us to address:

- AIDS prevention education
- Character/values education
- Drop-out prevention programs.

We are well aware that funding is limited, not only for education, but also for the necessary community projects such as sewer, landfill, road maintenance, etc..... As a new session of the legislature begins, it is important to stay informed and be sure that our legislators are acting in our interests in assuring that mandated programs and projects are fully funded. I believe most of us can and should do a better job in communicating with our area legislators.

## COORDINATOR OF SPECIAL SERVICES

During the 1987-88 school year, there were approximately 100 students within the S A U #7 needing Special Education Services. These services have been offered through regular and special education classrooms except in a few cases where the severity of the handicap or an order of the court has necessitated out-of-district placement.

The overall quality of services in the seven special educational settings has been good and, in some instances, exceptional. In particular, Ms. Norma Chenevert, the previous Coordinator of Special Services, has become Head Teacher as well as Resource Room Teacher at the West Side School in Stewartstown. Her dedication and knowledge of the field of special education have made a profound difference on the students in that school.

We have been fortunate in being able to provide quality services in the related areas of Speech/Language, Occupational Therapy & School Psychology through contracts with local professionals. Physical Therapy, Vision and Diagnostic Services have also been provided through various local and regional agencies.

We have continued to see the benefit of providing services for preschool handicapped children. Early identification and intervention appear to be ameliorating problems in many of these children prior to entering first grade.

Tutorial programs for vocationally disadvantaged students provided benefits for high school students in Pittsburg and Colebrook.

Two staff members continue to pursue Special Education Certification through the Pool Expansion Program (PEP). This program is administered by the State Department of Education to attract teaching professionals into the field of Special Education.

There has been an emphasis to coordinate curriculum and student objectives among the various Special Education classrooms in the S A U.

Parents, teachers, school boards, and administrators continue to provide the support necessary to enable our programs to be responsive to student needs.

## SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

Prevention, through education and various services, is the prime objective of the Health Services Program in school. Our goal is to allow children to develop an understanding of the importance of protecting their health and to obtain knowledge of the ways in which it can be maintained.

We continue to make use of all the service agencies, both local and state, that we have had access to in the past. Our usual screening procedures (i.e., vision, hearing, etc....) were also conducted on every student.

Two new state laws have been recently passed that affect the school. The first law, condensed from RSA 193, 141, and 200, has made the following changes in our immunization program: "All parents or legal guardians shall have their children who are residing in this state immunized against certain diseases. These diseases shall include, but not be limited to, diphtheria, mumps, pertussis, poliomyelitis, rubella, rubeola, and tetanus." Measles (rubeola), rubella, and mumps must have all been received after one year of age. If the child has already had one of the above diseases, doctor documented proof or a titre must be on file at the school. All children in the preschool program must have an up-to-date immunization record. This law was passed in January, 1988, and went into effect in September, 1988.

The second law was passed in July, 1988, and deals with the health education program. It is listed under RSA 21, 186, and 189. This law sets minimum standards for N H Public Elementary Schools in regard to health education. All schools are in the process of expanding their health curriculum. A grant was written last year to purchase the "Here's Looking At You, 2000" drug and alcohol education program for grades K-4 for use in all the S A U #7 schools. Education is the key to prevention.

To enrich our drug and alcohol education program, we were fortunate to have a presentation from Sgt. Lowe, a police detective with expertise in drug enforcement. We also had a presentation from the N H Safety Council on Seat Belts. Dr. Gifford came in to assist us with our AIDS education program. We would like to thank him for his assistance and concern in this area.

Dr. Goodman presented a workshop dealing with Pediatric Updates. The school nurse attended the series. We would like to thank him for his assistance with our school health program during his tenure as our school physician.

Please feel free to contact your school nurse in regard to any health matter that concerns you.

## PITTSBURG-CLARKSVILLE CHAPTER ONE PROJECT

The Pittsburg-Clarksville Chapter One Project is a federally funded effort to provide special assistance for school children who have been identified as individuals likely to benefit from additional individualized learning activities. Selection for participation in these programs is based upon achievement test results, teacher referrals, and parental requests for service.

Through the Chapter One program, the skills taught in regular classrooms are re-inforced thus helping to ensure that participating children will progress successfully from grade to grade. A variety of activities and educational materials are used. Computer software, reading stations, instructional games, and self-paced individualized reading and math programs were used as the base for this supplementary program.

Because of a limited budget, the Pittsburg-Clarksville program focuses on reading and math skills in grades one, two, and three only. This program focus is the result of parent and teacher surveys which have identified math and reading skills in the early years as the most critical ingredients in the long term academic success of students.

We have been very fortunate to have enjoyed strong support and excellent cooperation from our classroom teachers, Miss Hoover, Mrs. Fish, and Mrs. Pariseau. They have been instrumental in the successes of the Chapter One programs. The support of parents has been greatly appreciated also and has contributed to the overall excellence of our Chapter One effort.

The 1987-88 school year brought change to the Chapter One program. Mrs. Kate Lord, who served as Chapter One Project Director for the past nine years, retired from the director's position. She was responsible for the development of our present program. Because of her leadership and commitment, many of our students have been given that extra boost allowing them to experience the joys of success. As the individual responsible for the overall operation of our Chapter One program, she was a key contributor to the successes this program has experienced.

As Interim Project Manager, I wish to take this opportunity to thank all the staff and the many parents whose combined efforts have provided support and increased the benefits shared by Chapter One students.
