Ralph was born in Seabrook on March 29, 1907, the son of James S. and Ellie (Souther) Eaton and was a life-long resident. The son of a selectman and the father of a selectman, both having the same names, Ralph's interest and dedication to public service was a family tradition. As a young man he served as a constable and was Seabrook's first elected Chief of Police in 1939. He also served as a volunteer fire-fighter and was a life member of the Seabrook Firemen's Association. He became Building Inspector for the Town in 1962 and served in that capacity for twenty-two years until 1984.

He was a carpenter by trade and built or remodeled many homes in Seabrook, particularly Seabrook Beach and performed many remodeling jobs for the Town when the Town Offices were located at the Seabrook Firemen's Association Building.

Ralph and his wife Anna of nearly 59 years were the parents of three children. He served many years as an election worker at the polls on election day and his presence will be missed by the many voters who pass through the polls on that day. The first election day in many years that he was absent was in March, 1987, just after his death on March 4, 1987.

William E. Felch (better known as Bill) was born on July 25, 1916, Newburyport, Massachusetts, the son of Ralph F. and Viola E. Hersey Felch. His father Ralph (Jabe) Felch was notorious for his jokes and tales of days past.

Bill was a life-long resident of the Town of Seabrook and married Lorenda Dow; the couple had three children, Stanley J. Saracy, Ralph E. Felch and Charles W. Felch.


He served 4½ years in the United States Army and was a World War II Veteran. During '48-'49 he served as Commander of the Raymond E. Walton Post #70 American Legion and was a member of the Seabrook Firemen's Association for many years.

Bill worked for the State Highway Department for five years prior to first becoming Road Agent for the Town of Seabrook. He was the Town's first full-time Road Agent and held that position for nearly 30 years, retiring in 1982.

He was an avid hunter, fisherman and was very sports minded. Woodworking was one of his hobbies and he also enjoyed antiques. He is fondly remembered by many of his friends as being of a quiet, serious nature and as a family man first and foremost.

Article 2: Shall the municipality approve the Charter Amendment reprinted below?

To amend the Seabrook Home Rule Charter, Part II, by adding Section XXIV, Public Works, as follows:

There is hereby created the Department of Public Works. It shall consist of a Director of Public Works who shall be head of the department and all officers and employees assigned thereto. The Director shall be appointed by the Selectmen. All officers shall perform their duties subject to the supervision of the Director.

A. The Department of Public Works shall have charge of and supervision over the construction, management, and control of the Town's water system and all storm, water, and sanitary sewers, including the setting of rates which shall be done only with the approval of the Selectmen.

B. The department shall have charge of the care, maintenance, and construction of public dumps, public parks and playgrounds, cemeteries, public beaches, public forests, shade and ornamental trees, and the collection of waste and refuse. These duties shall not, however, conflict and interfere with the duties and responsibilities of the Recreation Commission so long as said Commission continues in existence.

C. The department shall have charge of the street lighting system and shall be responsible for the maintenance, repair, and extension thereof.

D. All physical properties of the Town, including water distribution, parks, playgrounds, and all municipal utilities not assigned to some other department or office shall be and are hereby assigned to the Department of Public Works.

E. The Director of Public Works shall be custodian of all tools, equipment, and other personal property belonging to the Town and not assigned to the care of any other public officer.

F. All persons currently holding office or performing duties in conflict with or duplicating the authority granted to the Department of Public Works herein, shall continue in office or in performance of these duties until the Selectmen appoint a director, at which time the said office and duties shall be discontinued.

G. The effective date of this amendment is July 1, 1987.

Article 3: To see if the town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance:

1. To amend the Zoning Ordinance Article 1, Section X, DEFINITIONS, by adding the following definition of "SIGN" as follows:

SIGN - A sign is a name, identification, description, display or illustration or any other visual display which is affixed to or painted or represented directly or indirectly upon a building, structure, or piece of land in view of the general public and which directs to an object, product, place, activity, person, institution, organization, or business.

However, a sign shall not include any display of official court or public notice nor any official traffic control device, nor shall it include the flag, emblem, or insignia of a nation, state, county, municipality, school, or religious group.

Article 4: To see if the town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2, as proposed by the Planning Board, for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance:

2. To amend the Zoning Ordinance by adding a new section as follows:

SECTION XI SIGNS
ARTICLE I GENERAL REGULATIONS

- A. The intent of this Article is to allow the erection of signs for the purpose of providing information and advertising in an orderly, effective and safe manner. Restrictions on type, location, and size of signs protect the public from hazardous and distracting displays and create an attractive environment which is conducive to business, industry and tourism.
- B. All signs shall comply with the regulations affecting the erection and construction of signs as required by such State and Federal Agencies having jurisdiction over the location and erection of same.
- C. Any traffic or directional sign owned or installed by a governmental agency shall be permitted.
- D. All signs to be located ten (10) feet from a Street Lot Line or a Public Right of Way except by special exception by the Board of Adjustment.
- E. The maximum height for all signs shall be thirty-five (35) feet.
- F. The minimum ground clearance for all permanent signs shall be six (6) feet.
- G. Signs, any part of which moves or flashes, and all signs with traveling light(s) or of an animated type are prohibited, except by special exception by the Board of Adjustment. Any signs, if lighted, shall be illuminated by a luminous tube or by an indirect shielded light. A sign or its illuminator shall not, by reason of its location, shape or color interfere with public traffic or be confused with or obstruct the view or effectiveness of any official traffic signal.

ARTICLE 2 SIGNS IN ZONES 1 and 5

- A. No more than one (1) nameplate and/or identification sign shall be allowed for each dwelling unit.
- B. No sign may be larger than four (4) square feet per side.

ARTICLE 3 SIGNS IN ZONES 2 and 3

Business signs are permitted in Zones 2 and 3 in accordance with the following regulations:

- A. No more than two (2) signs shall be allowed for any one business.
- B. One wall or projecting sign for each lot street frontage on each establishment. Maximum surface area shall not exceed two (2) square feet for each foot of building frontage for all wall signs and fifteen (15) square feet for projecting signs.
- C. One pole or free-standing sign for each lot street frontage. Maximum surface area shall not exceed forty (40) square feet per side except that a shopping center or industrial park having two (2) or more businesses may have a common sign containing a registry of all tenants and/or occupants with a maximum surface area of eighty (80) square feet per side.

ARTICLE 4 TEMPORARY SIGNS

One temporary sign per business shall be allowed. Such sign shall have a maximum surface area of thirty (30) square feet per side.

ARTICLE 5 SIGN PERMITS

- A. No sign shall be erected until a permit for same has been obtained from the Building Inspector and appropriate fee paid. No permit or fee is necessary for the following:
 - 1. Yard Sale and Flea Market
 - 2. Real Estate Sale or Rental Signs
 - 3. Institutional Signs
 - 4. Political Signs
 - 5. Signs indicating the name and nature of approved home occupations.
- B. There shall be no fee charged to non-profit organizations for temporary signs.
- C. All political signs shall be removed within seven (7) days after the election.

ADJOURNED TOWN MEETING HELD AT SEABROOK ELEMENTARY SCHOOL
SEABROOK, N.H.
MARCH 12, 1987

Adjourned Town Meeting called to order by Moderator Charles H. Felch, Sr., at 7:16 p.m.

Salute to flag led by Harry Brown.

Moderator stated that all visitors must sit to the right.

Moderator will recognize sponsor of article first.

No consideration of articles at a subsequent meeting if we adjourn to a later date.

All amendments must be presented to the Moderator in writing and must be signed.

Speaker entitled to be heard, but loud discussions must be taken to the lobby.

State law about smoking in a public place enforced -- RSA 155:45.

After an article has been explained to body, Moderator will accept a motion to lay on table.

Personal privilege given to Clyde O. Brown. Mr. Brown explained about the Board of Selectmen holding meetings behind closed doors.

Article 5: To see if the town will vote to establish a scholarship/trust fund for the purpose of accepting yearly royalties from the town's cable T.V. franchise and expending such sums to benefit high school graduates residing in the Town of Seabrook who are pursuing post-secondary education or training in the mass-media field, and to transfer into said fund the sum of Three Thousand Four Hundred Nine Dollars and Eight Cents (\$3,409.08) which represents accrued franchise fees paid to the town. And further, to establish a Scholarship Fund Committee of three citizens, one of whom shall be a Trustee of the Trust Funds, appointed by the Board of Selectmen to establish qualifications and procedures for the use of said fund and make yearly recommendations to the Trustee of the Trust Funds for awarding of scholarships.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Motion by Clyde O. Brown, second by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, to adopt Article 5 as read. Amendment by Albert Weare, second by Frederick Moulton, to amend figure amount to read \$3410.00. ARTICLE 5 ADOPTED AS AMENDED.

Article 6: To see if the town will vote to fund the Cemetery Trust Fund entitled "Care of Cemetery Lots" by depositing in said fund an amount of money from accumulated surplus in the amount of Six Thousand One Hundred Twenty-Five (\$6,125.00) Dollars (being the amount of receipts from sale of cemetery lots).

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Motion by Clyde O. Brown, second by Frank Fern, to adopt Article 6 as read. ARTICLE 6 DEFEATED.

Article 7: To see whether or not the town will vote to adopt the ordinances and regulations, together with a change of numbering, titleing and formatting thereof, the entire text of which are as published by General Code Publishers in "The Code of the Town of Seabrook" on file with the Town Clerk, effective on passage; this vote shall supersede and replace by reference to said Code the ordinances and regulations heretofore adopted by the Town of Seabrook.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Clyde O. Brown to adopt Article 7 as read. ARTICLE 7 ADOPTED.

Article 8: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to renew and refund town notes.

Motion by Clyde O. Brown, second by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, to adopt Article 8 as read. ARTICLE 8 ADOPTED.

Article 9: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Clyde O. Brown, to adopt Article 9 as read. Article explained by Town Counsel, Gary Holmes. ARTICLE 9 ADOPTED.

Article 10: To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to appoint such permanent police officers, firemen and employees for all other departments of the town as they deem necessary.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Clyde O. Brown, to adopt Article 10 as read. ARTICLE 10 DEFEATED.

Article 11: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell at public auction or by advertised sealed bids such town property as is no longer used by the town.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Ann Downer, to adopt Article 11 as read. ARTICLE 11 ADOPTED

Article 12: To see if the town will vote, pursuant to authority under RSA 80:42 and RSA 80:42-a, to retain and hold all real property located within the marshlands and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell all other tax title property, in the first instance to former owners of the property, or the grandparents, parents, children, and spouses of said former owner, for a sum not less than the outstanding taxes owed plus accrued interest to the date of tax deed; or failing such sale, then by advertised sealed bids or public auction, at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen.

Motion by James S. Eaton, second by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, to adopt Article 12 as read. ARTICLE 12 ADOPTED.

Article 13: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Million Eight Hundred Sixty Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty-Four (7,860,924.00) Dollars or such other sum as may be necessary, to pay and/or settle judgments of the Superior Court against the town for refund of a portion of the taxes assessed against the owners of the Seabrook project for the years 1978-1982 inclusive, and to authorize the selectmen to calculate and pay additional interest at the rate of six (6%) percent per annum on the principal sum of these judgments, from the date of the 1987 town meeting to date of payment, adding such additional interest to the total amount to be raised and appropriated; and to take any other action relating thereto.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Clyde O. Brown, to adopt Article 13 as read. Amendment by Clyde O. Brown, second by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, to amend figure amount to \$8,037,285.00. ARTICLE 13 ADOPTED AS AMENDED.

Article 14: To see if the town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as an offset against the following debt service:

Article 19: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty-Five Thousand Three Hundred (\$85,300.00) Dollars to purchase and install a central heating system at the Town Hall.

Motion by Clyde O. Brown, second by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, to adopt Article 19 as read. ARTICLE 19 DEFEATED.

Article 20: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Five Thousand (\$35,000.00) Dollars to purchase and install an electric generator at the Town Hall.

Article 21: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Three Hundred Eighty (\$11,380.00) Dollars to purchase and install additions/enhancements to the Town Hall computer system.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Clyde O. Brown, to adopt Article 21 as read. Computer system to be installed in Town Clerks office and also add to other departments. ARTICLE 21 ADOPTED.

Article 22: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Thousand (\$200,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of completing improvements to Old New Boston Road and Ledge Road and to apply the balance of

accounts under Article 46 (1983 - Ledge Road, Pine Street and Lower Collins Street), Article 30 (1985 - Ledge Road and Lower Collins Street), and Article 36 (1986 - Ledge Road and Lower Collins Street) towards these projects.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN/ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT'S REPORT

This has been an extremely busy but productive year for the town.

Early in 1987 a contract for engineering and design of the town's sewer system was finally awarded to the partnership of Jones and Beach/Stearns & Wheler. By the end of the year, design was proceeding approximately two months ahead of schedule.

After years of controversy a permit was finally secured from the State Wetlands Board to improve Cross Beach Road. During the summer and fall all work was completed including the re-establishment of several sand dunes which had been destroyed. A grant for \$17,000 was secured to reduce the cost of this work, from the Coastal Zone Management Program. A second CZM grant for \$25,000 was also obtained to allow the town to study the reconstruction of sand dunes on Seabrook Beach which had been destroyed in years past.

The town was active in the grant area in 1987, having secured a third grant in December in the amount of \$110,000. This grant from the State Department of Transportation will pay for major repair work to be done on the Causeway Street bridge in 1988.

The new police station was finally completed and occupied in December. Disputes with the construction company greatly lengthened the completion date of the building.

The new fire station construction proceeded much faster by comparison; the building was virtually completed by year's end and it should be occupied by this February.

The 1987 Annual Town Meeting approved additional funding for construction of a new transfer station but bids received exceeded the appropriation and additional funding will be sought at town meeting. If approved, construction should be concluded this coming summer.

This same situation occurred as a result of bidding for development of Ledge Road. If additional funds are approved, construction can be completed in 1988. Meanwhile, installation of finished grading and drainage has been authorized and will take place during the first few months of 1988.

Installation of the town's last deep rock well was completed in 1987. Unfortunately, water quality was poor due to the presence of substantial iron and manganese. Treatment may be the only alternative to putting that well on line in 1988.

Rocks Road picnic area and river access ramp was finally opened by the joint owners of Seabrook Station in the spring in 1987.

Several new management initiatives were started in 1987. An update to the employee's wage and classification study was commissioned and should be complete in 1988. Also, the establishment of a "flex benefits" plan for the employees will be studied; this will allow each town employee to tailor his/her fringe benefit package to meet his/her own personal needs.

A number of town hall employees were given specialized computer training in 1987 and a committee was appointed by the Selectmen and Beach Commissioners to study the possibility of centralizing all building inspection services. A committee was also appointed to study and recommend implementation of scholarship eligibility criteria made possible by cable television franchise fees.

In 1987 the Seabrook Employee's Association labor contract was finally signed. This negotiation was lengthy and at times difficult. Both sides persevered and a fair contract to both sides was ultimately concluded.

As 1987 ended, negotiations with the police and fire unions began for contracts expiring early in 1988. A ruling from the Superior Court was expected to determine the fate of the Town's residency requirement for police and fire department personnel. In addition, the SEA supervisory union's future will be decided by the Public Employee's Labor Relations Board.

Two special town meetings were petitioned in 1987. The first, held in the fall, dealt with the Chase Homestead. The meeting voted to allow the Chase family time to remove the structure thereby saving it from demolition as voted by the Annual Town Meeting in March of 1987. A second special town meeting was petitioned in December and was held early in 1988. The petitioners sought to authorize Sunday dog racing and to establish a scholarship fund from a part of the racing proceeds.

In 1987 the joint owners of Seabrook Station were paid a property tax rebate in the amount of \$ 8,037,285 due to a court settlement against the town. This settlement covers tax years 1978-82, but still unresolved are the years 1983 to the present. Another large multi-million dollar abatement is likely. This possibility, plus the Public Service Company threatened bankruptcy in 1987 caused the town to look much more carefully at future expenditures. At the end of 1987, several new initiatives were instigated for proposal to the 1988 Annual Town Meeting.

First, funding to study the town's financial condition and how it may be improved, especially by reducing our over-reliance on a single, large property taxpayer. Second, funding to examine the town's government structure and determine if certain efficiencies may be possible. Third, examination of the town's water supply and the condition of our aquifers. This critical area should be a major priority in the near future while funds are available to address it.

In the area of solid waste disposal, the Southeast Regional Solid Waste Commission was formed in 1987. Its responsibility, according to RSA 143-B, is to develop regional plans (in this case, most of Rockingham County) for the future disposal of trash and septic sludge. The town has actively participated in these planning efforts, and at year's end was studying the possibility of joining with other towns in Rockingham County to build a solid waste recycling plant somewhere in the county area. A proposal to this effect will be on the Annual Town Meeting Warrant.

In 1987, the town welcomed several new employees in three new positions. A Deputy Treasurer, a Selectmen's Secretary and a Clerk to the Town Clerk were hired and have certainly helped to make town government operations more efficient.

In 1987 the Housing Authority was revitalized with the appointment of several new members and was making plans for a presentation at town meeting.

Also this year a long-term project was completed with the identification of the boundaries of all Seabrook Beach roads and the setting of concrete markers to delineate those bounds. It will now be possible to determine when people have encroached on town roads with driveways, etc., and cause corrective action to take place.

Finally, 1987 saw the first televised Seabrook "Town Meeting". While actually not a legal town meeting, WCVB television used that title to depict its forum for a discussion of the pros and cons of nuclear power. In a related televised series, many Seabrook residents expressed their feelings regarding that same issue, and showed that great controversy still surrounds that subject.

As we go into 1988, many projects remain to be completed and some new ones will surely be begun. It is our feeling, however, that future expenditures must be carefully planned and our over-reliance on a single property taxpayer must be carefully examined. We all need to be more prudent with the expenditures we authorize at

town meeting, knowing that at any time the financial burden of those expenditures may suddenly be shifted onto the homeowners shoulders.

We would like to thank all town employees and other volunteer citizens working on town boards and committees for their excellent work in 1987. We look forward to a productive year working with you in 1988.

ASSESSING DEPARTMENT 1987

REVALUATION PROJECT

The town wide revaluation will be completed this year with new market valuations coming out for the December 1988 billing period.

ASSESSOR OFFICE LAYOUT CHANGE

Seventeen feet of additional counter space has been added within our office to facilitate the use of maps and computer print information for the public.

MOBILE HOME MARKET STUDY

All sales of mobile homes since 1982 have been thoroughly analyzed. The results of the study indicate a considerable market value rise.

PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANY AND TENANTS IN COMMON

Public Service Company and Tenants in Common have been paying 94% of the town's expenses for approximately ten years, and remaining taxpayers have been paying 6% of the total annual operating expenses. If the nuclear project was to go bankrupt, the town taxpayers would have to absorb an additional 94% of town expenditures. To put this into a mathematical perspective, the current annual tax bill of \$483.00 for a \$50,000 home would rise to \$2,937.00, for the same home, with the same value under the current operational budget.

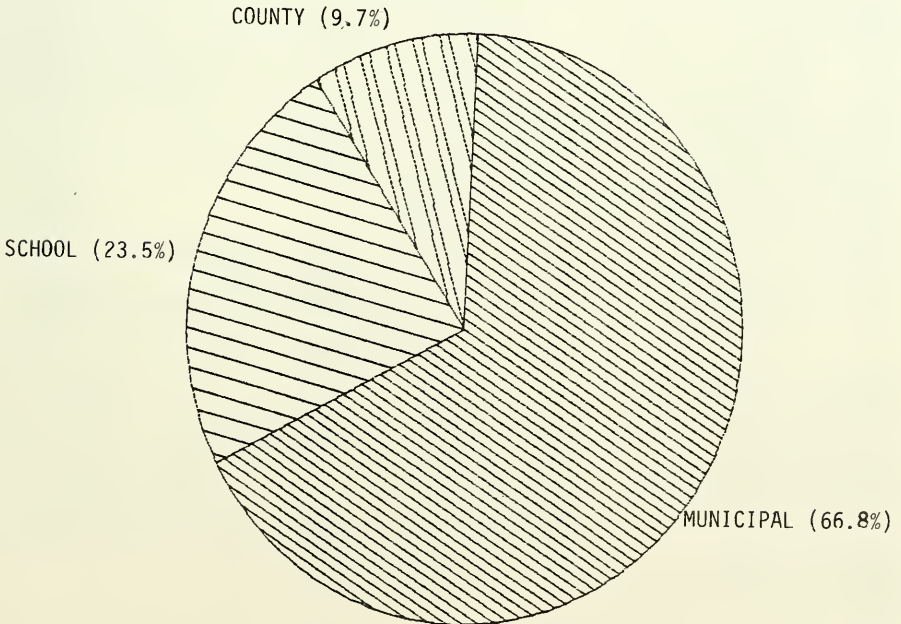

BUILDING INSPECTOR

I would like to thank all the people who removed their junk vehicles and cleaned up their property in 1987. It is encouraging to see that we still have pride in our community and I hope this will continue.

This year has been another very busy year for the building department. Residential units have remained about the same with mobile homes declining and single family homes increasing. The increases in conventional homes reflect replacement from mobile homes to new homes.

This year has seen a 50 percent increase in estimated values from \$7,918,299 in 1986 to \$11,885,050 in 1987. The reason for this is the increase in large commercial complexes and industrial buildings being constructed. Seabrook for several reasons is a very desirable location for business and with the completion of our much needed sewage system, will open up many more areas to this kind of development of our town.

To balance our growth and maintain the quality of life for the residents of the town some zoning changes will have to be made. If the proper planning is done and the sewage system becomes operational, it will bring many opportunity to the residents of this town and the business community as well.

In the past I have been to public hearings on zoning changes and very few residents have attended, leaving these critical decisions to a handful of volunteers. Everyone has good ideas, but if they are not brought forward and discussed we have lost a very valuable asset, public input.

ANIMAL CONTROL DIVISION
REPORT FOR 1987

Animal Control is at the completion of its second year in operation. During the past year, we have enjoyed the opportunity to find ourselves in many different but interesting situations. In many areas of our job the tasks have tripled, in others, they have only doubled. We have served the Town this past year in a very broad spectrum within the animal kingdom ranging from trapping skunks to retrieving dolphins from the beach; from apprehending foxes attacking chickens to chasing Eastern Coyotes running along the roadways. Of course, there were still the more common complaints of barking dogs and feral cats about the town, which we now handle on a daily basis. However, we feel that our most important task is to take care of the everyday nuisance calls of the local animals disrupting trash cans and running at large.

We have discovered many new aspects within the legal arena, both good and bad, but we have been able to handle most things and still work within the system. Our goal for 1988 is to conduct two more rabies clinics in the spring, as well as to assist the public in educating them to the new laws that have been passed. In doing so, our hope is that all will be able to maintain that loving relationship that we all share with our little family members. We are looking forward to serving you.

OFFICE OF THE PROSECUTOR

Once again, this office has attempted to maintain a fair and consistent prosecution policy. Abused suspended sentences have been brought forward, certain offenses have been targeted with increased fines and sentences while sentences in other matters have been eased.

With the constant addition of new books, the Law Library is slowly but surely developing into a quality area allowing considerable in-house legal research and reference into laws, their interpretation, application and, of course, courtroom technique.

Continued attendance at the New Hampshire Police Prosecutor's Association has maintained a forum for the exchange of ideas.

Learning has been only half the experience. The other half involves teaching: a question and answer period for an elementary school, a seminar on application of law and drawing of complaints for a group of private security guards, the supervision of a college student in a practicum experience, and the leading of many in-house discussion/debate sessions that lead to a broader understanding of the law.

FIRE STATION BUILDING COMMITTEE

The Fire Station Building Committee has been very busy this year with the continued project of making sure that the new Fire Station would be a building the Town of Seabrook could be proud of.

The Committee, consisting of Ronald Eaton, Sr., Chairman, Clay Fowler, Jake Eaton, Vernon Small, Bobby Locke and Bette Thibodeau, has worked very closely with Architect Homer Young and his associates; we met with them every Wednesday evening to review the plans and go over construction details.

On February 18th, 1987, the Architect presented the plans for the new Fire Station to the Committee for review and on February 25th, 1987, the spec went out to bid over the Selectmen's signatures.

The bids were opened on March 25, 1987 at the Selectmen's Meeting. Nine general contractors responded with bids ranging from a low bid of \$1,278,400 to a high bid of \$1,625,000. In April, upon recommendation of the Architect and the Building Committee, the bid was awarded to Quannapowitt Development Corp. of Wakefield, Massachusetts, the low bidder. Construction started almost immediately and by the 1st of May ground had been cleared of trees and footings for the new building were in place by the end of June.

Work has progressed quite smoothly with very few problems and with only one change order which was necessitated by a recent change in N.H. Regulations. The building is expected to be ready for occupancy during the month of February, 1988.

In addition to the construction of the building, furniture has been selected, put out to bid and ordered, and a weathervane design was put out to bid, ordered and has been installed on the roof of the building. Clerk of the Works Leonard DiBartolomeo has been on the job overseeing the construction and has been diligent in making sure the project is done according to specifications.

As Town Meeting time approaches, the Committee is pleased with the results and hopes that the Town of Seabrook will be pleased, too.

I submit the following report to the Board of Selectmen and the citizens and tax-payers of the Town of Seabrook, N.H.

First of all, I would again like to thank the Board of Selectmen, the Fire Chief, the Police Chief, the Water Department Superintendent, the Road Agent, and all other persons who have been involved in assisting with the operations in this part of the town government. I would also like to thank my secretary, Jean Moore for her efficient help to me in this department.

The Basic Emergency Plan for 1987 has been signed by the Board of Selectmen. The Emergency Operations Center (EOC) has been activated several times for emergencies, and also for testing equipment for the Radiological Emergency Response Plan (RERP).

There has been a lot of coordinating with governmental offices in the attempt to have a smooth transition from the old fire station to the new fire station. The Building Committee should be commended in their dedication and hard work; they have put together a beautiful building for the Town of Seabrook.

This office has purchased a new V.C.R and T.V. for training purposes, to benefit all departments; this equipment has been used several times this year for it's intended purpose. This department has also purchased a new dive suit along with all of it's related gear. I sent a man to school for diving certification, which he has completed; the new diving equipment has been assigned to him. This year the dive team has responded to several calls both mutual aid and locally. They have been successful in most all of their responses.

The Governor has changed the name of this office by statute from Civil Defense to Office of Emergency Management. This has expanded the duties of the director some-what, but whatever is expended properly is still 50/50 reimbursment to the town.

The committee has been meeting regularly since last September. We have studied several options and locations and are now in the process of drawing up basic plans and acquiring estimates for the facility.

We are concentrating on proposing an up-to-date facility adequate for the present and future needs of the town's public works departments which will provide ample storage area for all vehicles and supplies, a comfortable area for personnel needs, and a well-detailed mechanics bay - all within a facility with frontage which will not detract from the commercial/residential area in which it is proposed.

We feel we can accomplish the planning, estimating and overseeing of construction without the cost of outside consultants, thereby saving thousands of dollars in the overall cost. This will help us to avoid the million dollar plus type construction that has been proposed and accepted in recent years.

We feel that with the huge cost of the sewer system facing us, we should try to hold the line on expensive construction and yet propose a facility which is not only adequate but will not be detrimental to the area in which it would be located.

We wish to thank those people who have cooperated in assisting us with our efforts.

WELFARE OFFICERS REPORT

Once again the Town of Seabrook is keeping within its budget on welfare appropriations and, in fact, had more than \$5,000 left in surplus from the appropriation of the previous year.

We are now through our second year operating under the new re-codified law and can now reasonably predict what a future year may reflect in our indigent needs. Of course, there are many things that may happen that can impact on a budget, particularly a welfare budget which there is little or no control over locally such as the national and local economy, the federal budget and, of course, changes that are made in both federal and state laws dealing with a whole spectrum of programs which deal with food stamps, AFDC (Aid to Families With Dependent Children), the housing needs and fuel assistance.

As a caveat to the Selectmen and the Budget Committee, I advised them that if the federal budget curtails or specifically reduces the fuel assistance program it will have a profound effect on the local budget. There may have been some reductions in this area but where it may impact and how much is up to the Congress.

I must report that one of the most pressing needs this past year and I believe in the future is affordable housing for Seabrook citizens. I receive many calls on this and I have to advise them there is little or nothing that can be done about housing and prices of apartment rentals on the local level. This is truly a national and state problem and it must be addressed as such. In the meantime, I can only advise people of all the programs which are available to them.

I am pleased to make this report again to the citizens and taxpayers of Seabrook.

At the beginning of 1987 the year started out with a severe snow storm. The men had to plow, salt and sand all night long. During the year the regular rubbish runs were made, the regular maintenance and repairs of vehicles were done. Drains were installed on Farm Lane and Stard Road. There was so much snow in February that it was necessary to shovel by hand in the cemeteries to find graves for burials. During March all vehicles had to be readied for inspection. Gravel was hauled to fill in holes on Walton Road Extension, Cross Beach Road and Woodland Avenue. During April the sweeper was used to clean up the sand on the roads that was left there during the winter. There was a lot of debris to be cleaned up at the beach. This is the month preliminary work was done in the cemeteries to prepare them for mowing. The lawn mowers and weed wackers were sharpened to get them in shape for the month of May. The beach rake was used to clean the beach and the town. In July we hauled metal to Nichols in Amesbury, Mass. In August we helped with Old Home Days. Extensive work was done at Farm Lane Dock. We assisted in placing barricades around Old South Meeting-house because of demonstrations. We hauled numerous loads of beach sand and large rocks to Cross Beach as well as installing reflectors. One of our workers had the job of repairing gravestones damaged by vandals.

You are hereby notified to meet in the auditorium of the Seabrook Community Center, U.S. Route 1, (Lafayette Road), on Tuesday, March 8, 1988, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and to cast ballots until at least 7:00 o'clock in the evening of the same day, and to meet in the auditorium of the Seabrook Community Center, U.S. Route 1, (Lafayette Road), on Thursday, March 10, 1988, at 7:00 o'clock in the evening to act on the articles below.

Further, you are hereby notified that the moderator will process the absentee ballots at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon on Tuesday, March 8, 1988, pursuant to RSA 659:49.

Article 1: To elect by non-partisan ballot: one (1) Selectman and Assessor for a term of three (3) years; one (1) Trustee of the Trust Funds for a term of three (3) years; one (1) Road Agent for a term of one (1) year; one (1) Fire Chief for a term of one (1) year; one (1) Tax Collector for a term of three (3) years; one (1) Park Commissioner for a term of three (3) years; two (2) members of the Planning Board for a term of three (3) years; two (2) members of the Budget Committee for a term of three (3) years; one (1) member of the Budget Committee for a term of one (1) year; three (3) Constables for a term of one (1) year; one (1) Supervisor of the Checklist for a term of six (6) years; and one (1) Moderator for a term of two (2) years.

(On the Official Ballot)

Article 2: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to renew and refund town notes:

Article 3: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

Article 4: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell at public auction or by advertised sealed bids such town property as is no longer used by the town.

Article 5: To see if the town will vote, pursuant to authority under RSA 80:42 and RSA 80:42-a, to retain and hold all real property located within the marshlands and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell all other tax title property, in the first instance to former owners of the property, or the grandparents, parents, children, and spouses of said former owner, for a sum not less than the outstanding taxes owed plus accrued interest to the date of tax deed; or failing such sale, then by advertised sealed bids or public auction, at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen.

Article 6: On petition of Clyde O. Brown and seventeen (17) other legal voters of the town: To see what action the town will take on the following question: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure? These statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for non-payment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes".

Article 10: To see if the town will vote to appropriate Eighty-Three Thousand Three Hundred Thirty-Four (\$83,334.00) Dollars as the total cost of a Coastal Zone Management (CZM) grant, to apply for Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars from the state and federal governments as the 60% match towards said grant, and to raise Thirty-Three Thousand Three Hundred Thirty-Four (\$33,334.00) Dollars from taxes as the town's 40% match to the above CZM grant.

Article 22: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thirty-Seven Thousand Five Hundred (\$137,500.00) Dollars for the purpose of making repairs to the Causeway Street bridge and for engineering and related services in connection with said repairs and further to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for and accept grants and other forms of assistance to reimburse the town for the costs of said repairs.

Article 23: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-Seven Thousand Three Hundred Thirteen (\$77, 313.00) Dollars to supplement appropriations made under Article 46 of the 1983 annual town meeting, Article 30 of the 1985 annual town meeting, and Article 36 of the 1986 annual town meeting, for the purpose of completing improvements to Ledge Road.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 24: On petition of James C. Falconer and nineteen (19) other legal voters of the town, to see what action the town meeting will take on the following: To rescind Article #2 of the Special Town Meeting held on Tuesday, January 19, 1988, and to establish by majority vote the following regarding a so-called scholarship fund: to accept one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) per live pari-mutuel race and/or simulcast pari-mutuel greyhound race at Yankee Greyhound Park for the purpose of establishing a scholarship fund for the qualified children of Seabrook, and said fund to be administered through a trust fund pursuant to RSA 31:19-a; and further that said payments to be made by Yankee Greyhound Park to be reviewed annually by said constituted authority under RSA 31:19-a and adjusted in payment according to the C.P.I. (Consumer Price Index) as published by the Federal Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Article 25: On petition of Francis L. Thibodeau and twenty (20) other legal voters of the town: To see what action the town meeting will take to rescind Article 1 of the Special Town Meeting held on Tuesday, January 19, 1988, which pursuant to RSA 284:17-A allows pari-mutuel wagering and conducting greyhound dog racing on Sundays in the Town of Seabrook.

Article 26: On petition of James C. Falconer and twenty-one (21) other legal voters of the town: To see what action the town meeting will take on the following proposed by-laws to govern the conduct of Adjourned or Special Town Meetings, acting as a legislative body, pursuant to RSA 40.

1. The official voter checklist(s) shall be used at all Town Meetings at the entrance to the hall for all Adjourned or Special Town Meetings and all persons shall be checked off who enters. Legal voters then may be seated.

All non-voters or non-residents shall be distinctly separated and may be seated only after all legal voters are first seated.

2. That all rules of order and conduct of Town Meeting business other than what is set forth in RSA 40 and the New Hampshire Election Laws shall be conducted by Robert's Rules of Order Revised and that the Moderator shall be required to make his decisions based on these rules and laws.

3. That all Adjourned and Special Town Meetings shall be "video taped" and this record to be preserved in the archives of the Town forever; and to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for this purpose.

(\$300.00 Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 27: On petition of Paula T. Pietrowski and forty (40) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Seabrook Recreation Commission to offer an after school program for latch key children (children who go to an empty home after school).

Article 28: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Million Five Hundred Thousand (\$3,500,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of granting said amount to the Seabrook Housing Authority for the following purposes:

1. Said money is to be used by the Housing Authority exclusively for expenses of the Authority in the acquisition/funding, planning, construction and operation of an Elderly Housing Project;

2. Four Hundred Thousand (\$400,000.00) Dollars of this appropriation to be released immediately for the purchase of the land and preliminary site preparation including all related costs for acquisition such as deposits, hazardous waste surveys, insurance, engineering costs, preliminary site survey expenses, preliminary architectural costs, recording costs, legal fees, title insurance fees, wetlands approval ("evidence that premises are not in a Federal special flood hazard zone"), water resources investigation, required licenses with respect to zoning, environmental laws and building permits.

3. The balance of said funds are to be held in escrow until such time as the architect has consulted with all required Town agencies to design an appropriate and safe structure necessary for Elderly Housing. The funds shall include the engagement of an architect for the project with associated costs and fees, architectural plans and specifications, engagement of a contractor for construction of the project, builder's risk and other insurance, worker's compensation insurance, legal fees and costs, construction of the project including all related costs required to facilitate completion of the project.

4. A public hearing shall be held, followed by a Special Town Meeting request that the Town vote to authorize the Seabrook Housing Authority to proceed with the Elderly Housing project. Thereby releasing the funds in escrow to the Seabrook Housing Authority for the purpose stated above. Also that said housing be exclusively for Seabrook residents with a one year residency requirement.

Accountability will include a yearly audit filed with the Town Clerk in time for the town report, also a budget for the coming year. Should the vote be against proceeding with Elderly Housing, all funds held in escrow will be returned to the General Fund to reduce taxes.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 29: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Thousand (\$400,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing the land and preliminary preparation of said land on a site for Elderly Housing including all related costs for acquisition such as deposits, hazardous waste surveys, insurance, engineering costs, preliminary site survey expenses, preliminary architectural costs, recording costs, legal fees, title insurance fees, wetlands approval ("evidence that premises are not in a Federal special flood hazard zone"), water resources investigation, required licenses with respect to zoning, environmental laws and building permits.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 30: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Seabrook Housing Authority to accept State or Federal funding for Elderly Housing, if and when such funds become available.

Article 31: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Thousand (\$300,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing a parcel of land and all structures thereon adjacent to Governor Weare Park and comprising approximately three (3) acres, for municipal purposes.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 32: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Thirty-Six Thousand One Hundred Sixty (\$236,160.00) Dollars to supplement appropriations made under Article 33 of the 1986 annual town meeting and under article 23 of the 1987 annual town meeting for the purpose of constructing a solid waste transfer station.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 33: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Eight Thousand Five Hundred (\$38,500.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and installing a new weighing scale at the transfer station.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 34: On petition of Vernon G. Dow and eleven (11) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Six Thousand Five Hundred (\$36,500.00) Dollars to purchase a bulldozer.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 35: Shall the town join the Southeast Regional Refuse Disposal District in accordance with the provisions of the Southeast Regional Refuse Disposal District Agreement, a copy of which Agreement has been filed with the selectmen, and the provisions of RSA Chapter 53-B, which together provide for construction, maintenance, and operation of regional refuse disposal facilities by said District, provided that the District is formed by the towns of Brentwood, Danville, East Kingston, Exeter, Fremont, Hampton, Hampton Falls, Kensington, New Castle, Newton, North Hampton, Rye, Sandown, and South Hampton, and the city of Portsmouth in accordance with the provisions of RSA Chapter 53-B?

Article 38: To see if the town will vote to discontinue the capital reserve funds known as the "Motor Vehicle Fund" and to direct the Trustees of the Trust Funds to pay the balance of said funds to the Town of Seabrook.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 39: To see if the town will vote to discontinue the capital reserve funds known as the "Municipal Building Fund" and to direct the Trustees of the Trust Funds to pay the balance of said funds to the Town of Seabrook.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 40: On petition of Warner B. Knowles and fifteen (15) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town meeting will vote pursuant to RSA 35 of the Capital Reserve Funds Act to authorize the expenditure of Nine Hundred Seventy Thousand (\$970,000.00) Dollars from the Town of Seabrook's Municipal Building Fund for the purpose of the design and construction of a Public Works Facility and building(s) to be located on town owned land off Centennial Road. The facility shall include the water, highway and parks departments.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 41: On petition of Warner B. Knowles and fifteen (15) other legal voters of the town: To see what action the town meeting will take on the following: To authorize the construction of a Public Works Building and Facility on town owned land on Centennial Road and to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Seventy Thousand (\$970,000.00) Dollars for this purpose.

(Not Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 42: On petition of Warner B. Knowles and fifteen (15) other legal voters of the town: To see what action the town meeting will take to establish a so called Public Works Building Committee for the purpose of overseeing, reviewing, and inspecting the design, construction, and completion of said Public Works Facility; and said committee to be appointed by the moderator. Of those appointed at least three (3) of which shall be full-time or elected personnel from the highway, water and/or parks department.

Article 43: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Thirty-Three (\$6,033.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing a micro-computer and related software for the Water Department.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 44: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Five Hundred (\$15,500.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a new station wagon to replace the fire chief's car, and to authorize the sale or trade-in of the existing fire chief's car.

Article 49: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Five Thousand Five Hundred Ninety (\$35,590.00) Dollars to be used to supplement an appropriation made under Article 26 of the 1987 annual town meeting for the purpose of constructing a central refueling station for town vehicles.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 50: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Five Hundred (\$12,500.00) Dollars for the purpose of paying rent, salaries, and other expenses in connection with the establishment of a police sub-station at Seabrook Beach, and to authorize the selectmen to sign leases and other agreements for implementation of the purposes of this article.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 51: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Ten Thousand (\$210,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of conducting exploration for water supply, and for the development of water supplies to include engineering, land acquisition, and purchase and installation of pumps, water pipes and appurtenances, and to authorize eminent domain procedures as may be necessary for the purposes of this article.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 52: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty-Seven Thousand Five Hundred (\$87,500.00) Dollars for the purpose of replacing water mains and appurtenances on True Road and Blacksnake Road.

Article 53: To see if the town will vote to amend the Code of the Town of Seabrook by adding to Chapter 92, Purchasing System, the following provisions:

"All purchases of supplies and materials, the cost of which is estimated to exceed Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, shall be purchased only after public bids have been solicited.

A notice of the bid shall be advertised in a newspaper of local circulation and at least five days shall be allowed between the publication of the bid notice, and the filing date for bids.

The provisions of this by-law shall be subject to the control of the Office of the Board of Selectmen.

The Board of Selectmen may, from time to time, promulgate policies to effect the provisions of this by-law."

Article 54: To see if the town will vote to amend the Code of the Town of Seabrook, by adding to Chapter 202, Parks and Recreation, Article III, Launching Ramp, the following provisions:

"No person shall leave a vessel moored to the public float or attached to the public pier for a period of more than one hour, without expressed written permission of the Board of Selectmen, with the exception of rowboats, not exceeding fifteen (15) feet in length, which may be moored to the public float on designated sides.

No person shall place or deposit on the public float or public pier, any fish, lobster, bait, lobster traps, barrels, boxes, gear, nets or other fishing equipment for any period longer than is reasonably necessary for the prompt loading or unloading of same.

Violations of any provision of this by-law shall be punishable by a fine of not more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars per day, and prosecution for criminal trespass under the New Hampshire Criminal Code.

The provisions of this ordinance may be enforced by duly appointed members of the Seabrook Police Department and/or the Harbor Master appointed by the State of New Hampshire.

Article 55: On petition of Herbert A. Fowler and twenty-five (25) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to accept the use of the barge facility on the west side of Route 1A, formerly owned by Public Service Company of New Hampshire, to be used as a facility for the local fishermen, without any cost to the town.

Article 56: On petition of Charlotte K. Marshall and eighteen (18) other legal voters of the town: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Fifty (\$6,050.00) Dollars to repaint and repair the exterior of Brown Library.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 57: To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the expense of the general government for the protection of persons and property, for health and sanitation, for highways and bridges, for the support of the town poor and for all necessary expenditures for the ensuing year.

Article 58: To transact all other legal business that may come before this meeting.

The members of the Seabrook Recreation Commission are: Vernon Small, Chairman; William Moore, Vice Chairman; Charlotte Dow, Secretary; Jay Turcotte, Parks Department; James Eaton, Selectman; Harry Knowles, Sr. and Salvatore Rubera. The administrative staff of the Recreation Department are Sandra Beaudoin, Director of Recreation and Ted Pickard, Assistant Director.

The Seabrook Recreation Commission and staff have just concluded a very active year of promoting and providing leisure activities for the Town residents, pre-school thru senior citizens. Often times, people perceive the Recreation Department as supporting only the activities within the Community Center, but the involvement and support extends to over eleven outside youth and adult groups. Besides providing these groups with regular supplies, gear and equipment, the department purchased new full uniforms for four youth baseball teams, an electronic starting gate for the BMX racing and portable generator also for the use of BMX.

In addition to regular equipment for the Community Center, the department purchased 13 more pairs of rollerskates, attempting to meet the sizes needed of those attending rollerskating night, still a popular special at the center.

1987 PROJECTS

Part of the Commission & Department administrative activity included long range goals and improvements. Fulfilling their 1987 plans, a number of special articles & capitol improvement items were accomplished. A commercial style stove was installed in the Community Center's kitchen, which

better facilitates banquet functions, cooking classes and Friday night special event kitchens. Also purchased was a Merlin Phone & Paging system. Once installed, this system started saving the town money as well as making communications much easier on the general public and staff. Mosquito Control

Field work began on April 8th following extremely heavy rains which left acres of standing water and overflowing streams around town. The stream clearance crew of Derek Griggs and Ernest Souther IV went to work clearing out culverts and streams and removing natural and man-made debris that blocks the flow of water. Clogged streams are opened up to allow better flow and elimination of stagnant areas where mosquitos can breed. This phase of mosquito control continued through mid-May.

Surveillance of freshwater mosquito breeding sites began on April 14th with the first treatment of these areas (larviciding) occurring a week later. Surveillance and treatment of saltmarsh breeding sites began on April 30th. Jim E. Lane was hired as Field Assistant on May 19th. Because of low rainfall in May (1.5") and early June, the water table dropped causing many of the freshwater breeding areas to shrink in size or dry up totally. Except for the last week of June, the rest of the summer was extremely dry so freshwater breeding was not a problem. Treatments of saltmarsh sites, however, were necessary after each monthly high-run flood tide.

Kevin Yentz joined the program on June 9th as a member of the stream clearance/greenhead trap crew. By June 19th, ninety (90) greenhead fly traps had been placed along the perimeters of the saltmarshes, using the old '77 pick-up. Thousands of these vicious biting flies coming off the marshes are trapped and die before they reach higher, shady areas. The flies are attracted to the shade of these dark boxes, fly up inside and are trapped in the screened-in section where they eventually die of dehydration.

The adulticiding phase of the program (evening spraying of public roads using the truck-mounted fogger) commenced on June 1st. Adulticiding was carried out on 24 separate nights with the east part of town being done 12 times and the west part 12 times. During periods of high Aedes Sollicitans (vicious day-time biters from the saltmarsh) population, additional spot adulticiding was carried out on certain woods roads and public fields. The last night of spraying was on Sept. 10th. Lane and the supervisor shared the adulticiding duties.

Adult mosquito species populations were monitored weekly at three locations in town using CO-2 (dry ice) baited C.D.C. light traps. Specimens were identified, counted, and recorded with results being sent to State Health officials as part of the Eastern Equine Encephalitis monitoring program.

ANNUAL REPORT - BROWN LIBRARY - 1987

Nineteen eighty-seven was another year of progress for Brown Library. Statistically speaking, 17,292 items were circulated during that time period reflecting an 18% increase over last year's 14,667 total. The total patronage increased, as well, this year being 11,843 - an 11% increase over last year's 10,624. Since 1985, circulation has increased 64% and patronage has grown by 54%.

Most notable, and noticeable, amidst the many improvements that have been made this year at the library is the institution of a new, mechanized circulation system. This system, which is far more efficient, faster and less prone to error than the older, by-hand method of book check-out, requires that library patrons be both re-registered and issued new borrowers cards. Response to this has been most favorable - both from the staff, due to the new system's ease of use; and also from the general public who like the new, plastic, easy-to-carry, credit-card size library cards.

This year the library formally joined the New Hampshire Statewide Library Development System, and the state finally began direct van service to Brown Library. These developments, combined with Brown Library's continuing access of the New Hampshire Automated Information System via computer, should ensure that inter-library loan service will remain a viable source of support for the library and its patrons.

Despite the April flood, the Children's Room was busy, as usual, with an abundant, yearlong schedule of storyhours for the younger patrons. The summer reading program was most successful and culminated in the awarding of two bicycles as prizes, which were generously donated by the Zayre Corporation, in Seabrook. Also during the summer, juggler Andrew Schwartz gave an outstanding morning performance on the library lawn, and the annual Stuffed Animal Contest was attended by such a huge crowd that a much larger location has already been arranged for that event next year.

Gifts to the library were made by several organizations in and around Seabrook, among which were: the Seabrook Lioness Club, the Seabrook Business and Professional Association, Footes' Ice Cream in Seabrook, Poor Steve's Ice Cream in Seabrook, the Seabrook Dairy Queen, Burger King in Amesbury, and Zayre's, as mentioned above.

Displays in the Library included the artwork of Lucille Samia, the craft work of Chris Wood, and the talent of the Seabrook Young Authors. The Friends of Brown Library had a good year which included holding a booksale, taking part in the Seabrook Old Home Days celebration, and holding a raffle.

New books and other materials continued to be steadily added to the collection in 1987. The library and its staff maintained memberships and/or participated in various professional organizations: the American Library Association, the New England Library Association, the New Hampshire Library Association, Area Library Forum V, Seacoast Cooperative Libraries, and the Merrimack Inter-Library Cooperative.

And, Anne Ferreira, Children's Librarian, successfully completed a course in storytelling given by the School for Lifelong Learning at UNH.

Brown Library thanks its supporters and friends for the successes it has enjoyed so far and encourages those not yet familiar with the library and its services to call or stop in during 1988.

1987 WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

There were 455,397,530 gallons of water pumped in 1987. This 18,742,200 gallon increase over the previous year was mainly because of the outside watering during the summer season. We reached all time high pumping rates in this summer period.

Commercial-Industrial use decreased from 155,765,810 in 1986 to 133,246,660 in 1987. Many of our metered customers had increases, KJ Quinn 11,000,000, Greenhouse, Hampton Falls 700,000 had the largest. The 22,519,150 gallon decrease was mainly contributed to Public Service Co. and Bailey Co. which decreased 27,000,000 gallons and 9,000,000 gallons respectively.

There were sixty (60) new services installed in 1987. Forty-nine (49) residential and eleven (11) commercial-industrial. These services, commercial-industrial were all 6" or larger. They included sub-divisions, commercial condos, mini-malls and industrial buildings.

The crew along with their regular and routine duties, accomplished or overseen many of the following projects.

Five (5) fire hydrants were damaged by motor vehicles one on Rt. 107, Causeway St., Worthley Ave. and two on Route 1.

Several water leaks occurred. Most of these were on the land owners property. The largest of the leaks were two (2) 6" water main breaks (Leisure Living and Seabrook Mobile Village.)

Spring rain storms kept us busy pumping out resident's cellars.

Also, in the spring and early summer you could find the department crew in the Route 1 area. The project ran from New Zealand Road north along Route 1, down Dearborn Avenue (including part of Gove Road) across country through Weare Park and State of NH land to Foggs Lane. A short section on Route 1 between A street and entrance to Service Star was connected together. The project which included laying over 4,000 feet of 12" water mains, (previous water main sizes were 6" & 8") 13 new fire hydrants and installing all new water services along the route was mainly accomplished by the department. The section of Route 1 between Rocks Road and Dearborn Avenue was contracted to Methuen Construction Co. mainly because of the amount of ledge in this area. Whitman and Howard Engineering Inc. of Wellesley Mass. designed and engineered the project.

In the summer you could find us installing, flushing and testing an 8" water main and fire hydrant at the new fire station on Centennial Street.

Also, in the summer we were busy marking water mains and services all over town for state and sewer engineers.

The following projects, by contractors, which included laying of mains and services, installing fire hydrants, chlorinating, flushing, pressure testing and leak repair were overseen this past summer by

the department were: Utility Trailers-Route 107, Pheasant Ridge Condos New Zealand Road, Fortino Realty Trust sub-division-Blacksnake Road, New Timber Mart-Route 1, Zanellis Realty Trust-Batchelder Road, Cains Brook Condos-Route 1.

Late summer-early fall the department crew could be found building a new right of way road to our Mill Lane Pump Station. We were forced to relocate the road and utilities because in 1968-69 the right of way was inadvertently located in the wrong location (on another person's land). Trees had to be logged, brush cleared, culverts and water main installed and a roadway built. All by the Water Department.


Later in the fall the department built a man-hole type pump house at the 107 pump station area. The connections, piping, foundation, man-hole apparatus, electrical and the site work was all accomplished by the crew. The new pump and motor was installed by L. A. Hanna and Sons of Stratham NH. B.C.I. Geonetics of Laconia performed pump test and well evaluation work. The pump was designed and the project engineered by Jones and Beach Engineering of Stratham NH. This well has a safe yield of about 150 GPM and is ready to be used.

In the fall all the water mains in the entire town were cleaned and flushed.

This winter our True Road well water levels dropped drastically forcing shut down of the two (2) pumps. The pumps will remain off until these levels return substantially. We believe that high pumping rates this past summer contributed to this. It was observed that over 1,000,000 additional gallons were used outside during every sunny day of the summer period.

With this in mind I would like to conclude by urging all our customers to conserve water, it's a precious resource. If this conservation is observed by all, again, we probably and hopefully will enjoy another year with no water bands or moratorium restrictions imposed.

AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of

We have examined the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire and the combining fund financial statements of the Town as of and for the year ended December 31, 1986, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire, at December 31, 1986, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year. Also, in our opinion, the combining fund financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of each of the funds of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire, at December 31, 1986, and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supporting schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the general purpose and combining fund financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements of each of the respective funds taken as a whole.
