






TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same. Approved \$7,600.00.
- 2. Te see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways and plowing snow for the ensuing year. \$5,700.00.
- 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for sanding roads. The finance committee recommends \$300.00.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing and building bridges. Approved \$500.00.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day observance. Approved \$10.00.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the amount required by law for the support of the Town Library. Approve \$500.00.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 for the repair of road equipment and road maintenance and general highway. Approved.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for support of the Tamworth Community Nurse. Approved.

- 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine and appraise taxable property.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500.00 for Tarvia. Approved.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 to buy new equipment for the Tamworth Fire Precinct. It is recommended by your finance committee that the fire apparatus be kept in the town garage.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2053.00 to be laid out on the Cleveland road, provided the State will appropriate the sum of \$2053.00 for the same purpose. Approved.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of Class V roads, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$743.58. Not approved.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for upkeep and maintenance of the Tamworth Fire Precinct. Approved.
- 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Wonalancet Fire Precinct. \$100.00 Approved.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 to be laid out on road known as Turkey Street between Route 113 and Route 16. (House bill No. 47, introduced by Leonard Vittum would supplement this amount by \$3,000.00 which is a special appropriation by the State.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$137.00 to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising of the town, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region. Approved.
 - 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote

to raise and appropriate for the promotion of Winter business, \$500.00 approved.

- 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for white pine blister rust control to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department. Approved.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to contribute \$50.00 to each of the following hospitals, Memorial Hospital, North Conway, Huggins Hospital, Wolfeboro, Laconia Hospital, Laconia. Approved.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to be divided equally among the three road agents, for cutting bushes on road side. Approved.
- 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the upkeep and care of shrubs at the town hall. Approved.
- 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a road supervisor to replace our present system of electing road agents. Approved.
- 25. To choose a Selectman for three years, to choose a Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Highway Agents, Auditors, and all other officers and agents for the ensuing year.
- 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

At the close of the fiscal year your committee finds the Town with a surplus of \$3000.00. This is very gratifying, but the picture is not so rosy when it is learned that last year's balance was \$5000.00 and it was only by holding down appropriations, large savings in two others and the selling of Town property that the Selectmen were able to show a balance this year.

The cause of this decrease is the unusual large expenditures on the highways, where more than \$10,000.00 was spent and only \$6,000.00 was raised; if this trend is not checked there are only two alternatives, one the making of larger appropriations to meet expenditures which means a \$3.50 or \$4.00 tax rate or plunging the Town into debt. Neither course seems desirable.

Your committee has given this considerable study and have come to the conclusion that the fault lies in the system which originated in the horse and ox team days, before our present method of transportation was known. That this is generally recognized throughout the State may be seen by the fact that a bill has been introduced and favorably reported on in our legislature to change from three to one road agent, but it seems to us that this would not meet some of the problems, so we make the following recommendations.

That a supervisor be appointed by the Selectmen to have charge of Town Highways, his appointment to become effective after its approval by the finance committee. He could be removed at any time or for any just cause by the Selectmen, but would be entitled to a hearing by the finance committee. He could appoint one or more assistants to work under him, perhaps similar to our present system only they would be responsible to him and he would be responsible for them. He would be charged with all Town equipment

from spades to tractors and would return an inventory to the Selectmen every three months. He would not work his own equipment so there would be a greater distribution of days work than under our present system.

We recommend his salary to be \$1000.00 a year and \$200.00 expense account. It is to be a full time job with plenty of work.

One cause of the high cost of snow removal seems to be that there is no adequate heavy equipment to supplement the light plows, but we think it unwise to buy expensive machinery while our present form of divided authority exists.

We do not call this a perfect plan, but do think it worthy of your consideration. If, after a reasonable trial it fails, you may return to our present system or try some other scheme.

Through the generosity of Mr. Moier who gave \$1000.00 the Selectmen were able to construct a mile of hard surface road in the Washington Hill section, we wish to express our most sincere gratitude to Mr. Moier.

Believing it to be a sound policy to extend hard surfaced roads each year, particularly the hills we recommend the tarring of the road leading from South Tamworth to the bridge called Morrell Bridge.

Eccause the Town has contributed so much we recommend that the new fire equipment be housed in the Town Garage and a man be appointed to look after it. We also urge that a more active fire company be organized.

SECRETARY'S REPORT OF TAMWORTH COMMUNITY NURSE ASSOCIATION

In the spring months of the year 1940 the nursing work of our town was done by Mrs. Blanche Spalding, R.N., whose services, performed under considerable strain, will always be gratefully remembered. She was at that time a sick woman, but set aside or overcame her own disabilities in order to care for those who needed her. Her work was done at great cost to herself but the record shows how adequately it was done.

Mrs. Marguerite Tallman, R.N., came from Tilton in September to take up the work of community and school nurse in Tamworth. She is a graduate of the Beacon Hill Hospital in Manchester, took a special course at the Infants' Hospital in Boston, did district work in Fitchburg and in Tilton. She is well known among New Hampshire nurses. She lives at the house of Mrs. Emalie Ward in Tamworth Village.

On Nov. 6 Mrs. Tallman arranged with Miss Harkins of the State Board of Health a clinic for preschool age children, held in the Town Hall. Dr. Remick, assisted by Dr. Quimby of Sandwich, examined 42 children, of whom 21 were immunized against diphtheria. Mrs. Gertrude DeBlois, R.N., of Tamworth, members of the Committee and others helped with records and transportation.

In constant cooperation with the local doctors, the Laconia and other hospitals, the School Committee, the State agents, the Needlework Guild and every other welfare agency, our nurse carries on a steadily increasing work, the extent of which can be seen in the tabular record that accompanies this report. Some day we should employ our nurse for twelve months instead of nine as at present. She is paid, as all know, by an appropriation from the Town, supplemented by a fund from among our summer residents,

to whose interest and generosity we owe the beginning and much of the maintenance of this valuable nursing service.

The Nurse's work is reported to and supervised by the undersigned Committee, meeting monthly.

ANNUAL REPORT OF TAMWORTH OUTING CLUB

In the fall, a major face-lifting operation was accomplished on part of the Page Hill Slope by able work of Edward Walker and his caterpillar tractor. The area nearest to the ski tow, amounting to about two acres, was smoothed so that six inches of snow produced good skiing before the first of January; whereas in the past this slope has not been popular until February. At the same time, the ski tow power unit was moved to the top of the hill and a new rope installed; which changes, we believe, will result in a more efficient and less costly operation. So far this year the increased use of Page Hill has justified these improvements.

It has become an annual duty of the Outing Club to see that all slopes and trails are maintained. These were brushed by some volunteer labor, and mostly by hired labor.

This year to improve skiing conditions in the region, a local group of ski enthusiasts have banded together under name of the "Tamworth Trail Trampers" and have from time to time packed all the snow on the various trails and slopes so as to create a good smooth skiing base. This work has proved to be very beneficial to the skiing conditions for a long time after the work has been done, and we recommend that more of this work next year would pay dividends in increased business.

This year it was decided not to get out a new circular for the region, but to use this money for ski meets, winter advertising in the newspapers which will result in more free publicity through the special winter sports columns in the various newspapers. So far this year a carnival was held before New Years, in the pouring rain, including Sled Dog Racing, a down hill ski race on Mt. Whittier, and a slalom race on Page Hill, and a wood chopping and sawing contest in the

village. Even though the rain made things unpleasant for spectators and contestants, these events resulted in a lot of good publicity for our region. There is also scheduled a novice ski meet including down hill and slalom events to be held sometime in March.

The outing club has again supported the Tamworth Ski School, which has had so far as successful a season as of the winter before, and has given free instruction to the Tamworth School pupils which has resulted in the formation of a ski team representing the town school which will compete in a ski meet with the Emerson School of Exeter, N. H. The Ski School in its own behalf has distributed 3,000 circulars advertising its own facilities and also those of the region.

The now famous square dances held throughout the summer and winter have turned out to be even more popular than a year ago. Many weekends close to 100 people have enjoyed the music of the Hidden Orchestra and the calling of Ned Behr. This activity has more than supported itself and has helped to finance other activities of the region. As of a year ago W. C. Goodson arranged and managed a successful Ping Pong Tournament last summer.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

During the last four months the children of the Bemis, Chocorua, Downs, Tamworth, and Whittier schools have been inspected by Doctor Remick, assisted by the school nurse. The nurse has tested the vision of 181 children and they have all been weighed and measured. Parents have been notified of all defects that were found and a record of them has been kept in the various schools. In general, it would seem that there have been fewer cases of communicable diseases than usual, and there have been no real epidemics.

Through the interest of the parents, the Red Cross, and other sources it has been possible to have 8 children examined and fitted to glasses.

The school nurse is deeply appreciative of the cooperation of the Superintendent of Schools, the Board of Education, the staff of teachers, and of the parents of the children.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Tamworth:

I herewith submit my eighteenth annual report as superintendent of schools, it being the twenty-eighth in the series of such reports.

Democracy is being challenged today as never before. School, church and home form the triangle on which our safety rests. The triangle is a rigid figure and used much in the construction of foundations of heavy structures. If any side is imperfect the foundation gives away and the structure falls.

Homes and churches should be very active in building characters for worthy citizenship. Our immediate task lies in the schools in which teachers work so many days each year. We have comfortable buildings and good materials in a land at peace. We should do much. People in European countries are dying and the children growing up in ignorance. The children in America must save the world for Freedom and Democracy.

We must train for sound bodies, so we teach health lessons, we provide healthful conditions and outdoor playgrounds, and we have nurses and doctors to check up and correct defects.

We must train for mechanical skills for trades and industries. Our immediate defense program is calling loudly for workers with intelligent manual ability. It would be very wise to have some manual and domestic arts work in our schools, seeking to train hand as well as mind.

We must train for governmental tasks, so we have classes in History and Government and discussion on Current Events which are very much alive in these days. We have clubs and parliamentary procedure. We argue and discuss as people should in a Democracy. We try to train for future citizenship and worthy office-holding.

We must train for the finer arts, so we have music and drawing and poetry. We sing patriotic songs, we salute the flag and we try withal to appreciate the fact that our home country is free and prosperous because others struggled and worked and suffered for us.

We must teach scientific knowledge of plant and animal life and the laws of nature about us, so we have nature lessons and science lessons, and try to understand the new ways of living and working.

America marches on! What shall be her fate? The children must take over in the near future. The answer lies in the progress we make in character and the finer arts. Education without character is shown in the world gone mad today. We seek to find the virtues which endure—the finer senses of beauty, harmony, justice and honesty.

School property is kept in good condition. More attention should be given to enlarging, grading and beautifying the lawns and playgrounds. These should be beauty spots in Tamworth.

It is recommended that septic toilets be installed at Chocorua, that new screens be provided at Downs, and that the water supply at Bemis be permanently improved.

The health work is in care of Dr. Remick and the community nurse, Mrs. M. P. Tallman.

It is very desirable that some funds be available for the correction of the defects which the examinations reveal. Every child should have dental care and several should have treatments for eyes and throat.

The schools are standing well. Graduates from the high school in post-secondary institutions show good preparation.

Last June Headmaster Louis L. Ramsay graduated a class of nine.
