The annual Town Meeting was called to order by Moderator Talbot R, Hood at 10:00 AM and the polls declared open after reading of Article 1 of the Warrant. The balance of the Articles are to be considered at 7:00 PM.

 $\underline{\text{Article 1}}$ - To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. The $\underline{\text{result of}}$ the balloting was as follows:

Total ballots cast was 200 representing 26% of total registered voters (768).

Motion to accept, seconded and voted in the affirmative.

Article 3 - To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the income of the Jotham Lord Funds.

Moved to give to the benefit of the Town Library, seconded and voted in the affirmative.

Article 4 - To see if the Town will permit School Activities and the playing of basketball in the Town Hall under regulations prescribed by the Selectmen, until the next Annual Meeting.

Moved to approve, seconded and voted in the affirmative.

Article 5 - To see if the Town will vote to accept new Cemetery Trust Funds in the amount of \$5,696.38. (See Trust Funds Report)

Moved to approve, seconded and voted in the affirmative.

Article 6 - To see if the Town will vote to adopt written welfare guidelines as proposed by the Board of Selectmen, permit the Selectmen to amend said guidelines as the need arises, or act, in any way relating thereto complying with RSA 165- lb. (Copies of the full text of proposed guidelines are on file with the Town Clerk.)

Moved to approve, seconded and voted in the affirmative.

Article 7 - To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the 1968 GMC truck and revenue be added to the Highway Capital Reserve Fund.

Moved and seconded. Amendment then was made to change article to read as follows: "To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the 1968 GMC truck". It was noted that the Town cannot vote an unspecified amount to a Trust Fund. Amendment seconded and voted in the affirmative. Amended article then voted in the affirmative.

Article 8 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,0000 to be added to the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund.

Moved and seconded. Amendment then was made to change the article to read as follows: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund". Amendment seconded and voted in the affirmative. Amended article then voted in the affirmative.

 $\underline{\text{Article 9}}$ - To see if the Town wishes to take any action to change the contract with the Keene Ambulance Service, or take any other action regarding emergency ambulance service.

Moved and seconded. Discussion on the matter was to stay with the Keene Ambulance Service for numerous reasons including their experience, responding time, location and the fact that they are experts in their field. Motion to end discussion, moved and seconded. Article 9 reading as follows: "To see if the Town wishes to take any action to change the contract with the Keene Ambulance service." was opposed and defeated.

 $\underline{\text{Article 10}}$ - To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee under the authority of the Municipal Budget Act.

Moved and seconded. Amendment was then made to add \$1000 to Police Department budget for uniforms and equipment. Moved, seconded and voted in the affirmative. Amendment was then made to change article to read as follows: "To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee under the authority of the Municipal Budget Act and as amended." Amendment seconded and voted in the affirmative. Amended article them voted in the affirmative.

 $\underline{\text{Article 11}}$ - To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Moved to approve, seconded and voted in the affirmative.

 $\underline{\text{Article }12}$ - To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Moved and seconded. A generous round of applause was then given Ted Ferguson for his many years of service to the Westmoreland Police Department. Ted did not wish to run for 1987. Another generous round of applause was received by Paul Vincent, Selectman, who also did not run in the 1987 election.

A letter regarding the inconvenience of the Town Hall to physically disabled persons was then read and the Selectmen responded that they have been taking the steps necessary to improve the situation and the works were in progress with the state.

The Selectmen then announced that beginning April 1, 1987, Dump Stickers will be issued by the Town Clerk and the possible change in Dump Hours to read Wednesday 8 am to 5 pm, and Saturday 8 am to 5 pm. Closed Sunday.

Motion was made to urge the Selectmen to keep the Dump Hours on Sunday which are now in effect. Moved, seconded and voted in the affirmative.

The Town was then urged to attend School Meeting on Friday, March 13, at $7:00~\mathrm{pm}$ in the Town Hall.

The polls were declared closed and the meeting adjourned at 7:47 pm.

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Westmoreland in the County of Cheshire, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next. Polls will open at 10:00 a.m. and will not close before 7:00 p.m. The business meeting will be called to order at seven o'clock in the evening to act on the following matters:

Articles one, two and three will be on printed ballots to be voted on at the polling booths, starting at 10:00 a.m.

- $\underline{\text{ARTICLE 1.}}$ To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- ARTICLE 2. To see if the voters will approve the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board. (Copies on file with the Town Clerk)
- ARTICLE 3. To see if the town will vote to hold two sessions of Town Meeting, the first session for choice of Town Officers elected by an official ballot and other action required to be inserted on said official ballot and the second session on a date set by the Selectmen for transaction of other business.

The following articles will be discussed and voted upon at the evening session starting at 7:00 p.m.

- $\underline{\text{ARTICLE 4.}}$ To hear the reports of Agents and Auditors and take any action relative hereto.
- ARTICLE 5. To see what disposition the town will vote to make of the Jotham Lord Fund.
- ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will permit school activities and the playing of basketball in the Town Hall under regulations prescribed by the Selectmen, until the next Annual Meeting.
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept new Cemetery Trust Funds in the amount of \$759.32 (See Trust Fund Report)
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 80:50-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure. These statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for nonpayment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$25,000 to purchase a new one-ton truck and plow and sander for the Highway Department and apply \$5,000 trade-in allowance toward the purchase and further authorize the withdrawal of \$5,000 from the Revenue Sharing Fund. The balance of \$15,000 to be raised by taxes.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$35,000 for the purchase of a tank truck for the Fire Department and to authorize the withdrawal of \$11,000 from the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund and to accept \$5,000 from the Volunteer Fire Fire Department for the purchase. The balance of \$19,000 to be raised by taxes.

ARTICLE ll. To see if the Town will vote to establish a standing Town Recycling Committee to work with the regional solid waste management district toward further implementation of local recycling programs for additional materials.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$366,505 which represents the bottom line of the posted budget (MS-7). Said sum is "inclusive of all special articles addressed".

ARTICLE 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

1987 was a good year at the Westmoreland Public Library, circulation of books, magazines, and records for both adults and children has gone up from last year.

The annual book sale was held on Old Home Day. Book donations by townspeople enable us to hold this sale each year.

Bi-weekly story times are held during the school year for the Kindergarten and the second grade.

Request for books and resource materials not in our library collection are still being supplied through inter-library loan.

A Jamie Hurley Memorial Fund was established by his family and friends. Some of this money has been used to set up a fantasy section and to update and extend our existing collection.

We continue to receive Memorial Books from the Coffee Hour with Books.

The Westmoreland Gardeners replaced our window boxes and gave us a subscription to NATIONAL GARDENING.

We were given 1986 - 1987 BOOKS IN PRINT by the Van De Parres.

Type Master Services, Inc. of Westmoreland Industrial Park donated a used electric typewriter to the library.

REPORT OF THE WESTMORELAND VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT FOR 1987

In 1987 the Department responded to just 31 alarms, the lowest total in several years. The number of volunteer hours spent fighting fires was also lower than it has been in some time, in spite of two major fires at the County Farm. The second of these, in September, left standing only a shell of the old building after over five hours of effort by our Department and those of several neighboring communities.

The annual barbecue and fireworks display, with town band concert began the fourth of July holiday and once again was extremely successful. Proceeds from the barbecue enabled the Department to add some needed equipment.

Discussions continued through the year on the need to improve our ability to fight fires, most probably through the eventual purchase of a new tanker. This, a majority of members feel, is the most suitable type of vehicle for a town like ours, where water usually has to be transported to the fire scene.

A matter of real concern to us has been the loss of several members. We are down six from last year to a total of 23. Of these, several are senior members or for other reasons rarely participate in department activities, which leaves a core of fewer than 20 active members, a dangerously low number if we had to fight a major fire. It is our hope that Westmoreland residents will recognize the importance of a strong volunteer fire department to our town, and that new recruits will come forward.

We meet the third Tuesday of every month at 8 p.m. at the fire station, and anyone in the community who would like to join us in volunteering time and energy to the Department and the community is most welcome.

REPORT OF THE ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

In 1987, the Zoning Board conducted hearings for twenty-eight applications for special exceptions and/or variances to the zoning ordinances. Of these, twenty-four were approved, two were approved with modifications, one was denied, and one was withdrawn.

The Board is indebted to Richard Lawson for his many years of service on the Board as a member and as chairman.

In addition to teaching an Advanced First Aid and a DOT 1st Responder Course to ten area residents, the squad also trained monthly in routine training activities. Specialized training was accomplished by various squad members at area and regional seminars in the following categories: the Injured Child, Farm Machinery Rescue, FMT Burnout, Bizarre Rescues, and Mass Casualty Response. All squad members completed their annual CPR refresher and one member completed his EMT refresher.

Two members completed a defibrillator training in March of 1987. Protocols have been obtained for the use of our defibrillator from all area hospitals so that the patient or their family continues to have their choice of hospital. In conunction with the introduction of the defibrillator we taught an adult lay CPR course. We also taught all the 7th and 8th graders CPR and the Hemlick maneuver. The lower grades were taught an introduction to CPR and the Hemlick maneuver.

This past year our six man Vertical Evacuation Team (VET Team) continued its training and participated in a mutual aid drill with BellowsFalls at Surry Mountain Dam.

We completed an extensive maintenance program on the rescue vehicle which included the exhaust system, tires, transmission, rear springs, and body work to retard rust. It is anticipated that this will add years to the life of the vehicle.

This past year we had three (3) new members join the squad: Buffy Dewey, Doug Emma, and Peter McGraw. This gives us a total of ten (10) members. Of the ten, three (3) are EMT-D and seven (7) are Advanced First Aid and DOT 1st Responder certified.

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the school district in the Town of Westmoreland qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Westmoreland Town Hall in said District on the 11 day of March, 1988, at 7:30 O'Clock in the evening to act upon the following articles:

ARTICLE 1: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 2: To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grantsin-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency.

ARTICLE 3: To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the School District Meeting, money from the state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1988-89 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money, and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further, that the school board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) to employ an architect for the purpose of preparing plans and cost estimates for the renovation and/or construction of additional space at the Westmoreland Elementary School, or take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Thousand Dollars (\$17,000) to fund the anticipated deficit in the 1987-1988 budget; or take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$12,500) for the replacement of the underground storage tank and the handling and disposal of oil and petroleum-related materials as required by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission and to determine if funds for this purpose shall be raised by taxes, by borrowing pursuant to the provisions of R.S.A. 33, or any combination of these methods or to take other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 7: To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.

ARTICLE 8: To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

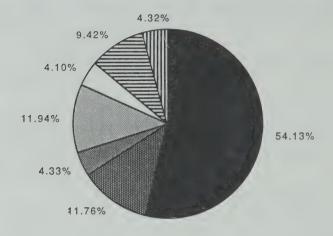

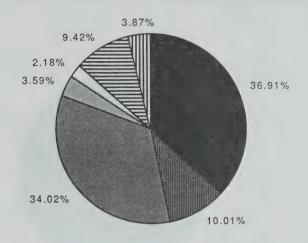
ANALYSIS OF PROPOSED BUDGET BY FUNCTION AREA

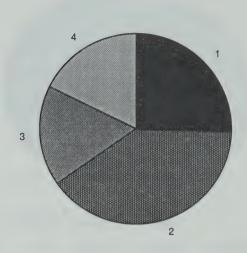

WESTMORELAND SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

MARCH 13, 1987

Agreeable to the foregoing warrant, the legal voters having met at the time and place mentioned in the warrant, the meeting was called to order by the Moderator, R. Bruce Smith, at 7:30 PM. After stating rules of conduct, Mr. Smith opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance.

The results of the election were then announced.

Mr. Smith proceeded by reading the School Warrant.

Article 1. Motion was made by Elke Hanna and seconded by Tom Hanna that all reports contained in the Westmoreland Annual School District Report be approved as presented. This report appears in the Annual Town Report booklet. There being no discussion, the motion was voted upon by voice and was carried.

Article 2. Motion was made by Elke Hanna and seconded by Theresa Acerno that the District authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grants—in—aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency. There being no discussion, the motion was voted upon by voice and was carried.

Article 3. Motion was made by Elke Hanna and seconded by Jennifer Bone that the District authorize the school board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the School District Meeting, money from the state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes avail-

able during the 1987-1988 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money, and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further, that the school board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money. There being no discussion, the motion was voted upon by voice and was carried.

Mr. Smith interjected that, in the case of amendments to a motion, one amendment at a time would be considered and voted upon.

Article 4. Motion was made by Reggie Simino and seconded by Brian Merry that the District support the existence of an Ad Hoc Committee of the Westmoreland School Board for the purpose of studying existing and future programs, enrollments, and facilities to accommodate the educational needs of Westmoreland students. In answer to a question as to who would serve on this committee, Mr. Simino stated that those interested should contact school board members. There being no further discussion, the motion was voted upon by voice and was carried.

Article 5. Motion was made by Reggie Simino and seconded by Eric Bone that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,600 for the replacement of and/or improvements to the Westmoreland School heating system with the funds to be raised by use of existing unexpended funds with the remainder to be raised by use of local property taxes. Discussion centered on sources of funds for the heating system, the amount of work to be done, and obtaining more than one bid for the job. The motion was voted upon by voice and was carried.

Article 6. Motion was made by Dick Lawson and seconded by Linn Starkey, Jr. that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$875,923 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district. Cameron Tease moved to amend the motion by changing the figure to \$916,154. Motion was seconded by Eric Bone. Mr. Tease then explained by means of handouts (attached) and graphs projected by an overhead that salaries and tuitions comprise the greatest portions of the budget; that the proposed salary increases make the salaries of Westmoreland teachers competitive with those in surrounding towns; and that non-certified personnel would be receiving the same raise as the teachers (35% over 3 years). Discussion followed concerning: tuition to Keene High School (\$3900/student/'87-'88 school year) and to Westmoreland Elementary School (\$2599/student/'86-'87 school year); the need for Special Ed and the doubling of the cost of state-mandated Special Ed which amounts to about \$95,000 involving about 28 students; the increase in taxes resulting from this appropriation which would amount to 11.15%; a plea that SAU 29 should hold the line on expenses - Westmoreland's share being 4% to 5% of their budget; and that the negotiated raise of 35% on top of the 20% raise given two years ago is needed to make Westmoreland's salaries competitive. A ballot vote on the amendment to the original motion resulted in 58 for and 47 against and the amended motion was carried.

Article 7. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

A request was made that copies of the budget and other handouts be distributed before the School District Meeting. The school board members said

this could be done at the Town Meeting.

A motion to adjourn was made, seconded, voted upon, and carried. Meeting adjourned at 8:38 PM.

There were approximately 110 people in attendance including Charles Larracey, Superintendent of Schools; Lawrence Seavey, Assistant Superintendent of Schools; David Hill, Business Administrator; Pat Trow, Personnel Director; and Janice Lefebvre, Principal of Westmoreland School.

WESTMORELAND ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 1987-88

Three new staff members joined us for the 1987-88 school year. Mr. Charles Powell teaches physical education and replaces Miss Amy Watson. Mrs. Emily Mills and Miss Beth St. Pierre have joined us as the resource room teacher and instructional associate respectively, replacing Mrs. Kathy Hanson and Mrs. Eleanor Hoff. We began the school year with an enrollment of 131 students. According to the fall 1987 census, our enrollment will increase to 146 by 1990. Of course, any change in residency or development will have an impact on this figure.

As many of you know, I began my teaching career in Westmoreland in the 1971-72 school year. The needs of the Westmoreland Elementary School have changed greatly since that time. With the passage of PL 94:142 in 1975, schools were required to provide educational opportunities for physically and mentally handicapped students within the public school setting. That resulted in the inclusion of a resource room, provisions for speech, language and occupational therapy, and educational evaluation of the handicapping condition. All of these services are available at the Westmoreland School. The problem that has developed is the lack of space in which to appropriately provide these services.

Additionally, the curriculum now includes music and physical education instruction for our students. Space for instruction in these areas and storage for the equipment with which to carry out the instruction is also a major concern. Space for our extracurricular sports programs is a concern also. This winter all of our basketball games will be away games because the participating teams in the league consider the Town Hall to be unsafe for the games.

The inclusion of the resource room displaced the school library to a much smaller space. With the information and technology explosion since 1971, our library facilities are inadequate for preparing our students to enter Keene High School.

In order to maintain the status of a state approved school according to the new minimum state standards, we must provide guidance services, an art program and the services of a certified librarian and aide by 1990. This will add more space demands to those with which we are currently struggling.

The provision of the above mentioned services or programs is not impacted by increased or decreased enrollment. They must be provided to some degree regardless of the number of students in the school. Our students benefit greatly by every improvement made to our school and our curriculum. Those of you who have witnessed the winter and spring concerns have seen the dramatic improvement as a result of good music instruction within our school. This year we saw the formation of the first Westmoreland School Chorus. Many people have commented on the improvements in our math and science curriculum due to the emphasis on exploration and manipulation of the concepts in those

disciplines. This has created enthusiasm and interest on the part of the students and a more solid understanding of the concepts. Our health education program, part of the science curriculum, is in the process of improvement. The school nurse is working with teachers in grades 1-4 and the science teacher to assist in the areas of hygiene, nutrition, communicable diseases and drug and alcohol education. The Westmoreland Lions Club sponsored our school nurse and science teacher at a three day conference regarding a drug and alcohol program called QUEST which is now being used in our junior high science classes.

Efforts are being made to help our students with the social and emotional transition to Keene High School, as well as the necessary academic preparation. Opportunities for our students to meet and work with other seventh and eighth graders in the area include the American Heritage Tour and joint field trips, assemblies and dances.

These improvements have taken place largely due to a dedicated and caring staff working within material and space constraints. With attention to be given to those two areas as well as to the new state requirements, I look forward to continued improvements in the education of the Westmoreland students.

An excellent relationship exists between the school and parents in Westmoreland. Many volunteers make tremendous contributions to the education of our students. The Cultural Arts Committee brings many exceptional experiences to our students in the form of guest instructors and field trips. The Famous Artists Come To School Program, sponsored by the Thorne-Sagendorff Art Gallery at Keene State College, is also totally dependent on volunteers. The Boosters Club lends much needed support to our sports programs by providing items such as team uniforms as well as financial support for such unexpected expenses as the added transportation cost for away basketball games this year.

In order to facilitate school community communications, a monthly newsletter is distributed describing the many school activities and events for the coming month. Copies of the newsletter are available in the local village store and the town library for those residents who do not have children in school. Additionally, I have attended small group meetings in people's homes or private gathering places for the purpose of discussing the school programs, philosophy, activities, etc., and any strengths and/or weaknesses of interest to the public. I have certainly enjoyed my first two years as principal and look forward to many more happy, productive years working with your children, the staff at Westmoreland Elementary School and the community of Westmoreland.

- In June the Department of Public Health assisted with information and testing of entire school population after a single case of active TB was diagnosed.
- Chesterfield, Marlborough and Westmoreland school nurses, together with the school nurse supervisor, Mary Parker, worked on compiling and completing a School Health Manual for compliance with guidelines of Supervisory District #29 and school physician, Dr. McMurphy.
- Workshop sponsored by the Lions Club on Skills for Adolescents, relating to Drug/Alcohol Education and self-esteem for grades 5 through 8.

SCHOOL YEAR 1987-88

Fall-Winter Health services provided the following:

- Twenty Sports physicals for potential sports participants.
- 2. School physicals for students in grades 4, 7 and 8.
- 3. First grade health records started.
- State mandatory immunizations report compiled and forwarded to Concord.
- 5. Vision and hearing screenings for grades 1 through 8.
- 6. Heights and weights for grades 1 through 8.
- 7. Blood pressures on students in grades 4, 7 and 8.
- Mandatory scoliosis screenings on students in grades 5 through 8.
- 9. Budget for health supplies submitted.
- Referrals to appropriate agencies for health related concerns.
- 11. Head checks for lice, as needed.
- 12. Up-date records and start records for transfer students.
- Between September, 1987 and January, 1988 a total of 450 students were seen in the Health Office.

Projection for February to June

- 1. Transfer stats onto students' records.
- 2. Start health education.
- Dr. McMurphy will return in the Spring to re-check students with health concerns.
- 4. Follow-up on vision/hearing screenings.
- Vision/hearing Clinic for Kindergarten/pre-school children in Westmoreland/Chesterield.
