

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Woodstock, in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Woodstock, on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to defray expenses in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if a discount of 3% will be allowed on taxes paid on or before the first of September or a later date to be set by the Selectmen and if the sum of twenty cents shall be added to each poll tax not paid on or before September 15th.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as posted.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to sell Property taken on tax titles.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow not to exceed the sum of \$9,100.00 to extend the Summer water line on Route 175 to the residence of Joseph Bujeaud.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow not to exceed the sum of \$10,600.00 to put in a sewer line from the Bigelow Cottage on Courtney road along said road to connect with the main sewer across Route 3.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 to place an honor roll bronze tablet on the present Memorial Monument in Soldiers Park in honor of the Korean War Veterans.

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## PUBLIC HEALTH AND SCHOOL NURSING SERVICES LINCOLN — WOODSTOCK AREA

Dec. 31, 1959 — Dec. 31, 1960

Total number of visits made during 1960 were 1,248. Of this number 790 were to medical and chronic cases, 23 to prenatal cases, 24 to new mothers, 35 preschool, Crippled Children's Services 27, visits to persons not taken under care; Welfare, etc., 349.

Conferences with Social Workers and Supervisors from various State departments 27, Work Shop and Professional meetings attended 12. Four children transported to State conducted Pediatric Diagnostic clinics, 1 to Orthopedic clinic, 1 adult for chest x-ray.

Total number of school visits made in the area were 200. Visits to homes in behalf of school work 28.

Nurses examinations on 311 pupils consisted of heights, weights, vision testing, hearing tests when it was found necessary, and general inspections, athletic examinations were carried out on 79 high school pupils by Dr. Dooley. Nurse's home visits were made when results warranted such. Hearing tests were given to all high school pupils.

Classes in baby bath procedure were given to the Seniors of the Home Economic Class.

For the Christmas season, gifts of toys, money, clothing and food were donated for the needy children and families. Special mention should be made of the students of the high school and the three upper grades of the Lincoln elementary school for the help on this program.

My thanks also to the organizations and friends who helped in any way on the Christmas program and for cooperation during the year.

YOU, whether YOU be a farmer, homemaker, business or professional man or woman, municipal, state or federal official, clerk or woodsman can play an important part in the continuing and vital prevention program.

First — by setting a good example YOURSELF — being sensible and complying with the necessary laws and regulations governing the use of fire in and near woodlands.

Second — by using YOUR individual influence in your community and valued council with others in insisting and encouraging them to do likewise.

The following simple rules may be used as a guide both for YOU and for them.

- 1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning don't leave it.

- 3. Make certain your fire, camp or debris, is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
- 4. Don't throw down lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes or from moving vehicles — make sure they are out — use your ash tray.
- 5. Don't burn at home use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.



#### REPORT OF PRINCIPAL

Superintendent M. Wayne Bowie Plymouth, New Hampshire

Dear Mr. Bowie:

I hereby submit my eighth report as principal of the Woodstock School. The 1960-61 school year began on September 7th, with an enrollment of 140 pupils. Halfway through the school year we still have 140 pupils, of which 81 are boys.

New drinking fountains have been installed in place of the old. Several new desks and chairs have made it possible to seat some of the larger pupils in better-fitting accommodations. Swinging doors have replaced the one-way doors between the first floor and the exits.

We are again attempting to provide hot chocolate for pupils at recess and lunch time. (Our equipment is meagre.) Mr. Corbeil has again done a fine job with the skating rink, and many pupils have helped with snow removal from the rink. The 7th grade boys have undertaken the task of making a Nature Trail, which we hope will be of much value in the study of Natural Science.

The work of the School Safety Patrol has perhaps never been more appreciated than in the past couple of weeks of savage sub-zero temperatures! Some Winter Carnival events have been shortened a bit because of the cold, but there has still been a very large number of boys and girls participating.

Last Fall the older boys and girls worked hard to convert the unsightly gravel pit behind the school to a graded slope that can be used by children who wish to ski. I would like to thank Mr. Clinton Hamnett for his help with the project. While the slope has seen much use, it is a poor substitute for the kind of a ski area that the town of Woodstock, with its many fine natural possibilities, should be able to provide for

its citizens. We continue to hack away each winter with hand-axe, knife and bush-hook . . . in order to clear a narrow ski trail down one of the slopes of Grandview Mountain, certainly one of the most beautiful and scenic areas in our region. It is too bad that we cannot take better advantage of the opportunities our physical environment provides.

This past semester there has been a small furore regarding "homework" for school pupils. I stand on the position taken by the faculty — that, generally, there is too little, rather than too much. I ask all parents to read as many as possible of the recent studies made relative to American Education. I would like, in particular, to refer to a recent comparative study, coauthored by Dr. George Gallup and Evan Hill, which is found in the last 1960 issue of The Saturday Evening Post, pages 59-76.

The Elementary School has been charged by many with failure in one of its fundamental tasks because high school and college pupils lack skill in reading. While there probably is room for improvement, we feel that our instructional program is reasonably good. Here again, however, we need some help from parents. Development of reading skills at all levels demands practice.

Our 1960 survey of our Junior High School-age pupils reveals that fewer than 17 % of these pupils read library books regularly, on their own initiative. Only one out of four of these pupils attempt to keep themselves informed of current affairs by consistently reading newspapers and magazines. Yet nearly all admit to a considerable acquaintance with the latest "funny books," and many spend from 20 to 35 hours each week watching Television programs. It seems highly improbable that children derive much of lasting value from most of the present programs. Most of the time thus spent is time which could be used to far greater advantage in supplementing the work of the school.

Perhaps we had better make greater use of the Truant Officer. We have had approximately **eleven** hundred half-days lost due to absence during the first semester. This is worse than last year's record, in spite of the fact that we have fewer pupils now. Probably at least 25% of these absences were not for good reasons. (It perhaps won't surprise you that attendance has been better during Winter Carnival.)

There are a few things that should be taken care of soon. One of the second-grade radiation units which has been patched several times is again leaking badly, and should be replaced.

The window in the roof of the building has broken glass, and should be repaired immediately, since the moisture it admits usually ends up in the supply closet.

Many windows now have broken sash cords, and do not function properly.

Some of our teachers need new desks rather badly. We should also get, if possible, one of the mobile Science Tables . . . for use by all grades.

We would like to again thank the Baptist Church for its help at graduation time, and also to thank Mrs. Pritchard, who has substituted so ably in the 5th grade while Mrs. Tetley is out.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT TO THE WOODSTOCK SCHOOL BOARD

Hereby submitted is my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The Woodstock Elementary School had only one change in staff for this year. Miss Anderson, who resigned to take a job nearer to Plymouth, was replaced by Mrs. Micklon who was a 1960 graduate of Plymouth Teachers College in the Elementary Curriculum. She has proven to be a good teacher with a great deal of energy and ambition and is well liked by the students in her class. All other teaching assignments remained the same.

Mrs. Wilson, the present Music Supervisor for the Union, has informed me she would be willing to take on the duties of Supervisor of Music in your school for another year if you so desire and in all probability there will be a special article in the warrant so you can decide to add this service if you wish. I would highly recommend doing so if you feel you can from the financial angle. Under such a program the Music Supervisor visits each class each week and teaches a full period of music as well as leaving lessons and instructions for the teacher to work on curing her absence. The Music Supervisor is also available for evening functions, graduations and things of this nature where singing, music or chorus groups participate.

During the Fall the question was raised concerning the amount of homework in the upper grades. From my knowledge and interest concerning the matter, I did not feel it was in excess so I invited Mr. Economopolis, Elementary School Supervisor for the State of New Hampshire to visit and make his recommendations to me. After his investigation, it was his feeling that too much was not being required but what was needed was more articulation between teachers so that on any given night a child might not have more than

he could do and on another practically none. This advice has been followed and there seems to be no more difficulty.

During the year another major piece of playground equipment has been added and two new drinking fountains installed in the school to replace those that were out of date and of a type not recommended by the State Department of Public Health.

The testing program remains the same as in previous years with readiness tests being administered to first graders when they enter school and achievement batteries administered to all children in the Fall and in the Spring. This year also an aptitude test will be given to all 8th graders to aid school officials in high school placement of the graduates.

The big problem facing the district it seems to me concerns possible courses of action in the education of the high school pupils. I am aware of the fact that committees from both Lincoln and Woodstock have been working on the problem and at this writing I am not sure what the solution is going to be. The Lincoln Superintendent, the school principals and myself met in the Fall to discuss this matter at length and I think that from the concensus of opinion a new 6-year high school was the best solution to the problem if the funds were made available for a building. In any event some decision should be made soon and positive action of some sort should follow. In the event that a 6-year high school (grades 7-12) was voted and built, grades 7 and 8 from the Woodstock Elementary School would move into it. The upstairs temporary partition between what is now Mrs. Hoff's and Mrs. Tetley's rooms could be removed thus leaving a school assembly area that could be used for many school activities as well as for a school hot lunch program which I would like to see some time in the future. Under present conditions this is impossible. A building program for the two towns under the Cooperative School Plan would give both Woodstock and Lincoln a voice in the organization and administration and it seems to me to be a desirable thing.

I would like to have you know that I am available to help in any way I can on the planning and guidance of this project if it reaches that stage.

I feel we have had a most successful year in education and I would like to have you know that I am ready to assist you in any way possible with your educational problems.

#### EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent of schools as per the following quotation: "Reports. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report showing the total salary paid to the superintendent, which report shall show in detail the amount derived from the per capita tax and the amount paid directly by each school district in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 48 during 1959-60 received a salary of \$7,750 which was made up as follows: \$3,500 paid from the per capita tax and \$4,250 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$1,100 for travel within the union was also prorated as stated above.
