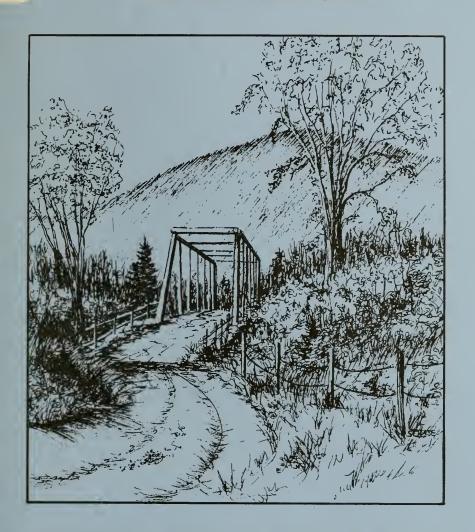

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ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 8, 1983

Norman J. Head, Jr., Moderator Howard C. Nichols, Clerk Meeting opened at 7:00 p.m.

Motion was made to dissolve the meeting at 11 p.m. All in favor.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Polls opened at 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Motion to accept budget of \$426,900.00 by William Paine seconded by Gail Paine. Explanation of each item by Gene G. Chandler. Motion made by Gene G. Chandler to increase the Election figure by \$300.00 to a total of \$800.00 due to the Special Election that will be necessary to fill the vacancy created in the General Court by the passing of Rep. Donalda K. Howard. William Paine asked if the Cemetery figure included the plotting of plots in the cemeteries. Chandler responded that it did not. Paine suggested adding \$400.00 to the cemetery figure of \$600.00 for a total of \$1000.00. Motion was made by William Paine and seconded by Richard Plusch to amend the Election figure by \$300.00 to give a total of \$800.00. Accepted by unanimous vote. Motion was made to amend the Cemetery figure by \$400.00 to a total of \$1000.00 by William Paine and seconded by John Murphy. Accepted by unanimous vote. Regulations on the cemetery regards sale of plots is to be set up by the Selectmen. Discussion ensued regards the amount allotted for Legal Expenses. Gene Chandler explained that it is always an unknown factor as to the amount necessary and that he felt that the figure was a comfortable one. Motion was made by Robert Gregory to increase the Airport figure to \$300.00, seconded by William Paine. The question was raised as to why the figure for the Sanitary Landfill was so much higher than last year. Gene Chandler explained that the increase was due to renegotiations of the contract that is now good for seven years. The long process of searching for and preparing another site according to State standards was explained and that the costs were prohibitive. Gene Chandler also pointed out that one of the capital reserve funds has been designated for the Sanitary Landfill for use as needed such as the purchase of land for a new site. Mr. Chandler explained the reduction in the Recreation figure that was balanced off by the Special Article in the Warrant in order for the Association to receive a grant. Mr. Chandler also pointed out that the Town insurance and health benefits programs were both being reviewed and hopefully would show reductions. Motion was made by Robert Gregory and seconded by Richard Barrows to amend the budget by an increase of \$850.00 to give a total figure of \$427750.00. Accepted by unanimous vote.

Article 3. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum not exceeding in the aggregate \$400,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable notes therefor, said to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the current municipal year. Motion to accept by John Brandt, seconded by David Carta and accepted by unanimous vote.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction. Motion to accept by David Carta, seconded by Richard Plusch, accepted by unanimous vote.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Bartlett. Motion to accept by John Brandt, seconded by Robert Jones, accepted by unanimous vote.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote in favor of authorizing the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of property taxes and resident taxes prior to issuance of the Tax Warrant, such payments not to be received before April 1st of any given year, in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 80:52a. Motion to amend by Howard C. Nichols to include the RSA 80:1a, seconded by Gail Paine. Motion to accept by Howard Nichols, seconded by Gain Paine, accepted by unanimous vote.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7200.00 for the purchase of a new highway sander and authorize the removal of \$7200.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund as payment for said sander. Motion to accept by Gene Chandler, seconded by Fred Hodgkins, accepted by unanimous vote.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11600.00 for the purchase of a new police cruiser and authorize the removal of \$11600.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund as payment for said police cruiser. Motion to accept by Robert Snow, seconded by Richard Barrows. Discussion ensued regards need of cruiser, type of cruiser to be purchased. Chief Snow responded that the current Chevrolet Malibu cruiser was on its last legs and was becoming very expensive to run. The Chief was looking into purchasing possibly another Volvo since the one purchased last year has been running excellently but he would investigate and get the best car for the best price. Article was voted on and accepted.

Article 9. To see if the voters of the Town will authorize the sum of \$8000.00 (eight thousand dollars) for the purchase of large diameter water supply hose and related accessories for the Fire Department. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert A. Grant and others. Motion to accept by Robert A. Grant, seconded by George Marcoux. Andy Grigel spoke for the article saying that this hose will help complete the system. Ken Billings raised the question of storage for the hose and Grigel stated that this would not be a problem. Benson Howard asked

if the Chief and Selectmen support this article. Chief Robert Jones stated that he did support the article and the Selectmen also stated their support. Petition was given to the moderator signed by Robert Kurz and others requesting a secret ballot vote on this article. Ballot was taken and the results were: Yes - 122, No - 20, Blank - 4. Article accepted.

Article 10. To see if the voters of the Town will authorize the sum of \$2400.00 (two thousand four hundred) to be combined with funds from the Town of Jackson for the purpose of purchasing a stand-by power source for the Tyrol Fire Frequency Radio Tower. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert A. Grant and others. Motion to accept by Robert A. Grant, seconded by Richard Barrows. Robert A. Grant spoke for the article. Gene G. Chandler questioned the portion Jackson would pay in their article as \$1600.00 and pointed out that normally in dealing with Jackson that capital expenses are split 50/50 and that operating expenses are usually split 60/40 since Bartlett has a larger population. James Chadbourne asked how many times the tower has been out, how long, and has it impeded fighting any fires? Grant answered that it had been out 4 times in the last year. Chadbourne asked what was proposed and Grant answered that a propane fire generator seemed to be the solution. Much discussion ensued regards effect on tax rate, was it really necessary, and had all possibilities to solve the problem been investigated. Motion was made and seconded to move the question and voted on unanimously. Vote was then taken on the article and it was passed.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 to pay partial costs of constructing a fence at the ballfield. The recreation budget has been reduced by this amount and a matching grant applied for from the New Hampshire Recreation Department. Motion to accept by William Paine, seconded by Richard Jones. John Murphy questioned where the skating rink was last year and couldn't this money saved from no rink be used for fence. Gene Chandler pointed out that this article was necessary in order to get a matching grant and that although the skating rink was not very successful due to poor weather, that money was still spent to try to make it work. Vote was taken and article passed.

Article 12. To see if the Town will authorize the removal of \$5000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund to use toward equipment purchases of the police, fire, and highway departments. Motion to accept by Gene G. Chandler, seconded by John Brandt. Motion by Raymond Schoen, seconded by Ken Billings to put this money toward the hose Article 9; vote taken and amendment defeated. Vote taken on the article as stated and passed.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) in support of the North Country Senior Meals Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jeannie Mahany (age 94) and others. Motion to accept by John Brandt, seconded by Gail Paine and article passed unanimously.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1400.00 for administrative expenses for the Gibson Center for Senior Services, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard Barrows and others. Motion to accept by Richard Barrows, seconded by John Brandt. The question was raised as to what was spent last year and Barrows responded \$1680.80. Vote was taken and article passed unanimously.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$832.00 for the support of the Children and Youth Project of Mount Washington Valley (C & Y). Agreeable to a petition signed by Susan Gaudette and others. Motion to accept by Sue Gaudette, seconded by John Brandt. Vote was taken and passed unanimously.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2700.00 for the 1983 Capital Budget of the Memorial Hospital, North Conway, New Hampshire. Agreeable to a petition signed by Peter Fresco and others. Motion to accept by Peter Fresco, seconded by Gail Paine. Lois Gregory spoke for the article stating that the money would be used to purchase equipment that would best serve the needs of people and the Town of Bartlett. The question was raised as to the amount appropriated last year and it was stated that the amount was the same. Vote was taken and article passed unanimously.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for support of the Community Action Outreach Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Walter Smith and others. Motion to accept by Michael Farley, seconded by Ken Billings. Michael Farley spoke for the article stating that the program is mainly to provide fuel assistance to the needy. Vote was taken and article passed.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2532.00 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County Inc. said sum being equal to \$60 per person in the Town of Bartlett. Agreeable to petition signed by Ruth Ann Fabrizio and others. Motion to accept by Ruth Ann Fabrizio, seconded by James Chadbourne. Fabrizio spoke for the article stating that the amount per capita is the same as last year. Vote was taken and passed unanimously.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the

sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) in support of the Mount Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce. Agreeable to a petition signed by Peter Fresco and others. Motion to accept by Peter Fresco, seconded by Lois Gregory. Fresco spoke for the article. Vote taken and passed.

Article 20. To see if the Town will contribute the sum of \$150.00 to assist the Northern Carroll County Family Planning Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Nancy J. Hodgkins and others. Motion to accept by Nancy J. Hodgkins, seconded by Gail Paine. Nancy Hodgkins spoke for the article. Vote taken and passed unanimously.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 for Carroll County Mental Health Service, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by William D. Paine and others. Motion to accept by William Paine, seconded by John Brandt. Robert Jones questioned whether these organizations were "double dipping" since most of them also received County funds, which the Town also pays money to the County. Vote was taken and passed unanimously.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10745,75 which will enable to Town to hire a third full time police officer. Said money to cover the period from May 1 to December 31 of the first year's employment. Submitted by the Selectmen at the request of the Chief of Police. Motion to accept by Kathy Haley, seconded by Howard Nichols. Chief Snow spoke for the article. John Brandt questioned why May 1 to December 31 and the Chief answered that this was the busy time and that to save money the new officer wouldn't start until it was absolutely necessary. David Shedd asked if the Selectmen were in support of the article. Chadbourne and Hodgkins were in support and Chandler was not. Ben Howard questioned if the State Police could pick up some of the patrol and the Chief stated that that was not possible. Petition was submitted signed by Doug Prebor and others requesting a secret ballot be taken on this article. Ballot was taken and the results were: Yes - 111, No - 22. Blank - 1, Article passed,

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Permit Ordinance as follows: Any persons, firms, corporations, etc., intending to build, construct, or modify any structure or taxable real estate in the Town of Bartlett must apply to the Selectmen for and receive a building permit before said work shall commence if the taxable value of said work exceeds \$500.00. Routine maintenance and repair items are not covered by this ordinance. The Selectmen shall have the right to refuse such permit to anyone who shall fail to comply with the applicable State Statutes or fail to furnish evidence of compliance with said State Statutes. The fine for violation of the Building Permit Ordinance

shall be \$100.00 plus \$10.00 for every day of violation. Motion to accept by Gene G. Chandler, seconded by John Brandt. Gene Chandler spoke for the article. Donna Tetley made a motion to amend the article to read that the taxable value of said work exceeds \$1000.00 as the ordinance is now. Much discussion ensued. Motion to accept the amendment made by Donna Tetley, seconded by Ruth Ann Fabrizio, vote taken and amendment accepted. Benson Howard questioned the State Statutes. Motion made to move the question, seconded, and vote passed. Vote taken on the article as a whole with the amendment and it passed.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept approximately 500 feet of road in the development of Saco Ridge Village, a subdivision located off the West Side Road in Bartlett, subject to specification approval by the Selectmen of Bartlett. Said roadway being a continuation of Highland Road, so called, previously accepted by the Town and approved by the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Caroline Middleton and others. Motion to accept by Joseph Kerins, seconded by Margaret Kerins. Vote taken and it was unanimously passed.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following described road as a town road for the Town of Bartlett. The Meadows Road, so called, running Northerly 650 feet from the West Side Road to a turnaround, said right-of-way being 66 feet in width and being more particularly bounded and described on a certain map entitled "The Meadows" being land of George Seemann, drawn by H. Edmund Bergeron. The acceptance of said road to be upon compliance by the developer with the road requirements of the Town of Bartlett and upon the vote to accept by the Selectmen of the Town of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by John A. Roden and others. Motion to accept by Peter Fresco, seconded by Ken Billings. Vote was taken and passed unanimously.

Article 26. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from Canal National Bank for two cul-desacs 50 feet in width more or less as shown on a plan entitled "Mountain View Section, Linderhof Resort", dated April, 1974, prepared by J.R. Blais and recorded at Carroll County Registry of Deeds Plan Book 27, Page 42. Such cul-de-sacs are extensions of Main Loop Road and provide access for lots numbered 213-224 and lots numbered 195-201 on said recorded plan. Acceptance of this deed is contingent upon construction of roads to standards established by the Town and satisfactory to the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Miriam Regan and others. Motion made by John Morris to accept, seconded by Karen Pellegrino. Vote taken and passed unanimously.

Article 27. Shall the citizens of Bartlett ask members of the New

Hampshire Congressional delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the U.S. Congress to: Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and the Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production, and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons, with verification safeguards satisfactory to both countries. Agreeable to a petition signed by David Armington and others. Motion to accept made by David Armington, seconded by Raymond Schoen. Armington spoke for the article. Much discussion ensued. Motion made by John Peterman, seconded by David Carta to move the question. Motion carried. Vote taken by voice was inconclusive and a standing vote was taken. Results were: Yes - 49, No - 45. Article passed.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Bartlett and to the health and welfare of the people of Bartlett. These actions shall include: 1) reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain. sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990; 2) conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal. The record of the vote of this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States. Agreeable to a petition signed by Gail F. Paine and others. Motion to accept by Gail Paine, seconded by Richard Plusch, Paine spoke for the article. Benson Howard felt that this article has no place at Town Meeting. David Taylor expressed the same feeling. Motion to move the question by David Carta, seconded by John Peterson, motion carried. Vote taken and article passed.

An article was handed to the moderator for reading. Moderator Head stated that the article could be read but no action could be taken on it. Petitioners stated that it was only to get the townspeople feeling. The article reads as follows: To see if the voters of the Town or Precinct will authorize the Bartlett Fire Department to enter into negotiations with other fire departments for the purpose of sending and receiving aid for extinguishing fires, providing stand-by coverage or controlling other emergencies which are the reponsibility of the fire department. Agreeable to a petition signed by Andy Grigel and others. Motion to dissolve the meeting was made by William Paine, seconded by James Chadbourne. Vote was taken and motion was carried.

Meeting dissolved at 10:35 p.m.

The BARA continues to provide activities for our youth and adult groups throughout the seasons.

The past few years have seen not only an increase in participation in program such as Little League, but an increase in skills by the children involved. The opportunities and programs for Bartlett children have increased significantly and have provided a sense of direction for many of our youth who might otherwise spend their leisure time involved in far less desirable activities.

Programs sponsored or helped by the BARA include Little League and Babe Ruth baseball, 5th and 6th grade basketball, adult softball, adult exercise classes, high school basketball, in addition to field trips and special events when called for.

For the first time the BARA offered Learn to Swim Classes and thirty five youngsters participated in the spring program as guests of the Cathedral Ledge Time Sharing facilities. Hopefully this program can be continued in the spring.

Last summer our recreation program was interrupted due to field renovations. We wish to reinstate the program this summer by providing a recreation program in cooperation with the Bartlett School Summer Reading Program.

Plans are also underway to offer afterschool activities for elementary students who do not have the opportunity to participate in organized sports.

We have outstanding indoor and outdoor facilities and our recreation team will continue to improve our offerings to the people of the community of Bartlett. It's our second year of service and we have made some great steps with our Squad. Training being the main item on our list over the past year has made it possible for us to train nine of our members to the level of Advanced Emergency Medical Technicians. We have some great hopes for the coming year as well. The Area's Emergency Medical Services have some new training programs in mind for 1984.

With most of our growing pains behind us, we plan to focus our efforts in a positive direction and maintain the best possible patient care, not only by training to higher levels but trying to keep our basic skills to a maximum as well. The emergency medical field asks so much of people who wish to partake that it's sometimes very hard for a group to maintain a high interest, but I feel that the members of this group are above that. We always have very good attendance at our calls and training meetings. I would like to extend my thanks to all the members of the group for a fine job and also thank all the people of Bartlett and Jackson for the support that they have shown. We would also like to express our appreciation for all donations and memorial gifts given to our Squad.

I'm pleased to report that we are requesting the same budget this year as we have for the past two years. We were able to cut down on some of the costs by shopping around before making a purchase of supplies or new equipment. For 1984 we are going to cut down on some parts of the budget in order to provide for more training money.

The Bartlett-Jackson Ambulance Squad responded to over 130 calls in 1983 and transported over 100 patients. The number of motor vehicle mishaps are down from 1982 but the total number of calls are up. Please let's all try to make 1984 a safe year for everyone.

BARTLETT PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT - 1983

The Bartlett Public Library circulated 7,631 books and magazines during 1983. Three hundred seventy-nine books were added to the collection. Memorial books were given by the VFW Auxiliary in memory of Cecile Nealley's mother and Glenn Hayes. They also gave a book on American flags in honor of Ed Clemons. Mrs. Robert Pleay gave books in memory of her husband.

Story hours were held every Friday morning during the school year and Friday afternoons during the summer for pre-school children. The library participated in the Fourth of July parade with a prize-winning float. The library trustees would like to thank Alan Eastman for the use of his truck and flat bed, and Susan Doyle for organizing and decorating her float. The prize money will be used to defray costs of our town history project.

The trustees and interested citizens are organizing to start researching our local history. Hopefully by 1990, our town's bicentennial, we will have a published history of our town. The library is interested in any old photographs or post cards of our town. We would like to make reprints of old photos that one may not want to donate to add to a photograph file to be housed in the library. If interested in helping call the library, 374-2755.

I'd like to comment on the financial report of the library. Although the report shows a fairly large book budget balance in actuality most of these funds are committed to the purchase of a new encyclopedia and a book order which had not been processed at the time of the budget reconciliation. Also, because the balaance of our total budget has been increasing slightly each year we are submitting our proposed budget for the year and subtracting \$1000 from the amount to be raised.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Once again, our cooperative town and state forest fire prevention and control program leads the nation in least acres burned per forest fire. Less than one-half acre per fire statewide average.

At the town level, your Forest Fire Warden is responsible for the prevention and control of all grass and wood fires when the ground is not snow covered.

Forest fire prevention is achieved at the town level by issuing a written permit for every fire that is to be kindled on the ground out of doors when the ground is not covered with snow. Each person wishing to have an outside fire must obtain this written permit from the town Fire Warden before kindling the fire. Any person that does not obtain a fire permit, when one is required, is violating our forest fire permit law and is subject to a court appearance and could be fined up to \$1,000 and receive a jail sentence of up to one year.

No fire permit will be issued between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is raining. The reason for this is twofold: the fire danger increases steadily between 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., then subsides to a safe level between 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. This happens because the sun dries out the fine fuels that are easily ignited and dries the air which permits rapid fire spread. Also during this part of the day fire fighters are not readily available in most communities so an escaped fire could burn longer and cause greater damage before being suppressed.

Your cooperation in burning only when conditions are safe is greatly appreciated.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

by L. Joseph Rivers

Our 1982-83 school year was a strong building year in terms of our attempt to improve upon our overall instructional programs. Despite the feeling that our programs were strong and that children were learning, we sought out an instructional design that would make our teaching/learning efforts even more effective. We adopted the Mastery Learning Concept which is a philosophy that most students can learn excellently. It assumes that virtually all students can master a great deal of what they are taught in school if the instruction is approached systematically, if students are helped when they have learning difficulties, if they are given sufficient time to achieve mastery, and if given sufficient opportunities to achieve. Our use of Mastery Learning is an ongoing approach, and we are already seeing excellent results from this new program.

The end of the 1982 school year featured the science and art fair and 8th grade career education night. Our career education week was highlighted by many guest speakers who met with our students to talk about their various careers.

Eighth grade graduation was held in the school gym for the first time, and more than 200 friends, parents and relatives attended. Graduation Awards were presented to the following students: George Mulvey Award for Outstanding School Leadership, Kirsten Murphy; Highest Academic Achievement, Eric Atwell (by the Bartlett School Board); Most Improved Student, Steven Moulton (by Bartlett Faculty); Science Achievement Award, Carl Schaible (by Jackson School Board); and Boy/Girl Athlete of the Year, Brenda Hawkes, Scott Moulton and Sarah Lord (by the BARA). A new award in memory of an outstanding Bartlett citizen, Glenn Hayes, was given to the outstanding 7th grade student for Scholarship, Sportsmanship, and School Spirit. The award, presented by Jeff Hayes, was awarded to Kelly Walton.

In September 1982 we welcomed back 195 students and two new staff members. Steve Adler, grade 5th and 6th teacher, replaced Mr. Paul Joyce; and Elizabeth Gaschott replaced Suzanne Griffin as teacher of special education students.

Our computer literacy program expanded into the establishment of a computer laboratory center with instruction in basic computer literacy to programming for all students in grades K-8.

Our drug and alcohol awareness and prevention is well underway, and students in grades 1-8 are responding very positive to this approach.

In the extra-curricular activities, our boys 5th/6th grade soccer and grades 7/8 posted outstanding records. The 7th/8th girls field hockey team showed great improvement.

The drama club, in cooperation with our music department, put on a splendid performance entitled Cabaret and features from Oliver. Over 300 attended the weekend presentations. We will continue to put a premium approach on our arts program.

A Parent Advisory Committee group was organized in January of 1984, and we hope to better our communications with our parents and the community.

The recent Presidential Commission report on Excellence in Education, A Nation at Risk, pointed out several shortcomings in education today. We intend to continuously look to ways to improve our total instructional programs and to prepare our students to be successful at the high school level.

Our budget for the 1984-85 school year focuses on our educational needs and adequately supports our academic goals. We appreciate your support of our community school, and we intend to make the best possible use of financial appropriations.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

by Dr. Francis M. Murphy

The school year 1983-84 has been, by all accounts, a reasonably successful year for S.A.U. #9. The transition from Bob Kautz's administration has gone quite smoothly thanks to the help and experience of the staff that stayed behind.

The high school has made a greater effort to be responsive to community needs, both in Conway and in the outlying districts. A new computerized attendance procedure has brought information to decision-makers soon enough to act on that information before it is too late.

In keeping with a move for cost cutting and efficiency, an administrative position has been cut from the S.A.U. budget. Elaine Woodman, our former Special Education Director, decided in light of this to move to the Bridgton School District in Maine. The tasks that she was charged with were divided between the elementary principals, the high school guidance director, the assistant superintendent of schools and one school psychologist whose working year has been extended by one month to help him accomplish the added duties. Next year the pattern will be similar. We have closed out the old position of assistant superintendent in the 1984-85 budget and opened the position of assistant superintendent for instruction and special education. Accordingly, we will be seeking applicants for this position.

Because of a rising demand for paperwork, some from the state and federal agencies, and some generated to do a more effective job here, we were at risk of having to add another secretary. At the same time our old computer was beginning to break down almost weekly. The solution to both of these problems seemed to be a new computer that could help the secretaries to produce more paperwork faster and solve the problem of breakdowns. The new computer can be used in locations other than just the S.A.U. administrative offices. By merely attaching a phone modem and a so-called "dumb" terminal that has no memory, outlying shoools can tap this superb machine, the IBM System 36. During the school year 1984-85 Kennett High School hopes to make use of the new computer for word processing, type setting and scheduling. By the 1985-86 school year, our hope is that we will be doing our own scheduling and have our own report cards and academic records computerized. Many other applications are also possible.

This year was also a year devoted to gathering community perceptions about the schools. The superintendent spoke at a number of local community functions, deliberately seeking what the community saw as the needs of the school district. A great deal of information was revealed about the towns' perceptions of the schools' performance; curiously, meetings with boards, teachers and administrators revealed that we all see some common areas that need improvement. These will become priorities for the administration.

Generally, we will focus on increased community involvement, more decisive administration, and increased student expectations. We fully expect, while maintaining and improving our programs in vocational and special education, to do more to make our more able students competitive in an increasingly challenging world.

Some small but significant achievements this year are the following:

- (1) Every teacher's performance has been evaluated this year for the first time in many years.
- (2) Every administrator's performance has been evaluated.
- (3) A new staff newsletter has been initiated.
- (4) A comprehensive study of the Guidance Department at Kennett was begun with the goal to make the department more efficient.
- (5) The vocational education program has revamped its scheduling and will allow a greater participation in the program by freshmen and more flexibility by upper classmen.
- (6) A new comprehensive testing system is being implemented to allow us to compare our performance as a school district to other districts and our own standards. This should enable us to determine priorities more realistically.
- (7) The science program at Kennett is undergoing a study to discover how they can improve.
- (8) The graduation requirements of Kennett High have been stiffened to include 2 units of science and 2 units of math.

In the area of physical plant the energy conservation projects at Kennett High School have progressed well with the installation of insulation panels, new windows, and the insulation of the attic in the 1923 building. John Fuller School got its new roof; and Conway Elementary, John Fuller and Kennett received new doors to make more energy efficient entries. Part of the play area at Bartlett was rebuilt and improved. Madison got a new roof, and the kitchen was relocated to squeeze a little more space out of that building. Freedom is now located happily in their new school. In Jackson the donated barn was improved with a new roof among other structural improvements, and a large area between the school and the barn was upgraded for a play area. The Tamworth furnace was replaced and the heating system was modified to improve energy efficiency. Also, the outside brick was cleaned, repointed and sealed.

In all, we believe it to have been a good year thus far, with progress having been made in a large number of areas and more to follow.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

It has been a rather tranquil year all things considered. Probably the biggest event financially and for the future direction of the Town was the vote at a Special Town Meeting in November to purchase 165 acres of land jointly with the Town of Jackson. The cost of the property was \$184,000,00 divided equally between the two towns. This authorization assures Bartlett and Jackson of a long range solution to its solid waste disposal problems and any other projects suitable for joint solution. As we assured you at the Special Town Meeting, no specific use will be made of the land without a public hearing. You authorized the Board at the meeting to implement a payment method and period best suited to the Town's financial positions. The Board has tentatively decided to pay its share (\$92,000,00) over a three year period with this year's payment determined by the total budget voted at Town Meeting in March. The overriding consideration, of course, will be the impact on the tax rate. We also think it prudent not to use the Capital Reserve Funds at this time. Any future solid waste solution will be expensive and we prefer to leave the funds in the Capital Reserve Fund and to increase that account whenever possible.

The financial condition of the Town remains very good. This past year the Town was fortunate again to realize a reduction in its tax rate (\$.50); we now have over \$150,000.00 in all our Capital Reserve Funds and our surplus should be fairly healthy; and we were able to remain substantially within our budget in 1983 despite considerable economic pressure and an extremely tight budget.

As you all know for the past five years the Town has used computer services for preparation of its property tax bills primarily due to rapid growth in the number and complexity of accounts. Indian Head Bank, our latest computer service, has declined to provide the service this year. The Town is fortunate to be able to purchase a small computer and the necessary software at what we consider a very reasonable price. It will have the capacity to accept other applications and should save time and money over the long haul.

On the ballot this year (Town Meeting Day) you will find a few non-binding questions. These questions have been designed solely to provide guidance for the Planning Board and the Board of Selectmen. We want to know how you feel generally about the direction growth should take as it affects the Town. One thing is certain; Bartlett will grow and we need this initial input to point us in the right direction.

And finally, on behalf of the Town, the Board of Selectmen would

like to make special note of the retirement of Pauline Gardner as a Supervisor of the Checklist. Mrs. Gardner served the Town for many years as an Auditor and Supervisor and her expertise will be sorely missed. Also deserving thanks for their service to the Town are Norman Head, whose term on the Planning Board expired, Richard Plusch, who served as a Trustee of the Trust Funds, and George Marcoux who served many years as Forest Fire Warden.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs:

Pursuant to a decree of the Superior Court in and for the County of Carroll and State of New Hampshire dated November 1, 1983 authorizing the Town of Bartlett to hold a Special Town Meeting with the same authority as an Annual Town Meeting for the expenditure of funds, you are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bartlett on the 29th day of November, 1983 at seven o'clock in the evening, to act upon the Articles set forth in this Warrant.

ARTICLE 1. To see if the Town will vote--,

Pursuant to a decree of the Superior Court in and for the County of Carroll and State of New Hampshire dated November 1, 1983 authorizing the Town of Bartlett to hold a Special Town Meeting with the same authority as an Annual Town Meeting for the expenditure of funds, you are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bartlett on the 29th day of November, 1983 at seven o'clock in the evening, to act upon the Articles set forth in this Warrant.

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- B. To borrow in the name of the Town by the issue of serial notes or bonds, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and amendments thereto, and any other statute thereto enabling, a sum not to exceed ninety-two thousand dollars (\$92,000.00) for the purpose of defraying the cost of the foregoing, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the time and place of payment and rate of interest on such notes or bonds and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance and/or sale of such notes or bonds;

- C. To authorize the Selectmen to apply for, negotiate, contract for, seek and do all other things necessary to obtain such federal and state grants, aid contribution and assistance as may be available for the purpose of such real estate for use as a solid waste disposal facility and to adopt any vote relating thereto; and
- D. To authorize the Selectmen to do all things necessary or convenient to carry the foregoing into effect.

Article 2. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Given under our hands at said Bartlett, this 7th day of November, 1983.

Said Warrant being posted on November 8, 1983 at the Bartlett Town Hall, Bartlett Post Office, Glen Post Office, Intervale Post Office, and various other public places within the Town of Bartlett.

Moderator Head asked for a motion to accept Article 1. Richard Garland asked that the article be re-read. Moderator Head re-read the article. Motion to accept the article made by Gene Chandler, seconded by Robert Gregory. Moderator Head asked if there was any discussion. John Walsh stated his support of the Selectmen on the articles but questioned what the future costs would be to the taxpayers for a landfill facility. Selectman Chandler explained that the decision whether to be a landfill or not had not been made yet. However, the estimated cost of starting a landfill is \$40,000/acre. Chandler went on to explain the property bounds by using the map that was posted. Chandler stated that there currently was enough money in the Capital Reserve Fund that was set up specifically for the future dump and therefore the effect on next year's tax rate would be nil. The State (Tom Sweeney) has been to the site and inspected it and has given its verbal OK to use the site as a landfill, incinerator site, stump dump, and/or septage disposal area. Bartlett has six years left on its current contract but Jackson has been given a mandate to close its dump but is currently in court about it. If Jackson must start using the site before Bartlett, arrangements will be made to reimburse Bartlett for the use of the area. Mr. Walsh continued his question by asking if Jackson could join our current landfill and if it did, would it affect the life of our landfill. Richard Garland responded that he felt that the current landfill could handle Jackson and that the life of the landfill would not be shortened.

Richard Garland asked if the current landfill could be extended 10 years beyond the current contract and since the rules are changing for landfills making them very difficult to maintain, wouldn't it be better to continue at the present site as long as possible and bank money towards the purchase of an incinerator. Selectman Chadbourne responded that incineration is definitely the way to go in the future but that a suitable piece of land away from people is necessary and that is why this piece of land is valuable. Richard Garland stated that because of the lack of definite answers at this time, this purchase should be postponed, Alfred Holbrook questioned whether the land could be resold if it turned out we didn't need it. Selectman Chandler states yes and most likely at a profit, since there is some valuable frontage on Rt. 16. The question was raised whether we could purchase less than the 165 acres. Chandler responded that this was being sold as a complete parcel and that the extra land would be needed as a buffer zone and expansion room. John Murphy raised the question of use of hydraulic compaction that is now being used in Japan and at a site in East Cambridge, Mass. The Selectmen agreed to investigate it but that this meeting was for the purpose for purchasing the land only and the method of disposal would be determined at a later date at a public meeting. Alfred Holbrook questioned whether sale of the land would be a problem if Jackson started using the site prior to Bartlett, Selectman Chandler said it could create a problem but we would try to prevent it from happening. Chandler also stated that this site could be used for many other purposes e.g. source of sand and gravel, site for a town building. Selectman Chadbourne stated that any agreement reached with Jackson would be presented to the Town for approval at a public meeting. Selectman Chandler explained that Hart's Location will be a part of this agreement but will have no vote in whatever is done but will be involved in any meetings or discussions on the matter.

Motion to move the question made by Robert Gregory, seconded by John Walsh. Ballot vote was then taken. The results are as follows:

Yes - 29 No - 9 Blank - 1

Article 1 passed by a 2/3 majority of those present.

Moderator Head read Article 2. No other business was presented and therefore no action taken.

Moderator Head asked for a motion to adjourn. Motion made by Michael Dewar, seconded by John Walsh. Meeting adjourned at 8:00 p.m.

TOWN OF BARTLETT OFFICIALS CLOSELY MONITOR COMPLIANCE WITH THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCES, REGULATIONS, AND BY-LAWS:

BUILDING PERMIT ORDINANCE: required for construction valued at \$1,000 or more. Violation = fine of \$10,00/day from beginning of construction.

- WINTER PARKING ORDINANCE: prohibits parking on Town streets between Nov. 1 and May 1. Violation = fine of \$50.00 plus towing charges.
- SNOWPLOWING REGULATION: no snow shall be plowed into or across any Town road.
- ILLEGAL DUMPING ORDINANCE: prohibits dumping and littering at other than in authorized area at landfill. Violation = fine of \$100.00.
- STUMP DUMP REGULATIONS: prohibits dumping garbage and outlining contractor responsibility for materials dumped at the site.
- ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE ORDINANCE: prohibits drinking of alcoholic beverages in public places. Violation = fine of \$25.00.
- TEST PIT INSPECTION ORDINANCE: requires inspection of pits prior to application for state septic design approval.
- EXCAVATION PERMIT REGULATION: permit required to excavate in Town road. Permit must be obtained 24 hours prior to commencement. Violation = fine of \$100.00.
- DOG LEASH BY-LAW: requires that all dogs be restrained by leash or under direct control of owner. Violation = fine of \$10.00 + board reimbursement.
- Complete descriptions of any of the above ordinances and regulations may be obtained at the Selectmen's Office.

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday the thirteenth day of March 1984 at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 will be by official ballot and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before six o'clock in the evening. The remaining articles of the warrant shall be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum not exceeding in the aggregate \$400,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable notes therefor, said to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Bartlett.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$16,235.00 for the purchase of a new highway truck and authorize the removal of \$16,235.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund as payment for said truck. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,240.00 for the purchase of a new one ton highway truck to replace the 1977 truck. Chandler and Chadbourne favor. Hodgkins opposed.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,500.00 for the purchase of computer hardware and software for the preparation of property tax bills, residence tax bills, checklists, and other appropriate uses and to authorize the removal of \$8,500.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund as payment for said computer. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,800.00 for the purchase of a new highway sander. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to repair the Town garage and to paint and/or vinyl side the Glen Fire Station and to authorize the removal of \$3,600.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund as part payment for said repairs. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following ordinance: All buildings, structures, or trailers intended for habitation constructed or moved into the Town of Bartlett for which a septic system is required will from this date require a "Permit to Occupy (PTO)" prior to occupancy. A copy of the State issued "Approval for Operation (AFO)" will be presented at the Town Hall at which time a PTO will be issued at a cost of \$1.00. The purpose of this ordinance is to insure that a septic system meeting State regulations is designed and constructed where required. Violations of this ordinance will result in fines of up to \$100.00 and/or \$10.00 per day for each day of violation. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to be added to the Dump Capital Reserve Fund. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will approve the agreement signed by the Bartlett and Jackson Selectmen on January 13, 1984 and which is posted with the Town Warrant. This agreement provides for the establishment of and procedures for the Solid Waste Disposal District Committee for the Towns of Bartlett and Jackson. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for purchase of fire related equipment for the Bartlett Village and Glen Fire Stations and authorize the removal of \$4,000.00 from the General Revenue Sharing Fund as payment for said equipment. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,283.60 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc., said sum being equal to \$1.65 per person in the Town of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by Jane Stoutermire and others, Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 to hire a summer recreation director and part time Arts and Crafts person from June to August. The Director will manage activities and field trips throughout the summer in conjunction with the presently ongoing summer program at the Bartlett School. Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph Rivers and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$973.00 for the support of the Children & Youth Project of Mt. Washington Valley (C & Y). Agreeable to a petition signed by Nancy Hodgkins and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) in support of the North Country Senior Meals Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by David Y. Taylor and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,470.00 for administrative expenses for the Gibson Center for Senior Services, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard Barrows and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,700.00 for the 1984 Capital Budget of the Memorial Hospital, North Conway, NH. Agreeable to a petition signed by Lois K. Gregory and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,130.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Margaret A. Kerins and others. Selectmen favor.
