THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bow in the County of Merrimaek in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bow on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To elect a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.
4. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for highways and bridges.
5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$2,418.00 for street lights.
6. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$300.00 for the control of white pine blister rust as recommended by the State Forestry Department..
7. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$712.34 for Class V road assistance, the state to contribute \$2,849.37.
8. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the maintenance of the Baker Free Library.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$198.67 (1/100 of 1 per cent of the town's valuation based on the 1947 assessment) to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town in cooperation with the other 37 communities in the Merrimack Valley Region.

12. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting, and make and appropriate to cover the expense of the audit.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300.00 for equipment and maintenance of the Fire Department.

14. To see if the town will vote to adopt an ordinance to regulate the installation of oil burning equipment in heating boilers and furnaces and various commercial and industrial applications, this ordinance to be based on the standards of the National Board of Fire Underwriters to be administered and enforced by the Fire Department and to take effect on the day of adoption.

15. To hear the report of the committee on a town dump and to raise and appropriate any necessary sum of money.

16. To hear the report of the committee on a veterans' memorial and to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same.

17. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the digging of a well at the town hall, piping to sink in the kitchen and equipings with proper shut offs for winter use, in case the cost exceeds said amount the Ladies' Aid of Bow Baptist Church agree to pay the additional amount, and if cost proves to be less than \$300.00 the surplus to be returned to the general fund of the town.

18. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for new snowplows.

19. To see what action the town will take in regards to electing a Chief of Police.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE BOW VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

In Case of Fire — Call 2709-M

Fires

We have answered 27 alarms in this past year with a fire loss of \$1,955.00, all covered with insurance.

The calls were for 2 truck fires, 2 flooded oil burners, one small house and contents, a delayed alarm, \$950.00 loss; one tool shed and garage and contents, \$1,000.00 loss; seven chimney fires, no losses; 3 grass and brush fires, one sawdust pile, one dump, one brooder house, \$5.00 loss; one house, struck by lightning, no fire; five calls for assistance from the Concord Fire Department and the Sunapee Mountain fire at Newbury.

Tanker No. 1

We purchased a new 2½ ton Ford chassis and mounted a pair of second-hand 375 gallon tanks on it, a 200 gallon per minute gear pump and a booster line. The truck has been in service since September, although it is not yet completed.

Fire Police

The following members of the Department have been appointed and sworn in as Special Fire Police and will have full police authority at all fires and times of emergency: Arthur Sargent, Robert Day, Carl Ogden, Arthur Chadwick, Sr., R. Herbert White, Frank Sheehy, Philip Sargent, Donald Carleton and Norman Ordway.

Forest Fire Emergency

During the week of October 22nd to October 28th, the station was covered about 20 hours a day. The roads of Bow were patrolled by car by our Fire Police and other volunteers from 7 in the morning until 2 the next morning. This was to prevent or report any fires and keep the back roads clear of cars and allow no parking in the town day or night. We had no fires and feel it was well worth the effort.

Mt. Sunapee Fire

During the same week — we furnished an average of twenty men per day, fully equipped, to District Fire Chief Tom King, to fight the very bad forest fire on Sunapee Mountain in Newbury. These men worked an average of 16½ hours a day, under the direction of Deputy Chief and Forest Fire Warden Howard C. Day, Deputy Warden Wilbur H. Vaughn, Deputy Warden William Colby and Acting Deputy Warden Robert Focht.

And right here I want to thank all the men, both from Bow and Concord, who worked and helped so much during this extreme emergency, and the members of the Auxiliary who had hot coffee and doughnuts for the men each morning at the station before they left for Newbury. It is this type of cooperation among the townspeople of Bow that will put this town way out front in community spirit.

Radio

With a contribution of \$150.00 from the Auxiliary and the same amount from the Department, we installed a two way radio in Engine No. 1 which gives us instant contact with the Concord or Manchester Fire Departments when we are out at a fire.

Lost Hunter

Last fall, Nyron Calkin of Concord, became lost in Bow. His friends called for help. A search was organized and sent out from the station and he was finally found by Alvin Prusia and George Ordway.

The Department

We now have 68 men on our roster, an increase of 4 men. We have lost two of our members by death — Lee B. Morgan and Richard Rau. The Department has raised over \$575.00 this last year — mostly by a continuous paper drive and have spent it on new equipment and where needed on the trucks and station. To the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Bow Fire Department, we give our warmest thanks for their continued cooperation and help.

REPORT OF THE LADIES' AUXILIARY OF THE BOW VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The year 1947 has been one of progress for the "Ladies' Auxiliary" to the Bow Volunteer Fire Department. We now have a membership of 52; 31 active and 21 inactive.

We meet on the third Wednesday evening of each month; during the summer at the fire station, in the winter at the Bow Mills Methodist Church. The officers are: President, Mrs. Beatrice Geer; vice-president, Mrs. Edna Kilmister; Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. Barbara Howe.

During the year, we gave to the Fire Department \$150.00 toward the purchase of a short wave radio, and also, paid \$17.50 for one-half the cost of the installation of a donated gas stove. Under the leadership of Mrs. Margaret Day, we have made \$317.40 on blanket clubs. We also served the Merrimack County Fire Wardens' supper in October.

The Emergency Lunch Shelf Committee under the chairmanship of Mrs. Muriel Howard, served lunch to the men at the fire station after the Haggett fire. During the Mt. Sunapee forest fire, Mrs. Muriel Howard, Mrs. Laura Sargent, and Mrs. Kay Houle, served early in the morning at the fire station, doughnuts and coffee to all the fire fighters. For our own needs we are going to purchase dishes and silver to go with our new coffee urn.

With the beginning of a new year we expect to continue our assistance, for that is our aim: to help in all ways our fire department.. Every woman in Bow is cordially invited to help us.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School District of Bow :

I hereby submit my annual report as Superintendent of the Schools of Bow.

Rather than to concern the greater portion of this report with reviewing the present school year, I should like to consider with you the major problem facing the school board, the problem of pupil housing.

As shown by the statistical table found elsewhere in this report, the Mills School has an enrollment of 131 pupils, of which number 38 are in the primary room — Grades I and II. (Since submitting the statistical table to the printers, the number has increased to 42). Our preschool census indicates approximately 30 youngsters to enter Grade I next fall. Not only will it be necessary to set up the entering Grade I as a separate unit, but our present primary group should be divided if the teachers are to secure maximum results in their teaching. We cannot expect any teacher to do her best work with 42 pupils in a two-grade per room arrangement, particularly on the primary level. The teachers are further handicapped by the size of certain classrooms, two of which should have a 30-pupil maximum.

Furthermore, as you are aware, one group of children is housed in the basement. This arrangement was necessitated by the fact that it was extremely doubtful considering the scarcity of teachers if teachers could be secured for the Center and Bog schools for many years to come. The Board and myself felt that, although such an arrangement was far from desirable, such a solution was the wise course to follow.

The above facts lead to one conclusion, — we must have increased facilities by next fall. The School Board has already engaged an architect to prepare preliminary plans

and specifications and these have been shown to several groups of citizens. The plans call for the addition of three classrooms to the east end of the present building, and a small activity room on the opposite end.

Although our primary need is classroom space, your committee feels that the activity room should also be considered as an integral part of the school plant. Not only would such a room provide for school assemblies, but also for such activities as noon lunch, physical education, and music. Furthermore, it was the opinion of the committee that the town of Bow was in need of such a building for community purposes. The auditorium proposed would serve not only the needs of the school, but could serve the community as well. Whether or not such an addition is constructed at this time or at some future time, I feel that it should be definitely a part of our planning. We estimate an enrollment of between 180 and 200 pupils within the next ten years, and the type of program offered to a group of that size demands such an activity space.

The budget of the school board contained in this report provides for an additional teacher another year, as well as for increased costs of operation. The budget, however, does not provide for payment of obligations incurred by the additions proposed.

I feel that townspeople as well as the School Board are faced with an important and serious problem in providing for the needs of the children of Bow. Only through the continued cooperation of all concerned can we hope to provide the facilities for an adequate program for the schools of Bow.

In conclusion I should like to mention two programs introduced into our curriculum during the current school year. Mrs. Helen Hayden engaged to develop a music program in all grades, and the Rinehart System of handwriting, which has met with satisfactory results in other New Hampshire schools, was also incorporated into the

work of all eight grades. Both programs have met with very satisfactory results and have filled a vital need in our school.
