TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Brookline, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Daniels Academy Building in said Town of Brookline on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March next at twelve-thirty of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and all other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative thereto.

4. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.

5. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks when assessing, instead of mailing.

7. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Cemeteries.

8. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw the funds from the "Capital Reserve Fund for Fire Fighting Equipment," and further vote to authorize the board of Fire Engineers to expend said funds for the purchase of a new fire truck.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to be added to the funds of the "Capital Reserve Fund for Fire Fighting Equipment," and further vote to authorize the board of Fire Engineers to expend these joint funds for the purchase of a new fire truck.

10. If article nine is not adopted, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the "Capital Reserve Fund for Fire Fighting Equipment."

11. To see if the Town will vote to allow any discount on property taxes.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40.00 for a swimming instructor.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for the purchase of base radio equipment for the Fire Department and to convert present equipment to comply with F.C.C. regulations. The new equipment to be procured under Civil Defense Matching Funds Act.

15. To see if the Town will vote to charge a penalty of twenty cents on each poll tax unpaid after September first.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

17. To see if the Town will vote to pay members of the Fire Department \$1.50 per hour, and if so to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for same.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for Memorial Day.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$432.48 to secure State Aid for permanent improvement to Highways.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Civil Defense.

21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to contract for janitor service at Daniels Academy Building.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20.00 for spraying trees on Town Property, and to authorize the Selectmen to contract for spraying of trees on private property where the owner contributes 100% of cost.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for cutting and removing trees.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Blister Rust Control.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to be added to the fund now available for painting the Daniels Academy Building.

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for building hot top apron on the South side of Daniels Academy Building.

27. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Code as follows: All building lots shall have a minimum size of (40,000) square feet with a minimum frontage of (100) feet.

28. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Code and Trailer Laws to limit the number of Trailer permits to a maximum of twenty-five (25).

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for new fire equipment.

30. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a study committee on Town Officers Salaries, or take any action relative thereto.

31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following legacies:

1. The sum of \$200.00 from Stella Dunbar, the income from same to be used for the perpetual care of the John Wright lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

2. The sum of \$100.00 from the Herbert Elwin Estate, the income from same to be used for the perpetual care of the Samuel Fuller lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

3. The sum of \$200.00 from the Grace Gould Estate, the income from same to be used for the perpetual care of the Llewellyn Powers-Perley Gould lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

4. The sum of \$200.00 from the Edward Watson Estate, the income from same to be used for the perpetual care of the Edward Watson-Mary Putnam lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.

32. To see if the Town will vote to send a letter of thanks and appreciation to the Harold Hobart Estate for their generous gift of the well at the Pine Grove Cemetery.

33. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

PREVENTING FOREST FIRES IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2,200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
4. Have something to keep the fire under control — pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to install in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

In 1962 we had 5 fires. We burned 6 acres. Permits issued, 55.

I wish to extend my sincere thanks to the Board of Selectmen for the excellent co-operation that they have given me and my department during the past year.

I would like to thank Mrs. Anita Taylor for the many hours spent at the police radio and telephone, and express my gratitude to the members of my department for their support, their fine work and the many unpaid hours of their services donated.

I would also like to express my thanks to the N. H. State Police, Motor Vehicle Department and to the Police Departments and Radio Operators of the surrounding towns for their excellent co-operation.

In 1962 there were 26 reportable motor vehicle accidents, as a result of these accidents there was considerable property damage and 16 persons injured.

I am happy and thankful to say however that again this year there were no fatal accidents in Brookline.

1962 was a record year as far as activity, with this department answering over 350 complaints, consisting of dog complaints, motor vehicle complaints, domestic complaints, etc.

As for motor vehicle activity over 500 vehicles were checked by the Police Department for violations, faulty equipment, checkups and warnings.

109 Summons to Court were issued for motor vehicle violations this year.

Property loss was lower this year due to larceny and breaking and entering even though the occurrence was greater than the previous year.

This year the Brookline Police Department in co-operation with the F.B.I. sponsored a regional police training school in Brookline, this I am proud to say was the largest attended police school ever held in

this area, with over 16 towns and cities sending over 100 officers to this school. And acclaimed by those attending as the best school that they had ever attended.

This year the School Safety Patrol was very active and through the efforts of the Police Department and P.T.A. all patrol members had a trip to Boston, Mass. and visited our State government in Concord, N. H.

Last but not least I would like to express my thanks to our local newspaper for its support of this department and to the Citizens of the Town of Brookline for their splendid support and co-operation that they have given to me and my department during the past year.

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Brookline qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 7th day of March 1963, at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of

school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire, or from any other source.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to be paid into a Capital Reserve fund for construction and equipment of additional classrooms to the elementary school.

11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$675.00 to provide the services of an art teacher to the pupils in grades 1-6.

12. To see if the district will vote to combine the school district election with the town election in accordance with Chapter 197 R.S.A., Section 197:1-a-197: 1-d, which permits the district election to be held on the same day and at the same time as the town election.

13. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS ADMINISTRATION

Superintendent

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I submit my second annual report as your Superintendent of Schools. As last year, this report will focus on two main areas: (1.) a progress report wherein work accomplished during the past year will be pointed out, and (2.) a discussion of areas which require positive action if your schools are to provide a quality education for the boys and girls of your community.

I. Progress Report

A. Policies and Regulations

Last year I stated, "We must develop sound, written policies and regulations to govern the work of each staff member and the education of each pupil." All school board members and school principals in this Union have been working on a policy handbook which should be ready for general distribution within a year. Citizens in each school district are encouraged to read the policy handbook when it is available, and discuss its content with members of their school board, school principals, or the Superintendent. The policies which govern your schools must be adaptable to our changing times, not static.

B. Financial Accounting

The state project to develop new financial accounting methods is now complete. The breakdown presented last year with few exceptions, has been adopted state-wide by the State Tax Commission and State Board of Education.

C. Curriculum Evaluation and Development.

Work in this area on a Union basis, is focused on mathematics and science during the current year. The National Science Foundation and numerous other national and university study groups have developed modern programs in chemistry, physics, biology, and each

mathematics area from grades 1-12. Up-to-date programs in chemistry and physics will be introduced during the 1963-64 school year, as will modern mathematics in certain grades.

The teachers are to be highly commended for their efforts to continuously improve the curriculum in each subject area, whether it is English, shop, reading, or any other subject.

D. Harvard-Lexington Project

The schools in this Union are fortunate in that we are one of twenty-nine school systems across the nation to participate in the Harvard-Lexington program. Through our participation, each summer three staff members attend summer school at Harvard-Lexington, taking courses to improve their work in the classroom. A major part of the summer school experience involves teaching pupils, grades 1-9, on a teach teaching basis. The Spaulding-Potter Trust is backing our participation through a \$3,000.00 three year grant. One immediate result of the project is the introduction of cooperative teaching and improving grouping in certain elementary school grades.

E. School Evaluation Project.

The project which is taking a great deal of every staff member's time this year is a complete school evaluation. The high schools are evaluated periodically by the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools (NEACSS). Milford Senior High will be so evaluated May 1-3 of this year, and Hollis High within the next few years.

The elementary school teachers are using the Boston University Evaluative Criteria as a basis for their study. Milford Junior High is using the NEACSS guide, and will be evaluated May 8-10 by a team organized by the State Department of Education.

The teachers are to be highly commended by each citizen for their work on the Evaluative Criteria, for it has required a tremendous amount of extra work. The entire project is focused on improving the schools for your children. The result will be a written master plan for school development.

II. Areas for Action

A. The Report of the Interim Commission on Education

I strongly commend to your attention the Report of the Interim Commission on Education. As you know, that Commission of New Hampshire citizens was established by the 1961 Legislature to study problems of education in this state and to recommend solutions. One of the major recommendations in the Report which has direct bearing on our schools is that New Hampshire should eventually have thirty-four school districts. The Report recommends immediate reduction from 48 to 34 supervisory unions. Milford is to be the hub of one which will include much of the present Wilton union together with our present Union 40, the exception being that Hollis is to be part of a larger Nashua Union.

The immediate significance of the master plan and supervisory union change is that the citizens who prepared the report favor the formation of cooperative school districts within the 34 areas. To the citizens in this region, it means that the work currently underway by citizens and/or school boards in Amherst, Milford, Mont Vernon, Wilton, and Lyndeboro, to study the formation of a cooperative school district, is within the state master plan.

I urge each of you to carefully review the results of this area study.

B. Staff

In last year's report I stated, "We must keep our excellent staff members and recruit others as needed. This can be accomplished through adequate salaries, sound personnel policies, and evidence that the citizens, through their School Board and school administration, are supporting a quality education program."

It is very important that adequate salaries be provided. The school districts in Union 40 will be in serious trouble if many of our excellent teachers are attracted by higher salaries in the neighboring school unions of Hudson, Goffstown, Wilton, and Nashua. The legal Massachusetts minimum teacher salary of \$4500 also has a direct bearing on our ability to attract—and hold—high quality teachers.

There must be a continuous effort by each citizen to do all in his power to support a realistic salary plan that will result in good schools for your boys and girls.

C. Other

I commend to your attention the reports presented by school officials in other sections of this report. The School Board members deserve a special word of thanks from every pupil, citizen, and staff member for the tremendous amount of work they do to promote better schools.

REPORT OF THE TEACHER CONSULTANT

Education in a Changing Society

It has been predicted that 70% of what we will be using in 1980 has not yet been invented; longevity will increase to nearly 100, air travel will be at the rate of thousands of miles per hour, and that even the most remote and primitive nations of today will be using atomic power for energy. This is but an indication of what we may expect the world of the future to be.

Unquestionably these changes present challenges to education that were unheard of a few years ago. We are constantly reminded of the expression "the challenge of change". In an attempt to meet the challenge all phases and levels of education are in a state of great ferment. Methods are being sought which will provide greater effectiveness in educating our youth to cope intelligently with the problems of tomorrow. From among these many experiments, plans and programs, there are emerging very definite trends that seem to be practical solutions to many of the problems faced by education today.

Trends in Education

One major cause for concern in education is the waste of the greatest resource of any nation, its brainpower. Too many pupils, for one reason or another, do not attain the achievements commensurate with their abilities. Another waste may be found among those who drop out early, or who are not using their talents. This waste seems to be the natural result of "mass production" methods of education. The trend now is to consider each pupil as an individual, understand his abilities and needs, and to provide a program which will allow no gap between ability and achievement. Three of the ways this is being done in Supervisory Union #40 are: through grouping; the development of programs of continuous progress; and through individualized instruction.

1. Grouping

Groupings are according to pupil achievement and flexible in order to allow the child to move from one group to another as his achievement warrants. His level of work is that which he can do successfully and at the same time be challenged .

2. Continuous Progress

His progress is continuous based upon the pace that is natural for him. A program of continuous progress provides acceleration, enrichment, and special instruction.

3. Individualized Instruction

Individualized instruction may be found in several subject areas, although it is most extensively conducted in reading. Here the child proceeds at his own pace, working independently, correcting his own mistakes, and learning whatever basic reading skills are found to be necessary as he moves along from one level to the next. These basic reading skills are taught to him both individually and as a member of a group requiring the same instruction.

Another form of individualized instruction is through programmed learning and the use of teaching machines. A programmed lesson is one scientifically developed in such a manner that the pupil may cover certain material independently. The machine enhances the programmed instruction. Although we do not have teaching machines, some of our reading instruction is of the program type. Although a teaching machine will never replace the teacher it merits careful consideration in that it provides acceleration and enrichment for many pupils and frees the teacher to give special help to others.

Making More Effective Use of Teacher Time and Talent

Another educational trend is toward making more effective use of teacher time and talent. Three ways we are attempting to do this is through team, or cooperative teaching, the use of teacher aides, and through educational television.

1. Team or Cooperative Teaching

Since no teacher has the same aptitude for teaching all subjects it seems reasonable that the teacher who has a special talent in a certain

subject should share it with as many pupils as possible and be the one to teach it. Likewise the subject in which a teacher feels limited should be given to another to teach. This is becoming regular procedure, and the basis for much of our cooperative teaching. Then again, some subjects in which two or more teachers show the same interest are taught cooperatively, each teacher contributing to the other teachers, and to all the children, her special techniques, background and enrichment. We find the latter to be the most rewarding experience to be obtained from cooperative teaching.

2. Teacher Aide

The objectives of the teacher aid plan are: (1) to improve the quality of the educational program, (2) to raise the professional status of the teacher by freeing her to teach, and (3) to provide opportunities for the superior teacher to spread greater influence to more pupils. This plan has been in effect in three districts in this union, has proven practical and effective, and has met these objectives.

3. Educational Television

We are making successful use of educational television in all of our elementary schools. The lessons are prepared and taught by master teachers who have had the advantage of unlimited preparation time, and materials unavailable to our own teachers. A weekly lesson in any subject often sets the stage for the daily classroom lessons preceding or following it.

Curriculum Study

The curriculum itself is undergoing close scrutiny in an effort to determine the relative emphasis to be placed on mathematics, science, foreign languages and the social studies. Methods of instruction are aimed at that of problem solving and the development of critical thinking rather than the accumulation of dates and facts. Our teachers have been involved with curriculum study and a general evaluation of the entire school system.

The problems involved in attempting to close the gaps between rapid technological progress, social change and educational needs are difficult and at times, overwhelming. We have been told that our survival as a nation may depend upon closing these gaps and without doubt we are faced with the challenge of change. Our teachers are aware of this and are dedicated to the task of providing their pupils with the very best education available.

We who administer, supervise, and provide the setting and materials for education are only assisting the key figures in this vital process of education, the teachers. To our teachers and to all who have helped them directly or indirectly through me I would like to express my sincere thanks and appreciation.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

The Brookline school system is currently undergoing an evaluation in order to insure its status as a school with an up-to-date and improving curriculum. Although a small school with the limitations inherent in a school of its size we feel it has a program and an environment to make it the envy of many larger systems. Our standardized test results thus far have been favorable and encouraging in the light of local and national norms. Working in close conjunction with the staff of our sister schools in the union we have made ourselves available to the best ideas and innovations that have been introduced locally. Although we feel our program is both stimulating and broad it is far from perfect and must undergo constant study and examination to keep abreast of the times and meet the challenge of the future.

It is for this reason that the teachers and curriculum of the Brookline school are being evaluated. The teachers in close cooperation with Miss Connolly, take time out to scrutinize themselves and their methods. This is not meant in any way as an official check on the teacher but rather to help the teachers themselves to determine where they have been most lacking and also in what areas they have done a most outstanding job.

The teachers are also engaged, in connection with Dr. James F. Baker of Boston University, in a program of School Evaluation. This is a program designed by Dr. Baker and a group of graduate students from the Boston University School of Education, to aid the staff of a given elementary school investigate its curriculum in order to determine its position and needs in comparison to national standards. The program to date has been both enlightening and helpful. Although it is expected to take somewhat longer than a school year to finish it is hoped by the next report that we might have some concrete conclusions and recommendations.

We have broadened our ungraded system somewhat, to permit the free interchange of students through the fourth grade. Children in all four rooms of the new school are now permitted to transgress the old grade barrier in order to read at that level that is most suitable for them.

Most of you by this time I am sure, have noticed the new playground equipment to the rear of the school. We have three swings, three tether balls and a merry-go-round in operation. The field to the rear of the school, not visible from the road, has been graded and seeded to provide what should be an excellent softball and soccer field for the older children. The effect of the equipment on the children has been all that it was hoped it would be. They now have a constructive outlet for their energy during recess and are more relaxed and happy for it.

Although we feel our program is broad enough to cover the wide range of ability from slow to exceptional student, there are still serious gaps in our present program. Within our total enrollment there are an unusually high number of children with serious speech defects. In order to allow these children at least the opportunity to communicate properly with their peers both now and when they leave school access to therapy is necessary. Some of the schools in the union have contracted for the services of a speech therapist for a short period each week. This is in line with what we of the Brookline district should do to help these children combat this serious defect.

Like all other public schools we also have a certain small percentage of exceptionally slow children. Although few in number these are children whose ability to progress in the normal classroom is poor or totally absent. Larger schools in the country, due mainly to their size, are able to provide a special class for slow learners. This is usually a class of a dozen or fifteen students that is especially taught and equipped to help them learn certain basic skills and to provide for themselves in a normal environment. Although it would not be practical to support such a class in Brookline alone I do feel we should share such a class with an adjoining town. The value of this type of class to the children involved is immeasurable.

Our status in good. Our progress has been sufficient to provide an up-to-date and modern facility for our children. Our needs are few but we feel they are practical and worthy of your consideration. The 1962-63 school has been a step forward. I am grateful to have been a part of it, and I would like to offer my appreciation to the School Board, Dr. Goodman, Miss Connolly, and the teachers for their part in the current school year.

ANNUAL SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

The School Board in the past year has been primarily concerned with keeping school costs within the means of taxpayers.

This year's budget represents an increase over last year's. The major increases are in tuition and teachers' salaries. Also listed are warrant articles asking for additional appropriations. These are listed below in the order of their cost to the District.

I. Tuition:

To Nashua (also special tuition students). This represents an increase of \$7,067.00 over last year.

II. Salaries for Instruction:

This represents an increase of about \$1,600.00 which seems like a great deal in any one year. However, our teachers were asked to go without recommended increases last year in order to keep expenses in line with the adopted budget. In order to keep our better teachers, we must increase salary schedules which neighboring towns are already paying.

III. Transportation:

The School Board actively sought bids for transportation and was able to save \$1,750.00 on the contract to transport children to and from Nashua. The Board intends to continue the practice of asking bids from qualified transport companies.

IV. Capital Reserve:

The School Board unanimously recommends that the District appropriate \$2,500.00 towards a Capital Reserve Fund, to be set aside for future building needs.

V. Lighting at Elementary School:

The School Board has had to contract approximately \$1,100.00 out of its Building Fund balance to install additional lights in the new Elementary School.

VI. Art Teacher:

The Superintendent has recommended that we take advantage of the part-time services of an art teacher, who already teaches in the other Districts in the Union. The School Board has taken no action on this question, which appears as Article 11 in the District Warrant.

VII. Old Primary Building:

Bids for sale of the old Primary building produced no results in the past year. The School Board and Selectmen will attempt to dispose of this property this year.

SYNOPSIS OF SCHOOL MEETING

March 8, 1962

The annual school meeting was called to order by Alton Jensen and business proceeded according to the warrant.

Article 1: Alton Jensen was elected and sworn into office of Moderator for the coming year.

Article 2: Katherine Hill was elected and sworn into office of Clerk for ensuing year.

Article 3: Nominations for member of the School Board for three years and voting by ballot was the next order of business: 217 votes cast: Terence Denchy 28, Martha Hurley 20, Marguerite Porter 113, Helen Ryan 44, and Brian Sherman 12.

Article 4: Louise Corey was elected treasurer for one year.

Article 5: Voted to pass the article to consider it under Art. 8.

Article 6: Voted that the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen be accepted as printed in the town report.

Article 7: Voted that town auditors shall act as school auditors, also the chief of police shall act as truant officer.

Article 8: Voted to postpone this article until after Article 20.

Article 9: Voted to authorize the school board to apply for and accept any money or grants for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire, or from any other source.

Article 10: Vetoed—192 votes cast: 122 no, 70 yes.

Article 11: Passed.

Article 12: Passed.

Article 13: Voted to spend \$2,500.00 from the Building Fund to reduce the first principal payment on the new school.

Article 14: Passed.

Article 15: Voted to raise and appropriate \$100 for expenses of School Board.

Article 16: Voted to have the school district elect its officers by official ballot and adopt the non-partisan system.

Article 17: Adopted with the amendment to add the plan and map by Clarence Farwell showing land boundaries between new elementary school and property of Eugene J. Wood, Jr.

Article 18: Voted to continue to send tuition students to Nashua.

Article 19: Voted to sell old primary school on Milford Road, the School Board to confer with selectmen regarding legality.

Article 20: No other business.

Article 8: School budget was discussed item by item. Five teachers given an increase of \$100.00 and transportation was cut \$1,000.00 due to bids. Terence Denehy moved that a total budget of \$91,802.94 be accepted. It was seconded and so voted.

Meeting adjourned at 1:00 A. M.
