# TOWN OF CHARLESTOWN, NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Charlestown, in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Charlestown Elementary School Gymnasium in said Charlestown on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at 10:00 in the forenoon until the beginning of the business session at 7:00 P.M. to act upon the following subjects:

### Article 1:

To choose the necessary Town Officers for their respective terms.

### Article 2:

"Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the existing town zoning ordinance to create Town Center Districts, Residential Districts, Industrial Districts, Business Districts, Rural Residential Districts, and Conservation Overlay Districts as proposed by the Planning Board."

By Ballot.

### Article 3:

"Are you in favor of semi=annual billing of the property taxes." By Ballot.

### Article 4:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for and accept and expend, on behalf of the Town, any and all grants, or other funds for municipal purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any other source.

#### Article 5:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at public sale real estate acquired by Tax Collector's Deed, after notice of the Selectmen's intent to sell said property be posted one (1) month in advance and published in two (2) local daily newspapers.

#### Article 6:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

#### Article 7:

To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

#### Article 8:

To consider the budget. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the maintenance of the poor, laying out and repairing highways, building and repairing bridges, street lighting and the necessary charges arising within the Town.

### Article 9:

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate up to the sum of \$50,000.00 to be used by the Highway Department for work on the Acworth Road. The work would consist of blasting and rebuilding the lower section of the road.

### Article 10:

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate up to the sum of \$45,000.00 for a new Highway Truck.

### Article 11:

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate up to the sum of \$50,000.00 to purchase a new ambulance and associated equipment. By Petition. Not approved by the Finance Committee.

### Article 12:

To see what action the voters of Charlestown will inact to protect and avoid conflict of interest by members of all boards and committees. That no members be allowed to partake in any bidding of public work projects, without a majority vote of the town, to assure all interested parties and firms will have a fair and equal chance of a fair bidding process. If this or any added wording passes by vote, it becomes effective at end of vote.

### Article 13:

To see what action the Town will take with regard to the Fall Mountain Regional School District Withdrawal Study Committee's decision to maintain the status quo, which does not allow the voters of the district to vote on a withdrawal plan. Supported by Finance Committee.

### Article 14:

To see if the Town will go on record as supporting Senate Bill 14 FN. This bill changes the method of apportioning the costs of cooperative school districts to one based entirely on equalized valuation.

By Petition. Supported by Finance Committee.

### Article 15:

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 9,728.00 for reprintinting 1000 copies of the "Second History of Charlestown".

Approved by Finance Committee.

### Article 16:

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,914.00 for dues to the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council.

Approved by Finance Committee.

### Article 17:

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,000.00 for the Fall Mountain Branch of Home Health Care and Community Services. By Request. Approved by Finance Committee.

### Article 18:

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the Sullivan County Hospice, Inc.

By Request.

Approved by Finance Committee.

### Article 19:

Are you in favor of authorizing the Planning Board to prepare a Capital Improvement Plan per the provisions of RSA 674:5 and presenting the results of such a plan to the voters at the 1988 Town Meeting.

Request of Planning Board.

### Article 20:

To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for Community Youth Advocates, Inc. in order to assure continued services and counseling for the young people of this community.

By Request. Approved by Finance Committee.

### Article 21:

To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Town's representatives to the General Court to take all necessary measures to insure that no low level radio-active waste from the Seabrook nuclear plant shall be stored or disposed of within this Town of Charlestown unless and until the proposed site of the proposed storage or disposal has been approved by the voters of the town at the annual Town Meeting by written ballot.

### Article 22:

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriation for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

# TOWN MEETING CHARLESTOWN, NEW HAMPSHIRE March 11, 1986

To the inhabitants of the Town of Charlestown, in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Charlestown Elementary School Gymnasium in said Charlestown on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at 10:00 in the forenoon until the beginning of the business session at 7:00 p.m. to act upon the following subjects:

The Meeting was called to order at exactly 10:00 a.m. by the Assistant Moderator, Patricia J. Royce, followed by the reading of the Warrant in full, followed by the reading of two Protest Petitions re: Article 3 and Article 4. At the completion of the reading, she announced that the Absentee Ballots would be cast at 4:00 p.m. The Polls were declared open at 10:15 a.m. for Balloting on Articles 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6; and the ballot for the School Moderator for one year, and Member of the School Board for three years for the Fall Mountain Regional School District.

Charles L. Child, Moderator, cast the Absentee Ballots, starting at 4:00 p.m. and ending at 4:04 p.m.

The Moderator closed the polls at 7:00 p.m. and then announced that the meeting would come to order. This was followed by his announcement of the procedure to be followed during the Meeting. (Refer to record of March 12,1985, as the procedure is the same).

A further suggestion was made by the Moderator that each speaker speak clearly, concisely, and try to keep their speaking to a minimum, although there would be no time set.

Article 2 "Are you in favor of the amendments to the Charlestown Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board for the purpose of clarifying the use of Fort No. 4 zone, adding the permitted use of municipal water structures to all zones, clarifying existing uses, establishing a standard for all signs to be erected in Charlestown and stipulating removal of uninhabitable manufactured housing all as presented at public hearings held in January and February 1986? No zones have been added or changed in this article."

By ballot.

Yes 343 No 180 Passed.

Article 3 "Are you in favor of expanding existing Zone A on the west side of Main Street from Dell Street on the south to Clay Brook on the north and bounded on the east by Main Street and existing Zone B and on the west by the Connecticut River?"

By ballot.

Yes 126 No 382 Defeated.

Article 4 "Are you in favor of designating as Zone G a residential area in North Charlestown extending from the Claremont line on the north to Ox Brook on the south and bounded on the west by the Connecticut River and on the east by a line running parallel to and thirteen hundred feet east of Route 12A?"

By ballot.

Yes 121 No 391 Defeated.

Article 5 "Are you in favor of modifying the Charlestown Building Code to stipulate in accordance with RSA 47-22a that all mobile homes (manufactured housing placed, or installed within the Town after January 1, 1987, shall comply with Federal Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Standards of December 18, 1975: This means all existing mobile homes when replaced and any additional mobile homes placed must comply with health, fire and safety standards adopted by the Mobile Home Manufacturer's Association and HUD in 1976."

By ballot.

Yes 421 No 113 Passed.

Article 6 "Shall we adopt the provision of RSA 72:37 for the exemption for the blind from property tax? This statute provides that every inhabitant who is legally blind shall be exempt each year from the property tax on a residence to the value of \$15,000.00."

By ballot.

Yes 343 No 183 Passed.

Article 7 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for and to accept and expend, on behalf of the Town, and all grants, or other funds for municipal purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any other source.

Motion presented. Motion made and seconded to accept Article 7 as read. Passed by a voice vote.

Article 8 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at public sale real estate acquired by Tax Collector's Deed, after notice of the Selectmen's intent to sell said property be posted one (1) month in advance and published in two (2) local daily newspapers.

Motion presented. Motion made and seconded to accept Article 8 as read. Passed by a voice vote.

Article 9 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town, such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Motion presented. Motion made and seconded to accept Article 9 as read. Passed by a voice vote.

Article 10 To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Motion presented. The motion was made to amend the article to read as follows:

"I move that the reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers chosen be accepted as printed in the Town Report."

Article 10 as amended was passed by a voice vote.

At this time, John Starr, Selectman, spoke of the dedication of James Hearne to the Town Hall restoration and preservation. The annual town report was dedicated to James Hearne.

Cedric Fisk, Selectman, gave recognition to Robert Colburne, retiring Chief of Police.

John Putnam, Selectman, gave recognition to Florence Bingham, who is retiring as Librarian after thirty years of service to the Town of Charlestown, and is also retiring as Supervisor of the Check List after many years of service. There was a standing ovation.

Barbara Jones displayed a painting by George Washington Mark of the old blockhouse which used to stand near Lower Landing Road in Charlestown. Mrs. Jones was instrumental in tracking down and returning the painting to Charlestown. The Charlestown Women's Club purchased the painting, and at this time, Polly Frizzell, President of the Charlestown Women's Club, presented the painting to the Town.

Article 11 To consider the budget. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the maintenance of the poor, laying out and repairing highways, building and repairing bridges, street lighting and necessary charges arising within the Town.

The motion was made and seconded to accept the budget as presented in the amount of \$1,303,118.00.

George Grabe made the following motion:

"I move to amend the budget for legal expenses - to add \$5000.00 making a total of \$12,000 for the existing town legal expenses; the additional sum to be used for the purpose of taking the Fall Mountain Regional School District to court in order to obtain reapportionment of the school district school board to conform to the Supreme Court 'one man/one vote' decision."

Motion seconded. Amendment passed by a voice vote.

Article 11, as amended was passed by a voice vote.

Total budget - \$1,308,118.00

Article 12 To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 to be used by the Highway Department on the Town roads, \$40,000.00 is designated to finish the Acworth Road, except oiling, and the balance to be used in the Beaudry Development off Old Claremont Road.

Motion made by Oscar Makinen to amend Article 12 to read as follows:

"I move the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$75,000 to be used by the Highway Department on the Town Roads. \$40,000 is designated to finish the Acworth Road, \$10,000 for the Beaudry Development and the balance to be spent at the discretion of the Selectmen and the Highway Advisory Board."

Motion seconded. Voice vote was indefinite, so a show of hands was requested. Amendment passed.

Article 12 as amended was passed by a voice vote. (\$75,000.00)

Article 13 To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,962.00 for dues to the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council.

Motion presented. Motion made and seconded to accept Article 13 as read. Passed by a voice vote.

Article 14 To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$26,020.00 for the Fall Mountain Branch of Home Health Care and Community Services.

Motion presented. Motion made and seconded to accept Article 14 as read. Passed by a voice vote.

Article 15 To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the Sullivan County Hospice, Inc.

Motion presented. Motion made and seconded to accept Article 15 as read. Passed by a voice vote.

Article 16 To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for Community Youth Advocates, Inc. in order to assure continued services and counseling for the young people of this community.

Motion presented. Motion made and seconded to accept Article 16 as read. Passed by a voice vote.

Article 17 To see if the Town wished to direct the Planning Board to prepare a comprehensive zoning proposal to be voted on at the March 1987 Town Meeting to designate additional areas as commercial and industrial zones, residential zones, historic preservation zones, or modify existing zones and raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to be paid to the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council for technical and graphic assistance and printing such a proposal.

Motion presented. Motion made and seconded to accept Article 17 as read. Passed by a voice vote.

Article 18 To see what action the Town will take to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be deposited in a Conservation Fund for the Conservation Commission to acquire land for future town use. Money authorized under the provision of RSA Chapter 36A.

Motion presented. Motion made and seconded to accept Article 18 as read. Voice vote taken - not passed. This was challenged and a vote by show of hands was taken. Article 18 was defeated.

Article 19 To see what action the Town will take to dedicate the upper hall in the Town Hall to the memory of Jim Hearne. Hall to be named:

JAMES HEARNE MEMORIAL AUDITORIUM.

Motion presented. Motion made and seconded to accept Article 19 as read. Passed by a voice vote.

Article 20 To see if the Town will vote to oppose the burial, storage, transportation and production of high level radioactive waste in the Town of Charlestown and State of New Hampshire; and to call upon Congress to conduct an independent investigation with full public participation in the feasibility and prudence of the US Department of Energy's (DOE's) present plan to dispose of radioactive waste and into the DOE's competence to carry out such a plan.

Motion presented. Motion made and seconded to accept Article 20 as read. Passed by a voice vote.

Article 21 To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriation for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon: Appropriation

No further business was brought before this Meeting, and the motion was made and seconded to adjourn, and it was so voted. The business meeting was declared closed at 9:23 p.m. by Charles L. Child, Moderator.

We began 1986 by asking organizations in town to contribute funds to help build our large print book collection. The Rotary Club, Lions Club, Garden Club, Women's Club and the Hemlock Hi-Toppers 4-H Club contributed funds or books for the collection. The donated books and the books purchased with donated funds added eighty-three books to be used by patrons with vision problems.

We offered Saturday morning story hours during the month of February. The children participating enjoyed stories, songs, and filmstrips. During the month of February we also were visited by Lynda Child's fourth grade on several afternoons. We displayed the biographies of some of our senior citizens which these youngsters had written. They were enjoyed by young and old alike.

During the winter months I visited the primary school to read stories and show library books to the children. They returned my visits in the spring by coming to the library. They learned how to use the library and the importance of handling library books with care.

During the winter months the Friends of the Library provided us with a short story discussion series. This was made available through the New Hampshire Council for the Arts and Humanities. Prof. Don Melander from New England College in Henniker, N. H. led the discussion for the three grograms.

The 1986 summer reading program was titled "Be a Comet and Blaze Trails", in honor of the year of Haley's comet. The bulletin board sported a large comet and every child reading twelve books put a colored streamer into the tail. By the end of the program the tail covered the bulletin board and spilled over onto the walls. We had eighty-four children sign up to participate and seventy-one read at least one book. A total of 1,116 books were read by the children participating in the program.

The Friends of the Library treated the children to a party at the end of the summer reading program and as a special treat they arranged for a performance by Michael Zerphy. This performance was open to the public and was attended by eighty children and adults who thoroughly enjoyed Mr. Zerphy's performance of mime and clowning.

This year we held two book sales. The funds raised were used to purchase books for the children's collection.

The Friends of the Library made and raffled a quilt. The quilt was won by Kathy Rogers of Charlestown and the funds raised were donated to the Library to add some new young adult books to our collection. We have thirty-eight new young adult titles for our teen readers.

This November we began, on a trial basis, providing library books to the Primary School for the children to borrow and enjoy. We registered 133 children to borrow books from the school and are averaging eighty books borrowed a week. Eighty percent of the children are first time borrowers and we are happy to see they are also coming to the Library to borrow books. It has been a great success and we look forward to continuing this service.

1986 has been a busy year and we end it by looking forward to 1987. We are already planning programs, looking at services we can add, and adding to and improving our collection to better serve you.

#### AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen:

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements of the Town of Charlestown, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1985, as listed in the accompanying table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Charlestown at December 31, 1985 and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund and account group financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents, including the supplemental Schedule of Federal Assistance, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Charlestown, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined, combining fund and account group financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

#### AUDITOR'S REPORT ON COMPLIANCE

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN:

We have examined the combined, combining and account group financial statements of the Town of Charlestown, New Hampshire, as of and for the year ended December 31, 1985, and have issued our report theron, dated April 22, 1986. We have also examined the Town's Schedule of Federal Assistance for the year ended December 31, 1985, and our report theron is included elsewhere herein. Our examinations were made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards; the standards for financial and compliance audits contained in the U.S. General Accounting Officers' Standards For Audit of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions (1981 revision); the Provisions of The Office of Management and Budget's Compliance Supplement - For Single Audits of State and Local Governments, circular A-128 Audits of State and Local Governments and the Single Audit Act of 1984 (Public Law 98-502), and accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

In connection with the examination referred to above, a representative number of transactions from each major Federal assistance program was selected to determine if Federal funds are being expended in accordance with the terms of applicable agreements and those provisions of Federal law or regulations that could have a material effect on the financial statements or on each major Federal assistance program tested. The results of our tests indicate that for the items tested, the Town of Charlestown, New Hampshire complied with the material terms and conditions of the Federal Assistance agreements. Further, for the items not tested, based on our examination and the procedures referred to above, nothing came to our attention to indicate that the Town of Charlestown, New Hampshire had not complied with the significant compliance terms and conditions of the programs referred to above.

Small Cities Community Development Block Grant Program - Subsequent - Events (Water System Improvement Project)

In our review of the subsequent quarter's activities, we noted that \$51,748.00 was not requested for reimbursement and not reported on the Program Status Report for the quarter ending March 31, 1986. It is our understanding that this matter will be corrected as soon as possible.

This report is intended solely for the use of the Town of Charlestown, New Hampshire, the cognizant audit agency and other Federal audit agencies. This restriction is not intended to limit the distribution of this report, which upon acceptance by the Town of Charlestown, New Hampshire, is a matter of public record.

COMMITTEE MEMBERS

#### POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

1986 has been a year of change for the Charlestown Police Department. During the year, three new full-time Officers were hired to fill positions vacated due to retirement or resignation. I was appointed in April, Officer David Peltier was appointed in September and Officer Joseph Temple, Jr. was appointed in October.

1986 was also an extremely busy year. DWI arrests increased by 80% and arrests overall were up by 41%. Reports of burglaries, auto thefts, larcenies, assaults and criminal mischief increased by 31% in 1986. A large percentage of these thefts could have been prevented if the victims would have taken simple precautions such as locking their house up when absent or locking their car doors at night. It is not possible to prevent all crime, but please make it as difficult for the criminal as possible!

An area of deep concern to the Police Department is the percentage of these incidents which are alcohol related. Over 50% of all arrests and a large number of the calls for service handled such as domestic disturbances, assaults, and vandalism are alcohol related. Without a doubt, the #1 Drug Abuse problem in Charlestown is Alcohol.

The rash of unsolved Homicides in the area are also an area of deep concern for the Police Department. In response we are instituting a McGruff Safe House program for the school children and have increased patrols in school areas during opening and closing hours.

There are many services not listed in this report which are performed by the Police Department on a regular basis. These include business security checks, vacant and seasonal residence checks, medical assists, citizen transports and message deliveries. We also provide dispatching for the Charlestown Ambulance Service.

All the members of the Charlestown Police Department are to be commended for their hard work and dedication. As the statistics will show, there is a lot of work being done by this small group of people.

In closing I would like to thank everyone for the warm welcome I have received. Charlestown is a real nice town. Your Police Department will try to keep it that way for you.

Between July 1985 and June 1986, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The two leading causes of forest fires were again children and fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden. Both causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for

more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden.

If you own forest land, you became responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber tax law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

#### PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Other than the usual number of Site Plan Reviews and Subdivision changes, the Board spent a great deal of time working with the Upper Valley - Lake Sunapee Planning Council (UVLSC) in the preparation of a Comprehensive Zoning Plan for the Town. \$ 3,000.00 was appropriated by the Town at the March 1986 Town Meeting to prepare such a plan for consideration by the voters in 1987. The proposed Zoning Ordinance Amendment has been completed after eight hearings beginning in August 1986.

The first few meetings were devoted to the preparation of a Land Use Policy Statement which formed the basis for the Zoning Plan. The results of the survey taken in 1985 and published in last year's Town Report were used.

The zoning proposal must be aimed at enhancing the economic base of the Town while striving to protect the character of the area. To attract business or any kind of investment the Town needs to recognize its assets which are represented by its rural setting and many attractive and historical dwellings. One large industrial firm has expanded significantly and a new business recognizing the potential tourist attractions of the area has located in North Charlestown.

The emphasis in the zoning requirements is to attract quality investments and provide protection for those investments. An analysis of past growth in the Town shows that while low value housing and marginal business ventures have been encouraged, these practices are very punitive on the overall valuation of property, cause higher taxes and discourage investment in property that can improve the tax base.

Through careful and critical review of proposed non-residential construction, protective zoning and quality subdivisions, the Town can start building in some increased valuation without a large demand for utilities and additional schools. Charlestown is, by last count, second from the bottom out of 234 towns in the state in per capita valuation.

#### CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Charlestown Conservation Commission continued the efforts of the Town to protect open spaces for present and future generations. The protection of areas for wildlife habitat, natural history, natural beauty and recreation is essential if we are to maintain the elements which make ours a unique way of life in this era of mass development. In this effort the commission has dealt with three Dredge and Fill permit applications, two cases in violation of wetland procedure, maintained the Nature Trail, sponsored Green-Up day for cleaning the trash and bottles from our roads, mapped underground fuel storage tanks which can be a threat to our water supply, and participated in town forest management.

The Commission also maintains membership in other conservation organization such as the Connecticut River Watershed Council, N. H. Association of Conservation Commission and the Upper Valley Community Land Trust. The Land Trust is a recent and vital organization providing methods to maintain open lands through conservation restrictions and easements. It is available to advise groups or individuals through Vicki Smith in the Lebanon office (448-1680).

#### RECREATION COMMITTEE REPORT

1986 was another super year for recreation in Charlestown. Basketball, base-ball, softball, soccer, swimming, volleyball, and winter carnival are the activities that the recreation commission has been involved in.

Soccer has the most participation of any of the activities with 175 children in the 5-11 year old age group and 20 children in the 12-14 league. Baseball is the next largest draw to children recreation in Charlestown, with 75 children in the minor league, 60 children in Little League, 30 in Babe Ruth, and 18 in Senior Babe Ruth.

Swim Team grew to over 100 children with the largest increase under 10 years of age. The swim team should also be congratulated for the TSV championship again this year. Due to the poor weather conditions the average attendance to the pool dropped in 1986 to 77 per day. Swimming lessons were a success with 94 students throughout the summer. Our special thanks to Meg York, the pool manager, and Henry Lake who took care of the maintenance.

Our Basketball program consisted of 23 girls on one team, 26 boys on two teams, and 18 boys on the high school age group. There was also a 5 team men's league program.

Charlestown continued to have a volleyball program for recreational purposes, with two tournaments and one night a week of open volleyball.

This year a new program was started with co-ed softball tournament. We hope to make this a n annual event to take place around the first weekend in August. This had a success debut with 8 teams participating.

Aerobics was co-sponsored by the recreation committee and the Fall Mountain Adult Education program. Aerobics is still being held in Charlestown.

The 1986 Winter Carnival continued to grow, adding sleigh rides as well as broom hockey, sliding contests, snow sculptures, cross-country skiing, snowmobile rides, ice skating exhibition, carnival gueen, and the Snow Ball dance.

In 1986 Swan Common was repaved and the area with fencing enclosed. Also new space was made available in the Town Hall for the recreational stroage needs.

I would like to thank all the Board and the Coaches that helped make recreation in Charlestown a huge success. A special thankyou to Mike White who acted as Recreation Director for the past year and to Laurie St. Pierre as Secretary of the Recreation Committee.

The largest problem in 1987 to be addressed is maintenance at Patch Park. We are asking for a new riding lawn mower in this year's budget. Also the bandshell and restrooms should be constructed.

#### CHARLESTOWN EDUCATION COMMITTEE REPORT

The Charlestown Education Committee began 1986 with a Special Town Meeting on January 6. The Town voted under the provisions of RSA 195:25 to have the School Board conduct a study of the feasibility and suitability of withdrawing grade K-8 from the Fall Mountain Regional School District. The vote was: YES 135, NO 29. The School District voted at the March 8, 1986 meeting to appropriate \$15,000.00 for the purpose of conducting the study.

The Study Committee met for the first time on Monday, March 24, 1986. Tom Esslinger of Acworth was elected Chairman. The Committee consisted of 15 members, 3 from each of the five towns in the district. Our representatives were Mary Holmes, School Board member, John Putnam, Selectman, and Albert St. Pierre.

The Committee hired the Center for Educational Field Services-University of N. H. to prepare a report. In the final report C.E.F.S. concluded that the Town of Charlestown could withdraw grade K-8 at no additional cost to Charlestown's taxpayers and still maintain existing programs.

A motion was made by a representative from Acworth to maintain the status quo (thereby not allowing the district to vote on a plan). The motion passed by a 9 to 4 vote with all three Charlestown members voting against the motion.

C.E.F.S. recommended in their report that the formula for funding the district be changed to include an equalized valuation of 25% to 50%. It also says, "C.E.F.S. believes the state formula for apportioning SAU costs of 50% equalized valuation and 50% ADM (RSA 189:47) is a fair formula, since the local property tax is the main source of school funding."

The Withdrawal Study Committee voted to ask the School Board to form a Formula Study Committee. The Withdrawal Study Committee then ended.

The Formula Study Committee was set up in the same format as the previous committee with Charlestown being represented by John Putnam, Jack Brannon, and Howard Mortenson. Again a motion was made to maintain the status quo. The motion passed by a 12-3 vote with Charlestown's membership being the three.

It appears that we are equal on these committees by getting 20% of the vote, yet Charlestown pays 50% of the bills.

In closing, I would like to thank Ro Metcalf, Jack Brannon and Steve Cobb for all the effort they have put in to the Charlestown Education Committee.

#### UPPER VALLEY - LAKE SUNAPEE COUNCIL

#### Year-End Report

The Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council is a public, non-profit voluntary association of towns and cities in the Upper Valley and Lake Sunapee areas. Our thirty-one (31) communities are in two states and five counties.

The Council consists of a Board of Directors and a professional staff. Each town or city annually appropriates funds for the Council's operation and sends two representatives to participate on the Board of Directors. The Board elects officers, adopts the annual work program and budget and develops policies and positions on issues that are important to our communities.

The Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council is the official organization that brings towns and cities within our region together. By bonding together and pooling their resources, local governments have a highly trained, professional staff available to them for a wide variety of services. Areas of expertise include land use planning, master planning, economic and community development, water quality management, transportation, landscape architecture, housing, capital budgeting, historic preservation, downtown revitalization, solid waste planning, recreation and fiscal and environmental impact analysis. The Council also serves as a collective voice for these towns and cities in dealings with state and federal governments, thereby protecting and furthering the needs and interests or our communities.

Half of your local dues to the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council supports regional planning and regional programs. Over the past year, the Council:

- o prepared the Upper Valley Solid Waste District Management Plan and provided administrative services to the Solid Waste District;
- sponsored and helped organize the Upper Valley Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program and provided assistance to the New London League of Women Voters to help create a similar collection program in the New London area;
- o worked with several communities in the Lake Sunapee area to develop a solution to their septage disposal problem;
- maintained our regional data base, including our role as a Regional Data Center for the U. S. Bureau of the Census and updated and published the Economic Profile of the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Region which is the primary source of economic and demographic data for our region;
- o provided an Economic Development Agent for Sullivan County to help retain and expand employment opportunities in the area;
- testified on several bills before the ligislature, including the Connecticut River Resource Authority Bill, and distributed summaries of new and amended legislation to our communities;
- testified on Vermont's 5-year highway plan and New Hampshire's 10-year highway plan;

- ° sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture Series;
- o sponsored two meetings on groundwater protection and distributed model ordinances to each community in the region;
- oprovided administrative services to the Upper Valley Community Land Trust and worked with the Connecticut River Watershed Council, Hanover Conservation Council and Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests to negotiate voluntary conservation easements and deed restrictions to protect open space and conservation lands;
- continued the regional historic preservation program, including historic surveys, national register nominations and historic preservation plans;
- coordinated efforts to secure state funding for the Upper Valley Transportation Study and the Cheshire Bridge and completed numerous traffic studies for our communities;
- provided technical assistance to Advance Transit and County Coach;
- helped over a dozen communities seek state and federal grant funds by providing technical assistance, data and in most cases, preparing the grant applications;
- conducted a survey of application fees for local land use regulations and distributed the survey results to several communities;
- o met on numerous occasions with state department heads and legislators to discuss the needs and interests of our communities; and
- ° updated and amended the Regional Land Use Plan.

As requested by communities, the Council conducted a large number of impact studies concerning proposed developments, prepared amendments to local subdivision, zoning, site plan review, and earth excavation regulations and provided mapping, drafting and other technical assistance.

The UVLSC has also provided a number of specific services to the Town of Charlestown including:

- Ongoing assistance in the implementation of the water system improvements and responsibility for administering the Town's \$228,000 Community Development Block Grant. The Council previously prepared the successful grant application.
- Preparation of a nomination to list the Charlestown Town Center (64 structures) on the National Register of Historic Places. The estimated cost of this project was \$4000 and was shared by the Council and the State at no cost to the Town.
- Prepared a new zoning plan to be presented to voters at March Town Meeting (\$5000 project, of which \$ 3,000 was covered by a town appropriation last year and \$2,000 was funded by local dues).
- Prepared a set of eight colored resource maps depicting steep slopes, wetlands, floodplains, aquifers, agricultural soils, and suitability for septic system and building construction (\$1,200 value, at no cost to the town).

- Prepared Existing Land Use Map (\$600 value, at no cost to the Town).
- Testified at the Cheshire Bridge Hearing in Concord and encouraged the State to obtain ownership of the bridge to ensure that the economic development and transportation needs of Charlestown and the area will be met.

In addition, Susan Elder, the Concil's Economic Development Agent for Sullivan County, has continued to provide valuable services by meeting monthly with the Charlestown Economic Development Association, providing technical assistance to existing industries in Town as well as negotiating with prospective new industries interested in Charlestown, and continuing to implement the Charlestown Industrial Strategy developed by the Council two years ago. We look forward to aggressively marketing Charlestown to the industrial sector in 1987.

The Council's staff of professionals stands ready to assist your community in addressing the planning and growth management issues which you will face during the coming year. We also encourage you to become more familiar and involved with the Council, since we are essentially an arm of local government addressing your needs.

#### WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

Critical improvements to the Charlestown Municipal Water System as mandated by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission have been partially implemented under Phase I.

#### Phase I completed

- 1. Construction of a one million gallon concrete storage tank off the Causeway Road in order to eliminate dependence upon the reservoir.
- 2. Construction of 4,700 linear feet of 16 inch transmission main from the new tank to the system via the "Causeway" Road.
- 3. Replacement of 1,450 linear feet of 12 inch watermain on Clay Brook crossing.
  - 4. Replacement of 950 linear feet of 12 inch watermain on Railroad Street.
- 5. Construction of 2,300 linear feet of 12 inch watermain to provide a system loop on Lovers Lane.

The Water Commission is now making application to the Office of State Planning for a \$700,000.00 Community Development Block Grant, which will make the following Phase II-A improvements feasible.

- 1. Construction of a second infiltration well.
- 2. Complete disconnection of surface reservoirs from the distribution system.
  - 3. Installation of corrosion control devices.
  - 4. Construction of 6,700 linear feet of new watermain on Old Claremont Road.

The Water Commissioners would like to thank Water Superintendent Henry Lake and the Engineering firm of Dufresne-Henry for their commitment to the project.
