#### REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

One of the many things that happened in our town this past year, was the opening of Spofford Hall. We wish them many years of success.

The Building Study Committee did an excellent job. Many hours were expended to arrive at their decisions and recommendations, given at a special hearing held last September. One of the recommendations was for the purchase of the property adjoining the Town Hall. Since this property has become available, we are inserting an article in the warrant for its purchase. The future needs of our town offices should be considered at this time, as office space keeps growing smaller and demands for services keep increasing.

At the present time, Chesterfield has about a million and a half dollars of land assessment in current use. This figure should about double this year. The Selectmen's Office has received many new applications due to the state ordered re-assessment.

On January 27 and 28, the state assessors were at the Town Hall to hear any complaints, and to explain their methods of assessing. One hundred and eight taxpayers attended this session. According to these officials, the turnout was small for the size of our town.

There will be many articles in the warrant on town meeting day. Some inserted as a regular course of town business, others by petition. Included on the ballot will be an article brought in by petition relating to solar energy exemptions. It is hoped that an informed voter will exercise his or her right to vote on all these vital issues.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the tenth (10th) day of March, next at 6:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

(Polls will be open at 10:00 A.M. and will close at 8:00 P.M.)

ARTICLE 1. To vote an Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers.

ARTICLE 2. To vote an Australian Ballot for the following: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:62 for a property tax exemption on real property equipped with a solar energy heating or cooling system which exemption shall be in an amount of 100% of the cost of said solar system? (By petition)

ARTICLE 3. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to change the term of office of Town Clerk from one year to a three (3) year term becoming effective at the next Town meeting.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will adopt an ordinance relating to drug paraphernalia. Copies of the ordinance are available at the Selectmens Office.

ARTICLE 7. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

- ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,279.50 to help support the work of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,048.00 to remain a member of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission as provided for in New Hampshire RSA 36:45 to aid the town in future planning. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$55,000.00 for the purchase of the Spaulding Property adjoining the Town Hall and authorize the withdrawal of \$33,000.00 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 with the balance of \$22,000.00 to be raised by taxation in 1981. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)
- ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 to refurbish the Spaulding property adjoining the Town Hall. (Approved by the Budget Committee.)

# ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, 1980

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 11, 1980.

The meeting was called to order at ten o'clock in the forenoon by the Moderator, James E. O'Neil, Sr., who read the warrant through Articles 1 and 2 and declared the polls open for voting by ballot for Town Officers and Amendments to the Zoning and Building Ordinances.

At six-thirty the Moderator called the meeting to order with Carl Johnson and Ethel Mills acting as Assistant Moderator and Assistant Clerk, respectively.

The Moderator then called on Rev. Theodore VanPatten, who offered prayer.

The Moderator brought it to the attention of the voters a printing error on page 9 of the Annual Report. In the "Estimated Revenue Ensuing Fiscal Year" column the following items should read:

The Articles of The Warrant were then disposed of as follows:

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Avis Gauthier and supported by Joan Dittrich to dispense with the reading of the Warrant, as it could be found on pages 4 - 7 inclusive of the Annual Report, and the Moderator would read each article as it was considered. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Gary Winn and seconded by Russell Johnson to use the same method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year as was used the previous year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Susan Fleisher and supported by Robert Callahan to authorize the

Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Vote declared by the Moderator to be in the affirmative.

Article 5. The report of the Budget Committee was given by Robert Beard, Chairman, who stated that they had met the required number of meetings and the breakdown of the budget could be found on pages 4 through 9. Voted by voice vote to accept the report as given. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative and did not pass.

Article 26 - Con't. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Gary Winn and supported by Robert Cannell to amend Article 26 to read: to prohibit the storage of radioactive materials for and from nuclear facilities and the dumping of radioactive waste from nuclear facilities, within the town lines of Chesterfield. The Moderator declared the vote on the amendment to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on Article 26 as amended. Vote declared by Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Wayne Winn and supported by Carl Johnson to accept all articles from Article 27 through 35. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. These articles as adopted are as follows:

Article 27. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Beatrice Wintle for the Trust Fund on Reuben and Beatrice Wintle Lot #123 in Chesterfield West Cemetery. ### CHESTERFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT

### Annual Report 1980

Much has happened in the past year. When the department went full time, it meant that all officers in that position had to be certified by the State of New Hampshire. Consequently, Officer Brady and I had to go to the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Academy for the eight week training period. Officer Brady left for the 48th class in Enfield, New Hampshire, on February 25th, but because of a knee injury in the third week he was required to leave the academy after his fifth week to have surgery. With his knee repaired and a good recovery he was readmitted to the 52nd class, starting with the 6th week, and graduated October 31, 1980.

The Police Standards and Training Council set the dates for us to enter the academy, so while John Brady was recuperating from his operation, I had to start my training on May 5th at Pease Air Force Base, where the school is normally held. I graduated with the 50th class on June 27th. This left the town without any police protection of its own, but we had no other choice, because these were the dates set by the State. We had to rely on already overworked outside help, the New Hampshire State Police, the Sheriff's Department, and surrounding towns. I thank them all for their help. During this time many people were upset with the response and service they were getting. A special meeting was held in August and people were able to air their complaints. I believe much was gained by everyone from this meeting. The Police Department learned the Public wanted and needed more patrol time, so it was decided to keep the 1976 Pontiac Cruiser rather than turning it in toward the purchase of the new cruiser. It is impossible to do more than we are already doing without extra men and the second police vehicle. We have hired seven special officers, who are at this time in training with us, and also going to school to be certified as Part Time Police Officers, which is mandated by State of New Hampshire law. These men will be certified in March 1981, and will be a big help to us during this coming summer.

Vandalism, burglary and theft continue to be the biggest problems in all communities. We are no exception. I encourage all citizens to report any unusual occurrence. Make note of registration numbers, descriptions of people, vehicles, etc. It is far better to check an innocent individual or automobile, than to have to investigate a crime already committed. Many people feel it is foolish to call over "nothing" but that "nothing" may be a crime in progress.

### PLANNING BOARD REPORT FOR 1980

The Board met 12 times during the year with public hearings for 11 subdivisions and three site plans. The Board also held a hearing to accept proposals for amendments to the zoning ordinances. None were proposed, and the Board decided not to revise the regulations this year, as the zoning ordinances and subdivision regulations were edited and reprinted in 1979.

Ronald Veriango became a regular member of the Board, with Joan Dittrich appointed as an alternate.

The main building of the rehabilitation facilities, Spofford Hall, was completed during the year. Also the Prospect Park Press building was completed in the Equity Management commercial zone on Route 9.

We think both of these facilities are attractive, afford employment opportunities for townspeople, and add to our tax base.

A new commercial zone north of Route 9 opposite the Equity Management zone was approved by the townspeople at the 1980 town meeting.

The town has rejoined the Southwest Region Planning Commission. Mayda Berg and I were appointed commissioners, and we took an active part in regional planning activities. Considerable technical assistance was received from this commission, and the commission also assisted the special building committee in their studies.

During the year the commission assisted in the completion of seven community comprehensive plans in the region, and also with others in various stages of completion. The commission has promised to assist Chesterfield with its comprehensive plan, and work is expected to being on this during 1981.

### CHESTERFIELD CEMETERY COMMISSION 1980 Report

1980 saw a great deal of needed work accomplished in the Town's 23 cemeteries, with \$5,431 spent for regular maintenance and \$1,780 for special (one-time) projects such as grave-stone repair and removal of dead elms. Three large new sections were opened for use at Friedsam Cemetery and gates were set up at Spofford and Friedsam cemeteries to help combat vandalism.

For 1981, the Commission projects a Sexton's budget of \$5,500 for regular maintenance and requests an appropriation for \$600 from the Town to complete our program of grave-stone repair. The Commission is currently working with the Trustees of Trust Funds to create badly needed new trust accounts or add to existing accounts in our impoverished older cemeteries.

Beginning in the spring of 1981, the gates at Spofford and Friedsam cemeteries will be unlocked and open during daylight hours every day until snowfall. The Commission now provides limited winter burial service (depending on snow depth and frost penetration) at the Spofford Annex and Friedsam cemeteries for the convenience of townspeople.

## CHESTERFIELD PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION REPORT 1980

During the summer of 1980, Wares Grove attendance again exceeded the previous year's totals with approximately 13,000 people using the facility. Good weather combined with a dedicated staff to boost attendance at the beach and the Recreation Program.

In addition to the existing passes for residents, the Commission voted to offer non-resident passes on a one year trial basis for the 1980 season; however, only one pass was purchased. Resident passes totaled 59.

As recommended by the Chesterfield Building Committee, the Commission is requesting the establishment of a Parks & Recreation Building Reserve Fund per the article in this year's Town Warrant. The requested \$1500 figure is the difference between the total amount of receipts for 1980 and the total amount expended in 1980.

In an effort to expand our programs for 1981, a series of family films will be shown outdoors at Wares Grove. A minimal admission will be charged to offset part of the rental costs.

As in past years, the Commission meetings are always open to the public for discussion pertaining to the operation of our beaches and programs.

The past year brought several changes and improvements to the Chesterfield Library. The ceiling in the main room has been painted white. This not only greatly improves the appearance of the building, it also

makes much better lighting with our present fixtures.

Our open house in August was quite successful. We raised about \$100 from the book sale, bake sale, and note paper. The money went toward new childrens reference books. If all goes well we plan another open house for this summer. There is notepaper on sale at the library throughout the year.

Our circulation increased over 600 more than in 1979. Several new patrons are using the library, and most are pleased with our efforts to provide up-to-date materials. The price of books has soared, making it

difficult to keep up as we would like to.

## CHESTERFIELD HOME HEALTH AGENCY, INC. SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT - FISCAL YEAR 1980

The year 1980 provided many challenges for the staff and the Board of Directors of your Home Health Agency. We have endeavored to maintain a high level of health services to the residents of the Town of Chesterfield.

An innovative "Meals on Wheels" program began this year in conjunction with Cheshire Senior Services. Our Nurse/Administrator co-ordinates volunteer activity for pick-up and delivery of meals to the homes of shut-ins three times per week. We have provided the allotted 75 meals per month to Spofford and Chesterfield residents. Similar meals are provided to residents of West Chesterfield from a Brattleboro program.

We are a non-profit organization, supported by Town funds, a membership drive, health insurance programs and patient fees. Patient fees are established on a sliding scale in relation to the financial circumstances of the family or individual involved. Services on a free basis or a partial payment basis are provided to many persons whose circumstances do not permit otherwise. No resident is ever denied our help because of inability to pay.

We are grateful to the Town of Chesterfield for continued support and we are indebted to those who have supported our membership drive. Complete self-sufficiency is not possible for a certified agency engaged in activity such as ours.

Memorial funds were received during 1980 to honor the memories of: May Pearson, Roger Spaulding, Lester Georgina, Mildred Gauthier, William McKenna, John Chickering and Arthur Tibbets. These funds are used for purchase of special extraitems not included in our operating budget. Wheel chairs, crutches and baby clothing are good examples of such items.

We are fortunate to have our staff headed by Nurse/Administrator, Marilyn Rousseau. She provides skilled nursing care and contributes her considerable expertise in health matters to our goal of health promotion and disease prevention.

Irene Seay is our able clerk/bookkeeper who copes with the ever increasing load of State and Federal forms and the paper work involved in the work load of our busy and growing agency.

Physical therapy, occupational therapy, and home health aide services are obtained from outside sources on a contract basis and are provided by the agency as required.

My personal and sincere gratitude is extended to our staff, our volunteers, and to our board members for their many hours of time devoted to the agency and especially for their willingness to serve.

### CHESTERFIELD HOME HEALTH AGENCY

During 1980, the regular hours of Nurse/Administrator were to be 30 hours per week. However, due to an increase in nursing care the last five months of the year, the hours worked were 40 or more per week. The relief Nurse/Admin. is available on a limited basis, and covers for vacation time. Medicare mandates every agency employ an administrator, and about one-third of the Nurse's time is spent on administration, i.e. - patient referral, financial advisement, transportation, telephone calls of inquiry from residents, arrangements for clinics and education, various meetings of agency - finance, personnel, evaluation and monthly board.

Some health services are not reimbursed by third party payers, (insurance, Medicare, Medicaid, etc.) and a certain percentage must be met by community funds to keep total visit costs as low as possible.

The average hours of various volunteer workers is 8 or more per week. For the entire year the approximate number of hours at each service was as follows:

Motion was made and supported to accept the recommendation of the Tax Study Committee that the proposed Legislation Amendment be pursued to eliminate double taxation of the residents of the fire district for fire protection. Vote was in the affirmative.

# REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE

Subject: Study of More Equitable Taxation of Property-S.F.D. To: Michael P. Bentley, Moderator-Spofford Fire District

In accordance with the article recorded at the Annual Meeting of the Spofford Fire District on March 12, 1980 and your letter of appointment dated May 29, 1980, the committee met for the first time on June 8 and again on June 19, October 25 and November 15, 1980. The legal assistance offered by yourself to the committee was accepted; hence, you became an exofficio member of the committee.

For the record, it is well to mention that the committee discussed and pondered the many facets of the existing inequity of double taxation for fire protection expense including the actual history of the fire district which was presented by John Leahy. We wondered what the responsibility of the Town of Chesterfield was to all the burroughs of the town regardless of whether or not they were a fire district. In the course of the discussion, the committee became aware of another inequity when Bill Allen indicated that the Revenue Sharing Fund for fire protection was used exclusively outside of the Spofford Fire District, thereby creating a second inequity.

We also wondered what the manner of operation was for other towns that were only partially covered by a fire district. It was thought that Walpole had such a situation and Bill Allen indicated that he would check out their manner of operation. Mike Bentley was requested to pursue the legal aspect of fire districts and the ramifications of a disbandment of a fire district since it was a possible solution to the inequity of double taxation. With this in mind, we adjourned until June 19th.

In our second meeting, Bill Allen reported that Walpole operated with two fire districts within the town and that each one was responsible for its own expense. This afforded us with no help to our problem. Mike Bentley reported, that in order to disband, we must have a two thirds vote of approval and that all indebtedness must be paid. We still did not have an answer to the legal responsibility of the town to a fire district nor what would happen to the property of a fire district or the proceeds from it if it were sold. It was decided to procure this information from the Department of Revenue Administration and Mike Bentley was authorized to communicate with them in an effort to obtain such information.

Because of our intended meeting with the Board of Selectmen at a later date, the committee felt that we should muster as much clout as possible which would even include the possibility of our secession from the Town of Chesterfield. We adjourned until such time as Mike Bentley would procure the answers.

It is interesting to note at this time, that in Mike Bentley's letter dated July 22, which dealt with the general question of inequity to a fire district covering only part of a town, that Mike Bentley specifically asked the following questions:

- 1. "Is it permissible for the Selectmen of the Town of Chesterfield to levy taxes for fire protection services on property situated within the boundaries of the Spofford Fire Precinct when services are being provided to those properties by the precinct with funds raised by precinct taxes levied on the same property?"
- 2. "If the Spofford Fire Precinct voted to dissolve and to sell all of its assets to the highest bidder, after payment of all existing obligations, how would any surplus funds have to be disposed of?"

In our meeting of October 25, we learned that after a considerable lapse of time, that Mike Bentley contacted the Dept. of Revenue Administration by phone and was told that it was their belief that the Town of Chesterfield was not liable in any way for the expense of the Spofford Fire District and should the town assume any, a budget with such expense included could not be approved by them nor could a tax rate be issued to the town.

It was decided that such information must be received in writing if we should decide to pursue the matter with litigation in the courts. Accordingly, Mike Bentley was authorized to press the Department of Revenue Administration for an immediate reply. With that, we adjourned until November 15th.

In our meeting of November 15, we learned that during the interim, Bill Allen had an opportunity to broach the subject of financial aid for the Spofford Fire District to the selectmen at an informal gathering and they indicated that virtually no help could be expected from the Town of Chesterfield. We also learned that a reply from the Dept. of Revenue Administration had not been forthcoming which left us without either an opinion or decision from this governing branch of government.

Why did they choose not to issue an opinion or decision? Were they concerned that the method of operation employed for many years might possibly be contrary to the actual law? The committee mused these questions and decided that it would be worthwhile to test this matter in the courts.

In conclusion, we would like to make the people of Spofford cognizant of the options open to them at this time:

- 1. Remain as we are at present, a separate fire district, and accept the double taxation for the cost of our good fire protection.
- 2. Disband the fire district and dispose of all property with, perhaps, a rebate made to all of the present residents. This would, of course, place ourselves at the mercy of the Town of Chesterfield for fire protection.

- 3. Secede from the Town of Chesterfield and set up our own township.  $\hspace{1cm}$
- 4. Test the legality of the present method of taxation in the courts.
- 5. Have legislation passed that would outlaw the double taxation method presently employed.

This committee recommends having legislation passed that would outlaw the double taxation method presently used. If for any reason, such legislation fails to pass both houses and become law, then we feel that this matter be pursued in the courts which will surely recognize the injustice of this inequity.

- ARTICLE 1. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 2. To see if the District will vote to appropriate whatever surplus funds it might have at the close of its June 30, 1981, fiscal year to an Energy Conservation Capital Reserve fund, the purpose of such fund being to fund improvements of a capital nature to effect energy conservation in school district buildings, and further to appoint the members of the Chesterfield School Board as trustees or agents of the District to carry out the objectives designated in this article in 1981 or thereafter.
- ARTICLE 3. To see if the District will vote to appropriate from the Energy Conservation Capital Reserve fund whatever sum of money is contained in such fund after the transfer to it of surplus funds in accordance with the provisions of Article 2. above for the purpose of installing storm windows and installing a temperature control system.

School District Meeting Chesterfield Central School Chesterfield, New Hampshire March 8, 1980

The Moderator, Errol G. Sowers, opened the polls at 10:00 a.m. for voting. The warrant for elections was read by the Moderator. The following were appointed as ballot clerks: James O'Neil, Jr., Evelyn Callahan, Ruth VanHouten, Nina Foster, Ann Knickerbocker, and JoAnn Morse. They took the oath of office from the Moderator.

At 8:00 p.m., the Moderator, Errol Sowers, called the meeting to order for the purpose of acting on the articles in the warrant. The Moderator read the articles in the warrant.

Articles were disposed of as follows:

ARTICLE 1. H. Claude Mowry moved that the District accept and place on file the reports of agents, committees, and officers as found in the district report. Seconded by Clara Wellington. Moderator declared the voice vote to carry in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 2. Jeanne Viarengo moved that the District appropriate whatever surplus funds it might have at the close of its June 30, 1980, fiscal year to an Energy Conservation Capital Reserve Fund, and to establish such a Capital Reserve Fund, the purpose of such fund being to fund improvements of a capital nature to effect energy conservation in school district buildings, and further to appoint Charles R. Johnson and Sylvia M. Thompson as trustees or agents of the District to carry out the objectives designated in the article in 1980 or thereafter. Seconded by Charles Johnson. The Moderator called for discussion. Antonio Souza moved to amend the motion by adding the phrase "and a third elected school board member" immediately following the name of Sylvia M. Thompson. Seconded by Donald Emery. This motion was recalled in favor of one made by Gerald Morgan to strike the names of the board members and substitute the phrase "the three elected board members". Seconded by James O'Neil, Sr. Moderator declared the amendment carried in the affirmative following a voice vote. Following discussion on the amended article the Moderator called for a show of hands to vote on the article. The Moderator declared the article to carry in the affirmative with the vote being 50 in favor, 48 opposed. The declaration was contested by JoAnn Morse who asked for a paper ballot, seconded by Judy Young, and supported by 4 others. Moderator declared that a vote would be taken by a paper ballot. Results: 55 in favor, 50 opposed. Moderator declared amended motion to be carried in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3. Robert Yacubian moved, and seconded by James O'Neil, Sr. to see if the District will authorize the School Board to appoint a 7-member building committee. Said committee shall study the design, construction and cost of renovation or additions to the Chesterfield Elementary School. Said committee shall report its findings at a special meeting prior to the March 1981 School District Meeting. Donald Emery moved to amend the motion and was seconded by H. Claude Mowry. The amendment is to see if the District will authorize the School Board and Selectmen to appoint a 7-member Chesterfield Building Committee to study the building needs of Chesterfield. Said committee to report to the town no later than September 30, 1980. Messers. Mowry and Emery then offered to amend their amendment to add the phrase "and to the school district" immediately following "to the town". Moderator declared the amendment to carry in the affirmative following a voice vote. The main motion as amended was then also voted on by voice vote. Vote declared carried in the affirmative by the Moderator.

ARTICLE 4. Patricia Manders moved that the district authorize the establishment of a public kindergarten within the Chesterfield School District. Seconded by Dorothy O'Neil. The Moderator offered a clarification of the article stating that this article had not been approved by the budget committee, nor supported by the School Board. He then called for discussion. Following discussion, a paper ballot was used because it had been mandated by resolution adopted by the School District Meeting on March 10, 1979. The ballot count was 35 in favor, 67 opposed. Moderator declared the motion to carry in the negative and the motion was lost.

ARTICLE 5. The Moderator declared that since Article 4 did not carry, and that since Article 5 was for funding Article 4, the Article 5 would be passed over.

ARTICLE 6. William Allen moved, and was seconded by Antonio Souza, that the district authorize the Chesterfield School Board to expend funds deposited in the so-called Chesterfield Sinking Fund established in 1957: \$733.02 plus accrued interest.

thus liquidating the account. Further, that the Chesterfield School Board be empowered to expend such funds during the 1979-1980 school year for capital improvements as may be determined by the School Board. Following discussion, the Moderator called for a voice vote which was declared to carry in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 7. Judy Johnson moved, and was seconded by Robert Shaw, that the District authorize the School Board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grants in aid, or other funds of educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any Federal, State or private agency. The Moderator declared the voice vote to carry in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 8. Charles Johnson moved, and was seconded by Michael Wiggin, that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$881,006.00 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the statutory obligations of the District. Discussion was called for by the Moderator. Robert Woodman made a motion to cut \$8000 from the total budget to eliminate Guidance Services. Seconded by Thomas Woodman. Moderator called for a hand count vote which overwhelmingly defeated the amendment. Moderator called for a voice vote on the main motion which was declared to be carried in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 9. Other legal business. Robert Woodman proposed the following resolution:

"WHEREAS Clara B. Wellington has served as a School Board Member and Chairman during the last 30 years, "AND WHEREAS she has, through her keen mind, cooperative spirit, honest and forthright manner, greatly furthered the quality of education provided by the Town of Chesterfield, "BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the voters of this School District recognize her exceptional services by unamimously adopting this resolution as a lasting tribute to her."

Seconded by Gerald Morgan. Voice vote declared to be carried in the affirmative. Ms. Wellington was then presented with an engraved plaque of appreciation by Sylvia Thompson amid much applause from those in attendance.

On a motion by Michael Wiggin, seconded by JoAnn Morse, the Moderator called for adjournment of the meeting. Voice vote declared by the Moderator to be in the affirmative, Moderator adjourned the meeting and also declared the polls to be closed. Meeting adjourned at 11:58 p.m.

## ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

The 1979-80 school year presented numerous challenges for your school district and its staff. The ever increasing inflation rate has made itself felt in all the goods and services purchased by the school district. The staff has worked hard and long to maintain a quality education for our children in the face of ever increasing prices. This has proved to be difficult in that costs for some educational supplies are budgeted one year prior to purchasing. The staff is to be congratulated for their efforts.

The student testing program is in its second year of operation. All students were given a full range achievement test in the spring of 1980. These tests were used to evaluate the programs for the 1979-80 school year and for the planning of the 1980-81 school year. Parents are encouraged to meet with their child's teacher to review the results of these achievement tests which will be given on an annual basis.

The Accountability Testing Committee has developed and administered tests in the areas of mathematics and social studies in Grades 5, 8, and 11. The results of these tests will be distributed to your school board and made public for comment and review. The Language Arts Accountability tests are now being developed and will be administered to the students in the spring of 1981.

The administration will present to the school board and general public a management plan using the results received from the accountability testing program. This management plan will outline any changes in curriculum or methodology which may be required as a result of these tests.

The towns' Curriculum Council has developed a draft of a Language Arts Curriculum Continuum for Grades 1 through 8. This guide will be distributed to all town teachers in September of 1980, and will be used as a pilot curriculum guide for the 1980-81 school year. These guides will be reviewed during the summer of 1981 using comments received from all teachers. The Language Arts Curriculum Guide will then be presented to all town school boards in August of 1981 for their adoption as the Language Arts Curriculum Guide for Grades 1 through 8.

The towns' Curriculum Council will begin work on a Mathematics Curriculum Guide in the spring of 1981. This guide will be implemented during the 1982-83 school year.

Your staff and administration are deeply involved in improving the quality of education offered to our children. We believe that a school either improves or becomes poorer - it seldom just "holds its own." No school or school system is so good that it cannot improve.

We wish to thank the school board and staff for their aid and cooperation in the past year. We also appreciate their willingness to devote the long hours which are necessary to manage and operate an effective school system.

## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The Chesterfield Central School opened its doors to students on Tuesday, September 2, 1980. The first day's attendance was officially listed as 301 students.

Martin Mahoney served as Acting Principal until my election as the new principal. I assumed my duties on Monday, September 29, 1980, when my contractual obligations with the Montgomery County, Maryland, Board of Education were completed. Also new to the school this year were Ann Keating, grades 2/3; Karen Lanier, grades 5/6; David Johnston, Science-grades 6-8; and Laura Corriveau, Music. Steve Jonas was appointed School Counselor, a new position this year.

The Language Arts Curriculum Guide was piloted in Chesterfield as well as the other towns in School Administrative Unit 29 this year. This pilot program, with much teacher imput, is still an on going, working process. The Ginn 720 Reading program was purchased and implemented for grades one through three with great enthusiasm from the staff and new social studies texts for grade 8 and science books for grades 6-8 were purchased. The Zaner Bloser Handwriting program was begun and the Ginn Language Arts program was piloted in Grade 4.

As in the past, the Chesterfield P.T.A. continued its great work. The New Hampshire State P.T.A. bestowed upon them its P.T.A. Unit of the Year award for 1980. The Parent Volunteer organization, under the coordination of Neil Jenness, continues to help teachers in the classroom, lunchroom, and playground.

Maggie Konet has been our Artist in Residence for this year. She is in school for three and one-half days per week for two weeks each month to provide students with the opportunity for and introduction to a variety of art disciplines. These include drawing, mask making, and weaving.

The purpose of a school is to provide the opportunity for every child to achieve the education that he/she so richly deserves. Policy and an atmosphere of discipline have been created to allow for these educational experiences.

My thanks goes out to the school board, parents, central office personnel, students, and to the Chesterfield staff for helping to make my first year at Chesterfield a very meaningful experience for me.

- 4. Administered tuberculin tests to 4th and 8th grade students, staff, bus drivers, and volunteers.
- 5. Served on local evaluation and placement team.
- 6. Cooperated with the Chesterfield Home Health Agency in the Preschool Vision and Hearing Screening Clinic.
- 7. Referral notices sent or phoned to parents concerning health evaluation findings, vision, hearing, communicable diseases, and dental referrals.
- 8. Conferences with principal, parents and teachers.
- 9. Meeting the students' needs resulting from disease, accident or psychosocial adjustment.
- 10. Member of Chesterfield Central School Health Education Curriculum Study Committee.
- 11. Applications to Lions Club (Eyesight).
- 12. Positive health attitudes and education on a "need to know" basis.

The Northeast outbreak of Pediculuosis (head lice) included our students. Although only 5% of our school population became infected, further spread of the disease was prevented by frequent inspection and referral.

The School Lunch Program served lunch from the first day to the last day of school. The price remained at 45¢ for lunch and 5¢ for milk. On the average, 200 students a day had lunch.

Our program is self-supporting with the exception of some government subsidy. Due to the inflationary rise in the cost of food and expendables, much time was spent planning meals to stay within our budget. Government surplus foods were a real bonus with such items as hamburgers, pork, chicken, turkey, peanut butter, cheese, oil, canned fruits, and vegetables.

Each student is provided with a monthly menu; also the local radio stations. Lunch money is collected on Friday in advance for the following week. Students may choose their meals by the day, or week, and may pay by the week or month in cash or by check. Applications for free and/or reduced lunches are available.

We welcome parents to visit, and to share comments or concerns with us. Any new menu ideas?
