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## — DEDICATION —

We've all heard stories of "the good ole days when I made 25¢ an hour". Did you know that we have been employing one of these people for the past twenty-five years? Since 1962 when Rita D. Gross began her career as "a town servant" she has held the positions of auditor, treasurer, town clerk/treasurer and trustee of the trust funds. I am sure some of these jobs assured Rita much less than 25¢ an hour. While she was a trustee, she went to every site and took pictures marking the memorial and matching it to the appropriate trust fund. This took time and dedication. Over the years, she has sent out birthday cards to remind us that our car registrations were due, and notes that we had forgotten to register our dogs. She has made out innumerable mailing lists for different projects and taken time to get together names for the Good Neighbor Club Thanksgiving baskets. Then she would help pack and deliver the baskets. She has taught children to braid from wool and over the years she's given lessons on braiding, knitting and crocheting. Long before she had a need for it, she was driving a school bus for our children. She and Bud purchased the first school bus Croydon ever had. She and Jane Chworowsky spent long arduous hours gathering material for the Bicentennial booklet (at the time dragging their five year old daughter, Carol Sue, along looking up old foundations). She found the time to make at least two sets of drapes for the Town Hall. In 1951 she spent the summer on top of Croydon Peak at the tower for Bud. She ran the weather station from 1961 until it was discontinued. She held every office in the Good Neighbor Club. She has been a member of St. Patrick's Church most of her life. Whenever anyone gets a letter that needs geneology research, who do we run to? Her office has been open to the public seven days and nights a week for decades. Rita was even asked to join the committee that would ultimately take her job.

After March 10, an era will come to an end in Croydon. The town clerk will no longer be accessible 24 hours a day — seven days a week. We will have to fit into our busy schedules, time to go register our cars, etc. The Gross home has served us well for many years and Rita has certainly done the name proud. No one could have been more dedicated to her job or more diligent in her work.

Because of her dedication and concern for the betterment of the Town of Croydon over the years, we hereby dedicate this 1986 Annual Report to Rita D. Gross.

## TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Croydon, in the county of Sullivan qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 10th of March next at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, (polls not to close earlier than 6:00 o'clock in the afternoon), to act upon the following subjects:

ART. 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, one Town Clerk/Tax Collector for one year, one Treasurer for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years, two Auditors for one year, and all such officers and agents as may be necessary for transaction of Town's business for the ensuing year.

ART. 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of nineteen-hundred dollars (\$1,900.00) for the lighting of streets.

ART. 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750.00) for the lighting and heating of the Town Hall and other buildings.

ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for the Social Security of Town Employees for the ensuing year.

ART. 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire all necessary sums of money for use during the year in anticipation of taxes.

ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand two hundred and seventy-nine dollars (\$1,279.00) for the Newport Area Home Health Agency.

ART. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand three hundred twenty-nine dollars and ninety-one cents (\$1,329.91) for the Newport Ambulance Service.

ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand and fifty dollars (\$2,150.00) for the Newport Dispatch Service.

ART. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the Planning Board.

ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for General Assistance.

ART. 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for any and all federal grants as may be available.

ART. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) to support the Sullivan County Hospice, Inc.

ART. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for the New Bridge Trust Fund.

ART. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the cost of the Library, including the Librarian's salary, heat, etc. Librarian's salary to be paid directly by the Town.

ART. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the cutting of brush.

ART. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) for insurances.

ART. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fourteen thousand dollars (\$14,000.00) for the upkeep of cemeteries to include the replacement of damaged stones due to vandalism.

ART. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to update the Town Tax Maps.

ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for the purpose of updating reappraisal of property.

ART. 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) for the Croydon Volunteer Fire Department.

ART. 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-five hundred dollars (\$3,500.00) for the Police Department.

ART. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to support the Sullivan County Regional Refuse Disposal District.

ART. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to expend from the Solid Waste Fund for the reclamation and restoration of the present dump site to meet requirements of the New Hampshire Bureau of Solid Waste.

ART. 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) for the operation and maintenance of the Town Dump, to include the disposal of solid and hazardous wastes.

ART. 26. To see if the Town will vote to continue the office of Town Clerk/Tax Collector for a three year term commencing March of 1988 contingent upon ongoing practicality.

ART. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for office equipment for the position of Town Clerk/Tax Collector.

ART. 28. To see what provisions the Town will make for a building to house any and all officers of the Town and Agents as may be necessary for the transaction of Town business and to see what sum of money shall be raised and appropriated for the same.

ART. 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) for summer and winter maintenance of roads.

ART. 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00) for the General Expense of the Highway Department.

ART. 31. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to expend the Highway Block Grant Aid for the maintenance of Class 4 and 5 highways, the estimated amount to be twenty thousand three hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$20,375.00).

ART. 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) for the Capital Reserve Fund for New Equipment.

ART. 33. To see if what sum of money the Town will vote to expend from the Capital Reserve Fund for New Equipment for the purchase of a new Town Truck.

ART. 34. To see if the Town will vote to construct a Town Garage for the Highway Department and to raise and appropriate such sum of money as deemed necessary.

ART. 35. To see if the Town will vote to incorporate the policies and guidelines of Expanded Elderly Exemption.

ART. 36. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Town's representatives to the Court to take all necessary measures to insure that no low level radioactive waste from the Seabrook nuclear plant shall be stored or disposed of within this Town of Croydon unless and until the proposed site of the proposed storage or disposal has been approved by the voters of the Town at the annual Town Meeting by written ballot.

ART. 37. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

(Marilyn Thorson resigned and Jane Chworowsky was appointed to fill the position.)	

The Town voted to raise and appropriate a total of \$86,526.46 which are itemized on Page 18 of this report.

Under Article #3, the Selectmen were authorized to spend the Highway Block Grant Aid.

Art. 27. Federal Grant. The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to apply for any and all federal grants as may be available.

Art. 28. Combining the offices of Town Clerk & Tax Collector. After some discussion and explanation of the article, a paper ballot was taken with the following results ...27 YES in favor of combining the two offices into one elected office for a one (1) year term commencing March 1987, and 13 NO not in favor of combining.

Art. 29. Salary for the Town Clerk/Tax Collector. After several motions were made and amended, the Town voted to pay the Town Clerk/Tax Collector at the rate of \$5.25 per hour, not to exceed \$8,190.00 per year. Fees would be remitted to the Town and when the Deputy Town Clerk/Tax Collector substitutes for the Town Clerk/Tax Collector, they will receive the same hourly wage of \$5.25.

Art. 30. Addition to the Town Hall. Following a motion and several amendments, with discussion, the Town voted to construct an addition to the Town Hall and apply for a feasibility grant to fund the same AND STUDY THE STRUCTURAL INTEGRITY OF THE EXISTING TOWN HALL. This was voted by a vote of 26 YES and 13 NO.

Art. 31. Negotiate a lease. The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate a lease of a building to house the municipal offices and equipment relating thereto should the necessity arise.

Art. 32. Town Garage. The Town voted to consider building a Town Garage for the Highway Department.

Art. 34. RADIOACTIVE WASTE. The Motion, as read by the Moderator and written in the warrant, was amended to delete the word 'transportation'. This was voted by a count of 14 YES and 11 NO. The Town voted to oppose the burial, storage, and production of high level radioactive waste in the Town of Croydon and State of New Hampshire and to call upon Congress to conduct an independent investigation with full public participation into the feasibility and prudence of the U.S. Department of Energy's (DOE's) present plan to dispose of radioactive waste and into the DOE's competence to carry out such a plan.

Art. 35. Cemetery regulations. The article was passed as written in the warrant with no additions or amendments.

Art. 36. Any other business.

A vote was taken on the 'will of the meeting' for holding the business part of the Town Meeting on the Saturday following the Tuesday Town Meeting Day and 20 voted YES in favor of Saturday business meetings and 15 voted NO. The Moderator explained that this must be on a ballot vote to take permanent effect.

Gerald Gross suggested the Selectmen look into the possibility of having Croydon East Village electricity extended from Newport rather than coming in through Grantham as it is now.

Bob Smith asked if the Road Agent had used Town Equipment to plow the Fire Department area and had he been paid for it? The answer was 'yes'.

Donna Leslie said the Town owed Jules Pellerin a vote of thanks for persevering on the Sichel Swamp controversy. All the proposed dams have been permanently dropped. (Hand clapping followed).

Harry Newcomb mentioned that the people appearing before the Planning Board are becoming very knowledgeable and even have lawyers with them...to the best of his knowledge, there are only 2 legally appointed members on the Planning Board and he felt this situation should be remedied.

William Walsh suggested that the Selectmen give a presentation for the need of an Administrative Assistant.

The meeting adjourned at 5:05 PM.

**Town Regulations For  
CROYDON CEMETERIES  
(March 1987)**

1968 Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to charge a fee for all burial lots: The receipts from these fees to offset general cemetery expenses.

Art. 24. Fee for Burial Lots — It was voted to lay the article on the table until next March. Harry Newcomb, Gerald Gross, Janet Pellerin were appointed a Committee to report on size of lots, fees and other recommendations which, if accepted, would be retroactive to this meeting. The Superintendent of Cemeteries was instructed by the Selectmen not to put any new names on the cemetery maps.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to guarantee a rate of \$50.00 for grave preparations: the Town to pay the balance not covered by other sources.

The motion was passed as written. Affirmative.

1969 Art. 26. Any other business...Report of the Cemetery Committee.

There are six public cemeteries in the Town of Croydon: Under-the-Mountain Cemetery, the East Village, Croydon Flat, Four Corners, Pinnacle and the Putnam. The remaining lots in these cemeteries are to be sold on an individual lot basis, except for the Under-the-Mountain Cemetery.

For the purposes of clarification, a "resident" is defined as a person who has resided in the town of Croydon for not less than three years consecutively. However, it is understood that at times there will be extenuating circumstances when a resident will not have resided here for three years, and this fact will be taken into consideration by the proper authorities.

**PROPOSED REGULATIONS**

Croydon residents may purchase the remaining lots in these cemeteries except for the Under-the-Mountain Cemetery, on an individual or family plot basis, which is not to exceed four graves, and a lot being a single grave-site.

With the limited space available in these cemeteries it would be impossible to determine an exact size of a lot because of the pre-existing lay-out.

The fee for the remaining lots in all the public cemeteries shall be \$50.00 (Fifty Dollars) per individual lot. If the family decides not to use the lots already purchased, they must revert back to the town at which time the purchase price will be refunded, and if the lot is not used within 100 years of the purchase date, it shall revert back to town ownership without any refund of monies. The monies received from the sale of cemetery lots will be placed in a general cemetery fund, the interest from which will be used for the perpetual care of the cemeteries.

The lots in the new part of the Croydon Flat Cemetery have already been laid out in 4 ft. by 11 ft. lots and the foregoing regulations shall also apply to it. All grave stones in this new section of the cemetery shall be flush with the ground except those already established.

Each lot shall have a permanent marker bearing sufficient vital statistics to identify the grave. (Applies to all cemeteries.)

Complete permanent records shall be kept by a superintendent of cemeteries or other responsible agencies.

(Town Clerk's Notation...There are 7 cemeteries in Town. No mention was made of the cemetery which has a map for it and called "Winter Hill" Cemetery. Located where the Newcomb's now, 1970, live)

1969 The hour being late and the Cemetery Report being rather full of discussion possibilities, the motion was made to accept the report as read and action to be



taken at a later date. Passed in the affirmative.

1970 Art. 22. To see what action the Town will take on the Cemetery Report and raise and appropriate any sums necessary.

Art. 22. Cemetery Report. The Town voted to accept the regulations of the cemetery report as drawn up by the Cemetery Committee (Gerald Gross, Janet Pellerin, and Harry Newcomb) with the additional paragraph which had been left out of last years' report, "These regulations will not affect any lots that have already been established or the markers thereon." There was an amendment to this motion that was also passed — the Selectmen shall appoint a Superintendent of Cemeteries to be responsible for enforcing the regulations.

1981 Art. 27. Any other business: The Cemetery Committee would like to add another regulation... "To amend the Cemetery Regulations of 1969 to allow the issuance of 2' X 2' lots for Cremation Burials and the price to be \$25.00. A marker, flush with the ground, with vital statistics to be placed in the center of said lots". This was passed in the affirmative with the understanding that if you had a \$50.00 lot and wished to be cremated, you could still be placed therein but if you only wished one small lot, you would choose the 2' X 2' for \$25.00 (as stated above.) This was passed in the affirmative.

1986 Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to update the cemetery regulations to read:

"For the purpose of clarification, a "resident" is defined as a person who has resided in the town of Croydon for not less that three years prior to acquiring the lots. However, it is understood that at times there will be extenuating circumstances when a resident will not have resided for three years, and this will be taken into consideration by the Cemetery Committee. A person must purchase deeds to a lot within six months of leaving Town."

A section of the Croydon Flat Cemetery will be reserved for single cremations. The size of the lot will be 2 feet by 2 feet and sell for \$25.00. All other regulations pertaining to the Croydon Flat Cemetery will apply.

Only four (4) cremation urns will be allowed on a regular sized lot.

Installation of all markers, stones and foundations must be with the knowledge of and meet the approval of the Cemetery Committee.

Art. 35. Cemetery regulations...S. Speer/Donna Leslie...The article passed as written in the warrant...with no additions or amendments.

## REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1985 and June 1986, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The two leading causes of forest fires were again children and fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden. Both causes are preventable, but only with **your** help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden.

If you own forest land, you became responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

## CROYDON VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

1986 was not a year of large fires or heavy property loss in the Town of Croydon, but we did have our share of calls. They consisted of numerous chimney fires and chimney cleaning, a variety of electrical fires, due mostly to faulty wiring, and a greater than usual number of calls to motor vehicle accidents.

I would like to think that our excellent fire record is the direct results of fire prevention practiced year-round by Croydon residents.

We have four more firemen certified by the State of N.H. and will continue this policy for all new Fire Department members.

The annual auction was a real success and helped to reduce the "balance due" on engine three.

The brush and grass fire situation in Croydon was well under control, due mainly to inclement weather during our peak fire season. A word of caution to all Croydon residents; both, seasonal and year-round, any fire kindled outside on the ground; except for a charcoal grill must have a written permit from the fire warden.

A final word of caution; a smoke detector is the cheapest insurance you can buy, but

it also has a "premium due" each year. Remember to replace the battery every fall; or in the case of 120 volt A.C. type detectors; mandatory in new construction after 1984, they should be tested weekly to insure the best protection.

## **REPORT OF THE BUILDING OFFICIAL**

As the building boom across the area remained unabated in 1986 Croydon continued to keep pace. Construction projects in town increased in number for the fourth year in a row, with 1986 experiencing nearly a 50% increase in permits over the previous year. I issued 32 permits last year compared to 22 in 1985.

Perhaps of greatest interest in this big increase is not the quantity of permits but the types of projects undertaken. In 1985 most permits were for small projects and only one new home was started. Last year that number zoomed to eight. (Has Croydon been "discovered"? If so, is that good or bad?)

I also issued permits in 1986 for the construction of five barns, five sheds, four home additions, three mobile home installations, two garages, two porches, two decks, and a chicken coup.

I would like to remind everyone that the State of New Hampshire requires that an approved septic system be obtained from the Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission before a mobile home can be installed or a new home built. I can advise further on this matter as to procedures, etc.

If anyone needs advice (I am a builder with 14 years experience) before starting a new construction project, or to merely obtain a permit, please feel open to contact me at my residence on the North Newport Road or by phone at 863-1764. Except where septic approval is involved, most permits are issued promptly. All cost \$1.00.

The Planning Board for the Town of Croydon met in the Town Hall the first Monday of every month in 1986 and one special meeting was held on October 13, 1986 for the sole purpose of expediting a request for subdivision.

The Board Members reviewed fifteen requests for subdivision of land in Croydon. Twelve requests were approved, two were denied and one subdivider asked for postponement.

The criteria of decision in each case was in the best interest of your Town and the residents and landowners of Croydon participated fully and the Planning Board Members thank you.

We are now confronted with a mandate from the State of New Hampshire to implement and conduct regulations that control excavations and restorations. The mandate will not be a simple burden to bear; but it will protect your children, rights to clean water and the beauty of your town. Our efforts in this matter will again be for the best interest of your town and will necessitate the cooperation of all.

We can foresee other situations that will require your assistance, and in conclusion we want you to know our meetings are open to you all and we invite you to sit in at any time.

**UPPER VALLEY LAKE SUNAPEE COUNCIL**

The Upper Valley Sunapee Council is a public, non-profit voluntary association of towns and cities in the Upper Valley and Lake Sunapee areas. Our thirty-one (31) communities are in two states and five counties.

The Council consists of a Board of Directors and a professional staff. Each town or city annually appropriates funds for the Council's operation and sends two representatives to participate on the Board of Directors. The Board elects officers, adopts the annual work program and budget, and develops policies and positions on issues that are important to our communities.

The Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council is the official organization that brings towns and cities within our region together. By bonding together and pooling their resources, local governments have a highly trained, professional staff available to them for a wide variety of services. Areas of expertise include land use planning, master planning, economic and community development, water quality management, transportation, landscape architecture, housing, capital budgeting, historic preservation, downtown revitalization, solid waste planning, recreation and fiscal and environmental impact analysis. The Council also serves as a collective voice for these towns and cities in dealings with state and federal governments, thereby protecting and furthering the needs and interests of our communities.



Half of your local dues to the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council supports regional planning and regional programs. Over the past year, the Council:

- prepared the Upper Valley Solid Waste District Management Plan and provided administrative services to the Solid Waste District;
- sponsored and helped organize the Upper Valley Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program and provided assistance to the New London League of Women Voters to help create a similar collection program in the New London area;
- worked with several communities in the Lake Sunapee area to develop a solution to their septage disposal problem;
- maintained our regional data base, including our role as a Regional Data Center for the U.S. Bureau of the Census and updated and published the Economic Profile of the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Region which is the primary source of economic and demographic data for our region;
- provided an Economic Development Agent for Sullivan County to help retain and expand employment opportunities in the area;
- testified on several bills before the legislature, including the Connecticut River Resource Authority Bill, and distributed summaries of new and amended legislation to our communities;
- testified on Vermont's 5-year highway plan and New Hampshire's 10-year highway plan;
- sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture Series;
- sponsored two meetings on groundwater protection and distributed model ordinances to each community in the region;
- provided administrative services to the Upper Valley Community Land Trust and worked with the Connecticut River Watershed Council, Hanover Conservation Council and Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests to negotiate voluntary conservation easements and deed restrictions to protect open space and conservation lands;
- continued the regional historic preservation program, including historic surveys, national register nominations and historic preservation plans;
- coordinated efforts to secure state funding for the Upper Valley Transportation Study and the Cheshire Bridge and completed numerous traffic studies for our communities;
- provided technical assistance to Advance Transit and County Coach;
- helped over a dozen communities seek state and federal grant funds by providing technical assistance, data and in most cases, preparing the grant applications;
- conducted a survey of application fees for local land use regulations and distributed the survey results to several communities;
- met on numerous occasions with state department heads and legislators to discuss the needs and interests of our communities; and
- updated and amended the Regional Land Use Plan.

As requested by communities, the Council conducted a large number of impact studies concerning proposed developments, prepared amendments to local subdivision, zoning, site plan review, and earth excavation regulations and provided mapping, drafting and other technical assistance.

The Council also provided direct services to the Town of Croydon over the past year. For example, the Council provided information concerning earth excavation regulations and advised the Town on procedures for adopting local land use regulations. We

also conducted a great deal of research on potential land-based septage disposal sites in Croydon and the surrounding towns in an effort to solve the town's septage disposal problem.

The Council's staff of professionals stands ready to assist your community in addressing the planning and growth management issues which you will face during the coming year. We also encourage you to become more familiar and involved with the Council, since we are essentially an arm of local government addressing your needs.

## **NEWPORT AREA HOME HEALTH AGENCY**

Throughout 1986 the Newport Area Home Health Agency continued to provide high quality professional nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy, and speech therapy services plus paraprofessional home health aide services to homebound patients throughout its service area. Well child services including immunizations and physical exams, dental clinics, and safety carseat loans were extensively utilized. Blood pressure screening and influenza immunization were methods used to promote good health in the adult population. The registered physical therapist conducted an 8 week flexibility and posture class at the Newport Senior Center.

In keeping with its commitment to provide comprehensive health care services to towns the Newport Area Home Health Agency developed a home assistance program (HAP) to provide aide, companion, and nursing services to patients not eligible for medicare or other insurance coverage. The fee for these services is billed to the patient and/or their family.

The year 1986 was a trying one for Newport Area Home Health Agency and other home care providers as the State and Federal Government attempted to initiate cost containment measures despite the growing recognition of the importance of home health to reduce hospitalizations. In March through September 1% of every medicare billing was deducted from Home Health Agency payments under the Gramm-Rudman Amendment. This meant that the town appropriations were used to fund a portion of every visit to a medicare patient during 7 months of 1986. In addition, medicaid reimbursement to care for low income patients was changed from a per visit to a per unit reimbursement in May resulting in less than full recovery of costs for services. Again town appropriations were used to fund a portion of every visit to a medicaid patient.

Therefore, your town appropriations serve as an "insurance" that essential nursing and clinic services continue uninterrupted to those residents who are in need of care.

Your support and confidence in our agency makes it possible for Newport Area Home Health to continue to provide cost effective home health care.

We wish to thank the staff, board of trustees, and volunteers who made the provision of excellent care in 1986 possible. Special public thanks are sent to Mrs. Connie Mountain who "resigned" as a well child clinic volunteer after serving at 109 clinics since she began in 1977!

## SCHOOL WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the School District, in the Town of Croydon, in the County of Sullivan, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the 10th day of March, 1987, at 9:00 a.m. to act upon the Articles set forth in this Warrant. Articles 1-5 covering the election of District Officers will be acted upon at 9:00 a.m. Voting will be by official ballot and checklists, and the polls will remain open for this purpose from 9:00 a.m. until at least 6:00 p.m. At 10:00 a.m. the remaining Articles will be acted upon.

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 4. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

ARTICLE 5. To choose an Auditor for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 6. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 7. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District; and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from State sources together with income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the revenue and appropriation which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,000.00 as a deficit appropriation to the 1986-87 budget for the purpose of meeting the costs of transportation, tuition, insurance and Special Education; and to instruct the Clerk to issue a certificate therefor to the Selectmen of the Town of Croydon.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the District will vote to appropriate the amount of any unencumbered balance, not to exceed \$25,000.00, accruing in the 1986-87 budget as of June 30, 1987, to establish a Capital Reserve-Special Education, to meet the expenses of educating handicapped children.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action of the School District Meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the fiscal year, as outlined under RSA 198:20-b, provided that (1) such money is used for legal purposes for which a school district may appropriate money, (2) the School Board holds a public hearing on the expenditure of such money before it is expended, and (3) the expenditure of such money does not require the expenditure of other School District funds.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the District will vote to indemnify and save harmless for loss, damage or violation of the civil rights of an employee, teacher or student; all school officials and employees in accordance with RSA 31:105 and RSA 31:106.



ARTICLE 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Croydon School District:

Research shows that the role of parents in the education of their children is extremely important. The following research findings were taken from *WHAT WORKS — RESEARCH ABOUT TEACHING AND LEARNING* which was developed and printed by the U.S. Department of Education. I cite these to again emphasize the role the family, more specifically the parents, must play in the education of their children.

- 1) Parents are their children's first and most influential teachers. What parents do to help their children learn is more important to academic success than how well-off the family is.
- 2) The best way for parents to help their children become better readers is to read to them — even when they are very young. Children benefit most from reading aloud when they discuss stories, learn to identify letters and words, and talk about the meaning of words.
- 3) Children improve their reading ability by reading a lot. Reading achievement is directly related to the amount of reading children do in school and outside.
- 4) A good way to teach children simple arithmetic is to build on their informal knowledge. This is why learning to count everyday objects is an effective basis for early arithmetic lessons.
- 5) Children who are encouraged to draw and scribble "stories" at an early age will later learn to compose more easily, more effectively, and with greater confidence than children who do not have this encouragement.
- 6) A good foundation in speaking and listening helps children become better readers.
- 7) Many highly successful individuals have above-average but not extraordinary intelligence. Accomplishment in a particular activity is often more dependent upon hard work and self-discipline than on innate ability.
- 8) Belief in the value of hard work, the importance of personal responsibility, and the importance of education itself contributes to greater success in school.

The Croydon Village School has made significant improvements over the past several years in both curriculum and appearance of the building. This has been due to the initiative and hard work of both the teacher, Charles Brettell, and the Assistant Superintendent of Schools, Anne Segal.

In spite of these improvements and what we now consider a good educational program, there is still much to be done to bring the Village School up to the new State Elementary Standards. Croydon currently is designated as a Category III school. In order to be considered in the highest category (1A), the following areas would need to be implemented:

1. public kindergarten
2. a school library with a minimum materials collection — such as books and magazines along with the services of a part-time, certified school librarian
3. part-time guidance counselor
4. part-time art instruction by a certified instructor



These are things which the School Board and School District will need to work on in the future so that the Croydon students will have the same opportunities and advantages of other students in surrounding towns.

My thanks to Anne Segal, Charles Brettell and the School Board for their continued efforts to bring quality education to the students in Croydon.

## **REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF PUPIL PERSONNEL SERVICES**

Special Education services are available to every student in the Croydon School District. The Croydon Village School has a pupil placement team consisting of the child's classroom teacher, school psychologist, speech/language pathologist and if necessary, the Director of Pupil Personnel Services. When a child is in need of special education services, the team together with the parents, plan and develop an individualized educational program designed to meet the educational needs of the student.

The Croydon School District has five handicapped students. All of these students have language and learning disabilities and receive their special education services in the Newport Public Schools. At this time, there are no handicapped students in the Croydon Village School.

School Administrative Unit #43 is currently in the process of establishing a regional special class for emotionally handicapped students. This class will be located at Sunapee Elementary School and will serve children between the ages of six and ten.

In closing, I want to thank our teachers, parents, and School Board members for their continued support of our exceptional children. I encourage you to visit your local school's special education programs as well as our regional School Administration Unit programs located in New London (Pre-School), mentally retarded (Newport), and emotionally disturbed (Sunapee). Please drop in and see first-hand the excellent work our teachers are doing in educating your special children.
