RECORD OF THE 1966 TOWN MEETING

Hampton Falls, N. H.

March 8, 1966

Hampton Falls Town Meeting was called to order at 3 o'clock by the Moderator, who read the warrant.

Supervisors took oath, there were 549 names on the checklist of those qualified to vote in town affairs, they also certified to the posting of the checklist.

Ballots were counted and 600 were found to be the number to be used. Polls were declared open at 3:11.

The business meeting was called to order at 7:30 by the Moderator, Richard Bohm, and the flag was saluted by the assembly.

A motion was made by Donald Janvrin, seconded by Alphonse Lemire that the meeting be postponed until 8 o'clock to give those fighting the fire at the Lindly Shaw home a chance to atend. Motion carried.

At 8 o'clock Francis Ferreira made a motion to postpone the meeting another half hour, to 8:30. Seconded by William Ackroyd. Carried.

Called to order at 8:30. The Moderator ruled: "Once an article taken up in the Budget or Warrant is finished, no further action may be taken on it, with the exception of one reconsideration in case of error or misunderstanding. There will be a limit of two (2) amendments to any article or any motion or part of a specific article. Any lengthy motion shall be submitted to the Moderator in writing." As the Warrant was read at 3 o'clock in its entirety, it was not read again at this time.

ARTICLE 2. — Motion was made by George Pond to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,200.00 for Town Officers salaries. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Carried.

Motion was made by Donald Janvrin, seconded by Jeanie Edgerly, that the sum of \$1,800.00 be raised and

appropriated for Town Officers expenses. Motion carried.

Ralph Farley made a motion to raise and appropriate \$475.00 for Election and Registration expenses. Seconded by Andrew Drakides. Carried.

Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin, seconded by Arnold Rasmussen to raise and appropriate the sum of \$720.00 for expenses of Town Hall. Carried.

Motion was made by Donald Janvrin, seconded by George Pond that the sum of \$100.00 be raised and appropriated for Employees Retirement and Social Security. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Alphonse Lemire the sum of \$1,500.00 be raised and appropriated for Police Department, this sum to include police uniforms, radio for Police Officer Robert Weaver's car, flares, etc., to be approved by the Selectmen. Motion was not seconded. Motion was made by Ralph Farley, seconded by George Pond the sum of \$1,000.00 be raised and appropriated for Police Department. Motion was made to amend by Alphonse Lemire, seconded by Daniel DeWitt to change the sum \$1,000.00 to \$1,250.00. Motion to amend did not carry. Original motion carried.

Motion was made by Donald Janvrin, seconded by Edward Pevear to pass over "Care of Trees", "Fire Department", "White Pine Blister Rust Control", "Special for Fire Truck", "Town Road Aid" and "Seacoast Regional and Development Association" until taken up under special articles in the Town Warrant Carried.

Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin, seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 for Insurance. Motion was made by Donald Janvrin to amend the motion to read "raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Insurance. Seconded by George Vigneau. Carried.

Motion was made by Donald Janvrin, seconded by

Ralph Farley to raise and appropriate \$150.00 for Planning and Zoning. Carried.

Motion was made by George Pond that \$500.00 be raised and appropriated for Damages and Legal expenses. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Ralph Farley, seconded by William Ackroyed the sum of \$25.00 be raised and appropriated for Health Department. Carried.

Motion was made by Ralph Farley to raise and appropriate \$50.00 for Vital Statistics. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Motion carried.

Gordon Janvrin made a motion to raise and appropriate \$900.00 for the Town Dump. Seconded by Alphonse Lemire. Motion to amend by Robert Weaver, seconded by Arvid Gustavson, the dump be kept open seven days a week, twenty-four hours a day. 45 Yes. 40 No. Amendment carried. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Donald Janvrin ,seconded by Alphonse Lemire the sum of \$300.00 be raised and appropriated for Brush Removal. Carried.

Motion was made by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for Town Maintenance, Summer. Motion carried.

Motion was made to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for Town Maintenance, Winter, by Donald Janvrin. Seconded by George Pond. Carried.

Motion was made by Ralph Farley to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for Street Lighting. Seconded by Arnold Rasmussen. Carried.

George Pond made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for Tarvia. Seconded by Ralph Farley. Carried.

Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,045.00 for Libraries. Seconded by Alphonse Lemire. Carried.

Motion was made by Ralph Farley, seconded by Don-

ald Janvrin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for Town Poor. Carried.

Motion was made by Donald Janvrin, seconded by Ralph Farley to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00 for Old Age Assistance and A. P. T. D. (Aid to persons totally disabled.) Carried.

Edward Pevear made a motion to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for Memorial Day and Veterans Association. Seconded by John Trumbull. Carried.

Motion was made by Louis Janvrin the sum of \$200.00 be raised and appropriated for Parks. Carried It was agreed that during the summer the Boy Scouts would raise and lower the flag on the common week-ends if the weather was fair and Russell Merrill Jr. on the smaller triangle, Routes 1 and 84.

Motion was made by Ralph Sanborn, seconded by Edward Pevear to raise and appropriate the sum of \$310.00 for Cemeteries. Carried.

Eugene Heal made a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$52.00 for the care of the clock. Duly seconded. Carried.

Motion was made by Louis Janvrin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for Interest in Temporary Loans. Seconded by George Pond. Carried.

Motion was made by Louis Janvrin the sum of \$490.00 be raised and appropriated for Interest of Long Term Notes and Bonds. Seconded by George Pond. Carried.

Ralph Farley reported there had been a \$100.00 deposit made to the B. and M. Railroad, the deed is to be delivered to the Selectmen within 30 days. The total cost \$1,000.00 for approximately 4 acres.

Donald Janvrin made a motion to raise and appropriate the 4sum of \$2,440.00 for payment on the Principal of Long Term Notes. Seconded by George Pond. Carried. Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin the sum of \$9,000.00 be raised and appropriated for County Taxes. Seconded by Edward Pevear. Carried.

ARTICLE 3. — Motion was made by Alphonse Lemire, seconded by Arvid Gustavson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,898.86 in payment for services to the Town by the Hampton Falls Volunteer Fire Department. Carried.

ARTICLE 4. — Motion was made by Donald Janvrin, seconded by Alphonse Lemire to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to add to the Capital Reserve Fund which was started in 1965 for a new Fire Truck. Motion carried.

ARTICLE 5. — Motion was made by George Pond to raise and appropriate the sum of \$306.43 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$2,042.87. Seconded by Donald Janvrin. Carried.

ARTICLE 6. — Motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 was made by Donald Janvrin for Control of White Pine Blister Rust, in Cooperation with the New Hampshire Department of Resources and Economic Development. Seconded by Ralph Farley. Carried.

ARTICLE 7. — Motion was made by William Ackroyd to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to make safer and improve that part of Drinkwater Road at and approaching the bend and bridge near the bottom of the "Dump Hill" on the east, and of the "Brown Hill" on the west, near the present Herbert E. Gilson residence, by installing a longer culvert to widen the bridge area, and also by widening and smoothing the road and strengthening the shoulders of the road on both sides of the bridge, where most needed. Seconded by Lloyd Fiske. Motion carried.

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ARTICLE 8. — Motion was made by Ralph Farley, seconded by Donald Janvrin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 toward the removal of infected trees. Carried.

ARTICLE 9. — Motion was made by Gordon Janvrin, seconded by Mark Kelley to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to paint the outside of the library, to purchase two (2) new book stacks, to repair the front steps, and make any other necessary repairs. Carried.

ARTICLE 10. — Motion was made by Andrew Drakides to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Hampton, Hampton Falls Youth Association. Seconded by Arvid Gustavson. Carried.

ARTICLE 11. Motion was made by John Trumbull to pass over this article. Seconded by Robert Davies. Carried.

ARTICLE 12. — Motion was made by George Pond, seconded by Ralph Farley to pass over. The road is in no condition now to be oiled. Carried.

ARTICLE 13. — Motion was made by Ralph Farley, seconded by Alphonse Lemire to pass over this article. Motion Carried.

ARTICLE 14. — Motion was made by Louis Janvrin, seconded by Edward Pevear, to give the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Carried.

ARTICLE 15. — Motion was made by Louis Janvrin seconded by Francis Ferreira to give the Selectmen authority to sell any property acquired by tax sale. Carried.

Articles 16 through 22 are a separate ballot.

ARTICLE 23. — Arvid Gustavson nominated Warren and Barbara Kinsman as Hog Reevers for 1966, seconded by Edward Pevear. Russell Merrill made a motion the nominations be closed, seconded by John Trumbull. Warren and Barbara Kinsman were declared Hog Reevers for 1966 and took the oath of office in open meeting. They were presented with the Badge of Office by Past Hog Reever, Robert Shillaber.

The Moderator declared a 10 minute recess. At the call to order John Starvish made a motion the polls be closed at 10:45. Seconded by John Trumbull. Carried.

The men of the department have worked hard to acquire this equipment for your protection, as well as running four suppers to help us financially.

The Ladies Auxiliary deserves a great deal of thanks for all the assistance they give us; financially or giving of their time, when the call arises, for serving coffee and refreshments.

In the way of special assignments, the Department assisted the Hampton Fall Police Department last Novemebr 10th in a man hunt for a missing patient from the Plimpton Nursing Home, the search being carried out for three days.

I am proud of the men in the Department and hope that we can serve you, the townspeople, as well in the coming year, 1967.

Not listed in the report was much appreciated help received from neighboring communities, local volunteers, State and U. S. Federal Governments. The amounts expended by the above listed parties amounted to well in excess of \$4,500.

Unfortunately, we found it impossible to stay within the budget as appropriated, due to the numerous unforeseen problems which arose during the past year.



HAMPTON FALLS SCHOOL WARRANT STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Hampton Falls, in the County of Rockingham, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote upon District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in Hampton Falls, on the Tenth Day of March 1967, at Four P.M. in the aftrnoon, and to cast ballots for candidates for the following District Offices:

- 1. Moderator for the ensuing year.
- 2. Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subjects embraced in this Warrant.

You are also notified to meet at the same place at Eight O'clock in the evening of the same day to act upon the following subjects.

- 6. To see what action the District will take in relation to reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen.
- 7. To see if the District will vote to authorize the construction and equipping of additions to the Lincoln Akerman School and alterations to the existing plant for use for school purposes; to provide such school facilities as have been generally

described in certain preliminary drawings by Douglas Prescott, Architect, and further to see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Sixty-One Thousand Dollars (\$61,000.00) for such purposes, and whether the District will vote to raise such sum through issuance of notes and - or bonds upon credit of the District for all or any portions of the sum so raised and appropriated and will vote to authorize the School Board to negotiate, and issue such notes and bonds, and to fix the rate of interest and all other terms thereof, and to take such other action as may be required to effectuate the purpose of this vote in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act RSA Chapter 33 and any amendments relating thereto and to see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make applications for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and the United States Government or any agency thereof. or take any other action in connection with the foregoing matters, or any of them, which may be desirable or necessary.

Note: Although this article calls for a total appropriation of \$61,000, the School Board proposes to issue bonds for \$55,000 and take the remainder from the capital reserve fund established for this purpose (see article 8 below). The proposed building and estimated costs are described on a separate building brochure.

8. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board, as agents of the District, to withdraw such capital reserve funds of the District as are being held in trust by the Trustee of Trust Funds for the purpose of "constructing and equipping an addition or additions to the Lincoln Akerman School and alterations to the existing plant."

Note: For two years the voters, by District vote, have placed money in the named capital reserve fund. Approximately \$5,320.00 is in this fund and the School Board proposes to now use this money toward completion of the school addition (see article 7 above).

- 9. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Members of the School Board:

I herewith submit my first annual report to school board members and citizens of this school district.

My duties as superintendent of schools officially commenced on September 15, 1966. This date was set jointly by the Portsmouth Board of Education and the School Boards of Supervisory Union No. 21

Shortly after my appointment in August, I was extended several invitations to visit schools and attend school board sessions as well as participate in the week-long meetings of your school principals and administrators later in August.

Early in my tenure here I came to realize that you have been and are sincerely interested in providing a quality education for your children. I have observed your school staff as ambitious, dedicated and cooperative professionals.

However, we must not become complacent in thinking that all must remain the same - - not in this day and age of rapid change. Already we are at work locally as professionals in studying our curriculum to keep it in focus with day-to-day advances. A good school system incidentally is judged by this very factor, among others. At this writing we are studying our social studies curriculum, modern foreign languge program, art and music programs with the hope of providing needed continuity in all grade levels.

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A great deal has been reported to you in the area of federally assisted programs under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (PL 89-10). Suffice it to say that our local school districts have benefited tremendously from these programs. Early in January, 1967 one phase of our Title I program will begin under the direction of Miss Sweetser. This program will provide small group instruction to students who have been identified as "educationally deprived" in need of special help in the academic areas. Statistics and experience tell us that these are the children whose number is rising and who get short - changed, educationally speaking, in the regular classroom of 30 to 40 children.

Title II is continuing to enhance our libraries. I may add here that I am impressed with the emphasis Hampton Falls has placed on improving library facilities and services. So vital to a good school, the library paves the way for increased knowledge and skills and, it is hoped, creates an awareness and interest in reading for pleasure.

Under Title III we are involved in two projects locally. In Cooperation with WENH-TV, Channell 11, in Durham, a grant was authorized which provided up-dated inservice education for teachers in Art and Science. The Instructional Materials Center under the able direction of Mr. Brooks is directly responsible for instructional improvement at all levels. I see evidence of the Center's influence each time I visit schools and classrooms. Through this facility teachers have come to realize that teaching methods can and must change. The learning rate of our students has gained speed and momentum with each passing day. We therefore are charged with adjusting our program accordingly.

The nation's school population is growing with each school year. Here in Hampton Falls we are feeling the effects of the need for additional classrooms. We find ourselves in this dilemma due to housing problems in Hampton. I think it wise indeed for Hampton Falls to retain its sixth graders locally. By so doing we will need additional classroom space. Your school Board members and school administrators are presently preparing the way for what will be adequate additional facilities to meet this need.

With the coming of a new set of elementary school guidelines in New Hampshire 1, we are committed to the principles of sound planning and true evaluation of what future elementary school buildings should be like if we are to meet the many new challenges facing schools in the '60's.

1. Guidelines and Recommendations for New Hampshire Public Elementary Schools (K-6) Department of Education, Concord, N. H., 1966.

It has been and always will be my sincere intent to keep the public informed about local, state and national educational affairs. It is my job to keep school board members informed of developments regarding organization, programming and staffing of schools under their jurisdiction. My affiliation with several national, regional and state educational groups assists me in passing on much information which applies to our local school problems.

Since there has been and should be a continued interest in consolidation of school districts in this state as well as in the nation, the reactivation of the Cooperative Study Committee seemed advisable early in my tenure here. A reorganization session has been held with appointed representatives from Hampton, Hampton Falls and North Hampton present. Future meetings of subcommittees have been set for early January and

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February, 1967. I expect that the results of the research will be of interest to all residents of Hampton Falls.

This supervisory union has been conducting two special education classes offered to those young people who have learning disabilities. While this type of program may be called expensive by a few of our critics, your school administrators are convinced that we must continue to offer special programs geared specifically to ability and achievement levels. The Town of Hampton has housed these classes for the past few years.

Our school enrollment figures, based upon December 23, 1966 are presented below:

Tuition pupils are listed elsewhere under school statistics.

The past few months have been challenging ones for me. They have been quite revealing for I have observed dedicated and competent staff members at work in each building. Our schools administrators are providing the kind of assistance, implementation and supervision of curriculum and personnel that makes for a most satisfactory school system.

I have high admiration for the unselfish manner in which individual school board members carry on their difficult and time-consuming roles as public servants - their interest and dedication is commendable.

The Supervisory Union Office Staff is deserving of a great deal of praise for the efficient manner in which they carry on the business affairs for eight separate school districts.
