## TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hancock on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
  - 2. To elect a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$94.00 for the Monadnock Region Association or take any action relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to provide supervision, repairs and maintenance of the bathing beach, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an adequate sum of money for Workmen's Compensation and Public Liability Insurance, or take any action relating thereto.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,422.00 for state aid construction, to be held for future use on the Forest road, the state to contribute \$2,844.00, or take any action relating thereto.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for state aid construction, the state to furnish the balance to finish the Forest road, or take any action relating thereto.
- 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate such sum of money as is asked for by the State Highway Department for town road aid, the state to contribute four times the amount, or take any action relating thereto.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum adequate to finish the road from the mill to Tuttle Corner started last year, or take any action relating thereto.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, \$3,200.00, adequate to purchase a snow plow for the tractor, or take any action relating thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to build a tool house at a cost of approximately \$10,000.00, to raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.
- 13. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day and Old Home Day, or take any action relating thereto.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White P8ne Blister Rust in cooperation with the State Forestry Department, or take any action relating thereto.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for the chlorination of the water supply as required by the state or take any action relating thereto.
- 16. To see if the Town will approve an agreement between the United States of America and the Town of Hancock, providing for alterations on Windy Row and Middle Hancock Roads in connection with the West Peterborough Dam and Reservoir Project, and authorize the Selectmen to enter into and execute the said agreement in the name and behalf of the Town of Hancock, and do all other acts or things necessary or incidental thereto, or take any action relating thereto.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to sell all or any part of its electric lighting system, or take any action relating thereto.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to make any extension or addition to its electric lighting system and raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to renovate the interior of the Town Hall, or take any action relating thereto.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$150.00 for flag belt and standards, or take any action relating thereto.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to buy a tank truck for the Fire Department and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

- 22. To see if the Town will vote to install a fire hydrant at or near the home of H. Thorn King, and raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to extend the water main and install a fire hydrant on Stoddard Road near Howard Dorry's, and raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to buy and improve a cemetery, or take any action relating thereto.
- 25. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action relating thereto.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of one percent on property taxes paid on or before August 15, 1948, or take any action relating thereto.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the use of the Town, or take any action relating thereto.
- 28. To hear reports of Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and take any action relating thereto.
- 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

# REPORT OF THE ELECTRIC LIGHT COMMITTEE

The total revenue received during the year from the electric lighting system was \$7,333.47. The actual income to the town for the calendar year 1947 was \$8,075.56, but the final settlement was not made in time to appear in the Treasurer's report.

New services were run to the ThriftShop and to the residences of Robert Gardner, Wayne Baldwin, Otis McQuillan and Willis Johnson. Several other services were changed from two wires to three wires because of increased loads.

The load at Camp Neshobe had increased so that the old secondary wires could no longer carry it and a three pole extension of the primary was made on the grounds of the camp to give better service to this customer.

The early fall snow storm of November 12th did extensive damage to our lines. About twenty poles were broken and it was necessary to get outside help to restore service. The expense was so great that not only were we unable to do the trimming we had planned to do in the fall but it was necessary to draw on the Replacement Fund to pay for this damage without exceeding our appropriation.

It seems to your committee that the town must decide very soon whether it wishes to continue to run its electric distribution system. As stated in our last report, we think it desirable to use the new line from Hillsborough to Peterborough as our principal source of current. The present main line is about 6½ miles long, runs through wooded country, is almost impossible to keep trimmed and because of its length, we get a considerable drop in voltage. We have had a preliminary conference with officials of the Public Service Co. of New Hampshire and they also tell us that our main line is not heavy enough to carry the present load without excessive voltage drop. Their first estimate of the cost of building a new sub-station on the Greenfield road and rebuilding the line to the village is \$25,000 to \$30,000. In addition, there is still a lot of trimming that should be done and this past summer, the New England Telephone & Telegraph Co. has made another inspection of jointly owned poles and condemned many of the old chestnut poles. Therefore, it appears that a considerable sum of money will have to be spent on the line to give adequate service.

Your committee does not feel competent to decide what action is for the best interest of the town and we propose to engage the services of an engineer to advise us. We are at present making an inventory of the system and hope to have some plans to present at the annual meeting.

#### FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops, lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New

Hampshire towns.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient properly to equip the available manpower in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 percent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near

woodland.

#### B. ADMINISTRATIVE POLICY

The position of first place in this report is selected for the discussion of the topic of administration not because it is of major importance but because it is the machinery which puts into operation the process for which the schools exist: the instruction of the child. In order that the child may have the educational opportunity which society wishes for him, teachers for subjects from beginning reading to advanced mathematics. debating or metal turning must be procured; buildings with their heating, plumbing and lighting facilities, and building furnishings from clocks to pupils' desks and power saws must be maintained; janitor service must be furnished; instructional materials from textbooks to preserved grasshoppers must be selected and a continuing supply provided, and transportation, safe and comfortable, must be operated. In a democracy the answer to all problems arising from all of these various areas must be found in the light of the welfare of the child. The need for wise decisions in handling these problems is a tremendous challenge to the highest type of educational leadership and cannot come without it but the wisest decisions will be reached and the soundest policies developed not by such leadership alone but will only grow out of a continuous frank and honest cooperative interplay of the interests and energies of professional educators, school boards and intelligent, publicspirited laymen. Man's search for a life of order and peace will be successful only to that degree that education meets the developing challenges of each generation and education will meet those challenges to that extent that those laymen of greatest wisdom and public spirit give of their abilities to the continuing development of the school. The schools belong to the people and must be what the people want. They will be good when the people take time to study their needs carefully and conscientiously and they will fail when the people neglect to support them or support them with money alone. They are a living part of our social existence and they derive their vitality solely from the very life streams of society's individual members. They must continuously receive the radiant energy of the very souls of the people. It is urgent that all take as active a part as possible in those activities that pertain to the school: P. T. A. meetings and committee work, school district meetings, forums for discussion of school matters, etc. The people of the Monadnock Region are constantly evidencing a high interest in cultural and educational matters. We should continue to strive to develop this potentiality into an ever more effective working force for the growth of our schools.

There were no changes in teaching personnel during the 1946-47 school year. However, at the end of the year Mrs. Etta Thurston withdrew to be nearer home. Just before schools were to reopen Mr. Wood was elected to the position left vacant. He received his Bachelor of Education degree from Boston University in 1938 and his Master of Education degree from the same institution in 1946. He had had one year of experience in teaching in elementary schools.

On December 5, 1947 Miss Welsh was stricken ill and since then Mrs. Wood, formerly Elementary Supervisor in Nashua, has been substituting. It is expected that Miss Welsh will be

able to return to her duties in the early Spring.

#### B. Program and Methods

The reading system with correlated material in social studies, science, arithmetic and health adopted last year in the lower grades has been further extended in the intermediate grades this year. These new instructional materials are based upon sound modern instructional methods and are a stimulant to the interests of both pupils and teachers. It is generally recognized that the social concepts the boys and girls get in school today will have much to do with their future happiness and welfare. It is unwise to continue to use textbooks, maps, workbooks, etc., that inculcate concepts not in keeping with our present-day needs. There is still a dearth of modern social studies material on the market but this condition is gradually improving. Another year should see still further progress made in the local schools in the improvement of the educational program and materials of instruction.

Several items in this budget deserve special attention. Last year mention was made of the item for teacher's salaries. Everyone is painfully conscious of the increasing cost of living. In an effort to be reasonably sure of having competent teachers next year a substantial increase over last year's budget item is being recommended. Few teachers in this time of teacher shortage are willing to accept positions where they have to teach more than a single grade. If rural communities are going to compete successfully with larger communities for the few elementary teachers available they must strive in every way to offer attractions to offset the appeal of the job with a single grade. Salary is definitely a factor which prospective teachers consider.

Two other related items commented upon last year were high school and elementary school tuitions. Keene Teachers College has stated definitely that cadet teachers will not be available next year so that institution can continue its relationship with the local high school. In order to continue the school with approximately the same program as it has had the Educational Association trustees estimate a need for \$10,500.00 from the school district in tuitions. An estimate of 35 pupils in grades 9-12 at \$225.00 would make an estimate of \$7,875.00 for the item of high school tuition and 20 pupils in gr. 7-8 at \$135.00 would make an estimate of \$2700 for the item of elementary tuition or a total of approximately the amount asked for by the trustees.

Last summer real progress was made in returning the elementary school building to a reasonable condition of appearance, comfort and sanitation. The first story of the building was insulated to save fuel and to make it possible to heat it to a comfortable temperature even on real cold days; the window sash was painted outside; the classroom floors were sanded and refinished; the retaining wall at the northwest corner of the building was rebuilt with concrete; broken and missing

slates on the roof were replaced and the valleys and eaves were cemented to prevent leaks from ice formation, and cold air registers were installed in the classrooms to permit the circulation of air for easier and more economical heating.

It is still hoped that the toilets may be moved to the first floor from the basement and a teachers' and health room pro-

vided before the end of the school year.

Further major building needs are: (1) painting building outside, (2) repairs to and in some cases replacement of badly worn desks and seats. Also, to preserve the fine appearance of the floors they should be gone over again next summer.

The special appropriation recommended for new equipment is to provide a few needed materials for art work and some type of visual aid materials. Visual aids have come to be regarded as absolute necessities in the up-to-date school. Their value is so great that it is very uneconomical not to have the schools reasonably equipped.

#### PART V. AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES & SPEC. REPORTS

#### A. School Health Report OLA M. MYHAVER, School Nurse

The following report is the summary of the school health activities at the Hancock schools from Jan. 2, 1947 to December 31, 1947.

In November physical examinations of students were completed by the school physician, Dr. Fredrika Moore, and notices of major defects of children whose parents were not present at the examination of these children at the primary school, were sent out. Also notices of major defects of Jr. and Sr. High School students were sent to parents. Prior to this,

vision and hearing tests were made by the school nurse. The hearing tests were later followed up by tests with the Maico Pure-tone Audiometer. This test is a great improvement over the old procedure. The Snellen chart (letter E) is used for vision testing. Home visits have been made by the nurse after no attention has been paid to the nurse's letters sent out. Cooperation of parents is necessary if corrections are to be made.

All students have been weighed and measured. Parents have been asked to fill out a disease census card for new entrants. This has been recorded on the health card filed for each child

in the school by the school nurse.

A "Hot dish" lunch is served at the primary school (sponsored by the Woman's Club and contributions from A. R. C. (local). At the High School a "Hot dish" lunch is served by the high school girls under the direction of the Home Economics teacher.

Arrangements for attendance at a Child Guidance Clinic were made by the Board of Education (local). A Dental Clinic by Dr. Lawrence at his office was sponsored by the local American Red Cross. A Nose Clinic was conducted at Dr. Walker's home. One tonsillectomy was also sponsored by A. R. C. No child is sent to a clinic without the consent of the parents.

Many defects have been corrected during the year. We have complied with the State Board of Health regarding regulations for the control of communicable diseases. Communicable diseases have been few. There is a first-aid cabinet in

each school equipped for the care of minor injuries.

The School Health Department wishes to express appreciation to all organizations (local and state) that assisted in the School Health Programs and to thank the doctors, eye, ear and nose specialists and dentists for their help and the teachers, principals, Superintendent of Schools, and Board of Education for their cooperation.

  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the district will elect and approve the inclusion of its officers and employees (other than those eligible under the Teachers' Retirement System) in the Employees' Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by Chapter 27A of the Revised Laws, as inserted by Chapter 183 of the Laws of 1945, and as provided by Chapter 201 of the Laws of 1945 and any subsequent amendments thereto.

- 10. If the district votes in the affirmative on the preceding article, to see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (\$14.00) fourteen dollars for the purpose of providing funds for the district's contribution to said retirement system for the coming year.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the purchase of new equipment.
