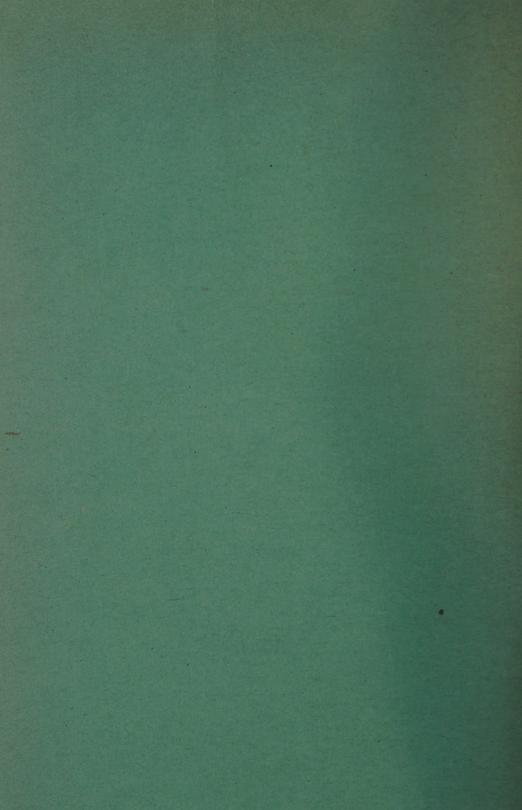

- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 and Interest to take up Water Bonds due July 1, 1954.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$64.86 for T. R. A. work, the State to contribute the sum of \$432.38.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for a 4th of July Celebration.
- 19. To see what action the town will take in regard to the spraying of the town against insects and appropriate money for same.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$700.00 for a community skating rink, and to authorize the selectmen or moderator to appoint a committee of three to supervise the same.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for Civil Defense.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$250.00 for the Lincoln-No. Woodstock Community Band.
- 23. To see what action the town will take in regard to garbage disposal and appropriate money for same.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Lincoln for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1953, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Municipal Court.

Financial Statements Comparative Balance Sheets—

December 31, 1952 - December 31, 1953:

(Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1952 and December 31, 1953, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$1,573.29 in 1953.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition:

(Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations And Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1953, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$3,518.00, less a net revenue surplus of \$1,229.08, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$2,288.92.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1953, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1953, is indicated in Exhibit F.

Statement of Bonded Debt:

A statement of outstanding bonded indebtedness as of December 31, 1953, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit M.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased from \$2,960.02 to \$2,-533.31 during 1953 as shown by the following statement:

This situation was largely the result of forest fires and tax abatements which caused the appropriations to be overdrawn as follows:

Although these expenditures were largely beyond the control of the Selectmen, attention is called to the fact that the Town of Lincoln has adopted and operates under the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law (Chapter 52, Revised Laws, As Amended), Section 5 of which provides as follows:

Exceeding Appropriations. In towns adopting the provisions of this chapter, no board of selectmen, school board, commissioners of a village district wholly within said town. or other expending agency shall pay or agree to pay any money or incur any liability involving the expenditure of money for any purpose for which an appropriation has not been made, or in excess of any appropriation or allotment made to it, except for the purpose of paying judgments rendered against the town or school district or said village district, provided, however, that in case of sudden and unexpected emergency the selectmen or village commissioners on application to the tax commission and the school board on application to the state board of education, after hearing, may be given a certificate of emergency authorizing them to make such expenditure or incur such liability, provided that no such certificate of emergency shall be granted unless the budget committee of the town has approved the expenditure. In cases arising during the year following the annual meeting where changes occur which make it unnecessary to use the amount appropriated for a specific purpose, an unexpended balance may be

transferred by the board of selectmen or the school board or the village commissioners of such village district from one appropriation to another, provided the total amount expended for all purposes does not exceed the total amount appropriated at the town, school or village district meetings for all purposes."

It is therefore noted that contrary to the provisions of Section five, (1) total expenditures in 1953 exceeded total appropriations and (2) no application was made to the Tax Commission for a certificate of emergency authorizing expenditures in excess of appropriations.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Lincoln for their assistance during the course of the audit.

To the Residents of Lincoln:

With this report to the Town we are making the following statement of policies and activities because we feel that such an explanation will go a long way in explaining the aims of your School Board and the need for the various items in the budget. Were there some other means of communication available in our community we would not use this means to inform you of our actions. So, because we feel that most folks read the Town Report, we hope they will read this summation for their better understanding of their school system.

There are two reasons why the budget has risen noticeably in the past few years, besides the commonly accepted one of increased costs. The first is the salary situation. In order to keep the schools staffed with good teachers it has been necessary to meet competition and, hence, that item reflects an increase of over \$400.00 per teacher in the last two years. The second cause is the condition of the school buildings which are in a needy state of repair. The time to patch and mend has passed and we are now in the process of doing major replacement work in order to bring the properties up to date.

We believe that our salary schedules are now in line with our neighbors and with the State averages. We hope that we shall not have to ask for more money for this purpose for some time to come—and only violent changes in our economic situation will cause us to change from our present position of no new raises for the immediate future. As far as the renovations going on in the buildings are concerned, we hope the taxpayers will agree that the money we ask for improvements will not be denied. If the residents would take the time to visit the schools we are sure they will approve of the expenditures being made. The High School has been completely refurnished and the money to be spent there in the next few years will be for maintenance only. The Grammar School will demand our

attention for the immediate present. Much should be done.

It is our hopes that we can complete the outdoor athletic and playground facilities this year. Our efforts along that line have been open and public and we trust that in time the civic pride will increase in our only municipally owned property. So far, the Board has been especially pleased with the cooperation it has received from the Selectmen and the Franconia Paper Corporation for all their contributions, as well as for the assistance received from members of the Town who have given of their time and equipment to make such improvements possible.

Your School Committee is vitally aware of the problem of juvenile delinquency and feels that if the adequate use of its facilities can be made more attractive to the younger members of the community it will combat all the more effectively the growing tendency to be less law-abiding. We think our ideas have produced favorable reactions along this line in the past two years. The boys and girls have available to them the gymnasium for all activities of community nature. and this also applies to the various adult organizations in the Town. We believe in this policy because there is no other place for large gatherings. It is our plan to make the school grounds attractive to both groups also. To that end we plan to install a new backstop for baseball teams hoping to revive the Old Town Team in the summertime. We have installed an asphalt play area for the younger children which will not interfere with the use of the larger field and hope in time to have an outdoor basketball practice area between the schools. A consolidation of playground equipment in one location is under consideration. If it is possible, we shall try to have a small parking area for vehicles of visiting officials and school employees.

Immediately, and for the future, we are installing new floors in the Grammar School and will then set about redecorating the rooms. In time we shall paint the building outside and then attempt to replace the furniture room by room with modern equipment. Much of what we now have is out-dated and in a bad state of disrepair. It is cheaper to get new tools than to repair old ones, such being their condition.

On the classroom side of the picture, it is to be noted that we strive for scholarship and good teaching. That is our big job. A well-turned-out child has no need to fear his position in society. We want to eliminate that fear if possible. So, besides a nice place to study in, we want good and adequate teaching consistent with our means. We think we are getting both, or at least approaching that goal. Our Shop School is more than adequate for a town of our size, and it is unfortunate that we cannot economically justify a larger and more diversified course of instruction. We cannot expand it without obtaining enlarged quarters which are not now available. The college courses and commercial courses can stand improvement, but again. we are handicapped by need of space and more instruction, all of which must be questioned from the townspeople if they demand such and are willing to pay the bill. Under the present system, the School Board will bend every effort to produce a satisfactory meeting with current college requirements.

As far as the adequacy of present facilities to meet future enrollments are concerned, the indication seems to be that we need not consider the problem of expanding our facilities for a few years to come. We feel that we can accommodate the coming school generation handily.

We are pleased to welcome Roger Stewart as Principal of our High School, and Miss Frothingham as our Commercial Teacher. In the Grammar School we are using Mr. Houston, who comes from a family of school teachers, as our Principal, and are satisfied with his work although he is new to it.

Appended to this report will be the State Audit of the past year which was not available in time for printing in last year's report, and which by vote of the School Meeting is herewith inserted. In closing may we state that the School Committee Hearings are always public and that we would welcome the residents of the Town at any of them and trust they will visit the Schools to see how their taxes are being spent.

School Lunch costs were discussed, the ball field was under discussion, and Charles Griffin explained that the school budget was a blanket one, whereby they were allowed to adjust

one item by another. Finally the following motion was made by Charles Griffin and seconded by May Tardiff:

"Moved that the School District raise and appropriate \$78,797.16, and to authorize and direct the School Board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the School Board, exclusive of State Aid, and upon the determination of the amount of State Aid to be received by the School District during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the School Board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from State Aid, and with the School District Clerk, certify to the Selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the Town for School purposes." This was carried in an affirmative vote. Article VI

Mr. Griffin moved, and Mr. Sargent Goodhue seconded it, that this year's State Audit be in the Town Report.

Mr. Griffin also made a motion that all motions, memorials, resolutions and other activities be incorporated into the Town Report. This motion was carried in the affirmative.

A rising vote of thanks for her work on the School Board was given Mrs. May Tardiff, whose term expires on this date.

It was voted to recess this meeting for balloting.

At six o'clock P. M., upon legal motions and voting, Moderator Ramage closed the meeting.

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1951 and June 30, 1952, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the financial condition changed from a Net Debt of \$2,615.03 to a Surplus of \$678.81 in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1952.
