The Session was well attended by an interested crowd of young and old from Littleton and surrounding towns.

LITTLETON WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the fifth day of March next, being the first Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 A.M., and may not close prior to 6:00 P.M.; business meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 7:30 P.M.), to act upon the following:

ARTICLE 1. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for three years, a Town Treasurer, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for three years, and one member of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for one year, and one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years and a Town Clerk for three years.

ARTICLE 2. Do you favor adoption of the Town Manager plan as provided in Chapter 37 of the Revised Statutes Annotated?

If the Town Manager Plan is adopted, to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) for salary and to defray expenses of the Town Manager. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 60:38 of the Revised Statutes Annotated for absentee ballot for the election of Town officers in this Town.

ARTICLE 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' Salaries, General Expenses, Elections, District Court, Town Building, Police Department, Forest Fires, Sewers, Streets and Highways, Street Lights, Vital Statistics, Sidewalks, Town Garage, Superintendent of Public Works, Health Officer, Hospital, Public Dump, Welfare, Old Age Assistance, Parks and Playgrounds, Community Center, Social Security, Blister Rust, Fire Department, Damage by Dogs, County Tax, Public Library, Cemeteries, National Holidays, Advertising, Region Association, Whitefield Airport, Planning Board, Recreation, Debt Retirement, Interest on Indebtedness, Sewage Treatment Plant, Conservation Commission, White Mountain Community Services, Dutch Elm, Town Road Aid (A & B), Highway Subsidy, Hydrants, North Country Home Health Agency, and other necessary expenses.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) to be paid to Kenneth E. Curran, Inc. for the cost of changes in the Pumping Station required by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission.

- ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1974 and to be paid therefrom.
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 76:15-a of the Revised Statutes Annotated providing for the semi-annual collection of taxes in the Town.
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to repair the Redington Street bridge deck and substructure and knee brace in upper truss and to raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to install combination windows in the Public Library Building and in the Town Building, and to raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for combination windows in each of said buildings; and further, to authorize the withdrawal of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the voters will order the Selectmen of the Town of Littleton, New Hampshire to repeal the present Dog Leash Law. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)
- ARTICLE 11. We the undersigned citizens of Littleton wish to have placed on the ballot an article to rescind Article 7 voted on at the last Town Meeting which has to do with regulating the dog population of the Town of Littleton. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)
- ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to make Farr Hill Road in the Town of Littleton a "Scenic Road" according to the Scenic Road Bill—R.S.A. 253:17, 18 which passed the State Legislature and became effective in August, 1971. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)
- ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to designate the below listed roads as scenic under the provisions of R.S.A. 253:17 & 18, for the purposes of protecting and enhancing the scenic beauty of Littleton, and further, that the Selectmen of said Town of Littleton shall, regarding such roads designated as scenic, file the appropriate request for suspension of specifications when making application to the Commissioner of Public Works and Highways for Town Road Aid funds under R.S.A. 241:7(I).

Lyman Road (also known as Stevens Road); Foster Hill Road; William Road; Gannon Road; Hilltop Road; Slate Ledge Road; Old Waterford Road; Fox Ridge—Farr Hill Loop; Broomstick Hill Road; Mann's Hill Road (connecting with Broomstick Hill Road); Mt. Misery Road; Mann's Hill Road; Fowler Hill Road; Mt. Eustis Road.

(This Article inserted upon written application of The Littleton Conservation Commission.)

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town of Littleton will rescind Article 8, said Article having appeared in the 1972 Town Report. Said Article has to do with reconstructing that part of Main Street between the Cottage Street Bridge and Maple Street for the sum of \$190,000.00; and to see if the Town will vote to pave Main Street from the Cottage Street Bridge to Maple Street without reducing the width of the present sidewalks and to install granite curbings from Pleasant Street to the Post Office Driveway, and from West Mill Street to the Social Security Office Drive, a distance of 1,437 feet at a cost of \$50,000.00, and further to authorize the withdrawal of \$50,000.00 for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) as a donation to the support of Alpha House, a group home for boys in Lancaster, serving the needs of boys with family and social problems in Coos and Grafton Counties. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution, namely:

ARTICLE 17. To see whether the Town will vote to sell to Eddy L. Moore and Dawn C. Moore the barn and surrounding land totalling approximately one-seventh of an acre situate on Meadow Street abutting the apartment house owned by Mr. and Mrs. Moore, formerly owned by Mr. and Mrs. Clarence M. Durant. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to convey a parcel of land approximately three hundred (300) feet by three hundred (300) feet in size located at the intersection of U.S. Route 302 and the North-bound exit from Interstate Highway 93 (appraised at Eighteen

Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$18,500.00)) to Cray Oil Company in consideration of the conveyance to the Town by Cray Oil Company of two (2) parcels of land, with the buildings thereon, situate on Union Street adjacent to the Town Building (1973 tax assessment, Twenty Thousand Two Hundred Ninety Dollars (\$20,290.00)).

ARTICLE 19. If the vote on the foregoing Article is in the negative and said foregoing Article is not adopted, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) to purchase from Cray Oil Company the two (2) parcels of land, with the buildings thereon, situate on Union Street adjacent to the Town Building.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to report to the Town, giving a particular account of all their financial transactions during the year, and financial condition of the Town at the close of the year, including a schedule of all its assets and liabilities, in strict accordance with State statutes. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to hire and pay private accountants to audit the Town records and accounts annually in lieu of depending upon the Division of Municipal Accounting, Department of Revenue Administration, to perform this service—usually late and not necessarily accurate.

If the Town votes to engage private accountants, to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) to defray expenses. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 22. To see if the voters will instruct the Selectmen to appoint a committee of not less than three persons to study the effect upon the tax structure should the Homeowners Exemption Law (R.S.A. 72:44) be adopted, and to report their findings to the Town prior to January 15, 1975. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) to contract for feasibility evaluations of alternative land sites suitable for industrial development. Such contracts to be carried out by qualified consultants. The finalized feasibility evaluations to be completed and on file no later than January 1, 1975. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to abandon the section of the Old Whitefield Road from its junction with Fowler Hill Road to the Bethlehem town line.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, contract for and accept any State and/or Federal aid and/or funds available at any time relating to disasters or emergencies within the Town, and to expend such funds for repair and relief.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) to repair the tower and restore the spire of the Town Building.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand Dollars (\$14,000.00) to paint the super-structures of the Redington Street bridge and of the Bridge Street bridge; and further, to authorize the application for this purpose the sum of Fourteen Thousand Dollars (\$14,000.00) from the unexpended balance remaining after the repair of the Beacon Street bridge and appropriated under Article 18 of the Warrant for the 1973 Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to execute and deliver to the United States of America a right-of-way easement deed for the Appalachian National Scenic Trail as it traverses town-owned property in the Town of Franconia.

ARTICLE 29. To hear the report of Agents, Auditors, Committees, including the Planning Board, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 30. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and to choose and elect any Agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under the Warrant.

ARTICLE 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

TOWN OF LITTLETON

LICENSING AND REGULATION OF DOGS

Section 1. DEFINITION OF TERMS. As used in this ordinance, unless the context otherwise indicates.

- A. "Dog" shall be intended to mean both male and female.
- "Owner" shall be intended to mean any person or persons firm, association or corporation owning, keeping or harboring a dog.
- C. "At Large" shall be intended to mean off the premises of the owner, and not under the control of the owner or member of his immediate family either by leash, cord, chain, or otherwise.
- D. "Leash" shall be considered to be not over 6 ft. in length.

Section 2. No owner or keeper of any dog shall permit such dog to run At Large.

Section 3. IMPOUNDING.

It shall be the duty of police officers (or some other designated official) to apprehend any dog running at large and to impound such dog in the town pound or other suitable place. The police officer (or some other designated official) upon receiving any dog shall make a complete registry, entering the breed, color, and sex of such dog and whether licensed. If licensed he shall enter the name and address of the owner and the number of the license tag. Licensed dogs shall be separated.

Section 4. NOTICE TO OWNER AND REDEMPTION.

The owner shall be notified not later than two days after the impounding of any dog. The owner of any dog so impounded may reclaim such dog upon payment of the license fee, if unpaid, and of all costs and charges incurred by the Town of Littleton for impounding and maintenance of said dog. The following charges shall be paid to the Town of Littleton: for impounding any dog, \$2.00; for keeping any dog, \$2.00 per day up to ten days.

Section 5. CONFINEMENT OF CERTAIN DOGS.

No dog of fierce, dangerous or vicious propensities and no female in heat, whether licensed or not, shall be allowed to run at large or upon the premises of one other than the owner. If such dog is found running at large in violation of this provision it shall be taken up and impounded and shall not be released except upon approval of the police officer (or person designated by the town) after payment of the fees provided in Section 6, provided, however, that if any dangerous, fierce, or vicious dog so found at large cannot be safely taken up and impounded, such dog may be disposed of by any policeman.

Section 6. HABITUAL HOWLING, YELPING, OR BARKING — DECLARED NUISANCE.

The keeping or harboring of any dog, licensed or not, which by habitual howling, yelping, barking or other noise disturbs or annoys any person or neighborhood is unlawful; and is hereby declared to be a nuisance and each day shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 7. DAMAGING PROPERTY.

It shall be unlawful to suffer or permit any dog to trespass on private or public property so as to soil, damage or destroy any property or thing of value and the same is hereby declared to be a nuisance and any such dog may be impounded by the police officers (or a designated person). Whenever it shall be affirmed in writing by three or more persons having separate residences, or regularly employed in the neighborhood that any dog is a habitual nuisance by reason of trespassing, howling, barking, or other noise, or damage to property, being vicious or by its actions potentially vicious or in any other manner causing undue annoyance, the police officer (or designated person) if he finds such nuisance to exist in fact, shall serve notice upon the owner or custodian that such nuisance must be abated within 48 hours, after which the police officer shall decide whether such nuisance has been abated and if not, any such dog shall be impounded. Refusal to release to the police officer any such dog shall constitute a violation of this chapter. That the owner or custodian of any dog impounded under the provisions of this section, shall pay to the Town of Littleton a fee of five dollars (\$5.00) in addition to all other charges payable under the provisions of this chapter.

Section 8. PENALTIES.

Any owner found violating any provision of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars for such offense.

Section 9. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This ordinance shall be in full force and in effect upon approval.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

1973

It was a busy year with the circulation of books continuing to climb, new registrations and very active reference service. Every thing seems very healthy except the economy affecting the price of

oil, books, cost of living-everything.

Ellen Morrow has charge of our film program. In 1973, 35 film programs were shown to 1,154 persons. The variety of groups served include the Montessori School, the Senior Citizens, Brownies, school groups, and Future Teachers of America. Mrs. Morrow also does the book displays seen in the library during the year. Library users look forward to her artistic work.

During the year 12 school groups, both elementary and high school, came for a tour of the library and instruction in how to use

the library. The librarian handles most of this instruction.

National Library Week was in April. An adult film program was enjoyed by a group of about 50 Littleton people. Refreshments were served following the program by the Senior Citizens. Mr. Alton Ferguson displayed many beautiful woodcarvings and Mrs. Laura Rancour treated us again with some of her applehead and cloth dolls.

The children's room collection has been weeded and replacements have been made where necessary. This work was done by Patricia Stillings and I followed through with the final decisions. The reference and adult non-fiction will be our next time-comsum-

ing but very necessary project.

In 1966, the Littleton Public Library and the N.H. State Library had all of The Littleton Couriers microfilmed. We have this paper on film from its start in December, 1889. The microfilm reader was given to the library by The Courier and students and adults use these films almost daily. In the 1974 budget we will ask the town for money to film such old Littleton papers as Ammonoosuc Reporter, 1852-1854, White Mountain Banner, 1857-1859, People's Journal, 1855-1864 and many others. Patricia Stillings and I have worked to prepare these for filming. They are so fragile that they cannot be used. Before very long they cannot be filmed. They are needed for the facts, the thinking and the whole record which they contain.

I wish to thank the Littleton Area Historical Society for allowing us to mend and fill-in using a few People's Journals and White Mountain Republic Journals which they received in a gift of old papers. I sincerely hope the State Library and the Littleton Public Library can get these papers filmed in 1974 so that we can begin using them. The negative of all of these films is kept in an under-

ground vault.

The exhibit room at the library was scheduled all year with the work of artists and craftsmen of the area. Mr. Leon Karr and Mrs. Marlene Baker arranged for these exhibits for your enjoy-

ment.

Ellen Morrow and Mary Miles took the library techniques course offered at Plymouth in the spring of 1973. There are eight of these courses in all and Ellen has finished seven of them.

The White Mountain Garden Club very kindly furnished us with flowers during the weeks of summer, and the Littleton Garden Club made wreaths for our doors at Christmas time. We wish to express our thanks for this effort which is much appreciated by staff and patrons.

Twenty-one books were given to the library as memorials to the following people: Helen Mayer Revoir, Mrs. Frank B. Kinne, Mrs. Frederick Carlin, Mrs. Alice Seace, William J. ANNUAL REPORT OF LITTLETON DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS AND HIGHWAYS

STREETS AND HIGHWAYS

The department worked with Clinton Clough, who was awarded the contract, to repair the cemetery wall this past spring. They spent about sixteen hundred (\$1600.00) dollars. We did some repair work to the wall at Palmer Brook on Bishop street in back of Dr. Enderson's office.

This past season the department worked with L. M. Pike on the street paving. The town trucks hauled all the hot top for the grader patch work. Streets that were paved: Washington, Pleasant, Jackson, Union, Grove, West Main, Cross, Lafayette, Herbert Lane and Morrison Hill Drive. About thirty-six (36) catch basins were rebuilt. new frames and covers were installed.

On the West Elm Street Ext. development there were eighty feet (80) of twenty four (24) inch culvert installed, also four hundred and thirty feet (430) of fifteen (15) inch drainage, one hundred ten (110) feet of twelve (12) inch drainage, five (5) basins 2x2' and two basins 4x10', also crushed gravel was hauled and it was oiled.

On Morrison Hill Drive, we installed three hundred ten (310) feet of twelve (12) inch underdrain and three 2x2' basins installed.

Bronson and South Street we installed six hundred (600) feet of twelve (12) inch storm drain and six basins 2x2', also on the south end of South Street we installed five hundred sixty (560) feet of six (6) inch underdrain, and one hundred thirty (130) feet of fifteen (15) inch culvert to take care of the water from this underdrain.

The department worked about three weeks on flood damage, hauling gravel, replacing culverts and grading.

The ditches were cleaned on Slate Ledge Road from Bill Hight's to Ronnie Marsh's, so blade mix was put down and it was sealed with asphalt. The ditches were cleaned from Manns Hill Road out beyond Dr. McDade's and blade mix was put down on the road. Farr Hill was oiled from West Main St. to Robert Stearns' driveway and a lot of hand patching was done on several streets and roads. There were some seven thousand (7000) yds. of sand stock piled at the Town Garage for winter use.

Town Equipment hauled about seventeen hundred (1700) yds. of gravel on the Lisbon Road and stock piled same at the Treatment Plant, this was done last fall when Crushing Inc. was dredging the river.

SIDEWALKS

Repaired curbing on West Main St. from Littleton Motel to Elm Street and hot topped, after curbing was repaired. Also on the other side of street in front of Congregational Church. On High Street, the sidewalks were repaired from Jackson Street to School Street (curbing and hot top). Curbing was also repaired on Jackson Street.

TOWN DUMP

Over six thousand (6000) yards of fill were hauled from town pit to cover, also a lot of the material that was cleaned from ditch work was hauled to the dump and used for cover.

SEWERS

Forty (40) septic systems were worked on this past season, some new systems and some repair or improvement on the older systems.

We finished up the sewer line extension on Crane Street, two (2) manholes and four hundred (400) feet of twelve (12) inch transite pipe. After this was completed the road was put back in shape and oiled.

SUMMARY PROGRAM OF THE WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION

1973 (36th Year)

Your Region Association, through its promotional and financial responsibilities, was one of the principal organizers of the White Mountains Art and Music Festival. This Festival has been acclaimed as a truly significant contribution to northern New Hampshire and in 1974, with a much larger budget, the program is expected to expand markedly.

Your Region Association also helped to set up the Hotel-Motel training program at the Waumbek, Jefferson, N.H. Because your Association has for many years promoted the region's hotel-motel industry, the directors felt this training program would effectively complement these on-going promotional activities. The responsibilities incurred by your Association were: a questionnaire designed to answer "Is there a need for the program" and assistance in employing graduates of the program in the region's hotel-motel industry. Additionally, your Association set up meetings with hotel-motel owners and managers to work out any problems and to exchange ideas.

Other activities for 1973 included: completion of a canoe and kayak folder (designed for promotional purposes), a State requested survey of flood damage to the private sector of northern New Hampshire's economy, representation at the Eastern States Exposition in Springfield, Mass., presentation of 4-H awards in Grafton and Coos Counties and annual subscription of the 4-H National News Magazine to club leaders, and the annual solicitations of listings for the New Hampshire Accommodations and Dining Directory and the Where to Stay folder. Additionally, your Association's executive director acted as secretary of the N.H. Council of Region Associations, an organization which works closely with the State's Office of Vacation Travel.

Your Association for its 1973 annual meeting set up a panel discussion on the subject of "Wilderness in the White Mountain National Forest." Panelists included representatives of the N.H. Snowmobile Association, the Appalachian Mountain Club, the Society for the Protection of N.H. Forests, Sno-engineering, the wood products industry in northern New Hampshire, the Sierra Club, the State's Bureau of Off-Highway Recreation Vehicles, the U.S. Forest Service and the North Country RC&D Project, Inc.

With regard to legislated matters your Association supported House Bill relative to Open Space. In large part the directors saw this bill as an attempt to help preserve our farmlands here in the region. Furthermore, your Association supported House Bill No. 10 relative to Off-Highway-Vehicles with the exception that the majori-

ty of directors felt snowmobilers should ask the permission of the landowners during periods when there is adequate snow cover.

Finally, the executive director spoke on Association activities both on radio and before several Chambers of Commerce and Rotary Clubs in the region.

Inquiries for the year totaled 5,000.

Wrote 27 news releases, 2 newsletters and 140 personal letters.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The New Hampshire Forest Fire Service is represented in every town, city or unorganized place in our state by the forest fire warden. Anyone wishing to kindle an outside fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the fire warden. Except for cooking fires, no fire can be kindled between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is a commercial or industrial burn or it is raining. The fire warden is assisted in his work by the District Forest Fire Chief who works for the Department of Resources and Economic Development Forest Fire Service.

Fire prevention was, again this year, the most important part of the Forest Fire Warden's job. Fire statistics show the need with 72% of the fires caused by smoking, debris burning and children. Smokey the Bear is an important prevention tool but he still needs much help from the public. Parents should warn their children of the hazards of playing with matches. Children tend to forget that a lighted match held in their hand is a potential forest fire.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT January - December 1973

A. GENERAL SERVICES

Received 467 new individual requests for mental health services to area individuals and families. Many of these were of a severe, emergency nature.

Note: During November, 1973 this agency received the largest number of referrals (57) during any one month period in our eight year history. Types of problems presented included the following categories:

Held 2,936 counselling sessions with individuals, families or groups from the region served by WMCS. (An increase of 246 sessions over 1972)

Held 690 consultation sessions with other professional persons and volunteers (doctors, nurses, social workers, members of FISH, etc.) and organizations concerning those individuals they were attempting to serve. (An increase of 236 sessions over 1972)

Held 405 education and community planning sessions with and for interested professional and lay persons in the region served by WMCS. (An increase of 123 sessions over 1972)

Continued to Provide:

Pre-admission screening and after care services for patients entering and leaving the New Hampshire Hospital, Concord.

Social-psychological evaluations for schools, courts, and state vocational rehabilitation services.

Bi-monthly in-service training program for those in the helping professions. The goal of this program is to provide new information, skills and coordination of services for individuals seeking help in our local communities. Expanded this program by encouraging all local human service organizations to become actively involved in the planning of these training sessions.

Counselling to individuals and consultation to the Administration at the Grafton County Home and House of Correction.

Weekly psychiatric consultation to physicians and to hospital staff serving patients hospitalized in our local general hospitals. A monthly in-service program for community and school nursing personnel.

A training program to help local hospital personnel deal effectively with the emotionally upset patients, and the alcoholic patients in our local hospitals.

A research program to measure the effectiveness of services provided by White Mountain Community Services to individuals seeking our help.

Added and/or expanded the following programs:

Intensive Diagnostic and Inpatient Care in our local hospitals for those individuals experiencing emotional problems. This was made partly possible by the addition to our staff of a psychiatric nurse and the assignment of a full-time psychiatrist to White Mountain Community Services by the National Health Service Corp.

Courses in Introductory & Advanced Group Work Techniques. (Sponsored in conjunction with UNH, offering graduate level credit.)

Introduced Video-Tape Technology for teaching, research and counselling services as part of our counselling program.

B. SERVICES TO CHILDREN AND YOUTH

Continued to Provide:

A group program for adolescent girls to teach them communication skills in their personal relations with their families, peers and institutions.

School consultation on a weekly basis to schools in Supervisory Unions #23 and #35.

A course open to all school personnel and other selected professionals in the Introduction of Group Techniques. (This course awarded three graduate school credits through the University of New Hampshire.)

Services at the Lisbon Development Center (fourth year), a demonstration classroom for handicapped children currently unable to attend public school.

Participated in Supervisory Union #23 Fall Teacher Orientation Workshop.

C. SERVICES TO THE ELDERLY

Continued the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (third year) to help retired persons continue to be meaningfully involved in their community affairs through their volunteer efforts. Because of this program 47 different area organizations (such as the local schools and Grafton County Home) received the valuable services of 218 senior volunteers, who contributed a total of 16,285 volunteer hours of work during 1973.

White Mountain Community Services is approved as a psychiatric out-patient clinic by the New Hampshire Department of Mental Health and is affiliated with the following state and national organizations: New Hampshire Association of Community Mental Health Clinics; Northern New Hampshire Mental Health System; New Hampshire Health and Welfare Conference; Psychiatric Out-Patient Clinics of America.

Clinics of America.

This non-profit agency is governed by a 40-man Board of Directors of local citizens. Elections are held each year at the time of the agency's Annual Meeting (May). All meetings of the board are open to the public and citizens are encourage to attend. All money voted or contributed to White Mountain Community Services is used to support local needs. This agency serves 23 towns totalling a resident population of 23,900.

LITTLETON PARK COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

A major change took place to our parks and playgrounds in 1973. Last March the people of Littleton voted to authorize the Littleton Park Commission and the Board of Selectmen to drain and grade the existing playing field at Remich Park. With the technical assistance being provided by the North Country Resource Conservation and Development Project Inc. and the contracting work awarded to Crushing Inc. of Littleton, the project broke ground late in June and was completed in early September.

The total cost of this project was nearly \$35,000. However, one-half of the total cost was reimbursed to the Town of Littleton under the Federal Land and Water Conservation fund program. (Matching-Funds) The playing field hopefully will be ready for public use by Spring 1975.

Our Summer Recreation Program, under the direction of Dennis Sargent, was most successful. The program was geared to both the youth and adults of our community. Basketball, softball, tennis, and volleyball combined with many cultural trips and a fine arts and crafts program were enjoyed by all.

Also, for the first time ever, to meet the demands of the tennis craze, the Recreation Department offered tennis instructions to many interested stars of the future. To top off the summer program the first annual Littleton Recreation Department Tennis Tournament was held and was termed a great success.

The Littleton Municipal Swimming Pool opened its doors to the public in late June. Attendance at the pool showed a substantial increase. Our Learn-to-Swim Program was most excellent and attracted many healthy and anxious new faces. Junior and Senior Life Saving courses were offered and were very well attended. Special thanks to Darrell Champagne, Dennis Sargent and Steve Simon for the fine job that they did in painting our pool. It was the first time ever since the pool opened in 1969 that the pool had been completely painted.

Ice skating, Hockey, Biddy Basketball, and Skiing at Mt. Eustis make up our Winter Recreation Program. A new addition to our winter program is the Adult-Recreation Program which takes place each Wednesday evening at the Littleton High School Gymnasium.

The Littleton Park Commission wishes to thank our regular staff and volunteers for their unselfish time and effort which they have given the recreation program. And a special THANK YOU to Darrell Champagne, the man who maintains our parks and playgrounds. Darrell keeps our facilities in the best possible conditions at all times.

LITTLETON POLICE REPORT — 1973

Lieutenant Donald M. Nocky of the Littleton Police Department, in making his annual report for 1973, stated that there was a total of 440 arrests made by the Littleton Police Department. He further advises that there were a total of 173 motor vehicle accidents investigated in which 17 persons were injured or property damage in excess of \$100.00.

Of adult criminal arrests, larceny and drug related offenses are the most frequent with 26 of each followed closely by alcohol related cases at 21. Other criminal offenses are listed as follows: 17 Assaults; 12 Burglaries; 9 Issuing Bad Checks; 4 Derisive Words; 3 Bench Warrants; 2 each of the following, Arson, Taking a Motor Vehicle Without the Owner's Consent, Default, Disorderly Conduct, Contributing to the Delinquency of Minors; and one each of the following, Rape, Corruption of Minors, Minor Possessing Alcohol, Resisting Arrest, Indecent Conduct, Forgery, Peace Bond, Carrying a Loaded Firearm in a Motor Vehicle, Requirements of Sanitary Conditions, and Malicious Damage. Littleton Officers arrested 12 persons for other departments and there were a total of 22 violations of the Dog Restraining Laws. There were 27 juvenile cases bringing the total of Criminal offenses to 199.

There were 241 motor vehicle arrests made in 1973, of which speeding was the most prevalent at 56, followed by uninspected motor vehicles at 45 and DWI at 29. Other violations are listed as follows: 15 Stop Signs, 14 Crossing Solid Lines, 13 No licenses, 10 Unregistered Motor Vehicles, 8 Red Light Violations, 5 each of Operating after Revocation or Suspension of Licenses, Conduct after an Accident, Defective Equipment, Misuse of Plates; 4 each of Operating Without Corrective Lenses, Allowing Uninspected Motor Vehicles to be Operated, Operating Motorcycle without Eye and Face Protection, Allowing Improper Person to Operate; 3 Limitations on Backing; 2 Reckless Operation; 2 Depositing Trash; and one each of the following, Failure to Keep Right, Overload, Failure to Signal, Failure to Stop for a Police Officer, Disobeying a Traffic Control Device, Failure to Yield the Right of Way to an Emergency Vehicle, Failure to File Proof of Financial Responsibility, and one Motor Vehicle Arrest turned over to another department.

THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

During the summer of 1973 the Commission members made a map and ground study of all roads within the Town of Littleton eligible for Scenic Road status under RSA 253:17 & 18. We undertook this project as a legitimate conservation activity and also at the request of the Selectmen. During the Town Meeting of March 5, 1974, a proposal will be included in the Warrant to designate certain roads within the Town as "Scenic".

On Saturday, May 5, our Commission conducted a massive clean-up program in the Town. Students from Littleton High School and Lakeway Elementary School spent a full morning collecting trash and discarded items which were then brought to the dump. Prizes for weight and bulk were awarded, made possible by the cash donations of Littleton merchants and businesses. The Town Public Works Department provided trucks and drivers, who generously donated their time that day. McDonald's thoughtfully provided free lunches for the working crews.

Our Commission is desirous of joining with a group in St. Johnsbury to collect papers and bottles for recycling. We hope to commence a small-scale program in the spring of 1974.

The following is a statement of services rendered to the people of Littleton by our agency. This statement covers the period from January 1, 1973 to December 31, 1973.

The nursing staff made 803 visits to residents of Littleton. There were 7 Physical Therapy visits and 47 visits made by our agency's Social Worker. This is a total of 857 visits made to Littleton residents. Coupled with the Child Health Programs and Expectant Parent Classes this represents approximately \$14,529.00 in services to Littleton residents in 1973. Of this amount, \$5,276.00 was charged to the town account. Last year's appropriation was \$5,000.00 so the remaining \$276.00 was charged to the reserve fund or paid for from donations.

In mid year we terminated the Social Service Component as Federal funds expired for this program. We were able to refer a great number of cases with social problems to other social agencies in the area and utilize other staff members for these services.

This fall we initiated a series of Well Child Clinics for this area. They will be held every other month with either Dr. Bishop or Dr. Lewis as the attending physician. Physicals are given by appointment. These are geared to low income families especially those children not under regular medical attention. The age group is primarily birth to 5 years although exceptions will be made in special circumstances. Immunizations and TB tests are available for any child needing them. We plan in the future to include vision and hearing testing and dental screening.

We also held a series of Expectant Parent Classes in November. The people attending received instruction in Child Birth, Diet and Nutrition, Baby Care, Exercises, and many basic facts about prenatal care. This series of 5 classes will be run in Woodsville in the spring and in Littleton in July or August. They will be held approximately three times a year. There was an average attendance of 12 persons at each of the 5 classes with many fathers attending. The results were very gratifying. People from Littleton, Lisbon, Bath, Haverhill, Bethlehem attended the classes which were held in Lisbon.

The Nursing and Physical Therapy Components of our services are very important to the patients we serve.

These services help reduce hospital stays, assist people to return to as high a degree of independent functioning as is possible. They also allow people to recuperate at home in more familiar surrounding and with family members present. The service also saves money as it is less costly than extended hospital stays.

An example of this would be a 35 year old male patient with Transverse Myelitis, Sacral Decubitus, and Neurogenic Bladder. This patient also has Laennec's Cirrhosis. This patient is being seen 5 days a week to treat the decubitus, irrigate the catheter, monitor general condition and supervise diet, medication and cirrhosis. This patient has been on our caseload since May 25, 1973. The total cost of our service for this patient has been \$2,160.00 for that period. Adding \$180.00 a month for housekeeping and food service brings the total cost of maintaining this individual at home to \$3,240.00. Had he been cared for in a hospital it would have cost \$18,000.00 for a comparable period and \$7,200.00 for an extended care facility. As you can see, this represents a substantial savings to whoever is paying the bill. The cost of all these services eventually comes from the tax or public dollar at some level. As you can see, this service is worth at least each dollar asked for from all services.

We are now planning a Homemaker Home Health Aide Program for the area we serve. This program will provide a much needed service for area residents and reduce the cost of providing nursing service to patients.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

The Littleton Planning Board consists of the following members:

Maurice Stearns, Chairman; Stephanie McGoldrick, John Streeter, James Baker, Daniel Edgar, Secretary/Treasurer; Thomas Pancoast, Esq.

Attorney Thomas Pancoast joined the Board in February, 1973, replacing George Quig who resigned late in 1972. Mr. Pancoast was a welcome addition with his professional approach and legal expertise.

The Planning Board continued to hold regular meetings on the first Wednesday of each month, beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the Town Building.

During the beginning months of 1973, the Board spent many hours drawing amendments to the Subdivision Regulations and Zoning Ordinance. The regulations were ultimately amended in a number of areas, the most important being the inclusion of all land within the Township of Littleton, regardless of its size and the fact that it has street frontage, under the authority of the regulations. Also, the amendments included the imposition of a \$500 fine for each lot sold from an unapproved subdivision.

The Board's proposed amendments to the Zoning Ordinance included stricter regulations for the placement of mobile homes and a fine of \$10 per day for all zoning violations. The proposed amendments subsequently became law by vote of the people at Town Meeting, 1973.

The new amendments supported some of the Board's short-term objectives of closing loopholes in the Regulations and Ordinance and provided a meaningful penalty for all violations.

During 1973, the Planning Board held nine regular meetings and ten special meetings, some of which were public hearings, on proposed subdivisions. They considered twenty-seven individual subdivisions ranging from one lot to over sixty lots.

Realizing that each new major subdivision has its own completely different set of economic, social and environmental problems and realizing that our expertise is limited, we regularly consult with a number of agencies, individuals and organizations offering a wide variety of needed knowledge and skills.

During 1973, we consulted with The United States Department of Agriculture, The District Soil Conservation Department, The Land Use Foundation, specialists from The Littleton Water and Light Department and The New England Telephone Company.

Our overall goal for the future is to provide land planning which is environmentally sound, economically feasible and socially acceptable.

WHITEFIELD REGIONAL AIRPORT COMMISSIONER'S REPORT — 1973

Having completed another active year, The Whitefield Regional Airport Commissioners submit this short resume of its activities to the various towns that it serves.

The budget that is published on the following pages will indicate that actual income exceeded anticipated income by \$3,815.22. This was due to an unanticipated increase in state funds, a first-time appropriation from the Town of Northumberland, plus the fact that Diamond International Corporation and Georgia-Pacific Corporation have joined Timberland Machines, Inc., as a contributor to our airport.

The Regional Airport continued to serve the region in many ways—some of which are listed below:

- 1. Headquarters for the Civilian Air Patrol
- 2. Provided a base of operations for the Air National Guard search and rescue helicopters.
- 3. Served as a site for National Guard Maneuvers.
- 4. Provided summer Air Line Service, Air Freight, Air Ambulance Service, Flight Instructions, and Scenic Air Flights.
- 5. Used by many commercial and industrial interests.

This past year, we completed renovation to our ticket office and waiting room. We have added a septic tank system that permitted us to install new toilet facilities. We extended the apron to serve the private hangar area and ran a new water line from the old to the new hangar area.

The air line service investigation has been completed but, as of this writing, no decision has been made as to whether or not Delta Air Lines will serve the North Country.

We think that to continue serving the North Country, as an airport should serve, we must not only maintain our present good standing but we must gain the reputation of being the best small airport in the northeast. One of the methods chosen by your commissioners to accomplish the aforesaid is to erect a much needed hangar that would house seven to ten planes. A glance at our budget will show a fund established for this purpose. If all goes according to plan, we should be able to erect the hanger without any increased financial burden to the several towns.

The new hangar will also enable the commissioners to find a Fixed Base Operator. It is our opinion that before we find someone who will man the airport for a full working day, we must give him a place to work in. The hangar would provide space for sales and service, as well as rental space to transient planes.

Recently, the governor and council approved the installation of a partial instrument landing system. The equipment called a "Localizer" will be installed this summer at a cost of \$40,000.00, all of which will be paid by State and Federal funds. The new equipment will provide a horizontal guide to aircraft and will increase the number of hours that the airport is usable.

Finally, your commission feels that the airport has truly become regional with all towns having a voice in its operation and participating in its financing. We thank everyone for their cooperation and respectfully request its continuance.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Board of Selectmen Littleton, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Littleton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1972. This examination was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed reports must be given to the Town Clerk to

be retained as part of the Town's permanent records.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, District Court, Planning Board, Public Library and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

General Fund:

Comparative Balance Sheets—As of December 31, 1971 and December 31, 1972: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets which disclose the financial condition of the General Fund as of December 31, 1971 and December 31, 1972, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Current Surplus of the Town increased by \$69,803.77 in 1972, from \$81,697.06 to \$151,500.83.

Analysis of Change in Current Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in current financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1972, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary, (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$54,202.73, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$43,523.00, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$97,725.73.

Long-Term Indebtedness:

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A-5)

Comparative Balance Sheets—Long-Term Indebtedness—as of December 31, 1971 and December 31, 1972 are shown in Exhibit A-5. The outstanding long-term debt of the Town decreased by \$67,000.00 during 1972, from \$514,000.00 to \$447,000.00.

Statement of Annual Debt Service Requirement: (Exhibit A-6)

A statement showing annual debt service requirements, as of December 31, 1972, is contained in Exhibit A-6.

TREASURER

General Fund:

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of general fund receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1972, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1972, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Parking Meter Reserve Fund: (Exhibit B-4)

A summary statement of the Parking Meter Reserve Fund is contained in Exhibit B-4. At the end of the fiscal year, the balance of this fund was \$26,486.67.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with the generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Publication of Reports:

The provisions of R.S.A. 41:13 require that at the close of each fiscal year the selectmen shall make a report to the town, giving a particular account of all their financial transactions during the year, and of the financial condition of the town at the close of the year, including a schedule of all its assets and liabilities. In addition, R.S.A. 41:14 provides that the selectmen shall cause their report, and those of other town officers required by law to make reports, to be published in pamphlet form at the expense of the town

and make the same available to the voters of said town at least seven days prior to the date of the annual meeting.

Guidelines pertaining to specific financial information to be included in the annual town report are sent to each board of select-

men by this Division at the end of each fiscal year.

It is noted, however, that the 1972 Littleton town report did not comply with the foregoing statutes or the prescribed guidelines in that the following statements and reports were not published: Balance Sheets (statement of assets and liabilities) as of December 31, 1972, comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures—estimated and actual revenues; statement of long term indebtedness showing annual debt service requirements, detailed and summary statements of treasurer's receipts and expenditures; tax collector's report; town clerk's report; and the report of the District Court.

In towns where the annual audit is usually made by the Division of Municipal Accounting prior to the annual town meeting and the audit report is published in its entirety in the town report, it is not necessary for the selectmen to duplicate the information contained in the audit report. However, in those instances wherein this Division is unable to conduct an audit before the annual town meeting, the selectmen must assume the responsibility of gathering and publishing the financial reports which are required by law.

Town Clerk:

Our examination disclosed that the Town Clerk has not been recording the minutes of the annual town meetings on a timely basis in a bound record book, but instead retains the minutes in a note book, in a very abbreviated form. As a result of this situation, our auditors encountered considerable difficulty in ascertaining the precise votes taken by the 1972 Town Meeting.

With regards to the recording of minutes of public proceedings R.S.A. 91-A:2 provides that such minutes shall be promptly recorded and open to public inspection within seventy-two hours of

the public meeting.

General Fund:

All vendors' invoices and bills paid by the Selectmen should be annotated as to check number, date paid and expense distribution, in accordance with sound business practices. This procedure will ensure that duplicate payments are not made.

District Court:

The Clerk of the District Court did not remit the net receipts of the Court to the Town Treasurer on a timely basis during 1972. The provisions of R.S.A. 502-A:9 require that such remittances be made on or before the fifth day of each month, and shall cover the net receipts of the court for the preceding month.

Planning Board:

As stated in our last report, the maintenance of a special checking account by the Planning Board for the administration of appropriations received from the Town, is contrary to R.S.A. 41:29, which stipulates that "The Town Treasurer shall have custody of all

monies belonging to the town, and shall pay out the same only on orders of the selectmen."

Accordingly, the balance in this checking account, amounting to \$288.69 as of December 31, 1972 (Exhibit F) should be transferred to the town treasury during the ensuing year.

Unredeemed Taxes:

As indicated in Exhibit C-2, as of December 31, 1972, unredeemed taxes from the tax sales of the levies of 1969 and prior years were as follows:

Inasmuch as the statutory two year redemption period has expired on these unredeemed taxes, the Tax Collector should deed all of the properties involved to the Town. The execution of tax deeds on all properties which are in default of redemption is required by the provisions of R.S.A. 80:38.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71, Section 27-a, require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town of Littleton. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Littleton for their assistance during the course of the audit.

CHIEF OF POLICE STANLEY L. McINTYRE RETIRES

Chief of Police Stanley L. McIntyre announced his retirement on January 1, 1974 after twenty-seven years of service to the Town of Littleton. He has earned the respect and high regard of the FBI and other Police Agencies throughout the state with his knowledge and expertise as a criminal investigator.

During Chief McIntyre's years of service, the Town of Littleton has been recognized by the American Automobile Association with

a Pedestrian Safety Achievement Award for eleven years.

Chief McIntyre initiated a police pistol training program in Littleton, and for eleven consecutive years the Littleton Auxiliary Police Pistol Team led the State of New Hampshire in the competition for

the Governor's Trophy.

When Chief McIntyre was appointed to office in 1949, the Town of Littleton had a four-man police department. As the Town expanded, so too did the police department to its current authorized strength of nine officers and a clerk. Chief McIntyre made use of Crime Commission Federal Funds to better equip the Littleton Police Department with a radar unit, a breathalyzer, a second cruiser and a modern communications system linking Littleton with other police agencies in the State.
