LYMAN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Lyman, in the County of Grafton and The State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the second day of March, 1976, polls to open at ten-thirty o'clock in the forenoon and will not be closed before six o'clock in the afternoon in said Town Hall, to act on Article 1, the remaining articles to be considered at one o'clock in the afternoon.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Thousand Six Hundred Seventy-three Dollars (\$17,673.00) as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year. All items marked by an asterisk in the budget are covered by this Article.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-six Thousand Eight Hundred Fifty-five Dollars and Seventeen Cents (\$26,855.17) to maintain highways, equipment and Town Share of T.R.A. All items marked by a cross in the budget are covered by this Article.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Fifty-two Dollars and Twenty-five Cents (\$852.25) for the Health Department (Health Officer and Overseer of Poor \$60.00, North Country Home Health Agency \$276.00, Littleton Hospital Association \$250.00, White Mountain Community Services \$266.25). All items marked by a dash in the budget are covered by this Article.

- ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) to defray the Town's share of the cost of the Lisbon dump.
- ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) for Town Cemeteries.
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Ninety-nine Dollars and Sixty-seven Cents (\$399.67) for dues to the White Mountain Region Association.
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer fifty percent (50%) of any 1975 annual net budget surplus funds to the Capital Reserve Fund established for the purchase of highway equipment.
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as compensation for the Tax Collector the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00).
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by tax deed.
- ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow monies from time to time for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1976 and be paid therefrom.
- ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00), (being one-half of the estimated cost) to perambulate the town line with the Town of Littleton.
- ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Seventy-five Dollars (\$875.00) for the following purposes: Police Chief \$500.00; Dog Police \$25.00, mileage at Fifteen Cents (15¢) per mile not to exceed \$300.00; supplies \$50.00.
- ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Seventy-eight Dollars (\$1,578.00) for the following forest fire equipment: 3 stainless steel back pumps @ \$34.6 each \$102.00; 1 275 gallon tank, the iron to frame the tank, pipes and fittings to connect tank to fire pump \$700.00; 150 feet of fire hose \$187.50; one line nozzle \$79.25; 2 two-way radios \$429.75; 6 helms \$79.00.
- ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for the financial administration of the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Four Hundred Fifty-eight Dollars (\$9,458.00) to be used for the purpose of repairing the foundation \$5,970.00) and roof (\$3,488.00) of the Town Hall.

ARTICLE 17. If the above four (4) Articles, namely Article 13, 14, 15 and 16, are adopted, to see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budget appropriations in the amount indicated; and further, to authorize the Selectmen to make pro rata reductions in the amounts if estimated entitlements are reduced or take any other action hereon:

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept any State and/or Federal funds related to disaster or emergency programs which are available at the time, and to expend such funds for repair of damage.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum Two Hundred Eighteen Dollars (\$218.00) to defray the Town's share of operation expenses of the North Country Council.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred and Three Dollars (\$203.00) for Pine Blister Rust Control.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Town Planning Board to approve or disapprove in its discretion new subdivisions and plats thereof as provided in New Hampshire R.S.A. Chapter 36: Section 19-29 inclusive and Section 34.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance: Section 1: No person, firm or corporation shall erect any new building or structure, or make substantial improvements to an existing building or structure, or cause the same to be done, within the Town of Lyman without first obtaining a permit from the Building Permit Officer (Board of Selectmen).

Section 2: 'Substantial improvement' means any repair, reconstruction, or improvement of a structure, the cost of which equals or exceeds fifty percent (50%) of the actual cash value of the structure either (a) before the improvement is started, or (b) if the structure

has been damaged and is being restored, before the damage occurred Substantial improvement is started when the first alteration of any structural part of the building commences.

Section 3: Any person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) and each day's neglect to obtain such a permit shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 4: Appeals shall be as provided in New Hampshire R.S.A. 156: 4-a, b, c.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution as required for participation in the National Flood Insurance Program:

WHEREAS, certain areas of Lyman are subject to periodic flooding from streams, rivers and lakes, causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and

WHEREAS, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of flood hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the floodplain areas having special flood hazards; and

WHEREAS, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to New Hampshire R.S.A. Chapter 31, 36, 156, and 156A.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That this Town Meeting hereby:

1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it intends to enact and maintain in force for those areas having defined flood hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and

- 2. Vests the Planning Board with the responsibility, authority, and means to:
 - (a) Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.
 - (b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the floodplain.
 - (c) Cooperate with Federal, state, and local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map and identify floodplain areas, and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining floodplains in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.
 - (d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of floodplain management measures.
- 3. Appoints the Building Permit Officer (Board of Selectmen) to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of elevations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the floor immediately above must also be recorded.
- 4. Intends to take such other official action within its power as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.

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ARTICLE 25.

To vote on the following question:

Shall we adopt the provisions of R.S.A. 72:43-b and 43-c for expanded exemptions on real estate which provide for a resident sixty-five years of age up to seventy-five, a five thousand dollar exemption; a resident seventy-five years up to eighty, a ten thousand dollar exemption; a resident eighty years of age or older, a twenty thousand

dollar exemption, provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or his spouse with whom he has been living for at least five years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than seven thousand dollars or combined income with spouse of less than nine thousand dollars; and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of thirty-five thousand dollars?

This Article to be acted upon by ballot pursuant to New Hampshire R.S.A. 72:43-a I (b).

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize to Selectmen to accept a gift of land for the purposes of constructing a road thirty (30) feet in width over land of Bette Huber, said road running approximately eight hundred (800) feet over said land of Huber from Ogontz Road and ending at Glebe Road.

ARTICLE 27. In the event Article 26 is adopted, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$1,100.00) for the purpose of constructing said road, said funds to be used for clearing and brushing the roadway, supplying two trucks, a payloader, a grader and a grader operator; the aforesaid appropriation is already included in Article 3 and is not in addition thereto.

The above two Articles inserted as the result of settlement of the case of Country Land, Inc. vs. Bette Huber and the Town of Lyman.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and dispose of the following equipment: one Palace Oak wood stove, box stove and one 16mm. projector and screen.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to approve the obtaining of the services of public accountants for the annual audit of the Town's accounts.

ARTICLE 30. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Upon the recommendation of town selectmen and city councils, the Division of Forests and Lands appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town and city every three years. The town or city warden is responsible for maintaining a force of men and adequate equipment to suppress any wildfire that occurs in his town or city during his term of appointment. The fire warden must authorize all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow. No open fires can be authorized between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., unless it is raining, without the additional permission of the state district fire chief.

Any person wishing to kindle an open fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the forest fire warden. Camp and cooking fires also require the warden's permission.

The Division of Forests and Lands, through its Forest Fire Service, assists all cities and towns in meeting these requirements by training the warden and deputy forces in wildfire suppression tactics, making hand tool suppression equipment available at fifty percent of cost, supplying pieces of Federal excess property for use as fire attack vehicles and sharing up to fifty percent of the cost of wildfire suppression costs.

Wildfire prevention is also a joint state, city or town program. Smokey Bear is available from the Forest Fire Service for local fire prevention programs. Posters and Junior Ranger kits are available for distribution by local fire departments upon request to the Forest Fire Service. Each forest fire warden is expected to carry on a continuous wildfire prevention program within his town or city.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LYMAN CEMETERY BOARD

Our work this past year was concentrated in the Center Cemetery. Approximately two hundred fifty (250) stones and markers were mended and straightened. Two loads of fill was utilized to raise sunken grave sites. In addition, the pair of pedestrian gates was replaced and given two coats of paint. This last project was made possible by gifts in the memory of the late Sara Reynolds. The remaining work was financed through the use of money in our Gift Fund. This fund is now nearly depleted. Some seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) was used to pay for the stone work and the fill. The funds which the Board receives in the Town Appropriation are used for normal upkeep. This includes moving, gasoline, repair of the movers and any other expense incidental to work of this nature. Our major project at this time is the mending and straightening of the stones in the Pond Cemetery. The estimate for the work needed to be done is four hundred dollars (\$400.00). The Board ernestly hopes that enough concerned people will be interested in funding this project through donations in the memory of their loved ones or as a charitable gift. The Board takes this opportunity to extend heartfelt thanks to all those who have so generously supported the restoration of the four cemeteries in Lyman.

WHITE PINE BLISTER RUST CONTROL - TOWN CONTRIBUTION

Control of white pine blister rust is vital to New Hampshire's forest economy and maintenance of the State's scenic qualities. More than 2,500,000 acres or about onehalf of the forests of the State, include white pine. Since 1917, this fungus disease which kills white pine has been controlled by eradication of its alternate host, currant and gooseberry bushes, commonly called RIBES. Provisions of RSA 223, require affected towns to financially support the Ribes eradication phase of the program.

Three years ago, the Federal government withdrew its financial support for white pine blister rust control. We, therefore, tried to economize by reducing the extent of control to only the highest quality pine stands.

We now are convinced that this approach is subjecting pine stands of lesser quality to potential destruction and economic loss. Ribes plants are increasing substantially in the non-controlled areas. Therefore, we are reactivating broader measures, which again requires financial participation of various towns.

Last year 1.450 acres were examined by Division personnel to locate hazardous Blister Rust conditions requiring immediate control action. Several areas were found in your town. Therefore, as authorized under RSA 223, we request an appropriation of \$203.00 from your town in 1976 for white pine blister rust control.

The cooperative State-town control program has long been successful in preventing major white pine losses. We consider continuing investments in blister rust control to be most worthwhile, and in the best interest of citizens of your town and the state as a whole.

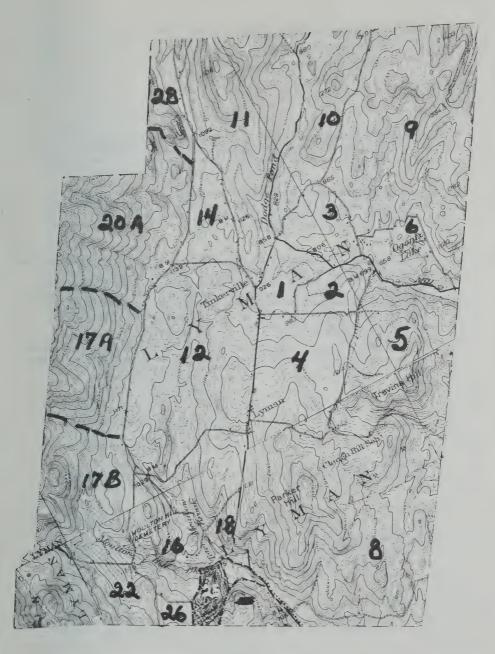

Town Report From the North Country Council

Information on subdivision regulations and flood insurance were the services provided by the North Country Council in 1975. The Council is available to work with the town on these two items.

On the regional level, the North Country Council prepared a public transportation plan and is working toward the implementation of its recommendations. The Council became the economic development district for northern New Hampshire on July, 1975, and is currently carrying out this function. Several regionwide meetings on Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission regulations, economic development, seminars for planning board members, and recycling of newsprint were sponsored. A recently completed report entitled "The Regulation of Mobile Homes in the Community", prepared by the Council, provides technical information to planning board members and local officials in the area of mobile homes.

In 1975, the Council increased its base of local support from 19 to 29 towns. The Council coordinates its activities with other agencies in order to avoid any possible duplication of effort.

<u>Planning News</u>, the Council's bi-monthly newsletter, disseminates useful information on land use, state legislation, court decisions, and general activities to interested persons in town. A town resident can be placed on the mailing list by contacting the town's NCC representative or the Council Office in Franconia, N.H. (Tel. 823-8108).

In performing its duties, the Council attends approximately 200 night meetings a year.

For the future, continued activity in community planning assistance will be emphasized along with major regional efforts in economic development, land use, and housing. Dissemination of planning information will be continued. The Council is working closely with the N.H. Public Utilities Commission in the improvement and upgrading of the North Country's rail lines, especially the Lincoln line and the North Stratford to Beecher Falls line.

The Council sincerely appreciates and thanks the town for its support and participation. This support has enabled the Council to provide a good deal of local and regional services.

The White Mountains Region Association is requesting continued support for its work in 1976 with an appropriation from the Town of Lyman.

We are enclosing our annual report and a summary of the Association's activities for the year just ended. This summary is usually incorporated into the annual community report.

The appropriation, as you may know, is derived from a standard formula which is used for all communities in the region. This is seven (7) cents per thousand dollars' valuation and is based on our most recent "Total Equalized Valuation" table published by the N.H. Tax Commission. According to our records, the total equalized valuation in 1974 for Lyman was \$5,709,675. The Association, therefore, is asking for an appropriation of \$399.67.

Community appropriations will be more important now than ever due to a change in State funding guidelines. Those new guidelines, to be implemented in the new fiscal year beginning July 1, 1976, will apportion State funds to the Region Association on a basis of local community support. In other words, each and every dollar appropriated by the communities in the White Mountains Region will be matched by the State.

Please note that your Region Association helps support the rooms and meals tax, a portion of which is returned to each community. In 1974, for example, the community of Lyman received \$1,418.41.

Demands for our services in your schools, hospitals, and for psychiatric emergencies have increased markedly in the area we serve. Hopefully we will be able to continue to provide these vital, and at times, life-saving services.

White Mountain Community Services continues to provide direct services to both Littleton Hospital and Cottage Hospital. Reports to us from the medical and hospital staffs of the area acknowledge the help this effort on our part has been to them. We are continuing to consult with school personnel and provide follow-up counselling care. We continue to service people directly so as to prevent admissions to the New Hampshire Hospital from your area. In this respect area residents are involved in our day treatment program, a new service which provides structured group activities in the local community.

In conclusion, we are grateful to you and your townspeople for their support in the past. We realize no single town among the towns we serve can financially bear the quality and level of mental health services needed and available to all of our citizens through White Mountain Community Services. However, if each town is willing to vote its full share to help defray these costs, then all of our citizens benefit. We need your help and hope you will speak and act in favor of our request.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Lyman for the year ended December 31, 1975, which was made in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audit reports must be given the Town Clerk to be retained as part of the permanent records.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Cemetery Association and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

General Fund:

Comparative Balance Sheets - As of December 31, 1974, and December 31, 1975: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1974, and December 31, 1975, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the current surplus of the Town decreased by \$2,453 during 1975 from \$6,526 to \$4,073.

Analysis of Change in Current Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in current financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$2,758, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$5,211 resulted in a net budget deficit of \$2,453.

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the year ended December 31, 1975, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71-a, Section 21, require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.
