TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Mont Vernon in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Mont Vernon on Tuesday, the seventh day of March, next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment, #1, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance.

This amendment amends Article V, Section B, by making it necessary to commence action under a variance or special exception within six (6) months of date of issuance and complete said action within one (1) year of date of issuance.

3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment #2, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance.

This amendment amends Article V, Section B, by imposing a five (\$5.00) dollar filing fee for all applications for variances or special exceptions.

4. To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment #3, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance.

This amendment amends Article III, Section C-2, by making it mandatory that all mobile homes be placed on masonry runners and that a fire-resistant skirt be installed. A temporary permit shall be issued pending installation of said masonry runners.

5. To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment #4, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance.

This amendment amends Article III, Section C-3, which also makes it mandatory for mobile homes placed in mobile home parks to have masonry runners and fire-resistant skirts.

6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment #5, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance.

This amendment amends Article III, Section C, to make it mandatory to commence action within six (6) months and complete action within one (1) year of the issuance of a mobile home permit.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Building Code Ordinance, as proposed by the Mont Vernon Planning Board.
- 8. To take the sense of the qualified voters whether the amendments of the Constitution proposed by the 1971 session of the General Court shall be approved.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to approve of having two sessions for the annual town meeting in this town, the first session for choice of town officers elected by an official ballot and other action required to be inserted on said official ballot and the second session, on a date set by the selectmen, for transaction of other business.

Action on succeeding articles is deferred until 7:30 p.m.

- 10. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 11. To act on reports of all Town Officers, Agents, Auditors, Committees, etc., and raise and appropriate any money relative thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to join the Nashua Regional Planning Commission.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$226.00 for current dues for the Nashua Regional Planning Commission.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission and Selectmen to accept from the Souhegan Valley Land Trust, a parcel of land commonly known as Purgatory Falls, in accordance with RSA 36A; 4; and to further authorize the Selectmen to accept any and all monies which are available; said land to beadministered by the Conservation Commission.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for an operating budget for the Mont Vernon Conservation Commission.

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 toward the purchase of land known as Purgatory Falls.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:

It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to hold a public gathering of 250 or more persons without first obtaining a permit from the Selectmen of the Town of Mont Vernon, authorizing the holding of said public gathering. Application for such a permit must be made at least 14 days prior to the scheduled date of said gathering. Said application should be made directly to the Selectmen, or left at the office of the Town Clerk.

- A. Each application must include the following information:
 - 1. The names and addresses of the real parties in interest sponsoring the public gathering.
 - 2. The date and or dates and nature of the affair.
 - 3. Whether or not admission will be charged.
 - 4. Whether or not refreshments will be served.
 - 5. Estimated number of persons attending.
 - 6. The exact location of said gathering.
- B. In addition to supplying the above information, each applicant must have proof of meeting the following minimum requirements in order to protect the health and safety of those attending the event as well as the residents of Mont Vernon, before a permit shall be issued.
 - 1. Must provide sufficient sanitary facilities as provided by Division of Public Health Services, in its Sanitation Laws and Regulations, specificially:
 - a. Section A, Regulation I, water supplies.
 - b. Section A, Regulation II, disposal of sewerage and other water-carried waste.
 - c. Section A, Regulation III, toilet facilities.
 - d. Section A, Regulation IV, garbage and refuse collection and disposal.
 - 2. Must provide adequate police protection at the expense of the applicant.

3. Must provide adequate off-street parking facilities, the minimum requirement being one off-street space for every four estimated persons attending.

4. Must meet all fire regulations and have evidence of such appro-

val from the Mont Vernon Fire Chief.

5. Must comply with all other Laws and Ordinances of the Town of Mont Vernon.

C. An application fee of \$5.00 must accompany every application.

The Selectmen, after reviewing the application, and the evidence submitted, may require the applicant to provide evidence of sufficient financial responsibility to insure the protection of the lives and property of the residents of the Town of Mont Vernon.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be subject to a fine not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each

violation.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately on the date of passage.

- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,200.00 to purchase two blade plows and a hoist and frame.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the raising and appropriation of \$1,500.00 annually, for the purpose of establishing a Capital Reserve Fund, in accordance with RSA 35:1, for the purchase of new fire apparatus.
 - 21. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance:
 - 1. All dogs shall be restrained from running at large within the limits of the Residential District of Mont Vernon, as defined in the Mont Vernon Zoning Ordinance, except when they are on the property of the owner or keeper or are being used for training purposes.
 - Any dog found running at large in violation of this ordinance shall be subject to impoundage with the owner or keeper of such dog being liable for all costs of impoundage.
 - 3. Penalty: Any person allowing a dog to run at large in violation of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine not exceed more than \$10.00 for each offense.

- 4. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to delete Section 8 (hours) of the Ordinance on Town Dumps, made effective September 1, 1971 by the Board of Selectmen, and allow the town dump to remain open 24 hours a day.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to hold the business meeting of town in future years on the Saturday following Town Meeting Day, at 1400 hrs. (2 p.m.) and follow that meeting with the business meeting of the school, also held annually. The voting to take place as it does now, on the second Tuesday in March.
- 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Polls open at 10:00 a.m., and will not close before 8:30 p.m.

DALAND MEMORIAL LIBRARY

One of the duties of the Library Trustees is to make a report to the townspeople annually. It would be a simple matter to state the acquisition of 375 volumes in 1971 and the fact that the Librarian and Assistant Librarian were paid \$1.60 per hour for a total of six and a half hours a week. That's nice and short.

And dull.

So let us be brighter - and lengthier - and tell you of some of the events which took place at or because of the Daland Memorial Library, Mont Vernon, 1971.

In the spring a new hand-made sign appeared on the lawn, thanks to the Friends of the Library and, in particular, Mrs. Sue O'Halloran and her father Jack Graves who made and donated it.

Throughout the year, gifts of money and books have been received for which we extend our gratitude. We would like to point out, however, that any or all Trustees will be pleased to look over your gift books before you carry them to the Library, thus saving you and the Library personnel unnecessary work.

The Friends of the Library, under the direction of Mrs. Sue Rotch, invited the Staff, Daland Trust Fund Trustees, Town Trustees and teachers at the Mont Vernon School to a tea to discuss ways in which the Library could be more useful to the school children. As a result, several grades now go in groups to learn about the Library and to take out books to which they might not otherwise have access.

The Trustees had realized for some time that the children's non-fiction section was practically non-existent. The need for immediate remedial steps was even more apparent as the children began to use the Library more extensively. A generous gift from the McCollom Fund, which is not a regular source of Library income, gave us almost instant, but far from total, relief.

In October Mrs. Dorothy Smith resigned as Librarian

and the Trustees were fortunate to obtain temporarily the services of Miss Nancy Walter. Mrs. Phyllis Garnett remained as Assistant and it is hoped that she will assume the duties of Librarian in 1972.

In considering the Library as a whole, one may also

wish to dwell a moment on the following:

The Daland Memorial Library has no running water. Besides creating a most obvious lack, this means that personnel cannot even wash their hands. Further, a severe limitation is put on the number of consecutive hours the building can be open. Just for fun, try doing your normal work for two hours without using one drop of water.

For several years the Trustees have received an increasing number of requests for a book depository in which books could be left when the Library is closed. Although funds are available for it, the Daland Fund Trustees have forbidden the installation of such a receptacle.

While it is commendable to preserve tradition, it is a fact that the decor of the Library urgently needs to be brought into this century without upsetting the building's classic design. Floor, shelf and wall space are extremely inadequate for today's modern library requirements.

Your Trustees are working to anticipate the needs of the town and ever-increasing demands on the Library facilities. If the groups directly involved with the Library will turn away from trivia and strive for common goals and genuine accomplishment, the Trustees believe that their report next year will show true progress in a small but distinctive New Hampshire library.

Fire Warden's Report

LEST WE FORGET - IT CAN HAPPEN HERE

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalant on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellar-holes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947 nothing could stop the wind driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a fire-

brand - a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.

2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.

3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if

they are, put them dead out when leaving.

4. Most important: Instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year -1971 was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who

remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.

REPORT OF POLICE CHIEF

During 1971 there were 87 complaints investigated and 5 reports of property stolen from parked cars at the two rock concerts. These reports came in two or three days after these concerts ended and only put on record for insurance company reports.

Stolen vehicles reported were 3 cars, 1 dump truck and 1 motorcycle all of which were found locally undamaged.

These also were from the rock in New Boston.

Four summonses were served for the N. H. Child Welfare Dept., 2 for State Police and 1 for a Massachusetts police department.

Eight motor vehicles were involved in accidents, 2 of

which injuries required hospital treatment.

Stray dogs without I.D. present a problem and expense to the town. Five dogs were put in the animal rescue league in Goffstown and 2 more were found homes.

As of June 14 there were 45 unlicensed dogs and the owners were personally contacted resulting in prompt payment of all but 8 who were then served court summons by certified mail. These summonses were all nol prossed upon payment before court time.

Cooperation of State police, Milford Communications, and other local police departments is greatly appreciated.

MONT VERNON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Having seen several of its projects near fulfillment, Mont Vernon's Conservation Commission found 1971 to

be a most satisfying year.

Perhaps most exciting was the generous gift by Mrs. George Carleton of Jew Pond and surrounding area, which will be known as the "George O. Carleton Park". The Commission is presently planning a dedication ceremony

at which time we will present a suitable sign.

The Commission organized two hikes this year. The first, a June walk enjoyed by more than fifty people to Purgatory Falls, highlighting the geological and historical background of the area. The second, an educational autumn nature walk over the town owned Hebert Lot with commentary by members on features common to typical New Hampshire woodlands.

Conservation Commission members and volunteer townspeople completed a section of woodland improvement on this Hebert Lot. This work produced income of \$134 from REAP (Regional Environmental Assistance

Program).

A map of Class IV roads and hiking trails of Mont Vernon was displayed in the store for any interested trampers. It is presently in the Library. The Commission would like to add to this map and would welcome suggestions for any additional trails from landowners.

On the educational front, the Commission provided some teaching material for the school. We also sponsored

Mike Nabor at Conservation Camp.

Our dream for several years has been to have the opportunity to purchase Purgatory Falls. That dream is finally being realized. At present Souhegan Valley Land Trust has bought Purgatory for Mont Vernon and Lyndeborough. A fund raising campaign is in progress. We have every faith that the money can be raised so that this popular spot can be preserved forever.

REPORT OF RECREATION COMMISSION, 1971

We have strived over the past year to inaugurate some recreational activities for the townspeople and to provide leadership to continue others held in the past.

Lack of support of residents forced us to cancel the

usual "May Day" celebration.

Boys and girls softball games were held weekly

through the summer and proved very popular.

We provided the coordinating leadership needed for a two week instructional swim program. Mrs. Robert Windt was the instructor and the Prescott Dow's generously let us use their pool for these lessons.

A Hallowe'en festival was held at the town hall. Seventy-four children attended the half hour of movies at 6 p.m. Teenagers and adults were invited to a square dance later that evening. While the number attending the dance was smaller than hoped for, those attending had a

very enjoyable evening.

Providing a skating area in town has proved difficult. Early season snow storms coupled with thin ice made the use of heavy snow clearing equipment on Jew Pond impossible. This leads us to the conclusion that a level, flooded area is the only way to provide a suitable skating area throughout the winter. We are continuing investigation into this matter.

At present we are meeting with a group of teenagers

from town with hopes of determining what activities they

want us to provide for them.

If anyone has an interest in any activity we might provide or the knowledge necessary to lead a study or sports group please contact any member of the commission. We are most interested in talking with you.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

During 1971 your Planning Board held twelve meetings. Mrs. Nancy Straw was re-appointed to a six year term on the Board. Mr. Roger Crouch and Mr. David Hayden (Jan. 1972) were named to terms replacing Mr. George Kittredge and Edward Walter, who resigned.

The Planning Board is charged by the State Statute to plan for the orderly growth of the town. The preamble of the Mont Vernon Zoning Law required that the rural charm of the town be preserved and the safety and well being of the people of the town be considered in Planning for its future. The present Zoning Laws and Subdivision Regulations go far to protect the residents of the town from such things as unsightly gas stations, sub-standard developers and others who would take advantage of our rural charm and tranquil life for their own profit.

A benefit for those of us who live in the town as a result of the Zoning Law and subdivision regulations is the increased value of our property. During the last five years, some property has more than doubled in value.

During the past year the Planning Board concerned itself with the problem of developers. We now have five subdivision plans before us. We have given final approval on five of the possible 154 sites. During the next few months we will be granting approval on most of the lots. The following chart indicates the impact of 150 new homes on Mont Vernon.

(In 1970 the value of all taxable property in town was approximately \$6,300,000).

It is easy to see that the value of homes built has a

great influence on the money available for running town government. The services required, such as schools, by the occupants of these homes, remains the same regardless of the value of the home. For example, the 150 new homes may bring an estimated 200 new children to our schools. A higher tax valued home will bring in more revenue to support schools than a lower valued home.

The Planning Board will do everything it can within its power to ensure that the higher value home is the type approved. One of our potential developers uses lots larger than one acre and will have homes in the higher price range, showing that it can be done in Mont Vernon and we

should not settle for less.

The proposed building code, which has gone through public hearings in January 1972, has been proposed by the Board in an attempt to improve the quality of the subdivisions in town. The Codes will provide for a building inspector to work with developers to assure a quality home and development.

Poor development work, such as road and drainage will ultimately cost the taxpayer money. Good planning and codes now will prevent some of the problems of the

future.

MONT VERNON SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

The population growth that is so apparent in surrounding towns is now reaching into Mont Vernon and is becoming obvious in our school needs and changes.

Many of us remember just a few short years ago when all six grades were taught by three teachers. At the close of the school year in June of 1971, the School Board was aware of a large incoming first grade scheduled for September and the necessity to create two first grade classes. With the aid and supervision of the Superintendent and Teacher Consultant, applications were reviewed for the first grade position and Mrs. George Kittredge was nominated by the Superintendent's office and elected by the Board.

The fall census figures show the need to continue with two first grade classes and undoubtedly we will go into

two second grade classes.

Because of the economic situation, the Board limited the teacher salary increases to less than 5 per cent and with the full cooperation of our teaching staff, the budget

was held to a minimum in the salary category.

An Ecology Day was held at the new school in the spring, and the finished lawn and grading and foundation plantings were completed. The Board wishes to thank all who participated and assisted them in the arduous tasks, especially those students of the school who worked so hard and take such pride in their new school.

The Board also found it necessary to eliminate the use of skimobiles on the school property because of the excessive cost of insurance to protect the district plus the

damage to school property.

ADMINISTRATIVE SCHOOL REPORT

To the Citizens of Mont Vernon:

For one to ask what is new in education today is to expose himself to a deluge of responses. Far removed from an era when the employment of a new teacher was a singular event in a community, the matter of providing educational opportunities for the youth of a community is now of such magnitude it is a topic of daily concern for all citizens. Although fully cognizant of the importance of education, the man on the street cannot but wonder about which avenue to take in the direction of providing optimum educational opportunities at a cost which a community can underwrite. Such expressions as the extended school year, performance contracting and open campus, to name a few, are based on the premise of "getting more for our money", either from the standpoint of greater utilization of our schools or a modification of teaching techniques for the purpose of expediting learning. Midst claims and counter-claims, there is little wonder that people oft times are confused as to which course to pursue. While each may have its place, no one thing can be regarded as a panacea; that which has worked well in one district may end in disaster if applied in another. The point to be emphasized here is that innovations must be studied in relation to many factors.

Mont Vernon schools have consistently moved forward, not infrequently integrating successful practices with innovations to the end of improving learning conditions. Administrators and teachers alike are aware that to stand still is to retrogress. However, all staff members are mindful that change for the sake of change is not the criterion of positive educational outcomes

MONT VERNON SCHOOL DISTRICT

The 1971-72 School Year saw the first grade enrollment grow to thirty three pupils. A second first grade teacher was hired to take care of this increase. This

moved the second grade class to the second floor of the McCollom Building.

The French Program for grades five and six was expanded from one class session per week to two class

Our music teacher has formed a small but lively Glee Club made up of fifth and sixth grade students. The rythm band instruments have arrived and sessions are well underway.

In order to extend a greater experience in library usage, a schedule is now being followed in which children in the Village School make use of the town facility during school hours. Additional books are included in our 1972-73 budget in order to continue the growth of our library within our own building.

The art program continues to progress well. The children are being exposed to various materials, methods, and media used in the art curriculum in today's educational world.

CONCLUSION

Looking ahead, many changes loom on the horizon. While citizens will always be concerned in some measure with the quality of education being offered in the community, that which will not fail to attract attention will be the matter of financing the public schools. With a recent reduction in state aid to education, it is interesting to note that court decisions in several states have given expression to the concept that the state assume complete fiscal responsibility to assure an equality of educational opportunity. Thus, the children of a community poor in taxable property would have some guarantee of receiving an education equivalent to that of their counterparts who, through some accident, live in a wealthier district. Obviously, even such a solution would not be without problems in its implementation, but it would appear that ultimately a greater issue will arise, that in the form of a challenge to the federal government. While there may be some legal obstacles, the logic of providing equality of educational opportunity within states cannot but assume some form on the national level. The time could be at hand when citizens, who have always cherished local control, may have to face squarely the issue of who will determine the grassroots structure of education in America.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE MONT VERNON SCHOOL DISTRICT

March 3, 1971

The Annual Meeting of the Mont Vernon School District was called to order at 7:35 p.m. by the Moderator, Walter D. Kilian, the Reverend David Svenson led the Assembly in prayer. The Moderator led the pledge to the flag and then read the Warrant. The voters were advised of the balloting for School District Officers to be held on March 9, 1971.

Article 1. George Kittredge moved that since this Article is included in the budget that it be acted on with Article 7.

Seconded by Robert Damoiseau. Voted.

Article 2. John Clark moved that we accept the School Report as printed. Seconded by George Kittredge. Voted.

Article 3. Robert Damoiseau moved that we pass over this article. Seconded by George Kittredge. Voted.

Article 4. George Kittredge moved that this article be adopted as it includes such things as sweepstakes and NDEA. Robert Damoiseau seconded the motion. Robert Thayer moved that the words U. S. government be eliminated. The motion was not seconded and the vote on

the original motion was carried.

Article 5. John Clark moved to accept the article as printed. Robert Damoiseau seconded the motion. The School Board explained that this extra bus would allow pupils to take part in athletics and other school related activities. There are about fifteen in number who would take advantage of this and would also give students a chance to use the Milford Library. Joseph Carleton amended the motion to include that any time the bus is not averaging ten students a night that the School Board has the option to discontinue the bus service. Seconded.

A discussion was held as to the cost per day of the extra bus and the School Board stated it was figured on

\$6.00 per day for 180 days. The vote to amend the motion was carried. Roland Christie moved the question, Robert Damoiseau seconded and the vote carried.

Article 6. Robert Damoiseau moved that the article be accepted as printed. George Kittredge seconded. discussion ensued on the types of instruments to be purchased and the need for the school to purchase them.

Robert Thaver moved for a ballot vote - seconded. George Kittredge moved for a vote by check list, seconded by Robert Thaver. So voted. Robert Straw. Donald Cheever and Oswald Williams assisted in counting the ballots. 82 were cast, 51 yes, 20 No and one invalid. Motion carried.

George Kittredge took this opportunity to thank the Selectmen for the fine picture of the new school on the cover of the Town Report.

The Moderator announced that anyone wishing to register may do so at the checklist meeting Monday from

7:00 - 8:00 p.m.

Article 7. George Kittredge moved that the sum of \$184,427.80 be raised and appropriated as printed at the conclusion of the school budget as propopsed for 1971-72, seconded by Robert Damoiseau. The motion and second were withdrawn since the proposed figure was the assessment not the budget.

George Kittredge moved that \$214,682.20 be raised and appropriated for the budget of 1971-72, seconded by Robert Damoiseau. The Moderator explained that the figure did not include funds that were previously appropriated in the preceding articles. The budget was then taken up by line item. After much discussion of the 100 Series and the 200 Series and explanation of these and the other series, the original motion was moved and seconded, was voted.

Article 8. Robert Damoiseau apologized on behalf of the School Board for the omitting of Bruce C. Smith's name from the list of graduates. An apology will appear in the Cabinet.

Joseph Carleton inquired if a name could be established for the new and old schools. Robert Damoiseau explained that the School Board had already named the old school the McCollum Institute and the new school, the Village School.

Robert Thayer asked that the Annual School District Meeting be held on a specified day - namely the Saturday before Town Meeting. Robert Damoiseau advised him that the meeting date must be set according to the Superintendent's schedule, since it is mandatory that the Superintendent attend.

George Kittredge moved that the meeting be adjourned, seconded by Virginia Harcovitz. Reverend Svenson gave the benediction and the meeting was adjourned at 9:10 p.m.

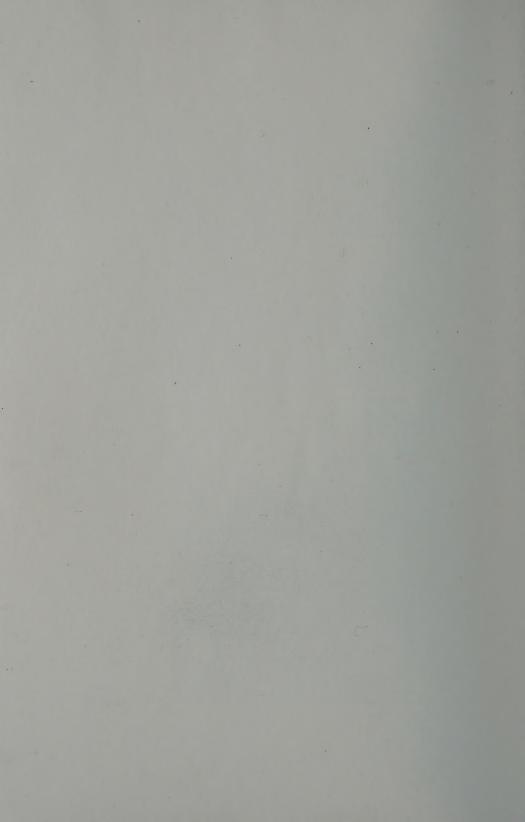
