TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Nelson in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Nelson on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for repairing highways and bridges, or take any action relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$336.31 for the construction of Class V highways, the State to contribute \$1,345.24.

5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for White Pine Blister Rust work, or take any action relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate money to calcium chloride Class V highways, or take any action relating thereto.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the maintenance and purchase of new equipment, or take any action relating thereto.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Old Home Day.

10. To see if the Town will give the selectmen the right to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to be added to the capital reserve fund to be use for the purchase of new equipment.

12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$42.00 for the support of the Monadnock Region Association, or take any action relating thereto.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Library.

14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of \$200.00 for the purchase of fire equipment.

15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to shingle the Town Hall.

16. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Nelson :

I herein submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools.

One full year has passed since the end of actual combat in World War II. The end of the war has brought no relief to the deficiencies in the American public school system. The situation has become steadily more critical.

An appraisal of American schools reveals many inadequacies in personnel, facilities and services that are necessary to meet the needs of children and the welfare of the nation.

Teachers leaving the profession since 1939 have formed the greatest vocational exodus in history. In relation to their numbers the loss to the profession has been more acute in the elementary schools and the rural areas have suffered most. A new policy of teachers salaries must be established with consideration for relative pay in other occupations. In 1944 the average annual pay for teachers was \$464.00 less than the average worker in private employment. If the fully qualified teachers received more pay than laborers the public schools would be staffed more adequately throughout the entire country.

Adequate health facilities and programs are non-existent in a very large proportion of rural schools. Sound health is the most valuable individual and national asset. Every child should be given complete physical examinations periodically followed by corrective measures. The health program should include organized outdoor sports and recreation for all children extended throughout the summer months.

More opportunities should be offered in the schools to practice various duties of citizenship. The financial tribute exacted by crime in general is great. Less than two percent of the population may be classed as criminal. The financial losses caused by this small percent of the population amounts to more than five times the sum spent annually for public education in the interest of all children.

The school lunch program as operated by the United States Department of Agriculture and sponsored by the State Board of Education is a desirable project. This program has become a definite part of the days work in many schools and is maintained as an educational need rather than a "feeding station."

The Munsonville school has been completely reconditioned. The classroom, hallway, ceilings and toilets were redecorated during the summer vacation with fresh paint. The floor and furniture were sanded and revarnished. New blackboards, an oil heater, a clock and a wash stand were installed in the classroom. A cabinet for scholars supplies and reference books has been provided. The foundation of the building has also been repaired extensively. A new steel flag pole in front of the building adds to the appearance of the property.

The provision for an adequate supply of good drinking water on the school property would be highly desirable.

Miss Josephine Stewart, having resigned at the close of the school year in June 1946, left a teacher vacancy with no suitable candidate available for the Nelson Village school. At the beginning of the school year in September 1946 the eight pupils from the Nelson Village area enrolled in the Munsonville or Harrisville schools.

CLASSIFICATION AND ORGANIZATION

HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES—IT PAYS!

The prevention of forest fires is the most important and difficult part of the work of your forest fire warden who heads a local organization set up primarily for the security of your community's forest property. The importance and value of the work of the forest fire warden and his deputies is, perhaps, best appreciated during hazardous periods when fire danger is greatest. The public, however, looks to him at all times for speedy and economical suppression of going fires

To properly fulfill his mission, the warden needs the generous and understanding cooperation of the public at large. He attempts to secure this cooperation by the posting of caution notices, news items and by word of mouth, always carefully explaining the necessity of restrictions imposed. In the matter of giving cooperation, however, the public often fails. The record shows that an average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year. Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable.

The careless smoker fails to properly extinguish his cigar, cigarette or pipe ashes or thoughtlessly throws them from the car window; the debris burner fails or refuses to consult the warden, as the law requires when the ground is not covered with snow, before attempting to burn; campers fail to properly extinguish their fires or frequently build fires when conditions are unfavorable.

Remember these rules:

1. Use ordinary common sense with fire in and near woodland.
2. Comply with requirements on the use of fire in and near woodland and when the ground is not covered with snow, secure written permission to burn from the forest fire warden.
3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands. Don't throw lighted material from moving vehicles.
4. Cooperate with and assist the warden and urge others to do so.
5. **HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES—** his efforts are only as effective as is the cooperation you give him!
