# TOWN WARRANT 1966

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Rockingham, ss.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Castle, in said County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Recreation Building in Great Island Common, in said New Castle, on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, 1966, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing. The polls for the election of town officers will open at ten of the clock in the forenoon and shall not be closed before six of the clock in the afternoon.
2. To hear the reports of agents, officers, committees, boards, and others heretofore chosen and to pass any vote in relation thereto.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriation for the same.
4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to incur temporary loans in anticipation of the taxes for the year 1966 upon the credit of the Town, and issue its notes therefor in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act.
5. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount to be made to those persons who shall pay their taxes within a reasonable time after they receive notice of the taxes

assessed against them and to fix the amount of such discount and the time within which such discount shall be allowed.

6. To see if the Town will vote to participate with the other towns and cities in the area in the advertising, promotional and publicity activities of the New Hampshire Seacoast Regional Development Association as authorized by law and to raise and appropriate the necessary sum of money therefor.

7. To see if the Town will vote to accept Town Road Aid from the State for the construction of Town roads and to raise and appropriate the necessary sums of money therefor.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed Sixteen Hundred (\$1600.00) Dollars to replace the Fire Department Pickup Truck (1947).

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed Fifteen Hundred (\$1500.00) Dollars to install a new fire alarm system.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed Twelve Thousand (\$12,000.00) Dollars to construct a new Fire Station to replace the old one.

11. In the event Article 10 is defeated, to determine what action the Town wishes to take in regard to the Fire Station and to raise and appropriate a sum of money to make the present Fire Station and to raise and appropriate a sum of money to make the present Fire Station safer and more presentable.

12. Upon petition of Robert G. Kennedy and eleven (11) others to see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain as a Town Road or Highway, the balance of Walton Road, so-called, along with the water mains and

hydrants therein and thereon.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred (\$1500.00) Dollars for specified improvements to the Great Island Common, the sum raised by the Town to be matched Two Dollars (\$2.00) for every One Dollar (\$1.00) by the Spaulding-Potter Charitable Trust.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the construction of a water main from the end of our new eight inch (8'') line on Portsmouth Avenue to join with the water main of the City of Portsmouth on Pierce Island or at some other point intermediate thereto agreeable to the City of Portsmouth.

15. Should the Town vote to adopt the provisions of Article 14, then to see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum required for the construction of said water main not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (75,000.00) Dollars (this sum to include engineering fees) and to raise the sum so appropriated by the issuance of serial bonds or notes payable in annual installments over not more than thirty (30) years, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act of the State of New Hampshire; the Board of Selectmen to negotiate and issue such bonds or notes and to determine the time and place of payment thereof, and the rate of interest thereon as they deem to be in the best interest of the Town. The bonds to be duly executed and sealed with the Town Corporate Seal affixed in accordance with the law.

16. To see if the Town will vote to approve the following ordinance:

**THE TOWN OF NEW CASTLE ORDAINS:**

That unless otherwise provided, any person convicted of a violation of any Ordinance of the Town of New Castle, or of any rule or regulation made under authority of any ordinance of the Town of New Castle,



shall be fined not more than Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for each offense.

This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

17. To transact such other business as may legally come before said meeting.

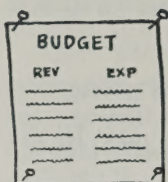

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## Selectmen's Annual Letter — 1965

As you have already noted from your tax bills last fall, the 1965 tax rate was reduced one dollar per thousand—in contrast with that of most communities. This was due to careful spending on the part of branches of the Town government, including the School Department. The Town finances were also helped by a substantial increase in the Interest and Dividends Tax collected by the State and transmitted to the Town and by the Sweepstakes revenue used in current school expenses.

We should like to call your attention to the article in the Warrant which calls for a penalty for the violation of any Town ordinance. The Town Garbage Collection Ordinance states that "garbage shall be placed in plastic or metal containers with tight fitting lids in order to prevent access thereto by animals. The lids shall be securely in place when the containers are set out for collection". Many of our residents are careless about this provision of the Ordinance so that there is much litter in our streets and yards. As there is now no penalty for violation the Ordinance cannot be enforced. We urge the adoption of Article 16 so that we all may take proper pride in the appearance of our streets and yards.

There have been no major repairs to the Town Hall for a number of years and there are several areas where major repairs will soon be necessary. The back wall is in bad shape and is getting worse. The building is used very little in comparison with a few years ago. We suggest the appointment of a Committee at this year's Town Meeting to consider all aspects of the Town Hall and to report back at the 1967 Town Meeting.

The Recreation Commission has an offer from the Spaulding-Potter Trust which would make available funds for certain work at the Common plus a 25 year plan for its orderly development. We believe that the Town should take advantage of this opportunity.

The supplemental Report on Sewers is now being made by Anderson-Nichols Co. in accordance with the 1965 vote and the wishes of the Water Pollution Board. The report should be available some time within the next few months.

As we advised at last years Town Meeting, the State is considering the acquisition of the Marine Reserve Area for the use of a Police Academy. Negotiations are still under way between the State and the General Services Administration. If for any reason these negotiations are terminated before completion we have advised the GSA that the Town's application is to have immediate action.

Article 12 petitions the Town to accept the extension of Walton Road as a Town road. We suggest that each voter consider this action very carefully before Town Meeting and if possible, look at the road in question. Please determine for yourself whether the road is ready for acceptance. The Selectmen sincerely feel that the road should not be accepted at this time.

These letters are dated at Fort William and Mary in 1775 after the Governor had taken refuge there just prior to his departure from the Province. In the letters the Governor asks for food.



## FIRE DEPARTMENT 1965

During the year the department answered 8 alarms. (6 in town, 1 false, 1 Mutual Aid call to Portsmouth).

For the first time in many years New Castle has an organized Fire Department. We have 10 trained members but are still looking for more men who are interested in protecting their town and homes from FIRE.

During the summer months the members train with the various types of equipment outside, and during the winter months we have outside speakers from different fire departments and other agencies connected with fire protection, in to help with training. If possible we would like to send at least one member of the Department to a State Training School in the Fall, and have that member come back and instruct the rest of the members in fire fighting techniques.

During the year two more red network telephones were installed in town giving us a total of five fire phones manned 24 hours a day.

In checking back in some of the old town reports we ran across this letter from Chief Webb in the 1959 report!

(Quote: In the near future, the people of New Castle must consider the fire insurance cost to a growing town with inadequate fire protection. Regardless of what some folks would like you to believe, ALL the following items are MUSTS before your fire insurance rate will drop.

1. Fire house manned twenty-four hours per day.
2. 500 gallon per minute pumper.
3. Improved alarm system.

4. Organized fire department.

Of the above four items, New Castle has NONE. (Unquote.)

We can say now that out of the four items above, New Castle has ONE.

PLEASE HELP!! DON'T GIVE FIRE A PLACE TO START. When you smell smoke, find the source, then CALL THE FIRE DEPARTMENT—AT ONCE. Give address clearly.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT 1965

I again wish to thank the citizens, and the selectmen for their co-operation during the past year also the teachers and school board for allowing us to come into the school and give our safety talk. which we feel is time well spent.

We answered 1,046 calls for the year, of these there were 297 calls from midnite to six A. M. in the morning. There was quite a variety in these calls and we will try to give you a run down-briefly. To try to give these calls in full detail would entail a great expense to the town in printing and space allotted would not be sufficient.

We are sorry to report the perfect record of no fatalities for the last fourteen years was broken when death resulted from an accident. We also have to report a pedestrian injured by a motor vehicle. We had six reported accidents against twelve the previous year.

We had 117 cases tried in our municipal court of various natures. We also had to appear at the grand jury and also the supreme court. These complaints had to be drawn by ourselves. We had one case where we had to break into a house and I did this with the assistance of Bev. Harris. where we found one of our local residents dead.

We issued 953 warnings of various kinds, motor vehicles and other wise.

We recommended to the motor vehicle department 103 suspension of licenses, also suspensions in the neighboring states. We relieved over 300 persons of their keys as being not fit persons to operate and sent them home by cab or other means of transportation.

We will give you the run-down of these various calls

in brief:

Complaints on lost dogs found in New Castle. Persons bit by dogs. Cats killed by dogs. Dogs making a nuisance of themselves in the school yard. Cats chased by dogs.

Death notices in the wee hours of the morning, also telegrams. Persons detained. Domestic troubles. Recovered stolen cars, also cars taken without authority.

Stretcher cases to the hospital. Bodies brought in by the Coast Guard for identification and investigation. Assist fire department at scene of fire—traffic duty, etc. Also woods fires—juveniles picked up playing with matches which were the cause of these fires.

Received calls with reference to youngsters being left alone all night, in some cases reports were made to the Child Welfare Department. Reports of missing adults; reports of missing juveniles and minors.

Magazine salesmen and other solicitors unauthorized for fictitious charities and so forth. Sex perverts run out of town. Calls to the hotel, guest rooms broken into by employees. Calls to the hotel, employees quarters broken into, clothes, money and other articles taken by other employees.

Intoxicated persons at the hotel and hotel grounds—traffic problems, minors in possession of alcoholic beverages, male and female. Nuisance calls—Complaints at the yacht club with reference to unauthorized use of boats, entrance to lockers and other minor complaints. Complaints of lobster traps being pulled and cut.

Assist other departments in investigations. Recovered fire arms for the Maine State Police, used in a holdup. Assistance to other departments on road blocks and checks, such as hit and run, etc. and "Peeping Tom" complaints.

Our biggest complaint has been garbage: Garbage put out in paper bags, boxes and barrels without covers re-

sulting in the garbage being strewn over the streets and other people's lawns. In a recent survey we found that there were between 75 and 80 per cent of the barrels that were put out were not covered and garbage was still being put out in paper bags and boxes.

Also complaints with reference to residents not moving their cars during snow removal. We could go on but time and space will not permit, as there are only seven days in a week and 24 hours in a day. Investigations, reports, preparing for court and other things take a good deal of time.

This report is not to criticize any one individual but we hope for the coming year that a lot of these situations will be corrected. We note that quite a few of our citizens have cut their *speed* down but there are still a few who do not obey the *stop signs*. We hope that they will not have to be corrected the *hard way*.

## REPORT OF THE NEW CASTLE RECREATION COMMISSION

We have been continuing most of our programs of last year: basketball, badminton, baseball, whist parties, plays, scout activities, dinners, movies, and our annual Easter peanut hunt. In addition we have tried several new activities this past summer. A playground instructor was hired, with financial help from the P.T.A., for a month, and programs were offered in sports, arts and crafts and a trip at the end of the season to Pleasure Island. We also offered lifesaving instruction at the Hoefle's pool for the more able swimmers, along with our program for beginners at the Frobisher's pool. We were fortunate to get two very able instructors for these programs. Thank you again to the Hoefles and Frobishers.

I think that we have been most fortunate in receiving a grant, two dollars for every one raised by the town, not to exceed \$3,000.00, by The Spaulding-Potter Charitable Trusts. This will enable us to clear the area of the cement foundations and to employ the services of a park and recreational planning organization. All of us on the commission feel that we have reached the stage where professional help would be very beneficial to us, and also an overall plan would be needed to get any state or federal aid.

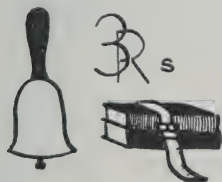

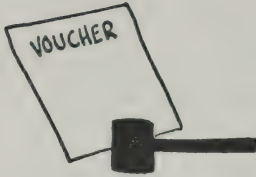

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In August of 1746 the Province awarded sums of money to widows and other sufferers who suffered losses on the attack on Louisburg.

Two widows of New Castle received 3 pounds each, the widows of Lewis Tucker and Henry Trefethen. Thomas Card was given 2 pounds.

Interesting to note is that Theodore Atkinson received 3 pounds for the loss of a gun — the same amount as that given for a human life. The gun was loaned by Atkinson to his slave John Gloster who went to war as a substitute for his master Atkinson.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

I welcome this opportunity to report to school officials and citizens of the District. In this my fifth report I wish to: (1) suggest some thought be given to expanding the school plant to provide a multi-purpose room; (2) summarize Public Law 89-10, Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, and; (3) express some personal concerns regarding the possible misuse of achievement test data.

### *Multi-Purpose Room*

New Castle's youngsters would, in my judgment, benefit greatly if appropriate physical education activities could be systematically conducted as a part of the regular school program. Physical fitness, of itself, is a worthwhile purpose and one may add the learnings involved in "team play" and the positive identification with a school as good reasons for serious consideration to be given this matter.

A multi-purpose room would also serve the school and the community in other ways. School demonstrations and presentations do much to maintain good school-community relations and a multi-purpose room would be most convenient for such use.

### *Federal Legislation*

Public Law 89-10, Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, is viewed by most educators as evidence of a much greater interest on the part of the federal government in the quality of public school education. To some critics, this "increased interest" portends federal controls as something evil. Actually federal aid, or federal financial participation is not new for we have benefited over a period

of years from the school lunch program. Impacted-area aid is certainly a most significant revenue item and the National Defense Education Act has been of help in strengthening science, mathematics and modern foreign language instruction.

Federal money is not "free money." It is obviously raised from federal tax sources rather than from property taxes. The local district may or may not choose to participate in the kind of projects which can be funded and does therefore have the final authority.

There are five titles or sections to public law 89-10 which are of particular importance to us and I will attempt to describe in very general terms the implications for Supervisory Union #21.

Title I makes available federal funds to expand and improve elementary and secondary school programs for educationally deprived children. Educationally deprived children are those whose achievement is below that normally expected of children of their age and grade. The term does include children who are handicapped by physical, mental, or emotional impairment.

Five districts, namely Seabrook, Hampton, North Hampton, Rye and Winnacunnet have authorized the use of federal funds to offer special instruction to the educationally deprived within these districts. It is expected that this program will be partially implemented by March 15, 1966. Small group instruction will be provided to correct educational weaknesses. The group will meet after school hours, occasionally during the school day, and during the summer months.

Title II provides federal funds to supplement local spending for library books and materials. The books and materials will be offered on a loan basis to all schools within the Supervisory Union and special arrangements for the distribution of these materials is being planned under a Title III grant.

Title III is designed to provide supplementary educational centers and services. In this section the United States Office of Education assumes the role primarily held by foundations and other private concerns of providing the financial incentive for creative proposals which seem to possess unusual promise of improved instruction.

The eight-member Advisory Committee which selected the grant winners reviewed 746 applications choosing only 69 projects to receive operational grants. Supervisory Union #21 was indeed fortunate to be one of the educational agencies selected. The grant will be used to provide effective instructional aids and equipment for the entire supervisory union as well as the related services offered by such a center.

#### *Achievement Test Scores Have Harmful Side Effects*

The use of test results in education is somewhat similar to the use of a drug, which use can result in harmful side effects. Sensitivity reactions may be as threatening to the patient as is the malady being treated.

Much has recently been written about the uses and abuses of achievement test results. In the State of California, for example, the General Assembly has twice debated the release of test data which emphasized the comparison of school districts and twice the General Assembly has voted to prohibit such release. In my mind the false conclusions implied should be treated in the same way that government agencies treat false advertising.

Within Union #21 there have been reports of parents unwittingly comparing test scores of one child to those of another in the same family without demonstrating understanding and affection toward both children. There have been instances where comparisons between related pupils have resulted in setting one family against another, where parents and relatives use test results for self aggrandizement and where the peace and stability of a neighborhood has been lost because of gross misunderstandings as to the purpose and meaning of test data.

Our achievement tests in the elementary grades are used as diagnostic measures to evaluate the strength and weaknesses of the *individual* pupil. There are other, less important, uses of test results and this requires critical study and analysis by persons specifically trained for such work.

In Union #21 the achievement test results are made known to parents and parents are encouraged to discuss the testing with the child's teacher. I suggest you, as a parent, be concerned with your own child's strengths and weaknesses, his academic progress, and be ever aware that no test yet invented has eliminated all errors of measurement. The teacher can give you much more information than can be learned from any single diagnostic test.

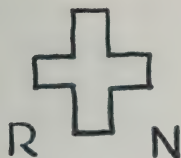
Pupils of today are learning more, they are learning at a faster rate, and they are being taught skills that will serve them for a longer period of time, than were the pupils of ten years ago, or even five.

One indication is the upgrading of norms or standards used to measure achievement of pupils across the nation. A change occurred in 1955, and again nine years later in 1964 a re-norming or re-standardization program was undertaken by the makers of the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills, used in our local testing program.

Studies of test results enable the teacher to teach to the strengths and weaknesses of individual pupils or groups of pupils that appear to have similar needs. As pupils across the nation show improvement, norms once again must be raised, but as each cycle is completed an ever improving educational program is provided.

I greatly appreciate the many kindnesses shown me by school personnel, school officials and citizens.

## SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

The health supervision of New Castle children by parents and family physicians is evident when annual physical checkups are conducted. In March, when Dr. Harold Hoefle examined pupils from the Maude Trefethen School, no serious health defects were discovered. When minor conditions are noted and reported to parents we are pleased with the prompt follow-up procedures.

In April, a team of dental hygienists, with the approval of the New Hampshire Dental Association and the New Castle School Board, set up a fluoride clinic. For a small fee, the teeth were cleaned and checked. A solution of sodium fluoride was then applied. Thirty-five children were registered and received this treatment.

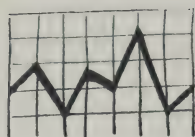
Visual acuity tests were given each pupil during the school year. These are in progress at this time for the current year. Three pupils have been referred for further examination.

Children who have been absent for three or more days must be checked by the School Nurse before returning to school. Thirty-two such checkups have been conducted by the School Nurse at her home.

Hearing tests are not held at the New Castle School because the expensive audio-testing equipment is not available. If necessary, arrangements may be made for individual testing at the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center.

The School Nurse is anxious to cooperate with parents and school personnel in maintaining the health and well-being of the New Castle school children.
