#### TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of New London in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear reports of agents or auditors and committees heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 5. To see what amount the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Town Library for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting for the ensuing year.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemetery purposes for the ensuing year.

- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to put the highway on Pleasant Street, beginning at the New London Fire House and extending to Ira S. Littlefield's corner in condition, and oil and make appropriation for the same.
- 10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the support of highways, bridges and sidewalks more than the law requires for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the construction of a sidewalk from M. H. Robbins' to Jane A. Tracy's new residence.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 for hydrant service.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars to help purchase 1600 acres of land on Kearsarge Mountain for public ownership.
- 14. To see if the Town will approve and confirm the action of the Selectmen in the construction of the extension of the sewer system, as ordered by the State Board of Health, at the cost of \$3555.62, also, the issue of notes of the Town to the amount of \$2540, as part payment of said construction.
- 15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to issue long term notes to refund the outstanding notes of \$2540, payable at such times and at such rates of interest as they may determine.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to construct additions to the sewer system, as may be required by the State Board of Health; to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to carry into effect any vote the meeting may pass relative thereto.

- 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to issue notes of the Town sufficient to pay for new construction of the sewer system, payable at such times and at such rates of interest as they may determine.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as open highways and make subject to gates and bars, agreeable to Chapter 79 Public Statutes, the following public highways:

From Putney's corner over Morgan Hill.

From northerly side of highway leading to dwelling on Walter Pingree Estate to Putney's Corner, so-called.

From Doyle's Corner to the George W. Hayes place, so-called.

From B. F. Sargent's to Benjamin Bunker place, so-called.

- 19. To see if the Town will vote to trade in the old truck for a new one and make appropriation for the same.
- 20. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to finish the construction of underpass at Little Sunapee Lake, and make appropriation of the same.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.
- 22. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

#### TRACY MEMORIAL BUILDING

#### Librarian's Report

The sixth year at Tracy Memorial has been one of the busiest in the history of the building. It would appear that our measure of service becomes greater with increased facilities of the library and the interests that it sponsors.

Different rooms have been used as a meeting place for the Woman's Club, the Hospital Aid, the editorial board of the New London News, the 4-H Club, occasional meetings of the Star Circle of the King's Daughters, a recital by the pupils of Mrs. Helen R. Colburn, and for committee meetings of numerous organizations.

The garden has been enjoyed and admired by many visitors. An added feature this year has been the water garden in the pool, and the introduction of fish to the pool. On the occasion of several evening affairs the garden has been illuminated, to the delight of all visitors. The Woman's Club presented an outdoor play, for which the garden provided an ideal setting for

the scene in sunny Spain.

The orchestra and choir have continued to work under the direction of Alfred E. Plumpton. Three concerts were given in New London, in February, March and May. The March cantata was also given at a vesper service at the First Baptist Church in Manchester and repeated at the Masonic Temple in the evening. The May concert was repeated in Manchester and a pleasing program was broadcast from Station WFEA. The work of the Tracy Memorial Orchestra received a write-up of more than half a column in the French newspaper "L'Avenir Nationale".

The exhibits arranged during the year have proved of interest, and have included the Dodge collection of medals; a display of Christmas cards designed and made under the instruction of the Art Department at Colby School for Girls; a group of Dickins' pictures; the interesting Harold Orne photographic studies; the George Washington Bicentennial Exhibit of Prints secured from the American Federation of Arts; the Manrique collection of textiles, lacquer and tiles; the Shima Japanese woodblock prints; white soap sculpture; the beautiful pictures from the first New Hampshire Salon of Photography (displayed at the Historical Building in Concord last year); the interesting portrait drawings by Elizabeth Fuller accompanied by metal boxes and trays decorated by Katherine Fuller Arms; and the George O. Draper exhibition of landscapes and sketches. From the latter exhibit the library has the loan of the popular canvas "Evening Star" for the winter months.

Classes from the Colby Hill School have continued to profit by their opportunity to follow the course in music appreciation offered by the Walter Damrosch hour on the radio once a week during several months of the school year. In February the debating team from the Colby Hill School held a debate in the assembly hall, meeting the Richards Junior High Debating Club of

Newport.

Entertaining and educational programs of the year have been travel talks by Mrs. Mary B. Macomber, who fascinatingly described Mediterranean countries visited with Mrs. Tracy, and illustrated by lantern pictures made by Mrs. Macomber; Seth A. Lamson, who gave a graphic narration of his walking trip through Corsica; and Joseph M. Clough's presentation of a summer's trip by motor across our country and return, illustrated with numerous pictures. The Constance Russell Marionettes were entertainers during afternoon and evening programs in observance of Good Book Colby Junior College and Tracy Memorial joined in bringing Miss Jennie Lee, a member of British Parliament, to New London. Harold Morrison Smith, an authority on Indian civilization, was a welcome Herbert D. Swift kindly entertained with moving pictures of local scenes and people, which always interest an audience. Numerous slides of native wild flowers photographed in color were shown by E. D. Putnam, who contributed many interesting facts concerning wild flowers. The unusual motion pictures of "The Realm of the Honeybee" and the fascinating talk on the subject by Phillip E. Crane were enjoyed and will be remembered by all who were fortunate enough to be present.

Holiday decorations, carol singing and program were in evidence at Christmas time. On New Year's Day open house was kept with open fires, music and refreshments to welcome all visitors. The choir enjoyed a Christmas tree and party at the library one evening

after choir practice.

There have been special features connected with the work of the children's room. Good Book Week was observed with books arranged as a Book Fair in the post office window. A Christmas tree with unexpected gifts for everyone was enjoyed the Saturday afternoon preceding Christmas. A baker's dozen of interesting, colorful puzzles were made, named and boxed by the children as gifts for the children of the Pembroke Town Library, which has opened a children's room this year. Mrs. Macomber entertained the children one afternoon with lantern pictures and stories of her trip with Mrs. Tracy, in Africa and southern Europe. Several of the boys continue to exchange stamps at the library, where a duplicate collection is kept for the purpose of exchange. Last year mention was made of the Friendship Chest, letter and money for hot lunches sent to the school children of Porto Rico. A letter of thanks, also two post card views have been received by the children, from the fifth grade in Aquadilla. The annual reading contest was based upon stories of American life, and record was kept by means of colored outline maps, punched to locate books read. Twenty-six boys and girls enrolled, and a total of 206 books were read from a chosen list. Prizes awarded at the grammar school graduation exercises went to Edward Picknell and Hattie Lull of the Elkins School. Honorable mention was given Dorothy Nudd and John Pierce of the same school, and Dorothy Green and Malcolm Smith of the Colby Hill School.

Gifts from friends of the library have included maps, books, local pictures, post cards, foreign photographs, scrapbooks, bookplates, a French flag, petrified wood, stamps, a doll, and much material from the U. S. George

Washington Bicentennial Committee.

Mr. and Mrs. Herbert D. Swift presented the library with a copy of Miss Walden's book, "Igloo", containing the autograph of Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd.

Among visitors at the library during the past year was Herman Currier, who was born in the old Morgan house, now Tracy Memorial Building. Three authors are known to have been among our out-of-town visitors, Helen Nicolay, Earle Looker, and James Morgan. Copies of their books, owned by the library, were autographed by the authors.

Loans of many books for the use of borrowers during the winter months were thoughtfully made by Mr. and Mrs. Francisco J. Manrique, and Mrs. Florence Griffin.

Other loans have been pictures, medals, fossil specimens, Confederate money, plants, stamps, photoradio-

gram, and curios.

Special gifts from Mrs. Tracy during the months of the past year have included a set of the writings of Alice Van Leer Carrick, autographed copies of "Complete Garden" and "Russia—My Home", two copies of "Only Yesterday", the William Howard Taft Memorial Edition of the Smithsonian Scientific Series, in 12 volumes; and "Source Records of the Great Events of the Post War Period" in four volumes. The Taft edition and "Source Records" are de luxe bindings. A panoramic view of the grounds and buildings of the International Exposition to be held in Chicago in 1933, several Daniel Webster statuettes, and a beautiful brass teakettle from India, have also been gifts from Mrs. Tracy.

The library still receives the books sent quarterly for addition to the International Mind Alcove. The volumes of the Dictionary of American Biography are added as published, usually three volumes a year, and purchased with the income from the Brown Fund. Nine volumes have been published to date. The World Book Encyclopaedia has been added, which is published in 20 volumes, and is modern, comprehensive and pictorial, a reference set which is valuable for work with students, especially with those of high school age, but fascinating to an older person seeking information.

Reviews of recent books by local people were run for a time in the library column of the New London News. At the time of the historical parade on Hospital Tag Day the library was responsible for the float representing the romance of Martha Custis and George Washington.

The routine care of the library, building and garden has been carried on by the same staff as during the previous year. Mrs. Allie Sargent has faithfully exchanged the books for Elkins borrowers once a week. Alice Todd, who has been vacation assistant for several years, served again in that capacity during the summer months.

The count of visitors during the year has been 24,225, an increase of 2,045 visitors. Books and magazines circulated have totaled 18,873, figuring an increase of 1,803 volumes. Non-fiction circulation was 3,208 volumes, an increase of 343 volumes above that of last year in the non-fiction group. It is a matter of enlightenment to compare the statistics of five years ago with those of today. By so doing we learn that our book circulation has leaped ahead 8,949 volumes, or, in other words, nearly doubled itself in five years. Our visitors are more numerous, 6,197 more than five years ago. Is a library and community house worth while?

If a record were kept of the reference work done with teachers and students of the various schools of the town the increase in the use of the library would register to a more marked degree than present figures indicate.

The accession book shows a total of 8,363 books, figuring an addition of 447 volumes since the report of last year. Of these, 348 volumes were added by purchase, 99 volumes by gift. With a reduced library appropriation fewer books than usual could be added and greater use of the book collection made necessary more of an expenditure for the re-binding of worn books.

Since this report was submitted to the trustees the first of October the increased use of the library by students of the town school, especially of the high school, is very marked. In the few months since the opening of school in September the visitation count and

circulation of books and magazines as compared with the same months of the previous year is of considerable interest, showing 1,264 more visitors and a circulation of 1,459 more books and magazines. The opening of a high school adjacent to the library naturally would mean increased use of library facilities and the anticipation of the librarians in this respect has been more than realized.

# REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF NEW LONDON HOSPITAL AND NURSING ASSOCIATION

A report by the president of the Board of Trustees of the New London Hospital seems to be an unprecedented innovation in the annals of this institution, and would seem to be correspondingly desirable. The pitiful paucity of townspeople who are present at the annual meetings of this Association has urged upon the president the desirability of printing a fuller report of the conditions, functioning, and financial status that maintain at the Hospital, and for the partial support of which a portion of the taxes of the people are levied.

The vacancy created by the resignation of Mrs. Fay L. Heath, R. N., last October as Head Nurse was filled by electing Miss Ellen H. Boyle, R. N., formerly assistant superintendent of the Mary Hitchcock Hospital at Hanover, N. H., and who is proving to be very capable and efficient in her present capacity. Under her direction the entire staff of the Hospital has functioned with unusual smoothness and proficiency, as well as with the efficiency of able superintending.

Every year the Hospital is the beneficiary of numerous private gifts of equipment and supplies, and this year has been no exception. This report, however, will deal only with the additions and improvements that have been made

through the efforts of the Executive Board.

During the year there has been a public pay station installed at the office, thereby simplifying the problem of telephone tolls, which have frequently been a liability to the Hospital treasury in the past.

Large chemical fire extinguishers have been provided for the main floor and second floor of the building. Up to this year there has been nothing of this kind in the building.

Cubicle curtains have been put in the women's ward which make it possible to screen every bed individually from every other one in the ward by the simple expedient of pulling two curtains together which are suspended from wires.

A nurse's emergency bell has been installed between the main ward corridor and the head nurse's room which will enable the night nurse, or any nurse on duty alone, to summon help from the head nurse immediately without commotion or loss of time.

Plans and specifications have been drawn up, and estimates made for a proposed addition to the present building which would encorporate a delivery room, nursery, X-ray room, private room, dark room, store rooms, and an elevator shaft.

The men's ward has been taken over and equipped as a delivery room for the present, and one of the private rooms has been furnished with another bed, and is now being used for a men's ward. One side of the present delivery room has been equipped to be used as a nursery.

A new system of Hospital records has been inaugurated making all information needed with regard to patients in a more readily available form.

A practically whole new hot water system has been put in which not only gives more hot water, but makes more room in the kitchen and cellar, and has reduced the expense for coal by some sixty dollars.

Toilet facilities for the janitor have been provided in the basement.

A new dark room for developing X-ray negatives has been constructed in the basement; the former one located in the attic being inadequate and unsuitable for reasons of temperature, size, accessibility and construction.

Our operating deficit has been reduced this year which we attribute partly to the decline of prices, partly to the increased efficiency of the staff, and to a better condition of collection of patients' bills and fees.

Several reductions have been made in the salaries of the staff during the past year, and problems are being considered for another year whereby a reduction in some departments will, in all probability become inevitable.

The financial panic made itself known very sternly on Tag Day, our receipts being only about half of what they were a year ago. In spite of all adverse conditions the Hospital is as well off, if not slightly better, than in previous years.

Our operating expense is approximately 20% less this year than a year ago which is gratifying to all concerned. The present cost per patient per day on an average is higher than the highest rate charged to any inmate, which is almost universally true of all hospitals. This fact is the principal one in producing a constant operating deficit which is inevitable in all institutions of this nature with little or no endowment. The financial report this year embraces a somewhat larger field than heretofore, and is designed to give a more accurate conception of the whole financial condition of the Association.

With the hope that this will give a clearer view of the operation of the Hospital this report is respectfully submitted.

# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board, New London, N. H.:

For the first time in a number of years, we have this year an opportunity to report on a major change in our schools.

At the District Meeting last spring, your Board was authorized to organize a public high school. This in-

troduced a number of imposing problems.

First, it was necessary to develop a curriculum. After much thought and discussion, it was decided to confine the efforts to a school which had as its main purpose the preparation of young people for college, but with some alteration for those who definitely were not planning to continue in school. This was more of a problem than seems apparent to those who went to college a few years ago. For many years the college preparatory course has been very much standardized, but in the last few years the colleges have been making great changes in their requirements. Probably for some years to come it will not be possible to make such a curriculum with entire satisfaction to everyone, as neither the colleges nor the high schools of America seem to know what they are trying to accomplish. However, we have developed a curriculum which seems reasonably satisfactory for the present.

Next was the problem of housing. It was manifestly impossible to consider a new building at a time when bonds could not be sold, and when no one knew what burdens the tax payer would have to meet because of the economic disturbance. Your Board, with great ingenuity, developed three new class rooms, together with a rest room and kitchen, in the present building. To the casual eye, this would have seemed impossible, but

the results have been remarkable.

Such a plant as we now have, however, must be looked upon as temporary. The enrollment was larger than was expected. The school is crowded to a point

where the very best educational results cannot be expected. As soon as business conditions permit, if the school is to be continued, the town must consider the

matter of a new building.

The third problem was the question of a teaching faculty. It was decided that the teachers must be equal to those to be found in good schools anywhere, and that inexperienced teachers should not be employed. Your Board put in more time and effort than I have ever before known a board to do, in order to secure a satisfactory group. All of the teachers secured have had graduate study beyond the usual requirements, and all have had successful experience.

The next problem was the building of a school. By this I mean the taking of pupils from other schools, with different traditions, and welding them into a new body, without previous traditions. This is naturally a very difficult task. It has not yet been fully accomplished, and what has been accomplished has not been done without difficulty. If "it takes centuries to build a nation", it certainly takes years to build a school.

Progress in this direction is evident, however.

Taken as a whole, I should say that, in the year since your Board was authorized to go ahead, you have gone

a long way.

I have spent considerable time in discussing the high school, as that is the new, and consequently most interesting, subject. Your elementary schools have not been neglected. In the mastery of subject matter, they have led the schools of this Union. The pupils stand very high in all tests, compared to the nation as a whole. We are not satisfied with that, however, and are continuing our effort to improve.
