It will be noted that about 50 per cent of the pupils have defective teeth. Six cases have been treated since the last examination.

During the year standard tests were given in all the fundamentals. By this means the points for needed drill were discovered, and considerable improvement was made.

In June the following four pupils were graduated from the eighth grade: Raymond Croteau, Frank Starkey, Harold Stafford, Evelyn Stafford.

Considerable musical ability is manifest among the pupils of both schools. It has been suggested to me by some of the parents that it would be wise to employ a special teacher for this subject. This teacher by giving a lesson in each school once in two or three weeks would assist greatly in developing the ability of the pupils, and increasing their interest in this important subject.

A report on the new schoolhouse is not properly included here, as the erection of the building did not begin until after

the close of this school year. However, we may anticipate slightly by saying that we believe it to be one of the best one-room buildings to be found in a day's travel. The interior might be improved by the addition of two more good pictures, and it is possible that some interested citizen may contribute these.

At the South school the old fashioned double desks might well be replaced by others like those in the new building.

In conclusion we wish to thank the parents, the teachers, and the board for their interest and wholehearted support in the improvement of the school.
