The town report shows the following debt changes:

The reduction in interest bearing debt is something all are interested in. A continuation of last year's good work for three years will result in the wiping out of this item. The work of the Selectmen in debt reduction the past year is highly commendable.

Water Collections

Over \$11,000.00 in water rents were collected. This item is down to \$4,979.28, showing a reduction of \$2,127.16 from the figure of \$7,106.44 at the end of the previous year. This item will eventually show only a nominal amount. To get a better picture of the improved situation in this department attention is called to uncollected balance of \$14,699.92 shown in 1940 report.

Old Unpaid Taxes

Attention is again called to unpaid taxes.

Under assets an item of \$3,538.24 is shown as taxes not collected previous years. It is the opinion of this committee, a portion of this item is collectable. It would seem that little or no effort was being made to collect by former tax collectors.

All items not collectable should be removed from the list of assets without any more delay and the balance collected promptly.

Appropriations and Taxes

We feel that appropriations for 1943 should be held at a low level and that taxes be reduced. These items showed an increase in 1942 and this fact was commented on unfavorably by State Officials. The trend over the state was opposite to our experience.

WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE
To the Inhabitants of the Town of Northumberland,
qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, March 9, 1943, to act upon the subjects hereinafter mentioned. The polls will be open at said place and date from 9.00 o'clock in the forenoon until 6.00 o'clock in the afternoon for the reception of your ballots upon the election of town officers under the Australian Ballot Laws; furthermore, you are hereby warned that on said date and place, at 11.00 o'clock in the forenoon, the matters of appropriations and such other business properly coming before said meeting will be taken up for your consideration and action.

1. To chose by ballot the following town officers for the ensuing year: a town clerk, a town treasurer, two auditors and one road agent.
2. To choose by ballot the following town officers for the ensuing three years: one selectman, one library trustee and one trustee of the trust funds.
3. To see if the town will instruct its selectmen to appoint all other town officers as required by law.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town officers and for the support of the town poor.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the police department.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for building and repairing highways and bridges and for town maintenance.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for sewer maintenance.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting streets for the ensuing year.
9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the public library.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day.
11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the employment of a district nurse.
12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to meet interest charges for the ensuing year.
13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$318.79 for town road aid, thereby obtaining from the State the sum of \$1,275.14 to be expended on class V roads.
14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for miscellaneous expenses.
15. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for maintaining a suitable skating place on the old ball field.
16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to provide watchmen and additional police protection due to the war emergency.
17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the use of the town health officer and board of health due to the war emergency.
18. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust in coöperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.
19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to the White Mountains Region Association for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and otherwise calling attention to the resources and advantages of the town, in coöperation with the other 45 towns in the White Mountains Region.
20. To see whether traveling carnivals shall be prohibited from operating in town during the ensuing year.
21. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes in order to defray expenses.
22. To see if the town will vote for a scale of discounts for the prepayment of real estate and personal property taxes on the basis of three per cent, if paid

by June 1, 1942, two per cent if paid by August 1, 1942, and one per cent if paid by October 1, 1942, or any other scale of discount that the town may vote to determine.

23. To see if the town will vote to construct a sidewalk to the new foot bridge from Brooklyn and Mechanic Streets and raise sufficient money therefor.

24. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway which served the foot bridge lost in the 1936 flood owing to the fact that the selectmen have laid out a different highway to the new foot bridge.

25. To see if the voters will instruct the selectmen to put poison rat bait on all town dumps every week and raise money for same.

26. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,500.00 for tarring the streets in Groveton village.

27. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

28. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative thereto.

29. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before said meeting.

A REPORT ON CUTTING OPERATIONS ON TOWN LOT

To the Selectmen of Northumberland, N. H.:

Arrangements were made by the selectmen for the sale of stumpage on the Northumberland town lot, a part of lot 119 to the Forest Products Association, Inc., in December, 1942. Actual operations started in January, 1943, with Mr. B. M. Merrill in charge. Labor has been hard to get and snow conditions difficult for cutting. However, with two cutters working part time, approximately 40 cords of first class fuel wood and 35 hundred feet, board measure, of hardwood logs have been cut to date. Operations are expected to continue at a more rapid pace as cutting conditions become more favorable in the spring.

The cutting operations are being done on a selective basis with an idea of bringing the area into continuous production. The trees are marked for cutting by a trained Norris-Doxey Farm Forester, under the direction of Mr. C. S. Herr, Assistant Extension Forester, and include only merchantable trees and trees that are defective or crowded. While the logs are being marketed through the Forest Products Association, Inc., with office in town, the fuel wood is a result of more complete utilization of tapwood and poor grade material, which is a very desirable bi-product at present wartime conditions.

The cut over area will support a good young stand of hardwood after the current cutting has been completed and will be ready to cut again in 10 to 15 years, bringing a return very favorable to the present operations.

The area is a fine example of what can be done under average conditions by the application of good forest practices. It is suggested that the area be open for the public as a demonstration area.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Members of the Northumberland School Board:
I hereby submit for your consideration, my ninth annual report of the Northumberland schools.

The school census taken last September, 1942, showed 534 people in town between the ages of 5 and 16. Of this number, 28 between 5 and 8 and 6 between 14 and 16 or a total of 34 were reported not in school. Those between 14 and 16 had completed the eighth grade. There were 572 pupils registered in the schools on September 30, 1942. Of this number 65 were over 16 years old. The whole number of resident pupils in school between the ages of 5 and 16 was 500. There were 7 pupils registered from outside of the district whose ages were between 5 and 16. Three handicapped children were reported under 21 years.

There were no changes in the teaching force of the elementary school building. From the high school building, we lost John G. Barry who failed to return when the schools opened in September, Hollis Sawyer left in June to do defense work, D. Chandler Matthews was drafted for the army in August and Thelma K. Bond left at Christmas time to take a similar position in Portsmouth. The positions have been filled by the election of Sophie Byk, Ellen B. Corey, Elizabeth N. Walker and Priscilla B. Evans.

Not being able to get a teacher-coach this year, the physical training is being carried on by Mr. Cascadden working with the boys and Miss Corey with the girls. Miss Willard has been helping with the basketball.

The transportation routes this year are as follows: Howard Potter, 41 pupils from Lost Nation road; Clayton Potter, 57 pupils with two trips from Northumberland road; Burward McLaughlin, 43 pupils from the Stratford line and the Craggy road; Lawrence Gonyer, 10 pupils to meet the Howard Potter bus; and Mrs. Veora Wheelock, 6 pupils from the Stark road. Nineteen high school pupils and 147 elementary pupils or a total of 166 are being transported at a cost of \$4,399.20.

There are registered in the elementary school two non-resident pupils—Stratford one and Stark one. In the high school are registered 22 non-resident pupils as follows: Guildhall, 6; Maidstone, 3; and Stark, 13.

The following data were gleaned from last year's registers: Unrepeated registration was 622—eleven more than last year; per cent of attendance 95.6—1.26 less than the previous year; 6 school board meetings were held; 975 tardy marks were recorded (far too many); 12 visits were made by school board members; 348 visits by citizens; and the superintendent was credited with 1,057 visits.

Sixty-nine pupils had a perfect record, that is, they were not absent or tardy during the year—elementary building, 24; and high school building, 45; and their names are as follows: Irene Meunier, Joyce Knapp, Marjorie Curtis, Vivian Cantin, Beverly Rolfe, Verna Donovan, Dorothy Dunham, Lorraine Baron, Priscilla Shedd, Lawrence Sweeney, Kenneth Cantin, Mary Grout, Elizabeth Higgins, Lucille Roberge, Harold Rolfe, Janette Rowell, Florence Taylor, Phyllis Turner, Lorraine Shedd, Marcia Perham, Ernest de Le Bruere, Harry Crawford, Rena LeClaire, William Mathurin, Rachel McFarland, John Ryan, Lloyd Wheelock, Josephine Forrest, Lorraine King, Donald Malefant, Edna Mayberry, Marilyn Mead, Mary Perham, Richard Perham, Elmer Sweeney, Frank Styles, Louis de La Bruere, Erma Hunter, Shirley Maguire, Barbara Mead, Annie Portigue, Willard Turner, Homer Chase, Armand

In addition to the minor repairs, some rooms in both buildings were redecorated during the summer vacation. Quite extensive repairs were made on the residence of the headmaster.

Mr. Omand, head of the Manual Arts department, has devoted quite a good deal of his class time in making model airplanes for the government. Besides the work on the planes some of the classes have made some very useful articles. Mr. Omand has had charge of the skating rink which has been enjoyed by many people.

Miss Jackson is doing the same efficient work with her classes in Home Economics. The home visits have been somewhat curtailed this year on account of transportation.

The yearly health check-up was made by Dr. W. R. Schillhammer, assisted by Florence Wheeler, R. N. Miss Wheeler makes daily visits to the elementary school building. She has held twelve dental clinics from November, 1941, to June, 1942. Sixty-three pupils were treated and 180 corrections made. Three T. and A. clinics were held in the Lancaster Hospital during July and August, 1941—twenty cases treated.

Penny milk is being served to 350 school children daily—68 in the high school building and 282 in the elementary building.

Physical Fitness program has been introduced into the high school under the guidance of Roy G. Cascadden and Ellen B. Corey. Miss Corey has charge of the girl divisions. This course was urged by the Federal Government through the State Board of Education.

Remedial work is carried on in all grades where needed with an effort to raise the standard of the work in the schools.
