TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillsborough
[L. s.] in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the E. G. Sherburne School "Cafetorium" in said Pelham on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects: The polls will open at 10 a.m. and close no earlier than 6 p.m. The tentative date for the business meeting is Thursday, March 10, 1960 at 7:30 p.m.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same, that is, if the Town will vote to accept the Town Budget as prepared by the Budget Committee and to take action thereon.
3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen, or a majority thereof, and Town Treasurer to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$705.41 as the Town's share of Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$4,702.71 as the State's share, as provided by law.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to add to the Capital Reserve Fund, for the purpose of purchasing a fire truck, or take any other action relative thereto.
6. To see if the Town will vote to transfer any unexpended balance of the Fire Department appropriation for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1960, to the Capital Reserve Fund, for the purpose of purchasing a fire truck, or take any other action relative thereto.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to purchase advertising in the 1961 Guide of the Merrimack Valley Region, or take any other action relative thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to join in a Regional Planning Commission and authorize the Selectmen to appoint two members to represent the Town. The initial terms shall be, the first member to serve for one year, the second, for two years, and at the expiration of each year, a member shall be appointed to serve for two years. This commission would be established under authority granted in sections 37-44, Chapter 36 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$850.00 for the purpose of repairing and gravelling Spring Street, so called, from the Dracut line to the Honor Roll, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition).

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,550.00 for the purpose of oiling or tarring or otherwise black-topping Loretta Avenue, Clearview Avenue and Doris Avenue, so called, same to be done in the year of 1960, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition).

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,800.00 for the purpose of tarring Dutton Road, so called, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition).

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,350.00 for the purpose of gravelling and tarring Tenney Road, so called, for a distance of approximately 4-10 of a mile westerly from Nashua Road, so called, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition).

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,475.00 for the purpose of tarring the remainder of Valley Hill Farm Road, so called, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition).

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,581.00 for the purpose of tarring the remainder of Atwood Road, so called, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition).

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,520.00 for the purpose of grading and tarring Tower Road, so called, on Jeremy Hill, so called, from the junction of Chase Lane, so called, and Tower Road, so called, to a point 300 feet beyond the Nystrom residence; this distance being 6-10 of a mile, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition).

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,375.00 for the purpose of gravelling and tarring or

applying other asphalt mix or blacktop surface on Peabody Road, so called, for a distance of approximately 3-10 of a mile commencing at Currier Road at the Foisie home and running to the Peabody Homestead, or take any other action relative thereto. (by petition).

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION

The Pelham Industrial Commission was formed during 1959 for the purpose of interesting desirable industrial firms to locate within our township and to render assistance to prospective manufacturers in locating property and arranging necessary financing as may be required.

The group, which was selected by the Selectmen, is composed of the following: A. E. Hirsch, Chairman; H. S. Currier, R. J. Gagne, Secretary; R. W. Ivers, and Col. T. E. Steed.

Shortly after its formation, the group met and consulted with the New Hampshire State Planning Commission. This organization advised that Zoning to protect industry was a necessity before any manufacturers would become interested in the area. Proof of this was found when five small manufacturers became disinterested in the area because of the lack of proper zoning. The activities of the commission were hampered by this fact for the remainder of the year.

The purpose of the commission will be pursued more actively in 1960 in view of the favorable zoning laws having been accepted by the residents of Pelham.

REPORT OF BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Selectmen feel it appropriate to report their efforts and comments on some of the Town affairs of the past year.

The Selectmen's semi-monthly meetings were held at the town officers room at the Library and were open to the public. Appointments, votes and other action was taken by the Board and recorded.

The Selectmen were represented on the Planning Board and Budget Committee, and at meetings held by the newly appointed Industrial Commission.

In keeping with the growth of the Town, the Selectmen enacted ordinances regulating public beaches, regulations and licensing of junk yards and the licensing of persons engaged in the selling of dairy products.

Cooperation on the part of our Representative resulted in the State Highway Department giving immediate attention to the painting of center lines, and the posting of necessary caution signs on the hazardous part of Gage Hill Road (Route 38). This fall construction was started to eliminate several of these hazardous curves.

After several power failures a meeting was arranged with the officials of the Granite State Electric Company, resulting in several dead trees being cut down and removed at no cost to the Town. We believe that the results have been gratifying.

The Reappraisal of the properties by the State to equalize assessments was completed. Over 1400 property record cards are now on file in the Town Officers' Room. The Selectmen's field book is also completed and in alphabetical order.

To date only 59 appeals have been made to your Selectmen, in comparison to approximately 70 appeals and complaints on property assessment for the year 1957.

We are of the opinion that results of the Special Town Meeting of January 8, 1960 were the proper steps to better our town for the future. Progress and growth are inevitable, but growth without proper zoning and planning could only bring our town unbearable burdens for generations to come. It is hoped that as we grow and progress, our future will invoke a balance between residential and industrial growth.

Due to the continued growth and the location of Pelham as a border town, consideration should be given to having full time

police and fire protection in the near future. Also we must face up to owning our own cruiser, the present one being owned and chiefly maintained by the Police Relief Association.

We should therefore better organize our efforts as our future growth comes upon us.

We appreciate the property owners for their generous efforts in making possible the tarring of some town roads.

In conclusion we wish to acknowledge the complete cooperation of all town officials and the general interest of townspeople during the past year.

REPORT OF PELHAM PLANNING BOARD

In addition to the Planning Board's regular meetings there were six special meetings and three public hearings held relative to changes in building and zoning laws. These meetings culminated in the Special Town Meeting of January 5, 1960, when the town adopted the articles of the Warrant by a vote of 151 to 17. A brief summary of that warrant shows residential, business, industrial and rural zones were established in Pelham and a zoning map was filed with the Town Clerk. Definitions for these zones or districts, and the uses permitted in each, were accepted as set forth in the warrant. Additional definitions were made to original zoning ordinances to clarify existing rules for the benefit of every property owner in Pelham.

The Planning Board holds its regular meetings in the Town Officers room at the Library on the first Monday of each month. All citizens interested in Pelham's future are always welcome and their cooperation is appreciated.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Pelham for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Cemetery Trust Committee, Library and Municipal Court.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1958—December 31, 1959: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1958 and December 31, 1959, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein the financial condition of the Town changed from a Net Debt of \$10,042.16 to a Surplus of \$7,822.87, in 1959.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

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Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4,) a revenue surplus of \$13,551.30, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$1,348.07, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$14,899.37.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1959, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit I)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1959, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

It is noted that the current financial condition of the Town changed from a current deficit (excess of current liabilities over total assets) of \$1,042.16, to a current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) of \$13,822.87, in 1959, as shown herewith:

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note. 58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners; 10%, or one out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent-minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple:

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles—use your ash tray.
5. Don't burn at home—use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

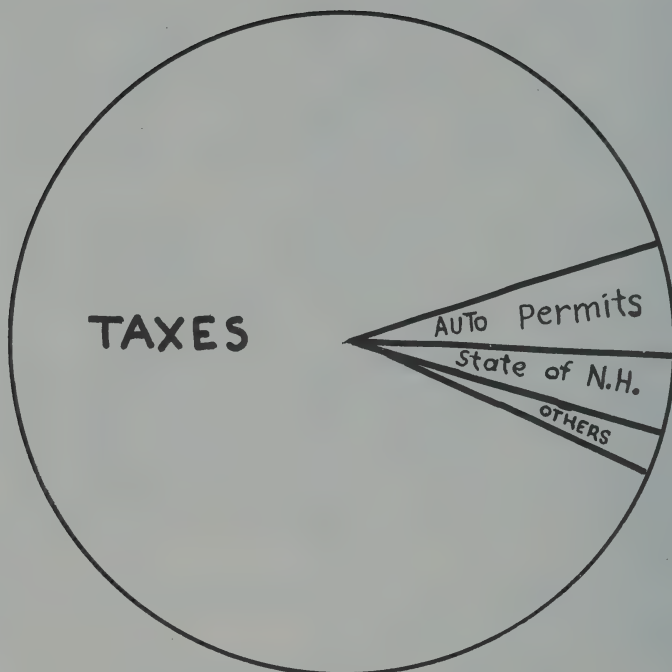

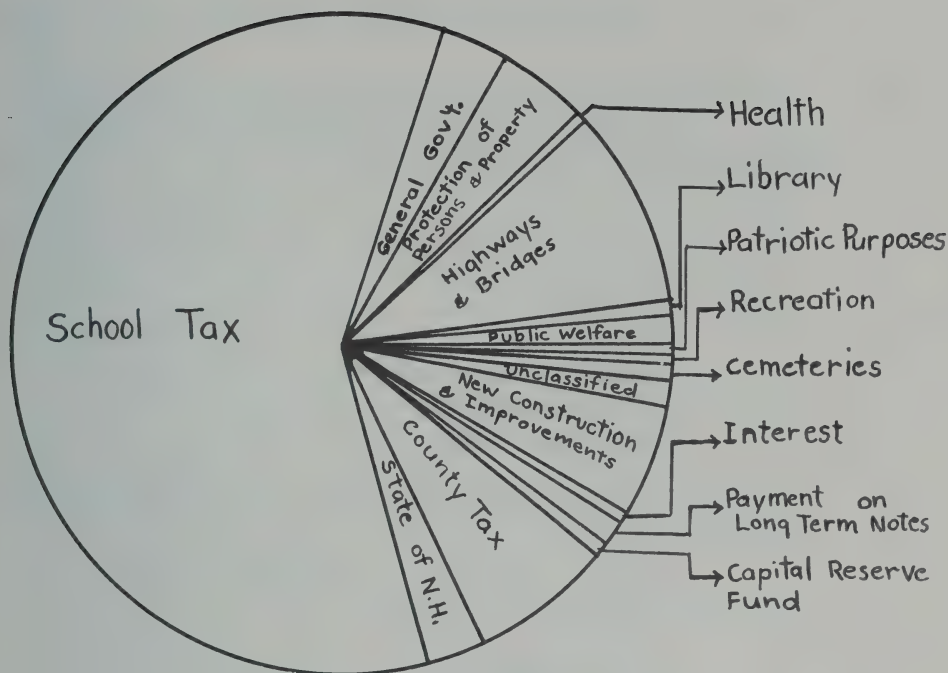

REPORT OF THE STATE NURSE

There was a series of Immunization Clinics held at the E. G. Sherburne School in March, April and May of 1959. Pre-school children received their three shots against whooping cough, tetanus and diphtheria. Children of all ages were eligible for the

Salk Vaccine shots and adults were also given Salk Immunization.

Pre-schoolers received their small pox vaccination at the March 24 clinic and also the November 19 Clinic.

Again in November, those children getting first and second Salk shots were given a chance to get their shots at the clinics on October 8 and on November 12. An adult clinic was held at the Sherburne school, where working teenagers and adults were given their Salk vaccine shots in the evening. A great number of townspeople availed themselves of this opportunity to receive protection and all clinics were well attended.

Mrs. Anna Horskin, R. N., presided at all clinics and Mrs. Laverne Steck, R.N. and Mrs. Rita Ducharme, R.N. were present at each. Mrs. Mabel Burton and Mrs. Florence Foisie assisted with clerical work. Oscar Burns, M.D., and Augusta Law, M.D. were the clinic doctors.

The project was under the direction of the New Hampshire State Department of Health.

The librarian, Mrs. Crossley, attended the University of New Hampshire courses in Public Library Techniques for three weeks this past summer. SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Pelham qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the E. G. Sherburne School in said district on the 23rd day of March, 1960, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to vote for officers under Articles 1, 2, 3, and 4. Polls will be open from one to nine p.m. Action on remaining Articles will begin at 8 p.m.

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the District will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund not to exceed Twelve Hundred (\$1200.) dollars to be used for the purpose of improving the water system at the E. G. Sherburne School. This money to be the balance of the sum raised and appropriated for the above purpose under Article 10 in the 1959-60 School District Warrant; or to take any other action relating thereto.

10. To see if the District will vote to hold its Annual School District Meeting on the third Wednesday following the Annual Town Meeting; or to take any other action relating thereto.

11 By Petition — To see if the School District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to be added to the present salary of the Supervisor of the Hot Lunch Program.

12. To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to appoint a committee to investigate future school housing needs of the School District. This committee to report during the year to the School Board and to the next Annual Meeting as to its recommendations concerning immediate and future needs and solutions.

13. To see if the School District will vote to adopt the following resolution:

WHEREAS the property taxes of most of the cities and towns of New Hampshire have reached exorbitant rates, and

WHEREAS this increase in the tax rate is caused directly by the great increase in population and a lagging increase in property values, be it

Resolved, that this School District Meeting go on record as favoring the enactment by the State of New Hampshire of a broad based sales and income tax, to be returned in its entirety to the school districts of the cities and towns, after deducting costs of collection. This return to be on a formula based on the equalized valuation and the enrolled school population of the cities and towns; and be it further

Resolved, that the School Board be authorized to send copies of this resolution to the Governor, the State Senate and State House Representatives, to our local State Senator and State Representative, and to any other groups or persons who may be concerned with this problem.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF PELHAM SCHOOL BOARD

This report will be confined primarily to the operation of the school system, both physical and financial, rather than to the educational aspects which are fully covered by the reports of the professional staff and are printed elsewhere. However, at this time we wish to compliment these people for their hard work and^{er} planning in this field. Our goal in education cannot be a stagnant one, but must be forward looking and flexible to meet changing times and conditions. To this end we congratulate our professional staff in the District for their work and intend to lend all possible encouragement for future progress.

SCHOOL FINANCES are and will continue to be an ever-increasing problem for a community such as ours. The only direct state aid Pelham received this year was \$3,000.00 toward bond retirement and none whatsoever toward direct costs of the school system. We see no chance of any increase in state aid until such time as the cities and towns of New Hampshire take positive action to force the Legislature and Executive Department to take a more realistic approach to the question of the real estate owner's ability to pay taxes.

BUDGET. The rise in the total budget this year is caused by several factors. One is increased high school enrollment and the fact that two high schools with comparatively low tuition will no longer take our students. Another major point is the increase in our own elementary pupils. From just under 400 students last year we are fairly certain of a minimum enrollment of 460 next September. We would also point out that the school auditorium was built with the idea that it could be a center for community activities. This it has truly become. However, the costs of this program are not truly educational costs, but by law must be part of the school budget. We would also point out that all items in the budget were included only after consultation with the Budget Committee and represent the lowest per item cost that we have been able to get.

TEACHERS' SALARIES. It has been asked of the School Board whether we try to set the pace in this matter or not. Such a charge could not be further from the truth. What we have attempted to do is to find out what is being done in this general geographic area and then to set a standard of pay that will permit us to at least compete for teachers. It might be well to

point out that as of the last week in August of last year we had not been able to hire a single replacement teacher for the money appropriated. It is also an interesting fact that as of the first of February the top quarter of the graduating class of Plymouth Teachers' College have all been hired or offered contracts for the next school year. One student has been offered and has accepted a starting pay of \$5,200.00 In the face of these conditions and the pay scale that we have been offering we are exceptionally fortunate to have the able and interested staff that we do. The School Board would like the Annual School Meeting to give it some firm guidance as to whether we should plan to retain able teachers for a period of years or if we should base our planning on our school serving as a training ground for teachers and then replacing them after two or three years.

SCHOOL BAND. We expect that with the continued cooperation of the school and the band committee that this organization will continue to develop into a worthwhile addition to the school program.

VOTE OF THANKS. The School Board takes this opportunity to thank the following organizations and individuals who have given freely of their time and money to aid the school: The various organizations of the town under the leadership of the Grange for the curtains for the stage and for the public address system; the P. T. A. for the card tables and for the shades in the auditorium; Mr. Alfred Luneau for the basketball scoreboard; the Pelham A. A. for the basketball backboards, and the students of the Junior High for \$100.00 toward their cost; Mr. Clement McCarthy for his donated legal services in bringing to a satisfactory conclusion our negotiations with the general contractor and his sub-contractors; the American Legion, Post 100 for the American flag for the auditorium; the workers in the lunch room for the band capes and the band mothers for the background instruments for the band. To these people and to any others that we may not be aware of, we say "Thanks."

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Pelham School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets—June 30, 1958—June 30, 1959: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1958 and June 30, 1959, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the New Debt decreased by \$3,028.55 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$3,896.92, less a revenue surplus of \$1,016.71, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$2,880.21.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1959, is indicated in Exhibit F.

Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit J)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1959, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit J.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus or (Deficit):

It is noted that the current financial condition of the School District changed from a current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) of \$4,091.24 to a current deficit (excess of current liabilities over total assets) of \$2,880.21, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959, as shown herewith:

School Tax Account:

A statement of the School District tax account is presented in Exhibit K. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1959, the School District had received the entire amount of the 1958-59 School tax from the Town of Pelham and also an advance of \$2,371.26 on the 1959-60 tax. This is included as a liability account in the Balance Sheet of June 30, 1959.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) of this report shall be published in the next annual report of the School District.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Pelham School District for their assistance during the course of the audit.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and citizens of the Pelham School District:

It gives me pleasure to submit this, my fifth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

There is a saying "Figures don't lie, but liars do figure." To be sure I'm not listed in the latter category I would hasten to add the following statistics that are taken from reports we must make out for the State Department of Education. Their source is the classroom Register which is an accurate tabulation of all pupil enrollments and is a legal document by New Hampshire School Law.

I list the above statistics for the sole purpose of calling to your attention the rapid increase in school population over the past few years. As pupil enrollment increases naturally school costs must rise to meet the added needs brought about by that increase. More teachers, more furniture, (a log is out of date) more books, more paper supplies, more transportation problems, in fact more of just about everything. Naturally these costs have been reflected in the School Budget. The point I would like to make is that your school board is doing everything in its power to keep costs at a minimum to the extent that your children will be provided an adequate education. I hope you will never want it otherwise.

You can consider yourselves very fortunate in having as teachers of your children a group that have been more than willing to give their best to their job. Every effort should be made to retain your present staff, not only because they are doing a very good job, but replacements will be most difficult to find. In the South Eastern section of the State alone there is a stated need for 137 teachers in addition to the 1959-60 personnel. I'm sure it is safe to say that Superintendents won't be wasting any time

in trying to fill their vacancies this year. The big question is "Where are they all coming from?"

NEW TEACHERS

Miss Nancy Ann Corey, B.A. Merrimack College 1959, Summer School Lowell T. C. 1959 to replace Miss Carol Willis, grade 3. Miss Willis resigned to be married and live at home.

Miss Janet Habecker, B.A. Merrimack College 1958, Summer School Boston University 1958, Summer School Lowell T. C. 1959 to replace Mrs. Kathryn Allen, grade 5. Mrs. Allen resigned to accept a position in Chelmsford at a higher salary.

Miss Mary E. Nims, B.Ed., Keene Teachers College 1959 to replace Miss Helen Garon, grade 1. Miss Garon resigned to go to California to teach.

Mr. Harold J. Sipsey, B.S. Norwich University 1932, Summer School Lowell T. C. 1959, to replace Mr. Warren Scamman as teacher of Science, grades 7 and 8. Mr. Scamman resigned to accept a position in the Hood School, Derry, N. H.

Mr. Michael Sullivan, B.A. Merrimack College 1959, to replace Mrs. Doris Webb as teacher of English, grades 7 and 8. Mrs. Webb resigned in November due to ill health.

REPAIRS AND REPLACEMENTS

The established practice of painting and repairs was carried out during the summer vacation. Storage shelves were built in the custodian's room, and minor repairs on storage units and sinks were carried out in the classrooms. All of these tend to keep the building in good repair and keep costs down to a minimum. Such an annual expenditure is good Yankee economy.

CUSTODIAN

Due to the resignation of Arthur Paradis because of illness, Lorin Raymond has been hired on a full time basis. The School District was fortunate in having a man of Mr. Raymond's caliber available, for by working well in excess of the normal eight hour day he has been able to carry on the custodial duties with a fine degree of proficiency. His interest in the building and attitude toward teachers and pupils is most appreciated.

INSTRUCTION

Under the guidance of Helping Teacher, Paul L. O'Neil and the splendid cooperation of Principal Charles Juris and his teachers, your instructional program is undergoing a continuous

upgrading. As Mr. O'Neil's report follows I will only say I am very happy with the work being done.

SCHOOL LUNCH

The school lunch program directed by Velma Houle with a fine assist from Gladys Stott and Hilda Richardson, has maintained its usual high standards. It takes real planning and efficient buying for two full time and one part time worker to serve the large number of dinners that are served daily. The addition of the six Porta-Fold units would help materially in this program, while at the same time add to the overall usefulness of the All-Purpose room. This is pointed up especially since the inception of the Youth activities programs carried out by both school and community.

THIS AND THAT

The parents and interested leaders in the community and school are to be commended for their interest and support of the many youth activities in Pelham. It is wonderful that the facilities offered by the new activities room are being used to such good advantage. It is good for all concerned that our schools have at last become truly community projects offering far more than just text book education. To all those who have had a part in it, we thank you.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board, citizens, and all school personnel for their fine cooperation. It has made my being a member of the team a pleasure.

HELPING TEACHER'S REPORT

Mr. Louis L. Ramsay

Dear Mr. Ramsay:

I herewith submit my report as Helping Teacher in the Town of Pelham, New Hampshire.

Let me begin by defining the basic function of the elementary school as stated so aptly by an expert in the field, Henry J. Otto:

"The basic function of the Elementary School is to guide every child to have those living and learning experiences that will enable him to behave as a responsible, considerate, contributing citizen at every stage of his development."

I particularly like this definition as it applies to the Pelham school. My classroom visitations have given me several opportunities to observe teachers involved in "guiding" your children into realistic "living and learning" experiences.

A teacher's task is complex. To assist in making one phase of his responsibility—that of improvement of the instructional program—somewhat of a less cumbersome experience, you have engaged the services of a Helping Teacher. His concern, therefore, with the assistance of the Principal, is to see that teachers keep in sharp focus our immediate as well as ultimate educational objectives. How does he go about this task specifically? There are many techniques and devices used. I have listed these for the reader although they do not appear in any order of importance, nor is this list all-inclusive:

- a.* Classroom observation and supervision.
- b.* Personal conferences with teachers and special supervisors.
- c.* Grade level meetings of all teachers Union-wide.
- d.* Special workshops or work sessions and other in-service programs.
- e.* Enlisting teacher cooperation in curriculum revision and planning.
- f.* Attending Faculty and Principal meetings.
- g.* Demonstration teaching.

I have found that your teaching force here in Pelham is most cooperative and highly dependable. It is a pleasure to work with such professional people. I have found them eager to experiment,

anxious and willing to work hard at their duties, interested in improving their status by attending extension courses and workshops offered by nearby institutions of higher learning.

The Pelham school is growing. Educationally speaking, you should be proud of the kind of progress being accomplished by an ambitious, energetic staff.

Achievement test results of last year place the Pelham record well above the national average. The device used for measuring this achievement is the California Achievement Test Battery.

We are indeed fortunate in having as Principal of your school, a person who is professionally alert, one who is not content with the “status-quo” or “laissez-faire” type of school administration. He engages himself with activities geared to improve the teaching methods and curriculum within his school and strives to act as the liaison between the school and community.

Your school, with its bright, clean, cheerful classrooms, staffed with intelligent, cooperative, and ambitious staff members, is a school that should command your pride and admiration.

The E. G. Sherburne School is truly a shining example of the American way of education. I am happy to be a part of it.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools, the School Board, and the citizens of Pelham, N. H.

I herewith submit my annual report as school nurse from September 1, 1958 to June 30, 1959.

During this school year we had numerous cases of chicken pox and measles, also a variety of virus upsets and the usual colds and respiratory ailments.

One child was taken to the Balch Clinic at the Elliott Hospital in Manchester, N. H.

Mrs. Catherine Hammond conducts speech defect classes every Tuesday morning for those needing help with speech.

We had three clinics, March, April, and May, supervised by our State Nurse, Mrs. Marie Fahey, R.N. Four hundred and thirty-five children and adults attended, 230 received Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus, or booster inoculations, 276 received Salk polio inoculations and 77 were vaccinated for small pox. I would like to thank the doctors, nurses and clerks who helped make these clinics successful and also the Pelham Grange for their contribution of lollipops.

In April we also had a clinic for all children entering school in September. Forty-two attended and were given a physical examination by Dr. Marshall of Nashua, a dental examination by a State Dental Hygienist, their eyes were checked for defective vision and they were weighed and measured.

Also in April, we gave the T. B. Patch test to 92 pupils of the first, fifth and eighth grades and to 7 adults. Four pupils were taken to Nashua for X-rays and were found in good condition. These tests are given under the supervision of Mrs. Irene Birchall, R.N., State T. B. Nurse.

A film "The story of Menstruation" provided by the Kimberley-Clark Corporation was shown to the girls from the fifth to the eighth grades inclusive, with the parents' permission.

The Legion Auxiliary paid for having glasses changed for one of our needy pupils. The P. T. A. provided milk and lunches for quite a few children during the year and several people gave clothes to be distributed where needed.

I want to thank the people and organizations that helped in any way, and also Mr. Ramsay, Mr. O'Neil, Mr. Juris and the teachers for their cooperation and contribution to the welfare of the children.

REPORT OF SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

I am very pleased to be able to submit this report on the Lunch Program of your school. We started the school year with two full-time workers, Gladys Stott and myself. On Sept. 15th the School Board added a part-time worker, Hilda Richardson, which was very much appreciated. During this time we have served 17,643 meals to children and 1,038 meals to adults or over 50% of the enrollment. Through the generosity of organizations and interested citizens we have been able to serve 508 free meals to children. We have served our annual Thanksgiving Day Dinner as well as dinners for the Teachers Union and Town Meeting Day as requested.

To date this year we have spent over \$600.00 for new equipment which includes a much-needed large electric mixer, a meat slicer, additional racks for the dishwasher, and two 20-qt. double boilers.

My sincere thanks to the many women who gave of their time and talent so that we were able to have little "extras" for special days, as well as the School Board and Staff who have taken such an active interest "above and beyond the call of duty" in our children's lunch program.

WHAT IS A SCHOOL LUNCH?

In primary grades it's a threat;

"You can't go out to play until you eat."

In the elementary grades it's a contest:

"My plate's clean first; can I have my seconds now?"

In high school it's a tool for asserting new-found sophistication:

"I can't eat this slop."

In the teachers' room it's a wail:

"If I eat it, I'll get fat."

In the kitchen it's a worry:

"Will they like it today?"

To the Manager it's a challenge:

"How can I make it on this budget?"

To the Federal Government it's a Type A Meal:

1 glass of milk, 2 ounces of protein, $\frac{3}{4}$ cup of fruit or vegetable, bread and butter.
