WARRANT FOR ROLLINSFORD TOWN MEETING

POLLS TO BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. TO 6 P.M. FOR ARTICLE I

Appropriations and other Articles of Town Business will begin at 8 P. M. at Rollinsford Grade School:

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF ROLLINSFORD, IN THE COUNTY OF STRAFFORD, IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at Rollinsford Town Hall in said Town, the eleventh day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- ARTICLE I. To bring in your ballots for:

 Town Clerk
 Town Treasurer
 - One Selectman and Overseer of Public Welfare for a term of three years. One Selectman and Overseer of Public Welfare for a term of one year Chief of the Fire Department

Three Members of the Budget Committee for a term of three years One Member of the Budget Committee for a term of two years.

- ARTICLE II. To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- ARTICLE III. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$26,000.00 to purchase a new fire truck, said money to be taken from the capital funds of the Town, and the balance to be raised by a note to be paid at the rate of \$3,000.00 per year out of the funds normally appropriated to the capital funds until the note has been paid in full, the Selectmen to be and hereby are authorized to execute any and all papers necessary to raise said funds.
- ARTICLE IV: To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the Somersworth, Berwick Nursing Association, and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00.
- ARTICLE V: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of Town Equipment (Highway Department), and to raise and appropriate a sum not in excess of one-half of one percent of the last assessed valuation for the purpose thereof. (Recommended \$2,000.00)
- ARTICLE VI: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$30,000.00 as the Town's share for the reconstruction of Front Street and authorize the Selectmen to negotiate with the State and/or contractors.
- ARTICLE VII: To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as prepared and submitted by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE VIII: To see if the Town will vote to continue to be a member of the Dover, Somersworth, Rollinsford Regional Planning Commission.
- ARTICLE IX: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey all the real estate and personal property connected with the Rollinsford sewer to the Rollinsford Sewer District.

- ARTICLE X: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the collection of taxes.
- ARTICLE XI: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate that has been or may be acquired through Tax Collector's Deeds.
- ARTICLE XII: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

EXPLANATION OF ARTICLE IV

In 1966, the regular full time nurse, Mrs. Helen Devereux made a total of 1,009 nursing calls to patients in Somersworth and Berwick. She travelled a total of 2,340 miles.

In 1967, Mrs. Devereux with only one part time nurse that only worked 237 hours in 1967, made 1,396 nursing calls and 26 Health Promotion calls. They travelled 3,178 miles.

In 1968, Mrs. Devereux and two part time nurses made 2,245 nursing calls and 54 Health Promotions calls. The travelled 4,217 miles. The part time nurses worked 623% hours.

ON THE STATE LEVEL (NOT ALL FIGURES ARE COMPLETE)

In 1966, there were 28 Home Health Agencies throughout the entire state of New Hampshire. As of December, 1968, there were 34 certified agencies in the state. These 34 agencies cover only 75% of the total population of the state, and at the same time these same agencies, while covering 3/4 of our population, are only covering 45% of the square mileage of the state. It might be of interest to note that in the past year a total of 24 additional towns within New Hampshire have been brought into coverage by these home health service programs. It is hoped that within the next year 6 new agencies will be added involving an expansion to 17 additional towns. The unknown number of agencies added in 1967 is all that is missing from this report.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the amnual examination and audit of the Town of Rollinsford for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1968, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter histed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audits must be given the Town Clerk as part of the permanent records.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Municipal Court and Sewer Project Account.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets - December 31, 1967 - December 31, 1968: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative balance sheets as of December 31, 1967 and December 31, 1968, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$216,627.52 in 1968.

Analysis of Change in Financial Conditions: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriation and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comperative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 51, 1968, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$13,334.20, less a revenue surplus of \$3,343.62, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$9,990.58.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1968, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1968, is shown in Exhibit B-2.

Municipal Court: (Exhibit E)

A statement of the Municipal Court Account is presented in Exhibit E.

Sewer Project Account: (Exhibit G)

A statement of the activity in the Sewer Project Account during the fiscal year is included in Exhibit F_{\bullet}

Statement of Indebtedness: (Exhibit G)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1968, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit G.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased from \$11,306.84 to \$1,269.32 in 1968, as shown herewith:

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT - 1968

Meetings of the Commission were held at the call of the Chairman during the year and were well attended. The members felt in order to act in the Town's best interest, a Conservation Survey, as recommended by the New Hampshire Natural Resources Board, should be conducted. This was done in November with a disappointing 7% returning their survey sheets.

In evaluating the results, we found that the elimination of pollution in the Salmon Falls River was of primary concern. This is in the process of being done. Secondly, the development along the river in the "Scoutland" area and land adjacent be utilized for recreation. On this point, the Commission has been invited to attend meetings with the Selectmen, officials of the American Legion and other interested groups in town to start the planning for such an area. Progress is being made. Thirdly, that several brooks be cleaned up and developed. Studies on this subject will be made in the near future.

At the invitation of the Planning Board, the Commission has met with them. The development of the Master Plan for the Town is the current order of business.

The Chairman attended the New Hampshire State Conservation meeting at Concord in December. It was both interesting and informative.

The Commission wishes to report, most favorably, the fine cooperation and assistance it has received from the Selectmen and other agencies of the Town, County and State.

Any constructive suggestions (by letter) would be most welcomed by the Commission.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Rollinsford Grade School in said District on the lst day of April, 1969, at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- To choose one Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years and one Member for the ensuing year.
- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the District.
- To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 8. REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Rollinsford:

During the past year, the quality of education available to Rollinsford students has continued to improve. More individual education, especially in the areas of language arts and reading, has improved the learning opportunities of our youngsters.

The favorable vote on the AREA-school concept assures continued improvement in the quality of education for Rollinsford. Students in Grades 7-8, by joining with their peers in Somersworth, will benefit from broader curriculum offerings.

Students in Grades 1-6 can now realize smaller class size through the space made available by the transfer of the junior high students.

Financially, the AREA school will serve us well in 1969-70--with further improvement through the years. We will realize a savings of \$19,200 (24 @ \$800) in tuition for Vocational students at the Dover High School which the State will take over now that the students are committed to Somersworth. The cost of sending Grades 7-8 students to Somersworth will be \$31,671 instead of the projected cost of \$32,666 to educate them in our own building. An additional gain in cost of freshman tuition is realized for those who would have ordinarily enrolled in Dover @ \$800 tuition costs per year as opposed to tuition costs of \$634 at Somersworth. The difference of \$166 for an estimated twenty students is a gain of \$3,320 making a total gain in tuition cost of \$22,520 for school year 1969-70. While some of the gain will be offset in transportation costs, it is obvious that we have made a wise decision financially through the AREA-school concept.

This concept guarantees that our youngsters will be assured an education in Somersworth in Grades 7-12 for the next twenty years which may be extended if new buildings are required in Somersworth while Rollinsford students attend school there.

Aside from the increase in tuition, the budget reflects an increase in teachers' salaries which will make us competitive with surrounding towns as we recruit teachers to meet the needs of our students in Grades 1-6.

The past year also saw the appointment of former Superintendent Robert L. Brunelle to the position of Deputy Commissioner of Education for the State of New Hampshire. His appointment shows the confidence and respect placed in him through his work in Supervisory Union No. 56.

The transition to a new superintendent was made less difficult by the experienced staff and the strong commitment for better education on the part of the school board. No small part was played by the AREA School Committee whose job it was to present its program at a time when it was critical to the best interest of the community.

It is with pleasure that I submit to you this annual report covering in part some of the activities of the Rollinsford Grade School during the year 1968-1969.

Elementary education is usually understood to mean appropriate schooling for children between the ages of 6 and 14. It is traditionally thought of in terms of mastery of the fundamentals of reading, writing, and arithmetic. The concept of education has been expanding in recent years to include the furtherance of all aspects of the wholesome growth and development of children.

The general aim is the fullest development of each child. The goals of elementary education are both individual and social; they are derived from the basic needs of children and the demands of modern society.

Modern elementary education is concerned with helping each child:

(1) to attain wholesome physical, emotional, and mental health.

(2) to become efficient in the tools of learning - to read, to communicate, and to think intelligently.

(3) to grow in understanding of the meaning of democracy.

(4) to understand the physical and social environment of which he is a part.

(5) to meet and solve problems intelligently.

(6) to develop worthwhile recreational and creative interests.

(7) to develop his best powers and potentialities.

FACULTY

To implement the aims as outlined above, it is necessary to have a faculty or teaching staff. The following Faculty Data Sheet will give you the facts concerning the members of the Faculty of this school. There have been two new teachers added to the staff as replacements for teachers who left at the end of the previous year for personal reasons. The new teachers are: Mrs. Linda Dolan, Grade 2 to replace Mrs. Charette, and Mr. Irvin Koelker, to replace Miss Quinn. Both of these teachers have had previous teaching experience and came to us well recommended by their previous employers.

INSTRUCTION

Under the heading of instruction there have been several new approaches used during the year.

One of the first devices to be put into operation was that of Contract Teaching. This was employed by Mr. Reid of the Social Studies Department in conjunction with Mr. Ingraham of the English Department, and of course the pupils of Grades 6-7-8.

In this arrangement, a pupil signs a written agreement or contract with the instructor guaranteeing that a certain quantity and quality of work will be produced by the student in return for a certain report card grade by the teacher. The "C" or basic grade contract calls for a minimum of classroom work and participation, while the "B" and "A" grades contracts each require progressively a greater quantity and increased quality of work to be done in order to achieve the desired grade.

This device has been found to work well both from the pupil viewpoint as well as that of the instructor.

During the past year, we have developed a remedial reading class that is being conducted by Mrs. Martha Peterson. Each pupil being given this instruction has been recommended by the individual teachers and tested to ascertain the difficulties that are being experienced. A great deal of effort is being expended in order to take the pupil at his present level of reading ability so that he will become more competent in this area.

Many devices for teaching such as the Tachistoscope, the EDL reader, the tape recorder are being used with good results.

There is a great deal of interest and accomplishment on the part of the pupils, and positive results are beginning to show.

Because of the number of pupils in the school (341) and the limitations of classroom space, it was decided that combining the individual back-to-back English and Reading periods into a double class arrangement would make the best use of both space and
teacher's energies. This puts approximately 40 students together for a two-period
block. In this manner both sections of sixth, seventh, and eighth grades share the
gym-cafeteria space for double periods each day. Both teachers are present at all times.
Each group of forty is divided into three groups of ability level for skill-area work.
Then they are heterogeneously grouped for sharing films, creative writing, etc.

At present a wide variety of materials is used each week. Included among them:

SRA Writing Lab
Individual Grammar Cards
Scope Magazine
SRA Pilot Library
Standard Reading tests
Pupil-Produced Articles (wide Range of Topics)
Films, Filmstrips, records, Overhead presentations
Book reviews and reports
Taped sessions
Dramatizations
Paperbacks
Discussion periods

Both English and Reeding are taught from a highly functional standpoint. Most students work as close to ability level as the teachers' time allows. Students requiring special help are segregated and taught on an individual basis. A few of the severest

cases receive remedial instruction. Since a Language Arts File is kept for each pupil in the Junior High Sections, work for the period is retained as the basis for grades issued each quarter. At present two language Arts grades are sent home for each pupil - one, the usual objective grade; the other, a grade representing effort - or more precisely - an estimate of performance with reference to ability.

To date most pupils have responded affirmatively to this approach. Parents seem enthusiastic and students are treated individually more than ever before in their school lives.

Team teaching can be made to work. Required are two reasonably compatible teachers and a willingness to spend the time and effort necessary to plan carefully.

The foregoing is excerpted from a paper propared by both Mr. Koelker and Mr. Ingraham for the State Department of Education.

ENROLLMENT

Another necessary component of the school is the student body. We have found that over the past fifteen years, the number of pupils has been gradually on the increase. By referring to the following tables facts concerning the following may be ascertained::

HOT LUNCH PROGRAM

The hot lunch program of the school is under the direction of Mrs. Kathaleen R. Burke, aided by Mrs. Rose Roberts and Mr. Willis Lane. They are charged with the preparation and serving of the noon meal. They handle their assignments in a very capable and efficient manner. The menus are well prepared, well balanced and appealing.

Each meal served is a Type A meal consisting of:

- (1) A Main Dish (of Meat, Fish, Poultry, or Cheese)
- (2) A vegetable
- (3) A sandwich of some sort (either sweet or plain)
- (4) A ½ pt. of Homogenized Milk (5) A dessert

Cost per lunch per child - 30¢ per day.

The number of meals served varies from day to day and from week to week to week. We have served, during the past year a total of 35,553.8 pupil meals. On some days we have served as many as 227 pupil meals. The average number of pupil meals served per day is 197.5.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL ROLLINSFORD SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the Rollinsford School District was called to order by the Moderator, Douglas Rollins, at 8:40 in the evening on Tuesday, the second day of April, 1968, at the Rollinsford Grade School.

The Moderator read the Warrant and announced that each Article would be taken up in order for action.

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

Joseph Porter nominated Lewis E. Janetos, seconded by Albert Labrecque. Albert Labrecque moved the nominations be closed and the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Lewis E. Janetos. Ovid Viel seconded the motion and it was so voted.

ARTICLE 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Robert Whitehouse nominated Kathaleen Burke who declined. Clara McCann nominated Mrs. Lydia Reardon. Frank Michaud moved that nominations cease, seconded by Ovid Viel. Robert McGurren moved that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Mrs. Reardon, seconded by Ovid Viel. and it was so voted unanimously.

ARTICLE 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

John Burke nominated Edward McCann. Arthur Osbon nominated Albert Labrecque. Richard LaBonte moved nominations cease, seconded by Albert Labrecque.

Results of balloting:

Edward McCann 39 Albert Labrecque 13

Edward McCann elected.

ARTICLE 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Joseph Porter nominated Edward J. Hudon. Albert Labrecque moved that nominations cease, seconded by Ovid Viel, and it was so voted. Ovid Viel moved that Clerk cast one ballot for Edward J. Hudon, seconded by Albert Labrecque. Vote was unanimous.

Discussion ensued on new law. Town to be informed. Ovid Viel moved that, if possible, barring legal technicalities, school officials be elected Town Meeting Day in same manner as other town officials. Edward Burke seconded the motion, and it was so voted.

ARTICLE 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

Albert Labrecque moved that salaries be accepted as proposed in budget. Ovid Viel seconded the motion and motion was carried.

ARTICLE 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Edmund Garland moved the reports be accepted as published in the Town Report. Peter Ordway seconded, and it was so voted.

ARTICLE 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

Edmund Garlani moved that State Tax Commission auditors be engaged. Albert Labrecque seconded the motion, and it was so voted.

ARTICLE 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income, school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the towm.

Peter Ordway moved that Article 8 be accepted as read, seconded by Lester Eldridge. Discussion followed.

Edmund Garland explained amounts in school budget. Hollis Furlong asked about the status of extra appropriation for transportation of St. Thomas Students. Edmond Burke explained increase in instruction area due to reimbursement of tuition charged to teachers for taking courses at U.N.H. approved by school board. Joseph Caouette inquired about foundation aid. Robert McGurran inquired about increase in amount requested for school supplies. Explanation was given that Rollinsford Grade School was now a larger plant, had a higher enrollment, causing greater costs. Hollis Furlong had questions on number of teachers utilized. Moderator asked permission to have superintendent of schools, Mr. Brunelle, speak to give explanations on questions raised. After all questions were answered, motion was put to a vote and budget as presented was passed at a figure of \$225,954.24.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive in the name of the district such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or any department or agency thereof.

Joseph Caouette moved that article be accepted. Lester Eldridge seconded the motion, and it was so voted.

He announced that the meeting had been opened at 10:00 a.m. in the Town Hall for the purpose of voting for Town Officers. He reported that there had been 490 votes cast and read the results of the voting:

Mr. Joseph Bourque moved that the same incumbents serve for another year. Motion carried.

Trustees of Trust Funds

Mr. Joseph Bourque nominated Ovid Viel, seconded by Mr. Robert Bisson. Mr. Poy Estes nominated Eugene Berube, seconded by Mr. Peter Ordway. There being no other nominations, Mr. Joseph Caouette moved that the nominations cease. A vote was taken and Eugene Berube was elected - 67 to 37. Mr. Berube was elected to a term of three years.

Parks and Playgrounds

Mr. George Ouellette nominated Mr. Joseph Allard. Mr. Joseph Allard nominated Mr. Adolph Lapoint. Mr. John Lawlor nominated Mr. Armand Bois. There being no other nominations, Mr. Honore Orellette moved that the nominations cease, seconded by Mr. William Fleming. A vote was taken and Mr. Armand Bois was elected.

Fence Viewer

Mr. Honore Ouellette nominated Mr. Bliss Garvin to be re-elected. Mr. John Lawlor moved that nominations cease, seconded by Mr. William Fleming. The motion was carried and Mr. Garvin was re-elected.

The new Town Officers were then sworn in. The Officers present were, Eugene Berube, Ovid Viel and Armand Bois.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money, in addition to the appropriated on March 9, 1965, to construct a municipal sewerage disposal system, including sewerage, interceptors, pumping stations, treatment works and other related facilities, including land acquisition, easements and rights of way as are required, and to determine whether such sum shall be raised by borrowing under the Municipal Finance Act or otherwise, or pass any vote relating thereto.

Mr. Arthur H. Osbon moved that the Town appropriate the sum of \$225,500.00 in addition to the money appropriated on March 9, 1965, for construction of a municipal sewerage disposal system, including sewerage, interceptors, pumping stations, treatment works and other related facilities, including land acquisition, easements and rights of way as are required, and that to raise this appropriation, the Board of Selectmen is authorized to issue \$225.500.00 bonds or notes of the Town under the Municipal Finance Act, seconded by Mr. Honore Quellette.

Mrs. Helen Desjardins requested the amount of aid that we would receive from the State and Federal Governments. She was told that the State's share was 40%, the Federal share was 40% and the Town would supply the remaining 20%.

At this time, Mr. Osbon introduced a representative of Green Engineering, Mr. Paul Guertin, for the purpose of explaining Article 3. He explained that \$225,500.00 had to be raised over the original bond. He also said that based on the oid of \$492,895.00, some of which is already set aside, an additional bond issue would be necessary, bringing the total project costs to \$621,141.00. There would be 399,288.00 that would be eligible for Federal and State grants. The Federal share would be \$199,641.00, State share would be \$199,647.00, Town share of participating costs would be \$117,908.00, and non-participating costs would be \$103,938.00.

Mr. Peter Ordway asked why the cost of the project had increased over the last three years. Mr. Guertin explained that the type of system had to be changed from a lagoon to a sludge system.

Mr. John Lawlor asked how many bonds had retired in the last year and was told by Mr. Lester Eldridge that \$11,000 had retired.

Mr. William Fleming asked how may bids were received for the sewerage treatment system and was told that the plans were put out to bid at the first of the year. Two contractors submitted bids, the low bid was \$492,895.00, with the difference between the two bids being less than \$5,000.00.

Mr. Fleming then asked if the system could be expanded and if the figures presented incl-

udad everything. Mr. Guertin explained that the system could be expanded. Mr. Guertin also explained that the present plan met State and Federal regulations.

At this time, Mr. Joseph Bourque asked to hear from Mr. Rollins, Selectman. Mr. Rollins stated that the Selectmen had gone to the State Water Pollution Board and questioned the increase in the system costs. The bids were re-examined. He then proceeded to explain that the old plan was for a primary system and that it was not acceptable by the State and Federal governments. Our present plan is for a secondary system and is acceptable.

Mrs. Desjardins moved that we should pass Article 3 now, the price would only go up later. She also asked if the site had been chosen yet. To this, Mr. Osbon replyed that the site would be behind the American Twine Co.

After much discussion, the motion to accept the Article was put to a vote and was carried - 79 to 25.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$5,500.00 for the construction of the Old Mill Lane Bridge.

Mr. William Fleming moved that the Article be accepted, seconded by Mr. Peter Ordway.

Mr. Kenneth Bolduc questioned the fact that the Town had originally planned to put a culvert across the road. Mr. Osbon explained that by putting a new bridge, we would acquire \$2,100.00 from State Bridge Aid. Mr. George Leuchs asked if the raod was a dead end. Mr. Bolduc again aked why we didn't use a culvert instead of a bridge. Mr. Osbon stated that water goes over the bridge now. He also pointed out the net cost for a culvert would be \$9,000.00 and the net cost of the bridge would be \$5,500.00. Mr. Lucius Emerson spoke for the need of a new bridge. Mr. Fleming stated that it was a problem and that it was time to fix it.

'A vote was taken and the motion to accept Article 4 was carried.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to repay the City of Dover for one-half of the cost for resurfacing Oak Street.

Mr. George Leuchs moved to accept Article 5, seconded by Mr. William Fleming. The motion was carried.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Town Planning Board, Conservation Committee and the Town Industrial Committee.

Mr. Peter Ordway moved that the Article be accepted, seconded by Mrs. Helen Bradley. A discussion on the floor followed resulting in having Mr. Osbon explaining the deposition of the money.

\$300.00 Planning Board

100.00 Conservation Committee 100.00 Industrial Committee

The question was asked if this had anything to do with zoning.

Mr. Louis Viel explained that the committee would set up the necessary items for for town growth and the master plan - Zoning would come later.

A vote was taken and the motion was carried.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$8,300.00 for the purchase of a new Town tractor for the Highway Department.

Mr. Patrick Genest moved that we accept the Article, seconded by Mr. Myron O'Neill.

Mr. Lyman Rowe asked exactly what we were buying. Mr. Osbon gave a detailed description

of the tractor and explained the cost. Mr. Rowe asked if it would handle all the jobs that were necessary to be done by the Town and received a positive answer from Mr. Osbon. Mr. Rowe also asked the life expectancy of the vehicle. Mr. Ernest Gagne explained that the Town would get five or six good years performance from the tractor.

Mr. Myron O'Neill stated that we needed a new tractor.

At this time, a vote was taken and the motion was carried.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of a Fire Truck Pumper and to raise and appropriate a sum not in excess of one-half of one percent of the last assessed valuation for the purpose thereof. (Recommended \$3,000.00)

Mr. Robert Bisson moved that we accept the Article, seconded by Mr. Raymond Brunelle.

 $\mbox{Mr.}$ Rowe asked if the money could be used somewhere other than where it was intended later on.

The Moderator and Mr. Osbon explained that the money could not be used for anything but the pumper.

A vote was taken and the Article carried.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as prepared and submitted by the Budget Committee.

 $\mbox{Mr.}$ Peter Ordway moved that we accept the Budget as printed, seconded by $\mbox{Mr.}$ Patrick Genest.

The discussion that followed concerned item 19 of the Town Budget--the snow plow. Several questions were raised and answered.

Mr. Hollis Furlong moved to amend Article 9 to reduce item 19 by \$1,400.00, seconded by Mr. Ronald St. Lawrence.

A vote was taken on the amendment and the amendment was defeated.

Mr. St. Lawrence asked if the Town put the tarring out for bid. Mr. Osbon answered this with a negative answer explaining that the quality of work and the price for which P. R. Boston did the work was very satisfactory.

At this time, Mr. Edgar Gray, Moderator, gave the Board of Selectmen credit for a job well done.

A vote was taken to accept the Budget as prepared, motion carried.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of a Dover, Somersworth, Rochester Regional Planning Agency. This Agency will be to plan for and encourage Regional Planning analysis, provide consensus on major problems of Regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of projects which extend beyond the boundaries of a particular town.

The Agency will have no jurisdiction over any matter of local affairs. It will be primarily advisory. Two members of the Regional Planning Agency shall be from the Town of Rollinsford, to be appointed by the Selectmen.

Mr. Joseph Caouette moved to accept the motion as read, seconded by Mr. Raymond Berube.

A question and answer period followed with Mr. Albert Labrecque moving to amend the

article to read that it would be accepted on a one year basis, enabling the Town more time to investigate, seended by Mr. Raymond Brunelle.

 ${\tt Mr.}$ Ovid Viel explained that the Town was not bound to anything and that we could drop out at anytime.

A vote was taken on the amendment - 38 to 36, amendment motion carried.

A vote was taken on Article 10 as amended, motion carried.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer the disposal of the so-called Scoutland, composed of one hundred and fifteen acres, with the exception of a portion to be kept for the use of the Boy Scouts.

Mr. Joseph Bourque moved to accept Article 11, seconded by Mr. Raymond Berube.

Mr. Edward Glovinski asked for more information. Mr. Rollins explained that as it now stands, the Selectmen have no jurisdiction over the property. This is the purpose of Article 11. There is 115 acres involved.

Mr. Roy Estes suggested that the property be held for sale until a later date whereas river property sales prices were going up all the time. Mr. Osbon explained that the Town was not going to sell, but wanted the authority to sell if an opportunity arose.

Mr. Joseph Caouette moved to amend Article 11 as follows: "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer the disposal of the so-called Scoutland, composed of one hundred and fifteen acres, and that Martel-Roberge Post #47 American Legion, be granted first option on said disposal for express purpose of developing a recreational area in said parcel of land to be utilized for child, community service, recreation and formative activities of the youth and citizens of Rollinsford."

Mr. Ovid Viel seconded the motion to amend.

Discussion followed.

A vote was taken on the amendment, motion carried.

A vote was taken on Article 11 as amended, motion carried.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept a fifty-foot right of way from Church Street to the old railroad bed, this land to be given to the Town by Omer Morrest for a road.

Mr. Patrick Genest moved to table this article until next year, seconded by Mr. Lyman Rowe. Motion was carried to table.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

Mr. Ovid Viel moved to accept Article 13, seconded by Mr. Raymond Berube, motion carried.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate that has been or may be acquired through Tax Collector's Deeds.

Mr. Ovid Viel moved to accept Article 14, seconded by Mr. George Hannon.

Mr. Charles Grant asked if this was the sale of property for taxes. The Moderator answered that it was taken over by Collector's Deed.

A vote was taken, motion carried.

ARTICLE 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Mr. Edward Glovinski moved that we adjourn.

The Moderator adjourned the meeting at 11:55 P.M.
