WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of South Hampton in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said South Hampton on Tuesday the 13th day of March, next at two of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following articles:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

- 10. To see what action the Town will take in regards to real estate deeded to the Town for non-payment of taxes.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10.00 for Sibley Relief, and \$10.00 for Col. E. W. Bailey Relief Association Fund.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Legal Expenses.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40.00 for Care of Common.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for Civilian Defense.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60.00 for maintenance of blinker at Towles Hill.
- 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN REPORT

BE A GOOD CITIZEN — COOPERATE

Smoking and debris burning caused more than 50 percent of the forest fires occurring in the state of New Hampshire in 1955 — 235 fires out of a total of 463 originated from these two sources. Lighted smoking material and matches thrown from moving vehicles along the highway or dropped by fishermen, hunters, hikers, berry and flower pickers accounted for 26 percent; debris burning in the wrong place or at the wrong time by those who failed to heed all pleas for safety or refused to recognize the logical, sensible rules and regulations set up under legislative authority governing the use of fire in or near woodlands accounted for more than 24 percent. This is inexcusable.

Everything possible is being done officially to remedy the situation. Since 1909 there has been a statute on our law books which requires everyone to secure written permission from the local forest fire warden before starting a fire in or near woodlands or where fire can be communicated to woodlands, unless the ground is covered with snow. A never ending program of educational work is being carried on by your local warden and state officials to inform the general public both of the value and necessity of securing the required permit for such burning. Much progress has been made, but there are still many who fail or refuse to cooperate. The value of our permit system was definitely proven in this district during the 1955 calendar year. Local wardens issued 14 permits for debris burning fires. That's a lot of permits. The records show NO permit fires got out of control. This proves several things - while wardens were liberal in the issuance of fire permits, accommodating every applicant so far as possible, they were cautious, following closely directives outlining overall policy governing the issuance of burning permits and thoroughly instructing permit users. The latter, too, fully appreciating their responsibility in using their permits, governed themselves accordingly. Result? Much burning done legally and safe.

But what of the smokers? Despite all the efforts of those officially charged with the responsibility of preventing fires, too many were careless or thoughtless in disposing of smoking material and matches. Why? It is difficult to say. Autos are now equipped with ash trays. Why not use them. The crushing out of a cigar, cigarette and the complete extinguishment of matches before being discarded is an easy chore.

If the costly habits of the careless and indifferent smoker and debris burner could be overcome, more than half of our annual forest fires would be eliminated. Will YOU do YOUR share to bring this about?

REMEMBER

- Get a written permit from your local warden before starting your debris burning or camp fire. The law requires it.
 Make certain they are dead out before leaving them.
 Become a safe smoker by extinguishing smoking material and matches before discarding them.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of South Hampton qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in district on the seventeenth day of March 1956, at 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectman the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the Town will authorize the School Board to enter into contract with out of state high schools and/or in state public academies for the purpose of educating high school pupils residing in town. Such contract being required by the State Department of Education.
- 10. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U. S. Government and/or State Agency.
- 11. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to accept from the Barnard Trustees, The Barnard School Building and any other properties and funds pertaining thereto, when the construction of a new addition to the building has been completed and when the necessary legal action has been accomplished to dissolve the Barnard Trusteeship.
- 12. To transact any other business which may legally come before this Meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

I herewith submit to you my second report as Superintendent of your schools.

The current year began Wednesday, September 7, 1955 with an initial enrollment of 50 pupils. The grade distribution shows the difficulties we are having.

Grade:	1	2	3	4	5	6	7	8

During the next four years we will be graduating classes of two, three, and four pupils while much larger classes are entering. The census taken in September lists thirteen children as five year olds. It is possible that some of the four year olds may have birthdays before the following January and would, therefore, be eligible to enter school. Next year's first grade, according to the census, will consist of at least thirteen pupils. Disregarding any families who may move into South Hampton, we should have an enrollment of 58 pupils next year. If we continue the fourth grade with Mrs. Currier, her room will enroll a minimum of 32 pupils in five grades. If the fourth grade is returned to Mrs. Kimball, she will have an enrollment of 39 pupils in four grades. This situation will grow worse as the small classes graduate.

The only satisfactory solution, not only for next year but for the foreseeable future, seems to be the employment of a third teacher. Under this plan each teacher would have approximately 20 pupils next year with a gradual increase as the smaller classes graduate and the larger classes enter.

South Hampton has taken a decided step in advance in services to its pupils by inaugurating a hot lunch program. The willingness of the parent-Teachers Association to sponsor such a program indicates real interest on the part of that organization and the people of the district. A hot meal for the children results in more active minds and a better physical condition for the following school session. I sincerely believe it brings about better educational achievement for our pupils.

Instruction in the Barnard School is an individualized process. In some of the larger systems we find this not to be true. The child seems to be reduced to a certain classification and becomes a card in a general office. That each child may be studied on an individual basis, the Helping Teacher is making it his special duty to hold conferences with pupils and teachers. By these conferences, he and the teachers plan an ever improving approach to the child's individual interests and strengths. This type of instruction has always been evident in this school. There can never be too much care taken in guiding children through their school years.

That our teachers are interested in the welfare of their pupils is proven by the willingness with which they devote their own time to progressive study in the educational field. Both teachers are enrolled in classes which meet after school hours and under the direction of skilled instructors. The value they receive is reflected in the work of our children.

One test of the efficiency of our school is the progress made by our pupils when they enter secondary schools. Reports coming to us prove entirely acceptable work being done in the new systems. Repeatedly, comment is made by the heads of these schools upon the attitude of the pupils toward their school work. No better proof can be offered that Barnard School is graduating chilren who have learned the fundamental attitudes of good

citizenship and earnest endeavor. This surely is one of the fundamental objectives of American education.

Barnard School is a busy community of child citizens. Its pupils are purposefully active. A visit to its rooms evidences real interest on the part of the pupils. It is always a pleasure to spend a time in this school.

For the cooperation of the teachers, for the helpful guidance of the School Board and for the friendly greetings of the pupils, I am grateful. There can be no doubt as to continued progress in the South Hampton Schools.

REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent, School Board and Citizens of South Hampton:

Once again, I am pleased to submit this, my second report, of the musical growth and progress in your school.

The general objective of music teaching in the grade schools is to cause the original crude, native interest in rhythm and tone, which characterizes practically every child when he begins school life, to develop into a genuine love of good music based on an intelligent appreciation of its moods, its structure and its notation. Such development will take place only if a consistent educational plan is carried out through a series of years and it is with such a plan that I am attempting to deal.

The main avenues of creating a really intelligent love of music are by learning to sing, learning to play an instrument, training oneself in appropriate rhythmic response, learning to read music notation, and creating music.

The net result of this entire program seems to be that if one is to learn to appreciate music one must be a musician. The better musician one is, the better one can appreciate music; therefore, we must try to guide our pupils into a more extensive knowledge of music at the same time making the whole experience of studying music so fascinating that they will love the art better and better as they master it more completely.

I am most pleased with the progress being made at the Barnard School and wish to thank all of the students, teachers, parents and others who make my work so enjoyable.
