TOWN OF UNITY

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Unity, in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Unity on the Second Tuesday of March, March 11, 1970, at ten in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

To choose all necessary Officers, Agents and Trustees for the ensuing year under the Austrailian Ballot system.

- 1. To choose a Selectman for the ensuing three years.
- 2. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing 3 years.
- 3. To choose an Overseer of Public Welfare for the ensuing year.
 - 4. To choose a Tax Collector for the ensuing year.
 - 5. To choose an Auditor for the ensuing year.
 - 6. To choose a Library Trustee for the ensuing three years.
- 7. To choose a Trustee of the Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.
- 8. To vote on the following question: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Satutes Annotated relative of playing games of Beano be adopted in this town?

BUSINESS MEETING CALLED TO ORDER AT 1 O'CLOCK

- 1. To hear the reports of the Selectmen and other Town Officers and to pass any vote thereto.
 - 2. To choose all other necessary Town Officers.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Librarian & Library Tax.
- 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for other Town Charges.
- 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Old Age Assistance and Town Poor Charges.
- 6. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to pay the just debts of the Town.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$102.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 8. To see what sums of money the town will vote to pay for insurance and workmans compensation.
- 9. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise for maintenance of Highways, bridges, snow removal and to determine prices to be paid for labor and trucks.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,038.45 for Town Road Aid. If this sum is raised the State will contribute \$6,923.00.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for the benefit of the Unity Volunteer Fire Dept. Inc. The said Dept. to have the authority to spend any part of this money for Civilian Defense Equipment for their use.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote by ballot to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by the Tax Collector's deeds.
- 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to contribute \$50.00 for the Dartmouth Lake Sunapee Regional Association.
- 15. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the Town's share of Social Security.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for maintenance of a Town Dump.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for an Old Home Day celebration. The Selectmen to head up the Committee.
- 18. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise for Town Hall Expenses—repairs, heat and electricity.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to maintain the Home Nursing Service. The money to stay in the Town and payments made when service is rendered.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for civil defense.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$23,000.00 for the purchase of a new truck with plows and for the erection of a town garage. Decisions as to type of vehicle, size of building and location of same to be joint decision of the selectmen and the planning board.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to dispose of unnecessary road equipment.
- 23. To see if the town will vote to discontinue approximately 1,000 feet of road starting at the junction of the new road built by Mr. Sweeney, proceeding westerly past Mr. Sweeneys house to where it converges with the new road. This discontinuence shall not take place until the new road meets, at no cost to the town the approval of the selectmen.

- 24. To see what sums of money the town will vote to defray the costs of the building inspector.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to extend the term of the Town Tax Collector from one year to three years. This term of office to begin after Town Meeting in March 1971.
- 26. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise for oiling a section of Town road \$2,400.00.
- 27. To see what sums of money the town will vote to support a local Safety Committee.
- 28. To see if the town will vote by ballot to have the State Tax Commission do a complete reappraisal of all real estate in the town and appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 to pay for the reappraisal. (by petition).
- 29. To transact any other business as may come before said meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Unity Elementary School in said district, on the 21st day of March, 1970, at ten o'clock in the morning to act upon articles 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5; the remaining articles will be acted upon at two o'clock in the afternoon. Polls will close at 6:00 p. m.

REPORT OF THE ASST. SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board of Unity and citizens of the Town, I herewith submit my report as Asst. Superintendent of Schools.

Instructional Staff

When classes resumed in September, 1969, three new teachers were welcomed to the faculty.

Mrs. Harold Hall resigned from her teaching position at Maple Avenue School in Claremont to teach grade 1 in Unity. A graduate of Stevens High School in 1964 and of Gordon College in 1968 with a B.S. degree, she had taught grade 4 for one year in Claremont.

Miss Mary June Foss of Forrisville, Vt., a 1969 graduate of Keene State College, is teaching grade 2. In addition to her student teaching in Hinsdale and Keene, she has worked with children during summers at camps, at centers for handicapped children, and as a recreational director.

Mr. Phillip Hagar of Arlington, Mass., is teaching grades 7 and 8, replacing Mr. Harold Hall who was reassigned to grades 5 and 6. Mr. Hagar was graduated from Boston State College in 1969 with a B.S. degree.

This remains an area of great teacher mobility and teacher shortages. It is difficult to secure qualified candidates with strong undergradute credentials. We were indeed fortunate to attract the above-mentioned teachers to the Unity School.

Combination Grade Eliminated

A year ago the combination grade 1-2 fluctuated from 39 to 40 students, a poor teaching situation. At that time, my report stated serious consideration must be given to dividing this grade and employing an additional teacher.

Your School Board gave this serious study. The primary program, with emphasis on reading, was carefully weighed. We discovered that pupil achievement was being hampered because one teacher simply couldn't devote sufficient teaching time to so many who were reeceiving their first instruction in the basics: reading, language, and arithmetic. Also, candidates who were interviewed for this position, vacated when Mrs. Newman retired, simply went elsewhere when exposed to the teaching load.

During the early summer, the Board voted to split this com-

bination grade. The benefits received by those children involved greatly outweigh the additional cost to the community.

Curriculum

Mr. Anthony Amari, teacher consultant, has been responsible for several changes at the school which have greatly helped in elevating the status of instruction.

The new phonics program and reading changes have been successful. The staff plans to continue to make improvements in this area.

The volunteer school library is a reality. The long hours spent by volunteer mothers have made possible a greater access to books for all students that otherwise would not have been feasible.

The faculty and administration are working on revamping the English program. Considerable time has been spent evaluating materials in this area. A complete updating of this program is tentatively planned for September.

In addition, the faculty will be working on changes in social studies and reporting of pupil progress.

These innovations at the school make it possible for us to give Unity students more opportunities than otherwise would be possible.

State Foundation Aid

Unity stands to lose over \$12,000 next year from Foundation Aid, the state's basic program for assisting communities with their educational needs. The loss of these funds has a tremendous effect on the budget being prosented to you. It creates an abnormally large increase in monies needed to operate the school, and places an addition heavy burden upon the property taxpayers of this town.

The Foundation Aid Formula is a complicated one. Oversimplified, it is an equation with three variables: the number of students, the amount of local financial support for our schools, and the town's equalization valuation (real dollar value:) The basic premise: The more a town or city is worth, the more it can afford to support its own educational complex.

During the past two years, the equalization valuation of Unity has nearly doubled, the main reason for next year's loss of Foundation Aid. This valuation is determined by the State Tax Commission. The formula used to prorate monies allocated for Foundation Aid is set forth by legislative statutes and must be based on the most recent even-year equalized valuation as set by that commission.

Because of the mechanics of the formula, the method of ob-

taining equalization valuations, and the fact that the Legisglature is funding Foundation Aid to approximately only 18 per cent of full entitlement, the now "wealthier" town of Unity must dig into its local resources and find funds to supplement the loss.

How long can this type of state aid to our school remain in effect? The answer is as long as we, the people back home, allow it to exist!

The state must come to the assistance of many of its school districts. Within the legislative body, with its diverse membership, expertise, and accessibility to financial consultants, there is the means to devise a method of pumping more state monies back to local districts. It is up to us to prime that pump. We must emphasize our support of state aid by personal visits, calls and letters to our local legislators. We must encourage our friends and neighbors to do the same, not only here in Unity but throughout the entire state. And let us not forget to let the Governor's office know our feelings and intent.

Perhaps as a start a resolution could be offered and passed at our March 21 meeting pointing out to the above-mentioned people the dilemma and financial plight of Unity created by its huge loss of Foundation Aid.

Minimum Standards

Minimum Standards for New Hampshire Elementary schools are now a reality; they become effective for the opening of school in the fall of 1972. These standards are valid. They require educational programs and services that parents and other adults would generally want to provide for the children of their community.

These Minimum Standards, under study for many years, were hastened by the 1967 Legislature which directed the State Board of Education to formulate them and to require State Board approval of schools in order to qualify for financial aid.

Many of these have financial implications, so good planning with emphasis on established priorities is the sensible approach. We must begin to incorporate the following:

- a. Teacher/student ratio not exceed 25/1 in grades 1 and 2
- b. Teacher/student ratio not to exceed 30/1 in grades 3-8
- c. Additional nursing services
- d. Art teacher: part-time
- e. Physical education teacher: part-time
- f. Guidance counselor: part-time
- g. Library aide: part-time
- h. Minimum expenditure of \$5/student for library resources.

The division of the combination grade 1-2 this fall enabled us to comply with "a". Our second priority, "f", is provided for in the proposed budget for 1970-71.

In Summary

The School Board, elected to represent you in school district affairs, has done so admirably. Its members continually strive to achieve a quality program within our limited financial resources.

The curriculum is constantly being evaluated, as is student achievement. They insist that the building itself be kept in good repair. A multitude of hours is devoted by these three gentlemen to oversee the operation and administration of the school system.

The school's faculty is young, enterprising, talented. Mrs. McCullough has done a commendable job in her first year as principal. Parents have devoted much time to assist the teachers, especially in operating the library. Supt. George Disnard, Mr. Amari and I are grateful to all who have assisted us. Your help and guidance has made our work meaningful during this busy, productive year.

In the spring of 1969, the children of the first and second grades with their teachers, Mrs. D. Newman and Mrs. B. Underhill, were visitors at Old Fort No. 4 in Charlestown, N. H.

The students in Grades 3 through 6 enjoyed a trip to the Dartmouth Museum at Hanover, N. H. A bonus was having a picnic at the Wilder Dam on the way back to school. Mr. and Mrs. A. Nelson, Mr. D. Fellows and Mr. and Mrs. E. McCullough enjoyed the trip, too.

The field trip taken by the seventh and eighth grades with Mr. H. Hall, Mr. L. Jarvis and Mrs. K. Gibson was to the State House in Concord, N. H., while the Legislature was in session.

Two seasonal parties were held in each room. At Halloween and Christmastime, room mothers and refreshments were furnished by the Parent-Teachers Club.

The Parent-Teachers Club made it possible for the students in grade 3 through 8 to have an IFYE student, William Barrett, visit the school. He showed slides and shared interesting facts about Finland.

Early in September, the children put on a Flower Show. Mr. I. Head and Mr. and Mrs. A. Reed were the judges. Four prizes were awarded in each room.

November was highlighted with a Learning Festival carried out by the seventh and eighth grades under the direction of their teacher, Mr. P. Hagar.

A Book Fair was held during Children's Book Week. The Corner Book Store in Claremont shared many books with us for the exhibit.

Our library is a great success. Interested parents and students of the seventh and eighth grades, with Mrs. Harvey Hill as librarian, have worked hard to keep the circulation of books running smoothly. We have many new books, magazines, and a Boston daily newspaper available for the growing number of readers.

Our custodian, Mr. G. Dunn, is working hard to keep our building clean.

Miss Marlene Dunn is still working with the older boys in the

Y-Club each Wednesday afternoon after school. The boys carry out exercises in each room every day.

The milk program continues to be important with about 90 children having milk at noon. Some children buy milk for the morning recess, too. A one-half pint carton costs four cents. The federal government reimburses the school for the balance.

Bus drivers Mr. Dan Fellows, Mrs. V. Osgood and Mr. W. Sears are doing a very good job getting the children to school and back home safely each day.

In January, the seventh and eighth grades started a weekly newspaper for the school. They sell about 90 copies every week. They hope to earn money so they can take a trip to Boston before school closes in June.

The staff would like to express appreciation to our School Board, Mr. G. Disnard, Mr. R. Waldo, Mr. A. Amari, Mrs. R. Sanderson, the Parent-Teachers Club, and all interested citizens for the help and encouragement that has been given to our school.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To the Unity School Board and the Citizens of Unity, I herewith submit my annual report as school nurse.

The following examinations were given during the school year 1968-69:

Vision tests to all students, of which five were referred for further examinations and four got glasses; hearing tests to 80 students of which two were referred and received treatment; Tuberculin Heaf tests to 17 students, of whom one showed a positive reaction and was given a Mantoux test which was negative; and color perception tests to 45 students.

Periodic head and skin checks were made on all students throughout the school year. All students were weighed and measured.

Eighteen cases of chicken pox, one case of German measles, three cases of whooping cough and two cases of mumps were reported to the school. No serious health problems occurred during the year.

Short conferences were held with 16 parents at pre-school registration. This is an excellent opportunity to obtain a more complete health background of students entering school; it is also an opportune time to explain to parents the school health program.

It is most important for parents of all school children to provide the school with explicit instructions as to their wishes as to transporation and with whom or where their children are to go in the event of illness or an emergency. If your telephone is unlisted, please see that the school is among those to whom you confide your number; otherwise, the school will have to call the parent at work.

I would like to express my appreciation to the School Board members and all the teachers who are always cooperative and most helpful in making it possible for me to carry out the school health program.
