You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Wakefield on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects: the polls not to close before six o'clock in the evening, same day.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Wakefield, N. H., on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March, next at seven thirty o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9305.00 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, as follows:

- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to pay Town bills in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,540.00 for the repair and maintenance of highways as follows:

- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$596.00 to be expended on Town Road Aid; the State contributing \$2383.98.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1250.00 to be paid to the Sanbornville and Union Precincts as follows:

Sanbornville Precinct	\$750.00
Union Precinct	500.00

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$950.00 for the Public Libraries and where it shall be expended.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the prevention and suppression of Forest Fires.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3108.00 for street lighting in the Town of Wakefield.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6000.00 for Old Age Assistance.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3000.00 for the care of Town Poor.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for maintenance of sidewalks n the Town of Wakefield.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the maintenance of Town Dumps.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$176.00 which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the Town to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other Towns in the Lakes Region.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of Pine Blister Rust in the Town of Wakefield in conjunction with State and Federal agencies.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to hear the report of the Industrial Committee appointed at the 1950

Annual Town Meeting; also to see if the Town will vote to continue the committee as an Industrial Committee or to change the name of the Committee to the Planning and Development Committee, and, if the Town votes to continue the Committee, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$180.00 for the expenses of said Committee.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to elect the members at large of the Municipal Budget Committee by the same method that it elects its other Town Officers, namely by the Australian Ballot.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3500.00 for the purchase of New Highway Equipment.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by serial notes or bonds, or otherwise, the sum of \$5000.00 for Playgrounds and/or recreational purposes agreeable to the petition of the Playground Commission.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the erection of a suitable Bronze Plaque in memoriam of the Veterans of World War Two, and that the Moderator appoint a committee of three to work with the Selectmen for its selection and erection. (By petition of the Sanbornville Womans Club and others.)
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to offer for sale such obsolete and unused equipment as they may consider desirable.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following: That a permit in writing must be obtained

from the Selectmen for the building or alteration of any building where the total expense exceeds \$100.00; And that a fee of \$0.50 be collected for each permit.

Violation of this regulation may be punishable by a fine of \$10.00.

- 24. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following: The owner of any un-occupied building shall be required to paste a placard, clearly visible, giving the name and home address of the owner. Placards shall be obtained from the Selectmen for a fee of \$0.25.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote of March 8, 1949 accepting the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law, Chapter 52, Sections 1-6 Revised Laws of N. H., 1942. Amended, Chapters 80, 159, Laws of N. H., 1943. (By petition of Ralph E. Abbott and others.)
- 26. Shall the provisions of chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this city or town?
- 27. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE GAFNEY LIBRARY, 1950

The year 1950 was an outstanding one for the Gafney Library in a number of particulars. The work of weeding the fiction shelves, which has been going on over a considerable period, was completed. Several thousand volumes were examined, the books being considered for their condition and their current interest and value. Books of general interest at the present time are now properly alphabetized on the shelves of the main reading room, while older titles and those in need of repairs are in the stacks in the basement. A start has also been made on similar organization of the non-fiction books. This work has required a great deal of staff time and it has been accomplished without extra help or expense and without interfering with the service in the library.

The library has felt the rising cost of books and the general increase in operating costs, while the revenue and appropriations have remained fixed. In order to augment the money available for the purchase of books, several activities were tried as a means of raising funds for book purchase.

On October 14 a food sale for the benefit of the Gafney Library Book Fund was held at the General Store in Sanbornville. Friends of the library donated home-made foods which were placed on sale at prices determined by the committee. The sale lasted just two hours, the entire stock being sold out within that period. The net proceeds were \$26.04. Those who contributed the food for the sale included: Mrs. Opitz, Mrs. Albert Wiggin, Mrs. Ansel N. Sanborn, Mrs. Edwin P. Geauque, Mrs. Bradley McCausland, Mrs. Lilian Edwards, Miss Norma Miliner, Miss Enid Watson, Mrs. George Soucy, Mrs. Ruth Hill, Mrs. Richard Sanborn, Mrs. Josiah Garvin, Mrs. Herbert

Hatch, Mrs. James Young, Mrs. Marie Hansen, Mrs. Lloyd Stevens and Mrs. Arthur Manzer.

Another event undertaken for the benefit of the book fund was a book review of the timely "Korea Today." This was held in the library on the evening of October 17, with Edwin P. Geauque reviewing the book. The event was well attended and a voluntary silver collection netted \$17.00 for the book fund.

Other special gifts to the book fund, plus the sale of some old magazines, brought the total up to \$49.79, and enabled the library to acquire many more books for the service of its patrons than would have been possible without these activities.

The total circulation of the library for the year was 4,203. Of these books 2,830 were fiction, 434 non-fiction and 939 juvenile.

New books added to the library collection during the year totalled 124. Of these 81 were fiction, 20 non-fiction and 23 juvenile. Because the Bookmobile from the State Library now services only the juvenile department and no longer provides books for adult readers, the bulk of the book appropriation was expended on adult fiction and non-fiction.

Friends and patrons of the library have been generous in making contributions of books and magazines during the year and have thus helped greatly. Books were donated by: United States Senator H. REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDENS

Each year two hundred thousand forest fires annually burn over 36 million acres of the forest land of this great nation. This area is roughly the size of our New England states. Tens of thousands of manhours costing over 40 million of dollars are used in combating these fires. They destroy valuable mature timber and new growth, and leave desolation and often death in their wake. With the large deficit in rainfall the past four to five years the need for extreme caution is great.

Every brush, grass or forest fire that you have in your town has its effect on you in several ways; such as increased taxes, loss of mature timber, marring of the landscape and spoiling the recreation value of our country side. It is safe to say that approximately 97% of the fires occurring in this state are man-caused and because all man-caused fires are preventable, remember — only YOU can prevent forest fire.

Our forest fire organization is doing a grand job in keeping our fires small, but the public in general is becoming increasingly careless in discarding matches and cigarettes. Another form of carelessness is the neglect to secure the required permit from the town fire warden to burn brush or use an incinerator in or near woodlands. It is YOU and YOU alone who can help correct this shameful waste of our natural resource by:

- 1. Seeing that your incinerator is tight and is sitting on clean ground.
- 2. Always clean a space about any open fire to prevent its spreading.
- 3. Never burn in dry windy weather.

4. In all cases a written permit is required from your town Fire Warden.

It is with your cooperation that this shameful waste of timber and money can be stopped.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Wakefield qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the Twentieth day of March 1951, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of district officers and agents, and for payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the

state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$653.12 to employ a music supervisor in conjunction with the other districts in Supervisory Union No. 36, providing however that all the other districts raise their share.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to pay each teacher a cost of living bonus of \$100.00, for the year ending June 30, 1951, and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 from the surplus of June 30, 1951.
- 11. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

CHILD HEALTH CLINICS

The Child Health and Immunization Clinics which were held in a series of three from November through January 1951 included Physical examinations to twenty one Infant and Pre-School children. These Clinics were sponsored by the State Dep't of Health in cooperation with the Wakefield Red Cross Chapter, including Motor Corps participation in transportation. We appreciate the kindness of the Selectmen in the use of the Town Hall which is centrally located for the Clinics.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Wakefield:

During the school year of 1949-50 the teachers in the Wakefield schools were as follows: Sanbornville, grades 1 and 2 Miss Abbie F. Tuttle, grades 3 and 4 Miss Flora P. Brackett, grades 5 and 6 Miss Frances Nye, grades 7 and 8 Mr. Walter E. Brasier; Union grades 1 to 4 Mrs. Florence Gerrish, grades 5 to 8 Mrs. Helen Abbott. The same teachers are serving for the current year. During the past year Mrs. Gerrish, Miss Nye, and Mr. Brasier attended summer school at the University of New Hampshire. Miss Tuttle and Mrs. Abbott attended a 15-week extension course in teaching elementary science held at Center Ossipee during the first term of 1950-51.

Mrs. Ruth Anderson R. N. is continuing her efficient and valuable service as School Nurse.

No profession bears a heavier burden of responsibility than the teaching profession. Small children come into our schools to develop the knowledges, skills and attitudes that are to be theirs for a lifetime. It is the purpose of your teachers to guide and help their pupils to acquire these desirable attributes to the maximum degree. To the degree that the teacher is successful the future of the child, as an adult, is assured — assuming other influences are favorable. Your teachers are well aware of their responsibility. This is evidenced by the high quality of their work and their devotion to the welfare of their pupils.

Enrollment of last year is shown in the table of statistics. At the opening of the current year enrollments were as follows: — Sanbornville primary 52,

grammar 38, Union school 50; Spaulding High School 25, Nute High School 17, Brewster Academy 3, Farmington High School 1. Totals: — Elementary 140; High School 46.

High school tuition charges per pupil last year were: — Spaulding High School \$155.80, Nute High School \$155.00, Brewster Academy \$150.00. These rates were low when compared with the average in the state. This low tuition rate and the fact that high school transportation is not provided accounts for the relatively low cost per high school pupil. Tuition costs will increase considerably in 1951-52 as rates up to \$209.00 per pupil have been announced. Other costs, due to the general inflationary trend, have been increasing during recent months and may be expected to continue. Hope of some help through state aid seems remote.

During the current year Miss Tuttle, with the cooperation of several mothers, is serving a hot lunch to those pupils in her room who cannot go home during the noon hour. This is an important contribution to the welfare of these growing children and Miss Tuttle and her helpers are to be congratulated. The recently formed Parent-Teacher Association is studying means of providing a hot lunch for all pupils of the Sanborn-ville schools who have to bring lunches from home. It is hoped that a way may be found to provide a

hot lunch for the pupils of the three schools of the district. Some federal aid is available to help finance this project. The welfare of all the children is the concern of the entire district.

For some years school board members of Supervisory Union No. 36 have discussed the matter of hiring a music supervisor for the union. supervisor would provide instruction in both vocal and instrumental work in the schools of the union. supervisor's time would be allocated, principally, on the basis of the number of pupils in the district. some instances two rooms could be combined for instruction. In general the supervisor could spend about one hour each week in each classroom. In addition to actual instruction the supervisor would organize the work in music for the teachers to carry on during the rest of the week. It is usual for such supervisors to present one or more concerts at some central place with pupils from all districts participating. At the Supervisory Union meeting held December 20, 1951 it was voted to recommend that a special article be inserted in each district warrant to see if the district will vote to appropriate its share of the cost of a music supervisor. The total cost of hiring a supervisor is estimated at \$3200.00. Wakefield's share for next vear would be \$653.12.

The active cooperation of the School Board, teachers, pupils, and citizens is gratefully acknowledged.
