TIMBER OWNERS AND LUMBERMEN

The Selectmen of the Town of Warren wish to call call your attention to the new timber tax law.—

CHAPTER 295, LAWS OF 1949

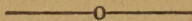
Some of the most important parts of this law as as follows:

Should you desire to cut lumber after April 1, 1950 you must procure from the Board of Selectmen of the Town or the assessors a blank which you must fill out giving name, residence, the location of the lot, the estimated amount, kind and value of the timber and such other information as may be required. This must be filed with the Selectmen before you begin operations.

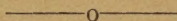
Whoever violates any of the provisions of this section shall be fined not more than Five Hundred Dollars.

Information on this law will be available from your Selectmen.

Your representative to the State Legislature will hold two meetings in the near future to give you all the information you wish to know in regard to this law.



REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

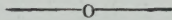

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: (LS)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defrey town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear the report of Selectmen and other town officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To raise and appropriate money to maintain highways and bridges, and raise and appropriate or set aside some amount of money for sidewalk fund.
5. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 to build a bridge over Black Brook near the Sanford Memorial Park.
6. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class V Roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$ 262.76, the State to contribute \$ 1,051.04.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or set aside the sum of \$ 1,000.00 toward the purchase of fire equipment.
8. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 1,000.00 to pay Town note due Laconia National Bank December 31, 1950.
9. To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights

10. To raise and appropriate money for support of Fire Department.

11. To raise and appropriate money for Town Library purposes.

12. To raise and appropriate money for Town Poor, Old Age Assistance and Soldier's Aid.

13. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day and care of Parks and Playgrounds.

14. To raise and appropriate money for Cemeteries.

15. To raise and appropriate money for White Pine Blister Rust Control in this Town.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 59.10 to the White Mountains Region Association.

17. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Week and raise and appropriate money for same.

18. To see what action the Town will take relative to the purchase of furniture for the Town Hall, (chairs, tables etc.) and if favorable, raise and appropriate money for same.

19. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in the Town?

20. To get the sense of the voters relative to a remedy for the Doctor situation in this Town and to take any action relating thereto.

21. To see if the Town will vote to grant a discount on property taxes of 1950, and determine date and percentage of same.

22. To authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

23. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

24. To transact any other business that legally may come before said meeting.

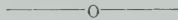

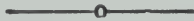

TEACHERS AND PUPILS. The district is fortunate in having a teaching staff composed entirely of college graduates holding four-year degrees. In this critical period of shortage of elementary teachers, many New Hampshire districts cannot meet this commendable goal.

Two new teachers were employed in September. Mrs. Doris G. Lavalley, a University of New Hampshire graduate replaced Mrs. Christie Caldron in Grades III-IV, and Mr. Hamilton J. Fleming, an Elon College, N. C., graduate became Principial and teacher of Grades VII-VIII. Mrs. Lavalley came from Ipswich, Massachusetts, and Mr. Fleming from South Portland, Maine.

Mrs. Dorothy Jesseman, and Mrs. Barbara Pike returned teaching in grades V-VI and I-II respectively.

The enrollment in the central school at the beginning of this school year was 97. The newly enrolled Glenciff pupils are enjoying the advantages of greater class competition better health facilities and instruction from commendable teachers.

BUILDINGS AND GROUND. The pupils now enjoy excellant toilet facilities, the School Board having continued its program to completion, by installing flush toilets for the boys, and lavatories in each toilet room. A bubbler was installed in the hallway of the second floor to accomodate the increased enrollment of pupils in the rooms there located. Equipment for the newly furnished VII and VIII grade room is of the movable, seperate unit type and lends itself well to the flexible program of the junior high school curriculum. There is no school system in the Union that has made such needed improvements as in the Warren Village School, and I hope that each citizen will visit his school, for only then can one appreciate the quality of the work done, or the benefits being derived from these improvements.

The material aid of parents, in both money and transportation the N. R. G. money, through the efforts of Mrs. William Hight the persistent efforts of Miss Latulippe beyond the line of duty, and the P. T. A. in sponsoring the Dental Mobile

Service, all contributed in making the Dental Clinic a successful health service project.

GENERAL INFORMATION. The loss of Lottie M. B. Underhill, R. N. who was taken from our school system by death last March, was keenly felt by the administration. Only expressions of praise are written in the files of the Superintendents Page, Janes, Martin Douglass, and myself all of whom she served during the years of her active service in this Union.

Miss Helen D. Latulippe, a graduate of Mary Hitchcock School of Nursing, and of Simmons College School of Public Nursing was obtained to fill the position left vacant. Miss Latulippe is a resident of Plymouth, New Hampshire.

The efficient manner in which she has taken over the work of School Nurse is commendable. The Union is fortunate in securing one with such qualifications and experience.

The loss of State Aid, in the several school districts of this Union, has made it necessary for the districts to curtail any immediate plans for a cooperative secondary school, as such plans depend somewhat upon both building aid and transportation aid from either the state or federal level, or both. Specifically, in Warren, the State Aid dropped from \$7186.74 in 1948-1949 to \$4,475.50 in 1949-1950.

CONCLUSION. My personal appreciation of the sincere interest of the members of the School Board in promoting the pupils' welfare and progress of the professional integrity and loyalty of the teachers, and of the assistance and cooperation of the citizens of the district in general, and of the P. T. A. in particular, is hereby gratefully acknowledged.

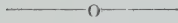

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public—YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is prevention fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

1. Being careful with fires in and near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.
